Arizona Notes & Numbers

» It's Family Weekend on the campus of the University of Arizona. All-time, the Wildcats are 52-33-1 on Family Weekend.

» UA has won four of its last six Family Weekend games, including a 47-30 win over UCLA last Oct. 14.

» Arizona has won four straight games in this series, including on a "Hill" Mary in 2014 and a double-overtime win in 2017.

» Of the 33 games in this series, 23 have been decided by one possession (8 points) or fewer, including each of the last five.

» Eleven of the 33 games vs. Cal have been decided by three points or less.

» Cal is making its first trip to Tucson since the 2014 season.

» The Wildcats have won seven of their last 12 Pac-12 Conference games, which includes last season's 45-44 double-overtime victory at California.

» The Golden Bears have visited Tucson on Family Weekend just once (2004).

» The Cats have rushed for at least 400 yards in six of their last 19 contests. From 1997-2015, the program reached 400 yards rushing on only three occasions.

» The Cats continue to lead the Pac-12 in rushing, averaging 481.4 yards per game.

» UA's defense forced three turnovers vs. USC after gaining only one through the first four games of the season.

» The Cats have allowed the third-fewest sacks in the Pac-12 (seven).

The Bear Down Tradition

Arizona's most memorable athletic tradition is the slogan "Bear Down," given to Wildcat teams by John "Button" Salmon, student body president and varsity athlete, shortly before he died in 1926 following an auto accident. Button Salmon's last message to his teammates, spoken to J.F. "Pop" McKale, coach and athletic director, was, "Tell them... tell the team to bear down." The rally cry predates "Win One for the Gipper" by two years.

Some Game Themes: The calendar turns to October and with it the midpoint of the season nears .. Yes, it seems like we just started, but Kevin Sumlin and his Wildcats are back at home for the sixth contest of his debut season ... One could label Saturday's clash with California as "big," "pivotal" or "must-win," and there's some merit to those notions if you consider potential postseason implications. However, for the Wildcats the most important factor is one discussed here a couple weeks ago: simply get better ... Despite a slow-starting offense, UA was a blocked field goal and missed extra point away from a tie game against USC last Saturday ... The reality is the Wildcats need to clean things up in all phases. Whether its untimely penalties, missed tackles, poor kicks or punts, every unit on the team has some simple things to tidy up that will make a big difference come Saturday ... The good news is, things can turn around quickly as Arizona proved itself last October by cashing in a 4-0 record to distance itself from an uninspiring 2-2 start ... Along the way to that perfect month was a thrilling double-overtime victory at California, the latest in a bizarre series between the two programs that dates back several decades now ... Justin Wilcox and his Golden Bears started fast with a 3-0 start, but their unblemished record took a hit with a home loss to resurgent Oregon last weekend ... Now in his second year, Wilcox has Cal trending in the right direction even though they are nestled behind three clear favorites in the Pac-12 North ... Down south, the Cats remain in the mix – as does just about everyone. Another win against a North Division foe would be a boost with plenty of familiar faces in the South Division race looming on the schedule ... If Arizona is to make a push in the south and contend for a bowl this season, it will need to play better at home starting with Family Weekend this Saturday ... Consecutive road games await in the middle of October, but otherwise four of the final seven are at Arizona Stadium ... The Cats hope they heat up as the weather begins to cool just a tad in the Old Pueblo ... A national TV audience tunes in on FS1, but we'll see you under the lights Saturday night. A new month of football is here.

Last Week: If it doesn't go down as a sloppy game, it will be a game of "shoulda, woulda, coulda" for Arizona as its comeback bid fell short against USC in a 24-20 defeat last Saturday. The Wildcats' offense sputtered early, allowing Aca'Cedric Ware and the Trojans' to rush out to a 17-0 lead. The visitors were poised to extend that lead in the late stages of the second quarter, but a fumble in the redzone was recovered by Jacob Colacion with 1:56 left in the half. The Cats pushed the ball to midfield, but their drive stalled until just a few seconds remained. A short pass to J.J. Taylor produced a nice chunk of yardage, but was aided by a roughing the passer and facemask foul that moved the ball all the way up to USC's 20-yardline for an untimed down to end the half. On for a 38-yard field goal try, Lucas Havrisik saw his kick blocked by Marvell Tell to preserve the Trojans' shutout ... Arizona opened the second half with an empty possession, then Ware broke loose for a 69-yard touchdown to make a 24-0 contest ... Still, the Cats fought back as Khalil Tate began to find some opportunities in the passing game. He connected with Stanley Berryhill for a 33-yard score just a few minutes later to make it a 24-7 game ... That score remained into the fourth quarter when Tate tossed a 32-yard touchdown pass to Cedric Peterson, drawing the home side within 10 points ... As the UA defense continued to turn away the Trojans, Tate again led the Cats down the field for another score. It took the Cats a series of short runs, but Gary Brightwell's 1-yard score made it a one-possession game with 1:40 remaining. Havrisik's extra point missed wide keeping the margin 24-20, meaning UA needed to recover an onside kick and score another touchdown. The Trojans recovered that kick and ran out the remaining time, keeping Tate and the Cats off the field for good ... The Trojans out-gained the Wildcats 450-330 overall, due in large part to limiting J.J. Taylor and UA's rushing attack to only 97 yards ... But Arizona remained in the game due to a resilient defense that recovered three fumbles and the Trojans' 18 penalties that totaled 169 yards ... Still, UA turned it over once and had eight penalties of their own, with the offense finding a rhythm too late ... It was USC's sixth straight win in the series.

Scheduling Odds & Ends: We've reached the point in the season where you begin looking for a bye week, and the Cats still have some waiting to do. The 2018 slate has Arizona playing 10 consecutive weeks before the bye week, which comes the second week of November ... The Cats are wrapping up a mini two-game "homestand" this week, one of two such consecutive home game stretches on the schedule (also play at home vs. Oregon on Oct. 27 and Colorado on Nov. 2) ... Next week will be a short turnaround for the Wildcats, who play a Friday night road contest at Utah on Oct. 12. It will be the first of two such quick turnarounds, with the other coming on Friday, Nov. 2 when UA hosts Colorado just six days after the Wildcats' Homecoming game on Saturday, Oct. 27 ... Arizona will be on the road for consecutive games at Utah (Oct. 12) and at UCLA (Oct. 20), before closing out the season with three of the final four games at Arizona Stadium.

Family Weekend: Arizona hosts California for the annual Family Weekend game this Saturday, Oct. 6, at Arizona Stadium ... The Wildcats are 52-33-1 all-time in their annual Family Weekend games, including a 47-30 victory over UCLA last Oct. 14 ... UA has won four its last six Family Weekend games ... It's been quite some time since Cal has visited UA for the Family Weekend game, last doing so in 2004 when Aaron Rodgers, J.J. Arrington and Marshawn Lynch cruised to a 38-0 win over Mike Stoops' first Arizona squad. Interestingly, that remains the only other time the Golden Bears have been in town for UA's Family Weekend game.

Bizarreness Against Berkeley: When Arizona and California get together, you might as well expect the unexpected. It's not a series that has the feel of a rivalry, but it's been evenly matched over the years since the schools first met in 1978. Arizona has won the last four meetings, but those wins have come by a total 11 points including a 1-point double overtime victory in 2017. In fact, Arizona holds a narrow 17-14-2 (yes, two ties) in the 33 previous meetings, though the Golden Bears have a slim 853-833 advantage in points scored. Still, it's the upsets and wacky moments that stand out in the history of the series. Here's a sampling:

Cal-Arizona Series Notes & Highlights

» Of the 33 games in the series, 23 have been decided by one possession (eight points), including each of the last five contests.

» The last meeting (Oct. 21, 2014 in Berkeley) needed two overtimes despite another masterful performance by Khalil Tate. UA led 21-7 at the half before Cal charged back to tie the game 28-28. The Cats went ahead by a field goal, 31-28, midway through the fourth, but the Golden Bears forced overtime after Matt Anderson drilled a 52-yard field goal with 1:52 left in regulation. Cal scored first in overtime, but the Cats tied the game 38-38 before going ahead 45-38 in the second overtime. The Bears then punched in a touchdown on fourth down play and elected to go for two and the win. That ensuing play saw Cal quarterback Ross Bowers throw toward Jordan Duncan in the back of the endzone, but Arizona linebacker Colin Schooler, with 14 tackles to his credit, knocked the ball away and preserved a resilient road victory for the Wildcats in Berkeley.

» The previous meeting (Sept. 20, 2014 in Tucson), saw Arizona trail 31-13 entering the fourth quarter before the Cats scored 36 fourth-quarter points en route to a 49-45 victory. UA's only lead of the game was with no time on the clock. Arizona quarterback Anu Solomon completed a 47-yard touchdown pass to Austin Hill on a Hail Mary heave that was nicknamed the "Hill Mary."

» Eleven of the 31 contests have been decided by a field goal or less, including two ties. The 1983 contested ended in a 33-33 draw, listed as the highest-scoring tie game in Arizona history, which is now a defunct category.

» There could have been several additional tie games in the series if not for the advent of overtime in the 90s. The schools combined to play six overtime periods in consecutive seasons in 1996 and 1997.

» The 1996 shootout helped lead to another change in college football. Arizona coach Dick Tomey opted to go for a two-point conversion in the fourth overtime of the 1996 contest, but the Wildcats failed and lost the game, 56-55. It was, at the time, the longest Division I football game. The next season, the NCAA instituted the rule whereby teams must try a two-point conversion when scoring a touchdown after the second overtime is complete.

» In that 1997 campaign, Arizona returned the favor with a 41-38 double-OT win in Tucson.

» The 1993 Arizona team was arguably the best in school history and was a victory shy of the Rose Bowl. The Golden Bears can be blamed. On a mid-November day in Berkeley, Cal scored 24 unanswered points to erase a 20-0 halftime deficit and stun the Wildcats, 24-20, in the final minutes. » In 2006, Cal was 8-1 and ranked No. 8 in the AP poll entering a mid-November contest in Tucson. Facing an underdog Wildcat club, the Golden Bears were in control much of the game, but an Antonio Cason pick-six put the Cats ahead in the fourth quarter and they held on for a 24-20 victory to wilt Cal's Rose Bowl hopes that season.

» In 2009, Arizona – with former Cal head coach Sonny Dykes as offensive coordinator – took a 6-2 record into the Bay Area and found itself trailing 18-16 in the waning minutes. Nick Foles drove the Wildcats into field goal range, but a third down pass attempt was batted at the line of scrimmage, Foles caught the deflection, rolled to his right and completed a pass to Delashaun Dean for a first down. Alas, it was an illegal forward pass – a double pass – and resulted in a penalty, loss of down and the resulting spot was out of field goal range. The fourth down try failed, Shane Vereen subsequently broke off a long TD run, and the Bears escaped, 24-16.

Touchdown Tate: Khalil Tate is known for his explosiveness, but even highlight reels may struggle to put into perspective how spectacular his big-play ability truly is. Just last season, Tate accounted for 26 touchdowns. He averaged 47.7 yards on his 12 rushing touchdowns, 28.6 yards on 14 passing touchdowns and 37.4 yards on all 26 touchdowns accounted for. Including his limited action as a freshman in 2016 and his early season numbers in 2018, here's a look at Tate's career touchdowns:

Move the Chains: One thing Arizona's offense has done well this season is get first downs. The Cats have picked up at least 20 first downs in all five games this season while averaging 25.6 first downs per game. That average ranks No. 14 in the country entering this week, and it's the best average for a UA offense in six seasons. Here's a look at UA's first down averages since 2012:

Explosive Plays: In recent weeks, Arizona has regained its knack for big plays that became so prominent last year. The Cats have racked up 17 offensive plays of at least 30 yards this season, a tally that ranks tied for 10th-most nationally. Interestingly, UA had only two such plays in its first two games of the season. Since, the Cats have produced 15 plays of 30+ yards, including at least three in each of the last three contests. Additionally, Arizona ranks tied for sixth nationally with six plays from scrimmage going at least 50 yards. A year ago, the team finished No. 5 in the FBS with 18 plays of 50+ yards.

Flag Day: Arizona and USC combined for 249 yards on 26 penalties last Saturday (and there were several other penalties declined). The Trojans alone drew 18 flags for 169 yards, both new opponent single-game records for Arizona. However, the Wildcats were penalized eight times for 80 yards, the latest in a disappointing trend of too many penalties. After drawing only four penalties for 26 yards in the opener, the Cats have now been penalized 33 times for 318 yards in their last four contests. Overall, Arizona ranks 98th nationally with 68.8 yards per game in penalties and 91st in penalties per game (7.4).

Cats in the Pac: Even with a setback against USC last week, Arizona seeks to build on a steady record in Pac-12 Conference play the last couple season. Two weeks, the Wildcats defeated Oregon State, 35-14, marking a win in the Pac-12 opener for the first time since 2014. A year ago (5-4), UA produced only its fourth winning conference record in 19 seasons. Now, with a 1-1 start in 2018 and including the season-ending victory over Arizona State in 2016, the Wildcats have won seven of their last 12 Pac-12 Conference games. The recent run of success has erased the memory of a painful eight-game conference losing streak prior to their triumph over the Sun Devils in 2016.

Fumble Flurry: After forcing just one turnover in the first four games of the season, the Arizona defense created a trio of turnovers last Saturday. Interestingly, the Wildcats recovered three Trojan fumbles, which snapped a string of five consecutive games without a fumble recovery for Arizona. Prior to last Saturday, UA's last fumble recovery came against Arizona State in the regular season finale last November. Arizona had not recovered three fumbles in a game since collecting three in a win over Grambling State on Sept. 10, 2016.

Poindexter's Production Picks Up: Poindexter's Production Picks Up: This time last season, Shawn Poindexter did not know if he would be playing football in 2018. He was hopeful to be back for one more season, and, last December, the NCAA granted him a full additional year of eligibility. He has made the most of the opportunity, emerging as UA's preferred target in the passing game and building off a strong finish to the 2017 campaign. Dating to last November, Poindexter has 27 receptions for 543 yards and three touchdowns in his last eight outings. Included are multiple receptions in seven of eight games after producing only two multi-catch games in his first 20 career games. In fact, over his first 20 games, which including an injury-riddled 2016 season, Poindexter hauled in 16 receptions for 244 yards. So in the recent span of eight contests, Poindexter has more than doubled his career tallies for receptions and yards. He now has 43 career grabs for 767 yards, an average of 17.8 yards per catch.

Shun Does a Ton: A member of the Paul Hornung Award List for the country's most versatile player, Shun Brown does a little bit of everything for Arizona. A dynamic punt returner, Brown's primary responsibility for the Wildcats is as the team's leading receiver. Brown in catches and yards Saturday versus USC, catching five passes for 81 yards. He leads the team with 23 catches this season and has 304 yards and three touchdowns. Brown now has 99 career receptions for the Wildcats and is approaching heady status. Brown is 29 career catches away from entering Arizona's Top 12 all-time in receptions. He would need to average 4.14 catches per game over Arizona's final seven regular season games to get to that point. Brown has also entered Arizona's Top 14 all-time in receiving touchdowns with 12. He's two away from tying Cayleb Jones for 13th all-time. Brown led Arizona with 43 receptions last year and finished with 573 yards, which was second most on the team behind Tony Ellison. This season, Brown has a Pro Football Focus "threat rate" of 35.3 percent, which is the highest on the team, meaning he is Khalil Tate's most targeted receiver. Tate and Brown have a completion percentage of 63.9, which is the highest of any Wildcat receiver.

School-er Zone: A consensus Freshman All-America selection last season, Colin Schooler has been a man on a mission the first five weeks of his sophomore season. He leads Arizona with 57 tackles through five games. Schooler already has 10 1/2 tackles-for-loss, which leads the Pac-12 and is tied with five others for tops in the country. Schooler, who had a 1/2 tackle-for-loss against USC, had multiple tackles-for-loss in each of the three games prior and set a new personal last month at Oregon State with four TFLs. The linebacker had Arizona's first 16-tackle game in four seasons in the opener versus BYU. He then had nine tackles apiece against Houston and Southern Utah over the next two weeks, before hitting 10 against the Beavers. Schooler led the Wildcats with 13 stops against USC. He has 24 career TFLs to his credit in just 18 career games and 15 career starts. Schooler is averaging 1.6 TFLs per start in his career. He's had at least three TFLs in a game four times over his last nine games dating back to last season. Schooler has also been either the team's leading tackler or second leading tackler in 10 of Arizona's last 11 games.

Lefty Vets: Arizona's revamped offensive line has improved each week and spots have been solidified with the return of senior left tackle Layth Friekh. Friekh missed the first two games of the season, but returned against Southern Utah. When he was inserted back into the lineup, left tackle Donovan Laie moved to right tackle and redshirt junior Cody Creason moved from right tackle to left guard. The move seems to have paid big dividends. Over the past three games with Friekh and Creason on the left side of the line, Arizona has produced 1,550 yards of total offense and 117 total points. Against Oregon State, Creason led all Arizona offensive players with a Pro Football Focus game score of 87. That score was the highest by any Pac-12 offensive lineman last week and the second-best by any Power 5 lineman. Creason received a run blocking grade of 88.9 and a pass block grade of 83. Friekh had the second-best score of any Pac-12 lineman behind Creason with a score of 81. He received a pass blocking grade of 83.9. The two have combined for 49 career starts and 59 career games played. Friekh had the highest PFF grade of any Arizona offensive lineman last week. His season grade of 78.9 is second-best on Arizona's offense behind Shawn Poindexter. Creason is the second-highest rated offensive lineman through five games with a season grade of 73.7.

Stan the Man: Prior to the season, walk-on redshirt freshman Stanley Berryhill was awarded a scholarship by coach Kevin Sumlin. The receiver from Tucson is already making the most of it in his first five career collegiate games. Berryhill has five catches for 99 yards this season. He caught his first career touchdown Saturday against USC, hauling in a 33-yard score from Khalil Tate in the second half. He has one catch in all five games this season. Berryhill received a game grade of 70.5 from Pro Football Focus against USC, which was the highest mark on the team. Berryhill is one of two Arizona receivers with 100 or more snaps this year to not have a drop, joining Cedric Peterson.

All over the Field(s): Sophomore linebacker Tony Fields has been a tackling machine since making his debut last season. Fields led Arizona with 104 stops last season, and currently sits second on the team with 36 stops and is tied for 12th in the league through four games. In his 18 career games, Fields has 140 total tackles, which is now the second-most by any Arizona player through 17 career games. His teammate, Colin Schooler has 12 more tackles than Fields through their first 18. Fields has started every game of his career and has proven to be a stalwart for coach Marcel Yates' defense. The combination of Fields and Schooler at linebacker has been a lethal one-two punch. In fact, the two teammates have combined for 93 total tackles through two games, which is the second-highest mark of any conference teammates this season. The two combined for 199 last season with 21 tackles-for-loss and nine sacks. Fields collected his first tackle-for-loss of the season two games ago at Oregon State.

Taylor Time: J.J. Taylor enters this week's game against Cal as Arizona's leading rusher with 527 yards and three touchdowns. He's averaging 105.4 yards per game. Taylor had a breakout game two contests ago at Oregon State, putting together one of the best games ever by an Arizona running back. Taylor rushed for 284 yards and two touchdowns on 27 carries against the Beavers, becoming just the 15th player in school history to rush for 200 or more yards. More, Taylor's total of 284 yards rank fourth all-time at Arizona for a single-game rushing total and third by a Wildcat running back. Taylor had 102 yards on his two touchdown runs alone against the Beavers, scoring from 40 yards out and 62 yards. He was named the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week for that game, becoming the first Wildcat offensive player since Khalil Tate last year to win the award. It was Taylor's fourth-career 100-yard game and first since totaling 129 yards against Oregon State last season. The 27 carries also marked a career high for Taylor. His 284 yards are the most ever by an Arizona running back in a road game. Only Tate's 327 yards at Colorado last season are more by an Arizona player in a road game. Last week against USC, Taylor had 50 yards on 18 carries.

Lockdown Lo: Sophomore cornerback Lorenzo Burns, who had a breakout season last year as a redshirt freshman, has taken the next step in his development this year as a sophomore. In the season opener this year, Burns established a new career high with three pass breakups and finished with three tackles in the 14th consecutive start of his career against BYU. He then started his 15th straight game against Houston and had three stops, but wasn't tested much by Houston quarterback D'eriq King. Against Southern Utah, Burns was once again a menace in the defensive backfield, breaking up a pair of passes to give him five for the season. Burns had another pass breakup to go with seven tackles at Oregon State last Saturday. Burns had another pass breakup against USC, his dad's alma mater, and leads the team in that category seven this season. The next closest on the team is three by Tim Hough and Tristan Cooper. Burns ranks fourth in the Pac-12 in passes defended, averaging 1.40 per contest. Burns established himself as one of Arizona's most reliable defenders a year ago as a freshman. He tied for second in the nation in interceptions by a freshman with his five. The five picks were the most by an Arizona defender since Trevin Wade also had five in 2009. Burns now has 14 career pass breakups in 18 games.

Who's Down With DFF?: Demetrius Flannigan-Fowles, a local product from Mountain View High School and Tucson High, has played in all 43 games in his career, never missing a contest. The senior has become a model of consistency and experience for the Arizona defense, which still features a number of underclassmen. He made his 29th career start Saturday versus USC and totaled seven tackles, which was third on the team behind Colin Schooler and Jarrius Wallace. Flannigan-Fowles had a career-high 81 tackles last season. He had five stops in the season opener versus BYU and three more against Houston. Against Southern Utah, he didn't start, but had his most productive game of the season. Flannigan-Fowles had five tackles, including one for a loss and also forced a fumble. He received a Pro Football Focus grade of 76.7, which was the highest of any Arizona defender with 50 or more snaps played. Flannigan-Fowles played 86 snaps, spending 44 in coverage and 42 in run defense prevention. With his five tackles against Southern Utah, Flannigan-Fowles reached 200 tackles for his career. He had one tackle and a pass breakup in 48 snaps played against Oregon State. He received a game score of 72.9, which was the highest by any member of Arizona's secondary. He was the highest rated member of the secondary against Southern Utah and Oregon State and second-highest rated against USC, behind sophomore Scottie Young Jr.

His Future is Bright-Well: Sophomore running back Gary Brightwell recorded his first 100-yard rushing game and his first career touchdown two games ago at Oregon State. Brightwell rushed for 113 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries, averaging 8.7 yards per carry. He scored on an eight-yard run in the fourth quarter to make it 28-7. He didn't wait long to get back in the end zone either. Brightwell scored again, this time from one yard out, against USC on Saturday, getting to Arizona within four points late in the fourth quarter. For the season, Brightwell has rushed for 277 yards and two touchdowns on 48 carries, averaging 5.8 yards per carry. Against Oregon State, Brightwell also had a 43-yard run, which marked the longest by an Arizona player all season until J.J. Taylor scored on a 62-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. Brightwell's early-season production is even more impressive when you consider he played slot receiver for the Wildcats as a true freshman last season, before being moved to running back. Brightwell and fellow running back J.J. Taylor have combined for 804 yards and five touchdowns in five games this season.

Jumpin' Jace: One of the most productive defensive backs in the Pac-12 last season, Jace Whittaker has had a stellar career for the Wildcats through his first three seasons. Whittaker, who missed Arizona's opener with BYU, had a career-high 13 pass breakups last season, which tied for second in the Pac-12 behind Oregon's Arrion Springs. Whittaker has 24 pass breakups over his past two seasons, which is the most by a Wildcat over a two-year span since Devin Ross had 25 over the 2008 and 2009 seasons. For his career, Whittaker has 28 career pass breakups, which is tied with Trevin Wade and Randy Robbins for ninth all-time at Arizona. He has 32 career passes defended with four interceptions in his career, three of which came last season. Whittaker was a second-team All-Pac-12 pick by Pro Football Focus and was recognized statistically for his strong coverage skills. Pro Football Focus gave Whittaker an overall grade of 85.85 last year, which is considered elite by their metrics and was the highest grade by any Arizona defender. Whittaker played 980 snaps last season, which led the Wildcats.

Reggie Gilbert had a pair of tackles in Green Bay's thrilling win over Chicago and was lauded on the nationally televised broadcast for his stellar cover skills at critical points in the second half. Defensive tackle Earl Mitchell had a solid game for San Francisco, totaling three tackles in a loss to Minnesota. Dane Cruikshank had one tackle in his NFL debut for Tennessee. In Week 2, Cruikshank was named the AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after he scored on a 66-yard fake punt.

BERKELEY, CALIF. (AP) — Arizona running back Zach Green couldn't bring himself to watch California's two-point conversion attempt in overtime and instead stared at his helmet.

Tight end Bryce Wolma tried to look away, too, but forced himself to take a peek -- just in time to see freshman linebacker Colin Schooler's game-saving deflection.

"I was looking at the scoreboard throughout overtime when we were on defense," said Wolma, whose touchdown moments earlier put the Wildcats ahead. "The very last played I turned. I'm like, 'I have to watch this.' I'm glad I did."

Quarterback Khalil Tate ran for 137 yards and a touchdown and passed for two more, including a 22-yarder to Wolma in the second overtime, and Arizona held on to beat California 45-44 on Saturday night.

The two teams combined for 984 yards of offense but it was Schooler's defensive play that made the difference.

Green scored the Wildcats touchdown in the first overtime and had a 3-yard run to open the second extra period before Tate scrambled in the backfield to avoid a sack and found Wolma open near the goal line for the game-winner.

California answered with Vic Enwere's 1-yard touchdown run but came up short on the two-point conversion try when Schooler knocked away Ross Bowers' pass intended for Jordan Duncan near the back of the end zone.

"We felt like the overtime two-point was that our best chance to win," Cal coach Justin Wilcox said. "It was my call. We were playing to win the game and that's what I felt like was the best."

That the Bears went for two instead of trying to force a third overtime rankled some of the Wildcats defenders.

"We took it kind of personally how they thought that they could go for two when they didn't need to," Schooler said. "Luckily they didn't get it."

Bowers completed 29 of 49 throws for 301 yards and two touchdowns, one in the first overtime, but was intercepted twice.

The Wildcats (5-2, 3-1 Pac-12) wasted leads of 21-7 and 28-14 before holding off the Bears (4-4, 1-4).

That bodes well for coach Rich Rodriguez's team, which is heading into the meaty portion of its schedule. Arizona next plays No. 15 Washington State in Tucson followed by a road game at No. 11 Southern California on Nov. 4.

"The difference at the end just came down to making plays," Rodriguez said. "They had a good play called. We just had a freshman step up and make a big play."

Tate continued to give Arizona's offense a lift. The Wildcats sophomore quarterback has rushed for 694 yards and passed for 468 in three games since replacing Brandon Dawkins.

Kevin Sumlin, a three-time national Coach of the Year finalist, was named Arizona's 32nd head coach on Jan. 14, 2018. He was formally introduced at a press conference on Jan. 16.

Sumlin comes to Arizona after serving as the head football coach at Texas A&M University for the past six seasons (2012-17), compiling a 51-26 record including three bowl victories. He also served as the head coach at the University of Houston for four seasons (2008-11), amassing a 35-17 record. In his 10 seasons as a head coach, Sumlin has compiled an 86-43 record and his teams have played in bowl games in nine of those seasons.

During his time at Texas A&M, Sumlin averaged over eight victories per season and won at least seven games each year, while competing in what many believe to be the toughest division in college football, the SEC West. His 44 wins over his first five seasons in College Station marked the second-fastest coaching start in school history, behind R.C. Slocum's 49 wins from 1989-93. Sumlin was the first Aggie head coach to lead his first six teams to a bowl game, and Sumlin's teams improved the Aggies' school record streak of consecutive seasons with a bowl game appearance to nine. His three bowl victories are tied for the most in school history. In addition, Sumlin guided Johnny Manziel to a stellar freshman season that saw him throw for 3,419 yards and 24 TDs, while running for 1,181 yards and 19 TDs en route to the 2012 Heisman Trophy.

Despite his defensive background as a linebacker at Purdue in the mid-1980s, it's been his offenses that have been his calling card as a head coach. In Sumlin's six seasons in the SEC, his offenses led the conference in passing, scoring and total offense twice. His 2012 edition became the first to break the 7,000-yard plateau in total offense with 7,261 yards, and his 2013 unit was just a yard shy of the milestone. Texas A&M owns SEC season records for passing yards (4,593 in 2013), total yards and average total offense (7,261/558.5 in 2012) and first downs (357 in 2013).

In his 10 seasons as a head coach, Sumlin's offenses have averaged more than 400 yards of total offense every season, including more than 500 yards five times. His teams have scored more than 500 points five times, including an incredible 690 points in 2011.

Sumlin was hired at Texas A&M after a successful stint as head coach at the University of Houston. His final Cougar squad set a school record with 13 victories (12 prior to Sumlin's departure to Texas A&M) in 2011 and notched the program's highest finish in the Bowl Championship Series standings. He was named the Region 5 Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association that year and was one of five finalists for the AFCA's National Coach of the Year award. Sumlin guided the Cougars to berths in the 2011 Ticket Center Bowl and the 2008 and 2009 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowls.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Brigham Young's offensive line pushed Arizona around. Tanner Mangum was effective in his return from an Achilles' tendon injury. The Cougars kept Khalil Tate from breaking off any big runs.

BYU expected to be better after a four-win season ago and sure seems to be after opening the season with a road win over a Pac-12 team.

Squally Canada scored on three short runs and BYU spoiled Kevin Sumlin's Arizona coaching debut with a 28-23 win over the Wildcats on Saturday night.

"We've been thinking about this for a long time, so really happy for the team in their ability to get the win," BYU coach Kalani Sitake said.

BYU went 4-9 last year, but was overpowering up front on offense and the defense limited Tate's effectiveness by not letting him get out and run.

Arizona had some good moments in the first half in its first game under Sumlin, but struggled on both sides of the ball in the third quarter as BYU built an 18-point lead.

Tate rallied Arizona in the fourth quarter. He scored on a 2-yard run and set up J.J. Taylor's 1-yard TD run with just over three minutes left, but Arizona trailed 28-23 after the 2-point conversion failed.

BYU never let the Wildcats get the ball back, grinding out a pair of first downs behind its powerful offensive line. "We got into a game that they were able to control the line of scrimmage," Sumlin said. "We couldn't get them off the field and when we did put them in a third-down position, they were able to make the plays to get a first down."

Tate threw for 197 yards and a TD on 17-of-34 passing, but was held to 14 yards rushing on eight carries.

Mangum battled injuries last season, throwing nine interceptions and eight touchdowns before going down with a season-ending Achilles' tendon injury. He was sharp against Arizona, throwing for 209 yards and a touchdown on 18-of-28 passing.

Mangum orchestrated a drive to set up Canada's first 1-yard TD run in the second quarter and opened the third with a 24-yard scoring pass to Matt Bushman that put BYU up 14-10.

"It was fun," Mangum said. "I was just enjoying it, the atmosphere, I love being with the guys and being healthy."

The Cougars began blowing the Wildcats off the ball on their next quick-hitting drive, marching 58 yards for Canada's second 1-yard TD run. Canada's 2-yard run at the end of the third quarter put BYU up 28-10.

Defensively, BYU was effective at limiting Tate's running options, but he found ways to beat them with his arm in the first half.

Tate led Arizona on a late scoring drive in the first half -- with help from BYU's two 15-yard penalties -- and hit Tony Ellison on a 15-yard touchdown pass to put the Wildcats up 10-7.

Tate had success again in the fourth quarter, but it wasn't enough to prevent Arizona's first home-opener loss since 2000.

"Being a quarterback, you want to win games. That's the ultimate goal," he said. "When the team wins, everybody wins."

HOUSTON (AP) Houston quarterback D'Eriq King and the rest of the Cougars' offense made it a miserable homecoming for Arizona coach Kevin Sumlin.

King threw for four touchdowns and rushed for two more as the Cougars hammered Arizona 45-18 on Saturday, dropping the Wildcats to 0-2 in Sumlin's first season.

King, who finished with 246 passing and 31 rushing yards, connected with Marquez Stevenson on a 24-yard TD pass, scored on a 1-yard run, then hit tight end Romello Brooker for a 52-yard score and it was 21-0 Houston after one quarter.

Arizona, playing uphill the rest of the game, never recovered.

Houston (2-0) scored twice more before halftime -- on a 35-yard field goal from Dalton Witherspoon and on King's 13-yard pass to Bryson Smith for a 31-0 lead.

"I thought our offensive staff and players did a great job today," Houston coach Major Applewhite said. "Getting out to a big lead was huge. It allowed us to get some other guys in the game."

Houston defensive lineman Ed Oliver, an All-American, gets a lot of hype but the Cougars' offense has a clear identity after the first two weeks. It's up-tempo and efficient. The Cougars are quick between plays, giving opponents little time to set up. On Saturday, it took Arizona some time to adjust.

"Defenses get tired with our fast offense," Brooker said. "I think it's really effective. We are improving on offense, too."

Arizona quarterback Khalil Tate, who has been mentioned in the Heisman Trophy conversation, looked sluggish at times, but finished the game strong, completing 24 of 45 passes for 341 yards and two interceptions and a scoring run. He tweaked his ankle in the first half but remained in the game. Sumlin said he and his staff checked on Tate throughout the game.

Tate said the ankle injury affected him a little, but that he still felt like his team did what they were trying to do. "You get bumps and bruises," he said. "We were still able to follow the game plan."

Arizona avoided the shut out, scoring its first points in the third quarter on a 49-yard field goal from Lucas Havrisik.

Running back Darrius Smith scored on a 1-yard rush with 11 seconds remaining in the third quarter to give the Wildcats their first touchdown. With just over 11 minutes left in the game, Tate scored his only touchdown of the day on a 2-yard run.

The Wildcats looked much better in the second half, but it was too little, too late.

"We didn't start fast, we got behind and it took too long to get things going," said Sumlin, who coached the Cougars from 2008-2011 before leaving for Texas A&M. "We have to start faster."

Arizona ran 100 total plays in the game and finished with 531 total yards (381 passing, 150 rushing.)

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) -- A sore ankle seems to be slowing that dynamic breakaway speed of Khalil Tate. But the Arizona quarterback sure can still throw the ball.

Tate passed for a career-best 349 yards and five touchdowns, then sat out most of the fourth quarter and Arizona gave Kevin Sumlin his first victory as Wildcats coach with a 62-31 rout of Southern Utah on Saturday night.

Tate needed just 13 completions, in 20 attempts, to amass his big numbers. His five touchdowns, which matched a career best, covered 17, 11, 2, 65 and 75 yards.

"Obviously he had some big plays that he created either in the pocket or got outside of it and kept his eyes downfield," Sumlin said, "and did some really nice things with some explosive plays. The first play of the game, he sat in there, then the second and third he had three progressions and so he was still able to improvise a little bit. He managed the game well."

Arizona (1-2) scored 31 consecutive points after Southern Utah (0-3), an FCS school coming off a 45-28 loss at Oregon State, tied it at 17-17 late in the second quarter.

J.J. Taylor returned a kickoff 84 yards for a touchdown for the Wildcats, his first kickoff return for a score in his college career.

"We just made plays," Tate said. "Like I said last week, you make that one play, I think that changes the outcome of the game."

Arizona, coming off a home loss to BYU and a dispiriting 45-18 rout at Houston, had 626 total yards to Southern Utah's 463, despite running 60 plays to the Thunderbirds' 98.

Tate tweaked an ankle early in the Houston game and hasn't shown his dynamic running ability since. He didn't need to against Southern Utah. His passing was plenty.

In the third quarter alone, Tate was 6-of-8 for 215 yards and three touchdowns. That included a 65-yard TD pass to Shun Brown and a pretty over-the-shoulder pass to Shawn Poindexter for a 75-yard score.

After Southern Utah rallied to tie it at 17-17 with 2:39 left in the first half, Tate quickly got the Wildcats back in the lead for good.

His 30-yard pass to Tony Ellison was the highlight of the eight-play, 67-yard drive. From the Thunderbirds' 11, Tate bought time running to his right and threw in the end zone to Brown for the TD.

The Wildcats took the second-half kickoff and put together another quick scoring drive. With the help of an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty, Arizona went 67 yards in five plays in just 1:55. Tate threw 2 yards to Cedric Peterson for the score and it was 31-17.

Arizona scored the first time it had the ball, Tate throwing 17 yards to Ellison for the score.

"The offense did a great job of controlling the football the first half," Southern Utah coach Demario Warren said. "I think they had their defense tired and worn out, but our defense just couldn't stop them tonight. Khalil Tate had a great game."

CORVALLIS, Ore -- After an explosive game, Arizona running back J.J. Taylor was asked what was working well for him.

"The offensive line," he responded, then chuckled. "All the stuff that we do at practice just showed up today."

Taylor rushed for a Reser Stadium-record 284 yards and two touchdowns, including a 62-yard sprint, as Arizona ran wild over Oregon State 35-14 in the Pac-12 opener on Saturday afternoon.

Dual-threat quarterback Khalil Tate, hampered by an injured ankle this season, passed for 152 yards and two touchdowns for the Wildcats. Gary Brightwell added 113 yards rushing and a touchdown and Shawn Poindexter had 92 receiving yards and a score for Arizona.

Arizona coach Kevin Sumlin said there was no doubt this was his team's best game of the season.

Safety Jalen Moore had 14 tackles, 13 unassisted, while Conor Blount threw for 137 yards and two touchdowns for the Beavers.

Arizona outgained Oregon State 594 yards to 238 yards.

"We never really found some rhythm out there. We really didn't," said Oregon State coach Jonathan Smith.

The Wildcats led 14-7 at halftime but missed scoring opportunities, in part due to penalties.

Arizona (2-2, 1-0 Pac-12) scored on the first possession of the second half to take control of the game, with Tate throwing a 16-yard touchdown to Poindexter.

With the score 28-14, Taylor's long run crushed any remaining hopes for the Beavers (1-3, 0-1).

Oregon State has juggled starters and playing time at quarterback, but Blount started his third straight game. Season starter Jake Luton replaced Blount last week versus Nevada but injured his ankle and did not play Saturday. Last season, Arizona went for a whopping 534 rushing yards against the Beavers in a 49-28 victory.

On Saturday, the Wildcats had 442 rushing yards.

"It's a stepping stone for our new offensive line to have a good rushing game," said left tackle Layth Friekh.

THE TAKEAWAY

Arizona: The Wildcat offensive line opened up big holes for their running backs, who often weren't touched until they were well into the secondary. No one expected Tate to match his career-high 349 yards and five touchdowns from last week against Southern Utah, but he was effective enough against the Beavers despite completing 9 of 17 passes.

Oregon State: Wide receiver Trevon Bradford, injured Sept. 15 versus Nevada, returned to action against the Wildcats and caught an 8-yard touchdown. Running back Jermar Jefferson totaled 100 yards, with 82 rushing yards.

YELLOW FLAGS -- The Wildcats were hit with seven penalties for 55 yards. Arizona had a touchdown wiped out with about 4 minutes left in the first half due to an illegal man downfield penalty. After an intentional grounding call pushed the ball back further, kicker Lucas Havrisik badly missed a 55-yard field goal. Sumlin estimated that penalties cost the Wildcats 21 points on Saturday, and said flags could cause the team to lose a game down the road.

KICKING WOES? -- Havrisik also missed a 43-yard field goal in the first half. Early in the third quarter, Arizona lined up for another 43-yard field goal, but the Wildcats rushed for a first down on a trick play. Havrisik is now 4 for 8, though that statistic is slightly misleading. All his misses are from 43 yards or longer.

TUCSON, Ariz. -- Southern California clicked on both sides of the ball, overcoming a rash of penalties while building a 24-point lead.

Then the offense bogged down. Two fumbles were lost in the fourth quarter. The penalties kept piling up.

What appeared to be an easy road victory turned into an ugly one.

Aca'Cedric Ware ran for 197 yards and two touchdowns, and USC overcame a mountain of penalties to hold off Arizona for a 24-20 victory Saturday night.

"The one thing I love about our kids is they're realists," USC coach Clay Helton said. "To be able to come out of here with a victory and know there's still more on the bone is a good thing."

USC (3-2, 2-1 Pac-12) dominated the Wildcats while building a 24-point third-quarter lead, but lost two fourth-quarter fumbles to let Arizona (2-3, 1-1) back in it. The Trojans also had 18 penalties for 169 yards, including a pass interference call that negated an interception in the fourth quarter.

Arizona's Gary Brightwell scored on a 1-yard run with 1:40 to play, but Lucas Havrisik missed the extra point and USC recovered the onside kick.

"We didn't play very well," Arizona coach Kevin Sumlin said. "Really, after that first drive of the second half, our defense did a good job."

JT Daniels managed the Trojans offense well in the first half before the Trojans went stagnant in the second. He completed 16 of 24 passes for 197 yards and lost a fumble to set up Khalil Tate's 32-yard touchdown pass to Cedric Peterson.

Tate threw for 232 yards and two touchdowns, but was limited to 38 yards rushing. J.J. Taylor, who had 284 yards rushing against Oregon State last week, was held to 50 yards on 18 carries.

"USC did a nice job of challenging us," Sumlin said.

The Trojans controlled Arizona on both sides of the ball while building a 17-0 halftime lead.

USC racked up 281 total yards in the first half, scoring on Vavae Malepeai's 1-yard run in the first quarter and Ware's 26-yarder in the second. The Trojans stymied the Wildcats' offense, limiting them to 116 yards while intercepting a pass by Tate to set up Michael Brown's 42-yard field goal.

Arizona caught a break when a facemask penalty -- USC's ninth penalty of the half -- tacked on to a 20-yard completion gave the Wildcats a chance for a field goal with no time on the clock. Marvell Tell blocked Havrisik's 28-yard field-goal attempt, preserving the first-half shutout.

The second half continued the same as the first: Arizona gained 13 yards before punting on its first drive, Ware ripped off a 69-yard touchdown run.

Arizona's offense finally showed some life with Tate connecting on two long throws. The second one, 33 yards to Stanley Berryhill III, cut USC's lead to 24-7.

The Wildcats recovered a fumble at USC's 32-yard line after sacking Daniels early in the fourth quarter and Tate hit Cedric Peterson for a 32-yard touchdown on the next play, cutting the lead to 10.

Arizona got another score, but took too long in getting it and couldn't get the ball back.

"We just need to play a complete game in all three phases," Arizona linebacker Colin Schooler said. "If you look at our losses, we haven't done that."
