




The Sun Devils were hungry entering the 1965 season after making their first College World Series appearance the previous year. Though they made an early exit with two losses in three games in 1964, their journey to Omaha, Nebraska, had given them a taste of the good life. There was no stopping Coach Bobby Winkles' team in '65. They stormed through the regular season with a 47-7 record, won the Western Athletic Conference title at 9-3 and swept two games from Colorado State in the District 7 playoffs in Phoenix to earn another trip to Omaha sporting a No.-1 national ranking from Collegiate Baseball. Slugging center fielder Rick Monday was the backbone of that team.



He batted .359 with a school-record 11 home runs and became the first of 13 Sun Devils to be named National Player of the Year. He was the first player chosen (by the Kansas City Athletics) in Major League Baseball's initial amateur draft. John Pavlik (12-0), Jim Merrick (13-2) and Ron Lea (11-3) headed the pitching staff.



ASUVS.LAFAYETTE-JUNE 7

ASU entered the tourney ranked first in the final national poll prior to the CWS, and lived up to the billing. The Devils blasted three Lafayette pitchers for a 14-1 win. Top Sun Devil sluggers included starting pitcher John Pavlik (2-for-3, 1 RBI), Sal Bando (3-for-5 with a double, a homer and 3 RBI), Jim Armstrong (3-for-4, 2 RBI and 3 runs scored) and Glenn Smith, with a 3-for-4 performance. Pavlik limited Lafayette to just three singles in getting the win, and was helped by Alan Schmelz in the ninth. Pavlik had a no-hitter for six innings before a run scored on three singles in the seventh.

The 1967 Sun Devils did not have an easy path to Omaha, where they captured their second national championship in three years. The Devils lost four of their first five Western Athletic Conference games before rallying to capture the Southern Division title and earn a spot against Brigham Young University in the WAC playoffs.

In a game still considered by many the greatest in school history, the 11th-ranked Sun Devils beat 9th-ranked Arizona, 3-2, in a one-game Southern Division playoff in front of 8,314 fans at Phoenix Municipal Stadium. Sun Devil pitcher Gary Gentry, who had shut out the Wildcats, 3-0, in the final regularseason game, pitched all 15 innings of the four-hour, 17-minute marathon. Working on just two days' rest, Gentry scattered nine hits, walked five and struck out 18.



He threw 208 pitches.

After disposing of BYU in the WAC championship series, the Sun Devils won two of three from Air Force in the District 7 playoffs in Phoenix to earn a spot in Omaha, where they won five of six games to claim National Title No. 2.



ASU VS. OKLAHOMA STATE-JUNE 12

Arizona State defeated Oklahoma State by a 7-2 margin, using a five-run seventh frame and the superb pitching of Gary Gentry to forge the win. The Devils fell behind, 2-0, in the top half of the first, but rebounded with a solo homer by Scott Reid in the third and an RBI triple by Jack Lind that scored Dave Grangaard in the fourth to tie the score. In the seventh, the Devils' main artillery was a three-run homer by Scott Reid. Gentry struck out at least one man every inning. After failing to return to Omaha in 1968, the Sun Devils put it all together with a monster season in 1969. They zipped through the WAC with a 15-3 conference record in the first year that league play was expanded from 12 to 18 games. After beating Idaho twice in the District 7 playoff in Phoenix, Coach Bobby Winkles' Devils stormed into Omaha with a 51-10 record and No.-1 national ranking.

Outfielder Paul Ray Powell led the Sun Devils in batting (.366), home runs (11) and RBI (73) and was named College Player of the Year by The Sporting News. Powell was a first-round pick of the Minnesota Twins in the 1969 June amateur draft, the seventh player drafted overall. Powell also played safety on the football team and led the nation in kick scoring in 1968.

Left-hander Larry Gura was the pitching star of the 1969 Sun Devils. He put together



a season that still ranks as one of the best in college history. Gura set a NCAA record for pitching victories with a 19-2 record and established a school record with a sparkling 1.01 ERA. He struck out 196 batters in 169 innings. He made four pitching appearances — two as a starter and two in relief — as the Sun Devils shook off a first-round loss to Texas to win their third national title in Omaha.

Longhorn freshman pitcher Burt Hooten limited ASU to only three hits in this 4-0 ASU loss. The 1977 Sun Devils were a determined bunch after compiling a 65-10 overall record and 17-1 WAC mark in 1976 but falling short in their quest for the school's fourth national title. Their 1977 record (57-12, 15-3) wasn't quite as impressive and they were down a bit in most statistical categories, but this time they got it right at Omaha.

Coach Jim Brock's Devils hit their stride in mid April, rolling up 19 consecutive victories in a streak that continued into the post season. They swept BYU in the WAC playoffs and stormed through a NCAA Regional tournament in Tempe with one victory over Cal State Fullerton and two over Washington State, taking a No. 1 national ranking into the College World Series.



Though they lacked the dominant pitching of some earlier ASU clubs, the Devils bludgeoned opponents with an attack that featured the likes of Bob Horner, Hubie Brooks, Chris Bando, Dave Hudgens and Jamie Allen. Horner won virtually every major college baseball award after leading the nation in hits (102), home runs (22), RBI (87) and total bases (191).

Sun Devil bats blistered Clemson early, and ASU then hung on for a 10-7 win. The Devils knocked undefeated Clemson hurler Ron Musselman out of the game early with one run in the first and a three-run third inning. In the fifth, Jamie Allen led off with a homer and Steve Michael doubled in a run to give ASU a 6-0 lead, but ASU starter Jerry Vasquez faltered and allowed the Tigers five runs in the bottom of the inning. The 1981 Sun Devils launched the 1981 season with the slogan "Omaha and Fun in '81." They enjoyed themselves thoroughly, frolicking through the tough Pac-10 Southern Division with a 26-4 record, taking a No. 1-national ranking into the College World Series.

About the only blip was a three-game sweep at the hands of Stanford in a late-season road series, but the Devils rebounded to sweep rival Arizona in the final regular-season series to take some momentum into the post season. They beat Gonzaga once and Cal State Fullerton twice to sweep the NCAA West Regional in Tempe and earn a trip to Omaha.

A devastating offense led by Mike Sodders (.424, 22 HR, 100 RBI), Kevin Romine (.410, 81 R,



27 SB) and Stan Holmes (.366, 14 HR, 82 RBI) set school records for team batting average (.356), home runs (110) and runs (694). Other big contributors were Donnie Hill (.378, 81 R, 22 SB), Ricky Nelson (.345, 18 HR, 68 RBI) and Alvin Davis (.396, 72 R). The bullpen was the strength of the pitching staff. Kendall Carter led the nation in victories with a 19-1 record, mostly in relief. Kevin Dukes, who beat Oklahoma State in the national title game, was 8-2 with 12 saves.

The Sun Devils' explosive offense scored early and often as ASU defeated Texas, 11-2, on the first day of competition. Left fielder Stan Holmes went a perfect 5-for-5 with six RBI and three runs scored as Arizona State scored in six of the nine innings played. First baseman Alvin Davis chipped in a 4-for-5 effort as well. A-State starter Kendall Carter pitched five and two-thirds innings of five-hit ball, allowing only two unearned runs in the fifth to pick up the win. Kevin Dukes came in and shut the Longhorns down over the next 3.1 innings, recording six strikeouts.

Arizona State would claim its fifth NCAA title with a 7-4 win over Oklahoma State, avenging the earlier extra-inning loss. ASU pounded the Cowboy pitching staff for 13 hits before a crowd of 13,239 and capitalized on four OSU errors. Reliever Kevin Dukes would pick up his second win of the series, pitching 8.2 strong innings and allowing only two hits and two runs while striking out six. For the Devils, left fielder Stan Holmes, who was named Outstanding Player of the CWS, went 2-for-4 with a run scored and an RBI. Designated hitter Mike McCain turned in a 1-for-2 performance with an RBI as well. ASU's Alvin Davis, Mike Sodders, Lemmie Miller and Kevin Dukes were named to the all-tournament team. The potent Sun Devil offense batted .325 for the tournament with nine home runs in six games.

The new facility offers higher capacity, improved amenities, and opportunities for better in-game experience for fans, alumni, former letter winners, student-athletes, media and employees.


The program's storied tradition is honored in a variety of ways, including increased signage and branding as well as creating a Legacy Walk that will feature permanent plaques for former head coaches and the foundation of the program, increased use of historical photos and video, and added emphasis on the programs strong ties with Major League Baseball, USA Baseball and the College World Series.

Capital improvements included a state-of-the art video board, batting tunnel, and weight room, a redesigned clubhouse complete with a player's lounge, academic center and training room, creation of a grass berm and patio installations, and premium seating options.


Arizona State University and Sun Devil Athletics completed a series of capital improvements to Phoenix Municipal Stadium this summer, highlighted by a state-of-the-art batting facility.

The Malone Family Hitting Complex, which is situated along the right-field line, includes three indoor hitting bays and a soft toss area, and garage-style doors that will afford the facility an open-air option, and a viewing deck with a hospitality area to enhance the game day experience for Sun Devil Nation.

Prior to the 2025 season, the Whiteman Family Performance Center was completed. This state-of-the-art pitching lab will allow Sun Devil coaches to work with pitchers in an effort to maximize performance and pitching effectiveness.

WILLIE BLOOMQUIST

Head Coach

Willie Bloomquist - among the legendary players in Sun Devil school history and a staple in the baseball world both locally and nationally - was named the head coach for the Arizona State University baseball program, on June 11, 2021, as announced by Vice President for University **Athletics Athletics** and Director Ray Anderson.

In three seasons with the program, Bloomquist has seen 18 of his players drafted in the MLB Draft, five All-Americans, three freshman All-Americans and a gritty squad that has shown its never out of game. Four times has his program overcome seven-run deficits to win a game, something that hadn't been accomplished since the 2000 season prior. Eleven times has ASU overcome a five-run deficit in three seasons under Bloomquist. In the last two seasons, ASU has 18 wins in games where it has trailed by at least three runs at some point in the game and the team has trailed at one point in 38 of its last 53 wins over the last two seasons.

The 2024 campaign saw the Sun Devils post one of the most prolific offenses in the country. ASU became just the eighth Sun Devil team in the program's illustrious history to reach 100 home runs and the first to do it since having 101 in 1990. The 2024 Sun Devils were the fastest to reach triple digits in the category in program history, doing so in 56 games and finished with 102 - 30th nationally and second in the Pac-12.

ASU had five players reach double digits in homers, marking the first time at ASU since 1993 that five players accomplished the feat (Todd Cady, Doug Newstrom, Antone Williamson, Paul Lo Duca, Jacob Cruz). It was the first season that even four had reached the tally since 1994.

ASU was sixth in the country with 143 doubles and fourth at 2.47 doubles per game. The team's .541 slugging percentage was 15th nationally while finishing second in the Pac-12 with a .403 team OBP. The team posted a .313 batting average for the year, good for 12th in the nation.

Kien Vu (NCBWA) and Ryan Campos (ABCA) each earned third-team All-America honors for the season while Brandon Compton was named the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year and

Freshman All-American. The Sun Devils had nine players recognized on the All-Pac-12 teams for the second-straight season. Vu finished sixth in the country and tops in the Pac-12 with his .413 average.

Campos was eighth in the country with 25 doubles and was a finalist for the Dick Howser trophy for the nation's top player. In his career - all three years coming under Bloomquist - he reached base in 137-of-147 career games (.932), posting a career. 369 average - good for 16th in ASU history. He would go on to become the 109th overall selection and a 4th round pick by the Cardinals in the 2024 MLB Draft.

Nick McLain finished his two years at ASU with a .327 average (92-of-281), with a .658 slugging percentage - a tally good for sixth in ASU school history (min. 250 at-bats) - en route to a third-round selection in the 2024 MLB draft by the White Sox. He logged 20 homers and 23 doubles in his career, in addition to five triples as over half his career hits going for extra bases.

In his second year at the helm, Bloomquist oversaw a marked improvement of the Sun Devil program, leading the team to a 32-23 record and a Top-Five finish in the Pac-12. The Sun Devil Baseball team was highly represented in the 2023 MLB Draft with eight overall selections – the fourth-highest tally in the nation and the most for the program since 2015.

The eight picks all went in the MLB Draft's most recent format of twenty rounds, after previous renditions typically included 40 or more rounds. ASU's eight selections are tied for the fourthmost in the first twenty rounds of an MLB Draft in program history and the most since also having eight in the 2008 MLB Draft. Only LSU (13), Wake Forest (10) and Stanford (9) had more overall selections than the Sun Devils this season.

JEREMY ACCARDO

Pitching Coach

Sun Devil Baseball and Willie Bloomquist named 18-year professional player and coaching veteran Jeremy Accardo as the program's pitching coach on June 27, 2024.

A native of Mesa, Ariz., Accardo comes to the Sun Devils after spending eight years in the professional coaching ranks, most recently as the Triple-A pitching coach for the Nashville Sounds of the Milwaukee Brewers

organization after previously spending several seasons in the Mets organization where he rose from a Complex League coach to the assistant pitching coach for the MLB team.

"We are dedicated to putting resources into our pitching operation and Jeremy Accardo allows us to add a brilliant mind to our staff to lead that charge," Bloomquist said. "We are in a place where we needed to expand our knowledge and expertise into the 'new era' of analytics and technology in baseball and Jeremy jumps off the page with his surplus of experience in developing professional baseball players utilizing those tools in the modern age."

"Jeremy is an incredible family man who has vast ties and roots to the Valley. He is a great communicator and a real personality that will relate well and get through to this generation."

Accardo's addition to the Sun Devil staff will see him take advantage of Sun Devil Athletics' recent investments to incorporate state-of-the-art technology from Simi, Trackman and Edgertronic. Accardo will play a pivotal role in unlocking the technological and analytic benefits afforded by the recently completed Whiteman Family Performance Center in right field – colloquially known as the ASU Pitching Lab.

"As someone born and raised in the Valley, this opportunity means a lot to me. I got into this game to help kids get better and achieve their dreams and I couldn't be more excited to do that at Arizona State," Accardo said. "I wanted to thank Graham Rossini, Willie Bloomquist, Sam Peraza, the coaching staff and especially the players for welcoming me. I am not taking this opportunity lightly. This is a dream job for me and I am eager to get going and help get this program back to where I know Willie and all of our fanbase envision and expect it to be."

Accardo comes to Tempe after spending the last several seasons with the Nashville Sounds, the Triple-A affiliate of the Brewers organization. Under Accardo's guidance, the Sounds pitching staff boasted the second-lowest ERA in Triple-A in 2023 and the third-lowest in 2022. The 2024 Sounds staff currently has the No. 6 ERA in Triple-A. The Brewers had the lowest team era in the MLB in 2023 and are currently ninth in the MLB this season, featuring several pitchers that Accardo helped develop.

Prior to joining the Brewers organization, Accardo spent the 2017-21 seasons with the Mets organization, where he started as an assistant coach in the Complex League in 2017 before a meteoric rise to the assistant pitching coach for the MLB team from 2019-21.

While he served as assistant pitching coach for the Major League team, the Mets were 11th in the MLB in ERA in 2019 and ninth in 2021. Highlighting that tenure was the production of three All-Star selections (Jacob DeGrom x2, Taijuan Walker). DeGrom was the National League Cy Young Award winner in 2019 with Accardo as an assistant coach, and led the NL in strikeouts in 2019 and 2020, earning All-MLB First Team Selections both seasons.

Accardo was the minor league pitching coordinator for the organization prior to that after a season as an assistant coach for the Las Vegas 51s. Among his pitchers from the 2018 Las Vegas 51s roster, where he served as an assistant coach, he oversaw the call-ups, recalls and rehabilitations of MLB players Paul Sewald, Bobby Wahl, Zack Wheeler, Drew Smith, Jacob Rhame, Scott Copeland, Tim Peterson and a slew of others.

"The modern era of baseball has changed in regard to how much emphasis has been placed onto the college game and prioritizing its prospects in recent years," Bloomquist said. "The development for the next level is now taking place on university campuses and you only need to follow the track record of some premier programs and their investment into bringing professional coaches into the fold to develop their talent. I wanted to make sure ASU was at the forefront of that trend."

Accardo joins a growing list of minor league developmental coaches and coordinators making the transition to the collegiate level. Notable among that group is recently named Texas Pitching Coach Max Weiner, who helped lead Texas A&M to the College World Series finals and the No. 4 team ERA nationally this season after spending several seasons with the Mariners organization. Dallas Baptist's Cale Johnson (Pirates) and Oregon State's Rich Dorman (Mariners) led their pitching staffs to Top-10 ERAs in the country in 2024 and postseason berths with DBU winning 45 games and the Beavers hosting an NCAA Regional. Georgia head coach Wes Johnson (Twins) led the Bulldogs to a national seed in 2024 in his first season at the helm, a year removed from winning a national title with LSU as the pitching coach and overseeing the development of No. 1 overall pick Paul Skenes.

While Accardo will assume the primary duties with ASU's pitchers, Sam Peraza will remain on staff as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator while former assistant coach Mike Goff will remain on staff in a non-coaching role.

Prior to joining the professional ranks, Accardo spent one season as an assistant coach for his alma mater at Illinois State University in 2016 after concluding a decade of action as a professional pitcher from 2003-2013 – including spending the 2005-12 seasons at the Major League level.

Accardo's professional career saw him spend time with six organizations, he appeared in 262 MLB $\,$ games with a career 4.30 ERA and 38 saves.

Accardo is a Mesa native who has dedicated much time to the local community and various youth sports chapters in his time away from the professional ranks. He resides in the Valley with his wife Carly and his children LeeAnne, Larson and Locke. Carly founded the Peaches Baseball Club in 2015, an all-girl baseball league in the East Valley that was developed with the couple's late daughter Leighton, who tragically passed from germ cell cancer in 2020. Leighton was added to the Arizona Coyotes' Ring of Honor in 2021.

SAM PERAZA

Assistant Coach, Recruiting Coordinator

Sam Peraza, formerly the associate head coach and pitching coach at San Diego State, enters his fourth season as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for Sun Devil Baseball.

Peraza's efforts have shown immediate dividends for the Sun Devils, with 10 pitchers being drafted in his first three seasons with the program. ASU's six pitchers taken in the 2023 MLB Draft were tied for a program record and the most in the first 20

rounds of an MLB Draft in in program history.

The 2024 Sun Devil roster was a group of strikeout machines, finishing 18th in the country with a 10.2 strikeout per nine inning tally - tops in the Pac-12. Ben Jacobs came on to the scene as ASU's ace with a 13.84 K/9 that was 13th natonally and tops in the Pac-12 as he finished with 102 strikeouts on the season.

Peraza has shown his efforts on the recruiting end as well, bringing in the nation's No. 2 transfer portal class in 2022 and No. 25 class in 2023. His 2023 freshman class was tabbed as the No. 23 group in the nation according to D1Baseball. ASU's 2024 and 2025 classes came in at No. 18 in the country for his third-straight Top-25 signing class.

Peraza spent the previous six seasons with the Aztecs as the program's pitching coach and was promoted to associate head coach in the summer of 2019.

During his illustrious coaching career, Peraza's pitchers have earned nine All-America honors, five conference Pitcher of the Year awards and 20 all-conference accolades. Peraza has coached 17 players that would go on the become MLB Draft selections.

With Peraza on the Aztec coaching staff, SDSU captured back-to-back Mountain West tournament titles in 2017 and 2018 and finished first or second in team earned run average in the league in four of the last six seasons. Peraza was part of a group that won 86 straight games when leading after seven innings – an SDSU school record.

Peraza has been a notable standout on the recruiting trail in his stops at San Diego State and Florida International with highlights including the No. 14 national class in 2017 at SDSU and the No. 8 recruiting class in the country at FIU in 2014. He also produced Top-35 classes in 2019 and 2020 at SDSU, which was consistently at the head of the Mountain West in recruiting under Peraza.

The 2021 Aztec squad was the only team in the MW to reach 30 wins on the season and finished second in a league that came down to the final weekend of action to determine a conference champion. SDSU was second in the league with two pitchers selected to the All-Conference Team in Tre Brown and Michael Paredes. Brown led the MW with seven victories on the season while also adding four saves. Troy Melton and Paredes were second and third in the league, respectively, in strikeouts with Ricky Tibbett in sixth.

During the shortened 2020 campaign, the Aztecs led the conference with a collective 3.73 ERA, allowing three earned runs or less in eight of their 10 victories. Against a challenging schedule, SDSU rose to the occasion, posting wins over Virginia Tech, Coastal Carolina, Cal State Fullerton,

Iowa, Nebraska, Long Beach State, Oregon State (twice), UC Irvine and Oklahoma.

Individually, Peraza coached two all-MW pitchers in Casey Schmitt and Troy Melton. Schmitt tied for the national lead with six saves in just eight relief appearances after earning consensus preseason All-America recognition and earning a spot on the preseason all-conference team.

Meanwhile, Melton went 3-1 as the Aztecs' Saturday starter, sharing the league lead in victories, which was tied for 23rd nationally. In addition, the right-hander ranked second in the MW with 26 strikeouts and found himself among the conference leaders in several categories, including opposing batting average (3rd - .192), fewest hits allowed (3rd - 15), runs allowed (T4th - 9) and ERA (7th - 3.22).

After leading the Mountain West in ERA during the 2017 and 2018 seasons, Peraza directed an injury-plagued 2019 pitching staff – the only staff in the nation to have all three opening weekend starters miss more than half of the season – to the second-best ERA in the league (4.28).

Under Peraza's guidance, right-handers Adrian Mardueno and Justin Goossen-Brown both earned all-conference honors in 2019, propelling SDSU to its sixth season with 30 or more wins victories in a seven-year span. Earlier that season, the Aztecs had an 86-game winning streak snapped when leading after eight innings, which stood as one of the five longest in the nation at the time.

In January 2019, Peraza was invited to attend the SureFire Baseball Forum, which features the top 32 assistant baseball coaches and 32 athletic directors from all over the country. The forum is designed to promote college baseball to athletic directors and give possible future head coaches an opportunity to network themselves, as well as learn the process from actual athletic directors.

Peraza's pitching staff played a crucial role in helping San Diego State secure its fifth Mountain West tournament championship over a six-year span in 2018. Peraza oversaw the emergence of junior right-hander Garrett Hill, who became the second straight Aztec to collect MW Pitcher of the Year honors and was selected in the MLB First-Year Player Draft for the first time in career by the Detroit Tigers. In addition, the SDSU bullpen was nearly perfect for the duration of the Mountain West Championships when opposing batters hit a combined .045 (2-for-44) against Aztec relievers.

Leading SDSU bullpen that season was closer Casey Schmitt, who was named a first-team Freshman All-American by Baseball America, marking the first Aztec to receive such distinction since Stephen Strasburg in 2007. Schmitt finished his freshman campaign with a 0.28 ERA, the lowest single-season mark in SDSU history (minimum 30 IP).

Peraza's staff was also instrumental in the Aztecs' MW tournament title run in 2017, leading the league in victories (42), saves (16), earned run average (4.12), walks allowed (188), runs allowed (298) and opponent batting average (.269). In conference play, SDSU also yielded the fewest hits (281) and extra-base hits (82).

Individually, left-hander Brett Seeburger garnered MW Pitcher of the Year accolades under Peraza's watch and was later selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 2017 MLB First-Year Player Draft. The Aztecs had two additional hurlers drafted that year in left-hander Marcus Reyes (Toronto) and righty CJ Saylor (St. Louis), tying for the program's most pitching draft picks since 2007.

COACHING STAFF





JASON ELLISON

Assistant Coach

Former Major Leaguer Jason Ellison was named the program's next hitting coach in August 2024, as announced by head coach Willie Bloomquist.

Ellison, who spent over a decade as a scout at the MLB level, joins the program after a season as the hitting and outfield coordinator at the University of Washington.

"To say I have known Jason for a long time would be an understatement and no one was as excited as I when he got into the coaching ranks last season," Bloomquist said, "It takes someone with exceptional baseball savvy and knowledge to earn the front office's trust for as long as Jason did and for him to come in and immediately have an impact at the collegiate level was no surprise. Jason is a baseball guy and has been his whole life. His guys came in and put up 40 runs at Muni against us last season. To have that ability on our coaching staff this season will be a boom for this program and our future."

During Ellison's lone season on Montlake, he oversaw the development of All-Pac-12 honoree Aiva Arquette, who rose to stardom as a sophomore.

The Hawai'ian native led the Huskies and ranked 11th in the Pac-12 in batting average (.325) and slugging percentage (.574) and was UW's leader with 68 hits and 45 runs scored, also driving in 36 runs.

Under Ellison's tutelage, AJ Guerrero also experienced a power surge during his junior campaign, slugging a career-high 15 home runs to enter the top-10 on Washington's career record list.

Ellison's hitters certainly put on a show when the Huskies visited Phoenix Municipal Stadium in 2024, combining for 39 runs on 41 hits with 15 extra base hits – nine of which left the yard.

"I could not be more excited and grateful for the opportunity that comes with being a part of this historic program. I want to thank Coach Bloomquist, Graham Rossinni and the staff and players who have welcomed me with open arms,," Ellison said. "Some of my earliest memories of baseball involve Willie. We won a high school championship together and to see his continued success through his career is inspiring. His teams have taken on that rugged, never-count-us-out mentality that Willie had through his career and to be able to join him as he continues to guide this program back to the heights we know it can reach is humbling and a true honor. I can not wait to get to work."

Ellison, who enjoyed a six-season Major League career with the San Francisco Giants, Seattle Mariners, Cincinnati Reds and Texas Rangers, had been an MLB scout since 2011 prior to his time at UW, serving with the Los Angeles Angels and Pittsburgh Pirates.

COLLEGE BASEBALL HALL OF FAME



The College Baseball Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization established in 2004 to preserve and recognize college baseball history. In July of 2006, Sun Devil legends Bobby Winkles and Bob Horner were part of the first-ever 10-member induction class in the new College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas.

Players are eligible for the College Baseball Hall of Fame ballot five years after the student athlete's final collegiate season, not to include any active player or coach on a professional baseball team roster. In addition, former players must have made an All-American team or an All-League team during at least one year at a four-year institution. Coaches must have achieved 300 career wins or have won at least 65% of their games.

SUN DEVIL ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME



The Arizona State University Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1975 to honor the school's most distinguished student-athletes in all sports. The Hall of Distinction, recognizing outstanding contributions from coaches and administrators, was inaugurated in 1982.

Athletes enshrined in the Hall of Fame are chosen by the Hall of Fame selection committee, composed of administrators, staff, faculty, and supporters close to the University's athletic program.

Hall of Fame selection is based on one or more of the following criteria: All-American recognition; NCAA champion; world record setter; Olympic medal; NCAA statistical leader; and significant contribution to sports and graduation.

Athletes become eligible for enshrinement ten years after their senior class has graduated. Plaques describing the athletic achievements of each inductee are displayed on the concourse level of the Desert Financial Arena.

Fifty-three Sun Devil baseball program members, some of whom played multiple sports at ASU, have been inducted into the Sun Devil Athletics Sports Hall of Fame.

Infielder Roger Detter is the newest member of this prestigious group when he was inducted in Fall of 2024.

Coaches Bobby Winkles and Jim Brock are both in the Hall of Distinction.





Bobby Winkles



Bobby Winkles, the architect of the modern era of the Sun Devil Baseball program, coached ASU for 13 seasons.

Coach Winkles, a three-time The Sporting News National Coach of the Year honoree, quickly turned

ASU into a national power as he won three national championships in the latter half of the 1960s. He compiled a .751 winning percentage, the highest in school history, and notched three 50-win seasons, including a 56-11 mark in 1969.


He mentored 16 first-team All-Americans, 20 ASU Hall of Famers and 39 All-WAC honorees. He also coached 45 Major League Baseball draft picks, including 12 first-round selections, and 21 players who made to the Major Leagues.


A charter member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame, he was inducted into the ASU Hall of Fame in 1982 and the ABCA Hall of Fame in 1997. His No. 1 was retired by ASU on February 25, 1972 and the field at Packard Stadium was dedicated in his honor in 2001.

This spring, he will be inducted into the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame.

Dr. Jim Brock, the winningest coach in the history of the Sun Devil Baseball program, led ASU for 23 seasons.

Coach Brock, a four-time National Coach of the Year honoree, notched eleven 50-win seasons

and four 60-win seasons at ASU, including a school-best 64-6 record in 1972.

He mentored 48 first-team All-Americans, 21 ASU Hall of Famers, and 112 all-conference honorees, including 49 in the WAC and 63 in the Pac-10. He also coached 190 Major League Baseball draft picks, including 15 first-round selections, and 60 players who made the Major Leagues.


A member of the 2007 College Baseball Hall of Fame class, he was inducted into the ASU Hall of Fame in 1994 and the ABCA Hall of Fame in 1998. Coach Brock's No. 33 was retired by ASU on January 21, 1995 and his name was added to baseball facilities at Packard Stadium in 2006.

An Arizona native and holder of three degrees from ASU, Dr. Brock prided himself on the Devils' 93-52 record versus the Arizona Wildcats from '72-'94.



ODDIBE MCDOWELL 1983-1984

The first Sun Devil baseball player to have his number honored, McDowell hit a combined .380 with 30 home runs and 31 doubles in his two years in Tempe. His 1984 season, in which he hit .405 with 23 home runs and 117 hits, remains one of the best offensive performances in school history and earned him a spot on the US Olympic team as well as the Golden Spikes Award. Oddibe had his number 0 retired, but legend has it that the digit on his back was actually the letter "O", making him the only player to have a letter retired. McDowell played seven seasons in the Major Leagues after being a First Round pick of the Texas Rangers in 1984.



DUSTIN PEDROIA 2002-2004

Dustin Pedroia put together three of the best seasons in Sun Devil Baseball history and his #2 was honored in February 2016 at Phoenix Municipal Stadium. A 2004 Golden Spikes Award Finalist, 2003 Pac-10 Co-Player of the Year, and the twotime National Defensive Player of the Year, Pedroia started all 185 games of his Sun Devil career. He finished with a .384 career batting average and added 71 doubles and 298 hits en route to three first-team All-Pac-10 selections. After leaving ASU. Pedroia was drafted by the Boston Red Sox in the second round of the 2004 MLB Draft and went on to become the 2007 American League Rookie of the Year, 2008 American League MVP, a four-time All-Star. four-time Gold Glove winner and a two-time World Series Champion with the Red Sox.



5 BOB HORNER 1976-1978

On February 11, 1996, Bob Horner saw his number honored by Arizona State. The first Golden Spikes Award winner in 1978, Horner hit 56 home runs over his three seasons in Tempe. He was the MOP of the 1977 College World Series and the 1978 National Player of the Year. He hit .412 during his senior season and led the Devils to Omaha all three years he played for ASU. Horner was the first pick of the 1978 MLB Draft, going to the Atlanta Braves. He spent 10 years in the Majors, winning the 1978 National League Rookie of the Year Award and playing in the 1982 All-Star Game. He was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006. He was named a Rosenblatt Stadium Legend at the 2010 College World Series.



SAL BANDO 1964-1965

February 23, 1996 saw Sal Bando's number honored by the Sun Devils. The MOP of the 1965 College World Series, Bando helped lead Arizona State to Omaha in both of his seasons in Tempe. Bando hit .319 over his Sun Devil career, including .364 in 1964. He played 16 seasons in the Majors, appearing in four All Star Games and winning the World Series three times with the Oakland Athletics. Bando spent eight years as the General Manager of the Milwaukee Brewers after retiring as a player. He was named a Rosenblatt Stadium Legend at the 2010 College World Series.



ALAN BANNISTER 1970-1972

A two-time First Team All-American, Alan Bannister had his number honored by the Sun Devils on January 9, 1999. A .355 career hitter, Bannister helped lead the Sun Devils to the 1972 College World Series with his .380 average, 13 home runs and 90 RBI. He rapped out 225 hits during his three seasons in Tempe and went on to play 12 seasons in the Major Leagues. He was the #1 overall pick of the 1973 MLB Draft, going to the Philadelphia Phillies.



HUBIE BROOKS 1977-1978

One of the greatest hitters in Sun Devil history, Hubie Brooks saw his #7 honored by ASU on March 3, 2000. Brooks hit .396 during his career, the third-highest mark in school history, including .432 in 1978, the fourth-highest single-season mark at ASU. That same season Brooks drove in 126 runs, the second-most of any Devil in a year. A member of the 1977 National Champions, Brooks went to Omaha both seasons he wore the Maroon and Gold. Hubie played 15 seasons in the Majors, twice being named to the All-Star Team. He was the third overall pick of the 1978 draft, selected by the New York Mets.

9 ALVIN DAVIS 1979-1982

Alvin Davis had his Sun Devil #9 honored on May 14, 2006. A four-year player, Davis hit .362 as a Sun Devil, including .395 during the National Championship year of 1981. Davis knocked in 200 runs during his tenure in Tempe and was a sixth round pick of the Seattle Mariners in the 1982 MLB Draft. Davis went on to win the 1984 American League Rookie of the Year Award. He played nine seasons in the Majors and was an All-Star in 1984.



14 LARRY GURA 1967-1969

January 18, 1998 saw one of the most dominant Sun Devil pitchers ever have his number honored. Larry Gura compiled a 25-6 career record for ASU, including the 1969 season that saw him go 19-2 with a 1.01 ERA. A two-time National Champion, Gura was a First Team All-American in 1969. He was selected by the Chicago Cubs in the second round of the 1969 Draft and went on to play 16 seasons of big league ball, including his All-Star season of 1980.



12 KEVIN ROMINE 1981-1982

On May 14, 2006, Kevin Romine had his number honored by Arizona State. One of only two people in school history to ever hit over .400 twice, Romine closed out his ASU career with a .408 average. A National Champion in 1981, Romine totaled 176 in his two seasons in Tempe. He was a second round pick of the Boston Red Sox in the 1982 MLB Draft and went on to play seven big league seasons.



16 PAUL LO DUCA 1993

On January 28, 2005, Paul Lo Duca's #16 was honored by ASU Baseball. Lo Duca spent only one season in Tempe, but it was a memorable one. His .446 batting average in 1993 set the school's single season mark, helping him be named the National Player of the Year by The Sporting News. A hitting-machine, Lo Duca totaled 129 hits, 14 home runs and 88 RBI on his way to earning Co-Pac-10 Player of the Year honors. Lo Duca played 11 Major League seasons and was a four-time All-Star, including a starter in the 2006 game.



14 ANDRE ETHIER 2002-2003

A two-time first-team All-Pac-10 performer, Andre Ethier saw his #14 honored in February 2016 at Phoenix Municipal Stadium. He finished his career hitting.371 with 113 runs, 27 doubles, seven triples, 14 home runs, and 118 RBIs. In 2003, Ethier earned All-American honorable mention honors, was named to the Tempe Regional All-Tournament team, and was honored as ASU's Outstanding Defensive Player as he ended his junior season and ASU career with a 23-game hitting streak, the eighth-longest in ASU history. He was selected in the second round of the 2003 MLB Draft by the Oakland A's In 2005, Ethier was traded to the Los Angeles Dodgers, where he won the Silver Slugger Award in 2009, earned a starting spot on the National League All-Star Team in 2010, and won a Gold Glove Award in 2011.



19 FLOYD BANNISTER 1974-1976

January 18, 1997 was the day Floyd Bannister, one of the greatest pitchers in Sun Devil history, had his number honored by ASU. Bannister earned 38 wins during his ASU career, including a school record-tying 19 in 1976. He had a career ERA of 1.88 and is second in school history with his 478 career strikeouts. He was a member of two College World Series teams and was a First Team All-American in 1975 and 1976. The first overall pick in the 1976 MLB Draft by the Houston Astros, Bannister played 15 seasons and was named an All-Star in 1982. Floyd was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2008.

21 EDDIE BANE 1971-1973

Eddie Bane pitched at Arizona State from 1971 to 1973, going 40-4 in his career with a 1.64 ERA. The lefthander threw 27 complete games and 11 shutouts during his collegiate career, helping lead the Sun Devils to the College World Series in 1972 and 1973. He struck out 535 batters in 379.1 innings pitched, including a career high 21 against LaVerne in 1972. He threw the only perfect game in Arizona State baseball history on March 2, 1973, striking out 19 batters in a 9-0 win over Cal State Northridge. His 535 strikeouts still stands as a school record, and his 40 career wins are third most in ASU history. Bane was twice named an All-American and was the 11th overall pick in the 1973 Major League by the Minnesota Twins. He played three seasons in the Majors and is currently the Director of Scouting for the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim. He had his #21 honored by Arizona State University on February 16, 2000.



24 BARRY BONDS 1983-1985

On March 19, 1993, one of the greatest sluggers of all-time had his number honored by Arizona State. Barry Bonds hit 45 home runs during his Sun Devil career, fourth most in school history. An All-American in 1985, Bonds played in two College World Series, setting a record with hits in seven consecutive CWS at-bats. The seven-time National League MVP is baseball's all-time Home Run King with 762 round-trippers. He was named a Rosenblatt Stadium Legend during the 2010 College World Series.



24 MIKE KELLY 1989-1991

Kelly's number 24 was honored on March 8, 2014, and was the last number to be honored at Packard Stadium. The first three-time All-American in ASU history, Kelly won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award in 1991 and was inducted into the ASU Hall of Fame in 2002. He earned consensus National Player of the Year honors in 1990 after becoming the fifth Sun Devil to join the 80-80 Club with 82 RBI and 83 runs scored. A career .350 hitter, his 46 home runs rank as the second most in ASU history. He was selected second overall in the 1991 MLB Draft by the Atlanta Braves and went on to play parts of six seasons on four different teams in the Maior Leagues.



27 RICK MONDAY 1965

Rick Monday's number 27 was honored by ASU on January 25, 1997. Monday made the most of his one varsity season in Tempe, earning National Player of the Year honors from The Sporting News for the 1965 National Champions. He hit .359 that year and blasted two home runs during the College World Series. Monday became the first ever player drafted by Major League Baseball, as he went #1 overall to the Kansas City A's in the first MLB Amateur Draftin 1965. He pitched 19 seasons in the Majors, twice earning All-Star Game appearances and winning a World Series in 1981 with the Los Angeles Dodgers.



REGGIE JACKSON 1966

Perhaps the most clutch playoff performer in baseball history saw his number honored on January 13, 1990, as Mr. October Reggie Jackson was honored by the Sun Devils. Jackson came to ASU on a football scholarship and decided to walkon to the 1966 baseball team. Reggie went on to win National Player of the Year honors, thanks to his.327 average and 15 home runs. He led the team in hits, runs and RBI and was drafted #2 overall by the Kansas City A's in the 1966 MLB Draft. He went on become a Hall-of-Fame player, hitting 10 World Series home runs, picking up two World Series MVP trophies and the 1973 AL MVP Award. He was inducted into the baseball Hall of Fame in 1993.

Since 1978, USA Baseball has honored the top amateur baseball player in the nation with the Golden Spikes Award. Each year. the award is given to the player who best exhibits exceptional on-field ability and exemplary sportsmanship.

Introduced in 1964, The Sporting News College Player of the Year selections were made for the publication by leading professional baseball scouts and scouting directors of the major league clubs.



BA) Baseball America

The Baseball America College Player of the Year is an annual award given by its namesake publication. Baseball America, since 1978 to the best college baseball player.



The Collegiate Baseball Player of the Year award is given to the best player in NCAA Division I. It was first awarded in 1984. An earlier version of the award was introduced in 1974 and is known as the Leftv Gomez Plate.



The Rotary Smith Award (1988-2003) honored College Baseball's Player of the Year, as voted on by college baseball publicists, former winners, and those former winners' coaches. The special award was given annually by the Rotary Club of Houston and paid tribute to R.E. "Bob" Smith - the force behind the Houston Colt .45s / Astros.



American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) selects National Players of the Year in nine divisions. Since 2001, the ABCA Players of the Year have been selected by the ABCA All-America Committees in each division from among the first-team ABCA/Rawlings All-Americans.










No school has played a more significant role in the MLB Draft than Arizona State University. Since the draft's inception in 1965, ASU has had more players selected (477) and more number one overall picks (4) than any other school in the country.

Naturally, the first player ever drafted was from ASU – Rick Monday, who went to the Kansas City Athletics as the No.1 overall pick in 1965. That's a marvelous testimony to Sun Devil Baseball's reputation among Major League scouts, and it also makes quite a statement about the school's tradition and amazing consistency.

Draft History

Pre-1965: Before the introduction of the First-Year Player Draft, amateurs were free to sign with any Major League team that offered them a contract.

1965-1986: Three drafts were held. The June draft, which was by far the largest, involved new high school graduates and college seniors who had just finished their seasons. It started in 1965 and continues to this day. In January, a second draft was held for high school and college players who graduated in the winter. Finally, there was a draft for players who participated in amateur summer leagues in August. The August draft was eliminated after only two years, while the January draft lasted until 1986. A player could be chosen twice a year before both phases of the old January draft, along with the secondary phase in June, were folded into a single, solitary phase in 1987. Since 1966, the January draft

had been held for junior college players and those whose eligibility had expired.

1987-1997: The draft process was streamlined in 1987, from four phases to one. Not only were both January phases abolished, but the June secondary phase was eliminated as well.

1998-2011: The draft was modified in 1998 to limit teams to 50 rounds. Previously, there had been no limit on rounds.

2012-2019: The draft was modified from 50 to 40 rounds.

2020-2022: The 2020 draft was modified due to the COVID-19 outbreak and was limited to five rounds. Similarly, the 2021 draft was limited to 20 rounds.



Team USA's Collegiate National Team is comprised of non-draft-eligible players currently playing baseball at the collegiate level. A selection of the year's USA Baseball Collegiate National Team field staff and USA Baseball staff members evaluate data from the current college season to select players for the national team. Selection to Team USA is among the highest honors for an amateur baseball player and several Sun Devils have historically been selected to participate on this elite team.
