The 2013 ASU-MC Game

The **Albany State University (ASU) Golden Rams** and the **Miles College (MC) Golden Bears** will meet Saturday, September 28th, in Birmingham, Alabama. Kickoff is set for 6 p.m. (Central Time) at Albert J. Sloan-Alumni Stadium.

The Golden Rams and Golden Bears will meet 52nd time in series history. ASU holds a 34-14-3 series lead over Miles. Miles won last season's meeting 41-6 in Albany.

The Teams

Albany State and **Miles** are members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC). Both schools compete at the NCAA Division II level.

ASU was selected by SIAC coaches to finish first in the SIAC East Division, while **TU** was chosen to win the West Division and the overall SIAC Championship. The **Golden Rams** have won the SIAC crown in 14 seasons: 1984, 1985, 1986, 1988, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2010. The Golden Tigers have won 26 SIAC championships, including the 2012 title.

ASU has made 13 appearances in the football playoffs. ASU is 2-10 in the playoffs. ASU's first appearance was **1993** when the Golden Rams lost to Hampton Univ. (7-33). Other appearances include: **1994** - lost to Valdosta State (7-14); **1995** - lost to North Alabama (28-38); **1996** - lost to Valdosta State (28-38); **1997** (twice) defeated Southern Arkansas (10-6) in first round, lost to Carson Newman (22-23) in second round; **2004** (twice)- received first round bye, defeated Southern Arkansas (42-24) in second round and lost to Valdosta State (24-38) in quarterfinals; **2005** - lost to Central Arkansas (20-28); **2006** - lost to Newberry College (28-34) in first round; **2007** - lost to Catawba College (35-66) in the first round; **2008** - lost to Tusculum College (22-34) in the first round; **2009**- lost to West Alabama (22-24); **2010** (twice)- received first round bye, defeated Wingate (30-28) in the second round, and lost to Delta State (7-28) in the quarterfinals; and **2011**- lost to North Greenville (14-63) in first round.

Miles College won its first SIAC championship in 2011 in the conference inaugural championship game against Albany State. That same year, they advanced to the Pioneer Bowl, losing to Johnson C. Smith University 35-33. The Golden Bears participated in the 2012 NCAA Division II playoff last season, losing to West Alabama 41-7 in the first round.

The Head Coaches

Albany State



In his 14th season as head coach at Albany State University, Coach Mike White has shaped the Golden Rams football program into one of the best in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). The Albany State football program has enjoyed tremendous growth and success for several years under Coach White's leadership and is recognized as one of the premier Division II teams in the nation.

Under Coach White's leadership, the Golden Rams have won five SIAC championship title in 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2010. His 2010 Rams also captured their first SBN National Black College Football Championship and the Washington D.C. Pigskin Club's National Black College Championship. With a career record of 99-45, he is now the second "winningest" coach in Albany State history.

Coach White and the Golden Rams finished the 2012 season with a 6-4 overall record and a second place finish in the SIAC East Division.

Also the team's defensive coordinator, Coach White has coached nationally-ranked defensive units and brought much attention to the Golden Rams "Dirty Blue" defense during his career. He has distinguished himself as one of the best defensive masterminds in the game. Under his leadership, the Albany State defense has been ranked among the best in the NCAA statistics for several years. His 2010 Rams finished second in the nation in rushing defense and scoring defense, and third in total defense and pass efficiency defense.

The recipient of several awards and honors for his coaching and leadership skills, Coach White was named the 2010 SIAC Coach of the Year, an honor he also received in 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2005. He was selected as the Heritage Sports Radio Network's (HSRN) National Division II Football Coach of the Year as the most outstanding Division II coach during the season.

He was the recipient of the SBN/Eddie Robinson National Black College Coach of the Year Award, presented by the Sheridan Broadcasting Network, in 2004. He also won the 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2010 Charles B. Fisher Awards from the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. and was honored by the 100% Wrong Club of Atlanta as the SIAC Coach of the Year. He was also named Division II National Coach of the Year by Don Hansen's Football Gazette in 2004. He was inducted into the Albany State University Sports Hall of Fame in 2004.

Known for his aggressive coaching style, Coach White has coached professional football standouts, including Walter Curry, who played with San Francisco 49ers; Jeff Hunter, who played with the Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and Buffalo Bills; Chris Sheffield who played with the Pittsburgh Steelers; Dan Land, of the Oakland Raiders; Kenny Gant, of the Dallas Cowboys; Edward Hobbs, European Football League; and Markco Maddox, of the Minnesota Vikings.

Named the assistant head coach in May 1997, Coach White has been a member of the Golden Rams' coaching staff since 1984, when he joined the staff as defensive line coach 28 seasons ago. A former Golden Rams football standout, he has been the defensive coordinator for 23 seasons.

During his career as an assistant coach with Albany State, Coach White was instrumental in leading the Golden Rams to nine SIAC championships, with five consecutive championships and five consecutive NCAA playoff appearances from 1993-1997.

In addition to his duties as defensive coordinator, Coach White served as special teams coordinator, conditioning coordinator, linebackers coach and director of intramural health and physical education.

Prior to joining the Golden Rams coaching staff, Coach White enjoyed a stellar five-year professional football career. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals in the fourth round in 1979, and played with the Seattle Seahawks from 1981 until 1983.

During his collegiate career as a Golden Ram, Coach White was a two-time Pittsburgh Courier All-American player in 1977 and 1978. Coach White was the SIAC Player of the Year in 1978 and was a three-time All-SIAC team member in 1976, 1977 and 1978. Coach White was the Most Valuable Player and Athlete of the Year in 1978. He won the All-Around Athlete award in 1977; Best Defensive Lineman in 1976, and Best Freshman in

1975. Coach White led the Golden Rams in tackles three of his four years and was co-captain of the team during his junior and senior years.

An Augusta, Ga. native, Coach White earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Sociology and Master's degree in Health and Physical Education from Albany State in 1990 and 1999, respectively.

Active in professional and civic organizations, Coach White is a member of the American Football Coaches Association, Black Coaches Association and the National Football League Alumni. Coach White and his wife, Phyllis, are members of the First Institutional Baptist Church in Albany.

Miles College



Reginald Ruffin enters his second season as head coach of the Miles College Golden Bears. During his first season in the Bears Den, he accomplished what no other Miles College head coach had prior. The Golden Bears won their first SIAC Western Division Title, first SIAC Championship game and their first Division II SIAC Championship. Coach Ruffin was named the 2011 SIAC Coach of the Years for his hard and dedicated work.

Ruffin has more than 10 years of coaching experience under his belt which includes his five years at Tuskegee University as their defensive coordinator and linebacker coach, the title which he held right before accepting the position at Miles College.

Ruffin spent the 2002-03 seasons at Tuskegee under Rick Comegy and before that were athletic director and head football coach at Choctaw County High School in Butler, Alabama. Also, he was an assistant football coach and defensive line coach at the University of West Georgia in Carrollton, Georgia, a high school assistant coach at Jackson High School in Jackson, Alabama and the defensive line coach at the University of North Alabama in Florence, Alabama.

During Coach Ruffin's time as defensive coordinator at Tuskegee, he had the SIAC's (Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) top defensive scoring defense, pass defense and rushing defense in 2007. His team's defense finished second in scoring and was among the leaders in most defensive categories in 2008. In 2009, his team once again posted the league's top defense.

Coach Ruffin is a 1994 graduate of the University of North Alabama and holds a Master's Degree in Education Administration from Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

During Ruffin playing days at the University of North Alabama, he became University of North Alabama's second three-time All-American and is the only Lion to ever earn All-American as a defensive end in 1995, 1996 and at linebacker in 1997.

In 1995, he was selected; first team All-Gulf South Conference, first-team CoSIDA NCAA Division II All-South Region, third-team CoSIDA NCAA Division II All-American, third-team C. M. Frank All-American, honorable mention Football Gazette All-American in 1996 and selected Gulf South Conference Defensive Player of the Week.

In 1996, Ruffin was selected; second-team All-American by the Associated Press, CoSIDA and the Football Gazette, All-Gulf South Conference and first team CoSIDA All-South Region.

Ruffin was a two-time All-American as a defensive lineman in 1997 and selected first team All-American by the Associated Press, the Football Gazette and the American Football Coaches Association and a second-team All-America pick by Daktronics as a linebacker. He was first-team All-Gulf South Conference for third consecutive years and first-team All-South Region.

Coach Ruffin started all four years at the University of North Alabama, setting a school record with 34 career sacks and setting the school single-season sack record with 11 in 1994. His career sacks and tackles for

loss total 431 yards in losses. During his time at the University of North Alabama the team set a combined record of 43-9, which included two National Championships and two Gulf South Conference titles. Ruffin was selected Gulf South Conference Freshman of the Year in 1994.

He is a native of Butler, Alabama and was selected for the 50th Anniversary University of North Alabama Football Team for 1949-98 and named to the Gulf South Conference Team.

Coach Ruffin is married to Monica and they have one son, Gabriel.

In his 16th season as a Golden Rams radio commentator, he follows in the footsteps of his father, the late Fred "Doc" Suttles, Jr., who was the legendary "Voice of the Rams" for 39 seasons. The dynamic duo covered more than 90 ASU football games for eight seasons. Suttles is a 1991 Albany State graduate.

Norman Newton, known in the radio broadcast world as "Norm-Ski", joins the ASU radio crew for his sixth year as color analyst. The 1991 ASU alum has followed the Golden Rams since 1985, when he and Suttles started attending ASC football games together. Newton is an account executive at UPS.

Returning for his eighth season on the radio is "**Coach**" **Jesse Massey**, who co-hosts the pre-game and halftime shows from various locations with an in-depth approach to the broadcast throughout each game. A 1980 graduate of Albany State, Massey is a retired educator.

The Golden Rams radio trio will also broadcasts 30-minute pre-game and post-game shows.

Rams in the News

Golden Rams receive SIAC weekly honors

Juniors Adrian Alexander and Phillip Moore and sophomore Ryan Latner have been recognized for their play during the Albany State Golden Rams' 34-13 win over Elizabeth City State University in Week 3. Alexander was named the SIAC Offensive Player of the Week, while Moore and Latner received honorable mention.

Leading Albany State to its first win of the season, Alexander, a 5'10, 195-lb running back from Macon, Georgia, rushed for a game-high 126 yards and a touchdown on only 10 carries. For the game, he averaged 12.6 yards per carry and added a long run of 40 yards.

Moore, a 5-5, 180-lb running back from Valdosta, Georgia, rushed for 91 yards on 14 carries to help add more efficiency to the Golden Rams' running game against Elizabeth City State. Latner, a 6'0, 160-lb punter from Melrose, Florida, had a 40.5 average on four punts for a total of 162 yards. Latner had a long of 47 yards and nailed three punts inside the 30 yard-line.

Alexander, Moore, Latner and the rest of the Golden Rams will travel to Birmingham, Alabama this Saturday, September 28th to take on the Miles College Golden Bears. Game time is slated for 6 p.m. (central time).

History Book

Albany State University enters its 67th season of football action. Although complete records are unavailable, the football program, which kicked off in 1945 with Coach Forest "Daddy Kirk" Kirkpatrick as head coach, has been guided by 10 coaches throughout the years. Kirkpatrick, known as the "father of Albany State athletics" coached four seasons, before passing the ball to Christopher Roulhac, who coached in 1949 and 1950, and recorded six wins, nine losses with three ties. Obie O'Neal, who led the Golden Rams for 17 seasons, compiled a 79-57-10 record. Under Coach O'Neal, the Rams won six SEAC championships in 1955, 1957, 1959, 1960, 1962 and 1966. J.R.E. Lee, III posted a 5-11 record in 1968 and 1969, and Willie Parker led the Golden Rams for one season in 1970 with a 4-6 record. Hampton "The Cutter" Smith came to Albany State in 1971 and posted a 27-28-3 record for six seasons. Whitney Van Cleve posted a 12-17-2 record during his three-year stint with the Golden Rams. Hampton Smith returned to Albany State to lead the Golden Rams to a 157-89-4 career record before retiring in 1999. Under Coach Smith, ASU won nine SIAC championships in 1984, 1985, 1986, 1988, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997. He led the Rams to their first Division II playoff victory in 1997, by defeating Southern Arkansas, 10-6. Mike White (99-44), who is in his 14th season as head coach of the Golden Rams, has led his teams to five SIAC championships and 10 appearances in the NCAA Division II playoffs.
