Marion Ross Fedrick was appointed as the 10th president of Albany State University on August 14, 2018, by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents. Fedrick previously served as interim president and interim executive vice president of the university. Spanning nearly thirty years of senior leadership experience, Fedrick has served in a variety of private and public sector roles.

Her professional background includes system-level higher education administration, campus-level higher education administration, strategic planning, crisis management and strategic partnership engagement. Committed to ensuring students realize their full potential, Fedrick believes every student deserves access to an excellent and affordable education. A three-time graduate of the University of Georgia, Fedrick holds a bachelor's degree in adult education, with a concentration in organizational development, and a master's degree in public administration, and a Ph.D. in higher education.

A hallmark of Fedrick's presidency is her focus on providing the ideal student experience. One which focuses on preparing students for professional careers while ensuring the entirety of the student's wellbeing is cared for. Since 2018 President Fedrick has used her commitment towards achieving excellence to drive new initiatives including a redesign of the institution's academic colleges, approval of the University System of Georgia's first nexus degrees, and the design and implementation of the university's integrated student success model.

As a result of her laser focus on this ideal, the University has achieved a sixteen percent increase in retention, and a six percent increase in student enrollment. As a champion for student wellness, Fedrick has expanded access and opportunities for ASU students by entering into partnerships that increase the available campus-wide student resources. Due to her widely known commitment to addressing student wellness, Fedrick is highly sought after to contribute to statewide initiatives including the University System of Georgia's (USG) Mental Health Task Force, and Georgia's COVID-19 Health Equity Council. Her leadership on the Health Equity Council has helped to increase the effectiveness of the Georgia Department of Public Health's statewide outreach to communities most affected by COVID-19, and to ensure the equitable distribution and administration of the COVID-19 vaccination. In demonstration of her commitment to student success, racial and social equity, and the power of community, Fedrick has been a spokesperson for access, equity, and fairness. The intersection of her vision, passion, and broad leadership capabilities have placed Fedrick in key leadership roles throughout her career.

Serving as the USG vice chancellor of human resources, Fedrick has led strategic initiatives relating to effective university administration, leadership development and all human resources planning efforts. She has also served at Clark Atlanta University, Emory University Hospitals, State of Georgia's Office of State Personnel Administration, AT&T, and the former BellSouth Corporation. Born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and raised in Georgia, she and her husband, Horace, who is a 34-year law enforcement veteran, have one daughter, Sarah.



Appointed as the Director of Athletics at Albany State in July 2023, Dr. Kristene Kelly hails from St. Croix in the United States Virgin Islands and has a rich background in collegiate sports that spans over two decades.

Before joining Albany State, Kelly held the position of Deputy Athletic Director for Internal Affairs and Senior Woman Administrator at Vanderbilt University, a top-tier Power 5 school in the competitive Southeastern Conference (SEC). She effectively led multiple internal departments, including sports performance, academics, compliance, human resources, and the recreation center.

Kelly's career path is notably diverse, as she has served in key roles across all three NCAA divisions. She was previously the Executive Associate AD/SWA at Dartmouth College from 2018 to 2020, after serving as Senior Associate AD/SWA. Before that, she directed the Athletics and Recreation department at Keene State College from 2016 to 2018. Her early experiences include roles as the Associate AD/SWA, Assistant Professor, and Department Chair at Saint Augustine's University (2009-2016) and as the Sports Information Director at Johnson C. Smith University (2002-2009).

Over her career, Kelly has earned significant recognition, including two Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) Senior Woman Administrator of the Year awards in 2011 and 2013. She was also only the second woman to win the CIAA John Holley SID of the Year award in 2005. Under her leadership, six Keene State teams moved on to the NCAA postseason, and she was responsible for the oversight of 35 varsity sports at Dartmouth College.

Kelly holds two bachelor's degrees in physical education and communication arts from Johnson C. Smith University, where she began her collegiate athletics career in 2001 as an academic counselor and graduate assistant. She completed her doctoral degree in Education in Sport Management from the United States Sports Academy in 2014.

Proficient in NCAA compliance, Title IX, athletic fundraising, and budget management, Kelly has successfully overseen programs with budgets exceeding \$2 million. She also guided a program to a national championship, showcasing her commitment to excellence. A respected voice in the field, Kelly frequently speaks at conferences and panels and has served on the Board of Directors for the Sexual Assault Center in Nashville, TN.

Outside of her professional responsibilities, Kelly is passionate about fitness. Over the past decade, she has completed a marathon, six half marathons, and various other races. Her guiding principle when it comes to wellness is #HealthIsWealth.

She is happily married to Jonathan Kelly Sr., and they have one son, Jonathan Jr., who is a junior at Albany State University.

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Quinn Gray steps in as new ASU Head Coach

A new era began on January 24, 2023 in Lovett Hall on the East campus of Albany State University. Former NFL quarterback Quinn Gray was formally introduced to take the helm of the Golden Rams football team. With the exit of Gabe Giardina who moved to the FCS level, taking over at Charleston Southern, Gray, dressed in a brand new blue suit with yellow pinstripes, a yellow shirt and a yellow and blue tie, was manicured and stood tall representing what was pleasing to a unified Golden Ram nation.

University President Dr. Marion Fedrick rushed from another meeting to be sure she was present. Alumni, boosters and former players were all on one accord that Gray had their support.

Gray's wife Shemeka was stunning in her blue dress with gold trim, while Gray's son and mother also attended the press conference. All of the visuals set the tone for an exciting press conference.

Gray addressed the packed-out Lovett Hall in what I could only describe as "Obama-esque." He was methodical in detailing his experiences and how they've prepared him for the job. "Being a coordinator at Florida A&M, an assistant coach at Alcorn, a high school head coach and an analyst at a Power Five school (Memphis), it prepared me from all angles to be right here today," Gray said. "I thought there was no way a fan base could be as passionate as FAMU, but over these last three weeks, I realize that the Albany State fans are right there. It might be 1A and 1B," Gray said with his patented smile.

Gray went into the history of

ASU coaches and named those who preceded him. He ended the list with former ASU coach Gabe Giardina. "Gabe did a great job here. It opened the door for him to move on to another position, but that brought the opportunity for me to be here," Gray said.

In his address, he talked about former greats and welcomed them back to the fold. He said he wanted to engage other former players and that they were always welcome because he respected the history of ASU football and those that laid the groundwork for the successes the Golden Rams have in winning conference and national championships.

He preached unity. "When I was at my previous job, I realized that those schools have a lot of money. Pretty much everything we asked for was provided for us coaches and the players. I came from the HBCU realm where we had to earn everything we got. I want to ensure that my players attack the classroom just like we attack on the field. We're going to start fast in the classroom and if they need help, we'll make sure we get them that help. It will be a total effort in making sure these young men are able to be successful on and off the field," Gray said.

Gray's success as a player landed him in both the MEAC and FAMU Sports Hall of Fames. He was one of the school's all-time great passers. He held school records in pass attempts (1,113), completions (562), passing yards (7,378) and touchdown passes (57), and he twice earned All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference honors (2000, 2001), leading the Rattlers

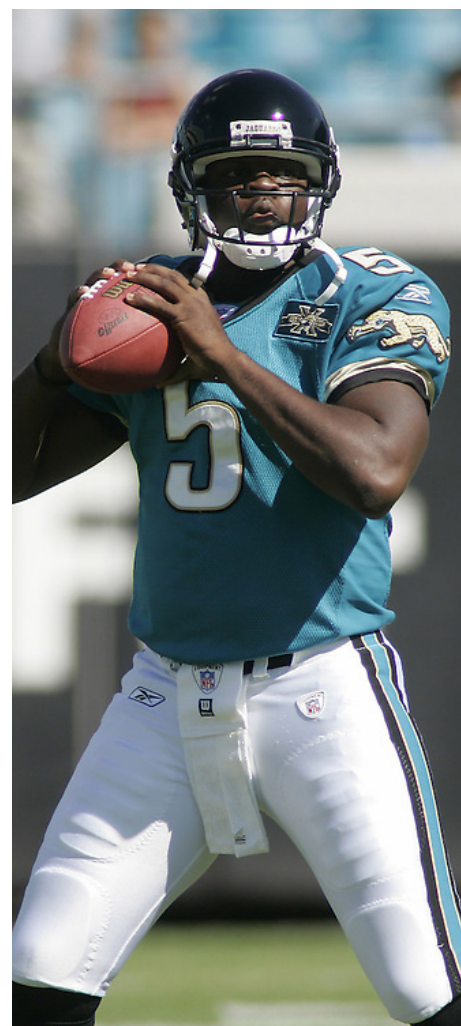

to back-to-back MEAC titles (2000, 2001). He was a member of four NCAA FCS playoff teams (1998, 1999, 2000, 2001).

Gray is obviously focused on the hot points that are important to the HBCU family. Playing four years at FAMU before embarking on his professional career, Gray has been in the culture from the player standpoint. As a coordinator at FAMU and an assistant at Alcorn State, Gray has seen coaching from different angles. When you add in his experience at the FBS level at Memphis, a Power Five school, he has all the ingredients to possibly be just what Albany State ordered.

Christopher Cash

Associate Head Coach/Co-Defensive Coordinator



Christopher Cash is the Defensive Coordinator for the Albany State University Golden Rams. Prior to coming to Albany State, Coach Cash coached safeties at Alcorn State University (2018-2021). Alcorn State won back-to-back SWAC Championships with a pair of appearances in the Celebration Bowl

and competed in Black National Championships two years in a row. In 2019, Alcorn's secondary led the nation in interceptions with a total of 21. Alcorn was also ranked #1 in the FSC in turnovers gained (36). In the SWAC Championship, Alcorn forced six turnovers including three interceptions. Cash coached Juwan Taylor who was named the SWAC Championship Defensive MVP, and Qwynnterrio Cole who was an HBCU All-America First-Team selection. In 2013-2014, Cash was hired as safeties coach at Florida A&M University where Rattlers, they lead the nation in passing defense. He went back to his high school alma mater, where he was the defensive coordinator for two years at Franklin High School (2011-2012).

Cash played at Franklin High School. Attended Palomar College in San Marcos, Ca. He went on to have an outstanding career at PC, where he had three interceptions as a freshman and was offered a scholarship to USC, which he accepted. He also made Junior College All-American while at Palomar College. Cash graduated from USC in 2002 after playing for head coaches Paul Hackett and Pete Carroll. He earned Pac-10 All-Conference honors. At USC, he earned the reputation of being a solid corner. He earned All-Pac-10 second team honors in 2001.

Cash was a football coach in the National Football League (NFL) from 2015 to 2016, finishing his career as the assistant secondary coach-cornerbacks of the Seattle Seahawks. Cash went on to play in the NFL from 2002-06 at cornerback. He was drafted in the sixth round (175th overall) by the Detroit Lions in the 2002 NFL Draft. Cash started in 12 games and wrapped-up 100 tackles with an interception his rookie season. After three seasons with the Lions, he played for the Atlanta Falcons in 2005 and 2006.

Cash is a native of Stockton, California. He received his B.S. Degree from (USC). Cash has two sons, Caleb and Darius Cash.

Matthew Brown

Co-Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers



Matt Brown will serve as the Co-Defensive Coordinator and Linebacker Coach for the Golden Rams. Brown most recently worked as the nickels coach in 2022 after serving as a graduate assistant and student assistant since 2018 at his alma mater, Alcorn State University. Brown became the graduate assistant coach for

linebackers in 2019 and was responsible for the growth and development of linebackers, putting together scouting reports, and game day defensive signal calling. Under his tutelage, the team was ranked number one in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) and the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in takeaways per game and interceptions. Brown coached FCS All-American and All-SWAC awardee Solomon Muhammad.

In addition, Brown coached the Jefferson County Middle School defense, serving as the defensive coordinator. The Tigers were ranked number one in total points per game (2) and were named the 2019 Southwest Mississippi Conference Middle School Champions. As a student assistant in 2018, Brown assisted the defensive line coach, checked on class attendance, inputted and broke down film, and scouted opponents. He aided in developing the 2018 All-HBCU and All-SWAC team member Terry Whittington and AFCA All-American and All-SWAC honoree Sterling Shippy. During his time with the defensive line, the Braves were number one in the FCS and SWAC in sacks (52), sacks per game (4.0), and tackles for a loss (9.5). They were also number one in the SWAC in total defense, rushing defense per game (91.5), and interceptions (14). Other career highlights include coaching the 2018 and 2019 Celebration Bowl and SWAC Championship teams.

Brown has a Bachelor of Science in Sports Management and a Masters in Sports Administration from Alcorn State University.

Brown is a Fayette, Mississippi, native and a 2016 graduate of Jefferson County High School.

Dazzie Morris

Offensive Coordinator/Offensive Line



Dazzie Morris joins the Golden Rams as the Offensive Coordinator and Offensive line Coach, before Coach Morris's arrival in March of 2023 he held the position of Offensive Coordinator at Deland High school in Deland, FL. Coach Morris has spent most of his career coaching college football most recently as the Offensive Line

Coach and Run Games Coordinator at Webber International University. Before that, Coach Morris worked for Methodist University as the running backs coach and was a part of the Bethune-Cookman University football staff in the 2019 season as its Offensive Quality Control Coach.

Morris served as the Defensive Coordinator of Ocoee High School in 2018 and he started his coaching career as the Offensive Line Graduate Assistant at Fort Valley State University in 2017, for a team that came up short in the SIAC championship game.

Morris graduated from Bethune-Cookman on May 10, 2017, receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree in liberal studies, while minoring in psychology. Morris was a four-year starter and All-MEAC Football player. He ended his college football career with three MEAC championships.

From Apopka, FL, Morris is a graduate of Apopka High School and helped lead the Apopka Blue Darters to a Florida Class 8-A state title in 2012. Dazzie Morris is married to his college sweetheart, Fidline Morris, whom he met at Bethune-Cookman. They are currently expecting their first child. Coach Morris is also a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Elijah Haggard

Defensive Run Game Coordinator/Special Team Coordinator/Defensive Line



Elijah Haggard will be joining Coach Grey and his staff in the Spring of 2023 serving as the Defensive Run Game Coordinator, Special Teams Coordinator, and Defensive Line Coach. Most recently he worked at the University of Memphis where he served for two years, (2021-2022) as A Defensive Line Graduate As-

sistant where he was part of back to back bowl championship teams in both the Hawaii Bowl (2021), and The First Responders Bowl (2022). During his time at Memphis he also graduated with his Masters Degree in Sports and Hospitality Management.

Prior to the University of Memphis, he served for one year as a graduate assistant coach at The University of North Alabama working with the linebackers in 2020.

Before, his time at North Alabama he worked for six months as linebacker coach at Avila University in Kansas City, Mo.

Prior to Avila, he served as a Defensive Student Assistant Coach at the University of Tennessee at Martin where he worked with Linebackers, Defensive Line, and assistant to the defensive coordinator. In 2018, the Skyhawks led the Ohio Valley Conference in scoring defense, allowing 19.5 points per game in league play. UTM's defense was also prominent in the 2017 national statistics.

In all he worked as a student assistant at UTM from 2015 until his graduation in 2019 with a Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education, focused in Biology.

A Parsons, Tennessee, native, he is a 2015 graduate of Riverside High School where he Lettered in football.

Orlando McKinley “Coach O” joins the Golden Rams as the Cornerbacks Coach and will also be coaching the returners. Before Coach McKinley’s arrival, he held the position of Defensive Graduate Assistant (DB’s / Returners) at his alma mater- Florida

A&M University over the past two seasons. In his tenure at FAMU, Coach McKinley helped the Rattlers to back-to-back nine-win seasons and an FCS playoff birth. While at FAMU, Coach McKinley developed one ALL-AMERICAN DB (BJ Bohler), and one ALL-AMERICAN Returner (Jah’marae Shread). Prior to being a Graduate Assistant, Coach McKinley spent his first season coaching as the Defensive Backs Coach at Benjamin Banneker High School in Atlanta, Ga.

Coach McKinley graduated from Florida A&M University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology, while minoring in Political Science. McKinley was a four-year starter, All-MEAC, and HBCU ALL-AMERICAN Football player. He ended his collegiate career as the FAMU and MEAC record holder for longest INT returned for a touchdown at 100 yards.

From Atlanta, Ga, McKinley is a graduate of Westlake High School, where he was an ALL-REGION Cornerback as well as an ALL-AMERICAN in Track & Field, holding the 110H record.



Toderick Devoe was born in Fort Lauderdale, Fl on April 5th 1980. Toderick also known as Tod is the oldest of three children from his mother Carol Bellamy and father Darryl Devoe. Toderick attended Boyd H. Anderson high school where he was a three-sport athlete (Football, Basketball and Track).

After high school, Toderick attended Itawamba Community College in Fulton, Ms before transferring to the University of Central Missouri. Toderick was a two-time first-team All-MIAA wide receiver and earned All-American honors as well. Toderick is the only player in Central Missouri history to record two 1,000 yard receiving seasons. He has the fourth most receiving yards in a single season (1,089) and third and fourth most touchdowns receiving (12 in 2002 and 11 in 2001) in a season and is second in career touchdown receptions (23) and average yards per reception (20.52 per catch).

He also boasts the longest touchdown catch in school and MIAA history of 99 yards against Minnesota Duluth in the Mineral Water Bowl. He also earned All-America honors in track & field for Central Missouri as a member of the 4x400 meter relay team in 2002. Following his career at Central Missouri, he went on to play in the NFL for the Baltimore Ravens and Denver Broncos. In 2014 Toderick would become the Wide Receiver coach at Richmond High School in Richmond, Missouri before returning home in 2015 to become the Wide Receiver coach at Deerfield Beach High School. In 2019 Toderick would become the Offensive Coordinator at his alma mater Boyd H. Anderson High School and would stay in that roll until joining the coaching staff at Albany State University.

Anthony Kelly

Assistant Coach



Anthony Kelly, a native Mississippian, has served as an assistant coach with the Golden Rams since 1990 and will be entering his 28th season as an assistant coach for the Golden Rams. He currently serves as the Rams' tight ends coach and is the direc-

tor of alumni relations.

Kelly earned an athletic scholarship in football to attend Albany State College in 1984. In 1984, he was part of the first SIAC Football Championship team at ASC. During his college career, he received numerous awards and recognitions for academic excellence, including the SIAC Student-Athlete Award and was named a research assistant for the Minority Biomedical Research Program in the Department of Natural Science at Albany State.

Kelly earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Chemistry with a minor degree in Mathematics from Albany State College in 1990 and a Master's degree in Science Education/Biology from Albany State University in Fall 2002.

In 2013, Kelly was inducted into the Albany State University's Sports Hall of Fame. Active in numerous professional, civic, and social organizations, Kelly is a member of the Prince Hall Masons and the Prince Hall Shriners. He is also a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. and Mount Zion Baptist Church of Albany, Ga.

Kelly is the father of a daughter, Ranetta and the grandfather of Derrinjah, both of Meridian, Mississippi. He is the son of Ms. Paulette Carson and the late James Odell Carson of Meridian, Mississippi.



2022 ASU season Recap



The 2022 season fell short of expectations put on the Golden Rams as defending SIAC Champions. Gabe Giardina and his team brought home the 2021 SIAC Championship, as well as taking down arch-rival Fort Valley State. Neither would come to fruition in 2022.

The season started off with a win against Mississippi College. The Golden Rams would use an all-around team effort to defeat MC. Preseason Offensive Player of the Year quarterback Dionte Bonneau would start ASU's scoring on a 40-yard bomb to a streaking Joe Shorter to tie the game at 7-7. Kam Ward would score on an 8-yard run in the second quarter to tie the game at 14-14. Marcuis Fulks would put ASU up for good on a 6-yard run and Jar-ee Turner would nab an interception and return it back for the 28-14 win. Season record 1-0.

The Rams would pay a visit to FCS opponent Florida A&M. The Golden Rams would put on a great effort, but fall short against the Rattlers. Marcuis Fulks would score two touchdowns on the day, while Kam Ward would carry 15 times for 89 yards. The ASU defense stood up to the Rattlers, allowing only 190 yards on the ground. Jar-ee Turner and Stephan Pierre each collected six tackles in the game. Season record 1-1.

The Golden Rams would get back in the win column by defeating Shorter University 42-20. Bonneau started out the scoring on a 42-yard quarterback keeper to put ASU in the lead for good. Aljhanod Thomas punched in a touchdown from 1-yard out, followed by Bonneau getting his second rushing TD of the game on a 1-yard run. Ralph Lovett went streaking across the field with

a 23-yard pass from Bonneau to score the first ASU touchdown in the third quarter, followed by Fulks with a 4-yard run to break open the lead for the Golden Rams. Thomas would haul in a 23-yard pass from Bonneau to push the final score to 42-20. Season record 2-1.

In the most dominating defensive performance of the season, ASU shut out the Clark Atlanta Panthers 35-0. Bonneau got the first score of the game on a 1-yard quarterback keeper. Kicker Eli Mashburn would add a 37-yard field goal to push the score to 10-0. Ward took his first touchdown of the day in from three yards out while Joe Shorter hauled in a 6-yard pass from Bonneau. Ward would score his second TD of the game from 9-yards out while Daveon Sanders got his first TD of the season on a 7-yard run. Season record 3-1.

2022 ASU season Recap

The Golden Rams faced the Golden Bears in another SIAC showdown. In the end, ASU would get the 20-3 win. Jaree Turner returned an interception for 40 yards for the game's first score. Fulks scored late in the second quarter from two yards out. Shorter would beat the defense deep in the second half for a 62-yard score. Season record 4-1.

The highest offensive output came against the Tigers of Edward Waters University. ASU would put up 54 points and give up just a single touchdown. ASU would run the opening kickoff back as Joe Shorter scampered for 90 yards for the opening score with just 12 ticks expiring on the clock. Ward would score next on a one-yard run. Rashad Jordan would beat the EWU defense deep for a 64-yard touchdown reception. Giardina would then put in several backups. Backup quarterback Jhaydon Sullivan would take one in himself on a 5-yard run to push the score to 30-0. Ward would add a 14-yard touchdown, Cameron Hopkins would haul in a 14-yard touchdown reception and Tori Sapp would add a 7-yard TD run for the 54-7 final. Season record 5-1.

Week No.7 would bring in the eventual SIAC champion Benedict College Tigers. This game was the turning point in the season. With a win against the surging Tigers, the Golden Rams would again be in prime position to make a run at the SIAC title. It was not to be as the streaking BC Tigers eeked out a 24-20 win. ASU got in a 14-0 hole to start the game. Ward scampered in for an 8-yard touchdown late in the second quarter leading to a 17-7 deficit at the half. Bonneau would hit Rashad Jordan for a 93-yard

touchdown. That brought the score to 21-14. Sullivan would catch a 5-yard pass from Bonneau with 1:46 remaining in the game, but the Tigers would hold on for the win. Season record 5-2.

ASU would face a pesky and resurgent Savannah State Tigers team in week 8. Jacquez Williams would get the Golden Rams on the board first with a 1-yard run. Gilbert Brown would add a field goal with 6:20 Remaining in the first half to give ASU a 10-7 lead at the half. Rashad Jordan would snag a 5-yard touchdown pass midway through the third period. Defenseman Malik Barnes scooped up a fumble and scored for the 7-yard final touchdown of the game. Season record 6-2.

Week 9 brought the Morehouse Maroon Tigers. ASU jumped on Morehouse from the start and never let off. Jaques Williams led off the scoring on a 6-yard run. Jamil Williams took in a 29-yard pass from Bonneau to make it 17-0. Lovett took a 38-yard bomb and made the

score 24-0. In the fourth quarter, Lovett would snag a 7-yard pass for the 31-7 final score. Season record 7-2.

Going into the Fountain City Classic, the Golden Rams had aspirations of closing out the season with the lone SIAC loss to Benedict. The Fort Valley State Tigers had something else in mind...revenge. Reeling from the 57-0 spanking that ASU put on FVSU to close out the 2021 regular season, the Wildcats were set to get back at the Golden Rams. From the start, it was FVSU pushing the pedal. By the middle of the second quarter, ASU was down 14-0. At the 10:13 mark, Lovett took a 21-yard pass to the endzone to get the Golden Rams on the board. Down 24-7, Ethan Bell came up with the blocked punt and scampered 16 yards for the score to bring ASU to within 10 points. That would be the closest ASU would get as they scored again on a 7-yard Lovett reception, but FVSU would add another score at the end of the game to win by a 31-21 margin. Season record 7-3

The Southern Intercollegiate Athletics Conference • SIAC

The Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) was founded in 1913 and today, more than 100 years later, the conference remains one of the nation's most viable forces in intercollegiate athletics.

On December 30, 1913, representatives of the following institutions met at Morehouse College to consider the regulations of intercollegiate athletics among black colleges in the southeast: Alabama State University, Atlanta University, Clark College, Fisk University, Jackson College, Morehouse College, Morris Brown College, Talladega College and Tuskegee Institute. The representatives formed a permanent organization (The Southeastern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) which has had a continuous history to the present. In 1929, they changed the name of this organization to The Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Two institutions have held continuous membership in the conference: Clark College (now Clark Atlanta University) and Tuskegee University. Other institutions which have held membership are Alabama A&M University, Allen University, Benedict College, Bethune-Cookman University, Edward Waters College, Fisk University, Florida A&M University, Jackson State University, Knoxville College, Morris Brown College, Rust College, Savannah State University, South Carolina State University, Tennessee State University and Xavier University. In 2019-2020 season, the league will add Savannah State University as their fourteenth official member.

The present membership is composed of fourteen different institutions in six states (Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Ohio, South Carolina and Tennessee): Albany State University, Benedict College, Central State University, Clark Atlanta University, Fort Valley State University, Kentucky State University, Lane College, LeMoyne-Owen College, Miles College, Morehouse College, Paine College, Spring Hill College, and Tuskegee University.

The SIAC is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and participates on the Division II level. Annually, the SIAC sponsors seven men's championships (baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, outdoor track & field and tennis) and six women's championships (basketball, cross country, outdoor track & field, softball, tennis and volleyball).

As the second oldest historically black college and university athletic conference, the SIAC has one of the most storied histories in all of the NCAA. Many of the conference's former athletes and coaches have transcended to larger-than-life characters that continue to be monumental in the world of sports. Furthermore, the chronicles of many SIAC programs are have been vital to the foundation of American society.

SIAC schools are known for being staunch competitors, where many have flourished to the realms of national and global celebrity. As a whole, the conference has staked its claim to more than 50 team and individual national championships. In 1978, Florida A&M became the first black college to win a NCAA Football National Championship on any level when they defeat Massachusetts, 35-28, in the inaugural NCAA I-AA Championship Game.

The SIAC has a rich history on the gridiron, as some of the biggest names in college and professional sports began their careers in the conference. Headlining the list are Pro Football Hall of Famers "Bullet" Bob Hayes (Florida A&M), David "Deacon" Jones (South Carolina State), Larry Little (Bethune-Cookman), Shannon Sharpe (Savannah State), John Stallworth (Alabama A&M) and Rayfield Wright (Fort Valley State). Former Tuskegee legend Ben Stevenson, legendary Florida A&M football coach Jake Gaither, Fort Valley State's all-time winningest head football coach Douglass Porter, Florida A&M's Tyrone McGriff and Willie "Gallop Gall" Gailmore are enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame. Fort Valley State alums Greg Lloyd, a former All-Pro for the Pittsburgh Steelers and recent inductee into the SIAC Hall of Fame, along with Tyrone Poole, a two-time Super Bowl Champion for the New England Patriots, are members of the NCAA Division II Football Hall of Fame.

Former Morehouse All-SIAC quarterback Jerome Boger has established himself as a top tier NFL official, recently serving as the head official for Superbowl XLVII between the Baltimore Ravens and San Francisco 49ers. Playing a key role in that same contest was Lane alum and current Ravens wide receiver/kick returner Jacoby Jones, who scored two touchdowns in the game. Jones highlights an impressive roster of former SIAC student-athletes playing in the league. Overall, the conference has produced more than 300 NFL players.

The SIAC is also home to football coaching legends Alonzo "Jake" Gaither and Cleveland Leigh "Major" Abbott. Gaither posted a 203-36-4 record (.835) and guided Florida A&M to six black college national championships, coupled with 22 SIAC titles during his 25-year tenure as head coach. Cleve Abbott coached all sports at Tuskegee during his 32 years at the school from 1923-1955. During this time, he won 11 SIAC football championships and seven black college national championships. Abbott's teams were frontrunners in the conference during the 1920's, posting six undefeated seasons while winning 46 consecutive games. From 1936-56, Abbott coached track and field, winning 25 of the 36 national AAU Championships in which his Tigers teams participated.

The SIAC's renowned history extends to the hardwood, as two of the first four blacks selected to play in the NBA were from the conference. Some of the former stars, who have enjoyed success in the NBA include: Florida A&M's Nate "Sweetwater" Clifton and Clemon Johnson, in addition to the Jones brothers - Caldwell, Charles, Major and Wilbert of Albany State. The late Ed Adams was a member of the 1934 Tuskegee squad that won the inaugural SIAC basketball tournament championship. Adams would later become a coach, spending 23 seasons leading Tuskegee to 645 wins, posting an .811 winning percentage while becoming the first black basketball coach to win 500 games. Former Temple University head coach John Chaney began his basketball career at Bethune-Cookman, where he scored more than 3,500 points and led the Wildcats to an SIAC Championship in the late 1950's. Long-time Fort Valley State women's basketball head coach Lonnie Bartley became the all-time winningest black college women's basketball coach in 2012 after 28 seasons at the helm. Both Chaney and Bartley are 2014 SIAC Hall of Fame inductees.

The SIAC has also made significant footprints on a global scale in track and field. In 1948, Alice Coachman became the first black woman to win a gold medal as she captured the gold in the high jump at the London Games. At the Barcelona Olympics in 1992, Tuskegee graduate Barbara Jacket, was an Olympic coach with the track and field team. In 1996, Benedict College graduate Dr. Leroy T. Walker became the first African-American appointed President of the United States Olympic committee. Other Olympic notables are: Catherine Hardy of Fort Valley State (1st place in the 400 meter relay in 1952); Mildred McDaniel of Tuskegee (1st place in the high jump in 1956); Bob Hayes of Florida A&M (1st place in the 100 meter dash in 1964); Jearl Miles-Clark of Alabama A&M (1st Place 4x400 meter in 1996 and 2000), Dannette Young (1st place in the 400 meter relay in 1998) and Edwin Moses of Morehouse (1st place in the 400 meter hurdles in 1976 and 1984) who went 10 years without a loss in hurdle competition.

One of the greatest tennis players of All-Time, Althea Gibson of Florida A&M, competed in the SIAC. In 1957, Gibson became the first black to win a singles title at Wimbledon and is now a member of the National Tennis Hall of Fame.

The conference has also achieved a level of success in baseball, which includes a World Series MVP. Donn Clendenon, an alumnus of Morehouse, was named the MVP of the 1969 World Series as a member of the New York Mets. Florida A&M's Andre Dawson, formerly of the Montreal Expos and Chicago Cubs, became the first player from the conference inducted into the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY. Both Clendenon and Dawson are 2014 SIAC Hall of Fame inductees. Others making history in baseball include Bill Lucas, another alumni of Florida A&M, who became MLB's first black general manager with the Atlanta Braves in 1978 after his playing career.

The SIAC concluded a banner year in 1993 as member institutions competed for NCAA Division II Championships in eight different sports. Albany State made its first trip to the playoffs after posting an 11-0 season; Alabama A&M's women's outdoor track and field team won their second consecutive National Championship, while their men's outdoor team finished 10th in the nation; A&M's men's and women's indoor track and field team both finished in the top five in the country while their cross country team won the southeastern regional title and finished eighth at nationals; A&M's men's and women's basketball squads each made the playoff appearances.

The SIAC is also home to both the longest running rivalry and the winningest team in black college football. Morehouse and Tuskegee have met 106 times since their inaugural contest in 1902. Tuskegee's football program has recorded more than 650 victories - first among Historically Black Colleges and Universities

All SIAC member institutions have a rich athletic history. They rely heavily on past leadership to help them face today's challenges as they continue their quest to excel in collegiate athletics.
