WOMEN'S BASKETBALL RETURNS AFTER BYE, SET FOR FIRST SHOWDOWN VS. TRINE

The Hope College women's basketball team steps onto the court for the first time in a week this afternoon, and it's another big game for the Flying Dutch.

One week after winning at Calvin University, 72-64, on Jan. 4, the Flying Dutch will play at Trine University on Saturday, Jan, 11 at 3 p.m. The winner seizes sole possession of first place in the MIAA standings and an early tiebreaker advantage.

Hope and Trine share identical records at 11-2 overall and 4-0 against MIAA opponents. Both also are nationally ranked in the latest Women's Basketball Coaches Association and D3hoops.com polls.

Hope leads the all-time series, 45-10. The Flying Dutch have won seven of the past 10 meetings, but lost to Trine, 63-59, in their last meeting: the 2024 MIAA Tournament championship game at DeVos Fieldhouse.

Trine has three games in a row, including two against MIAA opponents: at Alma College, 60-38, on Jan. 8 and at Saint Mary's College, 78-44, on Jan. 4. The Thunder's last loss came at nationally-ranked University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, 61-54, on Dec. 29.

Hope is in the midst of a six-game road trip. The Flying Dutch's next game is Wednesday, Jan. 15, at 5:30 p.m. at Kalamazoo College.

MIAA CONFERENCE

WINNING WAYS IN ANGOLA

Hope owns a five-game winning streak at the MTI Center that dates back to the 2019 seasons. Last season, the Flying Dutch won, 73-58, on Feb. 10. It was the third double-digit road victory in a row. Hope last lost at Trine, 70-65, in double overtime during the 2019 MIAA Tournament championship game.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Flying Dutch are in the midst of six consecutive games away from DeVos Fieldhouse. Hope is 5-1 away from home, this season including a 3-0 mark in true rd games and a 2-1 record in neutral-site games. The Flying Dutch have defeated Loras College (Iowa), The University of Olivet, Muskingum University (Ohio), Wittenberg University (Ohio) and Calvin on the road. Hope's lone loss in this stretch came to second-ranked Illinois Wesleyan University on Nov. 16 at Calvin. The Flying Dutch's next home game is Wednesday, Jan. 22, at 5:30 p.m. against Adrian College at DeVos Fieldhouse.

RINGING IN THE NEW YEAR

The Flying Dutch started 2025 with a 72-64 victory at Calvin University on Jan. 4. It was Hope's 19th consecutive victory against the Knights, the longest streak in program history and the second-longest in The Rivalry. The win streak began after a three-game sweep during the 2017-18 season. Hope pulled with four games of Calvin all-time (67-71). Senior guard Jada Garner scored a season-high 19 points against the Knights that was just one point of her career-high.

HIGH-FLYING OFFENSE

Hope is averaging a league-best 75.5 points during MIAA play after four games. The Flying Dutch are 10 points more than the next team, Trine. It's taken a balanced effort, with three Hope players scoring 10.5 points per MIAA game: forward Sydney Vis, guard Jada Garner and forward Leah Richards. Overall, the Flying Dutch top the MIAA in team offense at 74.2 points per game — five more than second-place Trine. Hope has only player in double figures in all games: guard Olivia Bellows at 10.2.

MIAA ATHLETES OF THE WEEK

TITLE CHASE

Hope is chasing a fourth consecutive MIAA regularseason championship for the third time in program history. Previously, the Flying Dutch earned four-peats from the 2008 through 2011 seasons and 2000-03. After today's game vs. the Thunder, there will be 11 more league games for both teams.

EYEING MARCH

Hope aims to advance to the NCAA Division III for the 12th consecutive season and 25th time overall. The Flying Dutch reached the Sweet 16 last season before losing at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, 72-61, Hope opened postseason play on the road for the first time since 2019 and defeated Ripon College (Wisconsin), 65-54, and host DePauw University (Indiana), 70-55.

SHARING THE LOAD

The Flying Dutch are tied for 23rd in the nation and first in the MIAA with a 19.1-point scoring margin. Ten of Hope's wins have come by double digits, including six in the current eight-game winning streak. All four of Hope's MIAA victories have been by eight points or more.

SISTER ACT

Twin sisters Anna and Leah Richards have made immediate impacts for the Flying Dutch off the bench in their first collegiate season. They are combining for 15.7 points and 10.9 rebounds per game. Anna Richards is third on Hope in both scoring at 8.2 points per game and rebounding at 4.5. Leach Richards tops the Flying Dutch in rebounds at 6.4 and is fifth in scoring at 7.5. As high school juniors, they led Lansing Catholic High School to a Michigan High School Athletic Association state championship.

MIAA'S FINEST BACK FOR THE FLYING DUTCH

Guard Jada Garner flourished in a new role as the starting point guard for the Flying Dutch during the 2023-24 season. As a junior, Garner directed a new starting lineup for the Flying Dutch that went 23-2 overall and claimed an outright MIAA regular-season championship with a 15-1 league record. Hope won the MIAA by three games. MIAA coaches rewarded Garner by selecting her as the league's Most Valuable Player and a first-team honoree. The junior from Midland, Michigan (H.H. Dow HS) is Hope's 13th MIAA MVP. Garner was joined on the All-MIAA Teams by forward Sydney Vis and junior guard Olivia Bellows.

MIAA ACADEMIC HONOR ROLL

Eleven different members of the Flying Dutch made the 2023-24 MIAA Academic Honor Roll, including eight returning student-athletes Olivia Bellows, Jada Garner, Lauren Leach, Courtney Lee, Terin Maynard, Lily Miller, Brooklyn Robak and Sydney Vis. Student-athletes must be a letterwinner and have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or high to achieve the accolade.

2022 POSTSEASON FLASHBACK

Hope and Trine squared off four times during the 2021-22 season, including an unprecedented memorable showdown in the semifinals of the NCAA Division III Championships. The Flying Dutch prevailed, 57-52, at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, en route to the third national championship in program history. After trailing 8-0 just 99 seconds into the game and 41-23 midway through the third quarter, the Thunder stormed back. The enders of Hope's 61-game winning streak rumbled on a 29-11 run over the next 10 ½ minutes to pull even. Kayla Wildman's 3-pointer with 3:35 remaining tied the score at 52-52. Guard Sydney Muller answered Wildman's dial-up from long range with a driving jumper 22 seconds later. Muller finished with 13 points, one more than teammate Ella McKinney. Hope then stifled Trine defensively, as the Thunder missed four shots and committed two turnovers over their final five possessions. Senior center Olivia Voskuil buried a contested jumper in the paint with 26 seconds remaining for a four-point lead. On Trine's next possession, Voskuil stole the ball away by acutely stepping into a passing lane in the paint.

BRIAN MOREHOUSE HEAD COACH

Brian Morehouse '91 has developed the Hope College women's basketball team into one of the nation's elite programs during his tenure, guiding the Flying Dutch to national championships in 2022 and 2006 and a national runner-up finish in 2010 as well as 18 MIAA championships through the 2023-24 season.

Through the 2023-24 season, Morehouse has guided the Flying Dutch to a 711-98 record (.879) over 28 seasons.

On January 13, 2024, Morehouse became the fastest collegiate basketball coach to 700 wins with a 79-77, double-overtime victory against Alma College at DeVos Fieldhouse in his 795th game. He broke the collegiate record set by Mark Campbell of Union University, Tenn. (811 games) and the NCAA record set by Kim Mulkey of Louisiana State (813 games).

In 2022, Morehouse guided the Flying Dutch to the third national title in team history and a 32-1 overall record. Hope extended a winning streak to 61 games over three seasons — tying for the third-longest in NCAA Division III history.

In 2021, Morehouse led Hope to a 16-0 record in a season shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Flying Dutch's 45-game winning streak set a school record and ranked as the eighth-longest in NCAA Division III history.

In 2020, Morehouse guided Hope to being the only undefeated team in Division III women's basketball with the No. 1 ranking. The Flying Dutch were one of 16 teams in title contention before the NCAA Tournament was canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It also marked the 22nd consecutive time the Flying Dutch had earned at least 20 wins during his tenure.

During the 2020 season, Morehouse reached the 600-win mark in his 690th game - faster than, at the time, any basketball coach in NCAA history at any level, women's or men's.

Morehouse has been chosen as the Division III National Coach of the Year three times by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (2021, 2020, 2006). He was also named Division III Coach of the Year by D3hoops.com (2019-20).

Morehouse was selected as the 2024 MIAA Women's Basketball Coach of the Year by his peers after leading the Flying Dutch to a fourth consecutive regular season title and seventh consecutive MIAA Tournament title game appearance.

Morehouse has been named the Michigan Collegiate women's basketball coach of the year by the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan four times in his career (2001-02, 2007-08, 2011-12, 2015-16). Morehouse is ranked among Division III's elite active coaches by winning percentage.

In 2024, Morehouse was selected as serve as an on-court coach for the USA Women's Under 17 Team Trials in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Morehouse's basketball roots run deep. His father, Dean, was the boy's basketball coach at Fremont (Mich.) High School. He joined son Brian as an assistant coach in 2000-01. Brian and Dean were honored as "Hometown Heroes" during the 2006 National Baby Food Festival in Fremont.

Morehouse currently represents MIAA coaches on the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) Conference Captains Committee and serves as a member of the WBCA board. He also serves as a member of the board of the Hand Up Fund, and is involved with Special Olympics and Holland Area Hospice.

COURTNEY KUST

Associate Head Coach

Courtney Kust '13 became Hope College's associate head women's basketball coach prior to the 2023-24 season. Kust had served as an assistant coach for the Flying Dutch the previous nine seasons and as the college's Assistant Athletic Director of Events since July 1, 2019.

Head coach Brian Morehouse said he is excited about Kust's promotion to associate head coach.

During the 2021-22 season, Kust helped the Flying Dutch claim the third NCAA Division III national championship in program history. Hope's record during Kust's coaching tenure is 231-23, a winning percentage of .909.

In 2018, Kust was named a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches' Association "Thirty Under 30 Class," a distinction that recognizes 30 up-and-coming women's basketball coaches aged 30 and under at all levels of the game.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Kust played basketball for the Flying Dutch from the 2009-10 to the 2012-13 season. She was a member of the 2010 national runner-up team and a captain her senior year. She earned All-Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association First Team honors during her junior and senior seasons.

Colly Carlson '92 has been on the Hope College women's basketball coaching staff since the 2005-06 season. Before that, Carlson coached high school basketball for 13 years. He teaches at Hamilton High School and is in his 22nd year of teaching social studies there. Carlson and his wife, Kristie (Gauntt) Carlson, are both

Randel played collegiately at NCAA Division II North Greenville University in Greenville, S.C., for two seasons, then played Ferris State University for two seasons. He reached the 1,000-point mark for his college career. He also played two seasons semi-professionally for the Grand Rapids Cyclones.

Randel also currently works as a Head Coach for Michigan Basketball Academies Women's 2023 and 2026 national teams as well as their Women's Basketball Player Development Director.
