HOPE LOOKS TO CARRY MOMENTUM FROM REGULAR SEASON INTO PLAYOFFS

The Flying Dutchmen will make back-to-back playoff appearances for the first time in program history when they host the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse on Saturday, Nov. 29, at noon at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium. The Flying Dutchmen aim for their second postseason victory after defeating Aurora University (Illinois), 49-21, last season.

Hope capped off another stellar season on Nov. 15 defeating The University of Olivet, 63-6, on Senior Day. The Orange and Blue went 9-1 on the season and 6-1 in the MIAA, earning an at-large bid for the Division III playoffs. This will be the first matchup ever between Hope and La Crosse (7-2).

The Orange and Blue carry a six-game winning streak into the playoffs and have won 20 of their past 22 games.

Wisconsin-La Crosse has also been on an impressive tear, making the playoffs the past five seasons under head coach Matt Janus in a loaded Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. This year, the WIAC has put four teams in the playoffs, the most of any conference in Division III this season.

The winner will face off against the winner of today's game between defending national champion North Central College (Illinois) and Hanover College (Indiana). North Central beat Hope in last season's third round, 42-21.

GAME NOTES

WINNING TRADITION

The Flying Dutchmen enter this afternoon with a 516-375-40 all-time record (.576), including a 252-112-6 record (.689) in MIAA conference play since 1958. The first recorded Hope football game kicked off in 1893. Led by head coach Erasmus A. Whitenack, Hope defeated a team from the City of Holland. The score is unknown.

TOUGH TO SCORE ON

Hope is tied for 26th in NCAA Division III in scoring defense at 15.0 points per game. The Flying Dutchmen have shut out at least three opponents in a single season for the first time in 47 years, blanking Loras College, 62-0, Albion College, 62-0, and Calvin University, 52-0. In 1978, Hope blanked four foes that season, including Maranatha Baptist College by a 28-0 margin in then opener, then four in a row late in the season: then-Olivet College, 48-0, Adrian College, 7-0, and Alma College, 16-0.

SACK ATTACK

Senior defensive lineman Liam Danitz has emerged as one of NCAA Division III's top pass rushers, ranking fourth in the nation with 13 sacks and seventh with 19 tackles for a loss. The exercise science major has set career-highs in both categories. Westminster's Jeremiah Belizaire tops the nation with 16 sacks. Benedictine's Brian Pritt is second with 15. Aurora's JP Chaney ranks third with 14.

RUN STOPPERS

Hope has been stingy against the run this season, holding opponents to 58.9 rushing yards this season and ranking the Flying Dutchmen ninth in rush defense in Division III. The school record for rush defense is 51.3 yards per game allowed in 1979. The Flying Dutchmen rank 26th in total defense at 260.5 yards per game allowed.

POSSESSION IS KEY

Fueled by a stingy defense and a highproducing offense, the Flying Dutchmen have been winning the time of possession battle at an elite level this season, ranking fifth in NCAA Division III at 34 minutes, 9 seconds per game. The national leader is Springfield College at 35:48.



ON THE OFFENSIVE

The Flying Dutchmen have racked up yards unlike few NCAA Division III teams this season, producing 513.2 yards of total offense per game that ranks fifth. The national leader is University of Wisconsin-River Falls from the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference at 598.9 yards per game.

QB1 AT HOPE

Junior Alex Thole threw for the second-most among MIAA quarterbacks with second in the MIAA in passing yards at 2,640, only 94 fewer than Adrian College's Noah Beaudrie. The transfer from Grand Valley State University has completed 192-of-267 passes with 20 touchdowns and a league-leading 175.9 efficiency rating. Thole has thrown five interceptions.

RECEIVING DEPTH

Quarterback Alex Thole has utilized a number of receivers in Hope's passing attack. Junior Jonny Rohen-Blanton finished third among MIAA players with 819 receiving yards after collecting 58 catches and three touchdowns. Senior Travis Myers placed ninth in the league with 627 receiving yards with 35 catches and five touchdowns. Junior Kaden DeHorn is another threat (423 yards on 24 receptions).

TRIPLE THREAT

The Flying Dutchmen averaged 233.1 rushing yards per game this season, ranking second in the MIAA. Three Hope running backs rank among the top eight in the MIAA:

- 5. Trey Goike, 556 yards (71 carries) 7.8 yards per carry;
- 6. Kal Motter, 521 yards (71 carries) 7.3 yards per carry;
- 8. AJ Martel, 503 yards (100 carries) 5.0 yards per carry.

GAME NOTES

INDIVIDUAL SUPERLATIVES

PAT KING

Placekicker Caden Balkon is Hope's all-time PAT leader with 164 in 31 games over three seasons. The senior set the career mark during the season opener at Loras, reaching 112 PATs in 22 games after making 8-of-9 attempts against the Duhawks. Nate Barnett '16 held the previous record with 111 over four seasons between 2002-05. Balkon heads into today with 160 PATs, has been Hope's placekicker since the 2023 season. The political science major previously totaled 37 PATs in 2023, a school-record 67 last season.

MIAA DEFENSIVE MVP

Senior defensive lineman Liam Danitz coheadlined the 2025 All-MIAA Football Team as the MIAA's Defensive MVP, as selected by the league's coaches, becoming the 29th Flying Dutchmen standout to claim MVP honors. The senior exercise science major led the MIAA with 1.29 sacks per seven league games, totaling nine sacks, including seven solo. His disruptive presence at the line of scrimmage consistently set the tone for the MIAA's No. 1 total defense and second-ranked scoring defense. Danitz followed former teammate Cole Luhmann as an MIAA Defensive MVP after Luhmann earned the distinction last season.

ALL-MIAA

The Flying Dutchmen placed 11 on the All-MIAA Football beginning senior defensive lineman Liam Danitz, the MIAA Defensive MVP. Danitz was joined by six other All-MIAA First Team honorees and four All-MIAA Second Team selections from Hope. Kicker Caden Balkon, safety Owen Graham, cornerback Austin Harvey, Hback Seth Luhmann, center Rob MacAleese and defensive lineman Caleb Paarlberg also made the first team. Linebacker Bryce Debri, receiver Jonny Rohen-Blanton, linebacker Schreur and quarterback Alex Thole earned second-team honors. Harvey, Luhmann and Paarlberg claimed All-MIAA recognition for the second time in their careers. The All-MIAA honors was the first for Balkon, Graham, MacAleese, Debri, Rohen-Blanton, Schreur and Thole.



D3FOOTBALL TEAM OF THE WEEK

Hope College linebacker Colton Schreur was selected to the D3football.com Team of the Week on Oct. 28. The senior earned the honor for the first time in his career. Schreur, a business major, recorded a season-high 10 tackles, including five solo, for the nationally ranked Flying Dutchmen during a 19-17 victory at No. 25 Adrian College. Hope held the Bulldogs to a season-low 217 yards of total offense and shut them out in the second half. Schreur also broke up a pass on a fourth-down stop in the end zone and added a half-tackle for loss. The Team of the Week, presented by Scoutware, is D3football.com's weekly honor roll. Now in its 27th season, it recognizes the top performance at each position from the previous week.

MIAA ATHLETES OF THE WEEK

Two Flying Dutchmen garnered MIAA Athlete of the Week accolades this season: return Gavin Reames and defensive lineman Liam Danitz.

Nov. 10: Reames was named the MIAA Special Teams Athlete of the Week. The senior business major helped the Flying Dutchmen record a 52–0 victory over rival Calvin University in the first game of The Rivalry played on Hope's campus. Reames returned one kickoff for 23 yards and five punts for 67 yards.

Oct. 6: Danitz was selected as the MIAA Football Defensive Athlete of the Week for the first time after recording nine tackles, two sacks and two fumble recoveries during a 55-35 Flying Dutchmen victory at Trine University on Saturday. The exercise science major finished with 2 ½ tackles for loss.


SEASON RECAP

WEEK 10

A determined and senior-led Hope College football team capped a ferocious six-game run to close the regular season on Nov. 15, bolstering its bid for an at-large berth to the NCAA Division III playoffs with a 63-6 victory against the University of Olivet at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium. The nationallyranked Flying Dutchmen (9-1) reached the nine-win mark for the second consecutive season and the third time under head coach Peter Stuursma with a Senior Day victory. The Flying Dutchmen outscored opponents 304-79 during their winning streak. The Orange and Blue also posted back-to-back shutouts and went 11 quarters without giving up a point. Against Olivet, Hope allowed only a touchdown on a 43-yard halfback pass from Caleb Rudd 3 minutes, 49 seconds into the second quarter. Sophomore defensive lineman Jake Punches blocked the PAT kick for a 21-6 Hope lead. Seven different Flying scored touchdowns. Dutchmen Freshman running back Trey Goike posted career bests with 104 rushing yards and three scores on runs of 50, 8 and 13 yards.

WEEK 9

The Hope College football team lit up the scoreboard and the Saturday night sky on a historic Nov. 8 evening at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium. The nationally ranked Flying Dutchmen provided all the fireworks in the first on-campus meeting of The Rivalry, defeating Calvin University 52-0 in front of 5,651 fans, one of the largest home crowds in program history. Hope, ranked No. 16 in both the D3football.com and AFCA polls, scored touchdowns on its first three possessions and added four more touchdowns and a field Defensively, the Flying Dutchmen recorded back-to-back shutouts for the first time since 1983. Hope limited Calvin to a season-low 152 yards of total offense and forced three interceptions. . Senior linebacker Colton Schreur led the team with eight tackles. Hope's offense delivered as well, totaling 557 yards and 33 first downs while averaging 6.8 yards per play and displaying balance with seven different Flying Dutchmen scoring touchdowns.



WEEK 8

The Hope College football team treated itself to a record-setting 62-0 victory at Albion College over Halloween weekend, erupting for the Flying Dutchmen's most points ever scored against the Britons and their largest margin of victory in the 96-game series. On defense, Hope shut out Albion for the 13th time after allowing only 81 yards of total offense. The Flying Dutchmen dominated from start to finish at Albion, recording their second shutout of the season. Over 54 offensive plays, Albion totaled 13 rushing yards and 68 passing yards. Senior Liam Danitz led the charge with seven tackles and 1½ sacks.

WEEK 7

An unflinching defense and a clutch kicker propelled the Hope College football team to a 19-17 victory at Adrian College on Saturday in a showdown between nationally ranked teams. The Flying Dutchmen shut out the unbeaten Bulldogs after halftime while scoring five decisive points on a third-quarter safety by sophomore defensive lineman Jake Punches and a 45-yard field goal by senior kicker Caden Balkon with 10 seconds remaining. At Adrian, the Flying Dutchmen held the Bulldogs to a season-low 217 yards of total offense and overcame an early 10-0 deficit. A fourth-down stop and a three-and-out on successive Adrian drives during the fourth quarter set up the game-winning drive. Hope's defense delivered several critical stops after halftime. Each team had only four possessions combined during the third and fourth quarters. Following a Koronnis Davis interception that thwarted a potential Flying Dutchmen scoring drive at the Adrian 1-yard line, Punches sacked Adrian guarterback Noah Beaudrie in the end zone for a safety on second-and-6 to cut the Bulldogs' lead to 17-16 with 8:05 remaining in the third quarter. Hope sacked Beaudrie three times during the game.

Safety Owen Graham and the Hope College football team enjoyed one big weekend. The senior intercepted two passes in a game for the second time in three games, delivering during an early swarming effort that propelled the Flying Dutchmen to a 56-21 victory over Kalamazoo College on Oct. 18. The Orange and Blue finished with 544 yards of total offense, with 260 on the ground and 284 through the air.

WEEK 5

Two recovered fumbles and three fourth-quarter touchdowns over a span of six minutes helped the Hope College football team secure a 55-35 victory at Trine University on Oct. 4. The Flying Dutchmen erupted for their highest-scoring game against the Thunder.

WEEK 4

The 15th-ranked Hope College football team saw its 16-game regular season winning streak snapped on Sept. 27 by Alma College in a stunning ending at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium, 29-26, in overtime in the MIAA opener for both teams In overtime, Alma (2-2) won the opening toss and went on defense first. Hope could not pick up a first down, so senior Caden Balkon kicked his longest field goal of the season, a 30-yarder, to give the Flying Dutchmen a 26-23 lead. The Orange and Blue thought they had secured the victory after Alma appeared to fumbled the second play of overtime. Officials instead the play ruled an incomplete pass, and the Scots' drive continued. On fourth down from the Hope 2, Alma quarterback Carter St. John's pass was tipped into the air, and caught by tight end Miles Haggart at the back of the end zone for the winning score.

WEEK 3

Defensive end Tate Bezeau tracked down elusive Mount St. Joseph University quarterback Jaxon Schreiber one last time, securing the game-clinching, fourth-down sack that earned the Flying Dutchmen a 31-28 victory on Sept. 20. Senior Caden Balkon's 22-yard field goal with seven minutes remaining in the fourth quarter was the difference.

WEEK 2

The Flying Dutchmen overpowered Franklin College (Indiana) during the opening two quarters to earn a 38-14 victory on Sept. 13. Despite challenging weather conditions, the Flying Dutchmen scored 31 consecutive points during the first half after the Grizzlies jumped to a 7-0 lead on the opening drive.

WEEK 1

The Flying Dutchmen scored the most points ever against a collegiate opponent in a season opener during a 62-0 victory at Loras College (Iowa) of the American Rivers Conference on Sept. 6. Hope also posted the back-to-back, season-opening shutouts since 1978 and 1979, when they defeated Marantha College (Wisconsin), 28-0 and 64-0.

GAME NOTES

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS

Head coach Peter Stuursma hired three new assistant coaches during the offseason: Sam/Nickels coach Brendann Brown, defensive line coach Isiah Hicks and H//y coach Drew Peterson.

Brown played at Grand Valley State University for four seasons, earning All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in 2021 and 2019 as a linebacker. He totaled 125 tackles, two forced fumbles and one interception during his career. He was named GVSU's most improved defensive player in 2019. Brown played at Farmington Hills Harrison HS for Hall of Fame head coach John Harrington. Brown earned his Master's degree in Communication and Media Studies from GVSU in 2023 and his bachelor's degree in Communication and Media Studies in 2021.

Peterson played tight end for four years at Grand Valley State University, totaling 30 receptions for 239 yards and two touchdowns in 48 games played between 2021-24. A four-year letterwinner, Peterson claimed All-Academic accolades from the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference four times.

Hicks was elevated into an expanded role after serving as a student assistant during the 2024 season. He played on the defensive line for three years. He graduated from Hope with a bachelor's degree in special education.

CHAMPIONSHIP PEDIGREE

In 2024, Hope claimed an MIAA title for the 23rd time in program history last season and was outright champs for the 15th time. The Flying Dutchmen won all of their league games for the 10th time. Hope went 7-0 in MIAA play in 2024, 2019 and 2009 seasons, and 5-0 in 2000, 1987, 1984, 1982, 1981, 1978 and 1973.

A 2024 TO REMEMBER

The Flying Dutchmen accomplished a lot during the 2024 season, including the first 10-0 regular season in the 122-year history of the program. Hope clinched the mark with a 48-12 victory at The University of Olivet on Nov. 16, 2024.. It was the Flying Dutchmen's third unbeaten regular season



in school history. The Flying Dutchmen went 8-0-1 in 1975 and 9-0 in 1984, both under legendary head coach Ray Smith.

Hope went on the post the first NCAA Division III playoff victory in program history with a 49-21 victory against Aurora University (III.) in the second round. The Flying Dutchmen lost to eventual national champion North Central College (III.), 41-21, in the third round. The Flying Dutchmen outscored opponents by a 492-163 margin during the 2024 season. Hope scored at least 40 points eight times, with a season-low of 34 during a 34-13 victory at Alma on Sept. 28. The Flying Dutchmen shut out two foes and held seven to single digits. Hope also broke six school records: points, touchdowns, rushing touchdowns, total offense, rushing yards and first downs.

HISTORY BOOK

Dr. Todd Harburn's passion for Hope College, history and college football runs deep like a go route. The 1978 Hope graduate and former football student-athlete for the Flying Dutchmen has authored "Every college ought to have a...football eleven': Hope College Football, Earliest coaches and teams 1893-1919", a 152-page book about how the nowproudly NCAA Division III and Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association program kicked off. Dr. Harburn, who also served as the team physician for the Flying Dutchmen for two decades before retiring in 2022, is proud to provide a "small supplement" to previous Hope Athletics history books authored by Gordon Brewer '48 and Tom Renner '67.



In nine seasons, head coach Peter Stuursma '93 has guided the Hope College football team to a 74-19 overall record, including a 49-10 mark in Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association games.

The Flying Dutchmen have won three MIAA titles — outright championships in 2024 and 2019 and a co-championship in 2021 — and finished in second place four times during his tenure.

In 2024, Stuursma led Hope to the first 10-0 regular-season in program history and was named both the American Football Coaches Association Region 5 and MIAA Coach of the Year. He also guided the Flying Dutchmen to their first postseason win with a 49-21 second-round victory vs. Aurora Univerity.

Hope recorded the second nine-win season in team history in 2019 when the Flying Dutchmen made their fifth NCAA Division III playoff appearance. Stuursma is Hope's seventh head football coach. He followed Dean Kreps (1995-2015), Ray Smith (1970-94), Russ DeVette (1955-69), Al Vanderbush (1946-54), Bud Hinga (1931-42) and Jack Schouten (1920-30).

Stuursma has deep ties to Hope College and the Flying Dutchmen football program. As a student-athlete, Stuursma served as co-captain for the Hope College football team during his senior season. He was a running back and special teams player. Stuursma received the team's Allan C. Kinney award after the 1992 season despite playing in only three games due to an injury. The award, presented annually since 1971 and named in memory of football player Allan C. Kinney, who died of cancer in his senior year in 1967, honors a senior player for maximum contribution to the football program. As a coach, Stuursma served as the Flying Dutchmen's defensive coordinator during the 1999 season before becoming a teacher and head football coach at East Grand Rapids. Hope claimed a share of the MIAA title in the 1999 season with a 5-1 league record while allowing only 18.1 points per game and scoring 32.6. Stuursma also was Hope's recruiting coordinator that football season as well as an assistant track coach for the 1999-2000 year.

At East Grand Rapids High School, the Pioneers flourished on the field under Stuursma's guidance. His teams went 162-34 with 13 state playoff appearances during his 16-season tenure. They claimed Michigan High School Athletic Association state titles in 2010, 2009, 2008, 2007, 2006, 2003, and 2002. They also reached the state semifinals twice. Stuursma was named Detroit Lions High School Coach of the Year in 2008 and High School Football Coaches Association Division 3 Football Coach of the Year in 2010, 2009 2008, 2007, 2006 and 2002. He was inducted into the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in March of 2020.

Stuursma also served as principal at East Grand Rapids Middle School from 2005 to 2016. He was assistant principal at East Grand Rapids High School from 2002 to 2004. He taught social studies and physical education for three years prior to becoming an administrator. Stuursma graduated from Hope College in 1993, completing the secondary teacher education program, majoring in physical education and minoring in social studies. In 1998, he earned a master's degree in physical education / sports administration from the University of Northern Colorado. In 1997, Stuursma worked as a graduate assistant on the NCAA Division II National Champion Northern Colorado football team.

Prior to his stop at Northern Colorado, Stuursma taught and coached at Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central High School for three years. He was head coach of the Rangers hockey team and assistant coach for the football team. Stuursma and his wife, Amy, also a '93 Hope graduate, have three children: Hannah, Robbie, and Mitchell.
