# FOOTBALL SET FOR REMATCH IN THE RIVALRY, BUT THIS TIME ON HOME TURF AT RAY AND SUE SMITH STADIUM

The nationally-ranked Flying Dutchmen take on Calvin University under the lights at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium for the second game in this new rivalry series.

It is Hope's first home game against the improved Knights, who have tripled their win total from last season. The Flying Dutchmen won the inaugural meeting, 38-7, last season at Grand Rapids Christian High School.

Hope brings a four-game winning streak into the rematch. The Flying Dutchmen are tied for second place in the MIAA standings with Adrian College, one game behind first-place Alma College with two weeks remaining.

Hope is coming off a 62-0 victory at Albion College last week, the biggest wins in the schools' 96-game history. The defense continued to shine, picking off Albion quarterbacks five times and allowing just 81 yards of total offense, a season low. Senior safety Owen Graham continues to fill the stat sheet as he had his third game with two interceptions.

Offensively, the ball was shared all around. Hope had a total of 10 different ball carries and 10 different pass catchers as well as three quarterbacks throwing passes. The Orange and Blue gained a season high 665 total yards and tied their single-game season high of 62 points.





#### 1975 UNBEATEN TEAM HONORED ON 50<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY

Hope College Athletics is proud to recognize the 1975 undefeated Hope College football team during this weekend's home football game. Under the direction of head coach Ray Smith, the Flying Dutchmen posted an 8-0-1 overall record 50 years ago, earning an outright MIAA championship with a 4-0-1 record.

Quarterback Tim Van Heest was named the MIAA's Most Valuable Player. Van Heest was joined on the All-MIAA team by running back Bill Blacquiere, offensive end Dave DeZwaan, offensive lineman Len Fazio, defensive end Bob Lees, defensive back Rick McLouth, offensive lineman Dewey Thompson, and defensive lineman Craig VanTuinen.

### RIVALRY RECAP

The Hope College football team made sure its first-ever Rivalry meeting with Calvin University would be a day to remember on Nov. 9, 2024.

The Flying Dutchmen jumped out to a 21-0 lead after one quarter and went to defeat the Knights, 38-7, at Eagles Stadium in Grand Rapids to clinch a share of their 23rd MIAA championship in school history and their first trip to the NCAA Division III playoffs since 2019.

The Knights took the opening kickoff and drove inside the Hope 15-yard-line before the Flying Dutchmen stiffened. A 37-yard field goal attempt was no good and Hope took over possession of the ball. The Flying Dutchmen then drove 80 yards in seven plays for the game's first points, with senior running back Tyler Amos going the final two yards for the touchdown.

The Hope defense, which has been one of the toughest to run against in Division III all season, came up with a big stop on Calvin's next possession, as sophomore defensive backs Brad Raredon and Lorenzo Vitti stopped Knights' running back Jaier Harden for a 1-yard loss on a fourth-and-1, and the Dutchmen took over on downs at the Calvin 45. Two plays later, senior quarterback Ben Wellman connected with sophomore wide receiver Trevor Griffiths on a 34-yard touchdown pass to give Hope a 14-0 lead.

Later in the first quarter, senior linebacker Andrew Debr<u>i</u> intercepted a Calvin pass and returned the pick 32 yards to the Knights' 33. Hope cashed in on the turnover as freshman running back Kal Motter scored on a 1-yard touchdown plunge.

Hope, which entered the game ranked third among Division III teams in total offense, generated 569 yards of total offense – 327 on the ground and 242 through the air. The defense, meanwhile, limited the Knights to 56 rushing yards and 242 yards of total offense for the game.

Amos led the ground attack, which was missing senior Chance Strickland due to injury, with 125 yards on 17 carries. Wellman threw for 220 yards on just nine completions and ran for 77 more on seven carries. Motter chipped in 61 yards on the ground on 10 attempts. Fifth-year senior Grant Holtzer had 142 receiving yards on just four catches.

Senior linebacker Cole Luhmann led the Hope defense with 10 tackles. Junior defensive tackle Caleb Paarlberg made eight stops.

#### **D3FOOTBALL TEAM OF THE WEEK**

Hope College linebacker Colton Schreur has been selected to the D3football.com Team of the Week. The senior earned the honor for the first time in his career. The Team of the Week, presented by Scoutware, is D3football.com's weekly honor roll. Now in its 27th season, it recognizes the top performance at each position from the previous week. Schreur, a business major, recorded a season-high 10 tackles, including five solo, for the Flying Dutchmen during a 19-17 victory at No. 25 Adrian College on Oct. 25.

#### WINNING TRADITION

The Flying Dutchmen enter this afternoon with a 514-375-40 all-time record (.575), including a 250-112-6 record (.687) in MIAA conference play since 1958. The first recorded Hope football game kicked off in 1893. Led by head coach Erasmus A. Whitenack, Hope defeated a team from the City of Holland. The final score and exact date of the game are unknown.

#### **PASSING LEADER**

Quarterback Alex Thole leads the MIAA with 2.096 passing yards and 262.0 passing yards per game. In his first season with the Flying Dutchmen, Thole has completed 155-of-210 passes with 17 touchdowns and three interceptions. Thole is first in the league in passing efficiency at 181.5.

#### TRIPLE THREAT

The Flying Dutchmen are averaging 215.8 rushing yards per game, second in the MIAA. Three Hope running backs rank among the Top 10 in the MIAA for rushing yards:

- 5. AJ Martel, 470 yards (95 carries) 4.9 yards per carry;
- 6. Trey Goike, 401 yards (56 carries) 7.2 yards per carry;
- 10. Kal Motter, 369 yards (48 carries) 7.5 yards per carry.

#### POSSESSION IS THE KEY

The Flying Dutchmen have been winning the time of possession battle at an elite level this season, ranking ninth in NCAA Division III at 33:45 minutes per game. The national leader is Macalester College (Minn.) at 35:32.



#### **PAT KING**

Placekicker Caden Balkon set the Hope College Football career point after touchdown record at Loras. The senior reached 112 PATs in 22 games after making 8-of-9 attempts for the nationally-ranked Flying Dutchmen against the Duhawks. Nate Barnett '16 held the previous record with 111 over four seasons between 2002-05. Balkon, who heads into today with 148 PATs has been Hope's placekicker since the 2023 season. The political science major previously totaled 37 PATs in 2023, a school-record 67 last season and 44 this season.

#### SACK ATTACK

Defensive end Liam Danitz is getting to the quarterback at a MIAA-leading pace this season. The senior already has set a careerhigh with 11 sacks this season. Danitz also is tied for second place in NCAA Division III for sacks this season. Brian Pritt of Benedictine College (Illinois) is the national leader with 13.

#### ON THE OFFENSIVE

Hope has been stingy against the run this season, holding opponents 60.4 rushing yards this season and ranking the Flying Dutchmen 10<sup>th</sup> in rush defense in NCAA Division III. The Flying Dutchmen are 38<sup>th</sup> in total defense (275.8 yards per game allowed) and tied for 46<sup>th</sup> in scoring defense (18.0 points game allowed).

#### ON THE OFFENSIVE

The Flying Dutchmen have racked up yards unlike few NCAA Division III teams this season, producing 507.8 yards of total offense per game that ranks fifth. The national leader is University of Wisconsin-River Falls from the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference at 607 yards per game.

#### **WEEK 7 RECAP**

An unflinching defense and a clutch kicker propelled the Hope College football team to a 19-17 victory at Adrian College on Saturday in a showdown between nationally ranked teams. The Flying Dutchmen (No. 18 AFCA/No. 19 D3football) shut out the unbeaten Bulldogs after halftime while scoring five decisive points on a third-quarter safety by sophomore defensive lineman Jake Punches and a 45-yard field goal by senior kicker Caden Balkon with 10 seconds remaining.

#### **WEEK 6 RECAP**

Safety Owen Graham and the nationally ranked Hope College football team enjoyed one big weekend. The senior intercepted two passes in a game for the second time in three games, delivering during an early swarming effort that propelled the Flying Dutchmen to a 56-21 victory over Kalamazoo College on Oct. 18. The Orange and Blue finished with 544 yards of total offense, with 260 on the ground and 284 through the air.

#### **WEEK 5 RECAP**

Two recovered fumbles and three fourth-quarter touchdowns over a span of six minutes helped the nationally-ranked Hope College football team secure a 55-35 victory at Trine University on Saturday. The Flying Dutchmen erupted for their highest-scoring game against the Thunder. Junior quarterback Alex Thole threw for 312 yards and four touchdowns.

#### **WEEK 4 RECAP**

The 15th-ranked Hope College football team saw its 16-game regular season winning streak snapped Saturday afternoon by Alma College in a stunning ending at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium, 29-26, in overtime in the MIAA opener for both teams. In overtime, Alma (2-2) won the opening toss and went on defense first. Hope could not pick up a first down, so senior Caden Balkon kicked his longest field goal of the season, a 30-yarder, to give the Flying Dutchmen a 26-23 lead. The Orange and Blue thought they had secured the victory after Alma appeared to fumble



the second play of overtime. Officials instead the play ruled an incomplete pass, and the Scots' drive continued. On fourth down from the Hope 2, Alma quarterback Carter St. John's pass was tipped into the air, and caught by tight end Miles Haggart at the back of the end zone for the winning score.

#### **WEEK 3 RECAP**

Defensive end Tate Bezeau tracked down elusive Mount St. Joseph University quarterback Jaxon Schreiber one last time, securing the game-clinching, fourth-down sack that earned the Hope College football team a 31-28 victory on Saturday. Senior Caden Balkon's 22-yard, fourth-quarter field goal was the difference for the 15th-ranked Flying Dutchmen.

#### **WEEK 2 RECAP**

The nationally-ranked The Flying Dutchmen overpowered Franklin College (Indiana) during the opening two quarters to earn a 38-14 victory on Sept. 13. Despite challenging weather conditions, the Flying Dutchmen scored 31 consecutive points during the first half after the Grizzlies jumped to a 7-0 lead on the opening drive. Junior receiver Jonny Rohen-Blanton set career-highs with 134 yards receiving and seven catches, including a 62-yarder for a game-tying touchdown.

#### **WEEK 1 RECAP**

The Flying Dutchmen scored the most points ever against a collegiate opponent in a season opener during a 62-0 victory at Loras College (lowa) of the American Rivers Conference on Sept. 6, surpassing a 55-7 Week 1 win vs. DePauw (Ind.) in 1977.

Head coach Peter Stuursma hired three new assistant coaches during the offseason: Sam/Nickels coach Brendann Brown, defensive line coach Isiah Hicks and H//y coach Drew Peterson.

Brown played at Grand Valley State University for four seasons, earning All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in 2021 and 2019 as a linebacker. He totaled 125 tackles, two forced fumbles and one interception during his career. He was named GVSU's most improved defensive player in 2019. Brown played at Farmington Hills Harrison HS for Hall of Fame head coach John Harrington. Brown earned his Master's degree in Communication and Media Studies from GVSU in 2023 and his bachelor's degree in Communication and Media Studies in 2021.

Peterson played tight end for four years at Grand Valley State University, totaling 30 receptions for 239 yards and two touchdowns in 48 games played between 2021-24. A four-year letterwinner, Peterson claimed All-Academic accolades from the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference four times.


Hicks was elevated into an expanded role after serving as a student assistant during the 2024 season. He played on the defensive line for three years. He graduated from Hope with a bachelor's degree in special education.

#### **CHAMPIONSHIP PEDIGREE**

In 2024, Hope claimed an MIAA title for the 23rd time in program history last season and was outright champs for the 15th time. The Flying Dutchmen won all of their league games for the 10th time. Hope went 7-0 in MIAA play in 2024, 2019 and 2009 seasons, and 5-0 in 2000, 1987, 1984, 1982, 1981, 1978 and 1973.

#### A 2024 TO REMEMBER

The Flying Dutchmen accomplished a lot during the 2024 season, including the first 10-0 regular season in the 122-year history of the program. Hope clinched the mark with a 48-12 victory at The University of Olivet on Nov. 16, 2024.. It was the Flying Dutchmen's third unbeaten regular season



in school history. The Flying Dutchmen went 8-0-1 in 1975 and 9-0 in 1984, both under legendary head coach Ray Smith.

Hope went on the post the first NCAA Division III playoff victory in program history with a 49-21 victory against Aurora University (III.) in the second round. The Flying Dutchmen lost to eventual national champion North Central College (III.), 41-21, in the third round. The Flying Dutchmen outscored opponents by a 492-163 margin during the 2024 season. Hope scored at least 40 points eight times, with a season-low of 34 during a 34-13 victory at Alma on Sept. 28. The Flying Dutchmen shut out two foes and held seven to single digits. Hope also broke six school points, touchdowns, rushing touchdowns, total offense, rushing yards and first downs.

#### **HISTORY BOOK**

Dr. Todd Harburn's passion for Hope College, history and college football runs deep like a go route. The 1978 Hope graduate and former football student-athlete for the Flying Dutchmen has authored "Every college ought to have a...football eleven': Hope College Football, Earliest coaches and teams 1893-1919", a 152-page book about how the now-proudly NCAA Division III and Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association program kicked off. Dr. Harburn, who also served as the team physician for the Flying Dutchmen for two decades before retiring in 2022, is proud to provide a "small supplement" to previous Hope Athletics history books authored by Gordon Brewer '48 and Tom Renner '67.

The book can be purchased through the Hope College Bookstore. All proceeds benefit the Hope Athletics Orange and Blue Fund.

In eight seasons, head coach Peter Stuursma '93 has guided the Hope College football team to a 68-18 overall record, including a 43-9 mark in Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association games.

The Flying Dutchmen have won three MIAA titles — outright championships in 2024 and 2019 and a co-championship in 2021 — and finished in second place three times during his tenure.

In 2024, Stuursma led Hope to the first 10-0 regular-season in program history and was named both the American Football Coaches Association Region 5 and MIAA Coach of the Year. He also guided the Flying Dutchmen to their first postseason win with a 49-21 second-round victory vs. Aurora Univerity.

Hope recorded the second nine-win season in team history in 2019 when the Flying Dutchmen made their fifth NCAA Division III playoff appearance. Stuursma is Hope's seventh head football coach. He followed Dean Kreps (1995-2015), Ray Smith (1970-94), Russ DeVette (1955-69), Al Vanderbush (1946-54), Bud Hinga (1931-42) and Jack Schouten (1920-30).

Stuursma has deep ties to Hope College and the Flying Dutchmen football program. As a student-athlete, Stuursma served as co-captain for the Hope College football team during his senior season. He was a running back and special teams player. Stuursma received the team's Allan C. Kinney award after the 1992 season despite playing in only three games due to an injury. The award, presented annually since 1971 and named in memory of football player Allan C. Kinney, who died of cancer in his senior year in 1967, honors a senior player for maximum contribution to the football program. As a coach, Stuursma served as the Flying Dutchmen's defensive coordinator during the 1999 season before becoming a teacher and head football coach at East Grand Rapids. Hope claimed a share of the MIAA title in the 1999 season with a 5-1 league record while allowing only 18.1 points per game and scoring 32.6. Stuursma also was Hope's recruiting coordinator that football season as well as an assistant track coach for the 1999-2000 year.

At East Grand Rapids High School, the Pioneers flourished on the field under Stuursma's guidance. His teams went 162-34 with 13 state playoff appearances during his 16-season tenure. They claimed Michigan High School Athletic Association state titles in 2010, 2009, 2008, 2007, 2006, 2003, and 2002. They also reached the state semifinals twice. Stuursma was named Detroit Lions High School Coach of the Year in 2008 and High School Football Coaches Association Division 3 Football Coach of the Year in 2010, 2009 2008, 2007, 2006 and 2002. He was inducted into the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in March of 2020.

Stuursma also served as principal at East Grand Rapids Middle School from 2005 to 2016. He was assistant principal at East Grand Rapids High School from 2002 to 2004. He taught social studies and physical education for three years prior to becoming an administrator. Stuursma graduated from Hope College in 1993, completing the secondary teacher education program, majoring in physical education and minoring in social studies. In 1998, he earned a master's degree in physical education / sports administration from the University of Northern Colorado. In 1997, Stuursma worked as a graduate assistant on the NCAA Division II National Champion Northern Colorado football team.

Prior to his stop at Northern Colorado, Stuursma taught and coached at Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central High School for three years. He was head coach of the Rangers hockey team and assistant coach for the football team. Stuursma and his wife, Amy, also a '93 Hope graduate, have three children: Hannah, Robbie, and Mitchell.
