FOOTBALL OPENS AT HOME WITH MOUNT ST JOSEPH

The nationally-ranked Flying Dutchmen take on Mount St. Joseph University (Ohio) to open up at home after starting the season with two road victories. It's the first time since 2006 opened the year with two road games.

The 2-0 Flying Dutchmen is aiming for back-to-back wins against Heartland Conference opponents in consecutive weeks after winning, 38-14, at Franklin College (Indiana) on Sept. 13. Mount St. Joseph was the HCAC's preseason favorite.

The Hope-Mount St. Joseph matchup poses an elite coaching battle. For Hope, Peter Stuursma holds a 67-18 record all-time over nine seasons. For Mount St. Joseph, Tyler Hopperton holds a 60-21 record all-time in his nine-year tenure.

At Franklin, senior defensive end Liam Danitz was the star on the defensive side of the ball for Hope, recording three sacks totaling a loss of 32 yards. The defense as a whole held Franklin College to a singular rushing yard in all-time performance.

Offensively, Hope relied more on the long ball for their yards. Passing for 321 yards, Junior quarterback Alex Thole completed 21 of his 23 passes along with two TDs and one pick. Thole has had a very efficient start to his Hope College career completing 70% of his passes thus far. Thole found his connection with junior receiver Jonny Rohen-Blanton against Franklin. Rohen-Blanton broke his career single-game record with 134 receiving yards, surpassing the 100-yard mark for the first time during his career.

be the Flying Dutchmen's 15th regular-season victory in a row. Hope's last regular-season loss was to Alma College, 35-17, at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium on Oct. 14, 2023.

mark the Flying Dutchmen's second 3-0 start during head coach Peter Stuursma's tenure. Last year was the first 3-0 start to a season for Stuursma.

complete the Flying Dutchmen's non-conference schedule with a 3-0 record before jumping into conference play where they host Alma College on Saturday, Sept. 27 at 1 p.m. at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium.

NATIONALLY RANKED

The Flying Dutchmen entered Week 3 ranked 15th in the American Football Coaches Association poll and 15th in the D3football.com rankings.

Hope rose three spots in the previous D3football rankings and two from the AFCA poll. The Orange and Blue entered the season ranked in both national polls for the first time, finishing 20th in each poll.

HEARTLAND HISTORY

The Flying Dutchmen own an 9-10-1 (.475) overall record against opponents from the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference:

- 3-0 vs. Anderson;
- 2-0 vs. Rose Hulman;
- 1-1 vs. Manchester;

Last season, Hope defeated two Heartland opponents: Franklin 48-6 at home in Week 2 and 49-7 at Rose-Hulman in Week 3.

HOME COOKING

Today is the 211th home game for the Orange and Blue at Ray and Sue Smith Stadium / Holland Municipal Stadium. The Flying Dutchmen are 131-76-3 (.631) at home since the facility opened in 1979.

The college purchased Holland Municipal Stadium from the City of Holland in 2012 and renamed it in Ray and Sue Smith's honor in 2013.

WINNING TRADITION

The Flying Dutchmen enter this afternoon with a 509-374-40 all-time record (.573), including a 246-110-6 record (.688) in MIAA play since 1958.

The first recorded Hope football game kicked off in 1893. Led by head coach Erasmus A. Whitenack, Hope defeated a team from the City of Holland in November. The final score and exact date of the game are unknown.



LAST GAME

The nationally-ranked Hope College football team delivered another dynamic first half on the road and a 2-0 start to the season. The Flying Dutchmen overpowered Franklin College (Indiana) during the opening two quarters to earn a 38-14 victory on Sept. 13.

Despite challenging weather conditions, the Flying Dutchmen scored 31 consecutive points during the first half after the Grizzlies jumped to a 7-0 lead on the opening drive. Hope finished with 509 yards in total offense, with 330 yards passing and 179 rushing. The Flying Dutchmen entered the game ranked fourth in the nation in total offense.

Junior quarterback Alex Thole (Schoolcraft, Michigan / Schoolcraft) completed 20-of-23 passes for 321 yards, two touchdowns, and one second-half interception. Junior receiver Jonny Rohen-Blanton (Rockford, Michigan / Rockford) set career-highs with 134 yards receiving and seven catches, including a 62-yarder for a game-tying touchdown.

EYEING 3-0

The Flying Dutchmen seek their second consecutive 3-0 start to the season for the first time since 1974 and 1975 under head coach Ray Smith. Hope has won the first three games of a season 16 times in program history, led by eight different coaches:

ALEXANDER THE GREAT

Junior quarterback Alex Thole makes his third career start for the Flying Dutchmen this afternoon. The Schoolcraft, Mich., native and transfer from NCAA Division II Grand Valley State University has settled in quickly, completing 35-of-50 passes for 626 yards, three touchdowns and one interception.

Thole ranks 13th in Division III in passing efficiency at 191.0. He is averaging 17.9 yards per completion.

Junior Jonny Rohen-Blanton and senior Travis Myers (Ada, Michigan / Forest Hills Northern) are among Thole's favorite targets. Rohen-Blanton leads Hope with 11 receptions and 213 receiving yards over two games. Myers had nine catches for 208 yards.

GET THE SACK

Senior defensive end Liam Danitz (West Branch, Michigan / Ogemaw Heights) joined an elite club with his three-sack performance at Franklin. Only seven other Division III players have recorded at least three sacks in a game this season. The most through Week 2 was four.

WEEK 1 RECAP

The Flying Dutchmen scored the most points ever against a collegiate opponent in a season opener during a 62-0 victory vs. Loras College (Iowa) of the American Rivers Conference on Sept. 6, surpassing a 55-7 Week 1 win vs. DePauw (Ind.) in 1977. The Flying Dutchmen once produced 81 points against Grand Rapids Catholic Central High in the 1913 season opener. Hope also posted the back-to-back shutouts in season openers since 1978 and 1979, when they defeated Marantha (Wisconsin), 28-0 and 64-0.



PASSING FANCY

The Flying Dutchmen finished the Loras game with 388 passing yards from four quarterbacks who played. the most since throwing for 352 during a 38-28 victory at home vs. Trine University in the 2023 season finale.

The aerial attack led to 688 yards of total offense, the second consecutive game vs. Loras with 600+ yards of total offense.

PAT KING

Senior placekicker Caden Balkon (Byron Center, Michigan / Byron Center) set the Hope College Football career point after touchdown record at Loras. Balkon reached 112 PATs in 22 games after making 8-of-9 attempts for the nationally-ranked Flying Dutchmen against the Duhawks. After two games, Balkon has made 117 PATs.

Nate Barnett '16 held the previous record with 111 over four seasons between 2002-05. Balkon has been Hope's placekicker since the 2023 season. The political science major previously totaled 37 PATs in 2023 and a school-record 67 last season.

MIAA PRESEASON POLL

The Flying Dutchmen were projected to contend for an MIAA title repeat this fall. Hope placed a narrow second in the 2025 MIAA Preseason Coaches Poll, totaling 11 points and placing one behind Alma College.

The Flying Dutchmen and Alma split the first-place vote, collecting four apiece. Adrian College took third with 23 points and was followed by Trine University (25), Albion College (26), The University of Olivet (42), Calvin University (43) and Kalamazoo College (44).

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS

Head coach Peter Stuursma hired three new assistant coaches during the offseason: Sam/Nickels coach Brendann Brown, defensive line coach Isaiih Hicks and H//y coach Drew Peterson.

Brown played at Grand Valley State University for four seasons, earning All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in 2021 and 2019 as a linebacker. He totaled 125 tackles, two forced fumbles and one interception during his career. He was named GVSU's most improved defensive player in 2019. Brown played at Farmington Hills Harrison HS for Hall of Fame head coach John Harrington. Brown earned his Master's degree in Communication and Media Studies from GVSU in 2023 and his bachelor's degree in Communication and Media Studies in 2021.

Peterson played tight end for four years at Grand Valley State University, totaling 30 receptions for 239 yards and two touchdowns in 48 games played between 2021-24. A four-year letterwinner, Peterson claimed All-Academic accolades from the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference four times.

Hicks was elevated into an expanded role after serving as a student assistant during the 2024 season. He played on the defensive line for three years. He graduated from Hope with a bachelor's degree in special education.

CHAMPIONSHIP PEDIGREE

In 2024, Hope claimed an MIAA title for the 23rd time in program history last season and was outright champs for the 15th time. The Flying Dutchmen won all of their league games for the 10th time. Hope went 7-0 in MIAA play in 2024, 2019 and 2009 seasons, and 5-0 in 2000, 1987, 1984, 1982, 1981, 1978 and 1973.

A 2024 TO REMEMBER

The Flying Dutchmen accomplished a lot during the 2024 season, including the first 10-0 regular season in the 122-year history of the program. Hope clinched the mark with a 48-12 victory at The University of Olivet on Nov. 16, 2024.. It was the Flying Dutchmen's third unbeaten regular season



in school history. The Flying Dutchmen went 8-0-1 in 1975 and 9-0 in 1984, both under legendary head coach Ray Smith.

Hope went on the post the first NCAA Division III playoff victory in program history with a 49-21 victory against Aurora University (Ill.) in the second round. The Flying Dutchmen lost to eventual national champion North Central College (Ill.), 41-21, in the third round. The Flying Dutchmen outscored opponents by a 492-163 margin during the 2024 season. Hope scored at least 40 points eight times, with a season-low of 34 during a 34-13 victory at Alma on Sept. 28. The Flying Dutchmen shut out two foes and held seven to single digits. Hope also broke six school records: points, touchdowns, rushing touchdowns, total offense, rushing yards and first downs.

HISTORY BOOK

Dr. Todd Harburn's passion for Hope College, history and college football runs deep like a go route. The 1978 Hope graduate and former football student-athlete for the Flying Dutchmen has authored "'Every college ought to have a...football eleven': Hope College Football, Earliest coaches and teams 1893-1919", a 152-page book about how the now-proudly NCAA Division III and Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association program kicked off. Dr. Harburn, who also served as the team physician for the Flying Dutchmen for two decades before retiring in 2022, is proud to provide a "small supplement" to previous Hope Athletics history books authored by Gordon Brewer '48 and Tom Renner '67.

The book can be purchased through the Hope College Bookstore. All proceeds benefit the Hope Athletics Orange and Blue Fund.

PETER STUURSMAS *HEAD COACH*

In eight seasons, head coach Peter Stuursma '93 has guided the Hope College football team to a 66-17 overall record, including a 43-8 mark in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

The Flying Dutchmen have won three MIAA titles — outright championships in 2024 and 2019 and a co-championship in 2021 — and finished in second place three times during his tenure.

In 2024, Stuursma led Hope to the first 10-0 regular-season in program history and was named both the American Football Coaches Association Region 5 and MIAA Coach of the Year. He also guided the Flying Dutchmen to their first postseason win with a 49-21 second-round victory vs. Aurora University.

Hope recorded the second nine-win season in team history in 2019 when the Flying Dutchmen made their fifth NCAA Division III playoff appearance. Stuursma is Hope's seventh head football coach. He followed Dean Kreps (1995-2015), Ray Smith (1970-94), Russ DeVette (1955-69), Al Vanderbush (1946-54), Bud Hinga (1931-42) and Jack Schouten (1920-30).

Stuursma has deep ties to Hope College and the Flying Dutchmen football program. As a student-athlete, Stuursma served as co-captain for the Hope College football team during his senior season. He was a running back and special teams player. Stuursma received the team's Allan C. Kinney award after the 1992 season despite playing in only three games due to an injury. The award, presented annually since 1971 and named in memory of football player Allan C. Kinney, who died of cancer in his senior year in 1967, honors a senior player for maximum contribution to the football program. As a coach, Stuursma served as the Flying Dutchmen's defensive coordinator during the 1999 season before becoming a teacher and head football coach at East Grand Rapids. Hope claimed a share of the MIAA title in the 1999 season with a 5-1 league record while allowing only 18.1 points per game and scoring 32.6. Stuursma also was Hope's recruiting coordinator that football season as well as an assistant track coach for the 1999-2000 year.

At East Grand Rapids High School, the Pioneers flourished on the field under Stuursma's guidance. His teams went 162-34 with 13 state playoff appearances during his 16-season tenure. They claimed Michigan High School Athletic Association state titles in 2010, 2009, 2008, 2007, 2006, 2003, and 2002. They also reached the state semifinals twice. Stuursma was named Detroit Lions High School Coach of the Year in 2008 and High School Football Coaches Association Division 3 Football Coach of the Year in 2010, 2009, 2008, 2007, 2006 and 2002. He was inducted into the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in March of 2020.

Stuursma also served as principal at East Grand Rapids Middle School from 2005 to 2016. He was assistant principal at East Grand Rapids High School from 2002 to 2004. He taught social studies and physical education for three years prior to becoming an administrator. Stuursma graduated from Hope College in 1993, completing the secondary teacher education program, majoring in physical education and minoring in social studies. In 1998, he earned a master's degree in physical education / sports administration from the University of Northern Colorado. In 1997, Stuursma worked as a graduate assistant on the NCAA Division II National Champion Northern Colorado football team.

Prior to his stop at Northern Colorado, Stuursma taught and coached at Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central High School for three years. He was head coach of the Rangers hockey team and assistant coach for the football team. Stuursma and his wife, Amy, also a '93 Hope graduate, have three children: Hannah, Robbie, and Mitchell.
