From its scenic location in the Green Mountains of central Vermont, Middlebury College continues to redefine liberal arts for the 21st century with a rigorous and comprehensive curriculum integrating opportunities and experiences vital for today's graduates. From the sciences and humanities to social sciences and the arts, Middlebury encourages students to seek ways to make meaningful contributions in a world that is increasingly complex.

Middlebury is a member of the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC), and nearly 30 percent of its students participate on

31 varsity teams. As a member of the NCAA's Division III, Middlebury's athletic teams have collectively won 37 national championships since 1995, and the College was awarded the Director's Cup for the 2011-12 season.

During the past 20 years, the College has completed several athletics-facility additions, including a 2,200-seat ice arena, three all-weather fields, a nine-court squash center, and most recently a new field house with a 200-meter track and artificial turf. The College also operates both alpine and Nordic ski areas 10 miles east of campus, as well as its own 18-hole golf course—and all are open to the public.

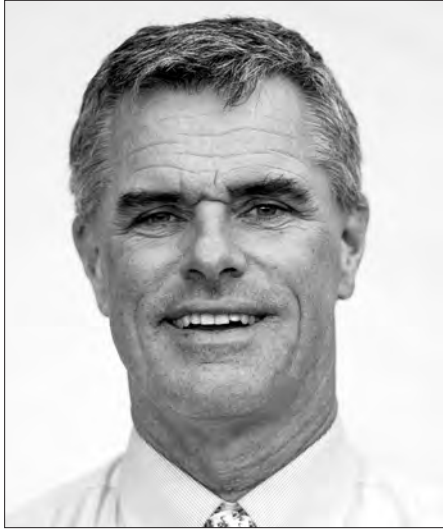

The Michael “Mickey” Heinecken Coaching Chair, Bob Ritter is in his 19th season as head coach of the Middlebury College football program in 2019.

His teams have a combined record of 43-15 over the past seven seasons with 7-1, 7-1, 6-2, 5-3, 6-2, and 7-2 campaigns, a run that includes the NESCAC title in 2013. The Panthers also won the NESCAC title in 2007, and Ritter was named the NESCAC Coach of the Year in both seasons. He earned national acclaim as a finalist for the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Coach of the Year Award in 2007. He now owns a career mark of 93-53 over 18 seasons at Middlebury, which gives him the second-best winning percentage (.637) in the history of the program.

As the head coach of the Panthers, Ritter has mentored 130 All-NESCAC selections and 69 NESCAC Players of the Week, while seeing his players break over 50 school records. During his tenure, 174 players have earned All-NESCAC Academic honors and 26 more were named Academic All-Region picks. Two players have received Academic All-American status, including Dan Pierce '16 on two separate occasions. Fourteen Panthers have received the Vermont Chapter of the National Football Foundation's College Scholar Award, including McCallum Foote '14. A finalist for the Gagliardi Trophy—Division III's top honor—Foote also received a coveted NCAA Post-graduate Scholarship. Under Ritter's guidance, several other players earned All-American awards, with three going on to NFL rookie camps. One former Panther, Steven Hauschka '07, played in back-to-back Super Bowls in 2014 and 2015, earning a Super Bowl ring on February 2, 2014, while kicking for the NFL's Seattle Seahawks. He signed a contract in the winter of 2017 to play for the Buffalo Bills.

Beyond head coaching duties, Ritter serves as the quarterback coach for one of the most prolific passing offenses in the country. From 2009–13, the Middlebury passing attack led all of Division III in pass completions per game, while holding dozens of spots in the top-10 national rankings. Over those five years, two quarterbacks, Foote (2011–13) and Donald McKillop '11 (2009–10) peppered the school and NESCAC record books, appearing first or second all-time for Middlebury 29 times, while holding 12 top-two spots in conference passing annals. Panther quarterbacks have been named NESCAC Offensive Players of the Year in four of the last eight seasons.

Ritter, a Holden, Massachusetts, native, began his coaching career immediately following his graduation from Middlebury in 1982. The freshly-minted graduate with an economics degree joined Heinecken's coaching staff that fall, spending six years as the defensive coordinator. Following those years at Middlebury, Ritter accepted a coaching position at Tufts as the men's lacrosse head coach and assistant football coach. During his tenure at Tufts, he worked as both the offensive and defensive coordinator for the Jumbos' football team.

In the fall of 1996, Ritter returned to Middlebury to serve as an assistant football and assistant men's lacrosse coach. He was named the head coach of the football program in December 2000 following Heinecken's retirement. Ritter, who continues to work as an assistant coach in the spring for the men's lacrosse team, stays active in the local community. He assists in and directs several local community outreach projects, including the long Panther tradition of “Picking Up Butch” and Relay for Life. He was a longtime member of the town of Middlebury's school board.

Now in his 13th season at Middlebury, Mandigo serves as the team's defensive coordinator as well as the defensive back coach. A 1996 graduate of Middlebury, where he was a three-sport athlete (football, ice hockey, and baseball), Mandigo served as an assistant coach in football, baseball and women's ice hockey at his alma mater the year following his graduation.

He then spent two years (1997, 1998) at Saint Anselm as the defensive coordinator before coaching at Boston College for two seasons (1999, 2000) while earning his master's degree. He returned to Middlebury as an assistant coach for three years before coaching high school football in California for a year. Mandigo returned to the NESCAC in 2006 and served as the defensive coordinator for four seasons at Wesleyan before returning to his alma mater in 2010.



Dave Caputi
Assistant Coach

Offensive Coordinator
5th Season
Middlebury '81

Dave Caputi is now in his fifth season as the team's offensive coordinator. He came to Middlebury from Bowdoin, where he served as the head coach for the previous 15 seasons. Caputi joined the Bowdoin staff after serving as the offensive coordinator at Williams for 13 seasons, where the Ephs compiled an 88-13-3 record with four undefeated seasons. Before joining Williams, Caputi served as both the quarterback and secondary coach at Tufts in 1985 and 1986. Prior to that, he spent a pair of years coaching the offensive backfield and receivers at Amherst.

A 1981 graduate of Middlebury, Caputi was the starting quarterback for a Panther squad that finished the 1980 season with a 6-1-1 record. In 1994, Caputi earned his master's degree in education from North Adams State College (MCLA).

Ryan Paquette joined the football coaching staff at Middlebury in the summer of 2014 after serving as the defensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coach at Maine Maritime for two seasons. He previously served for six seasons at Salve Regina, where he coached all areas of the defense and was the team's video coordinator. Before entering collegiate coaching, Paquette served as the linebacker and running back coach for a year at the Pingree School.

A 2007 graduate of Endicott, he was a three-year letter winner for the Gulls football team and also a two-time Academic All-Conference selection.

He has multiple certifications as a strength and conditioning coach at Middlebury.

Mike Phelps is now in his 13th season on the football coaching staff. He graduated from nearby Castleton University with a degree in sports administration and a minor in business. The Middlebury native is again coaching the wide receivers in 2019. Phelps has also spent the last 14 springs as an assistant coach for the Middlebury baseball team.

Phelps previously worked as an assistant coach with the Middlebury Union High School football team. During his time as a student at the high school, Phelps was a three-sport athlete, playing football, basketball and baseball. His team won a state title with an undefeated season during his senior year, with Phelps taking part in the Shrine Maple Sugar Bowl for senior all-stars from Vermont and New Hampshire.



Gus Brakeley

Gus Brakeley returns for his 11th season with the Panther football team, working with the defensive line for the seventh-straight year. He previously worked with the running backs and tight ends during the 2009 and 2010 campaigns. Brakeley has also spent the last 10 springs as an assistant with the men's lacrosse program at Middlebury, serving as the defensive coordinator for the past two seasons.

A Middlebury native, Brakeley earned his degree in political science in 2003 from the University of Canterbury in New Zealand. He later earned his master's degree at the school.

Brakeley, a member of the Shrine Maple Sugar Bowl's Vermont all-star team in 1998, spent three seasons assisting with the Middlebury Union High School football team. (His father, former Panther player Peter Brakeley '75, served as the long-time coach at MUHS.) He also assisted with the lacrosse team at Middlebury Union High School.



Michael MacDonald

Running Backs/Tight Ends
4th Season
Hamilton '13

Michael MacDonald returns for his fourth season on the coaching staff. A 2013 graduate of Hamilton, he came to Middlebury from Dickinson, where he coached the linebackers in his first season of collegiate coaching.

MacDonald was a four-year starter at middle linebacker for the Continentals, serving as a team captain in 2011 and 2012. He earned second-team All-NESCAC honors as a junior, moving up to the first team during his senior season. He finished his career second all-time in tackles at Hamilton with 301. MacDonald was named to the NESCAC All-Sportsmanship Team as a senior and was presented the Jack B. Riffle Scholarship Award as the college's outstanding male senior athlete.

2019 Season Preview

The Panther football team enters the 2019 season with a solid core of returning players, ready to challenge for a NESCAC title. The team finished with a 5-4 mark a year ago as injuries plagued the Panthers down the stretch during second their nine-game season in 101 years. This fall, Middlebury will tackle a new schedule for the first time since 1992, as the traditional order of opponents has been shuffled. The Panthers will open their season on September 14 at 2:00 p.m. when they host Williams.

Bob Ritter enters his 19th year at the helm of the program, owning a career mark of 93-53. His teams have won 43 of 58 games over the past seven seasons and show no signs of veering from their winning ways.

Quarterbacks

Junior Will Jernigan saw significant time a year ago, taking over the starting duties three games into the season.

The versatile QB completed 102 of 184 passes for 1,145 yards last fall, throwing 10 touchdown passes against seven interceptions. He was the team's second-leading rusher as well, gaining 321 yards on 109 carries with six touchdowns.

Running Backs

Junior Peter Scibilia led the team and was sixth in the NESCAC in rushing last season, gaining 553 yards on 131 carries with a pair of touchdowns. He finished the year ranked third on the squad in receiving yards with 196 via 19 receptions—two of them for touchdowns.

Receivers/Tight Ends

Seniors Maxim Bochman and Maxwell Rye both return as starting receivers for the upcoming season. Bochman caught 15 passes for 141 yards in 2018, while Rye made eight catches for 166 yards with a pair of touchdowns. Senior Aidan Power (10 rec., 86 yds.) and sophomore

Greg Livingston (4 rec., 32 yds.) both saw quality time a year ago and will compete for starting jobs.

Senior tight end Frank Cosolito returns for his fourth season as a starter. A two-time All-NESCAC selection, he led the team with 30 receptions, six for touchdowns, to go along with 316 receiving yards a season ago. He enters the year with 934 career receiving yards and 15 touchdown receptions.

Offensive Line

The offensive line has some holes to fill after four mainstays graduated last spring. Senior Kevin Woodring (6-3, 275) returns as a starting tackle for the third-straight season. The Second-Team All-NESCAC selection will be called upon to anchor the line. Senior Jack Purcell (6-5, 280) and junior Colin Paskewitz (6-3, 285) both saw significant time last year and will likely move into starting roles.

Defensive Line

Two-time All-NESCAC choice Martin Williams will lead the defense, as he returns for his fourth season as a starter. The senior racked up 29 tackles last season, including a pair of sacks and 2.5 tackles for lost yardage. Junior Charles Roselle made 25 tackles with two sacks in a starting role last fall as a defensive end. Senior Alex Norton (11 tackles, 1 sack) and junior Nick Leone (16 tackles, 1.5 sacks) both saw significant action in 2018 and will battle for starting spots.

Linebackers

Led by a strong group of juniors, the linebacking core returns a lot of experienced players. Pete Huggins was second on the team with 51 tackles a year ago, while Jack Pistorius was sixth with 34, to go along with 5.5 tackles for loss and four pass break-ups. Wyllis McKissick (25 tackles) and Zander Bailey (12 tackles) were also in the mix as all four players will vie for starting jobs.

Secondary

by injuries last season, allowing the team to return a well-experienced group. Junior Jonathan Hobart led the Panthers with 54 tackles in seven games, including a pair of interceptions at safety. Senior Kevin Hartley saw his season end early with an injury after making five stops with a sack in less than three games. Sophomores Gordon Pollock (35 tackles) and Nate Stewart (15 tackles) were forced into action early last fall and performed well as they look to challenge for starting jobs. Seniors Coltrane Marcus (25 tackles, 3 pass break-ups) and Michael Carr (6 tackles) return as veterans at the corner positions for the Panthers.

Special Teams

Rye, a Second-Team All-NESCAC choice as a punter, returns to the lineup this fall. The senior led the league with a 39.7 yard average a year ago, landing 21 punts inside the 20-yard line. Senior Carter Mas-sengill is expected to handle the kicking duties for the fourth-straight season.

Community Service



The Middlebury football team has regularly been involved in community service throughout the Addison County area.



The Middlebury football team has long dedicated its time and services to the Addison County community. Members of the squad are routinely involved in Relay for Life, Special Olympics, Habitat for Humanity, and the Community Friends programs. The Panthers also harvest food for a local community supper, volunteer at elementary schools, and help out whenever called upon to lend a hand in the area.

One of the team's most well-known traditions is "Picking Up Butch." This is the 56th year that first-year Middlebury athletes have been Picking Up Butch for football and basketball games. Basketball players do it during football season, and football players do it during basketball season. The tradition began in 1961 when 13-year-old Butch, a local resident with cerebral palsy, was wheeled to a football game by his grandmother. It started snowing halfway through the game, and afterward she couldn't push him all the way back home. A student named Roger Ralph '63 asked them if they needed a ride. Ever since then, Butch has been a fixture at football and basketball games.

The tradition has been well documented, inspiring a *Sports Illustrated* column by Rick Reilly in the spring of 2003, an ESPN *SportsCenter* feature that fall, and a visit from Steve Hartman of the *CBS Evening News* in 2007. The ESPN story later won an Emmy Award and a prestigious Edward R. Murrow Award. Other features have also appeared in the Associated Press and the *Boston Globe Sunday Magazine*. The latest feature on Butch was done for ESPN's *E:60* program, airing in November of 2010.

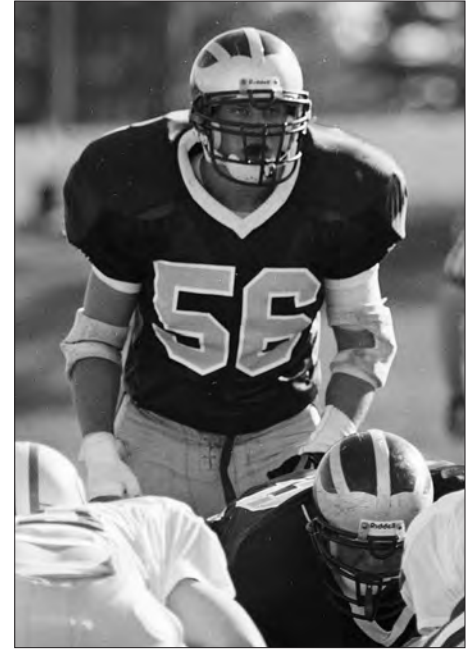

The Life and Times of an NFL Kicker—from Middlebury

Now an 11-year NFL veteran, former Panther kicker Steven Hauschka '07 has made quite a name for himself in the NFL. In March of 2017, he signed a four-year, \$12.4 million contract with the Buffalo Bills, after spending the previous six seasons as a member of the Seattle Seahawks. He recently signed a two-year contract extension worth \$8 million.

Before he was a Seahawk, Hauschka was a Panther. Having played soccer and lacrosse at Needham High in suburban Boston, Hauschka tried out for—and was cut from—both the Middlebury soccer and lacrosse teams. The summer before his sophomore year, a friend on the football team suggested that Hauschka give football a try. The squad needed a kicker, and Hauschka had a strong leg; the ex-soccer player won the job—and then went on to miss three of the first four field goals he attempted that year.

Yet from that point on, Hauschka proceeded to rewrite the record books at Middlebury, converting 20 field goal attempts during his three years of play, including a record 10 as a senior. He was named a District I Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors Association (CoSIDA) during his senior year, later graduating with a degree in neuroscience.

When Hauschka graduated from Middlebury in 2007, he still had a year of collegiate eligibility remaining. The coach-

ing staff at North Carolina State in the Atlantic Coast Conference said they'd let Hauschka try out for the team if he paid his own way to grad school. And three days before the start of the 2007 season, he won the gig.

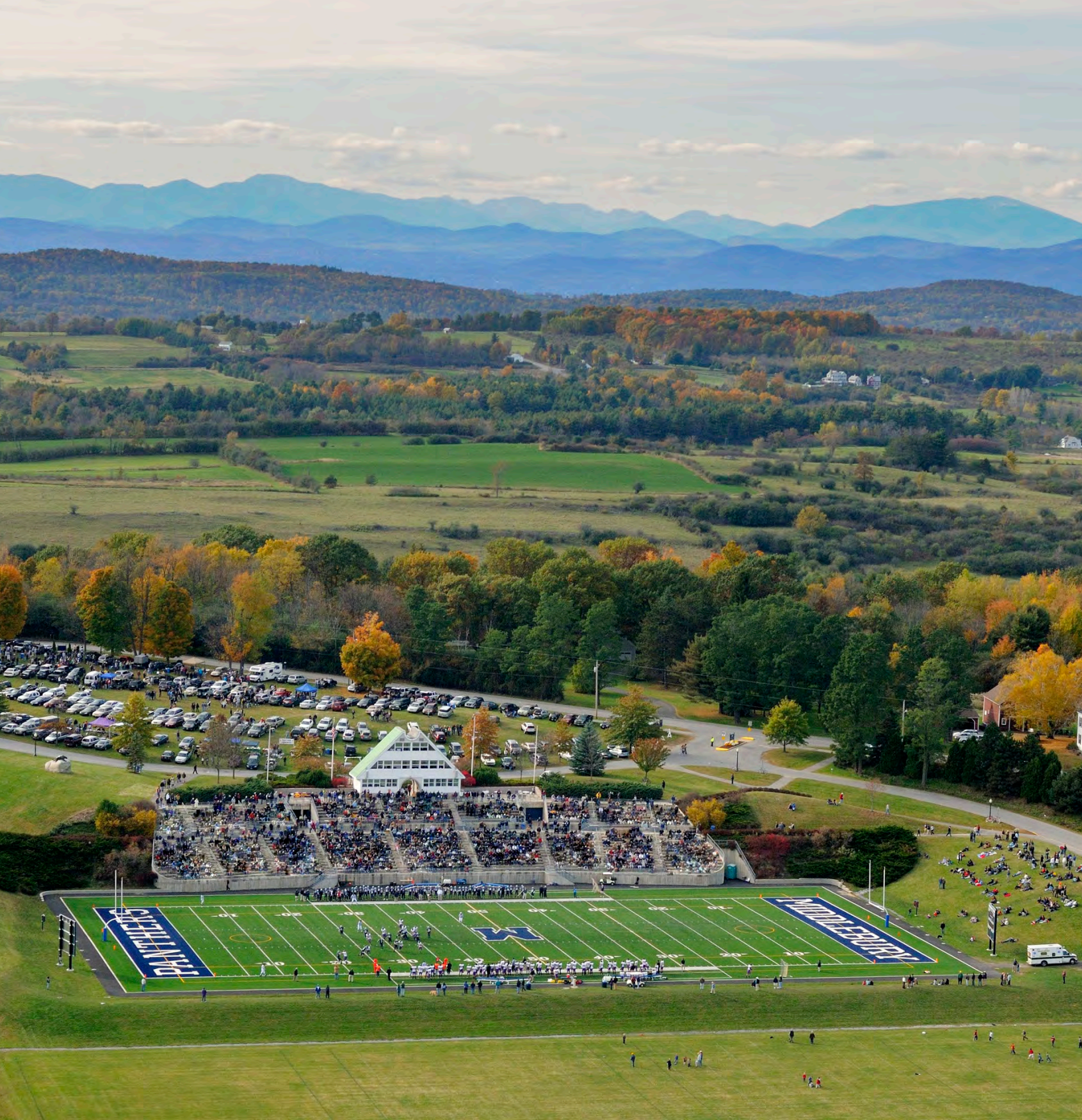
That year he connected on 16 of 18 field goals, won a game in the waning seconds against the University of Miami, and was a finalist for the Lou Groza Award, presented to the most outstanding collegiate kicker.

Later that year, he earned more tryouts, this time professionally. He was signed and released by four teams before earning a full-time gig with the Seahawks.

Hauschka did not let that break his spirit, as he has now become one of the very best kickers in all of professional football. The highlight of his career to date undoubtedly came on February 2, 2014, when he and his Seattle teammates won Super Bowl XLVIII. In the game, Hauschka connected on a pair of field goals and was 5 for 5 on extra-point attempts for 11 points in a 43–8 drubbing of the Denver Broncos. The following year, his Seahawks returned to the Super Bowl.

He currently owns the seventh-highest field goal percentage in NFL history at 86.4 percent (242/280) and earned the nickname of “Hausch-Money” from former coach Pete Carroll. In 2017 with the Bills, he set the NFL record with 13 consecutive field goals made from 50 yards or further.
