head coach lori kerans

& director of athletics



In her 19 seasons at the helm of the women's basketball program, Lori Kerans' teams have won or tied for 11 College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) titles and earned 11 berths into the NCAA Division III playoffs with the University's first-ever NCAA Championship in 2005.

Along with her coaching duties, Kerans is also the Director of Athletics & Recreation.

She has been named CCIW Coach of the Year seven times, including 1996-97 and 1997-98 when she led Millikin to a school record 25 victories each season, and again in 2005 when her teams set a new record with 29 wins. She has also been honored by the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association 10 times as their College Coach of the Year for Division III and was named the Molten/*Division III News* Coach of the Year in both 1997-98 and 2004-05.

Millikin became the first team in CCIW men's or women's basketball history to win five straight championships with its 1997-98 title. The Big Blue won at least 20 games during the eight-year span from 1993-94 to 2000-01, something no other women's team has accomplished in CCIW history.

Kerans is Millikin's all-time winningest coach and owns a 382-120 mark. In 19 years, she has had 18 winning seasons and owns a .761 winning percentage. Her winning percentage ranks her 12th nationally among all-time Division III coaches and 19th among active Division III coaches in career wins.

She owns an 204-39 record in games at Griswold Center and led the Big Blue to 46-game home winning streak from January of 1997 to 2001. Kerans and her teams have won 156 of their last 171 games at home.

A 1985 graduate of Millikin, Kerans was a four-year basketball letter winner and a three-year softball letter winner. As a senior during the NCAA basketball tournament, Kerans was named the Central

Regional's Most Valuable Player and was a Final Four All-Tournament Team selection. The Big Blue finished third at the NCAA Division III Basketball Championships that season and Kerans was named Millikin's Most Valuable Player.

Kerans is believed to be the first woman to play in and coach in the Division III tournament and owns an NCAA tournament record of 17-11. Her teams have advanced as far as the round of eight three times, with one Final Four appearance and one NCAA title.

In softball, Kerans was a second-team Academic All-American in 1985 and team MVP in 1984. In 1985, she received the University's M Award, given annually to the senior woman who has contributed the most to the athletics program.

Kerans earned a master's degree at Illinois State University after graduating from Millikin. She is a 1991 inductee into the Millikin Athletic Hall of Fame and was inducted into the Decatur Athletic Hall of Fame in June 1998.

After the 84-85 basketball season when the team placed third nationally, Kerans earned ASWF All-America, ASWF All-Region, NCAA Final Four All-Tournament, NCAA Central Regional MVP and Millikin MVP honors. She also finished her career seventh on Millikin's all-time scoring list and held the record with 21 consecutive free throws.

Kerans earned three letters in softball and played on the school's inaugural team in 1983. A three-time captain, she won MVP honors as a senior when she set records for walks in a game and walks in a season. The single-game mark still stands.

Dick Marshall

Dick Marshall is in his 11th year as Millikin's assistant coach after a 33-year career as head coach at Cumberland and Mt. Zion High Schools.

Marshall began his coaching career at Cumberland before being named coach at Mt. Zion, where he compiled a 301-128 (.702) record in 16 seasons. His teams won eight Apollo

Conference titles, seven regional championships and three sectional titles.

Marshall, who was named Macon County Coach of the Year six times, teaches in Millikin's Exercise Science and Sport program.

He is a graduate of Paxton High School and earned his bachelor's degree from Eastern Illinois University. Marshall and his wife, Gloria, have two daughters, Kim and Shelly, and four grandchildren: Andrew, Josh, Blake and Courtney.



Andy Luedke

Andy Luedke joins the Big Blue in 2005-06 after serving as a member of the Scout Team during Millikin's NCAA title run. A senior and graduate of Argenta-Oreana High School, Luedke played one year of basketball at Millikin before joining the Scout Team. An Exercise Science & Sport major, he will graduate with his degree in May 2006.



Audrey Minott

A decorated graduate of the Millikin women's basketball program, Audrey Minott joins the coaching staff for the first time in 2005-06, one year removed from helping the team earn its first NCAA title. A four-year starter for the Big Blue, Minott set a new school record with 109 games played in a career, was a member of the 2005 All-Final Four

team and was one of four players to set a new single-season record by playing in 31 games. A first-team All-CCIW player as a junior and a second-team selection as a senior, she started 95 of her 109 career games with 314 rebounds (2.9 pg), 318 assists (2.9 pg), 232 steals (2.1 pg) and 656 points (6.0 pg) while winning three CCIW titles and earning three NCAA appearances. She graduated Magna Cum Laude in 2005 with a degree in Fitness & Sport.



Ariel Lamb

Ariel Lamb is in her first year of coaching in 2005-06. A senior member of Millikin's national championship team in 2004-05, she earned one varsity letter in two seasons with the Big Blue. A junior transfer from Lincoln College, the Chicago native wrapped up her collegiate basketball career with the team's national title run in 2004-05. Lamb will

complete her degree in Fitness & Sport at Millikin in December 2005.

griswold physical education center

Griswold Physical Education Center has been the home of Millikin University basketball since the 1970-71 season. The Big Blue men christened the new facility with a 108-77 victory over Grinnell on Dec. 1, 1970. The men also won the basketball program's 1,000th game at Griswold Center, a 67-54 victory over North Central on Jan. 11, 1995.

Three regulation-size basketball courts are located in the fieldhouse portion of the building, which is 114 by 192 feet. The original Tartan surface was replaced by a maple floor in 1989. Seating for 3,052 spectators is available in Griswold Center. In the summer of 2004, new bleachers were installed

on the building's west side. In addition to traditional bleacher seating, fold-down style chairs are also part of the new bleacher design. And during the summer of 2005, new scoreboards were added thanks to a gift from Dyke ('68) and Sue Hawk ('69) Ridgley.

Griswold Center also houses a six-lane swimming pool, classrooms, offices, locker rooms and a training room. The building is named to recognize the gift of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Griswold. Mr. Griswold was a member of the class of 1923 and a former University trustee.

looking at 2005-06

The rings are designed, the banners hung, the celebration is over and the 2004-05 Millikin University women's basketball team has carved its place in NCAA history.

Now it's time to get back to work.

While Millikin and head coach Lori Kerans enter the 2005-06 season with something no one else can claim until the next post-season rolls around, last year's record-setting 29-2 NCAA Championship team is gone and a new one has taken its place.

But the goal is the same, and the Big Blue plans on defending its title one game at a time, proving yet again that Champions Wear Blue.

Without four-year starter and unflappable point guard Audrey Minott, the 2005-06 look might be a little different for the Big Blue, but the defensive capabilities and array of offensive weapons return in senior three-year starters Lindsey Koehn, Karin Olson, Joanna Conner, senior two-year starter Laura Zimmerman and last year's top players off the bench, juniors Christi Blackburn and Angela Vollmer and sophomore Lindsay Ippel.

Minott, the only player lost to graduation to see significant time (38.3 mpg in 2004-05) was voted the team's MVP after setting a new career record with 109 games played.

But despite the loss of Minott, the Big Blue doesn't plan to miss a beat. As the new season rolls around, the Big Blue is ready to get back on the court and make a run at a second-straight NCAA title, leveraging the athleticism, speed, confidence and consistency that propelled it into last year's NCAA Championship game.

Kerans and the Big Blue will put a solid team on the floor all year long, led by her four returning senior starters and captains - Koehn, Conner, Zimmerman and Olson. In addition to helping the team capture the program's first-ever national title, all four shot better than .445 during the 2004-05 season and could be on pace to move into the team's Top-20 scoring list by the end of their careers.

"Seniors are such a special part of any program, providing vital maturity and experience," Kerans said. "These seniors, four-year members of our program, have transformed the program, established a new standard of excellence and commitment. I expect their leadership to be an important stabilizing factor in this year of high expectations."

Conner, the Final Four's Most Outstanding Player, improved all of her statistical averages as a junior when she was also named a CCIW first-team selection and an NCAA Sectional All-Tournament player. She jumped into the No. 10 spot in career rebounding and posted season-bests 12.5 ppg, 8.4 rpg, 83 assists and 44 steals while shooting .445 from the field and .719 from the free throw line. She also earned post-season recognition as a first-team All-Region and third-team All-America player by d3hoops.com and finished 25th in the NCAA Division III in blocks per game.

Koehn earned her second-straight second-team All-CCIW nod as a junior when she led Millikin in steals and 3-point percent while finishing second in scoring. As a junior, she averaged 10.7 points and 5.4 rebounds a game with 83 steals, 98 assists and shooting .474 from 3-point and .479 from the field. Olson may have missed the NCAA Tournament with an injury, but her presence was felt during the regular season. In 23 games, Olson averaged 12.0 points and 5.9 rebounds while earning third-team All-CCIW honors. She also led all NCAA Division III players for most of the season with her team-high .585 field goal percentage. While she'll start the 2005-06 with an injury, expect her to make an impact when she's back at full strength as the CCIW season rolls around in January.

Zimmerman was a steady contributor to the effort in 2004-05, averaging 8.4 points and 5.2 rebounds while alternating at

guard and forward. Her 91 assists placed her third on the team and she also added 30 steals while averaging 29 minutes on the floor.

Though Kerans doesn't look deep into her bench during games, she returns her top three choices from a year ago in Vollmer, Blackburn and Ippel.

Ippel, who played considerable minutes in just a handful of varsity games last year, was a dominant force throughout the NCAA Tournament, replacing the injured Olson. She led Millikin in scoring during three of the five NCAA games and was the top rebounder in two, earning the NCAA Sectional's Most Outstanding Player honor and a place on the All-Final Four team. On the year, she averaged 9.3 points and 4.4

rebounds in 21 games, but during Millikin's five-game NCAA tournament run she put up an impressive double-double of 19.8 points and 10.2 rebounds.

Blackburn took advantage of her opportunities in 2004-05, making opponents fear her outside shot. She averaged nearly .400 percent from behind the arc with 42 3-pointers in 31 games while Vollmer's court awareness made her a threat on the floor. Blackburn averaged 6.0 points and 2.7 rebounds a year ago while Vollmer was putting up 4.9 points and 2.8 rebounds per game.

Also returning to help Millikin defend its NCAA title are senior Adriane Turner, sophomores Carsen Himes, Alayna Hirsch and Andrea Riebock.

With Minott gone, Riebock could share some of the point guard duties in 2005-06. She's got plenty of experience controlling the ball after quarterbacking a high school state championship team during her senior year. Though she saw action in just four games a year ago, Riebock will be ready if called upon this season.

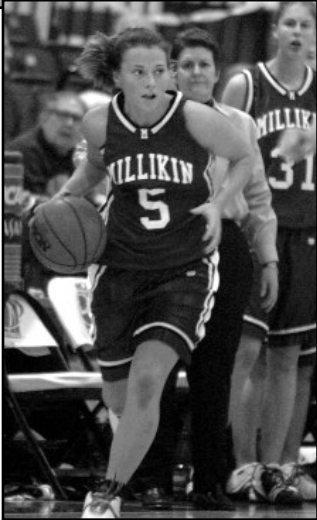
Perhaps the most exciting aspect of Kerans' recruiting class is the depth, experience and top-to-bottom toughness it brings. Transfer sophomores Kelly Steers (Illinois State) and Megan Mateer (Southwest Minnesota State) lead a group of 18 newcomers to the Big Blue, all of which come from quality programs. Eleven of the newest Big Blue were honored by the IBCA as members of all-state teams and 14 credit themselves with being all-conference selections as high school seniors.

"This recruiting class possesses both quality and depth. I am so impressed with their athleticism, competitive spirit and synergy," Kerans said. "As they learn the true meaning of 'wearing the blue' and begin to understand our basketball system, I believe this is a class very capable of continuing the tradition of excellence that is Millikin University Women's Basketball." With a senior-laden squad ahead of them, the newcomers will likely have to wait their turn, but a few, including Steers, Mateer and freshmen Jacquie Larson, Whitney Schwartz and Jody Johnson could see action as early as this season.

The 2005-06 team will have much to live up to after last season's success. In 2004-05, Millikin set a new record for wins in a season (29), wins at home (15), career games played (109, Minott), games played in a season (31, Minott, Blackburn, Koehn, Zimmerman) and finished second in the NCAA

Division III with both a 46.4 field goal percentage and a 93.5 win percentage.

Millikin kicks off its 2005-06 campaign with its own Coaches vs. Cancer Tournament, Nov. 18-20.



coaches vs. cancer program

In 1993, the National Association of Basketball Coaches formed a partnership with the American Cancer Society to aid the funding of cancer research and increase awareness of cancer prevention among the fans of college basketball.

Millikin head women's basketball coach Lori Kerans was diagnosed with breast cancer eight years ago. She was contacted about getting involved in the program and said she had no indecision to take part.

"Both our men's and women's basketball teams will take part in the program," Kerans said. "We believe we were one of the first Division III institution in the nation to be participating with both men's and women's basketball in Coaches vs. Cancer throughout the entire season."

Millikin raised more than \$10,000 during its first year in 1998-99 and more than \$25,000 last season.

Kerans said there are four things the program focuses on: research, patient services and prevention and advocacy programs.

"At Millikin, we are focusing most of our attention on the education aspect of cancer," Kerans said. "We want to make ourselves available to any setting: a church group, a school, anywhere we can

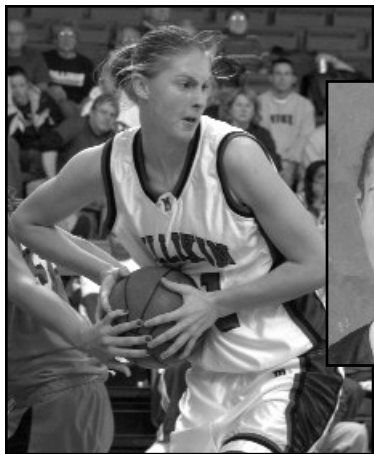
bring a message about cancer. We don't want to overwhelm people, but just say to them that cancer can be treated as any other opponent or challenge."

"Participating college coaches partner with the American Cancer Society, local businesses, organizations and individuals to raise money and awareness," Kerans said. "All proceeds benefit the local and state ACS chapters. More than 400 men's and women's college coaches are participating nationwide and to date have raised more than \$16 million."

The Coaches vs. Cancer Challenge competition will be held in February in Griswold Center. Teams of five will attempt 3-point shots for one minute. Corporate teams can enter for \$500, student groups (youth, high school, college) can enter for \$100. Teams will receive T-shirts, the opportunity to hang banners in Griswold Center during the Coaches vs. Cancer Challenge and post-competition coupons for dinner.

Millikin Earns NCAA Championship Over Randolph-Macon

Millikin 70, Randolph-Macon 50

Millikin's Laura Zimmerman started the second half with a block and defensive rebound followed by a Lindsey Koehn 3-pointer. Audrey Minott followed up with a layup for a 34-25 lead as the Big Blue rattled off the first five points of the second half en route to the 70-50 win and a national championship.

Clearly the No. 6 ranked Millikin University Big Blue (29-2) was not intimidated by the atmosphere or pressures that come with earning a national title, as it was relentless in its 70-50 win over No. 4 ranked Randolph-Macon.

Joanna Conner made it an 11-point game (38-27) with two free throws four minutes into the second half and Millikin clearly had control of the game, with Randolph-Macon being called for four

fouls in the first four minutes.

"It takes so much luck and a window of opportunity to win a national championship and I know how difficult it is to win one," head coach Lori Kerans said. "I tried to mentor this (junior) class like other coaches have mentored national champions. I thought this class, with Audrey, could contend for a national championship. This is a new mark for our program."

When Randolph-Macon was forced to call a timeout at 13:53 in the second half, Millikin had taken a 44-30 lead, extended to 47-30 on a 3-pointer by Koehn. With Millikin leading 49-31 with 10:17 left, the Yellow Jackets were running out of time to make

a run and catch the Big Blue. But Millikin's defense continued to lock them down, force turnovers and the Big Blue kept coming up with the rebounds, taking a 20-point lead on a jumper by Conner at the 8:00 mark.

"We set a goal to hold people to 50-55 points. Randolph-Macon is a very explosive team. It was our goal to hold them to 55," Kerans said. "We take great pride in the way in which we defend opponents. It really has to do with the players trusting each other when they switch."

By 7:26, when Randolph-Macon called a timeout Millikin was 55-35 and Minott, who played in a career record 109 games, added two free throws after the break as Millikin continued to pull away.

After Lindsay Ippel scored her 25th point of the game and Randolph-Macon was trailing 70-50 with 1:18 left it was clear that Millikin had run, rebounded and hustled its way to the title. Millikin seniors Kristin Trotter and Heather Miller checked in at the timeout and Millikin emptied its bench in the last minute as the Big Blue brought home their first team title in the history of Millikin athletics.

For the game, Ippel scored a game-high 25 points while Minott scored 15. Conner posted three team highs with a double-double of 15 rebounds and 14 points with six assists. For Randolph-Macon, Silva finished with 11 points and Emily Crider scored 10. Crider also led the Yellow Jackets with seven boards. Millikin shot 39.7% from the field, including 46.7% in the second half. The Big Blue defense held the Yellow Jackets to just 25.4% shooting.

To highlight the title, Millikin had three players named to the All-Tournament team in Audrey Minott, Lindsay Ippel and Joanna Conner. Joining them were Randolph-Macon's Megan Silva and Southern Maine's Megan Myles. Conner was also named the Most Outstanding Player.

It was clear from the get-go that Millikin's up-tempo play had set the pace, jumping out to a quick lead. The Big Blue never let Randolph-Macon close enough to cause any panic.

Late in the first half, Megan Silva closed the gap to just a one-point Millikin lead, 21-20 with two free throws with five minutes left, but Laura Zimmerman gave the Big Blue a five-point cushion near the 3-minute mark for a 25-20 score. Randolph-Macon's Salem Shaffer hit a 3-pointer with 30 seconds left to pull within 27-25, but Conner dumped in her fifth shot of the first half for a 29-25 half-time score.

By the 10-minute mark of the first half, all five of Millikin's starters had scored, as Millikin was spreading the wealth and picking apart the

Randolph-Macon defense, specifically in the post, with Millikin's Conner and Ippel combining for 17 of the Big Blue's first half points. Zimmerman added eight first-half points while floating between the guard and post positions.

Zimmerman and Conner were solid in every facet in the first half, recording eight rebounds each. Conner had a team high 10 points while Zimmerman dropped in eight. Ippel had scored seven for the Big Blue by halftime and Millikin had out-rebounded the Yellow Jackets 27-19. Millikin limited Randolph-Macon's All-American Silva to just six first-half points, two of them on free throws. For the Yellow Jackets, Michelle Orton had eight first-half points to go with Silva and Megan Senske's six. Shaffer and Orton each had four rebounds for Randolph-Macon and Silva had three assists.



The NCAA Championship is the first for any team in Millikin history, and the first women's team to win the championship since the CCIW began crowning a conference champion in 1987. It is the second national title for a CCIW women's team this year with Wheaton winning the soccer championship last fall. With the Championship title headed to Decatur, the Central region has now won seven of the last 10 NCAA titles.

Millikin wraps up the season with a 16-game win streak while the loss ended Randolph-Macon's 23-game win streak. Millikin head coach Lori Kerans wraps up the 2004-2005 campaign with a career record of 382-120 while Yellow Jackets head coach Carroll LaHaye is 354-249 overall. This year's trip to the NCAA Final Four was the second trip for Kerans, who was the senior guard on Millikin's 1985 3rd place team.

"I am not sure this has sunk in yet. My heart is about to burst," Kerans said. "I am not sure that this is the best-ever team at Millikin, but this team carried the torch for all the kids who have been through the program."

Both Millikin and Randolph-Macon advanced the finals with upset victories in their semifinal games. Each team was also making its program's first Championship Game appearance. Millikin's previous best Final Four finish was a 3rd place finish in 1985, while Randolph-Macon reached the Sweet Sixteen in 1996. No. 5 ranked Southern Maine (31-3) topped No. 1 Scranton (29-3) in the third place game, 55-53.

Win Gives Millikin a Shot at National Title (NCAA Semi-Final)

Millikin 66, Southern Maine 60

It may have been a dream at the beginning of the season, but No. 6 Millikin (28-2) will be playing for national title this season after getting past No. 5 Southern Maine 66-60 in the national semifinals. Millikin advances to the Championship game for the first time in school history after making only its second Final Four appearance in the program's 34 years.

The lowest ranked team remaining, Millikin needed a few trips down the floor to settle into its routine. But once the team found its rhythm, the Big Blue played the same balanced basketball it has played all year. Five finished in double-figures for the Big Blue, led by Lindsey Koehn's 17 points. Joanna Conner and Christi Blackburn each tallied 13 points, Lindsay Ippel scored 11 and Audrey Minott dropped in 10 points in the win. Six of Millikin's first-half baskets came from the outside, something the Big Blue hasn't had to rely on much this season. Southern Maine standout Megan Myles scored 19 of her team's first-half 28 points and finished with 28 to lead the Huskies. Ashley Marble was also a huge component of the Huskies offense, scoring 27 points and grabbing 16 rebounds.

Southern Maine started the game physical and aggressive, jumping out to a 6-2 lead five minutes into the game. While Millikin worked out some early jitters, the Huskies struggled to get shots to fall. But when things finally fell together for both teams, it was the 3-pointer that both teams took advantage of.

Conner tied the game at 12-12 with 9:07 left in the first half and Millikin had taken a 23-18 lead by the 5:21 mark. But a few 3-pointers later, and it was knotted at 28-28 at the half. Millikin took over its first lead of the half, and its last of the game, at the 10:41 mark when Koehn knocked down the back end of a trip to the free throw line. Millikin followed it up with a Blackburn 3-pointer to give Millikin a 44-40 lead when Southern Maine called a timeout with 10 minutes left.

The Huskies got within 46-44 with 8:41 left but two points would be all the closer Millikin let them get. Conner layed one in off an assist from Koehn and Ippel added a bucket off an assist from Conner. After two Southern Maine free throws, Ippel scored again assisted from Koehn to give Millikin a 54-46 lead when the Huskies called another timeout at 6:33. Two Huskies free throws brought it back to a two-point game, but Millikin had made it an 8-point game again by the 4:25 mark.

Megan Miles, who hit one of her four 3-pointers at 3:15, cut Millikin's lead to 58-54, prompting a Big Blue timeout. But when the two-minute mark rolled around things got interesting again. Southern Maine got a steal and breakaway layup to cut Millikin's lead to 61-58. With 1:07 left, Conner stepped to the line and knocked down her second free throw to make it a four-point game and Koehn picked up a steal with one minute left that looked to give Millikin enough to run out most of the clock.

But a Big Blue turnover on the inbounds and an offensive put-back by the Huskies cut Millikin's lead to 62-60 with 26 seconds left. Southern Maine fouled Minott immediately, where she sank both free throws to make it a two-possession game at 64-60 Millikin. Blackburn hauled down a defensive rebound, drew a foul and sank two more free throws to send Millikin into the championship game.

Kerans, who made her second appearance in the national semi-final (first as a player in 1985 and now on the other side of the sideline), saw her team accomplish a handful of firsts today.

- The Big Blue improved on its season win record with its 28th of the season
- Senior point guard Audrey Minott played in a school record 108th game
- The championship appearance will be Millikin's first ever in a team sport. Millikin's Final Four appearance was also a first for a College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) team since the league began crowning a champion in 1987.

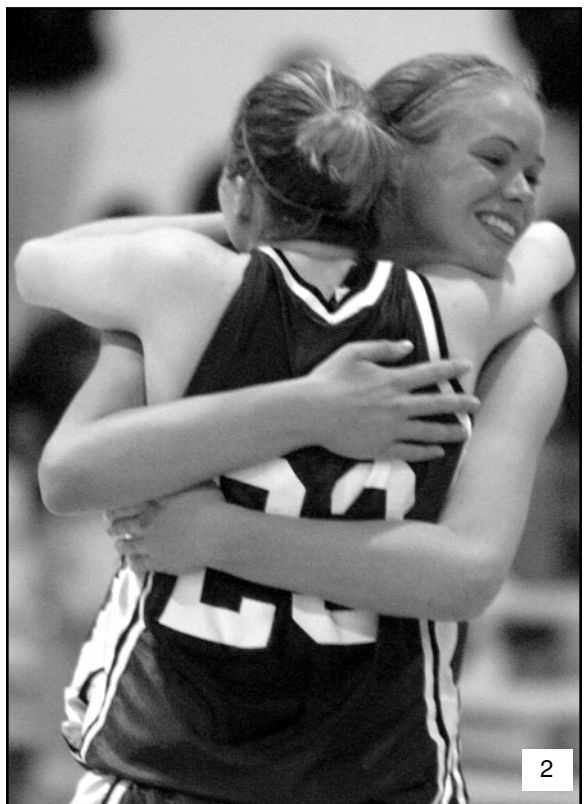
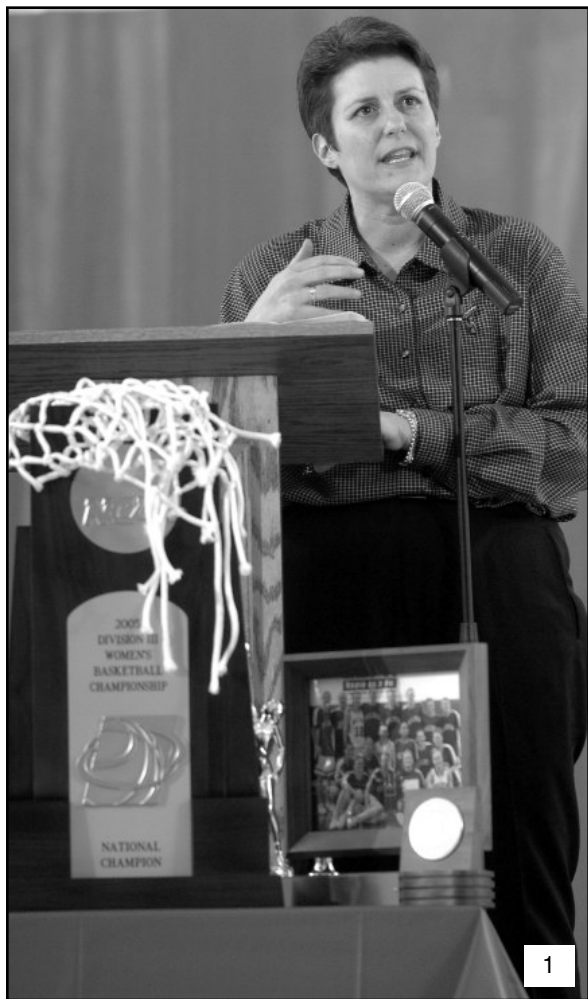

cciw history

The College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) celebrates its 60th year this season. Millikin is one of the four charter members with uninterrupted membership.

In National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III competition, CCIW schools have won 31 NCAA titles in 59 years. The schools have won seven titles in men's basketball, two in women's basketball, 11 in men's cross country, four in football, four in men's swimming, one each in men's and women's soccer, two in men's outdoor track & field, one in men's indoor track & field and two in volleyball.

The original nine-member league was formed at a meeting in Jacksonville, Ill. on April 26, 1946, and began competition during the 1946-47 school year as the College Conference of Illinois. The name was changed in May 1967 to recognize the two Wisconsin schools, Carroll and Carthage. Charter members were Millikin, Augustana, Carthage (then located in Illinois), Elmhurst, Illinois College, Illinois Wesleyan, Lake Forest, North Central and Wheaton.

Carthage left in 1952 and returned in 1961, while Illinois College departed in 1953 and Lake Forest left in 1967. Wheaton left in 1959 and returned in 1967, and Elmhurst dropped out in 1960 only to return in 1967. Carroll joined in 1955 and left in 1992 and North Park became a member in 1962.

Originally staging competition only for men, women's sports were added to the CCIW slate in 1986.

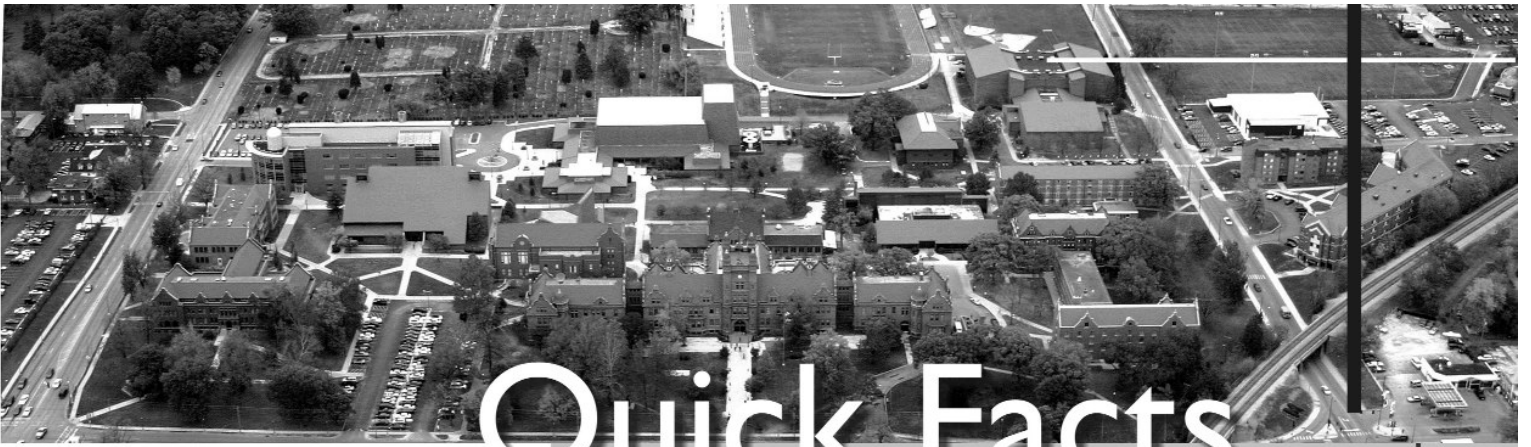

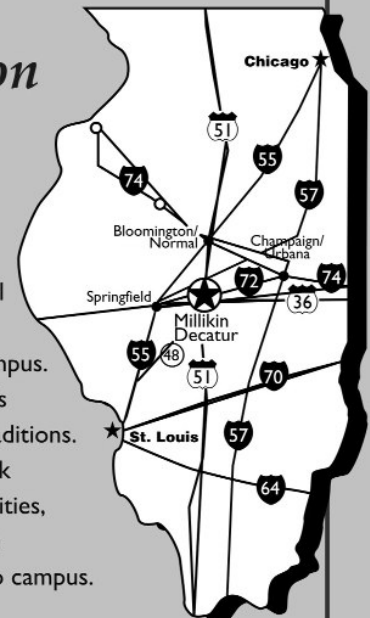

Griswold Physical Education Center

Griswold Center is perfect for the intercollegiate athlete or intramural player. The Center provides a gymnasium to seat 3,052, a running track and three regulation-size basketball courts. Millikin hosts several high school tournaments and games including the annual IHSA Class A Girls and Boys Supersectionals. Recent renovations include new bleachers on the west side, a fresh coat of paint, a new gym floor design and new scoreboards.

The men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball and men's wrestling teams also compete in Griswold Center's gym and its six-lane McIntosh Pool is home to the Big Blue men's and women's swim teams. The building also houses classrooms, staff offices, athletic training facilities and locker rooms.

Just north of Griswold Center, Millikin's track & field teams take advantage of 1997 renovations that included an eight-lane, all-weather track. The USATF Youth Athletic Championships were held on the track in both 2000 and 2001 and Millikin also hosted the NCAA Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championships in 2001.

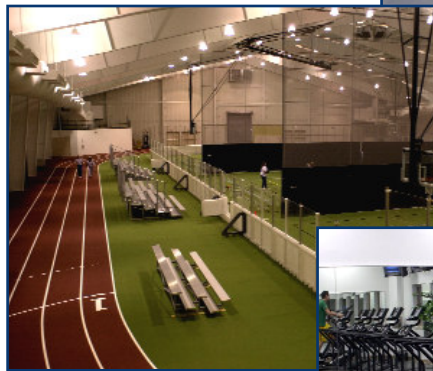


Several Big Blue teams make use of off-campus facilities. The men's and women's tennis teams play and practice at the Fairview Park Tennis Complex, located just across the street from campus. The men's and women's golf teams frequent the city's three golf courses while the Big Blue baseball program calls Sunnyside Park home. The softball team plays its home games at Borg-Warner Sports Complex while the cross country teams do most of their training at Fairview Park on the paved, grass and dirt trails that trace the historic Interurban Railway. The trails lead through Kiwanis Park to the Macon County Conservation District Bikeway to the Rock Springs Environmental Center.

Decatur Indoor Sports Center (DISC) at Millikin

Constructed in January 2000 in conjunction with the Decatur Park District, the DISC is a 87,000 square foot, on-campus athletic facility.

The DISC's new weight rooms are the perfect place for the serious athlete or amateur to work up a sweat. Upstairs facilities include machine weights, cardiovascular equipment and indoor golf facilities while the lower-level room provides an expanse of free-weights and dumbbells.
