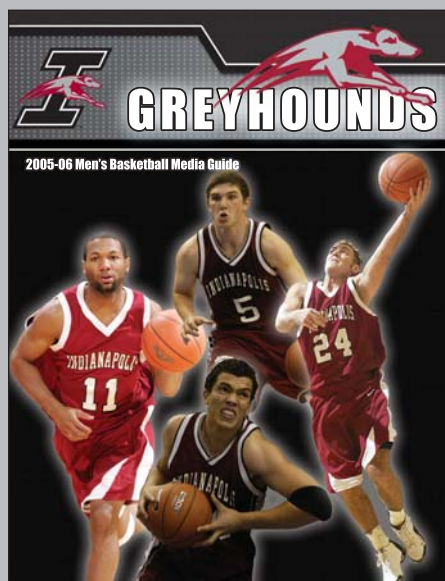

TODD STURGEON

- ▶ 9th season at Indianapolis
- ▶ 134-90 (.598) career record

Ninth-year UIndy head coach **Todd Sturgeon** made history in 2004-05 by becoming the first coach in school history to take his team to three straight NCAA II Tournaments. Sturgeon was also an assistant on the last back-to-back NCAA qualifiers, coach Royce Waltman's 1996 and 1997 NCAA Tournament squads.

Sturgeon is 134-90 (.598) in eight years at Indianapolis after leading his 2004-05 team to a 19-10 mark. Leading the Hounds was DII "Player of the Year" David Logan. The senior produced the greatest season on record at the school, shattering records and garnering loads of national attention.

Logan and fellow senior Lawrence Barnes (2nd team) were each named All-GLVC, with Logan garnering the "Player of the Year" in the league.

The '04-05 Hounds dropped their first two conference games on the road, but rebounded by rattling-off wins in 10 of their next 11 GLVC games. Indianapolis finished the regular season with a 14-6 conference ledger en route to its eighth straight GLVC tourney appearance. The Hounds entered the GLVC tourney with their highest seed (#3) ever.

The 2003-04 Hounds opened their record-setting campaign with a 12-0 start--tying the third-best in school history. They began with close wins over Seattle and Sonoma State to win the Ron Logsdon Classic in California to move into the NABC/Division II Bulletin Top 25 at 16th.

U of I won its first five Great Lakes Valley Conference games, including a 95-92 overtime triumph at Northern Kentucky that earned D-II Bulletin "Game of the Month" recognition.

The Greyhounds moved to #7 in NCAA II after upsetting top-ranked Southern Indiana, 88-87, in front of 3,750 fans at a raucous Nicoson Hall. The number seven ranking was the school's highest since 1996-97. UIndy was ranked in the first six regular-season polls of 2003-04.

The Hounds were ranked second in the first NCAA II Great Lakes Region poll of the campaign.

Sturgeon's Greyhounds rallied from an 11-point second-half deficit to nip 11th-ranked Lewis, 65-64, in a key February game. The Hounds followed that with two more GLVC home wins, including a 93-81 triumph over Northern Kentucky in front of 3,700 fans on "Senior Night" at Nicoson Hall.

Indianapolis clinched its NCAA Tournament berth with a 77-71 win over SIU Edwardsville in the GLVC Tournament quarter-finals.

In the NCAA's, the Greyhounds rallied from a double-digit deficit in the second half before falling in overtime to second-seeded Findlay.

Sturgeon became the third coach in school history to reach the 100-win plateau on December 1 with a victory against SIU Edwardsville. His .598 winning percentage is fourth in school history.

Sturgeon took his team to the NCAA II Tournament in 2003 with an 18-11 record. U of I took a charter flight to top-ranked Michigan Tech for the NCAA first-round game in front of a sell-out crowd of 3,570, dropping a 90-75 decision to NCAA II's number one team.

Sturgeon's Hounds defeated #6 Northern Kentucky and #14 Lewis in the midst of a six-game winning streak that included five GLVC triumphs.

The 2002-03 Greyhounds were a last-second shot away from claiming the Palm Beach Sunshine Hoops Challenge title, recording a 2-1 tournament mark.

Sturgeon's Hounds opened the 2001-02 campaign impressively by defeating ninth-ranked and 25-4 Seattle Pacific to win the

SPU Tip-off Tournament. Prior to that, his squad had defeated Indiana State in double overtime in an exhibition game.

The Greyhounds led the GLVC in free throw accuracy with .750 marksmanship. The Hounds were second in the league in treys, nailing 238 in 2001-02.

The team also excelled in the classroom, with graduated senior Ryan



Hupfer earning GLVC "Scholar-Athlete of the Year" honors.

The Hounds opened the 2000-01 campaign



with a 9-3 start—their best since 1997-98. Indianapolis was ranked as high as seventh in the NCAA II Great Lakes Region.

Sturgeon's 1999-2000 Greyhounds were 18-10, finishing fourth in the rugged GLVC. The Hounds advanced to the GLVC Tournament semifinals by defeating Lewis for the third time, 79-76 in overtime.

The Hounds led NCAA II in free throw shooting that season, hitting a school and GLVC-record .782 (513-656). Indy shot a conference and school-record 22-22 vs. IPFW.

The Hounds also performed well in the classroom with six players earning Academic All-GLVC recognition.

Sturgeon's 1998-99 Greyhounds set a school record with seven league road victories, posting a 7-4 ledger away from home. The Hounds' total of 15 GLVC wins in 1998-99 ranked second in school history. Indy's total of 17 wins overall is tied for sixth in the school's NCAA II history. Indianapolis was ranked ninth in the final NCAA II Great Lakes Region poll. The Greyhounds finished strong, winning 14 of their last 18 games.

The 1998-99 Hounds had a school-record seven Academic All-GLVC players.

Sturgeon began his collegiate head coaching career impressively in 1997 with his Hounds starting 7-0. His team won the Coca-Cola Classic for the second straight year and opened GLVC play by defeating NCAA II Tournament participant Lewis.

The 1997-98 Hounds upset NCAA II Tournament team Northern Kentucky on the road during the regular season.

The Hounds also posted the school's first-ever win at Quincy, pulling out a 72-68 decision that helped Indy qualify for the conference tournament.

Sturgeon became Indianapolis' first rookie coach since the legendary Angus Nicoson in 1947-48 to lead the Hounds to a winning record in his first campaign. He also became the third coach in the school's basketball history to accomplish this feat.



Sturgeon became the 10th coach in the Hounds' 82-year basketball history on April 2, 1997, succeeding Royce Waltman, who went to Indiana State.

Sturgeon helped lead the 1996-97 Greyhounds to a 23-5 record and the first GLVC championship in school history. The 1996-97 Hounds were the last unbeaten among 244 NCAA II teams that season, joining Kansas as the only unbeaten in NCAA I and II at that point in the campaign. Indy earned the first NCAA II #1 ranking in school history January 28, 1997, after defeating Southern Indiana in front of a standing-room-only crowd of 4,500 in Nicoson Hall to improve to 17-0. The Hounds and Fort Hays State were the only teams to be #1 in 1996-97.

The top-seeded Hounds hosted the 1997 NCAA II Great Lakes Regional and were ranked a school-record third in the final poll. Indy was ranked in the top 10 from January 7 through the end of the season. That squad also set school records for best start (18-0), NCAA II

record (23-5), GLVC record (16-4), home record (16-0), winning streak (18), GLVC winning streak (11), and GLVC home record (10-0). The 1996-97 Hounds were 3-0 vs. D-II top 10 teams.

The Hounds posted consecutive 20-win seasons and NCAA II Tournament berths in 1995-96 and 1996-97. UI beat Lake Superior in the 1996 NCAA first round for the school's first post-season win since 1964.

The 40-year-old Sturgeon played for Royce Waltman at DePauw in 1987-88, prior to serving as an assistant coach with him for nine seasons at DePauw and Indianapolis.

The Sturgeon-Waltman combination recorded an 89-49 record (.645) at U of I from 1992-97, after posting an 82-29 ledger (.739) in four seasons at DePauw. Over the total of nine seasons, Sturgeon helped Waltman's teams to a 171-78 mark (.687).

As a player, Sturgeon competed at DePauw for four years, helping the Tigers to a 87-23 mark (.791). The



Vallonia, Ind., native has the distinction of both playing and coaching on seven NCAA tournament teams at DePauw and Indianapolis, and coaching a #1-ranked team at both places.

Sturgeon was inducted into the DePauw Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 2003 as part of the NCAA III runner-up squad.

He earned a bachelor's in history at DePauw in 1988 and a master's in secondary education from Indiana State. He and wife, Lisa, have two sons, Connor, 7, and Cameron, 5.



FRED ANDREWS

- ▶ Assistant Coach
- ▶ 1st season at Indianapolis

Fred Andrews, formerly of Indiana-Purdue Ft. Wayne, begins his first season as a Greyhound assistant during the 2005-06 season.

Andrews spent five seasons at IPFW and headed up the Mastodons' recruiting efforts. Andrews was also actively involved in scouting future opponents, scheduling, and academic development.

The Decatur, Ind., native is a graduate of Purdue University, where he was a student manager for four years. During that time, the Boilermakers won back-to-back Big 10 titles and went to three NCAA tournaments. Andrews earned a bachelor's degree in accounting.

Andrews began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Butler County Community College in El Dorado, Kan. In his only season at BCCC, the Grizzlies finished with a 32-5 record and captured the Jayhawk West Conference, the Region VIII Championship, and finished third in the NJCAA National Tournament.

Andrews also spent three seasons as an assistant at Wichita State University, helping to lead the Shockers to their first winning season in seven years. He also coached at Central Florida Community College in Ocala, Fla., helping lead the Patriots to a 21-7 record and a Mid-Florida Community College Championship.



AUSTIN PARKINSON

- ▶ Assistant Coach
- ▶ 1st season at Indianapolis

Austin Parkinson, who is a former Purdue letterwinner, joins the Greyhounds as a graduate assistant for the 2005-06 season.

Parkinson completed his four-year playing career with the Boilermakers in 2003-04, leaving the school tied for 10th all-time for assists. Parkinson led his squad in assists in both his sophomore (140) and senior (119) campaigns.

The Kokomo, Ind. native attended Northwestern High School where he was a four-time team MVP and a two-time Nike All-American. He is the school's all-time leader in steals, assists and points.

His father, Bruce, also played at Purdue and is the University's all-time assists leader with 690 in his career. Parkinson's grandfather, Jack, also was a basketball standout, playing for Adolph Rupp's legendary Kentucky teams. He is enshrined in the Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame.



BILL ZYCH

- ▶ Assistant Coach
- ▶ 2nd season at Indianapolis

Longtime Indiana high school basketball coach Bill Zych is in his second season on the Greyhound staff.

Zych has accumulated 212 victories in his 19 seasons as a head coach. He just finished a 12-year stint at Center Grove High School where he was the longest-tenured coach in school history. Zych's team won 16 games in both the 1994 and 2002 campaigns--the most wins by a CG team since 1971. He was named Hoosier Basketball Coaches Association "District Coach of the Year" in 2002. His 1994 team also captured a sectional championship.

Zych's teams won a South Central Conference title and they were twice runners-up in the Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference.

He served a four-year term on the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Board of Directors, including two years as Vice President. Prior to his tenure at Center Grove, Zych coached Jay County in 1991-92, leading them to a sectional title before a two-point loss in the regional to top-ranked Anderson. Zych coached at Rensselaer Central for two years from 1989-91, leading them to the school's first sectional title since 1969 in 1991. That 1991 team also won the Lafayette Regional to make the school's only Semi-State appearance in single-class basketball.

Prior to that, Zych was at Winamac for four years, guiding his 1984 team to the school's first sectional title since 1970.

He and his wife, Janet, have two children, Stephen and Allysa. Zych teaches Honors Algebra and Algebra at Center Grove.

2005-06 Season Outlook

2004-05 D-II leading scorer, team assists and steals leader, University of Indianapolis record-holder for points in a season, all-time leading scorer in Greyhound history, unanimous 2005 GLVC Player of the Year, GLVC all-time leading scorer, 2005 NCAA Division II Men's Basketball Player of the Year.

You can find all of these accomplishments on the résumé of one Mr. David Logan. Logan attained them last season for a Greyhound team that went 19-10 and made its third consecutive trip to the NCAA tournament. The Indianapolis native and four-year starter will certainly go down as one of the best to don a Greyhound uniform, but the individuals suiting up for the 2005-06 Hounds are more concerned with the successes of the future than the accolades of the past.

Backcourt depth will be one of the strengths of this year's Greyhound squad. After losing four senior guards and 83% of the assists from last year's roster, the guard spots become all the more important this season.

After red-shirting last season, juco transfer Scott Strahm will see considerable minutes in the backcourt for UIndy, and Coach Todd Sturgeon expects his contributions to be considerable as well.

Scott is "a versatile perimeter player -- can play any of the guard spots," Sturgeon boasts, "and we will be counting on him for his ability to make a perimeter shot as well as provide some leadership in the backcourt."

Another underclassman, junior Luke Blank, will be called upon to step up for the Hounds. The 6'3" gunslinger had a promising start the 2004-05 season, hitting seven threes in the first five games until injury sidelined him for the season.

Sturgeon notes that Luke is "the most experienced guy on our roster. He has the ability to provide some offensive spark as well as some toughness at the defensive end.

Six-foot senior Rob Robinson will add some grit to the Greyhounds backcourt play. In Sturgeon's estimation, Rob is "a strong, tough defender who could provide added depth on the perimeter."

Sophomore Adam Martin is another Greyhound guard that the injury bug bit last season. Adam looks to bounce back with a strong effort this year.

"A terrific perimeter shooter who has had to overcome a host of nagging injuries but could provide a spark off the bench on the perimeter," is Sturgeon's assessment of Martin.

Freshmen Daniel Cox and Timmy Smith both hail from central Indiana and both could garner playing time from Coach Sturgeon this season. When looking at Cox, Sturgeon sees "a mature player for a freshman. He has the ability to be an outstanding offensive player for us."

The Coach is also keen on the other youngster.

"Tim is one of the fastest players on our team. We will be counting on him to provide a defensive spark and he's a rapidly improving offensive player."

Six-one senior transfer Jesse McClung came to UIndy via Ball State. Sturgeon likes what he brings to the table.

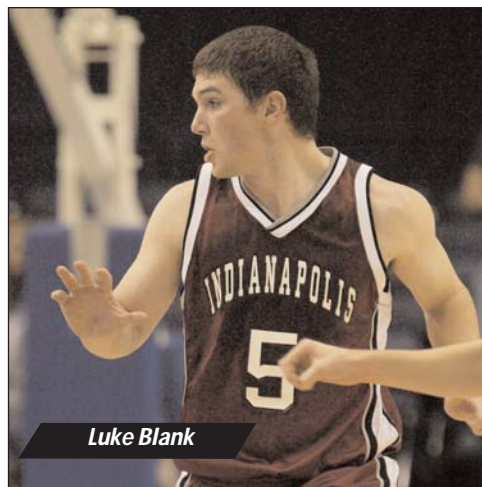
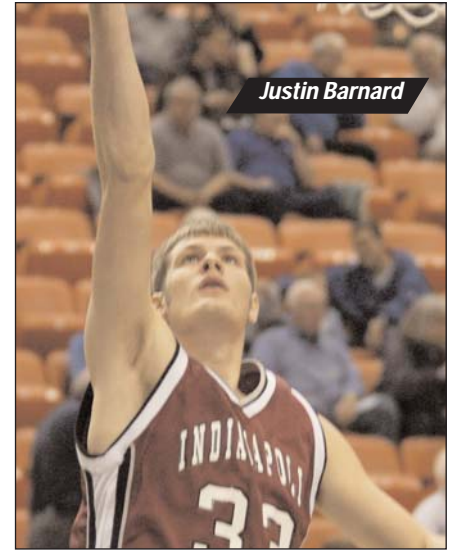

Returning starter Justin Barnard will be a versatile component to the Greyhounds' frontcourt. The 6'6" sophomore from Shelbyville could create match-up problems for opponents with his post-play and his sizeable range. Barnard led the Greyhounds in rebounding last season while shooting over 40% from beyond the arc in 37 attempts.

"A guy who really made some big plays for us as a freshman," Sturgeon says of Barnard. "We're anticipating him assuming a more prominent role in all phases of our team this year."

During a solid rookie campaign last season, Jordan Barnard was one of only three Greyhounds to appear in all 29 games. Like his twin brother Justin, Jordan is a player who can contribute in many ways.

Barnard is "a versatile offensive player who can shoot, pass, and play multiple positions," Sturgeon summarizes.

After adding three schools, the Great Lakes Valley Conference underwent realignment for the 2005-06 season. Newcomers Drury, the University of Missouri-Rolla, and Rockhurst were inserted in the newly created West Division along with mainstays Southern Indiana, Southern Illinois-Edwardsville, UM-St. Louis and Quincy. Bellarmine, Kentucky Wesleyan, Lewis, Northern Kentucky, St. Joseph's and Wisconsin-Parkside will join UIndy in the East.

The Hounds host their home opener December 6 against Northern Kentucky after beginning the season with six road games, including two exhibitions against intrastate D-I schools Indiana State and Indiana University. A rematch of last season's NCAA tournament first round game against Ferris State will be held at Nicoson Hall on December 21, part of the GLVC/GLIAC Challenge. The Hounds have a four-game home stand in January and conclude the regular season against Kentucky Wesleyan on February 23, also at home. UIndy will face each of its East Division rivals twice during the regular season and will play 19 conference games in all before the conference tournament, slated for March 2-5 at Roberts' Stadium in Evansville, IN.

The Greyhounds have a few unanswered questions raised by the departure of five seniors from the 2004-05 squad. Seventy-two percent of last year's scoring will need to be replaced this season, leaving plenty of opportunities for any number of Hounds to shine in the coming months.

In his 9th season as the head man at U of I, Todd Sturgeon declares this season's goal is "to carry on the tradition of winning that we've had here and to improve and become a team that can become a factor in the GLVC race." With his Greyhound teams winning games at a near .600 clip, the winning traditional may only get richer as the Hounds look to make a fourth consecutive trip to the NCAA tournament in March.

Talented freshman Braxton Mills comes to the Greyhounds from Pike High School. The 6'6" home-grown product could see quality minutes due to his robust game.

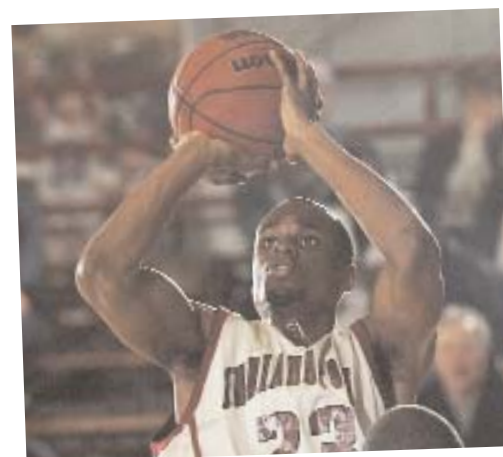

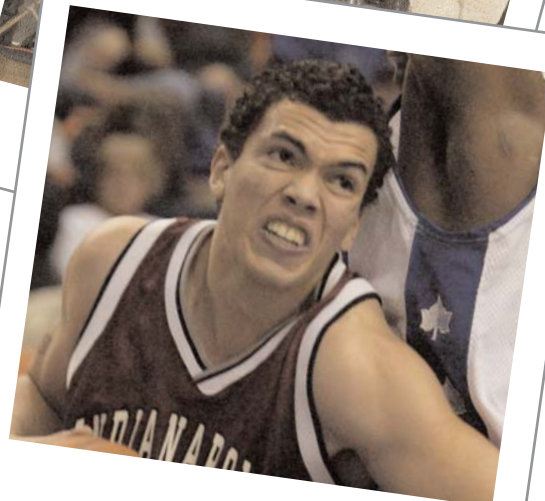

The 14-member Great Lakes Valley Conference has made its name throughout the last 27 years as a power in NCAA Division II basketball. In the last few years, however, the GLVC has seen success in many sports, and the league can now claim itself as one of the nation's top in all NCAA Division II athletics.

The 2005-06 academic year brings the addition of Drury University, the University of Missouri-Rolla, and Rockhurst University, increasing the GLVC from 11 to 14 members.

The formation of the GLVC can be traced as far back as 1972 when the athletic directors of three member schools - Kentucky Wesleyan, Bellarmine and Indiana State University at Evansville (now the University of Southern Indiana) - began preliminary discussions about forming a basketball conference. Four years later, the University of Indianapolis and Saint Joseph's College expressed interest. On July 7, 1978, those schools - along with Ashland University - united to become the GLVC.

Since formulation of the conference, ten schools have joined the league: Lewis University (1980), Indiana-Purdue at Fort Wayne (1984), Northern Kentucky University (1985), Kentucky State University (1989), Quincy University (1994), Southern Illinois University Edwardsville (1994), University of Wisconsin-Parkside (1994), University of Missouri-St. Louis (1995), Drury (2005), Missouri-Rolla (2005), and Rockhurst (2005). Ashland and Kentucky State left the conference after the 1994 season, while IPFW left the league following the 2000-01 academic year.

Along with its expansion came the hiring of the league's first full-time commissioner in 1996. In 2001, an associate commissioner was added to the full-time conference staff, and a part-time sports information director joined in 2004. The conference headquarters are located in downtown Indianapolis.

The GLVC can claim schools in many of the Midwest's major media markets, with schools in Milwaukee/Northern Illinois (UW-Parkside), Chicago (Lewis), Indianapolis (Indianapolis), Cincinnati (Northern Kentucky), Louisville (Bellarmine), Evansville (Southern Indiana), Owensboro (Kentucky Wesleyan), Kansas City (Rockhurst) and St. Louis (SIU Edwardsville/UM-St. Louis).

The conference sponsors 17 championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, indoor and outdoor track and field, and tennis for men and basketball, cross country, softball,

soccer, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, golf, and volleyball for women. The GLVC sponsors more women's golf teams than any other Division II league in the country, while GLVC baseball has featured the exclusiveness of using wood bats since 1999.

The addition of SIU Edwardsville, Quincy, Wisconsin-Parkside, and Missouri-St. Louis in the mid-1990s allowed the GLVC to become an immediate national power in several sports such as men's and women's soccer, women's softball and tennis

The conference expanded to include women's basketball in 1983-84 and immediately established a women's-men's doubleheader format in league play to ensure maximum exposure for both squads. GLVC basketball games take place on Thursday and Saturday nights in November, December, January and February. GLVC institutions have won 10 national championships in basketball. Kentucky Wesleyan leads all Division II institutions with eight men's basketball titles, while Southern Indiana won the men's crown in 1995 and finished as the runner-up in the 2004 tournament. Northern Kentucky's women won the school's first-ever national championship in 2000.

In 2001, the league announced the creation of the GLVC Hall of Fame, with the first class being inducted in 2002. The GLVC annually presents the Richard F. Scharf Paragon Award to the top male and female student-athlete in the league, and the Bertram Award to a distinguished alum who both succeeded while a GLVC student-athlete and excelled in accomplishments after graduation.

The city of Indianapolis continues to thrive. The most recent jewel in the city's crown is the stunning Indiana State Museum in White River State Park, which opened in May 2002. This edifice on Downtown's Canal Walk comes on the heels of other recent additions such as the NCAA national office and its Hall of Champions, Conseco Fieldhouse, the Indiana Firebirds Arena Football League team, Indiana Fever Women's National Basketball Association franchise, and the US Grand Prix Formula One race.

New buildings and facilities are everywhere in Indiana's capital city, and progress continues. Downtown life has been rejuvenated in the past quarter-century, and the city is recognized as a national center for amateur sports.

Indianapolis, called the Crossroads of America, is within a three-hour drive for more than 15 million people; half of the United States' population lives only a day's drive from the city, and Indiana boasts more interstate highways than any other state.

Indiana's capital is the nation's 12th-largest city (population: 800,000) and is the largest inland city in the country. Counting the residents of the greater metropolitan area, the population rises to some 1.5 million.

There are 12 institutions of higher learning in or near the city, which boasts the Indianapolis Museum of Art, Eiteljorg Museum of American Indian and Western Art, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Indiana Repertory Theater, Indianapolis Opera, Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement, and the new Indiana State Museum. The city is home to White River Park with its lovely Canal Walk, an oasis with lush landscaping, large fountains, antique-style street lamps, walkways, pedestrian bridge, pedal boats, jogging paths, and murals depicting scenes of life in Indiana. The park includes the Indianapolis Zoo, White River Gardens, the IMAX theatre, and the NCAA campus. The four-story Circle Centre mall offers plenty of shopping, food, and fun.



Indy is famous for auto racing; the world's largest sporting event is the 500 race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, annually drawing 300,000 spectators. The Brickyard 400 NASCAR race and US Grand Prix Formula One race add to the city's racing laurels. Indianapolis hosted the Pan American Games in 1987 and the NCAA Final Four men's basketball tournament in 1991, 1997, and 2000; it will host it again in 2006. Indy scored the Basketball World Championships in 2002 and played host to the 1991 World Gymnastics Championship; Olympic trials in swimming, diving, and synchronized swimming; national championships in gymnastics, track and field, rowing, canoeing/kayaking, swimming, diving, ice skating, archery, synchronized swimming, and NCAA championships in many of the same sports.

Indy has hosted these events with a multimillion-dollar array of world-class facilities: the National Institute for Fitness and Sport; Conseco Fieldhouse, home of the NBA's Pacers, WNBA's Indiana Fever, and the AFL

Indiana Firebirds; the 55,506-seat RCA Dome, home of the NFL's Colts; one of the fastest swimming pools in the world in IU's Natatorium; Indianapolis Tennis Center with 24 tennis courts and 8,000-seat stadium; the 12,500-seat IU Track and Field Stadium; Major Taylor Velodrome, site of international and national cycling meets; and Victory Field, home of the Triple-A Indians. Other pro sporting events in Indy have included the U.S. Women's Open, the PGA, the Brickyard Crossing Senior Golf Classic, and RCA Tennis Championships. The city hosted the Davis Cup quarterfinals in 1998. Indy sports the Indiana Ice amateur hockey team and the Indiana Blast men's professional soccer team, and serves as headquarters for many national amateur sports governing bodies and the National Track and Field Hall of Fame.

The expansion of the Schwitzer Student Center doubled its size and greatly expanded the services and amenities so important to students, including a much larger bookstore, coffee shop, lounge and game areas with Internet access, and Student Life offices in one facility.

An unprecedented era of campus improvement has added a campus mall and water garden, landscaping, decorative lighting, and broad walkways. A state-of-the-art health sciences building, Martin Hall, houses our nationally recognized Krannert School of Physical Therapy, School of Occupational Therapy, and School of Nursing.

There's much more. A gift from alumnus and trustee Richard E. Stierwalt enabled construction of an alumni house, providing meeting and gathering places for our hard-working alumni board and the many programs it helps to create, as well as a home for our Institutional Advancement offices, including the fund-raising arms of the institution as well as the offices of University Communications, Publications, and, of course, Alumni Relations.

These campus improvements have occurred against the ever-present backdrop of academic pursuits, cultural and athletic activities,

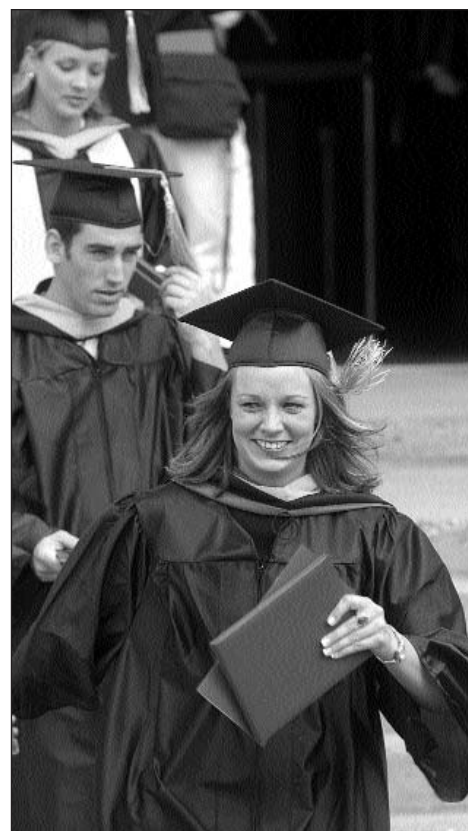

and a strong commitment to community service.

With the growth and activity on campus, enrollments have increased accordingly, and both the number and percentage of students who wish to live on campus have grown considerably. Growing enrollments have meant record graduating class sizes; some 700 graduates marched in the 2004 processional, and a third of our 20,000 alumni graduated in the last 10 years.

The fast-growing School for Adult Learning exemplifies the University's ability to iden-



tify a need in the community and move quickly to meet it, allowing busy adult students to pursue a college degree.

The School of Psychological Sciences debuted in 2001, joining the School for Adult Learning, School of Education, School of Nursing, School of Business, School of Occupational Therapy, Krannert School of Physical Therapy, and the College of Arts and Sciences. The University granted its first earned doctoral degrees in 2002.

The Center for Aging and Community and the Center of Excellence in the Leadership of Learning are two new ventures that promise to serve as the foundation for the institution's reputation even as they set the standard in their disciplines.

The Center for Aging and Community is implementing a combination of interdisciplinary coursework, research, consulting, and service to improve the quality of life for older adults. The Center of Excellence in Leadership of Learning seeks to enhance the leadership capacity of all who teach so that they may lead others to learn.

Amid the growth in programs, enrollment, and physical campus, the University remains committed to fulfilling its motto, "Inspiring Excellence."



DR. BEVERLEY Pitts

University President
Ed. D., Ball State University, 1981

After an exhaustive national search, the University of Indianapolis has selected a seasoned Ball State University educator and administrator as its next chief executive.

Beverley J. Pitts, provost and vice president for academic affairs at Ball State, will become the university's eighth president, effective July 5. She succeeds Jerry Israel, who is retiring.

Pitts will be the first female president in the 103-year history of the comprehensive institution, which has 4,100 undergraduate and graduate students on its main campus and is affiliated with the United Methodist Church.

The selection of Pitts was based on her impressive leadership qualities, solid record of accomplishments, and outstanding communication skills, said Sue Anne Gilroy, chair of the Search Committee. In addition to 20 years as a communication professor and administrator at Ball State, Pitts skillfully shepherded that institution through an especially difficult period while serving as acting president in 2004.

"The goal of our Search Committee was to conduct an exhaustive national search that would be open and inclusive, resulting in the selection of a visionary and dynamic, experienced and entrepreneurial president who will guide the university to the next level of excellence, building upon the impressive accomplishments of Jerry Israel," Gilroy said. "We found that person right here in Indiana."

Pitts was among four finalists, culled from nearly 80 candidates, who were invited to campus for interviews with seven advisory committees representing students, faculty, staff, alumni and community leaders. "With every constituent group, she was the universal favorite," said Christel DeHaan, chair of the Board of Trustees.

"I thoroughly have enjoyed working these last seven years with Dr. Israel and watching the university prosper under his remarkable leadership," DeHaan said. "The university has made tremendous strides, and is well-positioned for even greater achievements ahead. The Board is convinced that Dr. Pitts is the one to carry the baton forward."



DR. MARY Moore

Interim Provost

Dr. Mary Moore has been named interim provost of the University of Indianapolis, effective Oct. 1.

Moore is the university's vice president for research, planning and strategic partnerships and will continue her current responsibilities during the nationwide search for a new provost. Dr. Everette Freeman, who has served as senior vice president and provost since 2001, recently was named president of Albany State University in Georgia. The University of Indianapolis expects to fill the provost position by July 2006.

Pitts began her higher education career as an English instructor at Anderson University, where she received a bachelor's degree in English in 1968. She subsequently earned two degrees from Ball State: a master's in journalism and a doctorate in higher education.

While on the faculty at Anderson from 1977 to 1985, Pitts rose to assistant professor and became founding chair of the Department of Communication. She joined the Ball State faculty in 1985, where she moved through the ranks to become professor of journalism and assume increasing administrative responsibilities.

As provost and vice president for academic affairs, Pitts now has oversight of seven academic colleges and 900 faculty. She played a leadership role in developing the Freshman Connections program, which was identified as one of 13 Best Practice Programs in the Freshman Year by the national Policy Center on the First Year of College. Freshman retention at Ball State went from 67 percent in 1997 to 80 percent by 2003.

Pitts has been the designer or project director for five Lilly Endowment grants to Ball State totaling more than \$36 million. Two of the projects have addressed student retention, and the most recent funded a new Center for Media Design.

"I tried to bring the small, liberal arts experience I had enjoyed so much in my years as student and educator at Anderson, to Ball State through the Freshman Experience and retention programs," Pitts said. "Those experiences transfer well to the University of Indianapolis, which provides an important liberal arts foundation, as well as the opportunity for personal relationships between faculty and students that lead to retention and academic success."

"The university has come so far in the last few years. It has wonderful programs and great potential to serve Indianapolis and Indiana. It's exciting to go to a university that's in such great shape and has so many possibilities ahead. I am hopeful my communications background will help in telling the university's story further, to bring it even greater visibility and prestige."

"It's reassuring to leave the university in such good hands," said Israel. "I'm delighted that someone of Dr. Pitts' experience and leadership ability has accepted the opportunity to become the next president. Her knowledge and visibility in Indiana will allow for a smooth transition and rapid development of her presidency."

A Greenwood resident, Moore holds the faculty title of professor of sociology and previously served as the dean of arts and sciences and as associate provost. She earned a Ph.D. from York University in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, and came to the University of Indianapolis in 1982.

Director of Athletics

Sue Willey is in her third year as director of athletics and her 30th overall at the university. She was recently selected as the 2005 Division II Administrator of the Year by the National Association of Collegiate Woman Athletic Administrators (NACWAA). She will receive her award in Kansas City, Mo. on October 10, 2005 at the NACWAA Fall Forum. Willey was also selected as the 2004 "Pathfinder Award Winner" presented in recognition of her strong commitment to provide quality sport and leadership opportunities for girls and women in the state of Indiana. The award was presented by the Indiana Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance at a ceremony November 5, 2004.

UIndy has excelled under Willey's leadership. In 2004-05 the Hounds finished 18th in the U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup standings while 21 student-athletes earned All-America honors. Indianapolis produced 148 student-athletes worthy of All-Academic selections in their respective conference (GLVC and GLIAC) and three coaches took home their league's "Coach of the Year" honors. UIndy also boasted a two-time national champion men's swimmer and the Division II Player of the Year in men's basketball.

Willey is completing a four-year term on the highest NCAA Committee available to athletic administrators-the NCAA Division II Management Council. Her current Management Council assignments include the DII Budget and Finance Committee, DII Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committee, DII Management Council Identity Subcommittee, DII Championships Regionalization Task Force, DII Project Team to Review Issues Related to Diversity and the DII Championships Eligibility Project Team. Willey served as chair of the DII Management Council during the 2004 year and will complete her term of service at the close of the 2006 NCAA Convention in January.

Willey's responsibilities as director of athletics include participation on several important campus committees. She was the first female to serve on the President's Cabinet, and is a member of the Enrollment Management Committee as well as the Financial Aid and Policies Committee. She is a regular volunteer for the UIndy United Way Committee, as well as a cook for the campus Midnight Breakfasts.

**Assoc. Dir. of Athletics for
Development & Facilities**

Matt Donovan is in his third year as Associate Director of Athletics and his seventh as Director of Athletic Fund Raising and Facilities.

His efforts in athletic development have been impressive. The Greyhound Club recently surpassed the 1,300 mark in just its first six years of existence.

Donovan spearheaded the implementation of the Crimson & Grey Member Drive, which brought in more than 225 new members, including the sponsorship of all 76 graduating senior student-athletes.

Donovan created and implemented new solicitation programs for parents, faculty and staff, and advanced degree recipients, raising record amounts from each. He instituted the first comprehensive, 18-week phone-a-thon, raising \$140,000 per year with 82% pledge fulfillment. This past season's phone-a-thon helped bring in and retain more than 130 members.

Willey serves on the Great Lakes Valley Conference Executive Committee and she is currently serving a four-year term on the NCAA II Great Lakes Region Softball Committee. Willey has been active in the governance of intercollegiate athletics her entire career. During the late 70's and prior to NCAA committee work, she served on the Executive Committee of the Indiana Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIAW). She also has served on various NCAA Division II regional ranking committees, as well as the D-II legislation committee.

Willey is a frequent guest speaker for various groups. This past year she spoke at the NCAA Conference Interns Seminar, Gender Equity and Issues Forum, DII Conference Commissioners, NCAA National Convention, UIndy Student Affairs Division, NACWAA/HERS Institute for Administrative Advancement, Women's Leadership Symposium, NCAA Leadership Institute for Ethnic Minority Males, and a Graduate Class from Ball State University.

Due to a growing need for academic support for UIndy student-athletes Dr. Willey submitted an application for an NCAA Grant. In March, the University of Indianapolis was selected to receive one of six NCAA Division II Strategic Alliance Matching Grants. This grant makes it possible for Willey to enhance the part-time academic advisor position to full-time. Daryl Gibbs has been named Assistant Athletics Director for Academic Services and will also be the driving force behind the growth and development of the CHAMPS/Lifeskills program.

A 1993 inductee into the UIndy Athletic Hall of Fame, Willey earned an incredible 19 letters and 11 MVP awards in her four-year career. She was the "Female Athlete of the Year" from 1972-75. She began her coaching career at her alma mater after graduating cum laude from UIndy in 1975. The versatile Willey coached 23 years at U of I, directing 43 different teams in five sports. She was the GLVC softball "Coach of the Year" in 1989, and her softball teams earned national academic honors in 1996 and 1997.

Willey is an associate professor of health and physical education at UIndy and has taught in the Department of Kinesiology for more than 25 years, with a special teaching interest in sport ethics. Willey holds a master's degree and a doctorate from Indiana University.

Donovan is active in the Greyhound Club, reviewing, revising, and launching a university-wide athletic fund raising program focusing on involvement of coaches, administrators, and former athletes.

He worked from 1994-99 as the UIndy Director for Annual Giving, building a 15% increase over four years.

Donovan has an extensive background in fund-raising, having served as project director for The Campaign for Penn in 1993-94 at the University of Pennsylvania and associate project director for the Purdue University Phone-a-thon in 1992-93.

The 1989 Western Illinois graduate is on the National Association of Athletic Development Directors Executive Committee.

He and his wife, Angela White, have two sons, Casey, 4, and Patrick, 1.

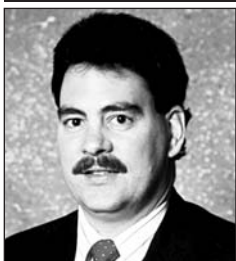

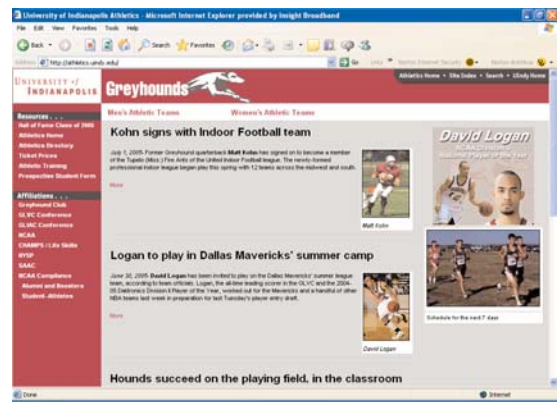

Indianapolis' **Nicoson Hall** is one of the finest NCAA II basketball venues in the country! Thirteen six-foot color action pictures were added to the concourses in 2003-04 thanks to the university's corporate partners. The Hines Hospitality Room was dedicated in November of 2002.

The versatile facility received national recognition in 1995 when the Orlando Magic practiced in it during the Eastern Conference Finals. CNN and other media outlets aired practice footage from Nicoson Hall.

The Greyhound logo, designed by alumnus Mike Schwab, is displayed in the center of the court, spanning 24 feet! The entire playing court, including the logo, was redone in the summer of 2005.

Nicoson Hall has been the home of the Greyhounds since 1960. The 4,000-capacity arena was a welcome addition to the campus after the Hounds played 33 years in a building called "the barn," constructed as a "temporary" facility.

The arena was known as "The Gym" until the spring of 1977, when the university's trustees named it "Nicoson Hall," in honor of Angus Nicoson, who had announced he was taking a disability retirement earlier in the year. "Nick," as he was affectionately known, had been athletic director and basketball coach for the Greyhounds for 30 years.



Nicoson, who died in 1982 at age 62, compiled an outstanding record of 483- 279. He not only guided the basketball program to success, but also transformed the entire athletic program into a highly-respected one. A special bronze portrait of Coach Nicoson, located on the west concourse of the arena, was dedicated in 1991.

Nicoson was named Hoosier Basketball Conference "Coach of the Year" seven times. He also coached the Indiana High School All-Star team to a winning record for 17 years in the annual summer basketball classic against the Kentucky stars.

"Nick" was inducted into the Indiana Basketball and Helms Foundation Halls of Fame.

Nicoson Hall is the arena wing of the Ruth Lilly Fitness Center. The athletic and physical education complex opened in 1984, housing an eight-lane swimming pool and diving well, gymnasium, racquetball courts, training room, wrestling room, weight room and more.

Nicoson Hall served as the wrestling venue for the 1987 Pan American Games and as a training camp site for the NBA's Indiana Pacers.

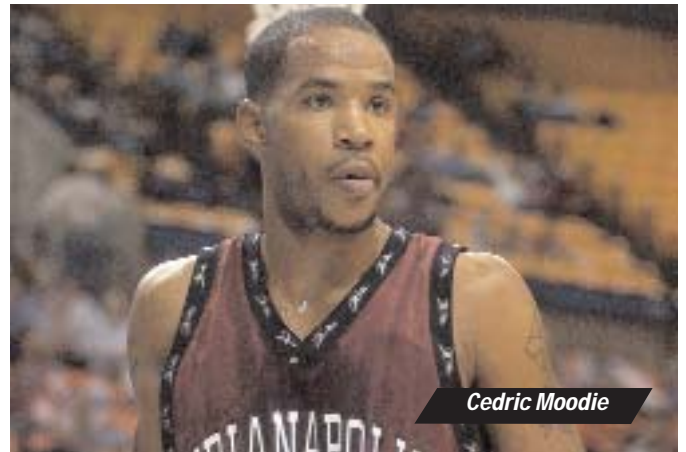

Tyrone Barksdale—The 1996-97 NABC Second-Team NCAA II All-American played for Furstenfeld in Austria, averaging 24 points in his first four games. He had played for the Roanoke Dazzle of the NBDL, in Mexico, and for Des Moines in the IBA. A starting guard, he helped Des Moines to the IBA title, finishing fifth in trey accuracy. He had played for the Pella Windows AAU team. He played professionally in Colombia in 1998-99, averaging 29 points and leading the team in steals and assists. He was a two-time all-star for Pogon Ruda in Poland.

Mike Deemer—Played for Gary in the CBA in 2002-03 after spending time in the Dallas Mavericks camp. He played for the CBA's Fargo-Moorhead Beez in 2001-02. He had played pro ball in Mexico, Argentina, Finland, Australia, and Taiwan in a four-year pro career. For Joensuu Kataja in Finland in 1999-2000, he averaged 18 points and 11 rebounds to earn Division I all-star status.

David Logan—Played for the Dallas Mavericks Summer League club after his phenomenal 2004-05 campaign. Signed a contract to play for Edimes Pavia in the Italian League.

Perrell Lucas—College Sports Magazine 1995-96 NCAA II First-Team All-American who played in France in 2000. In 1999, he played in the Philippines. He had played for the Marathon Oil AAU Team in 1998 and the Wisconsin Blast of the IBA in 1997-98.
