CREDENTIALS

Requests should be made one week in advance. Requests are screened with care to insure a working press box. Children, spouses, pets and cheering are not allowed in the press box.

INTERVIEWS

All interviews with members of the team during the season must be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office. Please call ahead and allow 24 hours to set up interviews with players. Arrangements will be made for telephone and in-person interviews at a time that is mutually agreeable to the reporter/broadcaster and the student-athlete. The best time to call Coach Butler is in the morning. Any television crews wishing to tape an interview with Coach Butler may do so daily before practice. Please call ahead to allow an office representative to help facilitate the interview.

PARKING

Parking for all members of the working media for Terrier home softball games can be found in either the Student Life Lot (A) or the Verandah Lot.

INTERVIEWS

Student-athletes are available on the field immediately following the game. Coach Butler will meet with the media following each game on the field. During a double-header, no student-athletes may be interviewed between games, with the exception of the starting pitcher of the first game. The Wofford locker room and training room in Richardson Hall are NOT open to the media.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes for newspaper photographers and photographers on assignment are available from the athletic media relations office. Credentials will not be issued for freelance photographers. Photographers will not be allowed on the field during the game.

PRESSBOX SERVICES

Members of the media will be provided with flip cards, current statistics and pregame notes prior to the start of the game. Statistical summaries will include final box score. There is wireless access at Hope Field, along with ethernet ports. A photocopier and a fax machine are also available inside the Richardson Building.

DIRECTIONS TO HOPE FIELD

From the West/GSP Airport: Take I-85 north to exit 69 (Business 85 North). Exit at 5A, I-85 South/US 176. After 3 miles, turn right on Cleveland Street. Follow under railroad tracks and the baseball field can be reached by either going straight or turning left onto Memorial Drive.

From the North: Take I-26 east to exit 15 (US 176). Follow for 7 miles as road turns into I-85 South and then Pine Street. Turn right on Cleveland Street. Follow under railroad tracks and the baseball field can be reached by either going straight or turning left onto Memorial Drive.

From the East/Charlotte Airport: Take I-85 south to exit 77 (Business 85 South). Exit at 5A, I-85 South/US 176. After 3 miles, turn right on Cleveland Street. Follow under railroad tracks and the baseball field can be reached by either going straight or turning left onto Memorial Drive.

From the South: Take I-26 west to exit 21B (US 29 North). After 3.5 miles, turn left on St. John Street. Turn left at North Church Street. Turn right on Memorial Drive and follow until the baseball field is on your left.

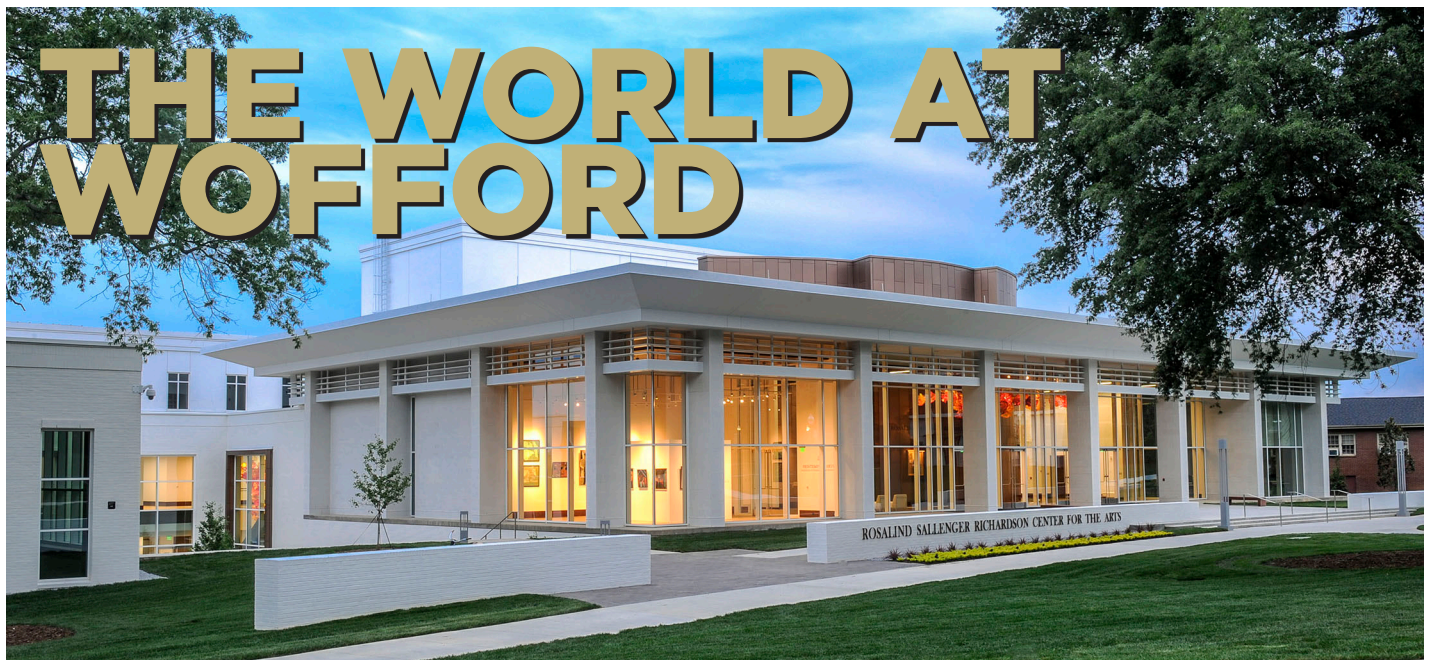

THE WORLD AT WOFFORD



Wofford College, established in 1854, is a four-year, independent, residential liberal arts college located in Spartanburg, S.C. It offers a distinctive program with 26 major fields of study to a student body of 1,800 undergraduates.

Nationally known for the strength of its academic program, outstanding faculty, study abroad participation and successful graduates, Wofford ranks well in U.S. News & World Report, The Princeton Review, The Fiske Guide to College, Kiplinger's Personal Finance and the Open Doors Report on International Education Exchange, an organization that ranks Wofford #4 in the nation for study abroad participation.

Wofford has produced six Rhodes Scholars and is home to one of the nation's 290 Phi Beta Kappa chapters.

A leader in offering high-impact learning opportunities to students, Wofford encourages students to take advantage of all that Wofford, and through it the world, has to offer.

These opportunities include internships with scientific, corporate and non-profit organizations across the globe, undergraduate research opportunities, service-learning in the local community, international study abroad programming and a thriving host of co-curricular opportunities on campus.

One of those co-curricular offerings is the James-Atkins Fund, a student-managed and operated investment organization. The Mungo Exchange also prepares students for life after Wofford by offering professional development, career services, entrepreneurship programs and much more.

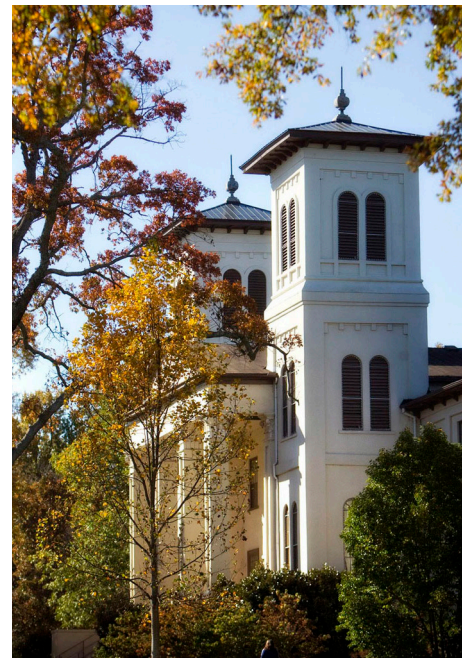
Student and residence life on campus include exciting Division I NCAA athletics, opportunities to participate in one of the college's Greek-letter fraternities or sororities, competitive intramurals, a diverse selection of clubs, student publications and a housing plan that helps students progress from first year through fourth in a close-knit community that builds independence. The residence life experience culminates in a final year in

The Village, beautiful, Charlestonian-style apartments designed to help transition students from college student to successful graduate.

Thanks to the generosity of alumnus and trustee Jerry Richardson '59, the Rosalind Sallenger Richardson Center for the Arts opened in May of 2017 and the Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium to house new basketball and volleyball arenas opened in September of 2017. The new Greek Village was completed in the spring of 2016.

Additionally, the Chandler Center for Environmental Studies and Jerome Johnson Richardson Hall, a 150-bed residence hall, opened in the fall of 2020. Renovations to the library into an academic commons were completed in the fall of 2019. Burwell Dining Hall and Mungo Campus Life Center renovations were finalized in 2021 and a new softball stadium, along with improvements to Snyder Field were finished in the summer of 2022.

Wofford's entire 175-acre campus is a national arboretum, named the Roger Milliken Arboretum at Wofford College in honor of the late longtime trustee and benefactor.





Wofford offers distinctive learning opportunities that set it apart from other liberal arts colleges. A few of those high-impact educational experiences include:

The Interim, a January term that encourages students and faculty to explore new interests both on and off campus. A sampling of on-campus programs include: Knitting, Science and Art of Craft brewing, Breakout Games, and Yoga. Travel/study projects take students to Australia, China, Ireland, Germany, Japan and other sites around the world. Students also complete internships both locally and around the globe.

The Bonner Scholar program, a service-learning scholarship program that places deserving students in volunteer positions throughout the community.

The Mungo Exchange is a place where students can build upon their liberal arts education by adding professional skills desired by employers and graduate schools. The Mungo Exchange includes the Career Center, whose events, programs and individual meetings are focused on our mission to prepare students for life after Wofford. The Office Entrepreneurship + Innovation serves as the hub and resource center for innovation on Wofford's campus, offering educational opportunities, resources, a community of support and professional connections to innovators and industry experts. International Programs, The Center for Community Based Learning and Undergraduate Research are also in the Mungo Exchange.

Environmental Studies provides a creative and supportive learning environment that helps students pursue their goals in the field of sustainability. It operates both on Wofford's campus and at the college's Goodall Environmental Studies Center at Glendale, S.C. The property where the center is located borders 19 acres of protected green space along Lawson's Fork Creek.

Neuroscience, a program that allows students to examine the nervous system and its regulation of behavior through an experimental approach, is offered

jointly by the Departments of Psychology and Biology.

Computational Science, a fast-growing interdisciplinary field that is at the intersection of the sciences, computer science and mathematics, involves learning to store, retrieve, process and visualize massive amounts of information in web-accessed databases.

The Creative Writing Concentration, a program led by outstanding published faculty authors that provides additional opportunities for students to hone their creative writing skills, earn coveted prizes and become published writers.

The Presidential International Scholar program offers an opportunity for an outstanding, intellectually gifted student to visit developing countries

researching a specific academic area of interest. The student then returns to campus to share his or her experiences.

Presidential Seminar, a weekly seminar for outstanding seniors hosted by Wofford President Nayef H. Samhat. Seminar participants explore interdisciplinary subjects of current significance. The college now has a similar program for juniors.

Liberty Fellowship is a two-year leadership experience for young citizens of South Carolina with exemplary promise for societal achievement. The Liberty Fellowship is offered in partnership with South Carolina businessman Hayne Hipp and the Aspen Institute.

Wofford also has been well represented in minor league baseball. Brandon Waring, Michael Gilmartin, Alex Wilson, Luke Leftwich, Will Stillman, Matt Milburn, Spencer Kulman, Kody Ruedisili, Jacob-Condra Bogan, Adam Scott, Brett Rodriguez, Colin Davis, Hayes Heinecke and Marshall Toole all were with teams in the last ten seasons. John Cornely made his MLB debut with the Atlanta Braves in 2015.

Over the past ten years, Andy Strickland (Atlanta and Jacksonville), Tommy Irvin (Arizona), Pat Illig (Detroit), Kasey Redfern (Jacksonville, San Diego, Detroit and Dallas), Alvin Scioneaux (San Diego), David Marvin (Atlanta), Miles Brown (Arizona), and Jojo Tillery (Tennessee) have been in NFL training camps. Brenton Bersin reached Super Bowl 50 in 2016 with the Panthers. Ameet Pall was the fifth overall pick in the 2012 CFL draft.

Other components of the new facility include a major gift from Toccoa Switzer and In the spring of 2021, Wofford began construction of a new softball facility located near Snyder Field and King Field. The nearly 300 seat facility features recessed dugouts, press box, concession stand and restroom facilities. It was completed in the summer of 2022 and hosted the first game in February of 2024.

Hope Field is named in honor of Hope Filchak, the granddaughter of Maria Bower and Wofford alumnus Tom Bower '74. Hope was born with a rare genetic condition called MLS syndrome, which is lethal in males. The miracle of Hope is that she was born female or else she would not have survived birth.

Hope's syndrome has caused her multiple disabilities, including deaf-blindness and abnormal heart and brain conditions. Doctors said that Hope would "never walk or talk." Hope proved them all wrong as she not only walked and talked but started running, singing, dancing and so much more! She not only wanted to live but she wanted to thrive in life!

Through Hope, her family is acutely aware of the marginalization of the disabled community, a minority group that anyone can become a part of at any time. A little hope goes a long way and our Hope has inspired us to ensure inclusion for all. Our vision is for Hope Field to be a place of belonging where everyone can play and thrive. Go Terriers!

RICHARDSON HALL

In the fall of 2020, first-year students moved into the new, 150-bed Jerome Johnson Richardson Hall, located just across Campus Drive from other first-year residences, Greene Hall and Marsh Hall. The residence hall houses a variety of student activities facilities on its main floor, and will provide beautiful living, fellowship and study areas for students. One wing of student rooms faces Russell C. King Field and Switzer Stadium. Another looks out over Snyder field. Both wings have rooms with views of the courtyard. The building stands on the site where Andrews Field House stood until 2019. Because of its proximity to athletics facilities, the first floor of the building houses baseball and softball locker rooms and offices as well as locker rooms and a shared training facility for men's and women's golf. Richardson Hall is the first student housing built on Wofford's campus since 2011.

LOCKER ROOM

The Terriers have occupied the facility since the softball program's inception. In addition to the locker room, office space for the coaches is also in the building, along with a coaches locker room, officials locker room and laundry facilities. A spacious mud room with cleat and helmet racks, and storage room is also included for the team.

THE JOE E. TAYLOR CENTER

Wofford alumnus and former South Carolina Secretary of Commerce Joe Taylor donated \$1 million for the renovation of the Curry Building into the Joe E. Taylor Athletic Center. The Taylor Center features a 7,000 square foot weight room and offices for athletic department staff. The building, located next to Gibbs Stadium, was completed in June of 2009.

The weight room facility is equipped with a total of 24 racks with built-in pull-up bars and nearly 25,000 pounds of plates, dumbbells and olympic weights. The 24 racks are divided, with twelve used with platforms and twelve used with benches. Additional equipment includes four pulldown machines, four low row machines, six glute/ham machines, two decline ab machines, and a leg press. Also included is a large area of Mondo track flooring, which is used with the step-up boxes, plyo boxes and hurdle sets in speed development.

The Taylor Center also provides offices for administration and several sports, including men's and women's tennis and cross country and track and field. A conference room and several work areas give the coaching staff much needed space. The first floor of the building contains the rifle range, which includes ten lanes with electronic scoring.

THE RICHARDSON BUILDING

The home of the Wofford College Athletic Department since 1996 is the Richardson Physical Activities Building. The facility includes offices for the administration, football, baseball and other sports on the second floor. Also included on the second floor is an aerobic dance room, team meeting room, racquetball courts and a student-athlete lounge. Locker rooms for football, men's and women's cross country/track and field, men's and women's soccer and a training room are located on the first floor.

Wofford alumnus Jerry Richardson made donations in 2008 and 2018 that were used for enhancing the Richardson Building. Numerous improvements were made in the facility to ensure that it is one of the most advanced athletic facilities in the nation.

The most recent renovations to the building include a 1,200 square foot addition to house a new state of the art hydrotherapy suite which includes a Hydroworx aquatic therapy pool with underwater treadmill. The existing training room was relocated to adjoin the new hydrotherapy suite, which results in a much-needed increased size for the new training room. Supporting the training area are three staff offices, exam room, and state-of-the-art x-ray room. The new team meeting room is equipped with the latest video technology and a media backdrop for post-game press conferences.

The existing football locker room was expanded and upgraded. The upgrades included new paint, carpet, ceilings, and lighting. The equipment room has been reconfigured, and a new high-density storage system was purchased to increase capacity and improve efficiency in the handling of equipment. In addition to the visible improvements a new supplemental mechanical unit to control moisture and improve indoor air quality was installed, along with new HVAC controls in the entire building.

With the campus fitness center relocated to the Benjamin Johnson Arena, renovations were also made to the second floor. A second team meeting room was created with sliding glass walls to provide flexibility for a variety of uses. A student-athlete lounge was built near the racquetball courts which includes two 70-inch monitors.

The building also includes the Harley Room, a large multipurpose area overlooking Gibbs Stadium. The area hosts a wide variety of campus events during the year and a new video wall was installed in 2022. On the patio, a sculpture of Jerry Richardson was dedicated on May 12, 2014 to honor him and recognize the 20th anniversary of the Carolina Panthers summer training camp being held on campus. The sculpture, created by noted California artist Todd Andrews, depicts Richardson seeming to be ready to walk over to Gibbs Stadium to watch the Terriers – for which he also played – take on the next worthy opponent.

RICHARDSON INDOOR STADIUM

A new era at Wofford began in 2018 with the opening of the Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium. The new home of basketball and volleyball is adjacent to the north end of Gibbs Stadium, where the Terriers play football.

Wofford alumnus and trustee Jerry Richardson, Class of 1959, provided the gift to fund the facility that includes a 3,400-seat basketball arena and a 350-seat volleyball competition venue as well as offices, locker rooms, meeting rooms, training rooms and special fan areas, including several open-air suites. The facility replaces Benjamin Johnson Arena, which continues to be used as a first-rate gymnasium for intramural and campus recreational activities.

The facility has already been able to attract top opponents for the basketball teams, including South Carolina, North Carolina, Harvard and Georgia Tech. It also hosted the 2023 Southern Conference Volleyball Championship.

The Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium also has a seating capacity for non-athletics functions, such as commencement and concerts, of 4,500. The facility includes "Club 51" for club seat holders, the "Boneyard" lounge in the student section, state of the art sound system and acoustical design, along with electronic charging stations throughout the building.

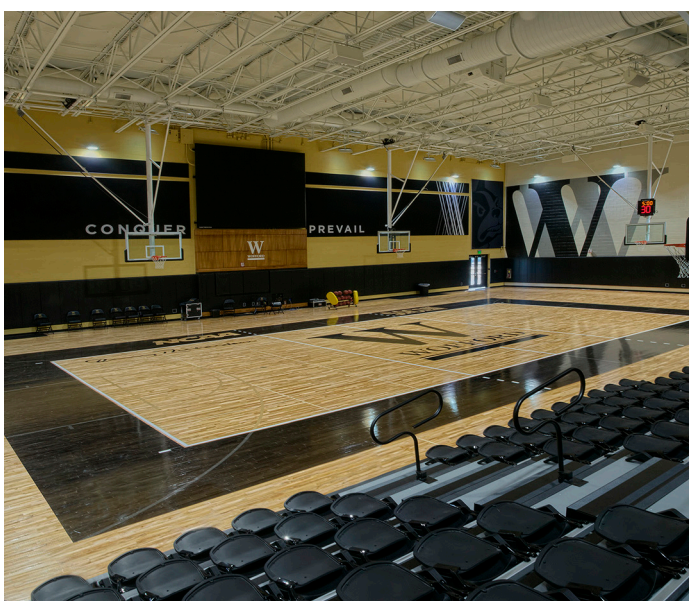

BENJAMIN JOHNSON ARENA

When the campus community bid farewell to the Benjamin Johnson Arena as the home of Wofford basketball and volleyball in 2017, it created new possibilities for student recreation and wellness. The renovated Benjamin Johnson Arena student fitness center opened in January of 2018 as part of the Mungo Student Center.

"The Benjamin Johnson Arena, which opened in 1981, holds a lot of history for Wofford College, and we're glad we are able to continue to use the facility as a larger, better fitness center for our students, faculty and staff," President Nayef Samhat says. "The addition of the new Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium provides us with this terrific opportunity to give our community a place in the Benjamin Johnson Arena to exercise both their bodies and their minds."

The lower level of the arena (once basketball and volleyball courts and bleachers) houses a new multi-sport playing surface with three courts. A walking track surrounds the perimeter of the courts. The locker rooms were completely renovated. The concourse areas have become the new student fitness center with the installation of a variety of equipment and machines.

The east concourse has weight equipment, including free weights, benches and machines. The other concourse has cardio equipment, including treadmills, stationary bikes and elliptical machines. The concourses also have open locker storage and new audio-visual equipment.

In addition to the fitness activities, Benjamin Johnson Arena is home of a comprehensive intramural, recreation, and club sports programs that encompass team sports, individual sports, fitness classes, club sports, as well as various other programs. Highlights include intramural basketball, softball and soccer, equestrian club, men's club lacrosse, club ultimate frisbee and an outdoors club.

The arena is named after Benjamin O. Johnson '30 who was a Spartanburg textile executive associated with Spartan Mills. Mr. Johnson was also a trustee of Wofford College as well as a benefactor. Wofford moved into the Benjamin Johnson Arena in 1981 after playing in adjacent Andrews Field House for 50 years. The \$4.5 million arena is part of the Campus Life Building, which was designed to serve as the center of athletic, social and cultural activity on campus.

The first men's basketball contest was held on January 22, 1981, as The Citadel scored a 65-64 win over Wofford. The Terriers first win in the arena was on January 26, 1981. The men had an overall record of 334-131 in 37 seasons in the facility.

The Wofford women's basketball team fielded its first varsity team in the 1980-81 season, moving into Benjamin Johnson Arena in 1981 after playing in Andrews Fieldhouse for the first half of the season. The first women's basketball game was held on January 22, 1981, with Wofford defeating Sacred Heart 74-25.





The City's origins predate the Revolutionary War. Spartanburg was named for a unit of American Revolution forces called the "Spartan Rifles" who helped defeat the British at the Battle of Cowpens in 1781, under the leadership of General Daniel Morgan.

The town of Spartanburg was incorporated in 1831 and later as a city in 1880 by the 13 Original States and Tennessee. During this time Spartanburg was booming due in large part to the rapidly expanding textile industry.

In the 1870s, Spartanburg became a railroad "hub city," with mainline railroads extending from Magnolia Street depot in all directions, taking passengers and freight to Charleston, Augusta, Atlanta, Asheville, Charlotte and points beyond. As many as 90 trains per day could be seen and heard operating in Spartanburg during the golden age of the American railroad, 1900-20.

During the 1920s, Spartanburg built South Carolina's first municipal airport and claimed the state's first commercial radio station (WSPA). Its leadership in the state was reflected by the election of several residents as governor.

Thousands of U.S. soldiers bound for overseas service in World Wars I and II trained at camps in Spartanburg. The post headquarters for Camp Wadsworth (1917-19) was located at the present site of WestGate Mall, and the Camp Croft (1940-45) was located south of the city.



Much of that military reservation has become Croft State Park.

After World War II, Spartanburg made a concerted effort to promote its location at the junction of Interstates 85 and 26 to international business. One of the greatest successes of this campaign was the development of the BMW manufacturing center near the Greenville-Spartanburg Airport.

Spartanburg's downtown, which always has been anchored by the campuses of Wofford and Converse Colleges, has been undergoing a major revival since the mid-1990s. In addition to the corporate headquarters for Denny's, Advance America, QS-1 and several other companies, the city has acquired a magnificent public library, the Marriott Hotel at Renaissance Park and most recently, the Chapman Arts Center and the USC Upstate George Dean Johnson School of Business. The area surrounding Morgan Square gradually is redeveloping with a variety of interesting restaurants, urban apartment-style housing and a new baseball stadium.

Throughout the 20th century, textile manufacturing



companies formed the backbone of the Spartanburg economy. The most significant of these companies still in operation is internationally respected Milliken & Company.

Blessed by geography and climate as well as by energetic and well-educated citizenry, Spartanburg is emerging as one of the centers of a 21st century metroplex that extends along the South Carolina portion of the I-85 corridor.





WOFFORD TRADITIONS

THE FIRST OF MANY

The first softball team at Wofford took the field in 2024 under the direction of Coach Chelsea Butler. On February 9, the Terriers pulled off their first ever win in program history defeating Robert Morris 3-0. In their second ever game as a program, the young Terriers took the field against Robert Morris in the Terrier Invite, Wofford's first ever hosted tournament. On that magical night, Margaret Axelson took the circle and turned in her best performance of the year, pitching a complete game shutout with only two hits allowed. She did not allow a baserunner past second base in the entire game. The offense took the early lead in the first inning with a Hope Ingle double scoring Wofford's first ever run and recording the Terriers' first ever hit. In the third inning, Havalynn Abernathy would add to the lead blasting Wofford's first ever home run over the right field wall. The Terriers would add another run late thanks to a Hope Ingle walk with the bases loaded to reach the final score of 3-0.

MARK LINE

One of the winningest coaches in Wofford baseball history is Mark Line. He served as head coach from 1985 to 1994, posting a career record of 204-157 for a .564 winning percentage. He was named NAIA District VI Coach of the Year in 1987. In 1990, the Terriers won 30 games for the first time in school history. He served as the Deputy Athletic Director at Wofford before serving at the first head coach of the Wofford softball program during its inception until the hiring of Chelsea Butler. Line currently is an assistant coach for the Terrier softball team as it begins its second season of action.

CHELSEA BUTLER

In 2022, the Terriers hired Chelsea Butler to take over as softball head coach. She pitched for Golden West Junior College earning all-conference recognition before transferring to Eastern Kentucky from 2008-2009 with her senior season highlighted by a 2.32 ERA. Before Wofford, she was on many DI coaching staffs, including Utah State, Temple and Presbyterian. She was an assistant coach at the University of Maryland in 2021 leading the Terapins pitching staff to 3.10 ERA with an opponent batting average of .249 before joining Wofford. Once at Wofford, she over saw many milestones in the inaugural season, guiding the newly formed softball program to a 23-24 record and an 11-10 record in Southern Conference play. She earned the Coach of Year award in the Southern Conference. This is the second time in Wofford's history that such an award was given to a first year head coach and the first ever for Wofford Women's athletics.

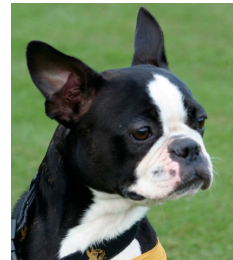
ACES HIGH

The Terriers boasted three pitchers, Margaret Axelson, Abby Greenwood, and Tayven Stephenson, in the top 15 in ERA last year in the Southern Conference. Margaret Axelson was Wofford softball's first ever player of the week award winner, player of the month award winner and the first player to be named All-Southern Conference. She led the Southern Conference in ERA with 2.15, and was ranked sixth in the SoCon in innings pitched with 124. Axelson also compiled three shutouts last year. Abby Greenwood was named to the SoCon All-Freshman Team last

year with a ERA of 2.71 which was third best in the SoCon. She also pitched 139.2 innings last year with 12 complete games. Tayven Stephenson ended the season with a 4-2 record with one shutout and three complete games. Although only playing in 13 games and pitching 47 innings last year, she had the 12th best K/7 in the SoCon with 4.0. All three return this upcoming year to take the circle for the Terriers.

TERRIERS

Wofford's nickname dates back to the early 1910's when Professor E.H. Shuler recalled seeing a terrier named Jack at Wofford baseball games. A cartoon showing a Jack-like dog doing gymnastics appeared in a Wofford Journal about the same time. By 1914, the nickname Terrier was firmly established for the college's athletic teams. Wofford has had a number of real life mascots including Spike in the mid-50s and Jocko in the early 1960s. Most Wofford Terriers have been Boston Terriers which have a smooth black coat with white markings on the face, neck, chest, legs and feet. They usually pack a muscular 20 pounds on a foot-high frame.



BEN WOFFORD

Born on October 19, 1780, Benjamin Wofford rode a Methodist circuit as a lay exhorter in 1806 and 1807 in western Kentucky, but soon returned to South Carolina in that year to marry Anna Todd. With the death of her father in 1809, he inherited control of the Todd family farm in the southern part of Spartanburg County. Ordained in 1814, he served as an itinerant for only three years. A year after the death of Anna Todd Wofford in 1835, he married Maria Barron. His business interests and their diminished enthusiasm for rural life led them to move to the village, at the corner of present-day Magnolia and St. John Streets. There he continued to invest conservatively and live simply until his death on December 2, 1850.

Wofford's will provided \$100,000 for the establishment of a college for literary, classical, and scientific education in Spartanburg, to be under the control and management of the state's Methodist Conference. Within four years of Benjamin Wofford's death, the trustees he named took the money he bequeathed, secured a charter, bought land, built a college and five houses for professors, hired a faculty, and opened its doors.

THE TERRIER SCULPTURE

A sculpture of a Terrier was unveiled on March 25, 2008 outside of the Student Life Building as a gift to Wofford College from the Class of 1956. The following is the text of an address given by Talmage Boyd Skinner, Jr., 1956, Chaplain Emeritus of Wofford College on the dedication.

The mascot of a college should, in large measure, represent the character of the place. In this Palmetto State, we are surrounded by a bevy of mascots. There are Gamecocks and Tigers, Bulldogs and a Rooster named Chanticleer, Indians, Paladins, Cougars, Valkyries, and one school has a sock for an ensign. There are Trojans, Pioneers, and Spartans, and various Cats and feathered creatures. In all the land, only two other schools are Terriers. Some will laugh when we affirm that we are the only true Terriers. Some chuckle when we are audacious enough to claim to be unique and even superior in so many aspects of being a college. The most arrogant of us will admit that there are many good colleges. We have even tried to copy some. I have always been a bit uncomfortable when we talk of another school being a – "flagship" that we need to emulate. Hey! We ARE the flagship! Forgive the pride of some old guys who have loved this little school for over half a century. Yes, we did not come to Wofford just to purchase an education; we joined Wofford. We were adopted into the family with a bond that cannot be broken. Many colleges claim to be family. We truly are.

Ours is a bond of shared experience hammered out on the playing fields against foes our size and those with more students than we have living alumni. It does not stop with athletics. The term "student athlete" has authenticity at Wofford. The bond is from a shared academic experience that is not content just to pass on so-called facts, but prepares students to think and to continue to grow. The "proof of the pudding" is in the doctors, lawyers, college presidents and professors, teachers, coaches, leaders in business and service - even in the ministry of the Church. A bond is created in the experience of the arts - the theater program, choral music, strings. One thing we lack - a band - not just the band class that plays well once or twice a year, but a BAND for spirit and musical experience. A bond is created through service programs and the physical arts witnessed by so many exhibitions on campus. Not the least is a religious life program that is open and tolerant, that walks with students seeking answers and helps them first learn to ask questions.

We, the Class of 1956 present this Terrier to our college as a symbol of Wofford Spirit in all aspects of this place like no other. We want to add to the tradition of this sacred ground. We want to remind the present Wofford that there is a past on which she stands and remind all of us that it all will be forgotten if we do not have a vision for the future. Our goal should be deeper than the usual quest for reputation, wealth, and prestige. Dr. Dunlap has always called Wofford a "kingdom of the just." May that ever be our watchword. It may be a simple, unsophisticated phrase, but we are called not to be powerful, but good. As the prophet Micah said, "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God."

The Class of 1956 proudly and humbly presents this physical representation of the Spirit of Wofford College and all those members of our family who ever lived or presently live on the "City's Northern Border," and all who are yet to dwell in the shadow of the Twin Towers.



2025 SOFTBALL OUTLOOK

This will be the second season under the direction of head coach Chelsea Butler. The team is headlined by three seniors, Hope Ingle, Havalynn Abernathy and Hannah Maddox. The Wofford pitching staff also returns three out of four top pitchers from last season. The staff boasted the second best ERA and WHIP in the SoCon at 2.93 and 1.39, respectively. The rotation is headlined by All-Southern Conference First Team player Margaret Axelson and SoCon All-Freshman player Abby Greenwood, who both look to improve on their 2024 season. Overall, 17 players return to the team from last season when the Terriers tallied a 23-24 overall record in their inaugural season. The roster features five newcomers joining the squad.

PITCHING

The pitching staff includes five total arms, which all throw right-handed. Junior hurler Margaret Axelson leads the dominant pitching staff. The All-SoCon First Teamer led the Southern Conference in ERA (2.15) with a 9-6 record in 124 innings logged. She will be the ace of the roster and look to add to her stellar career this season. Sophomore Abby Greenwood returns after a stellar freshman performance. Snapping up a SoCon All-Freshman Team nod with 139.2 innings pitched, being ranked third in SoCon in ERA with 2.71 and ranked fourth in WHIP with 1.25. She also notched 12 complete games with a 9-15 record. Sophomore Tayven Stephenson looks to carve out a bigger role for herself this season after pitching 47 innings, with a 3.70 ERA. She tossed three complete games with one shutout. Sophomore Sydney Baker appeared in four games in relief last season, pitching a total of 11.2 innings. Wofford welcomes one freshman pitcher this season, Natalya Salo.

CATCHERS

The Terriers have three catchers on the roster. Hope Ingle is a senior who hit .214 in 46 total games played. She led the team in home runs with three, in RBI with 24 and in walks with 27. She was second on the team in hits with 27 and third on the team in slugging percentage with .325. In the field she recorded 103 putouts and 18 assists without making an error.

Olivia Lenzen returns as a sophomore after hitting .240 and slugging .293 as a freshman. She played in 31 games and had 18 hits with four of those being doubles, which tied for second on the team. She is currently training to play first base.

Wofford welcomes one freshman backstop, Lucy Cameron.

INFIELD

The Terriers have nine infielders listed on the roster heading into this year. The infield is still very young with every position filled by either a sophomore or freshman. It is led by the savvy glove of sophomore Kaytlin Greenwood. The Southern Conference All-Freshman Team shortstop hit .195, slugged .285 and had a .287 on-base percentage. She was second on the team in home runs with two as well as scoring 24 runs. Her main value to the team comes from her fielding, where she led the team in assists with 132. She was second on the team in stolen bases with eight last year. To the left manning the hot corner is the speedy Desirae Devine. Desirae played in 40 games last

year and led the team in stolen bases and ranked sixth in the SoCon with 14. She had a .202/.312/.234 triple slash with 15 free passes. She was tied for second in runs scored last season for the team with 18. Kate Platte has the second base spot, she appeared in 21 games last year and led the team in batting average, slugging and on-base percentage with .419/.513/.468, scoring 14 runs with 26 hits in only 62 at-bats last year. Kalli Petty is a sophomore who played 35 games last year, primarily at second base. She batted .211 and was tied for the lead in doubles on the team with five and tied for second on the team in RBI with 14. Sophomore Gracie Parker spent some time at third base and designated hitter. She saw action in 36 games last year, batting .247, scoring 15 runs and receiving 24 free passes. Her .417 OBP was second on the team. Abby Gossett was primarily a designated hitter for the Terriers her freshman year, batting .250 in 26 games played with a .364 on-base percentage. Wofford welcomes three freshman infielders in Brianna Stanley, Rivers Sampson and Maizie Gatlin to the roster.

OUTFIELD

Havalynn Abernathy and Hannah Maddox are the senior leaders of the outfield. Abernathy played in 39 games last year in right field. She hit .283 with a .377 on-base and .402 slugging percentage. She tied for second on the team in hits with 26 and doubles with four. She also holds the honor of being the first person to hit a home run at Hope Field, which she accomplished against Robert Morris on February 9, 2024. Hannah Maddox played in 31 games last year swapping between corner outfield spots. She hit .262, which is third best among returners. She was used sparingly throughout last year, mostly as a utility do it all defender. However, she drove in nine RBI in 42 at-bats. She will be looked to step up as a leader this year in the outfield. Sophomore Meghan Towery has the center field spot for the Terriers. She played in 34

games with a .228 average and 14 RBI en route to a SoCon All-Freshman Team selection. She only made two errors last year, which is fewest among all Terriers in at least 30 games played. Abbi Campbell is a sophomore from Piedmont, South Carolina who currently holds the left field position. She started all 47 games last year and primarily hit in the second spot of the lineup. She had the most hits out of all Terriers with 28, most runs scored with 20 and most plate appearances. She also had the most putouts by a Terrier outfielder last season with 66. Sophomore Bergan Needles played in 25 games last year as a defensive utility player.

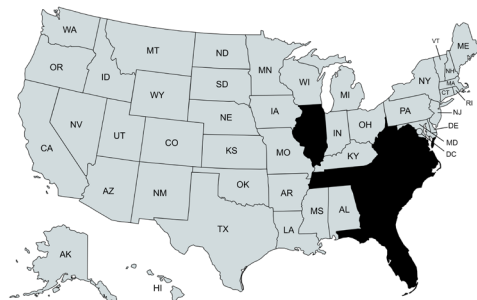

Wofford College announced on May 25, 2022, that Chelsea Butler was named the head coach of the softball program. Butler brings over a decade of experience, both as a collegiate student-athlete and pitching coach, at the Division I level to Wofford.

Butler has spent the previous three seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland, working with the pitching staff. In the 2022 season, Maryland was 29-23 overall and 14-8 in the Big 10. It marked the most wins for the Terps since 2013 and the fifth-place finish was the highest since joining the conference. It was also the first season in which Maryland won a game in the Big Ten tournament. Jaeda McFarland (first team) and Megan Mikami (second team) were named All-Big Ten.

“We are excited to have Chelsea take the helm as we launch our softball team,” said former director of athletics Richard Johnson. “It is important to get things right when you are starting a program. Coach Mark Line has done a great job in laying the foundation and now he is turning it over to Chelsea to continue to build the team. We look forward to seeing them take the field in the spring of 2024.”

“I am thrilled and grateful for the opportunity to build the Wofford softball program,” said Butler. “I want to thank President Nayef Samhat, Athletic Director Richard Johnson, Deputy AD/SWA Elizabeth Rabb and Mark Line for this opportunity and I am incredibly honored by their belief in me. I look forward to not only building this program, but empowering young women to find and be the best version of themselves on the field, in the classroom and in their individual lives. Now and forever, Go Terriers!”

sisted with recruiting at Incarnate Word. She was the associate head coach at Presbyterian College from 2014 to 2018. She was in charge of the pitching staff and designing off-season and in-season workouts, while also serving as the recruiting coordinator. She coached three All-Big South pitchers, 18 NFCA Scholar Athletes, and helped the Blue Hose earn 2015 Big South runner-up honors.

Prior to her time at Presbyterian, Butler spent one season at Temple. While with the Owls, she oversaw the pitching staff and designing off-season and in-season workouts. Additionally, she coordinated several in-game aspects, including pitch calling and charting. Butler also served as the recruiting coordinator and, as the first assistant, handled travel logistics and other duties.

Butler joined Temple after spending the 2013 season at Utah State, where she worked primarily with the pitchers. While with the Aggies, she was also responsible for scouting reports and served as the recruiting coordinator.

Before Utah State, Butler was an assistant coach at her alma mater, Eastern Kentucky, during 2012. While there, she was responsible for the pitchers and recruiting. Her first coaching

experience as an assistant coach with the USA Athletics 18 gold team in Southern California.

As a player, Butler played two seasons at Golden West Junior College. As a sophomore there, she posted a 21-13 record with a 1.35 ERA and 170 strikeouts in 231.2 innings of work. She earned first team all-conference recognition and was an all-tournament selection. Butler then was a two-year pitcher (2008-09) for Eastern Kentucky. Her career was highlighted by a standout senior season in which she posted a 2.32 ERA.

A native of southern California, Butler earned a degree in sociology from Eastern Kentucky in 2009. She added a Masters of Arts in Coaching and Athletic Administration from Concordia

Kara Shutt joined the Terrier softball staff as an assistant coach in July of 2022 after two seasons with Mississippi. She enters her second season on staff in 2025 after being elevated to associate head coach in January 2025.

“First and foremost, Kara is a wonderful human being who exemplifies high character and a positive demeanor on and off the field,” said Butler. “Kara has had the opportunity to learn from some of the best coaches in our game, and I know that her experiences, paired with her own coaching philosophies, will allow Kara to continue to shine. I am thrilled that Kara has decided to join our Wofford Softball family, and I know that our athletes are going to love being around her and learning from her.”

Shutt spent two seasons as a volunteer assistant with Ole Miss from 2021-22 in which she helped the Rebels to a 41-19 campaign that concluded in the Los Angeles Regional Final of the NCAA Tournament in 2022. With Shutt on the staff, Ole Miss posted its fourth-ever 40-win season, and the 39 regular season wins tied for the program record. Her first season in Oxford in 2021 saw the Rebels post a 36-22 record with an appearance in the Tucson Regional, also advancing the finals.

Before joining the Rebel staff, Shutt was a graduate manager at another SEC program with South Carolina. The Gamecocks posted a record over .500 each of Shutt’s two seasons in Columbia, the first of which in 2019 saw South Carolina advance to the finals of the Tallahassee Regional in a 38-19 campaign. The Gamecocks touted a 17-6 clip in 2020 before the season’s untimely end due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Shutt was a key player on the Elon Phoenix as an All-American and three-time All-

CAA First Team selection. The outfielder placed on the All-Colonial Athletic Association First Team in each of her final three seasons, and her senior campaign in 2018 was capped with an NFCA All-American Third Team nod and her second NFCA All-Region First Team selection. With 63 career doubles, Shutt is both the Elon and CAA all-time career leader. With 21 doubles in 2016, she set a single-season program record that she replicated in her senior season. Shutt hit .425 as a senior to set the Elon Division I program record for a season. A career .373 hitter, Shutt finished second on the Elon all-time hits leaderboard with 253.

As a freshman, Shutt wasted no time making her presence felt in the Phoenix lineup in 2015, driving in 44 RBI to set the record for most in a season by a freshman and finish second in the program’s single-season record books. With a .331 average, Shutt earned CAA All-Rookie Team and Third-Team NFCA All-Region honors.

A native of Greensboro, N.C., Shutt graduated from Elon with a bachelor’s degree in sport management in 2018 and earned her master’s degree in the same field from South Carolina in 2020.

Mark Line has been a leader on campus for over 30 years, first as the baseball coach and then as an administrator. He joined the athletic department administrative staff in July 2003 in the role of associate athletic director for internal operations and sports programs. He was promoted to senior associate athletic director in 2012 and was named the Deputy Athletic Director in March of 2017.

In July of 2021, he was named the inaugural coach of the softball program. He served as the head coach for a year and recruited the first class of student-athletes who arrived on campus in the fall of 2022. He remains on staff as an assistant coach to Chelsea Butler.

A 1977 graduate of Erskine, he earned a masters degree from Western Kentucky. Line posted a 210-158 record (.571) in 10 years as the Terriers baseball coach (1986-95). He received District Coach of the Year honors in his second season as the 1987 squad put together as a 23-11 mark. Wofford then set a single-season school record for victories the following campaign with a 27-12 record. It marked the first time Wofford qualified for postseason play in consecutive seasons. Line's 1991 team established another Terrier mark for wins with a 30-9 record.

Line was selected as a 2004 inductee into Wofford's Athletic Hall of Fame. The first-base dugout at Russell C. King Field, the Terriers' on-campus baseball facility, is named in his honor.

Line has served as chairman of the physical education department since 1988. Following the 1995 season, Line accepted a role as associate dean of students in the Wofford student af-

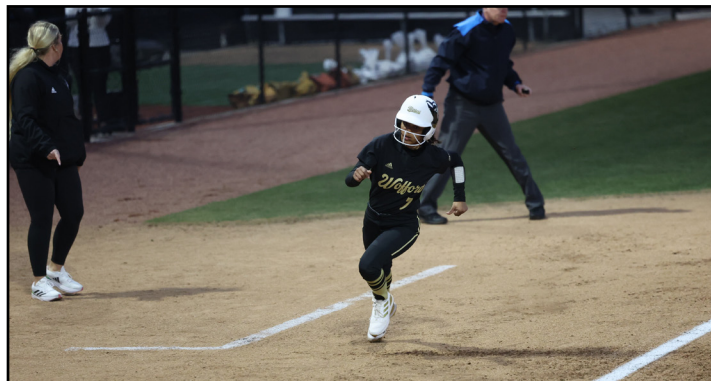

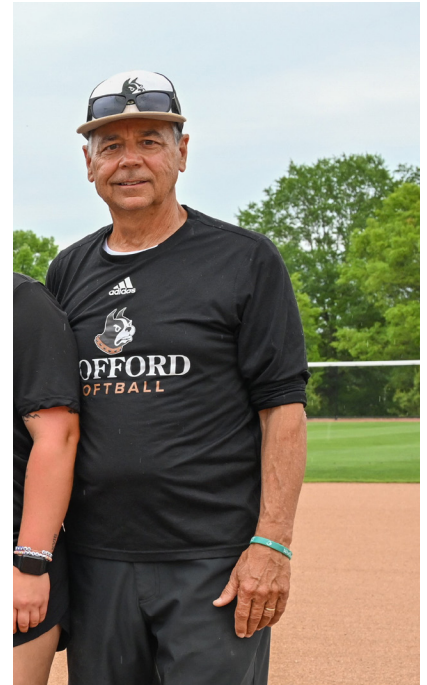

DR. NAYEF SAMHAT

PRESIDENT

Nayef H. Samhat, the 11th president of Wofford College, is a native of Detroit, Michigan. He holds a B.A. in international affairs from The George Washington University's School of International and Public Affairs, a master's degree in international affairs from Columbia University and a Ph.D. in political science from Northwestern University.

The Wofford College Board of Trustees elected Samhat as president of the college on Tuesday, May 14, 2013. He began his duties at Wofford on July 1, 2013.

Samhat came to Wofford in July 2013 after serving as provost and professor of political science and international studies at Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio. Prior to his time at Kenyon, he was the Frank B. and Virginia B. Hower Associate Professor of Government and International Studies and an associate dean at Centre College in Danville, Kentucky.

Since taking office at Wofford, Samhat has led the college through two strategic visioning processes, including the latest to address justice, equity, diversity and inclusion on campus. A record \$470 million comprehensive fund-raising campaign, including endowment growth of over \$250 million (the total is now more than \$400 million), concluded in 2021. He has overseen the renovation or construction of 11 campus facilities, the re-evaluation of the general education curriculum, an increased engagement with the Spartanburg community, including new initiatives in Spartanburg's northside neighborhood, SACSCOC reaccreditation, and new marketing and branding initiatives as well as many other plans, programs and grants designed to build community, boost sustainability, champion the liberal arts and enhance the educational experience for students.

He serves on the executive committee of the Annapolis Group of Liberal Arts Colleges. Past national service includes the boards of the Council of Independent Colleges national board of directors, the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU) and the NCAA Division I board of directors and board of governors, which also included service on the NCAA Division I Presidential Forum and as a mentor for the NCAA Pathway Program. He also was chairman of the Southern Conference Council of Presidents in 2015-16.

His academic interests include international relations theory, international political economy and the politics of the Middle East, especially international relations in the Middle East. He has contributed articles, papers, reviews and essays on these and other topics. Samhat is also a staunch advocate of the liberal arts educational experience and has been a national presenter, panelist and commentator on the subject.

Samhat is married to Prema Samhat. They have three daughters, Alia, Jehan and Leila, and three grandsons.

SCOTT KULL

ROBERT D. ATKINS '65 DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Scott Kull was named Wofford College director of athletics, effective April 1, 2024. Kull previously served as the deputy athletics director for external affairs and executive director of the athletics foundation at University of North Carolina Charlotte. He has held similar positions at the University of Utah, University of South Florida, Florida State and Texas Christian University. His career has also taken him to the University of Florida and Georgia Tech.

A proven fundraiser, Kull has over 30 years of experience in intercollegiate athletics, including work in strategic planning, student-athlete wellbeing, athletics marketing and media relations, departmental leadership, financial affairs, compliance and risk management, corporate sponsorship, licensing, ticket sales, emerging technologies and facilities and event management. In 2019, he was recognized by the Sports Business Journal as a "power player."

Before Charlotte, Kull was at the University of Utah, where he served as Deputy Athletics Director for External Affairs since 2018. While with the Utes, he achieved the largest gift in athletics history, oversaw a development team that achieved record giving and attracted \$51 million in gifts for a football stadium renovation. That team also secured \$4 million in gifts towards a gymnastics practice facility. In addition, Kull contributed to NIL education and revenue initiatives for the department.

He also oversaw marketing, television, media relations, licensing, multi-media rights and digital and creative media. He created a digital and creative department and handled revenue contracts including stadium pouring rights, official footwear and apparel, merchandise, website, multimedia and PAC-12 television. He served as the sport administrator for men's basketball, gymnastics and lacrosse and led searches for the head men's basketball coach and head men's lacrosse coach.

Prior to his time at Utah, Kull was Deputy Athletics Director for External Operations and Associate Vice President for Development at South Florida from 2016-2018. During his tenure, he also served as Acting Athletics Director. He led efforts to secure \$53 million in future athletics revenue and oversaw a staff that achieved a 300% increase in fundraising from 2016 to 2017. Their efforts were instrumental in USF reaching its goal of \$1 billion in the Unstoppable Campaign.

Likewise, he oversaw external relations, including revenue contracts for concessions, pouring rights, AAC television, website, licensing, apparel and merchandise. He served on search committees to hire head coaches in football, men's basketball, baseball, women's golf and men's tennis.

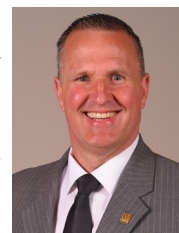
As the Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Operations at TCU from 2005-2016, he served as a member of the Executive Leadership Team for Strategic Planning & Management. He was a member of the development team that raised \$260 million for Capital Projects over eight years, including \$164 million for football stadium renovations and \$72 million for basketball arena renovations.

Among his duties in external operations, he oversaw a 12-year, \$40 million agreement with IMG for sponsorship and media rights. He was also instrumental in procuring video boards and LED displays for several athletic facilities. He partnered with coaching staffs to effectively administer men's basketball, swimming and diving, golf, track and field and cross country.

He was General Manager and Associate AD with Host Communications at Florida State University from 1999 to 2005 and served as Director of Marketing for the Seminoles from 1997-99. He got his start at Florida, where he was a graduate assistant in the athletics ticket office from 1992-93. He also served as a Marketing Assistant at Georgia Tech (1993-94) and as an Assistant Director of Marketing at Ohio State from 1994-97.

A 1990 graduate of Otterbein College, where he played football and threw the javelin, Kull received his Master of Arts in Sport Management from Ohio State University in 1992.

Raised in Old Town, Maine and Claremont, N.H., Kull enjoys travel, cycling and has competed in the Ironman Triathlon. His community involvement includes the United Way, the Live Thankfully program and Habitat for Humanity.



DR. JAMEICA HILL

FACULTY ATHLETIC REPRESENTATIVE

Dr. Jameica Hill, Associate Provost for Administration and Professor of Chemistry, is in her 18th year as the Faculty Athletic Representative (FAR). Dr. Hill represents Wofford to the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Southern Conference. She is responsible for certifying the eligibility of student-athletes and assuring integrity in the eligibility process. In addition to supervising athletics policies, the FAR also serves as a liaison between the faculty and the student athletes, looking out for their individual well-being with regard to academics and athletics. She served as the President of the Southern Conference from 2017 to 2019 and is currently chair of the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship Committee.

Hill, a native of Due West, S.C. and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, earned her Ph.D. degree in inorganic chemistry at Clemson University, where she was a Graduate Teaching Assistant of the Year. She received Wofford's 1995 Martin Luther King Jr. Humanitarian Award and was also an associate director for a summer science program that was funded by a grant from the Howard Hughes Medical Center.

Hill's interest in athletics has been a lifelong one. Her father was a high school coach, and she participated in many different sports (including being named a SC All-State point guard and playing in the North/South game).

A 1988 graduate of Wofford, Hill was a cheerleader for the football and basketball teams as a student. Her husband, Jason Hill '89, is a former Wofford quarterback and assistant coach. Their daughter Shelby graduated from Clemson University and earned a Ph.D. in chemistry at Southern California, while their son Jason '19 played football at Wofford.



ELIZABETH RABB

DEPUTY AD / SWA

Elizabeth Rabb is in her 23rd year as a member of the Wofford athletic department. In August of 2019 she was named deputy athletic director. Her responsibilities include covering the areas of compliance, advancement, media relations, video services and ticketing. She took on the role of senior woman administrator in September of 2015. Prior to moving to deputy athletic director, she served as associate athletic director for compliance and also provided oversight for the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

In addition, she is the sport supervisor for men's and women's tennis, volleyball, women's lacrosse and men's and women's golf. In July of 2011, she ended a three-year term as a member of the NCAA's Administration Cabinet and is currently serving on the NCAA Division I Council along with the NCAA Nominating Committee. BRENT WILLIAMSON

ASSOCIATE AD FOR ATHLETIC COMMUNICATIONS

Brent Williamson joined the Wofford staff in September of 2007. After eight years as Assistant Athletic Director for Media Relations, he was named Associate Athletic Director in September of 2015. He came to Wofford after spending four years as the Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations at the University of Maine.

He is responsible for the athletic communications operations for all 20 sports in the Wofford College Athletic Department and is the primary contact for football, men's and women's tennis, and cross country/track and field. He oversees all department publications, statistics, news releases, the department's website "woffordterriers.com," and social media outlets. Overall, he



has worked with five NCAA Tournament teams in men's basketball and nine NCAA FCS playoff teams in football. The 2013 football media guide was named "Best in the Nation" by CoSIDA, the 2021 baseball media guide was second in the nation and the 2021 football media guide was third in the nation. He also oversees the marketing and promotion of all Wofford sports.

In four years at Maine, Williamson oversaw the media relations for nineteen sports. He was the primary contact for the men's ice hockey team, which advanced to three NCAA Frozen Fours. He worked with six All-Americans and a Hobey Baker Finalist, along with several future NHL players and two Stanley Cup Champions. At Maine he also oversaw the development and production of a bi-weekly television show, The Black Bear Insider, along with other special projects.

Prior to Maine, he spent eight years working in media relations in the National Football League. After two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons, he joined the Jacksonville Jaguars in 1997. In 2002, he was named Director of Media Relations for the Houston Texans. He assisted in the media relations operations at four Super Bowls.

A native of Taylors, S.C., Williamson graduated from Wake Forest University in 1994 with a bachelors degree in history. He added a masters of sports management from the University of Richmond in 1996. His grandfather, W.S. Williamson, graduated from Wofford College in 1932.

RYAN PRICE

ASSOCIATE AD FOR BUSINESS/ OPERATIONS

After spending two seasons with the Wofford baseball team, Ryan Price moved to administration on September 1, 2014, to assist in internal operations. He was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director for Business and Finance in the spring of 2017 and Associate Athletic Director in November of 2021. In addition to assisting the Athletic Director with special projects, Price is responsible for controlling all sport budgets, departmental invoices, and expense reports. He added responsibilities overseeing operations in February of 2024. He is the sport supervisor for the 2024 SoCon tournament champion baseball team, along with softball and cross country/track and field.

Price joined the Terriers in October of 2012 as an assistant baseball coach. In his first season on the staff, the team led the Southern Conference and the nation with 163 stolen bases and was 18th in the nation in sacrifice bunts. In 2014, the team set a school record for wins in a season and reached the Southern Conference Tournament semifinals.

Prior to joining the Terriers he was an assistant coach and coordinator of baseball operations at The College of Saint Rose. He also served as an athletic department assistant. A three-time Northeast-10 Conference All-League outfielder at The College of Saint Rose, he was also a three-time Northeast-10 Academic All-Conference pick who made 174 starts.

A native of Binghamton, New York, Price received his bachelor's degree in sport management and mathematics from The College of Saint Rose in 2010 and added a master of business administration in 2011.



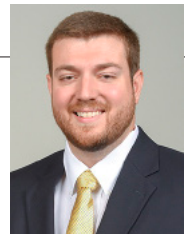
SAM KEENAN

SPORTS MEDICINE

Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System's Sports Medicine Institute is the official sports medicine provider of Wofford College athletics. By partnering with the Sports Medicine Institute, Wofford student-athletes have access to all the services and specialties of a teaching hospital as well as a Level 1 trauma center at Spartanburg Medical Center. This includes specialty physicians, diagnostic testing such as MRI and CT, pharmacy services, drug testing and nutritional counseling.

With the opening of Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium in the fall of 2017 and the renovations of the Richardson Building in the summer of 2018, the Wofford College Athletic Training staff has two new on-campus facilities.

The athletic training area in Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium is used for men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's lacrosse, and men's and women's golf. This location will also be the primary area for physical therapy with a Biodex machine and treadmill. The area includes two offices, an exam room, and a wet area with two Grimm CRYOtherm hot/cold soaking tubs.

In the Richardson Building, the athletic training room is primarily for football, men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's cross country and track and field. A 1,200 square foot addition houses a new state of the art hydrotherapy suite which includes two Grimm CRYOtherm hot/cold soaking tubs and a Hydroworx aquatic therapy pool with underwater treadmill, resistance jet technology, and an underwater camera for detailed observations and feedback to the trainers and athletes. The existing training room was relocated to adjoin the new hydrotherapy suite, which results in a much-needed increased size for the new training room. Supporting the training area are three staff offices, exam room, x-ray room, and storage room.



WILL CHRISTMAN

DIRECTOR OF SPORTS MEDICINE

Will Christman is in his 16th season at Wofford and was named Director of Sports Medicine in 2016. He joined the Terriers in 2008 after working for two years at Furman University. He oversees the athletic training room and assists with the football team. The football team has won five Southern Conference titles during his tenure.

At Furman, Christman worked with men's basketball and men's and women's golf in addition to assisting with football. During the 2005 season he interned with the Buffalo Bills. He was a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech for two years while earning his masters degree at Georgia State. In 2002, he was a season-long intern for the Carolina Panthers and also worked for the Panthers during the 2001 training camp at Wofford. In addition, he has spent time as an athletic trainer at Wingate University, South Carolina, and Dreher High School.

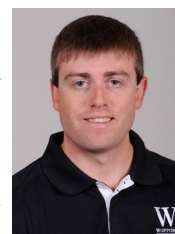

The Southern Conference, which enters its 104th year in 2024-25, is a national leader in emphasizing the development of the student-athlete and in helping to build lifelong leaders and role models.

The Southern Conference has been on the forefront of innovation and originality in developing creative solutions to address issues facing intercollegiate athletics. From establishing the first postseason college basketball tournament (1921), to tackling the issue of freshman eligibility (1922), to developing women's championships (1984), to becoming the first conference to install the 3-point goal in basketball (1980), the Southern Conference has been a pioneer.

The Southern Conference is the nation's fifth-oldest NCAA Division I collegiate athletic association. Only the Big Ten (1896), the Missouri Valley (1907), the Pac-12 (1915) and the Southwestern Athletic (1920) conferences are older in terms of origination.

Academic excellence has been a major part of the Southern Conference's tradition. Hundreds of Southern Conference student-athletes have been recognized on CoSIDA Academic All-America and all-district teams. A total of 20 Rhodes Scholarship winners have been selected from conference institutions, most recently in 2012-13, when former Wofford volleyball player Rachel Woodlee earned the prestigious award.

The conference currently consists of 10 members in six states throughout the Southeast and sponsors 20 varsity sports and championships that produce participants for NCAA Division I Championships.

The Southern Conference offices are located in the historic Beaumont Mill in Spartanburg, South Carolina. A textile mill that was in operation from 1880 until 1999, Beaumont Mill was renovated in 2004 and today offers the league first-class meeting areas and offices as well as a spacious library for storage of the conference's historical documents.

MEMBERSHIP HISTORY

On Feb. 25, 1921, representatives from 14 of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association's (SIAA) 30 members met at Atlanta's Piedmont Hotel to establish the Southern Intercollegiate Conference. On hand at the inaugural meeting were officials from Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn), Clemson, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology (Georgia Tech), Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi A&M (Mississippi State), North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Polytechnic Institute (Virginia Tech) and Washington & Lee.

Dr. S.V. Sanford of Georgia was chosen as acting chairman and N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee was named secretary. The

decision to form a new athletic conference was motivated by the desire to have a workable number of conference games for each league member. With 30 schools in the SIAA by the early 1920s, it was impossible to play every school at least once during the regular season and many schools went several years between playing some conference members. In addition, in 1920, the SIAA voted down proposed rules that an athlete must be in a college a year before playing on its teams and refused to abolish a rule permitting athletes to play summer baseball for money.

Play began in the fall of 1921, and a year later, six more schools joined the fledgling league, including Tulane (which had attended the inaugural meeting but had elected not to join), Florida, Louisiana (LSU), Mississippi, South Carolina and Vanderbilt. VMI joined in 1923 and Duke was added in 1929.

By the 1930s, membership in the Southern Conference had reached 23 schools. C.P. "Sally" Miles of Virginia Tech, president of the Southern Conference, called the annual league meeting to order on Dec. 9, 1932, at the Farragut Hotel in Knoxville, Tennessee. There, it announced that 13 institutions west and south of the Appalachian Mountains were reorganizing as the Southeastern Conference. Members of the new league included Alabama, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Florida, Georgia, Georgia School of Technology, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Mississippi A&M, University of the South, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.

According to the minutes of the meeting, Georgia's Dr. Sanford stated that the division was made along geographical lines. Florida's Dr. J.J. Tigert, acting as spokesman for the withdrawing group, regretted the move but believed it was necessary as the Southern Conference had grown too large. The resignations were accepted and the withdrawing schools formed the new league, which began play in 1933.

The Southern Conference continued with membership of 10 institutions, including Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina, Virginia, VMI, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee.



The Southern Conference office is located in the refurbished Beaumont Mill in Spartanburg, less than a mile from the Wofford campus.



The second major shift occurred some 20 years later. By 1952, the Southern Conference included 17 colleges and universities. Another split occurred when seven schools – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest – departed to form the Atlantic Coast Conference, which began play in 1953. The revamped Southern Conference included members The Citadel, Davidson, Furman, George Washington, Richmond, VMI, Virginia Tech, Washington & Lee, West Virginia and William & Mary.

A third major shift occurred in 2012-13, when five members announced their departures and three schools were added. College of Charleston announced its decision to leave for the Colonial Athletic Association following the 2012-13 season, while Appalachian State (Sun Belt), Davidson (Atlantic 10), Elon (Colonial) and Georgia Southern (Sun Belt) announced they would depart following the 2013-14 campaign. At the Southern Conference's 2013 spring meetings in Hilton Head Island, South Carolina, the league officially extended invitations to former members ETSU and VMI, as well as Mercer, to join the league for the 2014-15 academic year.

Today, the league continues to thrive with a membership that includes 10 institutions and a footprint that spans six states: Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. Current league members are The Citadel, ETSU, Furman, Mercer, UNCG, Samford, Chattanooga, VMI, Western Carolina and Wofford.

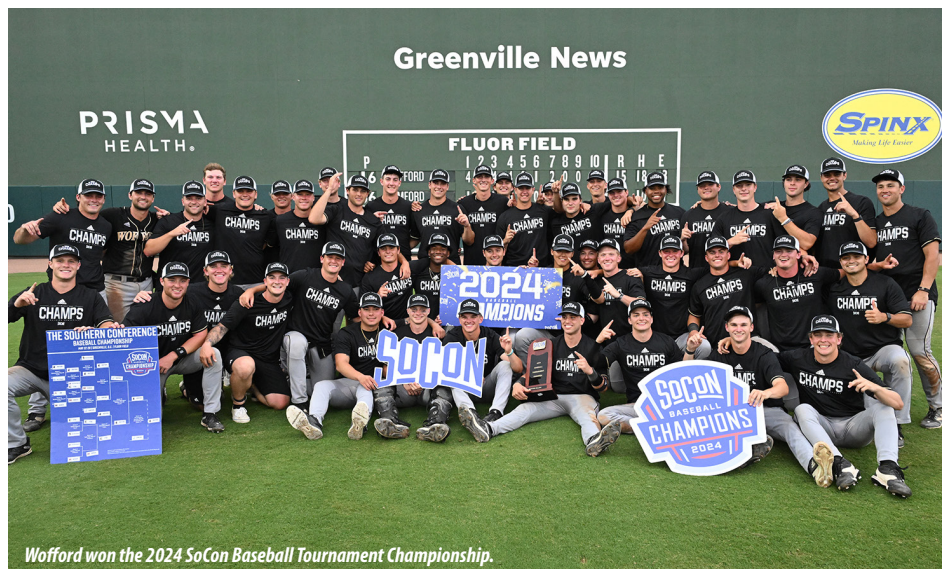
CHAMPIONSHIPS

Men's basketball was the first sport in which the conference held a championship. The league tournament is the nation's oldest, with the inaugural championship held in 1921 at Atlanta's City Auditorium and won by Kentucky. The tournament began Feb. 25, the same day that members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association met to discuss forming the new league that would become the Southern Conference. The following year, North Carolina won the first tournament after the formation of the league.

Commissioner Germann spearheaded the Southern Conference's expansion to include women's athletics during the 1983-84 season. That year, league women's championships were held in volleyball, basketball and tennis.

The Southern Conference declares champions in 11 men's

sports – football, soccer, cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, wrestling, baseball, lacrosse, tennis and golf – and 10 women's sports – soccer, volleyball, cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, tennis, golf, and softball. Rifle is a mixed sport.

At the end of the last academic year, there were approximately 2,000 four-year colleges in the United States. Only 290 of them have the right to induct their graduates into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's most prestigious liberal arts honor society. There are six private Phi Beta Kappa colleges and universities in the Carolinas: Wofford, Davidson, Duke, Elon, Furman and Wake Forest.

Founded at the College of William and Mary in December 1776, Phi Beta Kappa was the first of the Greek letter fraternities and adopted such rituals as the badge, the secret oath, and the special handclasp from the various secret societies of the day.

Phi Beta Kappa, however, was also devoted to the principles of "friendship, morality, and literature (or learning)," and these characteristics gradually attained the greatest emphasis. John Quincy Adams, Edward Everett and Joseph Story, members of the Harvard chapter, are credited with making the fraternity a public literary and honor society for undergraduates in the 1830's. Women were first admitted to Phi Beta Kappa in 1875 at the University of Vermont.

Wofford received its chapter at the 1940 triennial meeting, bringing to fruition more than ten years of work by three Phi Beta Kappa members who were then serving on the faculty: President Henry Nelson Snyder, Dr. David Duncan Wallace, class of 1894, and Dr. John West Harris '16, a brash and brilliant young English professor not afraid to campaign vigorously in the conviction that his alma mater deserved membership. (Dr. Harris later founded the National Beta Club, which still has its headquarters in Spartanburg).

Phi Beta Kappa today sponsors numerous programs to encourage scholarship and learning, including the Phi Beta Kappa Book Awards and the visiting scholar, academic fellowship and leadership programs.

For these reasons, Phi Beta Kappa Day at Wofford has institutional significance, as well as being especially memorable for the new members, each of whom will receive the traditional Phi Beta Kappa watch key or pin.



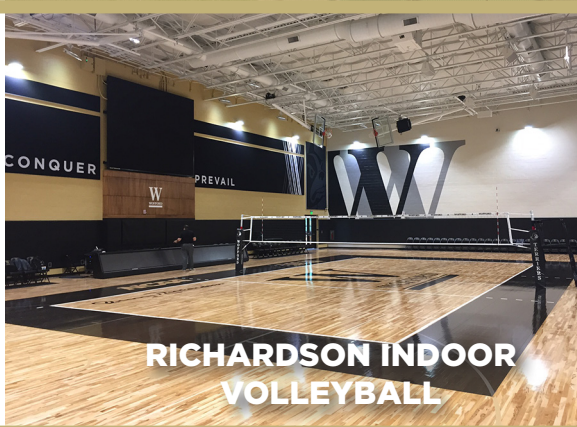

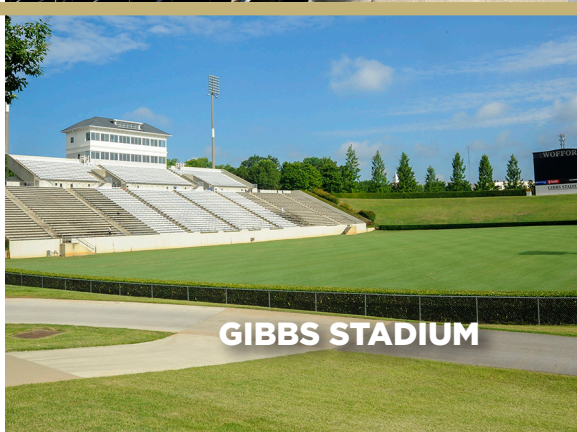
