THE AUBURN PROGRAM

When swimmers come into the Auburn program, they do not just improve, but they flourish.

Headed by Olympian Brett Hawke, along with assistants Richard Long, Aaron Ciarla, Carrie McCambridge and Paul Yetter, the Auburn coaching staff works every day in refining technique in strokes, starts, turns and underwater work.

The work in the pool is coupled with the dry land workouts in the fall and weight training with strength and conditioning coach Bryan "PK" Karkoska. Working through PK's dryland training, Auburn swimmers are physically prepared for the training necessary to challenge for a championship every year.

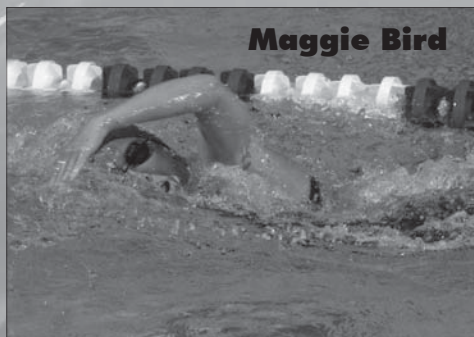

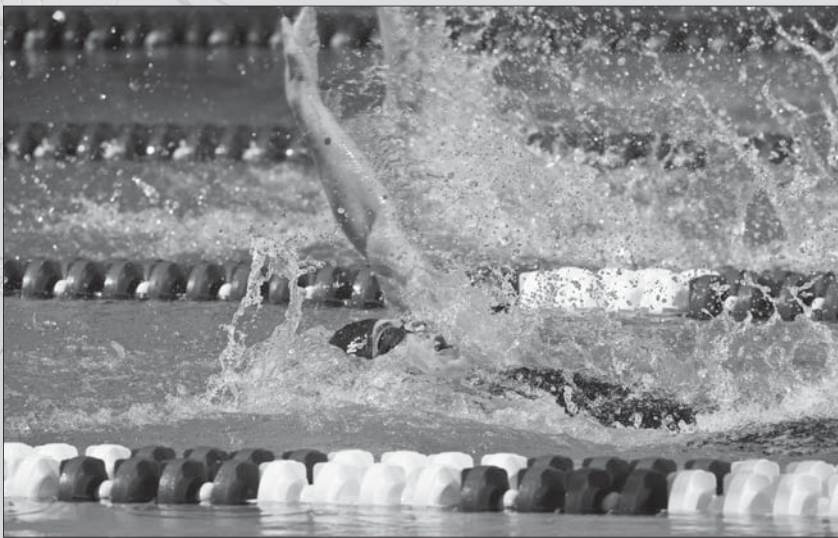

Charlotte G. Lowder Student Athlete Development Center

The Charlotte G. Lowder Student Athlete Development Center, with 33,000 square feet of dedicated space to students and learning, gives Auburn University the physical infrastructure that allows the ability to implement and expand the array of programs designed to enhance the academic performance of Auburn student-athletes. Located adjacent to the Auburn Athletic Complex, the facility is centrally located for easy access for all Tiger athletic teams.

The goals of the Charlotte G. Lowder Student Athlete Development Center are to create an opportunity for one-stop learning for all services including academic counseling, life skills, and tutorial services; to utilize the technology available to support academic missions; and to create a showplace that honors achievements of student-athletes. In addition, programs are designed to develop leadership skills and a strong altruistic attitude, which are fundamental characteristics of the Auburn graduate.

Within the walls of the center are the Academic Hall of Honor designed by Auburn student-athletes, two "smart" classrooms with new and innovative technology that hold 50 people per room, seven counselor offices as well as administrative support, the PAW (Promoting Academic Winners) office, Operation Follow-Through, the Student Athletic Advisory Committee office, 40 four-person tutorial rooms, a library resource area, a soft-study lounge, a 25-station computer classroom, the student "Cantina" for snacks and beverages and the tutor coordinator office.

The construction of the Student Athlete Development Center was made possible by the generosity of Robert and Charlotte Lowder and from the Lowder Family Foundation. Student-Athlete Support Services

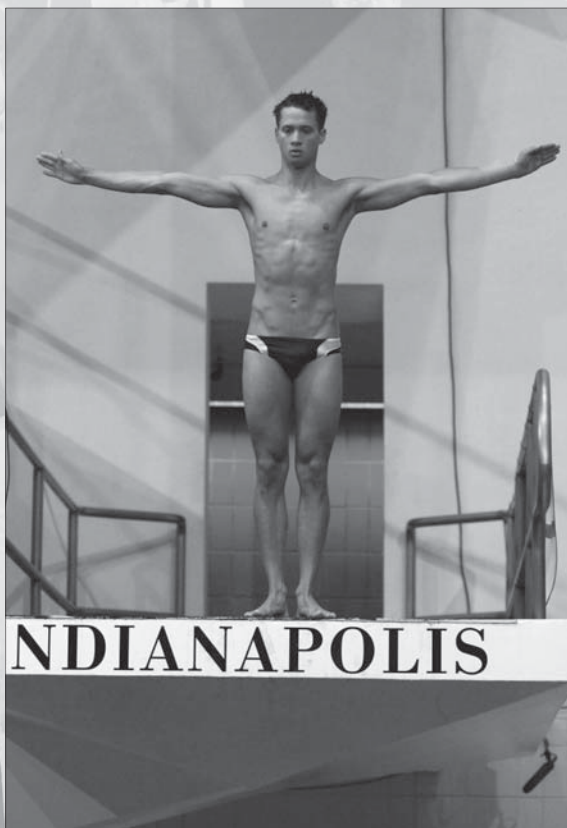

AUBURN UNIVERSITY

Auburn's beautiful main campus--graced by greenery and open spaces and highlighted by historic Samford Park--is made up of 375 buildings spread across 1,875 acres. Buildings in the main campus area are within walking distance of each other. Residence halls are only a short walk from classrooms, dining and athletic facilities. Auburn is located in the Southeastern United States in east-central Alabama about 30 miles from the Georgia border.

- AU has been ranked in the top 50 of public institutions for the past 15 years by U.S. News & World Report, is among the top 15 percent of colleges ranked by the Princeton Review, and has academic programs that score high in national surveys.
- AU invests in extensive national assessments to obtain quality, data-driven information for measuring and continually improving instruction and student preparation.
- More than 92 percent of our students and more than 95 percent of our alumni say that if they could start college over again, they would choose Auburn.
- A 2005 Harvard survey ranked AU as one of the top six colleges and universities in the country as a place for young faculty to work, which has a lot to do with actively engaging students.
- AU is the only university in the country to offer an undergraduate degree in wireless engineering, and the first in the Southeast to offer degrees in software engineering.
- AU's Draughon Library is the largest library in the state, with 2.9 million volumes. The library subscribes to 19,000 journals and 256 electronic databases, provides library instruction and tours to students, prospective students and parents, and serves as an instructional resource for faculty.





Auburn People

Auburn faculty and alumni are world-class achievers in practically every arena. Here are just a few examples:

- AU has graduated more than 210,000 students since it began in 1856. Currently, we have more than 193,000 alumni living around the world.
- There are more than 94 Auburn clubs around the country who have raised more than \$220,000 for scholarships. Two clubs have endowments of more than \$100,000 and the Alumni Association Endowment stands at more than \$2.3 million.
- The Student Alumni Association, with membership of 2,700 students, recently established a student scholarship for its rising senior members.

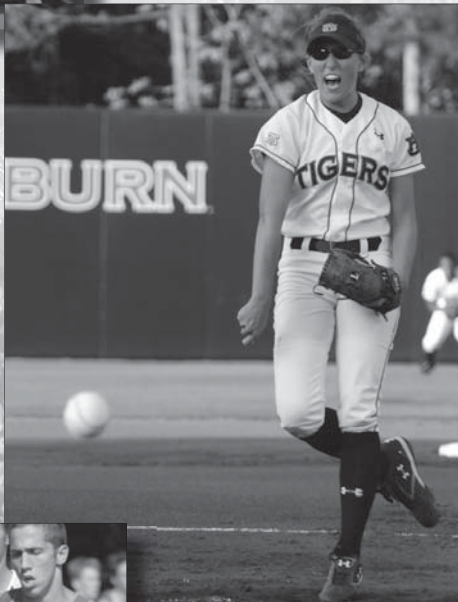

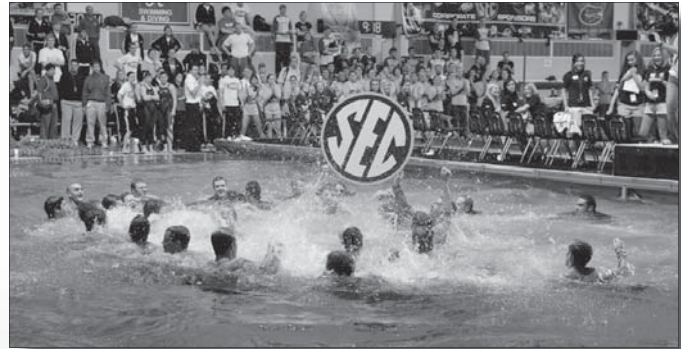

Auburn's Eagles

For over 100 years, eagles have been associated with Auburn University's football program. From a static presence on the sidelines to rousing flights over the field, WAR EAGLE has become an Auburn icon.

The role of Auburn University's eagles is to promote wildlife conservation as a part of the education initiatives of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the College of Veterinary Medicine's Southeastern Raptor Center. The USF&WS permits the Raptor Center to house eagles and use them on hundreds of educational presentations each year – including Auburn's home football games. Currently, three flighted eagles and numerous other non-releasable raptors are used for these educational programs. Eagles stir emotions in many people as they have come to symbolize strength, power and courage as well as other important values such as freedom, American heritage and the preservation of our environment. Golden Eagles Tiger (War Eagle VI), Nova (War Eagle VII) and Spirit (a Bald Eagle) are the eagles who have inspired football fans with their graceful flights over Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Jay GOGUE

President

Jay Gogue began his tenure as Auburn University's 18th president on July 16, 2007.

The Waycross, Ga., native is a two-time Auburn graduate in horticulture, receiving a bachelor's degree in 1969 and a master's in 1971. In 1973, he earned a doctorate in horticulture from Michigan State University.

Shortly after returning to his alma mater, Gogue engaged the talent and insight of the Auburn family toward development of a dynamic and forward-looking strategic plan to guide the University for the future. Students, alumni, employees, business leaders and other stakeholders contributed to a roadmap that will strengthen Auburn's academic, research and outreach mission, improve operational efficiency and develop human capital. The Auburn Board of Trustees adopted the strategic plan on June 27, 2008.

Gogue arrived at Auburn with ample experience in the top ranks of academia. He was selected president of New Mexico State University in 2000 and, in 2003, named president of the University of Houston and chancellor of the University of Houston System.

Gogue worked for the National Park Service from 1973 to 1986, rising to the position of chief administrative scientist for several regions of the U.S. Park system. He began his distinguished career in higher education administration in 1986 as associate director of the Office of University Research at Clemson University, where he also served as vice president for research and vice president/vice provost for agriculture and natural resources. Utah State University selected Gogue as provost in 1995.

Gogue met his wife, Susie, in the 8th grade, and they married during their undergraduate years at Auburn. Susie also earned two Auburn degrees. They are the proud parents of three children and have two grandchildren.

He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Golden Key honor societies, Sigma Chi Fraternity, Sigma Xi scientific research society and the National Society of Scabbard and Blade, the honorary military society for all branches of service. Gogue previously served as an accreditation reviewer for the Pacific Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.



Jay JACOBS

Athletics Director

Auburn Director of Athletics Jay Jacobs has a vision of leading Auburn Athletics to becoming the nation's preeminent Athletics Department.

In his tenure at the helm of the Tigers' program, the department has prospered athletically, academically and financially.

Under Jacobs' leadership, Auburn Athletics has made major strides benefitting Auburn student-athletes, coaches and fans. The department has focused on five strategic goals under his leadership: Winning, graduating student-athletes, managing the department's fiscal affairs, complying with SEC and NCAA rules and providing a professional game day experience.

The Auburn Athletics Department has consistently ranked in the top 10 percent of the NACDA Directors Cup and has claimed eight national championships under Jacobs, including a school-record four titles in 2005-06, along with 14 Southeastern Conference titles.

Academically, Auburn has earned five public recognitions by the NCAA for scoring in the 90th-100th percentile nationally in the Academic Progress Rate (APR).

Jacobs served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Tiger Unlimited prior to his appointment as Director of Athletics and has initiated several successful business ventures for the Athletics Department, including a five-year contract with Under Armour Performance Apparel and nine-year extension with multi-media rights holder ISP Sports.

During Jacobs' tenure, Auburn has also moved forward with numerous facility projects designed to benefit Tiger athletic programs and their fans, most notably, the construction of the \$92.5 million state-of-the-art basketball arena and practice facility that will open prior to the 2010-11 season.

Jacobs was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec. 22, 2004, after working in almost every area of the Auburn Athletics Department for the previous 20 years.

Jacobs earned his undergraduate and master's degrees in business administration from Auburn in 1985 and 1988, respectively, and was a member of the Auburn football team, earning two letters as an offensive tackle in 1982 and 1983.

He is married to the former Angie Sapp of Dublin, Ga. The couple has three daughters, Haley, Meagan and Jayne.

SEC SWIMMING AND DIVING

Over the past few decades, the Southeastern Conference has been a constant force in swimming and diving. In 2009, the SEC claimed its 11th Men's National Championship as the Auburn Tigers won their eighth NCAA title. In addition, the SEC had three Top-10 finishes with Florida, Tennessee and Georgia. The SEC led all conferences among top 10 finishes at the championships with four. The SEC women were led by runner-up Georgia, followed by two more Top-10 finish teams in Auburn and Florida.

With Auburn's national title, the SEC won its sixth championship in seven years. Florida finished fifth, Tennessee finished eighth and Georgia finished 10th, marking the 40th consecutive season in which the SEC has placed at least one men's team in the top 10. Since 1969, 104 SEC teams have finished in the NCAA's top 10.

In addition, 10 individual titles were captured by an SEC athlete. The SEC now has an all-time total of 151 NCAA individual titles on the men's side. Five NCAA records were set by SEC athletes in 2009, including: Bradley Ally, UF (200 IM); Neil Versfeld, UG (200 breast); Shaune Fraser, UF (200 butterfly); 400 Medley Relay, AU (Wollach, Klein, McGill, Targett); 200 Medley Relay, AU (White, Silva, Targett, Louw).

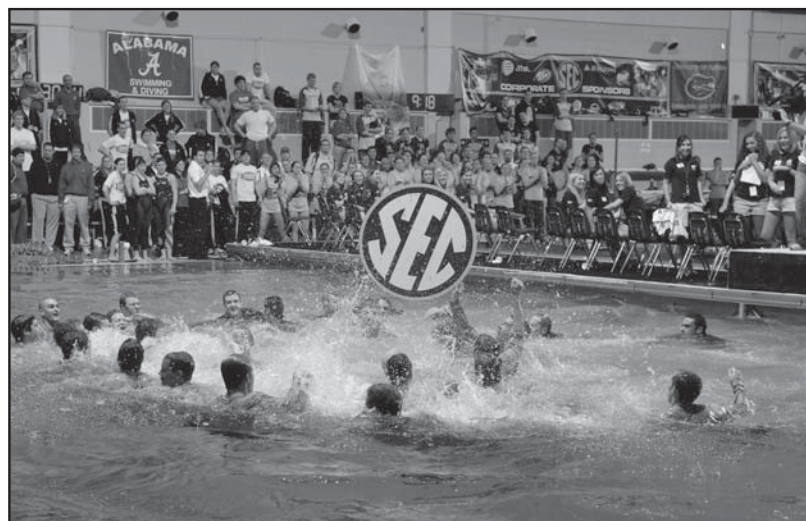
On the women's side, the SEC had eight teams competing at the NCAA Championships. Individually, five titles were captured in 2009 to take the SEC's total to 202 NCAA individual titles. The SEC also had an NCAA meet record holder in Florida's Gemma Spofforth, in the 200 backstroke. In the 200 back final, the SEC placed four of the final eight, including a 1-2-3 sweep by Florida. Since 1982, the Southeastern Conference has placed 76 women's teams in the NCAA top 10.

SEC MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING NOTES

- The SEC has had 11 NCAA Men's Championships: (Tennessee- 1978; Florida - 1983 & 1985; Auburn - 1997, 1999, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2009).
- 2009 marked the 40th consecutive year that the SEC has had at least one team in the top 10 of the NCAA Championships.
- The SEC has placed a total of 104 teams in the top 10 since 1969.
- SEC athletes in swimming and diving have captured a total of 151 individual NCAA titles (including relays).
- In 2009, the SEC recorded five NCAA records: Bradley Ally, UF (200 IM); Neil Versfeld, UG (200 breast); Shaune Fraser, UF (200 butterfly); 400 Medley Relay, AU (Wollach, Klein, McGill, Targett); 200 Medley Relay, AU (White, Silva, Targett, Louw)

Gabrielson Natatorium
Feb. 17-20



Named after legendary coach B.W. Gabrielsen, the 2,000-seat Gabrielson Natatorium is home to the University of Georgia swimming and diving program and is located within the Ramsey Center on campus.

The natatorium area contains three separate pools. The 50-meter competition pool contains 844,000 gallons of water and can be configured into four different layouts by utilizing the two movable bulkheads to allow for both short- and long-course training.

Two 1-meter springboards, two 3-meter springboards and five diving platforms (1, 3, 5, 7.5 and 10-meters) hang over the diving pool, which is 16 to 17 feet deep and contains 525,000 gallons of water.

The natatorium hosted the 1999 NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championships, 2002 NCAA Division I Men's Swimming and Diving Championships, the 1997 World Championship Team Trials, and both the 2004 SEC Swimming and Diving Championships.

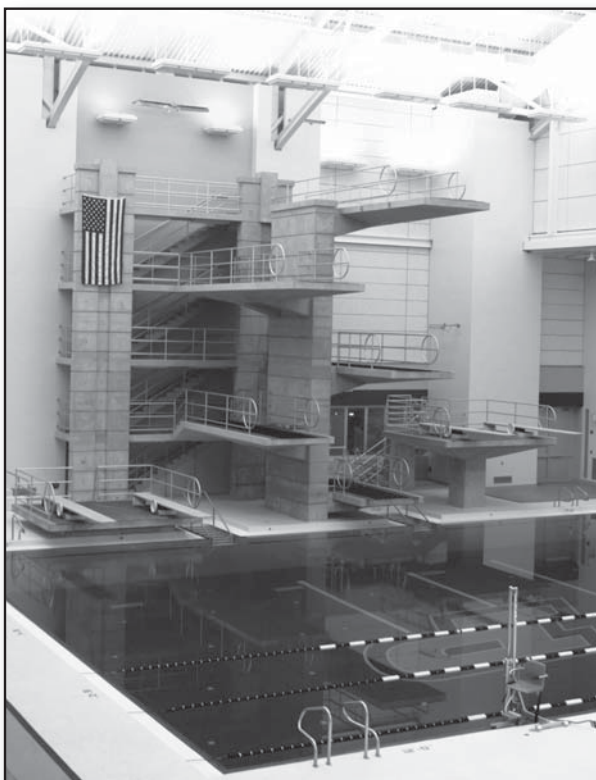

Built in 2001, the Boilermaker Aquatic Center ranks as one of the finest in the nation and serves as the home pool for the Purdue University swimming and diving programs.

The center has hosted several premier events, including the 2005 NCAA Women's Championships. It has also hosted the 2002 NCAA Central Regional Diving Zones, a U.S. Swimming age group meet and the 2003 Women's Big Ten Swimming and Diving Championships, and the 2004 Men's Big Ten Swimming and Diving Championships.



The center features an eight-lane, 50-meter competition pool, while the diving well holds 500,000 gallons of water and doubles as a six-lane, 25-yard short course. A Daktronics scoreboard provides state-of-the-art scoring and allows live video coverage of events.

Additionally, a weight room is provided for student-athletes on site. Permanent seating is available for 700 spectators, expandable to 1,400 with use of temporary bleachers.

In addition to the 2010 NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championships, the Boilermaker Aquatic Center will serve as host to the 2010 Big Ten Women's Swimming and Diving Championships and 2010 NCAA Zone C Diving meet.

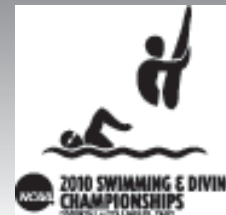

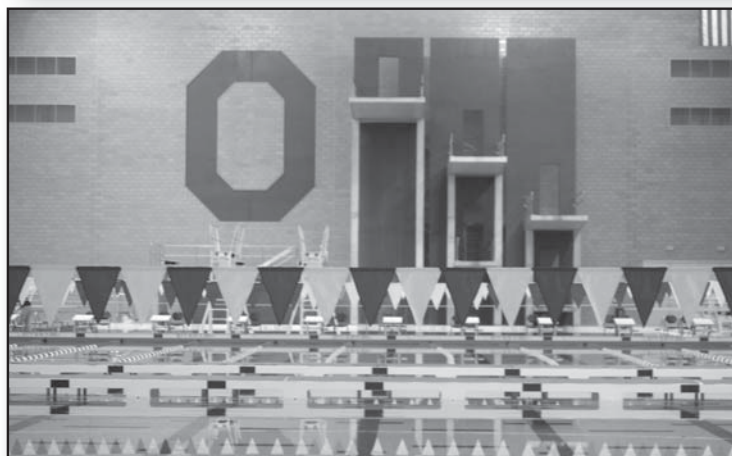
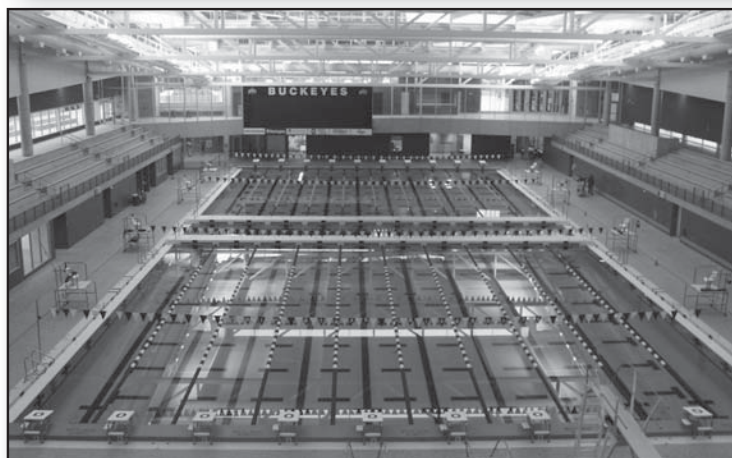
Since 2005, the Bill and Mae McCorkle Aquatic Pavilion has served as the home pool for The Ohio State University's swimming and diving programs.

The pavilion consists of the Mike Peppe Natatorium and the Ron O'Brien Diving Well. The Peppe Natatorium, named for the former Ohio State head coach, features a 50-meter competition pool and seating for over 1,700 spectators. The O'Brien Diving Well consists of three centerline towers and the ability to have one- and three-meter springboards on all four sides of the well. Holding nearly 1.56 million gallons of water in the entire facility, the Pavilion is part of Ohio State's 600,000 square-foot Recreation and Physical Activities Center (RPAC).

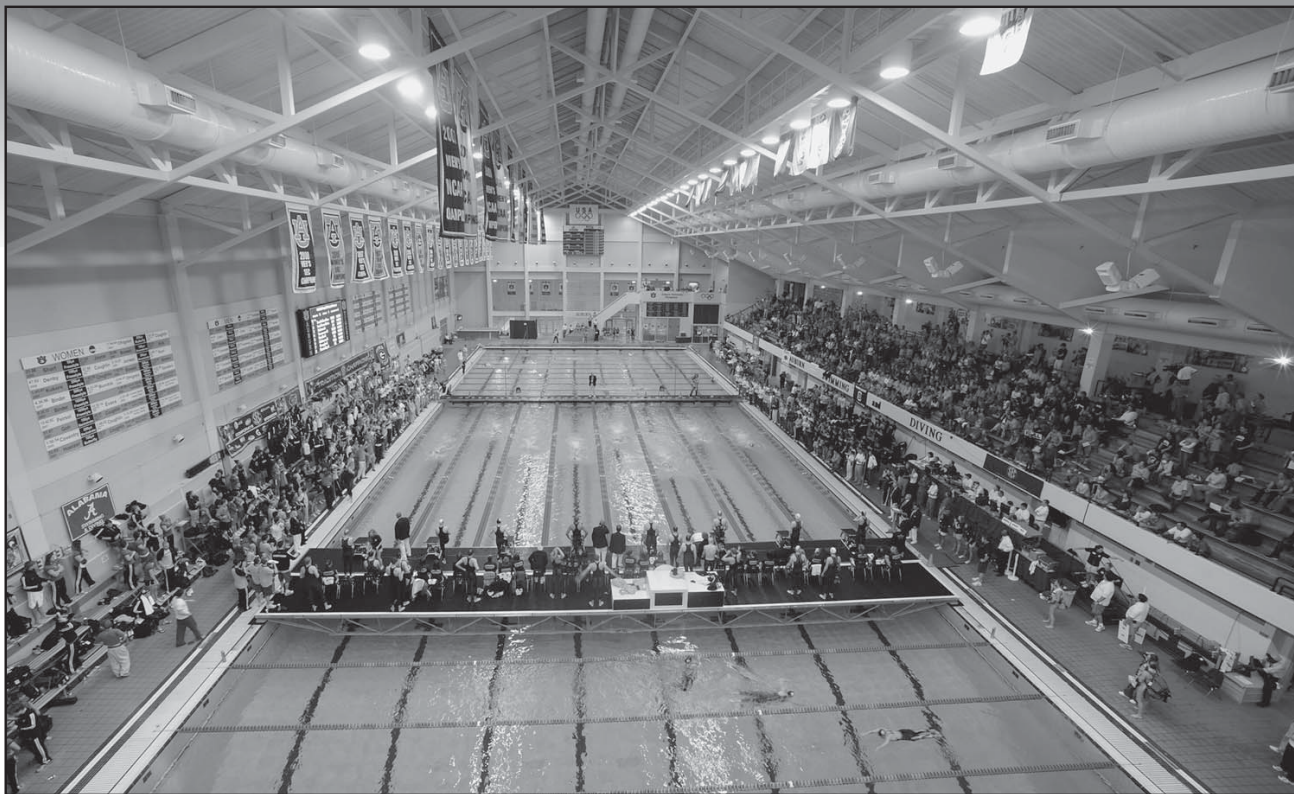
Other features of the pavilion include two visiting team locker rooms; two coaches and officials locker rooms; a full digital scoreboard; a leisure pool and whirlpool spa; an observation balcony; and a media workroom.

The facility has previously hosted the 2006 Big Ten Women's Swimming and Diving Championships, the 2006 NCAA Regional Diving Championships, the 2007 Big Ten Men's Swimming and Diving Championships and the 2008 NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championships.

Along with the 2009 NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving Championships, the McCorkle Aquatic Pavilion will be home to the 2009 USA Junior National Championships, as well as one of USA Swimming's Grand Prix circuits.



JAMES E. MARTIN AQUATICS CENTER



Draped with banners honoring the six-time Men's NCAA Champions, four-time Women's NCAA Champions and 15 SEC titles, the James E. Martin Aquatics Center has been home to the Auburn swimming and diving team since it opened in 1993. Chosen to host some of the top competitions in the sport of swimming, the Aquatics Center is designed as one of the premier natatoriums in the nation, and provides Auburn and its athletes with the perfect facility for training and competition.

During the 2002-03 season, the center was showcased on multiple occasions, as the Southeastern Conference Championships was held here for the third time since dedication and the 2003 Women's NCAA Championship was hosted by Auburn from March 20-22. The facility had also previously hosted the 1998 NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving National Championships. The Oct. 7, 2002, issue of Sports Illustrated rated the pool third fastest pool in the country. During the course of the two championship events in 2003, a total of 12 SEC records were established while seven new NCAA records were set during the women's championships.

The facility will again host a major championship in 2009 as it will serve as the host of the SEC Swimming and Diving Championships.

Formally dedicated on April 30, 1994, the \$10.5 million center is named for former Auburn president Dr. James E. Martin, a key player in the project's undertaking.

The 63,000 square-foot facility opened in October, 1993, and hosted

nine collegiate competitions during its first year of operation including the 1994 Southeastern Conference Championships.

Since its opening, the facility has become a home to a multitude of national and international Olympic teams. Auburn swim teams have competed against members of the U.S. National Team in competitions, the U.S. Water Polo Team has used the facility for training sessions and competitions and various other national teams called the Martin Aquatics Center home in preparation for the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta including China, Japan, Finland, Israel and South Africa.

The center played host to the U.S. Open in 1995, 2000 and again in 2005. The three-day meet featured approximately 800 of the top American and international swimmers.

The swimming center complex, located between Beard-Eaves Coliseum and the Student Activities Center, houses an Olympic-size pool with two moveable bulkheads which allow for variable distance competition and simultaneous diving.

The center is equipped with seating for approximately 1000 spectators with an additional 800 seats for competitors on the pool deck. The facility adjoins Auburn's former swimming facility, which has undergone an extensive renovation and now serves as a warm-up and practice pool. The facility was designed with speed in mind and results from the 1998 NCAA Men's Championships, 1994 SEC Championships and 1995 U.S. Open prove that the pool is one of the nation's fastest.

The design of the pool incorporates a state of the art gutter system which absorbs waves rather than reverberating them back into to the competition pool. Ultimately, the design creates a calmer pool and reduces the amount of turbulence swimmers must face. In addition, the bulkheads feature a flow-through design which minimizes waves rebounding on turns.

The pool is nine feet deep at its most shallow point and 16.5 feet deep beneath the diving apparatus. The diving facility features two one-meter springboards, two three-meter springboards and five platform levels (1-, 3-, 5-, 7.5- and 10-meters). The floor of the diving well is navy blue and provides a darker contrast which makes it easier for divers to spot the water during the course of a dive.

Recent additions to the facility include a new Daktronics high-definition video board on the west wall, along with new record boards displaying Auburn, NCAA and World records. A new closed-circuit television/video camera setup has also been added on the pool deck.

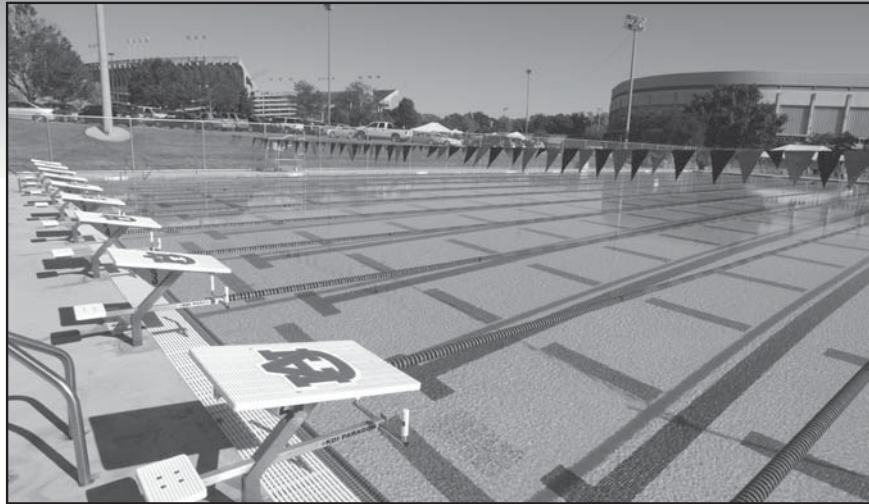
Auburn Outdoor Training Facility

For years, Auburn University has had one of the top competition and training facilities in the country in the James E. Martin Aquatic Center. In the fall of 2007, Auburn furthered the commitment to its athletes as the Tigers opened their new outdoor pool, adjacent to AU's Student Activities Center.

Sitting at the former site of Auburn's Luther Young Tennis Courts, the outdoor pool is 50-meters long and 25-meters wide. It can be set up with 10 lanes for long course (50-meter) swimming or 22 lanes for short course (25-meters).

The pool holds 600,000 gallons of water and is heated so that it can be used throughout the year.

Along with the bonus of training outdoors, the outdoor pool offers an advantage in training for international competitions as many of those are held outdoors.

BRETT HAWKE

HEAD COACH / FIRST YEAR / AUBURN



Brett Hawke enters into his first full season as head coach for the National Champion Tigers swimming and diving program after serving as co-head coach for the 2008-09 seasons and assistant coach for two seasons prior.

Under Hawke's direction, the Auburn men came away with their eighth national title, capturing the 2009 Men's Swimming and Diving NCAA Championship. During the three-day event, Auburn recorded 54 All-America honors and had one individual and four relay champions. The Tigers also set three US Open, three NCAA and 17 school records en route to the title.

Hawke returned to The Plains in the summer of 2006 as an assistant coach for the program. Hawke, a native of Sydney, Australia, was a 17-time All-American swimmer for Auburn from 1997 to 1999.

As a member of the coaching staff, Hawke works directly with the Auburn sprinters. Under his direction, Cesar Cielo provided one of the top highlights from the 2008 NCAA Championships as he became the fastest swimmer in the world with his 18.47 in the 50 free. What made the mark even more impressive was not that he did it once, but he reached the mark three times. He won the 50 free with a time of 18.52 after qualifying with an 18.79 in the preliminary. His time of 18.47 came as the 200 free relay leadoff.

In all, Auburn sprinters won six All-America honors with Cielo sweeping the 50 and 100 freestyle titles in 2008. He also became the first swimmer to break the 41-second barrier in the 100 free with a 40.92. For his efforts, Cielo was named the NCAA Swimmer of the Year for the second year in a row.

During the 2009 World Championships, Hawke served as an assistant coach with the Brazilian national team and coached Cielo to two gold medals in the 50 and 100 freestyles. Cielo became the fastest swimmer in the world in the 100 free when he touched the wall in 46.91. Other Tiger sprinters medaling at the championships were Fred Bousquet (silver – 50 free, bronze – 100 free, 4x100 free relay) and Matt Targett (silver – 50 fly, bronze – 4x100 medley relay).

Hawke also had the opportunity to coach Cielo at the 2008 Olympic Games. Serving once again as an assistant coach with the Brazilian national team, Hawke mentored the South American star as he won a bronze in the 100m free and a gold in the 50m free with an Olympic record time of 21.30. Other Auburn sprinters trained by Hawke at the 2008 Olympics included Matt Targett, Fred Bousquet, Jakob Andkjaer and Alexei Puninski. Targett and Bousquet both brought home medals after their performance on relay teams.

Auburn sprinters overall were very impressive at the 2007 NCAAAs

with 13 swimmers advancing to finals. In the men's 50 free, Auburn took the top two spots with Cielo taking the title and Targett right behind him. Scott Goodrich and Bryan Lundquist also made the championship final. In the women's 50 free, it was Kara Denby leading the team in eighth.

In the 100 free, Cielo picked up another NCAA Championship with a time of 41.17 and Targett followed in sixth place. In the women's 100 free, it was Denby again leading the team in fourth place, followed by Emily Kukors in fifth.

During his time in Auburn, Hawke captured nine NCAA titles to go along with seven SEC crowns. In 1997, Hawke became part of Auburn history as he was a member of the first NCAA Championship team.

At the 1997 NCAA meet, Hawke won four titles, including one as part of the 200 medley relay team that set a new U.S. Open and NCAA record.

At the same meet, Hawke claimed Auburn's second ever 50m free title. He duplicated the relay performance the following year with the medley relay team that took the crown in a NCAA meet, NCAA and U.S. Open record time.

In 1999, Hawke helped lead the Tigers to their second NCAA team title en route to capturing four titles of his own at the meet. During his three years as a student-athlete, Hawke was also part of three SEC team championships.

A two-time Olympian, Hawke finished sixth in the 50m free in Athens. Hawke has three Commonwealth Games medals in his collection, including silver in the 50m free from 2002. Adding to his long list of international experience, in 2001 and 2003, Hawke was a World Championship finalist in the 50m free and at the 2002 Pan Pacific Championships, Hawke won bronze in the 50m free.

A five-time Australian champion, Hawke is the former Australian record holder in the 50m free with a time of 22.07 that he set at the 2004 Olympic Games in the semifinal round.

Hawke is married to the former Trudi James and the couple have four children: Kirra (11), Kobe (7) and year-old twins Yasmin and Lily. James was a member of the Auburn University soccer team from 1994-97. Hawke is currently working towards his bachelor's degree in psychology.

JEFF SHAFFER

HEAD DIVING COACH / 11TH YEAR / WISCONSIN ('80)



Jeff Shaffer has been developing and guiding divers across the country to great accomplishments throughout their careers in the last 30 years. He came to Auburn almost 11 years ago as one of the most respected coaches in the diving community and has improved the Auburn diving program in Olympic-size proportions.

During his tenure at Auburn, Shaffer has made the diving program into a complete complement to the Auburn swimming program. Through his strong coaching ability and sound philosophy, Shaffer has guided his student-athletes to success.

"Our philosophy here at Auburn is developing divers from the ground up," Shaffer said. "It is a growing process and through the experiences gained here, our divers have the opportunity to become great."

Shaffer's coaching career kicked off in 1980 after he graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He moved to Mission Viejo, Calif., and assisted diving legend Ron O'Brien from 1980-85. Shaffer followed O'Brien to Boca Raton, Fla., and continued to coach with him until 1988.

While with O'Brien and during his career coaching at the club level, Shaffer coached divers of all ages and ability levels and demonstrated the gift to develop divers to world renowned status. His talent was recognized by the United States Olympic Committee in 1996 when they honored him as the inaugural recipient of the USOC National Developmental Coach of the Year for all Olympic sports.

Throughout his club coaching career, Shaffer has guided divers to many distinguished accomplishments. Such honors include 10 World Junior champions, 39 National Junior champions, eight Senior National champions, three Junior National Team titles and three Senior National Team titles.

Shaffer carried his philosophy and achievements to the collegiate level, first to LSU, then to Southern California and now at

Auburn. His divers have played crucial roles in contributing to the success Auburn has had on the national level, making an impact on 12 of Auburn's NCAA team titles.

The contributions started through Shaffer's first recruiting class that included Caesar Garcia and Ashley Rubenstein and have continued throughout the last 11 years.

Evidence of Shaffer's philosophy of developing athletes can be seen through all of his pupils, including Garcia and Rubenstein. With Shaffer's guidance, Garcia grew from an All-American as a freshman to a two-time NCAA platform champion, the 2004 SEC and NCAA Male Diver of the Year and a XXVIII Olympian.

Rubenstein played a significant role in the three NCAA championship teams she was a part of. She was a member of Auburn's first-ever women's NCAA title in 2002 and as a senior in 2004, her fourth-place finish on the 1-meter contributed to the team's large margin of victory and its third-straight national title. Rubenstein has gone on to be a 2004 USA Olympic Team Trials finalist, a National Team member and most recently, the 2006 U.S. National title one the 1-meter

Among the many successful divers Shaffer has instructed, some include NCAA champions Matt Bricker and Steve Segerlin and All-America honorees Corey Gerlach and Lynnsey Segraves.

Most recently, Auburn's Kelly Marx and Dan Mazzaferro played key roles on the team's eighth NCAA title run during the 2008-09 season. Marx was runner-up on the 3-meter and reached the finals on the one-meter, while Mazzaferro earned honorable mention All-America honors on the three-meter at the national meet. Both divers earned honorable mention All-America accolades on the 10-meter platform.

The pair's contributions during the 2009 SEC Championships proved to be great, as the Tigers went on to win their 15th conference title. Mazzaferro was named the 2009 Co-SEC Male Diver

of the Year after he repeated as SEC champion on the platform. He also finished first on the 3-meter and tied Marx for second on the 1-meter. Marx picked up second place on the 3-meter and platform, as well.

All in all, the philosophy that Shaffer has embedded in his coaching has proven to be successful from his days with O'Brien to now as he continues to provide his student-athletes opportunities to grow into essential contributors to the continued accomplishments the Auburn swimming and diving teams experience, as well as success on the international level.

Shaffer and his wife, Jenny, have two daughters, Amy (21), a senior at Auburn, and Kelly (20). The couple also has a son, J.J. (Jeffrey Jr.) (15). Amy is majoring in business, while Kelly is a junior on the Samford University soccer team.

TOM HEALEY

DIRECTOR OF SWIMMING AND DIVING OPERATIONS / 25TH YEAR / AUBURN ('95)

After spending 23 seasons in various positions with the Auburn swimming and diving teams, Tom Healey resumed the duties of Director of Swimming and Diving Operations at the start of the 2008-09 season.

Healey first came to Auburn as an assistant coach to John Asmuth, beginning with the 1985-86 season. During his time as an assistant, he was responsible for recruiting, on-deck coaching and various administrative duties, including team travel.

When David Marsh took over the Tiger teams in 1990, Healey assumed the roles of a student assistant until he finished his degree from Auburn in 1995, graduating summa cum laude with a degree in sport management and recreation. He then worked as a graduate assistant under Marsh until completing his master's degree in higher education administration in 1999.

From 1999 until 2008, Healey worked in various capacities as a volunteer assistant coach under Marsh and Richard Quick, serving as the meet director for home meets in the James E. Martin Aquatics Center. In that time he worked the United States Swimming Junior Nationals as the Co-Meet Director, United States Open swim meet and the NCAA Swimming Championships.

It was in 1995 that Healey took an active role with the Friends of Auburn Swimming Alumni Group, maintaining relationships with a base of more than 600 alumni from the Auburn swimming and diving program. He coordinated annual reunions while also helping to raise funds for the Ralph Crocker Scholarship Fund.

Before coming back to Auburn full-time, Healey worked with the Alabama Sports Festival in Montgomery as a director of operations. He was in charge of recruiting and coordinating volunteers for the sports festival in which more than 8,000 athletes participate in more than 20 different events.

The Scranton, Pa., native got his start in swimming as a teenager, helping his uncle coach summer league teams. He got his first full-time coaching job in 1970 with the Starlit Aquatic Club in Fairfax, Va. He worked as an assistant coach with the team until 2002.

Staying in the northern Virginia area, Healey then took a job with the Solotar Swim Team, working first as an assistant from 1972-80 before taking over as head coach from 1980-85. While with the team, he oversaw the training and development of more than 500 swimmers. The team trained at five different pools and utilized 20 assistant coaches in the program.

Since 2002, Healey has been involved with the Auburn Masters Swim Team. During his time with the nationally-ranked masters team, he has seen numerous national records fall and taken the team to several national championships.



RICHARD LONG

ASSISTANT COACH / 2ND YEAR / AUBURN ('05)



Richard Long begins his fourth season with the Auburn swimming and diving team as an assistant coach. During the 2009 season, Long helped coach the men's swimming and diving team to both an SEC and NCAA championship title.

In the summer of 2009, Long served as an assistant coach for Paraguay at the World Championships in Rome. He coached two swimmers to two national records.

Long served as the team's videographer in 2008 and focused on gathering underwater and above water video of meets and taking footage of the swimmers in practice. The video provided the coaching staff the opportunity to use for stroke analysis. Using Dartfish for stroke analysis, he launched a Webcast over the Internet to allow swimmers to access footage at their convenience.

As a volunteer assistant in 2007, he helped coach the men's and women's teams to both SEC and NCAA championships.

Long completed his bachelor's of science degree from Auburn University in Exercise Science while spending two years on the swimming and diving team, earning three All-America honors (200 FR, 400 FR, 800 FR).

Long, a native of Hampton, Va., resides in Auburn and is married to the former Erin Hebert. Richard and Erin have a son, Tyson Long.

AARON CIARLA

ASSISTANT COACH / 2ND YEAR / AUBURN

Aaron Ciarla is in his second season as an assistant coach with the Auburn swimming and diving program. Ciarla recently served as head coach for the Bahamas Swimming Federation at the 2009 World Championships where his swimmers earned nine individual and two relay national records.

A former standout for the Tigers in the sprint freestyle, Ciarla is a seven-time NCAA champion and a 13-time All-American from 1997-2000. He was a part of the 1997 team that captured the first NCAA swimming title in Auburn history and served as co-captain for the 1999 NCAA championship squad. During the 1999 meet, Ciarla won the 50 free title and was a part of three national champion relays that broke NCAA and U.S. Open records.

During the 2000 national championships, Ciarla swam the second leg of the 200 free relay that set the world record at 1:25.14, a record that stood for four years.

Ciarla served as the team's graduate assistant coach from 2004 to 2006 before returning to the Plains in early 2009. In total, he has been a part of six national championship squads as an athlete or coach.

A native of Syracuse, N.Y., and Charlotte, N.C., Ciarla earned his bachelor's in political science and a master's degree in public administration from Auburn.





CARRIE MCCAMBRIDGE

ASSISTANT COACH / 3RD YEAR / PURDUE ('06)

Carrie McCambridge enters her third season on The Plains. The Columbus, Ohio, native was recently named assistant coach to the Auburn swimming and diving program after two seasons as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach. Working closely with PK in his weight room, McCambridge's primary area of focus was with the Auburn diving, cross country and gymnastics teams from 2007-2009.

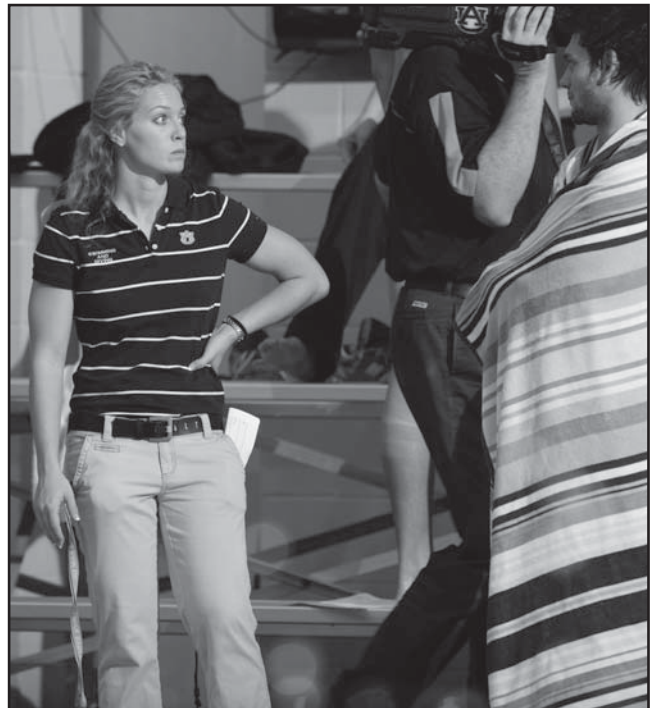
Working with swimming and diving is nothing new to McCambridge, who was an accomplished diver herself while in college.

McCambridge lettered all four years on the diving team at Purdue and was a four-time All-America honoree. For her work on the boards, she was also honored twice as the Big Ten Diver of the Year. She is still the Purdue record holder on the platform, having a score of 346.05. In 2004, McCambridge swept all three boards at the Big Ten Championships. She returned in 2006 to take the title on the platform for her fourth conference championship.

Prior to coming to Auburn, McCambridge spent a year as an intern in strength and conditioning at Purdue, working mainly with the men's and women's tennis, men's and women's swimming and diving, cheerleading, soccer and softball teams.

Recently, McCambridge was honored by the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCa), winning the 2009 John Stucky Award. The award is given in honor of Coach John Stucky and recipients are chosen based on characteristics and skills that they've shown throughout their work in the strength and conditioning profession.

McCambridge earned her undergraduate degree from Purdue in 2006 in organizational leadership and supervision. She recently received her master's in exercise science at Auburn in August.





PAUL YETTER

ASSISTANT COACH / 1ST YEAR / WISCONSON ('98)

Paul Yetter, who served as an assistant coach with the 2008 United States women's Olympic team in Beijing, China, was named an assistant coach with the Auburn swimming and diving program in the summer of 2009.

"Having Paul Yetter join the Auburn staff is fantastic for the team," said Hawke. "He is a world-class, world-renowned coach. He has coached at the highest level, had world record holders and coached many national record holders at the club level.

"This is an exciting time for Paul, an exciting challenge for him, but also we know that we are making the team we have here even stronger, and we feel very fortunate to have him join us. We are excited for the future and what it holds."

Yetter comes to Auburn with more than 13 years of coaching experience from the developmental to international levels, including serving in various capacities at the North Baltimore Aquatic Club (NBAC) since 2001.

"Paul is very strong in a lot of areas and I think he will bring a lot of new ideas to our staff," said Hawke. "He will work with both men and women with a middle distance focus, but will be available to assist in almost any area of the program."

A coach with extensive international experience, Yetter not only served as an assistant coach with the U.S. National Team at the 2008 Olympics, but was also an assistant for the national team at the 2007 Japan International Grand Prix, 2006 Pan Pacific Games and 2005 World Championships. He also was the U.S. women's head coach at the 2007 Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

"The tradition and history of excellence at Auburn really attracted me to this position, as well as the energy of the current staff and team," said Yetter. "I could not be more excited to be a part of the Auburn staff and Auburn tradition. I cannot wait to get started and help Auburn's student-athletes move forward both in and out of the pool."

Yetter's athletes have represented the USA in International Competition every year since 2004, winning medals at the Olympic Games, World Championships, Pac Pacific Games, World University Games, and the Pan American Games.

Most recently at NBAC, Yetter coached Liz Pelton to the 2009 USA World Championship Team where she finished sixth in the 200 backstroke. Pelton qualified for the US team in three individual events, more than any other female swimmer from the United

States.

Prior to the 2009 season, Yetter coached Katie Hoff to Olympic Team berths in 2004 and 2008. During the 2007-08 season, Hoff set 11 American Records in nine different events, won three Olympic medals and twice set a long course World Record in the 400m IM.

Yetter has coached five NBAC athletes to the United States "A" National Team - Katie Hoff, Liz Pelton, Felicia Lee, Dan Madwed, and Courtney Kalisz.

Since 2002, Yetter's swimmers have set more than 75 national age group records in 12 of the 14 competitive events while 10 different athletes have achieved more than 75 No. 1 national age group rankings. Yetter coached a group of 12 athletes to the 2009 World Championship Trials, and 13 athletes to the 2008 Olympic Trials.

For his efforts in coaching, Yetter was named the 2007 United States Olympic Committee Developmental Coach of the Year.

Yetter is a 1998 graduate of the University of Wisconsin where he earned a degree in English. While at Wisconsin, he swam from 1995-96 as a member of the Badger swimming and diving team and was a national qualifier in the 400 individual medley and 200 breaststroke.





BRYAN KARKOSKA

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH / 14TH YEAR /
AUBURN (1994)

The Auburn swimming and diving program - like all other sports at AU - are expected to be able to compete at the highest levels possible. With that in mind the Auburn swimming and diving staff, just like all other Olympic sports, entrusts Olympic sports strength and conditioning coach Bryan "PK" Karkoska with their athletes.

At Auburn, athletes are made faster, stronger and more athletic through the intensity and genius of the strength and conditioning program. Karkoska and his staff transfers his intensity and enthusiasm into his weight room through legendary workouts.

Known throughout the Auburn swimming and diving program for its legendary workouts is PK's ATUBS training, which combines weight lifting and cardio-vascular exercises. ATUBS, formerly known as circuit training, stands for "Auburn Team Unifying and Building Sessions."

The sessions last for about an hour during the preseason and are used to establish and build team cohesiveness and the Auburn swimming work ethic and discipline. The circuit-training coincides with the training in the pool with an increased intensity on the dryland side, as well as, challenges the student-athlete both physically and mentally.

"The circuit was by far the hardest part of the season, but PK made sure that it was never an individual effort, the team got through circuit together. It's what bonded us in the end, and in essence made us tougher," said Aaron Ciarla, former men's team captain, member of the 1997 and 1999 national championship teams and current Auburn assistant coach.

Karkoska's credible reputation follows him. Numerous universities call on a regular basis to find out what exactly he does with his program and in the weight room. He has also worked closely with the physiology department on several issues and has had numerous articles and essays published about human physiology and general health.

A 1994 graduate of Auburn with a bachelor of science degree in exercise science, Karkoska, a Chicago, Ill., native, also earned his Masters of Education with an emphasis in exercise physiology on the Plains in 1996.

On the Olympic stage, Gangloff won gold in both the 2004 Athens Olympics and 2008 Beijing Olympics as a part of the United States 400m medley relay teams. Other international accolades include winning bronze in the 50m breaststroke and gold as a part of the 400m medley relay at the 2009 World Championships.

In prior world meets, Gangloff won silver in both the 50m breast and 400m medley relay at the 2008 World Championships. At the 2005 World Championships, he came away with a gold in the 400m medley relay and silver in the 50m breast.

Gangloff currently holds the American record in the 50m breast, recording a time of 26.86. He also is the 2009 USA Swimming champion in the 100m breast.

While at Auburn, Gangloff was a 12-time All-American and in 2004, he was a part of the NCAA champion 200 medley relay squad, as well as being a part of the 2003 and 2004 national championship teams.

In his senior year, Gangloff won both the 100 and 200 breaststroke events and swam the second leg for both the 200 and 400 champion medley relay squads at the 2004 Southeastern Conference Championships.

A native of Stow, Ohio, Gangloff earned his degree in criminology from Auburn in 2005. He is married to the former Ashley Rubenstein, who dove at Auburn and participated in the 2005 World University Games.

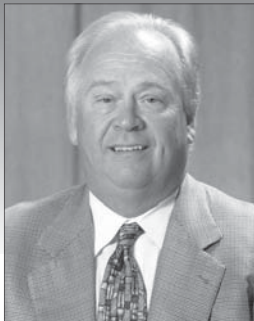

The Auburn women's swimming and diving team looks to return to the top both in the conference and nationally during the 2009-10 season. The Tigers finished second in the SEC and took sixth at the 2009 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships in College Station, Texas.

Auburn returns a handful of athletes with both national and international experience. Looking to lead the squad are five seniors in Ava Ohlgren, Maggie Bird, Alana Dillette, Abby MacGregor and Melissa Marik. Other key returning upperclassmen include juniors Caitlin Geary and Erica Meisser and sophomores Micah Lawrence and Arianna Vanderpool-Wallace.

"We have great leadership with our captains in Ava Ohlgren and Maggie Bird," Brett Hawke, head swimming and diving coach, said. "They, along with their classmates, will be crucial in turning around the women's attitude and desire to get back on top."

A group of 10 freshmen (nine swimmers and one diver) join the squad this season and will be looked to contribute right at the start of the year.

"We're really excited for this class of freshmen," Hawke said. "Among the many talented swimmers we have join-

ing us this season are Katie Gardocki, Darcy Fishback and Becca Jones. Those three and their classmates will play a big role for us."

FREESTYLE

Auburn returns a good group of sprint freestylers in sophomore Arianna Vanderpool-Wallace and junior Caitlin Geary, both whom competed at the 2009 World Championships this past summer in Rome. Vanderpool-Wallace holds the school record in the 100 freestyle and had a successful NCAA championship her freshman season. Geary will be looked to lead the way in the 100 and 200 freestyles for the Tigers.

"Caitlin is coming off a good summer and we're looking for big things from her this season," Hawke said. "Vanderpool-Wallace will be very hard to beat this year at both the SEC and NCAA levels. We're expecting to see great results from her."

Freshman Becca Jones will also make a big impact for the Tigers in the sprint freestyles. Coming in as one of the top female sprint recruits, Jones enters her first year as the Virginia state record holder in 100 and 200 freestyles.

Senior captain Maggie Bird will continue to lead the way in the distance freestyle events. Bird is coming off another solid performance at the NCAA Championships, taking third in the 500 free and fourth in the 1650 free. She also swam in the A Final of both the 400m and 800m free at the 2009 U.S. Championships, finishing seventh and sixth, respectively.

Looking to add depth in the freestyle events will be freshmen Katie Gardocki and Darcy Fishback.

"Katie Gardocki will make an imme-

diately impact in the distance freestyle events, while Darcy Fishback will be great in the sprint freestyles," Hawke said. "We're really excited to see how they progress throughout the year."

BACKSTROKE

Looking to fill the gap left by a trio of graduated Tigers will be senior Melissa Marik and junior Erica Meissner.

"Both Melissa and Erica are coming off really great summers," assistant coach Aaron Ciarla said. "Melissa is stepping up already at practice and will pick up where Rachel left off last year."

Marik, a six-time All-American in both backstrokes, finished seventh in the 100m back and 11th in the 200m back at the 2009 U.S. Senior National Championships this summer. Meissner reached the semifinals in the 200m back at the U.S. meet, finishing ninth overall.

Newcomer Morgan Faye Smith will be expected to supply much-needed depth in the backstrokes. Smith is a 10-time high school All-American and will have an immediate impact on the squad, providing some competition to Marik and Meisser, as well as scoring points for Auburn throughout the season.

BREASTSTROKE

Senior Abby MacGregor, along with junior Melanie Roberts and sophomore Micah Lawrence, will lead the way for Auburn in the breaststroke events. The trio has extensive experience at both the conference and national level and will make big impacts on the team's success this season.

MacGregor had a great summer, competing in the 200m breast consolation final at the 2009 U.S. National Cham-

pionships. Roberts and Lawrence both return as All-Americans and competitors at the U.S. meet. Lawrence had a successful 2009 NCAA Championships, finishing fifth in the 200 breast, setting a new Auburn record during the prelims.

Joining the three will be a trio of freshmen in Laura Johnson and Lauren and Lindsey Norberg. Johnson is an Alabama state champion in the 100 breast, while the Norberg twins both have recorded New York state championships in the 100 breast and are high school All-Americans.

BUTTERFLY

Seniors Alana Dillette and Ava Ohlgren, along with sophomores Stephanie Horner and Kelsey Winters, will be key components to Auburn's success in the butterfly.

"Alana and Ava had great summers and will be our go-to girls at most meets," assistant coach Richard Long said. "Stephanie has a great understanding of how to compete at high-level competitions."

Dillette represented the Bahamas at the 2009 World Championships, swimming in the 100m fly. Her strength is in the 100 fly and will be a key player in the sprint relays. Ohlgren took seventh in the 200m fly at the 2009 World University Games and is the current Auburn record-holder in the 200 fly.

Horner is a 2008 Olympian for Canada and finished 20th in the 200m fly. Winters swam in the consolation finals at last season's conference meet, finishing 11th in the 100 fly and 13th in the 200 fly.

Fishback joins the group of upper-classmen and will be a big contributor in the butterfly events. She currently holds the Ohio state record in the 100 fly

and is a four-time state champion in the event.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Ohlgren is returning as one of the top individual medley swimmers in the country. Coming off a successful summer at the World University Games, Ohlgren captured both 200 and 400 IM titles at the international competition. The senior captain has earned a NCAA title in both events and is a three-time SEC champion in the 200 IM and a two-time SEC champion in the 400 IM.

"Ava doesn't have a real weakness and that is what makes her great in the IM," assistant coach Paul Yetter said. "She has great turns and a solid endurance base that allows her to finish all of her races strong."

Looking to accompany Ohlgren in the IM will be Roberts and Geary. Both represented the Tigers in the 200 IM final at SECs and will look to make impacts in that event.

A trio of newcomers will provide depth in both the 200 and 400 IM events for Auburn. Gardocki's strength in distance events will give the Tigers another strong swimmer in the 400 IM. Johnson and Lauren Norberg have great potential to be successful in the 200 IM and will be looked to develop into strong IM competitors.

DIVING

A trio of sophomores return from last year's team and look to make great strides in their second season with Auburn. Leading the way are Anna Agüero and Vennie Dantin, each of whom scored at the 2009 SEC Championships and came within one dive of making the NCAA championships as freshmen.

"Anna and Vennie did a great job last year and it was very commendable how they finished the season," Shaffer said. "Both worked very hard this summer to improve their levels of consistency and difficulty."

Agüero reached the podium at last year's conference meet, finishing third on the platform with a career-best score of 285.55 and scored points for the Tigers on the 1-meter springboard. Dantin recorded a career-best score of 343.40 on the 3-meter springboard, taking fifth in the event at SECs. She also scored points on the other two boards for Auburn.

Classmate Mary Catherine Cochran made great improvements throughout the season and the summer. With the help of her quickness and agility, she'll continue to develop into a great diver for the Auburn program.

Newcomer Laura Russell joins the three and will add depth to the young squad. She enters her freshman campaign as the 2008 Alabama state champion on the 1-meter springboard and has a successful career at the high school level.

MEET THE TIGERS

Coming off the team's eighth NCAA Championships and 13th-consecutive SEC title, the 2009-10 squad looks to continue its success in the upcoming season. Seven national champions and 12 All-Americans return to make this season another banner year.

Entering their final season are nine seniors in Jordan Anderson, Will Dove, Gideon Louw, Kyle Maese, Kelly Marx, Dan Mazzaferro, Tyler McGill, Michael Silva and Pascal Wollach. The Tigers return five juniors and eight sophomores to the squad as well.

"The key for the men in maintaining their championship status is the leadership on the squad," Brett Hawke, head swimming and diving coach, said. "Seniors Tyler McGill and Jordan Anderson are captains of the squad and will be great leaders on this team."

A large group of freshmen in nine swimmers and one diver look to continue the success Auburn has experienced in the past.

"We have a great group of freshmen coming in," Hawke said. "They will make an immediate impact for us this year."

FREESTYLE

The Auburn men look to fill the big shoes left by Olympians Matt Targett and Jakob Andkjær in the sprint freestyle, both of whom were big contributors in the Tigers' successful NCAA run. Looked to step up is senior Gideon Louw and sophomores Adam Brown and Christopher Fox.

Louw returns as one of the top sprinters in the country, swimming in both the 50 free and 100 free finals at the 2009 NCAA Championships. Brown, a 2008 Olympian for Great Britain, and Fox, a member of several British na-

tional teams, will compete at the collegiate level for the first time this season and are expected to make an immediate impact on the team.

"We're really excited to finally have Adam Brown and Christopher Fox to be a part of our team," Hawke said. "They are going to be great additions to any championship run we have this year."

Newcomer Mason Chenier, along with sophomore Karl Krug, will add depth to the sprint freestyle. Chenier, a six-time North Carolina state champion, and Krug are looked to produce big races for the Tigers this year.

Freshmen Chris Kramer and Brandon Siemasko will be great additions to the distance freestyle for Auburn. The duo, along with senior Will Dove and junior Robert Looney, will be relied on to make bigger strides for the Tigers in the distance freestyle events.

BACKSTROKE

Returning for the Tigers is one of the best backstroke contingents in the nation that played a major role in Auburn's successful NCAA run. Senior Pascal Wollach, juniors Kohlton Norys and Jared White and sophomore Max Murphy all enter the 2009-10 season as All-Americans with a wealth of experience.

"The backstroke is probably our strongest group of swimmers on this team right now," assistant coach Aaron Ciarla said. "It is a great group of guys that will score a lot of points for us this year."

Norys returns as the defending NCAA champion in the 100 back and Wollach is the Auburn record holder in both the 100 and 200 distances. White

finished sixth in the 100 and eighth in the 200 at the national meet, while Murphy earned All-America honors when he finished 11th in the 100 distance.

Freshman Kyle Owens will be a great addition to the already strong group. Owens is a two-time Tennessee state champion in the 100 back and will be expected to push to upperclassmen and contribute greatly to the overall success of the team.

BREASTSTROKE

Just like the backstroke, the Tiger breaststrokers will be one of the strongest in the country, returning 2009 World Championships competitors junior Adam Klein and sophomore Genaro Prono, along with senior All-American Michael Silva.

"We have an extremely strong group of breaststrokers," Ciarla said. "It's going to be an exciting year for them and we are all anxious to see how they perform."

Klein, the 2009 SEC runner-up in both the 100 and 200 distances, is coming off a successful summer where he competed in the 50m breast and 200m breast at the world meet in Rome, Italy. Prono represented Paraguay at the World Championships, while Silva is a four-time All-American and a member of the 2009 NCAA champion 200 medley

relay squad.

Joining the trio will be freshman Stuart Ferguson, who enters his first year as one of the top breaststrokers out of high school. Ferguson spent three seasons as a member of the U.S. junior national team and is a two-time junior national champion in the 100 breast.

BUTTERFLY

A pair of seniors in captains Tyler McGill and Jordan Anderson will lead a solid group of butterflyers this season. Juniors Andrew Mitchell and Looney and sophomore Aaron Middleton join the seniors and will add strength and experience.

"We have a solid group of guys in this stroke," assistant coach Richard Long said. "Tyler and Jordan will be great leaders and Andrew is very versatile and has a very strong stroke."

McGill enters his last season as a finalist at the 2009 World Championships in the 100m fly, while also earning gold as a part of the 400m medley relay. Anderson is a two-time SEC runner-up in the 100 fly and will be a key part of the Tiger 200 medley relay.

Mitchell and Looney will be key contributors in the 200 fly, seeing both come off successful sophomore seasons. Looney reached the finals of the 200m fly at the U.S. National Championships this summer and earned All-America Honorable Mention honors in the 200y distance at the NCAA meet. Mitchell came away with a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Championships in the 200 fly and finished 10th in the event at the conference meet.

Newcomers Ferguson, Sam Kiefer and Tony Cox will give Auburn added depth in the butterfly events. Kiefer is a two-time Alabama state champion in the 100 fly, while Cox finished ninth in the 100 fly at the 2008 Short Course Junior Championships.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Auburn returns a handful of experienced swimmers, including McGill and Mitchell, in the IM events. McGill returns as the Auburn record-holder and SEC runner-up in the 200 IM and Mitchell enters the 2009-10 season as an All-American in the 400 IM.

"Tyler has a great butterfly stroke and can take it out fast or conserve energy

and come out on top in the end," assistant coach Paul Yetter said. "He's going to be very strong in the 200 IM again this year. Andrew is improving rapidly and has strengths in all strokes. We'll be looking to him to be a leader in both events."

Also returning is Silva, Looney and Klein. Silva and Klein both excel in the breaststroke, but will provide experience in the 200 IM. Looney, a distance swimmer, has a strong freestyle and butterfly and will contribute in the 400 IM.

Ferguson, Kramer and Owens will add depth in the individual medley events for the Tigers.

DIVING

Kelly Marx returns as the lone senior on the squad, while classmate Dan Mazzaferro will earn a redshirt due to an injury. Marx enters his final season with an impressive resume and looks to continue his success throughout the year.

"Kelly had an outstanding year last year and it is our goal to continue that progress even farther," Shaffer said. "He really stepped up his performance at the NCAA championships and probably had one of the best overall performances at the meet."

Marx comes into the 2009-10 campaign as a three-time All-American last season and was the 2009 NCAA runner-up on the three-meter springboard. He is coming off a very successful summer where he and teammate Mazzaferro took bronze on the 3-meter synchronized springboard at the 2009 World University Games in Belgrade, Serbia. After finishing second on all three boards at the SEC championships last season, Marx is looking to do one better and close out his collegiate career as a conference champion once again.

Joining him are sophomore Adam Godzinski and freshman Thad Ellis. Godzinski made great progress during his first season with Auburn, recording NCAA Zone cuts on the 1-meter and 3-meter springboards. Ellis starts his collegiate career as a four-time high school All-American and the 2008 Georgia Diver of the Year. He had a successful run at the 2008 USA Junior Nationals, finishing third on the 1-meter and sixth on the 3-meter.

AUBURN SWIMMING/DIVING HISTORY

Auburn organized a “tank team” five years before swimming was recognized as a Southeastern Conference sport. The 1932 squad was coached and captained by Howard Morris, a sophomore engineering student from Montgomery.

Even before this team was officially established, Auburn competed in “telegraphic” meets. The pool in the basement of Alumni Gym was only 55 feet long and 25 feet wide. Three lanes were marked off, and the athletes swam three laps for 165 feet, or 50 meters. They timed themselves and compared the results with other schools via telegraph. How Auburn fared is shrouded in lost memories.

By 1936, “Boots” Chambless, a former Auburn athlete and assistant football coach, headed the swim team known as the “Paddlers,” or the “Tank Team.” With 16 student-athletes eligible for intercollegiate competition, the team received new equipment, swimming suits and robes and were able to take 10 swimmers on the road to compete against other universities.

Chambless was unable to coach during the 1938-39 season and by 1940, the team was captained by Henry Mohns and Sterling Smith, with an organization “built among themselves.” Various coaches helped out with training and scheduling meets. The 1940 team is the first to show up on official SEC records, finishing fifth at the SEC Championships. The Tigers finished fifth again the following year.

What happened after 1941? Very little, if anything, judging by the lack of records. All collegiate sports took a hiatus during 1943-44 because of World War II and when they resumed, Auburn elected not to have a swim team because of inadequate facilities. Bo Torbert, a former Alabama Supreme Court Justice, was a member of the team that resumed competition in 1947. “We were the first after the war to have a swim team,” Torbert recalled. The SEC Championships resumed in 1948.

The 1950s and 1960s were quiet years for the swim program, which consisted mainly of volunteers, the best swimmers from Auburn’s mandatory swim classes. One of the major accomplishments was the construction of a new pool adjacent to Memorial Coliseum.

Students had been pressuring the administration for a new pool, but were met with constant resistance until Harry M. Philpott

became Auburn’s president in 1965. He was a driving force behind the construction of Auburn’s first competitive swimming facility.

A new era of AU swimming began in 1970 when coach Bill Washington headed the new swim team formed that fall. “We got money to travel, but we had to buy our own suits, T-shirts and warm-ups. We swam in seven meets and lost all of them,” Washington said. The next year the team swam in 11 meets and won two. The third year, with Tennessee added, Auburn won five and lost eight.

During this period, the conference developed into a nationally respected arena for top swimmers. At the same time, Washington moved into a full-time teaching position in the physical education department and the university hired Eddie Reese as the new swimming coach.

Auburn’s rise to national prominence under Reese is unprecedented in NCAA history. In his first season, 1973, he took Auburn from last in the conference to fourth and was named SEC Coach of the Year. In 1974, Auburn jumped to third place in the SEC with the help of Mike Drews, who won three SEC titles and was named SEC Swimmer of the Year. With a 17th-place finish at the NCAA Championships, the Tigers served notice that they were becoming a national power.

Auburn’s success enabled the Tigers to recruit better athletes to continue the success. In 1978, the men’s team hit its all-time high with a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships in Long Beach, Calif. Two-time SEC Swimmer of the Year Scott Spann captured individual titles in the 200-yard IM and the 100-yard breaststroke at the 1978 Championships.

Auburn began a women’s program in

1974. Although no scholarships were offered until 1976, the Lady Tigers swam competitively under Reese. Following the 1978 season, Reese left Auburn for the same position with the University of Texas, which had just moved into a brand-new facility. He has remained at Texas since leaving Auburn and has served as the head coach for the U.S. National Team at the Olympic Games on three different occasions.

Richard Quick, a former Southern Methodist All-American, who had developed a national reputation as a talented young coach, was chosen to replace Reese.

Quick led Auburn to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships in 1979 and a fifth-place finish in 1980, a position the Tigers would maintain for the next two years. From 1978 to 1980, Auburn swimmers David McCagg, Bill Forrester, Rick Morley and Rowdy Gaines dominated the 400- and 800-yard freestyle relays winning three NCAA titles.

Women’s swimming became an official SEC sport in 1982 and Auburn’s team, lead by Annie Lett and Carolyn Goodley, finished fourth at the AIAW Championships in the first of three consecutive top 10 performances.

But the era belonged to Ambrose “Rowdy” Gaines, one of the greatest athletes in school history. Gaines was known around the globe as the world’s fastest swimmer. As a sophomore he led the Tigers to a

sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. By 1980, when he helped Auburn finish fifth at the NCAA meet, Gaines was practically invincible and was chosen for the United States Olympic Team. After the United States boycotted the 1980 Moscow Games, Gaines would later win three gold medals at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

In the 1982 season, the Auburn men finished fifth and the women were fourth, but after the season Quick became the second-consecutive AU coach to leave the Plains for the University of Texas. Quick spent six years at Texas, followed by 17 years at Stanford (winning 12 NCAA titles along the way) before returning to Auburn as its head coach prior to the 2007-08 season.

Quick was succeeded by John Asmuth, who came to Auburn in 1973 as a swimmer under Eddie Reese. He became an assistant coach in 1976 and was retained by Quick in 1978. Asmuth is best known for helping coach Rowdy Gaines and coaching Per Johansson, an Auburn swimmer who won a bronze medal for Sweden in the 1980 Moscow Olympics and two bronze medals in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.

Auburn diving reached new heights in 1987 when Jose Rocha captured the NCAA crown on the 1-meter springboard. During his career at Auburn, Rocha won five SEC titles and was twice named SEC Diver of the Year.

In the eight years Asmuth was at the helm of the Auburn program, his teams finished in the top 10 three times and in the top 20 another three years.

One of Asmuth's greatest contributions to Auburn can be seen in the James E. Martin Aquatics Center. Asmuth was a key player in the plans to build a world-class natatorium and served as director of the

James E. Martin Aquatics Center from 1990-2008.

Auburn vaulted into the higher echelons of collegiate swimming in the 1990s. Equipped with a world-class facility and a talented, enthusiastic coach named David Marsh, Auburn swimming stood higher than ever before.

A product of the Auburn swimming program, Marsh returned to the Plains as head coach in 1990. Over his last five seasons, Auburn swimming and diving produced 643 All-Americans honors. Success was the story for Auburn under David Marsh.

In Marsh's inaugural campaign, 1991, the Auburn men placed 20th at the NCAA Championships, only a year earlier they had failed to produce any NCAA qualifiers. The women made breakthrough strides in 1992, leaping 27 spots to eighth in the nation after 1991's disappointing 35th-place finish. The men continued their climb up the national ladder with a 15th place 1992 NCAA finish.

For the women, 1993 marked a second-consecutive eighth-place NCAA finish. Marina Smith took the NCAA crown on the 1-meter springboard. The men rose to sixth at the NCAA Championships. Both teams placed second in the SEC.

In 1994, the Auburn men did what no other Auburn swim team had ever done before, win a SEC team title. Swimming in the brand-new Martin Aquatics Center, AU claimed the team title in front of a capacity crowd. The women placed second at conference for the third straight year as Kristie Krueger captured her second SEC 100 butterfly title. At the national meet, the women made history by winning a relay, the 200 medley relay.

Auburn became the first women's team outside of Stanford, Texas and Florida to win a relay in NCAA Championship history in 1994. Stephanie Bowers, Keri Reynolds, Kristie Krueger and Allison Bock combined to win the 200-yard medley relay. Auburn finished fifth as a team. At the NCAA Men's Championships, Auburn placed fourth and Marsh was named 1994 National Coach of the Year.

Kurt Jachimowski inspired the Auburn men to a third-place 1995 NCAA finish, as he won the Tigers' first NCAA individual swimming crown in 14 years. Jachimowski swam away with the 200 IM title and finaled in both backstrokes at the national meet.

The Auburn women finished 13th at the 1995 NCAA Championships. At the SEC Championships, Auburn won its second straight men's team title, while the women were runners-up for the fourth straight year.

Although Tennessee ended Auburn's two-year hold on the SEC title in February 1996, the Tigers bounced back in March to finish as the national runner-up, placing second at the NCAA Championships in Austin, just 43 points behind homestanding Texas. Auburn's team of Scott Tucker, Oliver Gumbrell, Brock Newman and Nick Shackell claimed Auburn its first relay national title since 1980 at the meet, posting a Jamail Swim Center record in the 400 freestyle relay with a blistering 2:52.87 in the final event of the three-day meet. In all, Auburn broke school records in six events (100, 200 back, 200 and 400 medley relay, 100 fly and 100 breast) at the meet.

Three Tigers - John Hargis, Scott Tucker and Nick Shackell - were chosen for the 1996 Olympics. Hargis and Tucker for the U.S. team and Shackell for Great Britain. With two swimmers on the U.S. team, and Shackell for Great Britain. With two swimmers on the U.S. team, Marsh was named as an assistant for the men's team. Hargis and Tucker returned to the Plains with gold medals for their parts in helping the U.S. place first in the 400 medley and 400 free relays, respectively.

A young Auburn women's team rebounded from a fifth-place SEC finish to place 12th at 1995-96 NCAA Championships in Ann Arbor, Mich., giving Auburn swimming fans reason to be optimistic about the both teams' futures.

Auburn's women's team continued to progress in 1997 as the Tigers finished second at SECs and seventh at NAAs, it's highest finish since 1994. The women had 10 SEC champions, five NCAA champions and 30 All-American honors.

It was 1997, that was the year for the Auburn men, as the Tigers claimed Auburn's first swimming national title and its fourth SEC championship. The men had 15 SEC champions, 17 NCAA champions and 49 All-American honors.

In 1999, the Auburn men brought the NCAA title back home by winning four relays and three individual events. All 17 men earned All-America honors, marking the first time in school history this has

happened. En route to claiming the second title, Auburn won its third consecutive SEC title, fifth in six years, proving to be a dynasty.

It was another first for Auburn swimming in 2002 as the women's team captured its first NCAA title. The Tigers brought 11 athletes to Austin, Texas for the meet and all 11 brought home All-America honors with junior Maggie Bowen taking seven of her own. Not to be outdone, the AU men also claimed a championship in 2002, bringing home the hardware from the SEC Championships for the sixth consecutive time.

As if Auburn hadn't already reached the pinnacle of the sport, the 2003 season brought an NCAA first with it. Not only did the men win the SEC championship for the seventh consecutive time, but also the celebratory jump in the pool had the women's team joining them for the first time post-SEC meet. The season was far from over there, however, as the women's team successfully defended its title with 50 All-America honors in front of the home crowd. The men then went down to Austin, Texas, and nearly lapped the field, scoring 609.5 points to bring home the men's team's third NCAA title. All 19 swimmers

that went to the meet scored and the Tigers scored in all 21 events. The notability of the double wins was compounded by the fact that no combined coaching staff had ever won a men's and women's title in the same season - until Marsh and Co. did it.

At the 2004 Olympics, a total of 12 Auburn swimmers competed, bringing home an Auburn record-tying five medals, including the first three Olympic medals by an Auburn female as Kirsty Coventry took home a gold, silver and bronze. That went along with five world records that the men's team set at the 2004 NCAA Championships and the nine combined NCAA records from the men and women at both national and SEC Championships. On the collegiate front, Marsh did what no one thought was possible for the second straight season in 2004, sweeping the men's and women's NCAA crowns.

In 2005, the Auburn men captured its third consecutive national title and ninth straight SEC title. For third straight year, both the AU men and women won the SEC titles.

The women's NCAA Championship in 2006 will go down in school and NCAA history as one of the most exciting meets

ever. In a down-to-the-wire championship, the Tigers came out on top by a mere three points over Georgia, in the Bulldogs' home pool, to take their fourth NCAA crown. A week later and for the third time under Marsh, the men were able to duplicate the women's title and take their sixth NCAA victory. It also marked another milestone for four Auburn senior men - George Bovell, Kurt Cady, Eric Shanteau and Doug Van Wie - would conclude their careers having never lost a dual, conference or NCAA meet.

The Auburn men continued the team's streak in 2007, winning its fifth-consecutive NCAA Championship in Minneapolis, Minn., winning by 169 points over Stanford. Auburn tallied seven individual titles and a team-record 65 All-America honors en route to its fifth-straight championship, the longest run since Indiana won six in a row from 1968-73.

Cesar Cielo highlighted the week, earning NCAA Swimmer of the Year honors. The Tigers also picked up another SEC championship along the way, earning 11 individual titles in Lexington, Ky. The men's title made it a clean sweep after the women's team had earned its second consecutive NCAA Championship, fifth in the team's history, the week before.

The women came from behind on the final day, erasing a 32-point deficit to Arizona to win by 58 points. The Tigers won four individual titles while earning 57 All-America honors for the win. The national title came a month to the day after the women also picked up another SEC Championship.

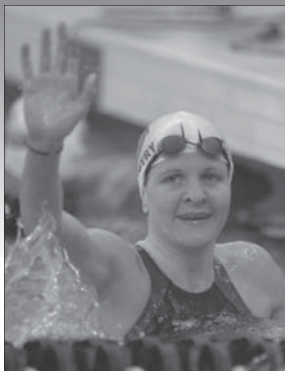
The 2007-08 season saw the end to the NCAA runs for the Auburn squads, but the Tigers were able to extend their SEC titles runs while also making a statement on the international stage.

Auburn's women could not keep up with Arizona at the NCAA Championships, scoring 348 points to the Wildcats' 484. The men had a similar experience a week later, tallying 316 points and finishing fifth behind NCAA champion Arizona and its 500.5 points. Ava Ohlgren took the NCAA title in the 400 IM to lead the women's team while Cielo set new U.S. Open and NCAA records in the 50 free and 100 free. Cielo finished the meet with four individual titles (also swimming on two winning relay teams), giving him an Auburn record of 10 NCAA titles. For his efforts at the meet,

Cielo was named the NCAA Swimmer of the Year for the second year in a row. In all, the men's team earned 41 All-America honors from 16 athletes while the women picked up 44 honors from 14 athletes.

The Tigers swept the team titles at the SEC Championships for the fifth time in the team's history in 2008. The men won their 12th in a row while the women claimed their fifth in the last six years. Cesar Cielo was named Swimmer of the Year while Quick was named SEC Men's Coach of the Year. For Quick, the conference title was the 22nd of his career, but his first men's title.

Auburn swimmers also had a big year on the international level, starting with the FINA Short Course World Championships where current and former Auburn swimmers tallied 13 medals, including eight gold medals and five world records.

Next up was the Beijing Olympics where Auburn set a school record with 21 current, former and future Tiger swimmers competing. AU swimmers went on to pick up a record 13 medals at the Games, led by Coventry's school record of four, including a gold and a world record in the 200 back. Cielo, competing in his first Olympics, earned a gold in the 50 free and a bronze in the 100 free. Former Tiger Dave Denniston also returned to the pool following his 2005

sledding accident, competing in the 2008 Paralympic Games.

Auburn returned to the pool for the 2008-09 season with hopes of returning back to the top in national competition. The Tiger men picked up their 13th-straight SEC title, recording 11 conference titles. The women finished in a close second to Florida and was led by Ava Ohlgren who finished with five SEC titles. Matt Targett was named Swimmer of the Year, while Ohlgren earned co-Swimmer of the Year.

Auburn's women headed to the NCAA Championships and came away with a sixth-place finish. The squad recorded 40 All-America honors. Ohlgren came away with a third-place finish in the 200 IM, while classmate Maggie Bird took third in the 500 free and fourth in the 1650 free.

The Tiger men entered the NCAA Championships ready to make a run at its eighth national title and came on top, defeating title-favorite Texas by 39 points. Matt Targett earned four NCAA titles as a part of four relays and had a team-best seven All-America honors. In the 100 back, Kohlton Norys swam to his first national title of his career. Richard Quick and Brett Hawke were named co-NCAA Men's Coach of the Year.

The Auburn swimming and diving team were well-represented internationally, sending 17 current and former student-athletes to the 2009 World Championships in Rome, Italy. Cesar Cielo came away from the championships with two gold medals (50m free, 100m free) and one world record (100m free). Kirsty Coventry set a new world mark on her way to a gold medal in the 200m back. As members of the 4x100m medley relay, Mark Gangloff, Tyler McGill and Eric Shanteau took gold for the United States.

Now that the Tigers had silenced any critics of continued Auburn dominance in the conference, it was time to move on to the big dance. Auburn had won five straight national titles from 2003-07 but saw their streak snapped in 2008 with a disappointing fifth-place showing.

Quickly setting the tone for fans and competitors alike, the Tigers hit a new US Open record time in the 200 freestyle relay. Auburn trailed Stanford by two-tenths going into the anchor. Targett left the block and it was all but over. The two-time Olympic medalist stormed passed David Dunford (18.52), clocking an 18.19 and earning Auburn a new NCAA and US Open record time of 1:14.08. Stanford placed second, hitting the wall in 1:14.22.

"People thought we peaked at SECs," said Hawke after day one of NAAs. "We knew as a team we hadn't. We knew, coming into this, it was going to be a dogfight the whole way. We feel like we have a team that can contend. We have to prove ourselves to be champions. There are still two days to do that. I feel pretty good about where we're at right now."

On the 1-meter springboard, junior Kelly Marx set the all-time Auburn six-dive record en route to a sixth-place finish, earning the Tigers 13 valuable points. The Overland Park, native topped the 3-year-old record, scoring 386.80. Marx surpassed the 382.80 mark set by Steve Segerlin at the 2008 NCAA Championships.

Auburn concluded day one with 141 points, trailing only Texas with 171. Behind Auburn were Stanford (130), Florida (107) and Cal (103).

Norys claimed the first men's 100 backstroke title in school history, setting the pace for a strong Auburn showing on day two of the 2009 NCAA Championships. Auburn relay

set another US Open Record on Friday while junior Kelly Marx and sophomore Adam Klein set new school records to edge the Tigers closer to the Texas Longhorn's top-spot.

"I knew it was a close race and when I turned at the 50," said Norys. "I saw someone ahead of me. I just tried to get my hand there first. It was great having two other teammates with me in the race, because we practice and train together. It was nice to win my first individual Gold Medal. It was a proud moment to be up on the awards stand in the top spot."

McGill led the Tigers with a second-place finish in the 100 fly, setting a new Auburn

record of 44.63 in the process. Madson took third with a new career-best time of 44.99. The Tigers took a total of 38 points from the 100 fly, cutting the Texas lead to 225-219. Stanford trailed close behind with 204.

Auburn earned 48 points in the 100 back, retaking second place from Stanford to trail Texas, 305-297. Stanford was in third with 265. Only 3-meter springboard finals and the 800 FR remained on the day's itinerary.

Marx set another Auburn record off the 3-meter springboard, earning a 454.85 as the Auburn divers looked to chip away at the Texas lead. Marx shattered the previous record of 427.80 set by Steve Segerlin on Feb. 3, 2007.

"I am speechless," said Marx. "I was excited when I finished second in the preliminaries, but to do it here tonight and set a school record is incredible. It has been hard this year, but I feel like I am peaking at the right time. I have taken it dive by dive and the consistency has paid off."

The Tigers entered Saturday's final session six points behind the Longhorns, however a strong preliminary swim gave Auburn the upper hand entering the finals. Trailing Texas by as many as 62 points on day two, Auburn took the lead for good following sophomore Klein's school-record setting performance in the 200 breast, where he finished fourth. Auburn grabbed a one point advantage after the event and never looked back.

Saturday's finals began with the AU backstrokers, who continued their dominant display, putting the Tigers seven points back of the Longhorns with a 44-point effort. Wollach led the way for Auburn, hitting the wall in 1:39.65 for a fourth-place finish worth 15 points.

The Tigers earned 36 points in the 200 fly and extended their lead to 473-436, behind senior Madson (1:41.70) who finished third. McGill (1:42.44) followed in fifth while sophomore Robert Looney (1:42.76) hit a new personal-best time to place 11th.

Auburn capped the championship, winning the 400 free relay behind the foursome of Andkjaer, Targett, Norys and McGill, who turned in a time of 2:46.67.

"To win a national championship is an incredible feeling that I can't begin to describe," said Madson. "To start at Auburn as a champion and finish my career as a champion is incredible. That is exactly why I came to Auburn."

Auburn finished the meet with 526 points, 39 ahead of second place Texas. Quick, who is the first coach to win a national title at three schools, is battling an inoperable brain tumor that was diagnosed in December 2008. Quick was not in College Station for the championships, as the Tigers were directed by assistant Brett Hawke who has led the program since Quick's diagnosis.

"This is just a great way to finish the meet," Hawke said. "It's a great tribute to Richard Quick and what he means to this program"

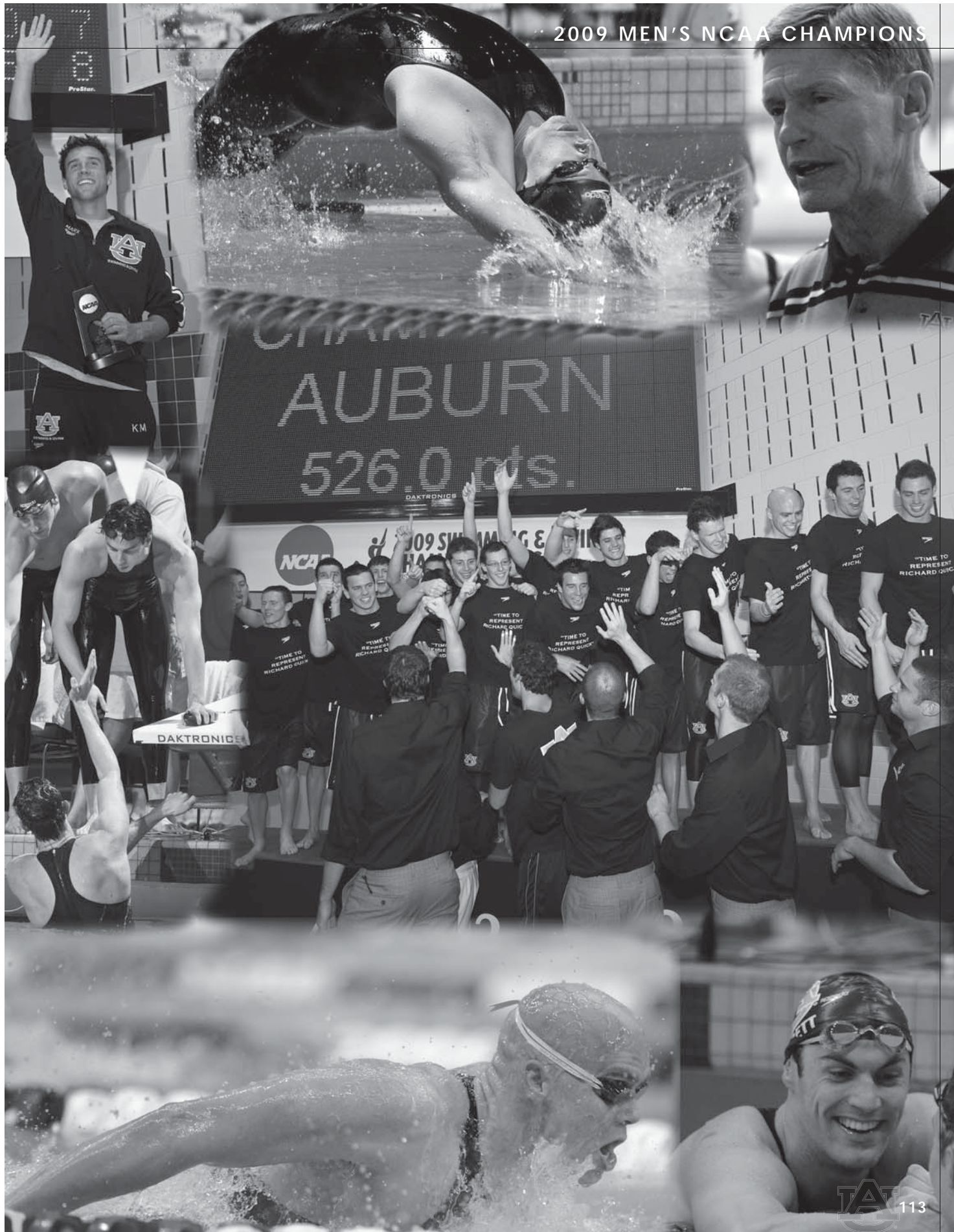
Over the course of his 31 year coaching career, Quick won seven national titles at Stanford and five at Texas to accompany his first at Auburn.

It took a total team effort, but the 2006-07 Auburn women's swimming and diving team mounted a final-day comeback to pick up its second NCAA Championship and fifth in the past six years. The Tigers overcame a 32-point deficit to Arizona in the final day, finishing with a 58-point victory.

All 19 Auburn swimmers and divers that competed earned at least one All-America honor, combining for 55 honors during the three-day meet. The 19 individuals to earn All-American status is a new Auburn record, surpassing the previous mark of 18 set in 2004 and 2006, while the 57 total All-American awards ranks second best in a single championship meet for the Auburn women.

"It unbelievable," said senior co-captain Adrienne Binder. "I never knew that I could be this emotional about it. I am so proud of this team and I couldn't be happier right now. It's been the most amazing experience and we've been through so much this year. It couldn't have gone any better. It's perfect."

Co-head coach Dorsey Tierney-Walker, who earned NCAA Coach of the Year honors along with David Marsh, was also impressed with the way her team finished.

"The girls surprised even me, and I don't get surprised very often," said Tierney-Walker. "What a total team effort each session. The way we came out and just got better and better every session says something. This team

has been through some challenges this year, and I think it's made them stronger as individuals and stronger as a unit. It certainly showed this weekend, and it's by far the best this team has every swum. I couldn't be more proud."

The Tigers started off the meet in second place after the first day of competition with 155 points, 13 behind Arizona.

Binder earned her 11th career All-American honor but first national championship by dominating the 500 free, smashing her own school record with a mark of 4:36.96. Hayley Peirsol and Maggie Bird piled it on for the Tigers, finishing behind Binder in fourth and seventh, respectively.

Freshman Ava Ohlgren had a great finish to her first NCAA event, finishing runner-up in the 200 IM with a time of 1:55.67, foreshadowing things to come for her in the NCAA Championships.

In the opening day relays, Auburn finished fourth in the 200 free relay and sixth in the 400 medley relay.

After picking up one individual title in the first day, Auburn added to it with two more in the second day. The Tigers, who set four school records and had individual victories from Ohlgren in the 400 IM and Rachel Goh in the 100 back, trailed Arizona by 32 points entering the final day of competition.

Ohlgren, seeded 13th entering the meet, stunned defending champion Whitney Myers of Arizona by shattering her personal best with a school-record time of 4:04.08. Ohlgren, whose best mark of the season entering the meet was 4:15.01, broke the previous Auburn record of 4:04.48 set by Kirsty Coventry in 2005.

"I didn't really know what to expect, but I was really happy with the outcome," said Ohlgren. "I just tried to go out there and swim my race. Our coaches told us to just go out there and get our personal best times and do what we can, and that's what I did."

Ohlgren was not the only swimmer who excelled in the 400 IM, as Julie Stupp set a personal best with a time of 4:07.32 to finish fourth, while Binder placed sixth with a time of 4:10.08.

Goh repeated as NCAA champion in the 100 back, breaking another school record set by Coventry in 2005. Goh, whose previous best was 52.34 set while winning the SEC title in February, raced to a time of 51.97, bettering Coventry's mark of 52.32.

"It was really exciting for me," said Goh. "Of course I wanted to defend my title. But I swim my races not for myself but for the other 19 girls on the team. I rely on them and they rely on me."

Melissa Marik kept things rolling for Auburn as she surprised the field by making the 100 back final after being seeded 44th. She went on to finish eighth with a time of 53.82.

Emily Kukors broke her own school record in the 200 free that she had set during the prelims when she posted the fastest qualifying time of 1:43.96. Although she improved to 1:43.72 in the finals, she was edged by Arizona's Lacey Nymeyer, who won in 1:43.49. Kukors finished third overall.

In the night's relays, Auburn just missed another title, finishing second in the 800 free relay with another school-record time of 7:01.05, breaking the previous school mark by .06 seconds. The Tigers trailed California by more than three seconds after two legs, but Kukors exploded for a 1:43.39 split, making up more than four seconds on Cal's swimmer and giving Auburn the lead. Binder was edged during the last 50 yards as Cal won by just .16 seconds.

In the 200 medley relay, the team of Goh, Kara Denby, Margo McCawley and Kukors swam a season-best time of 1:38.06 to finish third.

Lynnsey Segraves led Auburn in the 3-meter diving, reaching a championship final for the first time in her career. The senior posted a personal-best score of 347.90 to finish sixth.

"That was really exciting and rewarding to watch," said head diving coach Jeff Shaffer. "A senior in her last NCAA championships stepping up and making her first final, and then competing to the best of her ability. I couldn't be happier for Lynnsey."

After trailing in second the first two days of the meet, it was all Auburn on the final day. The finals session started with a bang for Auburn, as the Tigers took the top two spots and had four of the top 15 in the 1650 free. Peirsol defended her NCAA title in the 1650, breaking her own school record with a time of 15:45.92. Peirsol raced to an early lead and lapped much of the field, cruising to victory by more than seven seconds. Her nearest competitor was Binder as she came home in a personal-best time of 15:53.44 to earn the silver.

"I wanted to go out with a bang," said Peirsol. "During the whole race, I was just thinking 'Suck it up for a little over 15 minutes.' We have put in the work this year. We have worked hard and NCAAs is just the fun part. This is where all of our work pays off."

Haser finished in ninth place with a time of 16:12.85, and Bird was 15th in 16:18.03 as the Tigers rolled up 48 points in the event to erase the 32-point deficit to Arizona and take over first place in the team standings after just one final.

In the next event, the 200 back, Auburn's depth helped add to the lead, as the Tigers placed five swimmers in the top 16. Marik led the way for the Tigers as she swam in the championship final, finishing eighth in 1:56.69.

The Tigers had two of the top five finishers in the 100 free, as Denby placed fourth in 48.07 seconds, just .03 shy of her school record from the prelims, and Kukors was fifth in 48.40 seconds.

Auburn then placed three swimmers in the top 10 of the 200 breast, expanding the lead to more than 50 points and securing the team title with two finals left. Kristen Hastrup led the way with a fifth-place finish in 1:55.90, while Ohlgren added to her stellar meet with a seventh-place finish in 1:56.343, earning the fifth of her six All-American honors for the meet, tying her for second most by a freshman in school history.

In the platform diving competition, Lynnsey Segraves just missed a spot in the championship final with a ninth-place finish in the prelims and a score of 272.60. But she bounced back in a big way, setting a school record with a score of 300.05 to win the consolation final.

"What a great way for her to end her career, with a consolation win and a new school record breaking 300 points," said head diving coach Jeff Shaffer. "I'm real proud of her effort today and real proud of the performances by both Lynnsey and Corey (Gerlach) at this years NCAAs. I'm glad we could contribute to the team effort."

The Tigers capped off the meet with a fourth-place finish in the 400 free relay, as the team of Denby, Ohlgren, Marik and Kukors finished with a time of 3:15.35. It was not as quick as their mark from the prelims, but with victory assured, it hardly seemed to matter.

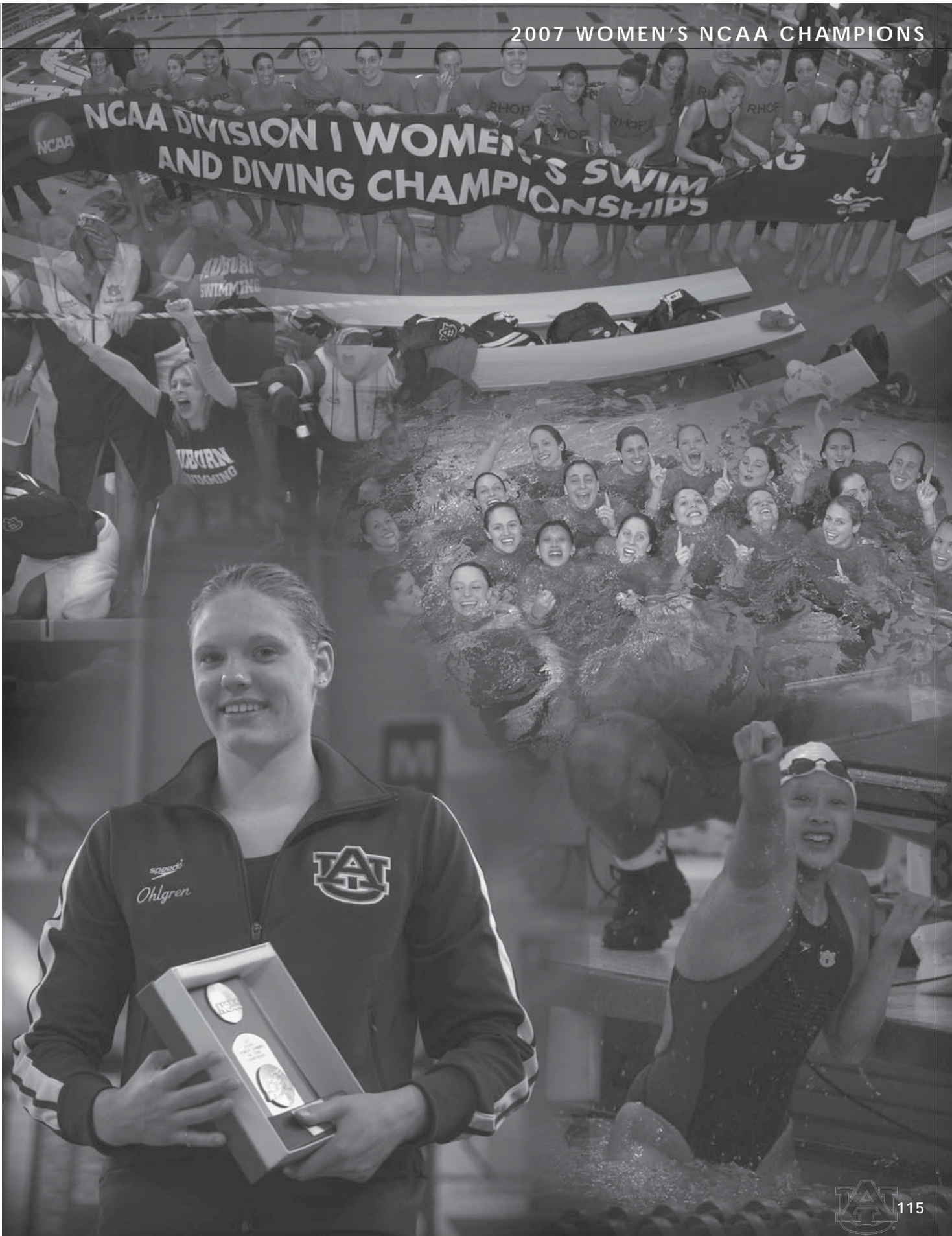
For outgoing head coach David Marsh, the win marked the 11th national championship his career.

"Sending out David in his final women's meet with a victory was very, very important to this group," said Tierney-Walker. "It was very well-deserved for David and I wouldn't want to send him out any other way."

Auburn scored 187 points on the first day of the NCAA Championships to take the lead and never looked back as the Tigers led wire-to-wire to win their fifth consecutive national championship.

"This is probably my third, fourth or fifth most talented team," said head coach David Marsh, who coached his last meet as Auburn's head coach. "But we've never had a better meet top to bottom.

"Our team has made this year very special. I really just enjoy this team. There are so many great individuals, and I could go down story by story and tell you how they have gone from rags to riches, including all three of our captains. This group has a lot of depth that involves where they have come from and what they have gone through."

Auburn kept the momentum going on the second day to lead by more than 100 points heading into the final day of competition. A dominating day-three performance gave the Tigers 566 total points, topping Stanford, the nearest competition, by 169 points.

The Tigers' domination was evident based on the awards presented following the meet. Marsh was named NCAA Division I Men's Swimming Coach of the Year, Jeff Shaffer was named NCAA Division I Men's Diving Coach of the Year, Cesar Cielo was the NCAA Division I Men's Swimmer of the Year and Steven Segerlin was named NCAA Division I Men's Diver of the Year.

The Tigers did not wait until the final day, though, before getting the excitement started as Cielo broke the 50 free record on the opening day to become the fastest swimmer in the world.

Cielo swam 50 yards faster than anyone has ever done before, and more impressively, he did it twice in less than an hour. Cielo posted matching times of 18.69 to win the 50 free and leading off the record-setting 200 free relay as Auburn took a 66-point lead

after the opening day.

Cielo broke the NCAA and US Open records held by former Tiger Fred Bousquet, who had a time of 18.74 in the prelims of the 50 free at the 2005 meet, which was also held in Minneapolis. Prior to Thursday, Bousquet was the only man who had ever swum 50 yards in less than 19 seconds, but Cielo did it four times in one day. He had times of 18.84 and 18.89 during the prelims in the 50 free and 200 free relay, respectively.

The Tigers started the evening session by repeating as champions in the 200 free relay, and they did it impressively. Cielo teamed with Matt Targett, Scott Goodrich and Bryan Lundquist, who all swam sub-19 second splits, to smash the NCAA and U.S. Open records with a time of 1:14.71. Their time was more than one second faster than the old record of 1:15.78 set by California in 2005, which stood until the Tigers posted a mark of 1:15.56 in the prelims.

Less than an hour later, Auburn scored 70 points in the 50 free by placing five swimmers in the top nine.

"The sprinters were nothing short of amazing," said head coach David Marsh. "I don't use that word very often when I'm coaching, but that was an exhibition I'd like to say has never been seen at the NCAA level."

Cielo and Goodrich also helped Auburn finish third in the 400 medley relay to conclude the opening night. Goodrich led off and Cielo anchored, with David Maras and Alexei Puninski swimming the middle legs as Auburn clocked a time of 3:06.09.

Auburn also received valuable points from its divers, as Segerlin finished third and Kelly Marx sixth on the 1-meter board.

The Auburn swimming and diving team inched closer to its fifth straight NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving on day two as it stretched its lead to 102 points entering the final day of competition. The Tigers used a combination of depth, diving

and relay speed to widen their margin, which stood at 66 points after day one. Auburn's team of Goodrich, Maras, Puninski and Cielo posted a time of 1:23.37, easily breaking the old NCAA mark of 1:23.88 set by Arizona in 2006. It marked the fifth time that Auburn has won the 200 medley relay since 1997.

Auburn's lone individual victory of the day came from Segerlin, who won his second career NCAA title and first on the 3-meter board. Segerlin won the event with a score of 401.50. Dan Mazzaferro finished 11th overall on the 3-meter board after posting a score of 352.40.

"It feels awesome to win an NCAA title on a springboard event," said Segerlin.

"At Auburn, platform has always been our big focus, but Jeff (Shaffer) is an amazing coach in both springboard and platform. Coming to college I never dreamed I'd win a title on springboard."

The Tigers added to their lead with three finalists in the 100 fly. Targett broke the school record that Alexei Puninski had set during the prelims and finished third with a time of 45.87, besting Puninski's prelim mark of 46.19. Puninski improved to 46.06 to finish fifth, while Jakob Andkjær placed eighth with a time of 46.76.

In the 100 back, James Wike matched his prelim time of 46.87 to finish fifth place in the finals. Bryan Lundquist finished eighth in 46.97 while Goodrich finished second in the consolation final to place 10th overall, with a time of 47.33, and Cielo placed 16th with a time of 48.23. In the 100 breast, Jon Roberts finished in sixth place with a time of 53.01 as Maras won the consolation final to place ninth overall with a time of 52.94.

Auburn also had a sixth-place finish in the 800 free relay, as the team of Andkjær, Lundquist, Tyler McGill and Joey Schneider finished with a time of 6:24.80.

The Tigers left little doubt in the final day of the meet, essentially clinching the team title during prelims by advancing 11 swimmers and three divers into the finals while already holding a 102-point lead. Auburn, which set five NCAA records during the meet, finished with 566 points.

Although Auburn's sprinters grabbed much of the spotlight, it was a total team effort that earned the Tigers the title. Eighteen different individuals combined for 64 All-American honors during the three-day event. The 64 All-American honors was a new school record, while the 18 individuals to be honored was second best in school history.

Cielo highlighted the evening by putting his name atop the NCAA record book for the fourth and fifth times during the meet. Cielo started his evening by setting a new NCAA record in the 100 free with a winning time of 41.17 seconds, breaking the old mark of 41.49 set by Duje Draganja of California in 2005 while becoming only the second Auburn swimmer to win the 100 free, joining Rowdy Gaines, who won the event in 1980 and 1981. He also became the first Tiger ever to win the 50 free and 100 free at the same NCAA meet.

Targett finished sixth in the 100 free in 42.71 seconds, while Andkjær won the consolation final in 42.67 seconds to place ninth overall. Lundquist placed 13th in 43.01 seconds and Goodrich finished 16th in 43.87.

Cielo also helped Auburn wrap up the meet by winning the 400 free relay with yet another NCAA record. The group of Andkjær, Cielo, Targett and Lundquist sped to a time of 2:46.56, smashing the previous mark of 2:47.70 set by California in 2005.

Segerlin capped a terrific collegiate career by winning his second diving title of the meet and third of his career, defending his title in the platform competition. Segerlin, who finished his Auburn career with 11 All-American honors, recorded a score of 414.90 to edge Arizona State's Michele Benedetti by less than three points.

"I was a little shook up after I missed my second and third dives," said Segerlin. "But Jeff Shaffer worked with me over the summer to increase my degree of difficulty. I knew if I stayed solid in my more difficult dives I could get back in the game, and that's what happened."

Two freshmen also reached the platform finals as Marx finished in sixth place with a score of 352.35 to earn his second All-American honor, while Mazzaferro finished in eighth place on the platform with a score of 332.05.

Scott and Logan Madson were impressive in the 200 fly, both breaking their personal bests for the second time of the day. Scott finished second in 1:43.47, which ranks second in school history, while Madson improved to 1:43.97, finishing in fourth place. McGill placed 11th by clocking a time of 1:45.04 in the consolation finals.

In the 200 back, Wike was not able to match his personal best time of 1:41.93 from the prelims, but still finished in sixth place with a time of 1:42.92, bettering his eighth place performance from last year's NCAA meet. Roberts finished 15th in the 200 breast with a time of 1:57.37, while Osborne placed 16th in 1:58.62.

"This year was a very challenging year," said Marsh. "There were so many things this year that turned us in another direction. So many obstacles came in our way, but the coaching staff and the team members themselves were brilliant."

The 2005-06 Tigers were ready for a battle at the NCAA Championships and were dressed accordingly in blue fatigues.

As the No. 2 ranked team all season behind host-Georgia, the pressure was finally off the Tigers, after being the team to beat for the previous four years.

"We know we are the underdogs coming in," junior Hayley Peirsol said. "There isn't any pressure on us. It is just fun. It is just swimming for us."

Even with the pressure supposedly off, the Tigers were still in pursuit of their fourth NCAA title in the last five years and winning would mean snapping Georgia's 50 straight victories in Gabrielsen Natatorium. Auburn had 17 swimmers and two divers competing (the only team in the nation to qualify a full squad), two more than Georgia and three more than No. 3 Arizona.

Of the six events contested on day one, five of them were won by Arizona or

Georgia competitors. Arizona, who according to the official psyche sheet, was not expected to finish in the top-five saw themselves in the lead after wins in the 200 free relay, 200 IM and 400 medley relay.

It was an orange and blue clad 500 free final as three AU competitors graced the field of eight, each posting lifetime best swims in the morning prelims. Peirsol lowered her career best in the final to grab the runner up spot with a time of 4:41.78. Adrienne Binder ended up fourth and Chelsea Haser seventh as the trio earned 44 points in that event alone.

The Tigers kept mounting up the points in the 200 IM with Emily Kukors in third, Julie Stupp in seventh and Lauren Duerk in ninth. In the 500 free and 200 IM alone, the Tigers racked up 54 percent of their day one point total. At the end of the first day, AU trailed Arizona by 10 and led Georgia by four points.

Day two opened with a disappointing fifth place finish in the 200 medley relay, but sophomore Julie Stupp sparked energy in her Tiger team as she battled to a runner-up finish in the 400 IM (4:09.22) and was surrounded by two teammates in the championship final.

In the next three events Georgia outscored Auburn by 90 points and controlled the leader board and the top spot on the podium. Bulldog stars Kara Lynn Joyce and Mary DeScenza continued to thrive in their home pool, each picking up an NCAA individual title on day two.

The Tigers would save the best for last on day two in the remaining two individual events, 100 back and 3-meter diving. After nearly two days of competition, the Tigers finally crowned their first national champion of the meet as freshman Rachel Goh became the first Auburn female to win the NCAA 100 back title.

Following Goh's triumphant performance, classmate Corey Gerlach garnered the attention on 3-meter springboard. With each dive Gerlach improved and ended up third, the highest finish for any Tiger freshman on 3-meter.

With one day remaining Auburn found themselves trailing the Bulldogs by 53 points. The Tigers would have to pull off their best final day ever to have a shot at the national crown. The battle for the title would begin in morning prelims.

On Saturday morning the gamefaces were on and the letters "YAHM" were proudly displayed on every woman. The letters stood for, "You Always Have More," and the Tigers would live up to that slogan as they returned every

swimmer from the prelims to finals and consols (Georgia had just seven).

"They were sky high after the morning session," Marsh said. "They rode that momentum right into the finals."

The night started off with a bang from the distance free trio of Peirsol, Binder and Haser. Peirsol became Auburn's first national champion in the 1650 free and teammates Binder and Chelsea were third and 13th, respectively. The 40 points from the 1650 free helped move the Tigers within 33 points of UGA.

After 39 points from the 200 back compared to Georgia's 17, Auburn pulled within reach, needing just 11 points to tie with five events remaining. It wouldn't take long for Auburn to pull even with Georgia after mounting 31 points from three competitors in the 100 free, even though UGA's Joyce was the overall winner. En route to evening the slate at 436, Kukors broke a three-year old AU record in the 100 free (48.52) to finish fourth.

Auburn opened up a 469.5-447.5 advantage after the 200 breast, a race in which newcomer Alicia Jensen would put it all on the line and take third, breaking the oldest AU record on the books (2:10.81).

Georgia pulled within five after DeScenza won the 200 fly and another competitor fifth, even though AU had three swimmers in consols. With the gap so close and only the 400 free relay remaining, only one thing was certain- the team race would come down to the final event.

If you owned a calculator in those finals minutes leading up to the 400 free relay, the keys were probably overworked. After the numbers were tabulated, the scenario played out as follows: for AU to win they would need to finish third or better and have Arizona finish in front of Georgia. For UGA to defend its championship, only one scenario would lend that end result - win the relay.

Georgia led after DeScenza's first leg but Arizona's Jenna Gresdal passed Tricia Harm to take a .80 lead on UGA after the second leg (AU in third). The Wildcats increased the lead by 1.12 after a strong third leg by Whitney Meyers. It would come down to the anchor - Lacey NyMeyer versus superstar Joyce. Both swam a blistering final leg and Joyce pulled within reach of NyMeyer with less than 25 yards to go, but NyMeyer would stretch in for the win and the Tigers would end up third, in the relay that is.

"When we hit the wall, there was pandemonium," Marsh said. "The entire building knew what was at stake."

As the Tigers rejoiced in their fourth national title, senior Jeri Moss was reassuring anchor Kukors that indeed the Tigers had pulled off the miracle - they had won the battle.

"The passion, heart, fire and everything that went into that championship was wrapped up on my teammates faces at the end of the meet," Moss commented.

In the second-closest margin of victory in the 25 years of the women's NCAA Championships, the Tigers stood first on the podium with 518.5 points, just three ahead of Georgia. With tears in their eyes and smiles as wide as their faces would allow, the 2006 Auburn women's team knew they have pulled off the impossible and were part of a very special moment in Tiger swimming and diving championship history.

"I have never experienced anything that thrilling," Marsh said. "It wasn't just the last relay, it was the last day. That is the best day we have ever had in Auburn swimming."

The number 10 was significant for the 2005-06 Auburn men's swimming and diving team. Ten represents the number of fingers that head coach David Marsh proudly displays championship rings. Ten is the golden number of national championships that the 2005-06 Tigers helped bring home to The Plains.

The four-man senior class of George Bovell, Kurt Cady, Eric Shanteau and Doug Van Wie have an endless list of accolades, including Olympic medalist, NCAA Champion, SEC Champion and All-American. One more honor stood within reach in 2005-06, an honor that no one before them had been able to accomplish - go undefeated in every category.

The Tigers, who sported a No. 1 ranking the entire season, entered the 1996 Olympic pool in Atlanta, Ga., looking to extend their streak to four. Marsh wanted his team to get out to a strong early start and that is exactly how the story played out.

The Auburn 200 free relay team of Cesar Cielo, Matt Targett, Bryan Lundquist and Bovell, came out roaring on the opening night finals. The quartet captured the title in 1:16.15 and got the ball rolling in the Tigers direction. Keeping the momentum

going was the 400 medley relay who finished as runner-up. The Tigers held a 42 point lead over Arizona with two critical days remaining.

"It has been way too long since we have won a relay," Marsh said. "It was nice to see us get back on the top of the podium in a relay and it was thrilling for the team. It creates a lot of momentum and excitement for the rest of our team."

Arizona came out blazing on day two and slowly chipped away at the Tigers lead. The Wildcats 200 medley relay started the night off with a NCAA record-breaking performance (1:23.88) and the Tigers had to settle for second. Shanteau duplicated his third-place finish in the 400 IM and Alexei Puninski, just 30 minutes after swimming the fly leg on the 200 medley relay, finished seventh in the 100 fly.

The Wildcats caught the Tigers in the fifth event of day two, the 100 breast, as AU had no one swimming in the event, while Arizona had one in the finals and one in consols. This effort helped boost the Wildcats to a one-point deficit with three events remaining. In the 100 back, Van Wie turned in a stunning 46.22 performance, to take second (just .30 off the title) as he was out-stretched by Northwestern's Matt Grevers.

All eyes would turn to the diving well where Steve Segerlin would finish third in the 3-meter final with a score of 401.20 to put Auburn ahead by seven points going into the 800 free relay.

After a pool record 6:16.67 by the Wildcats in the 800 free relay and a sixth place finish by AU in the event, Arizona sat atop the leader board by five points with one day to go.

"Arizona had the magic tonight," Marsh said. "They were just on fire. The final

night is going to be a knock-down, drag-out. Their strength is their quality, our strength is our depth."

The Tigers found themselves in somewhat unfamiliar territory. Never in any of the other five championship meets had the Tigers ever trailed at the end of day one or two. The lesson that Marsh and his staff stressed throughout the year - team championships are won in the morning sessions - would be the theme of the final day.

"If we come in in the morning and get five, six, hopefully seven into the finals," Marsh said, "we will be in good shape. It is in the teams hands."

Auburn's showed its strength in numbers, qualifying seven individuals (five more in consols) and a relay for the Saturday night showdown. The Tigers all but assured itself a victory by qualifying more swimmers than Arizona. The 100 free finals would be the showcase event of the finals as five AU swimmers would decorate the finals and consols.

With the team lead there for the taking, the Tigers wasted no time in recapturing the top position. In the second event (200 back), Van Wie and James Wike produced 23 points to give Auburn the advantage, an advantage that they would never lose again.

In the premier event of the evening, the 100 free, Auburn got three swimmers in the consols to outscore Arizona 13-0. The Tigers then split with the Wildcats in the finals as Cielo took fourth and Targett seventh, all but cancelling out a third-place finish by Arizona's Simon Burnett and a fifth-place finish by Wildcat Lyndon Ferns.

The Tigers and Wildcats each put one in the 200 breast finals but the difference came in the 200 fly as Auburn had two competitors in consols and one in the finals and Arizona had no qualifiers in either. With two events remaining and 26.5 separating the two teams, Auburn looked poised for its sixth overall team crown. And it didn't hurt that the 10-meter platform, where Segerlin was in position for the win, was up next.

After a record-breaking 469.30 points in the platform finals, Segerlin took all suspense out of the race for the team title. Segerlin's victory marked the fourth straight year an Auburn man has been crowned champion on platform.

"It feels awesome coming from a really long line of NCAA champions at Auburn," Segerlin said.

"This is the best performance in Auburn history," Auburn head diving coach Jeff Shaffer said. "We talked about being focused and confident and having the courage to step up and most importantly to have fun. We had nothing to lose, our swimmers took care of business, and this was bonus points for the team."

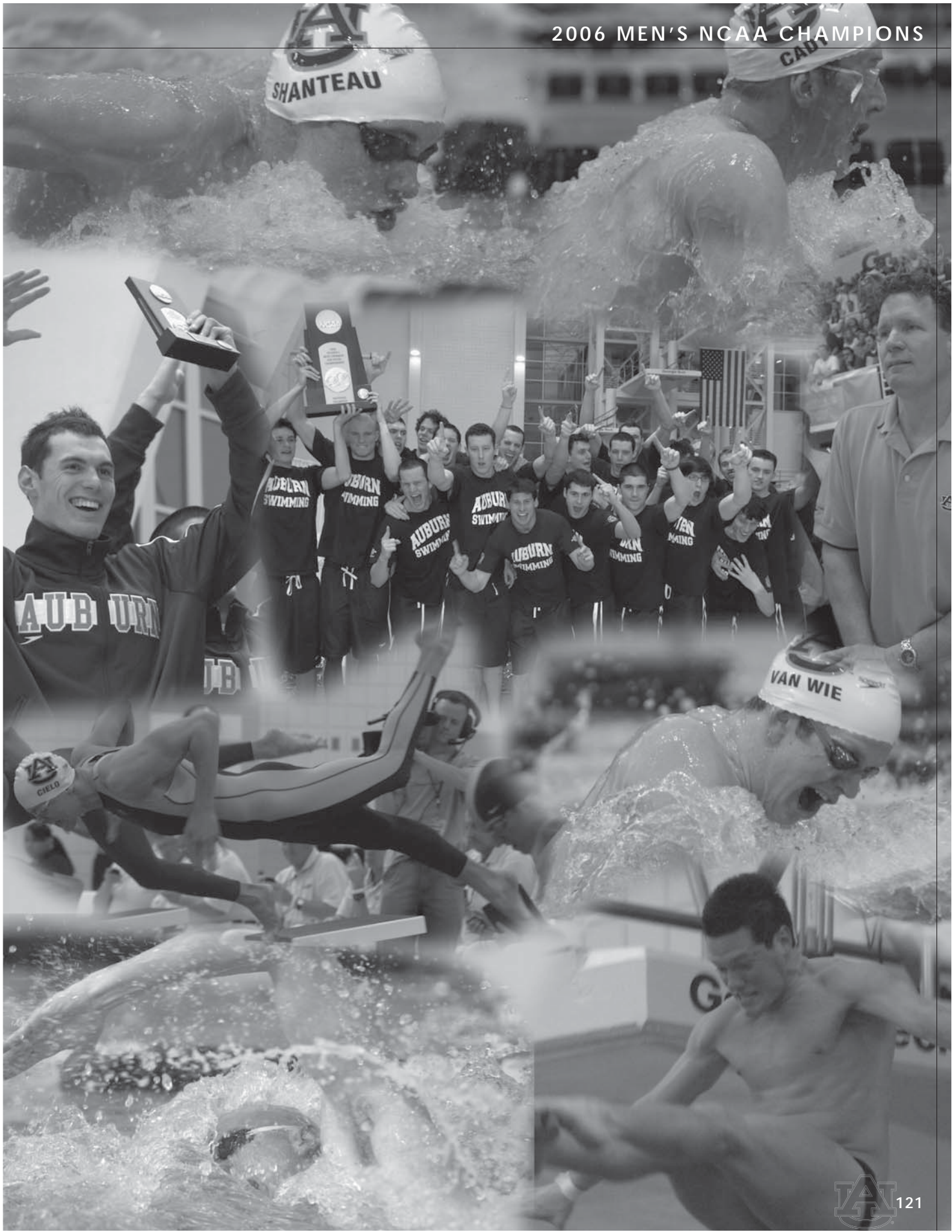
In the final event, Arizona continued to dominate the relays as they claimed the 400 free relay (the Wildcats won four of the five relays, Auburn won the other) and Auburn was second. The points didn't matter - the 10th finger was filled.

"Today it feels really good, like a relief," Marsh said. "It is such an intense meet from top to bottom. This men's team in particular has come from everywhere and it took all year to bring this team together. The last two months I saw synergy happening within our team and you have to have that at this meet to be successful."

Team mission, check. Senior mission, check. Bovell, Cady, Shanteau and Van Wie concluded their storybook four-year careers with a 31-0 dual meet record and four SEC and NCAA team titles. This senior class alone put together 13 SEC titles and six NCAA titles to go along with 56 All-American honors. "There is no other way that this senior class wanted to go out," co-captain Shanteau said.

Strength in numbers said it all for the 2006 team and Marsh will no longer have to drive home the importance of the morning sessions. For everyone in attendance at the 2006 championships, we all can walk away knowing that team titles are earned in the a.m.

A united team sporting bleached hair (and one mullet) became only the third team since 1980 to win three NCAA titles in a row and ironically in the same pool where the bleached out Auburn men won its first championship in 1997.

The first day of competition would see the Auburn men take a decisive lead as the team had been accustomed to doing the previous two years. The 200 FR would start things off right in the finals by breaking the Auburn record with a 1:16.00, and going under the old NCAA record with first place Cal. After the 200 IM when Eric Shanteau and Doug Van Wie both put in top four finishes the Tigers looked on their way to dominating the first day. But they didn't know whether Fred Bousquet would be able to

repeat his sub-19 second performance in the 50 free. Not only did he walk away with the NCAA record, the only two sub-19 swimmers ever, and as NCAA Champion he registered a "quantum leap in the sport," Marsh said. Fred's 18.74 from the prelims erased the old record by more than three tenths, a huge margin even in a 200 let alone swimming's shortest race.

After Fred's second landmark swim in the 50 all eyes turned to diving where Auburn sported the strongest pair in the entire field. Matt Bricker and Steve Segerlin both finaled to start off what would be a great weekend for AU diving. Finally the first day came to a close with Auburn just off the school record in the 400 MR with a 3:07.92. The Tigers had taken a 172 to 130 lead over Arizona, with Stanford close on the Cardinals heels with 120 points.

Friday was a new day with the rest of the field trying their best to flex their muscle and reel Auburn back in. Eric Shanteau got the individual points going for the Tigers; he was the top seed going into finals for the second night in a row but settled for a school record and third place in the 400 IM. Next came Bousquet in the 100 fly finals for the third year in a row, taking the top Auburn spot with fifth. The 100 breast saw Auburn not score a point for the first time since 1995 but Van Wie, Chad Barlow, and Scott Goodrich got the ball rolling again in the 100 back. Doug's time of 46.17 lowered the school record he set in the morning as he led a third, sixth, and 14th place points charge.

This led to 3-meter diving and typically Auburn divers get better as the boards go up so the rest of the team looked on anxiously to see how Steve and Matt would do. Both would deliver and Steve would go on to set the third team record of the day (618.30) in his third place effort.

thought it was an awesome effort by Steven," said AU diving coach Jeff Shaffer. "Finally we break the school record on a three-meter championship list. We had a game plan and he dove with a tremendous amount of confidence tonight."

With only one event to go the scores looked much tighter than Auburn had gotten used to seeing at the end of the second day. Stanford and Arizona were both close and everyone knew the last day would truly decide the winner. The 800 FR team helped increase Auburn's lead by breaking the fourth school record of the day. Freshman Rory Connell came through with a vital sub 1:35 third split. After the relay the standings laid out at Auburn 338, Stanford 300, and Arizona 292.

With one day to go, the team title looked up for grabs as Auburn was shut out in the mile to start the day but once again Doug Van Wie and Chad Barlow had great swims to put points on the board. Though Chad had broken the team record at SECs Doug came out ahead this time with a second place and personal best 1:41.24. Right after that Auburn deflated Stanford and Arizona's hopes by finishing the 100 free with Bousquet and Bovell in finals and Wochomurka and Bryan Lundquist in consols. Fred again swam an amazing sprint freestyle leg, breaking the second oldest school record on the books with his 42.19. The old record holder - two-time Olympic Gold Medalist Rowdy Gaines.

With only one man scoring in both the 200 breast and the 200 fly, Bricker and Segerlin knew it was up to them to cement the victory for Auburn. Only this time it was Bricker who would top his teammate and as it turned out the entire field. Matt made it three years running that Auburn has won the platform diving and Steve made sure it was the second year in a row that Auburn went 1-, 2 by matching his second place performance from last year.

"What a great performance from Matt and Steve," Shaffer said. "I couldn't be more proud of Matt stepping up tonight. He has been through a lot in his four years at Auburn and it was just a fitting end for him to come out victorious tonight."

This left only the 400 FR and Auburn looking for its first relay win of the meet. Fred again lowered the record books with his 41.87 leadoff breaking the youngest school record on the books...his own from earlier that day. The relay would fall to Cal, but the Tigers knew they had come through where it mattered the most. AUBURN 491, Stanford 414.

Divers Matt and Steve really showed their value scoring 86 points when the margin of victory over Stanford was only 77 points. The seniors came out ahead of the field again as senior captain BJ Jones said, "Every year the goal is to win another national championship. It feels great to go out as a captain and lead my team and bring it home to Auburn University. I came here to win a national championship and thank God I have been able to win three."

Clad in navy blue warm-up suits and brand-new, bright orange Nike sneakers, the Auburn women's swim team members made for an intimidating bunch as they stepped onto the pool deck to begin Saturday evening's round of finals during the 2004 NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championship in College Station, Texas.

The top-ranked Tigers made their entrance at Texas A&M's Student Recreation Center Natatorium sporting an even more confident look.

"To know you're walking in as the 2004 national champions is an incredible accomplishment," Auburn head coach David Marsh told his Tigers in a team meeting before the evening competition. "And to win it before the final session begins is an even greater achievement."

Auburn, which led from the opening night of the three-day meet, closed the

door on the competition during Saturday morning's preliminary swims, marking the third straight year that the AU women walked onto the deck as national champions even before the final session had begun.

Auburn's quest for their third straight national title began much more quietly than the first two did. There was no individual title on night one. Nor was there a relay that was first to the wall. But there was a sense of urgency, and a feeling of togetherness that allowed the Tigers to own the day one lead.

"The competition is great here. It is at a world-class level. The ladies are improving toward that level, and that is what we are focusing on right now, making one step forward instead of big jumps forward," Marsh said after the first night. "They are itching to win events but the goal is to accumulate points to win the championship. We are going to have to fight throughout the three days to be our best. It is not going to come easy"

Day two was junior Margaret Hoelzer's day to shine. The girl from Huntsville, Ala., raced in four events on Friday night, collecting a first- and second-place finish in her two individual events while also swimming on a record-setting relay and the final relay of the night as the Tigers contin-

ued to increase their lead.

Auburn and Hoelzer picked up their first NCAA title of the year in the first event of the night, swimming to a new NCAA and US Open Record in the 200 medley relay.

Hoelzer, who was seeded seventh and raced in lane one of the 200 free, took her first individual crown with a NCAA-record time of 1:56.16. Hoelzer had the fastest split on every leg in the field but the last and was the lone swimmer to have every split under 30 seconds.

Hoelzer finished her individual night by leading the Tiger charge in the 100 backstroke as the junior stroked to a second-place finish.

The Tigers' final relay of night two produced a fourth-place finish as the AU quartet of Kirsty Coventry, Heather Kemp, Adrienne Binder and Hoelzer combined for the 800 freestyle relay.

"To be honest, I was pretty tired by the time the 800 rolled around," Hoelzer said. "It was a huge race and you don't have a chance to think about your own feelings. You have to do what's best for the team and suck it up and try to take one for the team."

Coventry capped off the championships by taking the crown in the 200 backstroke.

"It was a good race, probably my best race of the whole meet," Coventry said. "I just wanted to go out there and have fun and that is exactly what I did. It just all came together for me tonight."

The Auburn senior class closed out their collegiate swimming careers in style, racking up a total of 569 points, the most in program history and the highest total at the NCAA Championships since 1993.

"We are very thrilled and honored to come out of here with a victory," AU Coach David Marsh said. "What I think you saw during this meet was really truly how many awesome swimmers there are in the NAAs. One of the things I tell my team is that when you win a swimming title, you are competing in the highest level athletic venue in collegiate sports. To win a team title is very special and different every time."

"All season we have trained real hard and it has always been our goal to win three in a row," Demerae Christianson said on behalf of the senior class. "It just feels good to get the job done and to celebrate not with just the senior class, but the whole team. It is just so special. Hopefully we have left something behind for the team next year."

Best Ever. That is how the 2004 Auburn men's swimming and diving team will go down in history. The Tigers, led by a group of four young men who went by the catchphrase of 'Auburn's Four Horsemen', literally went out and re-wrote the NCAA record books. And they did it six times over.

Fred Bousquet - or 'Freddy Biscuits' as he came to be known around the pool deck - and his compatriots George 'The Hammer of Justice' Bovell, Ryan 'The Diesel' Wochomurka and Derek 'The Big Man' Gibb set the tone for the Tigers from the get go, stroking to a world-best time in the events first race, the 200 free relay.

Record one set.

Bovell returned to the pool two events later and successfully dropped the hammer on the field in the 200 IM, defending his title from 2003 and doing it in a new world record time.

"I felt a lot of pressure which I put on myself," Bovell said after his night-time swim. "I probably would have never forgiven myself after coming so close (to a world record this morning)

and not accomplishing it."

Record two set.

One event later, it was Bousquet's turn to defend his title in the 50 free. Considered the most exciting race in all of swimming, Bousquet sliced the water to his first individual world record - and this after needing a swim-off to qualify for finals.

"I guess I need to be a little mad to swim faster and my teammates knew it so they put me in good condition for the race. Everybody was behind me," Bousquet said.

Record three set.

the end of the first night, the Tigers had already amassed a 98-point lead on the field. But there was still work to be done.

Sophomore Doug Van Wie and senior Mark Gangloff were the next to put 'World's Best' next to their name as they joined Bousquet and Gibb in re-writing the record books in the 200 medley relay.

Record four set.

With two days completed, the Tigers had gained a seemingly insurmountable 186.5-point lead on the field. But there was still work to be done. They were in search of the title 'Best Ever.'

Though they didn't provide themselves with a nickname, the diving trio of Caesar Garcia, Steven Segerlin and Matt Bricker did their part for the team championship as well. After garnering a total of five All-America honors after the first two nights, the trio finished 1-2-6 on the platform, with Garcia becoming the first man to ever successfully defend his platform title. All told, the divers contributed 93 points to the team total.

With one event remaining, a first-place finish in the 400 free relay was all that stood between Auburn and the points record. Enter the 'Four Horsemen' for their final ride. And ride they did - all the way to a fifth world-best time and a new NCAA points record of 634 points. Records five and six set.

"Those four guys are always at their best at the relays and that has characterized my favorite Auburn swimmers, going back to Rowdy (Gaines), Yoav (Bruck) and Nick Shackell. All four of those guys are just like that," AU Coach David Marsh said of the 'Four Horsemen.'

"The 'Four Horsemen' are just the best guys," Gibb said. "When you got guys like Fred and George, it just gets everyone going and we weren't going to look back the rest of the way."

The Tigers had literally lapped the field. Auburn had won the event by 256.5 points. The 'Four Horsemen' alone contributed 340 points, beating all but three teams by themselves.

"Last year was great but I wanted this one even more," senior captain Bryce Hunt said. "All year long us seniors tried to lead by example."

And lead they did.

Home sweet home. The only thing sweeter than winning the first women's National Championship in school history is defending that title at home. Even though the Tigers went undefeated during the regular season, won their first SEC Championship just three weeks prior and had the number one ranking all year long, with the level of competition and being seen as the team to beat the women knew they would have to swim well to win again.

"It gives you a certain level of confidence that we swam so well at SEC (Championships), and our times were seeded well. However, like other coaches said there have not been a point scored yet in this meet. We are not taking anything for granted. We know there are great teams here ready to compete. However, the team is ready and we know we can swim faster. We are looking forward to competing with some of the best in the world," Auburn senior captain Maggie Bowen said prior to the championships.

With the resurgent women at the University of Georgia hungry after their three-year reign atop women's swimming was broken by Auburn in 2002, and superstars like Natalie Coughlin leading a strong University of California team it looked like Auburn would need all of their 18 athletes to win their second title in as many years.

Day one started very strong for the Tigers as they qualified with four top seeds out of the five events. A morning that featured Auburn swimmers qualifying one-two in the 200 IM also featured pool records by the 200 medley relay team and by Becky Short in the 50 free.

In finals the ladies jumped out to a 45.5 point lead after day one with some impressive swims. Bowen and Kirsty Coventry combined to finish 1-2 in the 200 IM. The win was Bowen's third straight in the event at NCAA's and gave her the three fastest times in NCAA history. Short and Eileen Coparropa kept the momentum going by finishing second and third in the 50 free. With the lead, the ladies wanted to send a message in the evening's final event: the 400 medley relay. They sent quite a strong message indeed as the team of Coventry, Bowen, Margaret Hoelzer,

and Short not only won, but set pool, NCAA, and US Open records with a time of 3:31.45.

As day two got underway it was evident that Auburn was the class of the meet. Auburn qualified 12 swimmers for the evening session as well as being the top seed in the 200 medley relay. Leading the way were Bowen, who qualified first and second in the 400 IM and the 100 breast respectively, and Coventry, who qualified first in the 100 back. The sellout hometown crowd did not go away disappointed at the end of the second day as Auburn extended their lead to an impressive 127 point lead with one day to go.

In the evenings' first event, Auburn's relay team of Jenni Anderson, Laura Swander, Hoelzer, and Short won by nearly two seconds with a time of 1:36.69 once again breaking the pool, NCAA, and US Open record. The victories continued to come as Bowen won the 400 IM for the third consecutive year. Junior Heather Kemp provided the most exciting race of the night, winning her first National Championship by tying North Carolina's Jessi Perruquet with a time of 1:45.01. The evening's finale was another Auburn title as the team of Hoelzer, Kemp, Coventry, and Bowen broke the NCAA meet record in the 800 Freestyle relay.

The last prelims session saw the women pick up right where they left off the night before. Nine women earned the right to swim again for the final session. Short continued her strong meet by grabbing the top spot in the 100 free. Joining her were two other Tigers, Coparropa, and Kemp. Hoelzer also swam very well qualifying for finals twice, in the 200 back and the 200 fly. The women also had the fastest 400 freestyle relay team Saturday morning.

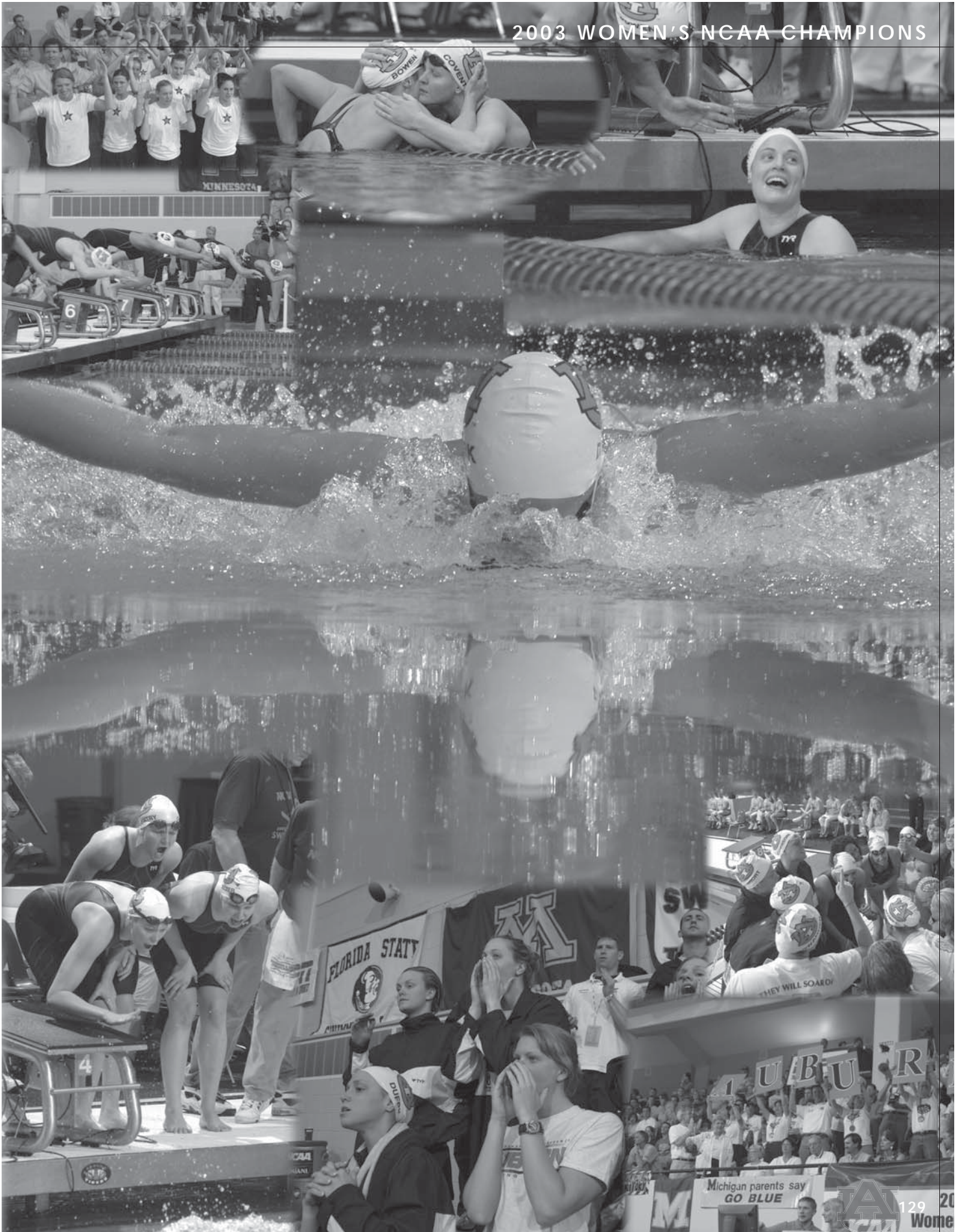
With victory virtually assured the women cemented their second straight NCAA title with another strong session. Coventry and Hoelzer finished second and third in the 200 back to start the last session. Short and Coparropa followed them with another 2-3 Auburn finish highlighted by Short's school record 48.53 second place. The women finished the meet as they started it by winning yet another relay by dropping over three seconds from their morning swim in a fast 3:14.15.

"This is truly a great night for Auburn University," Auburn athletics director David Housel said. "I am especially proud of our swimmers, coaches and their staff that in the same week that they won the NCAA title, they also were named as an academic All-American team. The fact that David Marsh is a product of the Auburn swim program makes this much more special. It is a great day to be an Auburn Tiger."

With their hometown fans cheering and the anxious men's team urging them on all weekend, the women finished their season as they had planned all along, with a victory swim and fight song in a pool that they dominated all year long.

Pressure. With an immeasurable amount of self-inflicted pressure on their collective shoulders, the Auburn's men's swimming and diving class of 2003 not only answered the bell at the national championships, but they came out with nary a scratch on their faces.

Having just watched their women's counterparts win it all for the second consecutive year, the men's team was determined to head down to Austin, Texas - the exact pool that the women had taken the celebratory dip in a year ago - and bring back the one thing the seniors were lacking, an NCAA title.

From the outset the Tigers were on fire, trailing in the overall points battle for a total of two events. By the time event three rolled around, freshman George Bovell was ready to leave Auburn's first mark on the championships.

Bovell not only helped move the Tigers to the top of the leader board, but he challenged history, winning the 200 IM in a NCAA and US Open record time of 1:42.66.

On event later his classmate did his part as Fred Bousquet - affectionately called Freddy Biscuits by his teammates - swam to his own title, winning the men's 50 freestyle in a convincing 19.31. The event turned out to be the coming out party for the Tigers as a total of four AU swimmers swam in the championship finals.

By the time the curtain came down on day one, the Tigers held a commanding 85-point lead, having corralled 206 points in the first session. Both the 200 IM and the 50 free were titles that the Tigers had last won in 1999, also the last time AU won the overall crown.

Day two was more of the same as the Tigers were just three points shy of doubling their lead by the end of the night - not to mention racking up a total of 449 points, just 47.5 points less than what AU had tallied in 1997 when they first won it all, the most points in school history.

Night two again started out with fireworks as the Auburn 200 medley relay team of Bryce Hunt, Pat Calhoun, Bousquet and Derek Gibb erased the oldest Auburn record on the books. Though they could not claim the NCAA title, the points-train gathered more steam as the night rolled on.

As was the case with the 200 IM the night before, the 400 IM was an Auburn event with three Tigers stroking the walls for points.

The culmination of the night - and possibly the championships - was in the 100 breaststroke finals as Auburn Tigers filled four of the eight lanes available. Again the Tigers could not stand atop the podium for the awards ceremony, but the feeling amongst the Tiger bench area was one of significant accomplishment.

With the trophy already firmly in their grasp, diver Caesar Garcia brought Auburn its first diving title in 16 years. With twists and turns and flips and reverses, Garcia scored a 575.80 on the platform on the final night, tying for the NCAA title.

The Auburn Tigers did more than just secure an NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving Championship on Saturday night, March 29, 2003. They did it without leaving a doubt of who was the best team in the country with contributions coming from all 19 athletes on the NCAA roster. Just as impressive was the fact that the Tigers scored in all 21 events, a rarity in the sport.

When it was all said and done, the Tigers won the third national team title in program history by crushing the field by a whopping 196.5 points, becoming just the second team in NCAA history to break the 600-point barrier as the Tigers tallied 609.5 points.

"The fact that all 19 athletes scored in every event shows the diversity of this team," David Marsh said. "We are not about one star. I am just delighted."

AU tallied 61 All-America honors in the process and made sure that the class of 2003 left without any disappointment.

"All I can see is the eyes of this senior class because they are the ones that initiated the effort to pull this team together in a special way," Marsh said. "They did the follow-through and then came to this meet and gave the performance. They didn't want to leave Auburn without a championship, and I hope that is the attitude of future swimmers and divers that come into our program."

By the time day three rolled around, there was no doubt in the minds of coaches, athletes and fans, who was going to win the 2002 NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championship in Austin, Texas, except in the minds of the soon to be champs - the Auburn Tigers.

Not that the team thought the feat was impossible or that they weren't capable, but the fear of "you just don't know what can happen" loomed over their heads.

Heading into that last day of competition, the Tigers stood at 67 points ahead of the second place team with a

strong day of competition remaining. Although the team knew they held a safe lead, the Tigers couldn't help remembering last season, when a false start on the 400 free relay in the prelims of day three squashed any hope of bringing home Auburn's first-ever women's NCAA title.

Little did Auburn know, that now insignificant set-back may have very well been the fire fueling the drive to their title in 2002. Eight athletes returned in 2002 from that season. Stronger than ever. Both mentally and physically.

The stage was set. All Auburn had to do was have a solid preliminary round in the morning and stay in the places they qualified in for the finals and the title would be theirs.

That sounds simple enough, but what most casual fans didn't realize is that the Auburn team was filled with a team of three freshmen, six sophomores and two juniors. Not exactly veterans to pressure.

Not only did Auburn have a solid prelim competition, the Tigers again dominated the pool all but officially announcing their claim to history.

The Tigers had an emotional meeting immediately following the morning swim. The topic? It was the fact that the title was all but clinched. The meeting was one of tears, prayer and lots of hugs. But this time, the tears

were of joy and not disappointment.

That night of swimming at the championships was one no one could forget. The Tigers controlled the meet despite the excitement, despite the anxiousness and despite the immeasurable pressure put on those 11 women. The Texas Aquatics Center was indeed painted orange on March 23, 2002, but on this night, the color changed a bit.

Their dream had come true, the Auburn Tiger women's swim team defeated rival and three-defending national champion Georgia by 88 points. All the hard work, and yes, blood sweat and tears had come to fruition. The Tigers brought home the title.

As commonplace in some of Auburn's past seasons, the 2002 team didn't need a superstar. Sure, they had one. Junior Maggie Bowen not only earned two NCAA titles in the 200 and 400 individual medley and finished second in the 100 breaststroke, but she swam on four relays and broke her own American Record in the 200 IM (1:53.91).

But Bowen's individual point total could have been erased and the Tigers would have still stood at the top of the awards stand in the end. No, this was a team title. A title where all 11 swimmers became All-Americans. All 11 women stood on that awards stand as individuals and claimed a trophy.

Freshman Margaret Hoelzer was the 10th-highest scorer at the meet placing fourth in both the 100 butterfly and 200 backstroke and fifth in the 200 fly. The team as a whole broke an astounding 14 school records during the three-day event and AU head coach David Marsh was named the NCAA Women's Swimming Coach of the Year for the second year in a row. He and associate head women's coach Kim Brackin had constructed a masterpiece. No one could deny the astounding performance Auburn had just accomplished. Not No. 1 Stanford and not runner-up Georgia.

The Tigers were finally on top. Where they knew they could and should be. With such a young "inexperienced" squad, it is a spot they don't plan on relinquishing any time soon.

They came, they fought, they conquered. With a third-place ranking going into the 1999 NCAA Championships, the Tigers went to the IU Natatorium on the prowl, looking to bring the NCAA title back to the Plains. A second title in two years would be nothing short of astounding for the Auburn program which saw its first NCAA title in 1997.

However, with no divers available, Auburn was going to have to fight for every point they earned. Having at least 39 teams and 250 athletes entered into the competition, AU knew that this would be no easy triumph. Head coach David Marsh believed the key to Auburn's success would rely on the team leaders taking charge as well as the freshman stepping up to contribute to the team. Auburn made their presence known early as the Tigers swam a time of 1:16.50 in the 200 free relay during prelims, setting a U.S. Open, NCAA and NCAA meet record. That energy and enthusiasm set a pace that would catapult the Tigers through the rest of the meet.

"On the first day, our goal wasn't necessarily to set a record. Time wasn't the issue, we just wanted to get our

hand on the wall first and get our 40 points," team captain Aaron Ciarla said. "We were just focusing on one session at a time. We just went out gunning for it."

Auburn continued to release their ammunition as the Tigers went on to win four of the five swimming events held on day one. Senior Lionel Moreau captured the 200 IM (1:45.24) title, followed by Ciarla's victory in the 50 free (19.34) and closed out the day by winning its closest event of the evening, the 400 medley relay (3:09.17). Brett Hawke, the anchor leg of the relay, dove in behind but swam a 42.34 split to outtouch Stanford's Justin Ewers as the Tigers won by .08 of a second, 3:09.17 to 3:09.25. At the end of day one, Auburn had a 41-point lead over Texas and a 58.5-point lead over Stanford.

The Tigers added to their title portfolio on day two as they continued to dominate in the relay events and score points in individual events. AU total recorded 168.5 points on day two alone, but only won one title, the 200

medley relay (1:26.12).

On the last day, the competition became very intense, as Stanford remained within reach of Auburn. It was truly a nail biter down to the last event.

One of the biggest bonuses of the meet came on day three when sophomore Dave Denniston swam 1:55.51 to win the 200 breast title, the third individual title for AU in the meet. Heading into the final event of the meet, the 400 free relay, the Tigers knew that Stanford was still on their heels.

AU's leadership of Brock Newman, Hawke, Ciarla and Romain Barnier did not fail the Tigers as the relay team blazed through the 400 free relay. Ending the Championships as they began them, AU set the U.S. Open, NCAA and NCAA meet record in the 400 free relay with a time of 2:50.90.

"I was like a cat on a hot stove Saturday night," said Marsh.

As soon as senior Romain Barnier touched the wall, everyone knew that the Auburn Tigers had won their second NCAA title.

"The goal was, as is with a lot of programs, to win a national championship," said Marsh. "We had an exceptional commitment from our seniors to lead the program. Throughout the year, when we hit a lot of bumps in the road, but they pulled us together."

The celebration of the second national title in three years, began on the pool deck and continued all the way back home to the Plains. After they arrived, there was the traditional rolling of Toomer's Corner, causing downtown Auburn to look snow white in April. A coronation ceremony along with the Tiger walk from the Martin Aquatic Center to the coliseum was held in their honor. It was a moment of glory for the newcomers and a sense of conquest for the older members of the team who now had two NCAA titles placed by their name.

"When you do something special at Auburn, the whole town and university celebrate," said Marsh.

In addition to the titles, AU now owns three of the five NCAA records in the relays, two of which were set this year.

"The relays did play a crucial role," said Marsh. "The fun thing about it was that there were different heroes on each different relay."

Auburn won seven events and placed in the top eight of eight others. There was one swimming event, out of eighteen, in which the Tigers did not earn points. For the first time in AU history, all of the Auburn NCAA team earned All-America honors. One could say that the Tigers went above and beyond the call of duty to prove that they were No. 1.

NCAA champion Denniston summed it up best: "This is a dream come true. That's why I came to Auburn, why a lot of guys did. Being this close and being able to taste it is a lot of fun." Well said.

Minneapolis, Minnesota will always be a fond memory for head coach David Marsh and his 1997 men's swimming and diving team. It is there that the Tigers won the program's first ever national championship.

With four senior All-Americans, including three Olympians, the 1996-97 team dominated the competition by amassing a record total of 496.5 points.

Ranked number two in the country going into the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships, Auburn left no doubt about who was really number one as the Tigers overwhelmed top-ranked Stanford, defending national champion Texas and 54 other teams that had qualified for nationals. The SEC champion Tigers finished a strong 156.5 points ahead of the second-place Cardinals.

"To be honest, I didn't know what to expect," said Marsh. "I really enjoyed watching the guys celebrate and having a good time feeling great about Auburn University, their experience here and seeing it pay off for all of the hard work they put in this year."

In addition to winning the national title, Marsh was named 1997 NCAA Coach of the Year, adding to his accolades of great swimming accomplishments.

The previous year at the NCAA Championships in Austin, Texas, the Tigers scored 443.5 points to finish ahead of top-ranked Michigan's 358 total but lost by 35.5 points to Texas' 479. Auburn remembered what it felt like to be so close and not get there and used that to push them over the top.

Stanford came into nationals ranked first ahead of Auburn, Tennessee,

Texas, Southern California and Michigan. The field included 12 returning individual champions but none from Auburn, which did have Nick Shackell, Brock Newman, and Scott Tucker, members of the defending champion 400 free relay team.

With the three Olympians, Shackell, Tucker and Hargis and the senior diver Koffi Kla, Auburn rose to the top.

"Nick Shackell, through his attitude, his care and love for the team, and his competitiveness, has been a tremendous leader," said Marsh. "One of the most important moments of this meet was although John Hargis had the fastest 100 butterfly split on the medley relay we won, he had a disappointing 100 butterfly, but minutes later he was leading the cheers. That is what a guy of quality character does. Scott Tucker ended his career on an incredibly positive note. He was key in several of our relays. He has done Auburn very proud. Koffi Kla has been the best team diver I think we have ever had at Auburn. All four of those four will be missed sorely."

Newcomer Brett Hawke made an impression as he swam 19.16 in the 50 free prelims, the fastest ever by an Auburn swimmer. Hawke eventually took the title with a time of 19.19.

Wearing their "Marsh Madness" t-shirts, which featured a photo of their coach in his longer hair that was fashionable in the late 1970s as an All-American swimmer at AU, Auburn's 18 competitors at nationals were obviously a close-knit group. Emphasizing the point was the decision to bleach their hair white as a further sign of team unity.

The Tigers won four out of five relays, placed second in the 800 free relay and had 16 individuals earn All-America honors.

After arriving back to Auburn, the Tigers and supporters gathered at Toomer's Corner for a pep rally despite rain and thunder. An official Coronation of Champions ceremony was held featuring a traditional Tiger Walk from the Martin Aquatics Center to the coliseum where the swimmers and coaches received handshakes, high fives and cheers as they enjoyed their moment in the spotlight. The formal ceremony featured a list of speakers and proclamations from the president and the vice president of the United States to the mayor of Auburn.

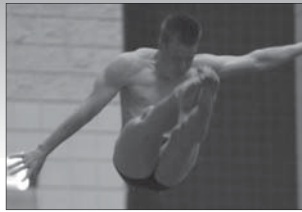

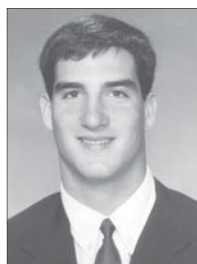

Auburn Swimming and Diving Wall of Fame

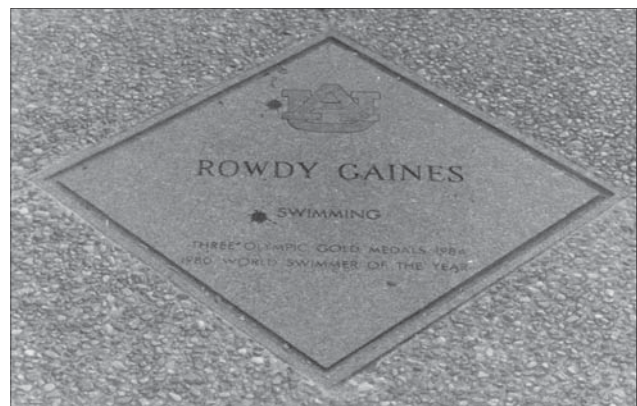
