## **Washington, D.C. — America's Soccer Capital**

The soccer atmosphere in Washington, D.C., is among the most passionate in the United States as evidenced by its selection for international competition and performance by its teams.

AU has served as the training site for a number of national teams and prominent club squads. In Spring 2005, the U.S. Men's National Team trained on Reeves Field. AC Milan trained at American in the summer of 2003. Before playing in the 2002 World Cup, the Uruguay National Team used AU's facilities to train. American has also served as a training site for Blackburn, Newcastle, Barcelona, the U.S. Women's World Cup squad and the Uruguayan national team. The D.C. United, Miami Fusion and San Jose Earthquake of Major League Soccer have all used American University to train, as well.

The nation's capital had the unique privilege of hosting the 1999 Women's World Cup, the 1994 World Cup and the 1996 Olympic Soccer games. RFK Stadium was the site for six World Cup and nine Olympic matches, each event filling the venue to its 56,000 seat capacity. RFK was also filled for the 1997 MLS Cup.

Both the men's and women's U.S. National Teams have become especially enamored with the Washington area, and more specifically, RFK Stadium. The men's team has hosted the U.S. Cup three times, in 1993, 1995 and 1996, winning all but one match. The women's team also competed in the 1995 U.S. Cup at RFK. Both sides play numerous "friendlies" against other nations and chose Washington as one of their home sites for qualifying matches for the 1998 World Cup.

Washington has been a mainstay for professional franchises over the past three decades. The tradition began with the NASL's Washington Diplomats in the early 1970s and has continued today with D.C. United, which has won four Major League Soccer titles, including in 2004. In addition, the metropolitan area served as host to three teams in the old American Professional Soccer League in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

On the collegiate level, American University has established itself as a nationally recognized program. In 2004, the Eagles defeated LIU, 3-0, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Reeves Field. The Eagles also hosted a NCAA First Round match and two NCAA Tournament games in 1997. In 1985, AU hosted the NCAA Tournament semifinal in which the Eagles defeated Hartwick, 1-0, in front of over 5,000 raucous fans, sending American to the NCAA Championship game against UCLA in Seattle.

Participation in youth soccer makes D.C. one of the strongest soccer markets in the U.S. According to research conducted by the Soccer Industry Council of America, the Washington-Baltimore area ranked third in the U.S. in average participation.

**A** poised leader with a vision for raising American University's men's soccer to one of the elite programs in collegiate soccer, Todd West begins his seventh season as the Eagles' head coach and 11th overall season with the program.

"I think the American men's soccer program is now recognized and respected on a national level," West said. "We can compete with the nation's elite programs and as we have shown with our success in the NCAA tournament we can contend for a national championship. Our goal each and every year is to compete for our conference championship and participate and win in the NCAA tournament. The university has given us the support and resources to compete at the highest level in NCAA division I soccer. We have a brand new state of the art Bermuda grass game field; a brand new bermuda training facility and we have what may prove to be one of the better recruiting classes in AU history. I am excited about the 2005 season and the future of our program."

In his first five seasons, West fashioned the program in his own image - tireless, fiery, and competitive - while still playing with the utmost professionalism. He guided the Eagles to three appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including a trip to the Sweet 16 in 2002 and a second round appearance in 2004. In addition, he has led his squad to

victory in four of six D.C. College Cups.

West's 2004 squad was his third NCAA squad in five seasons as the Eagles' mentor. The team won its second Patriot League title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, after defeating LIU at home, 3-0, in the first round. For his efforts, West was named the PL Coach of the Year.

In 2002 the Eagles finished with a 13-7-2 record. American went 4-2-1 in the Patriot League as the conference placed three teams in the NCAA Tournament.

The Eagles were ranked nationally most of the season and achieved a ranking as high as No. 11. American defeated No. 9 Boston College and No. 18 Penn State.

AU was awarded an at-large berth to the NCAA Tournament and hosted George Washington in the NCAA First Round on Reeves Field. The Eagles defeated the Colonials, 1-0, before falling to Maryland in the second round by a 1-0 score.

In just his second season as head coach, he guided the

Eagles to the 2001 Patriot League championship; a berth in the NCAA Tournament where the club advanced to the Sweet 16; and a final national ranking of 14th.

Continuing AU's outstanding tradition in NCAA Tournament play, West and his charges did not disappoint. American advanced to the Sweet 16 where it fell to eventual national champion North Carolina, 1-0, in overtime. The Eagles advanced after dispatching Ohio State, 2-1, and Wake Forest, 3-0, in the opening two rounds.

American finished 2001 with a 13-8-2 overall record and a 6-1-0 mark in Patriot League play. The Eagles claimed the league's automatic berth in the NCAAs after advancing past Holy Cross in the championship game on penalties, 4-3. It was American's inaugural season as a member of the Patriot League.

West faced a challenging first season as head coach in the year 2000. The Eagles finished 7-9-2 overall, but came on strong late, posting wins in four of their final five matches. American also battled to an impressive 5-2-1 finish in the nationally-recognized Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).

In addition to his duties at American, West was named an assistant coach of the U-20 U.S. National Team in May 2002. He served under head coach Thomas Ron-

gen, with whom he has had a long relationship. West also served as an assistant coach under Rongen with D.C. United, a three-time Major League Soccer (MLS) champion. While with United, West assisted in match preparation, player development, training sessions and scouting.

Before taking over the AU program, West spent four seasons as an assistant to former head coach Bob Jenkins. His tenure during that run was highlighted by the Eagles' trip to the 1997 NCAA Quarterfinals and a No. 5 national ranking.

West's career began as a stellar high school, club, and Olympic Development Program (ODP) coach in

the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. He served as the head boy's coach at Lake Braddock Secondary School from 1993 to 1996, where he compiled a record of 47-13-6. His 1995 team captured the Virginia State Championship and finished with a No. 12 national ranking in the final poll. For his efforts, he was named 1995 NSCAA Virginia State Coach of the Year.

One of the most accomplished youth club coaches in Virginia, West has been associated with the state's ODP since 1992. West was recently named a head coach on the U.S. Region I U-14 team and he holds a United States Soccer Federation (USSF) National "A" Coach-

ing License.

A top-level student-athlete during his playing career, West is a 1988 graduate of George Mason University in Fairfax, Va., where he was a four-year starter for the Patriots and received a bachelor of science in physical education and business. During his career at George Mason, West played in three NCAA tournaments and helped the program capture three CAA Championships. George Mason finished in the top 20 three times during his collegiate career.

A native of Dallas, Texas, West currently resides in Falls Church, Va., with his wife, Samira (Sam), and daughters, Kyra and Zoe.

Jeff Kinney returns for his fourth season with American University and second as an assistant coach under head coach Todd West. Kinney formerly served as the team's graduate manager in 2003 and 2004. A 2003 graduate of AU, Kinney was one of the toughest players on the squad, playing in the midfield.

"Jeff is an outstanding person and I am excited that he will continue his soccer career, albeit in a new capacity, here at American University," West said of his former player. "Not only does he excel on the soccer field, he carried a 3.6 grade-point average in physics. Jeff will be a valuable asset to the program, especially during training. He will certainly be one of the better players on the field and the players will learn from his example and also be able to draw from his experiences as a two-time NCAA Tournament participant."

Kinney was named to the Verizon Academic All-America Men's Soccer Second Team in 2002 as well as the Verizon Academic All-District II Men's Soccer Team. He was named to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll in 2001 and 2002. Kinney started 21 matches for the Eagles and was named to the Penn State/Nike Classic All-Tournament Team. After an impressive performance in the backfield against Lehigh, Kinney was named Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week and also to the Soccer America Team of the Week.

In 2001, Kinney played in 22 matches, scoring a goal and adding an assist. His goal came in the

first round of the NCAA Tournament against Ohio State as part of a 2-1 AU victory. Prior to coming to American, Kinney started every game as a freshman and sophomore at James Madison. He was named a Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Scholar-Athlete and GTE Scholar-Athlete.

Kinney currently resides in Washington, D.C.

11th Season

Nick Stames enters his 11th season as assistant coach at American, and his seventh as a member of head coach Todd West's staff. Stames' primary responsibilities lie with the development of the AU goalkeepers.

Under his tutelage, Eagle keeper Michael Behonick developed into one of the finest in the East and was selected in the sixth round of the Major League Soccer SuperDraft in 2003.

"Nick has a great deal of experience with goalkeepers at several different levels," West said. "He is the first exclusive goalkeepers' coach we have had and his impact has been evident. With such a technical position, Nick gives our goalkeepers the instruction and technical support that will only benefit their development."

Stames has spent 14 years as a physical education teacher at Herndon Middle School in Herndon, Va. During that span, he developed his coaching skills, serving as goalkeeper coach for the Virginia Region I Olympic Development Program. Prior to that involvement, he coached at Marshall High School and at his alma mater, George Mason University.

Stames is a 1986 graduate of George Mason, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in physical education. A standout in goal for the Patriots, Stames helped lead the club to two NCAA Tournament appearances and one Colonial Athletic Association title.

A 1981 graduate of Lake Braddock High School, Stames and his wife, Linda, reside in Bristow, Va. The couple has two daughters, Caitlin and Kylie, and a son, Nicholas.



**Steve Totten**  
Assistant Coach  
Virginia '01  
First Season

Steve Totten enters his first season as an assistant coach at American University.

Totten most recently was the head coach of Yorktown High School in nearby Arlington, Va., where he spent three seasons. During his time at Yorktown, Totten led the team to two National District Championships and in 2005, led the team to its best-ever finish with an appearance in the Northern Region Semifinals. Totten also gained coaching experience working with the Reston Football Club, the National Cathedral School, the D.C. United Youth Program and with the Bethesda Phoenix.

As a player, Totten was a three-year team captain at the University of Virginia, where he was voted the team's Most Valuable Player after the 1999 and 2000 seasons. In each of Totten's four seasons, his Wahoo squad was ranked in the top-10 in the nation. Totten culminated his collegiate career by being drafted in the third round of the MLS draft by the D.C. United.

**W**ith only two seniors on the 2005 American University men's soccer team, the team struggled but still managed to win the Patriot League regular season championship and earn a spot in the PL title game. In 2006, the Eagles will benefit from a strong corps of senior leaders and a solid sophomore class with a year of experience under their belts and anticipate a deep run into the NCAA Tournament.

### Goalkeeper

Junior **Chris Sedlak** is the incumbent in the position and will likely get the majority of the minutes in net this season. Sedlak kept the Eagles in many games last season, and head coach Todd West describes him as potentially one of the best goalkeepers in the Patriot League. The coaching staff is looking for more leadership out of Sedlak in helping to organize the back four.

Meanwhile, freshmen **Zach Solomon, Ryan Leonard** and **Timothy Hoagland** will compete for the backup goalkeeper position.

### Defenders

Once again, **Nate Baker** and **Nigel White** will anchor American's four-man defensive unit. This season, however, West expects to move both Baker and White to the outside, making room for two new faces in the middle.

Sophomore **Tremaine Chinapoo** had a solid spring and could fill one of those two middle spots. In addition, **Cooper Bryant** – a transfer from Wake Forest University – and **Karsten Smith** could see time in the middle. With the size Bryant and Smith bring to the Eagles – both are 6'3" – the

coaching staff expect AU defenders will be more active in set pieces this season, something American lacked last season.

In addition, freshmen **Cameron Petty, Dor Yasur, Hector Benavides** and **Ryan Baker** are exciting players that could also see significant time on the field. According to West, AU's defense should be the strength of the team, with as many as eight players competing for the four spots.

### Midfield

In American's long history of soccer success, midfield has traditionally been the Eagles' greatest strength. This season should be no different, with Coach West asking his midfielders to possess the ball more this season and do the majority of the defending, allowing AU's skilled defenders to "clean things up."

The midfield is headed up by a pair of outstanding seniors in **Sal Caccavale** and **Garth Juckem**. Caccavale is perhaps the strongest player in the Patriot League and is described by West as being a "tweener," with skills as both a forward and a midfielder. West will allow Caccavale more freedom this year, as opposed to last season, giving him the ability to use his creativity to create offense.

Meanwhile, the return of **Lucas Dowiak**, who missed all of 2005 with an injury, will allow Juckem to move to the flank and act as the director of the offense by using his strong right leg on long balls. Dowiak, who is left-footed, will also likely earn a starting spot in the midfield.

Sophomore **Phil Purdy**, the 2005 Patriot League Rookie of the Year, and junior **JP**

**Kuykendall** will be asked to defend more this season. With those two shoring up the midfield in the defense, West expects it will further free up Caccavale to be creative. Kuykendall is a smart, possession-type midfielder who will not be counted upon to attack the goal.

Another sophomore, **Tomer Konowiecki**, is a player similar to Caccavale in that he can play in the midfield or up front. According to West, Konowiecki is a solid player when he plays with confidence. In addition, **Mark Petruniak** gained valuable experience last season and will be back looking to contribute.

Meanwhile, young players could also figure into the mix. Petty could see time at midfield, and freshmen **Jake Van Yahres** and **Colin Zizzi** could also see action. Van Yahres reminds West of Caccavale, but could play some at the flank, while Zizzi is a talented player with his

feet who earned high school All-American honors.

### Forwards

Senior **Larry Mark** is the leader of the small group of forwards in American's **c a c h e**. Mark is blessed with **s p e e d**,



perhaps the best in the Patriot League, and gives the Eagles

options over the top. According to West, Mark will get his share of chances and it will be up to him to finish.

Meanwhile, sophomore **Justin Turco** will figure into the mix at forward, as well. West said that Turco's new-found discipline will result in better on-field results. Also, Benavides could see time up front. Benavides led the Eagles in scoring in the spring season.

Van Yahres, Konowiecki and Caccavale could also contribute as forwards.

## Schedule

According to West, the 2006 Eagles will play "as competitive a schedule as we've ever played." With six 2005 NCAA Tournament



participants on the 2006 schedule, the Eagles could face potentially a top-10 strength of schedule. AU

faces off against New Mexico, who made it to the finals last season, and Duke and NC State, both of which were ranked in the top-20 in 2005.

The Eagles are especially looking forward to a few games, particularly the rematch with the Lafayette Leopards, who defeated American, 1-0, in the 2005 Patriot League Championship Game. In addition, the Eagles are seeking to regain the D.C. College Cup, which in 2005 went to a team other than AU for the first time in tournament history.

The season starts up on August 25, 2006, with the opening tilt of the College Cup against Howard.

Coming off a solid 15-6-2 season in 2004, the 2005 American University men's soccer team was looking to improve on an already NCAA tournament-quality effort. Todd West started his sixth season with Eagles, only returning 6 of 11 starters and adding 9 newcomers to the roster.

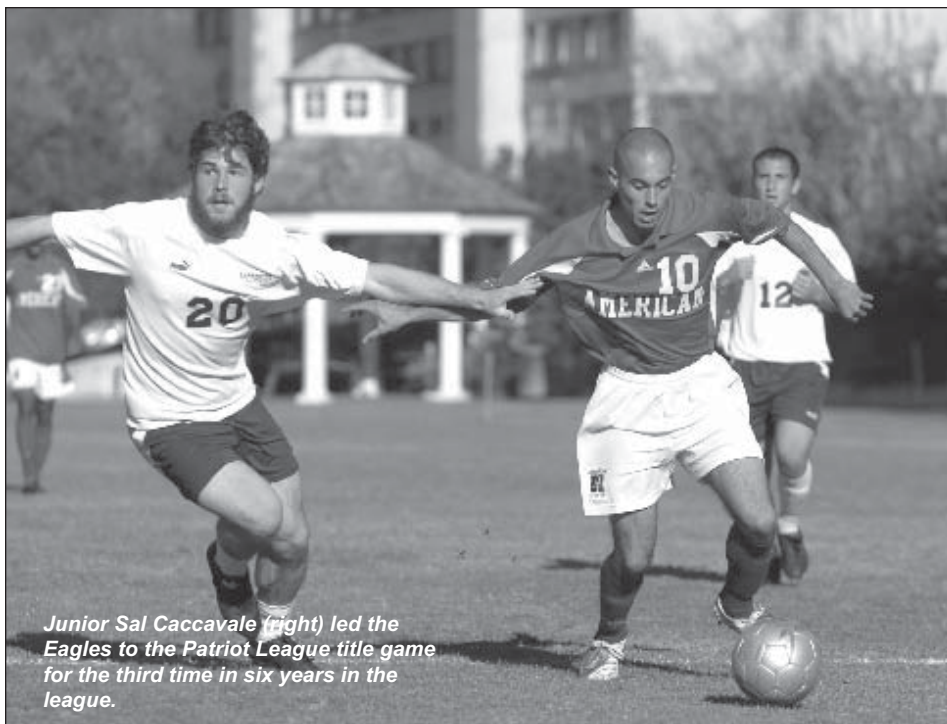
The squad, under the leadership of only two returning seniors, finished the 2005 season at a disappointing 7-9-1, losing the Patriot League final to Lafayette. Only junior Sal Caccavale was named to the All-South Atlantic Region team.

The Eagles opened their season in Washington, DC against George Washington in the D.C. College Cup, posting a 1-1 tie through double-overtime. Though AU played hard and outshot GW 29-11, the Eagles couldn't push forward for a win.

The next round of the D.C. College Cup saw American taking on host Georgetown. Though AU put up a good fight and outshot the Hoyas 17-7, the end of play saw the Eagles at the losing end of a 1-0 final score. Garth Juckem and Nate Baker were named to the All-Tournament team.

The Eagles home opener against Princeton continued the unimpressive 0-1-1 season with a 2-1 loss against the Tigers. The Eagles fought hard after Princeton scored their first goal, but couldn't hold on for a tie or a win. The Eagles outshot Princeton 15-14, marking the third consecutive game where AU outshot their opponent and lost.

But the Eagles luck would soon change. Their next match was against visiting Drexel, whom AU suffered a 1-0 loss in the 2004 season. Goals by Garth Juckem, Larry Mark, Sal Caccavale, Coco Del Rio, and one of Drexel's own defenders helped vault the Eagles to a 5-0 victory and their first win of the sea-

son.

American then traveled to New Haven, Connecticut to play Dartmouth and Yale in the Yale Classic. AU dropped both games: a 1-0 decision against Dartmouth then a 3-2 OT loss to Yale. This put the Eagles at a 1-4-1 record, a reminder of the 2-3-0 start the Eagles posted in the 2004 season. Despite their mediocre performance, two Eagles-goaltender Chris Sedlak and Sal Caccavale- were named to the All-Tournament team.

The next game saw the Eagles starting their domination of the Patriot League, with a 2-1 double overtime win over Lafayette. The Eagles would go 5-2-0 in the PL in the 2005 season.

The Eagles traveled to Annapolis, Md., next to face the Navy Midshipmen. Although the Midshipmen and the Eagles both tallied the same number of shots, Navy was able to capitalize on two scoring opportunities. American dropped a Patriot League match on the road 2-0, marking the third game the Eagles were shut out.

American stayed on the road

to Loyola (Md.), where they lost another tight game with a 3-2 overtime loss to the Greyhounds. Garth Juckem and Sal Caccavale scored the two goals for the Eagles, but the team failed to come away with a win.

After being postponed due to inclement weather, the Eagles hosted Patriot League opponent No. 18 Lehigh. After a saving goal by Coco Del Rio in the second period which tied the Eagles with Lehigh 1-1, American came into overtime blazing. Del Rio tipped in a rebound just two seconds before the end of the first overtime period, giving the Eagles the edge they needed to pull away with a win. The win over Lehigh gave the Eagles at 2-1-0 record in the Patriot League, as well as a number of League awards.

After another game rescheduled due to rain, the Eagles traveled to face Holy Cross in hopes of grabbing the lead of a four-way tie for the top place in the Patriot League. However, American faltered in the first part of the game, letting up three goals in the first fifteen minutes. The Eagles couldn't recover,

and fell to Holy Cross 4-1, dropping their Patriot League record to 2-2-0. American's lone goal was scored by Philip Purdy.

The Eagles returned to Reeves Field looking to turn around their luck, but found the Big East's West Virginia Mountaineers ready to dominate. Despite American's valiant effort out-shooting the Mountaineers 14-7, when the dust settled WVU came away with a 2-0 win, dropping the Eagles to 3-8-1 for the season.

The Eagles stayed at home to host Patriot League front-runner Colgate for the race to first place in the League. A win would put American in the tie for first, whereas a

loss would put the Eagles on the bottom. The Eagles fought hard to come away with a 3-1 win over Colgate, improving their record to 3-2 in the Patriot League. Freshmen Philip Purdy and Justin Turco led the Eagles' offensive assault with a goal each, Turco's first of his career. Junior Larry Mark also tallied a goal for the Eagles.

After canceling their game against Penn State, the Eagles traveled to Bucknell and solidified their place in the Patriot League with a 2-1 win over the Bison. American's freshmen led the charge again with goals from Philip Purdy and Stephen Romeo. The win placed AU in a tie for top seed in the tournament and home field advantage with Army. Romeo's effort earned him the Brine Patriot League Rookie of the Week after he tallied the game-winner versus Bucknell.

The Eagles faced Penn on the road before competing for the Patriot League regular season title against Army. The Eagles experienced a brief setback, suffering a 2-0 loss to the Quakers, dropping them to 5-9-1 for the season.

As if fate had orchestrated it so, the Eagles faced the Black Knights of Army in a titanic match-up to appoint the host of the Patriot League tournament. Although Army fought hard, the Eagles ran away with a 3-0 win over West Point's finest and claimed the Patriot League regular season title and home field for the tournament. Two goals by Garth Juckem and a goal by Larry Mark gave the Eagles their third shut out of the season.

Prior to the tournament, freshman Philip Purdy was named Brine Patriot League Rookie of the Year by the league's coaches. Purdy recorded three goals in conference play and his seven total points in PL play were second on the squad. Meanwhile, midfielder Sal Cac-

cavale was named to the league's All-League First Team and Garth Juckem and Gordon Templeman were named to the league's Second Team. Caccavale finished the regular season as the Eagles' third-leading scoring with four goals and four assists for 12 points. Juckem was the Eagles' leading scoring in the regular season, notching six goals and four assists for 16 points. Templeman was a defensive stalwart throughout the season. He played in and started all seven league games, and earned the Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week.

The Eagles started the tournament strong, blanking Colgate to propel them to the championship game against Lafayette. Philip Purdy scored AU's goal, continuing their streak of winning the first round of the Patriot League tournament since joining the league in 2001.

The Eagles would go no further this season, and the Lafayette Leopards dashed AU's NCAA dreams with a 1-0 win over the Eagles in the Patriot League Championship. Lafayette scored in the 4th minute of the first period, but the Eagles could not respond with a goal of their own. It was AU's first loss in the PL Championship game after two previous wins in the final.

Although the NCAA tournament proved just out of reach for the Eagles, a number of their key players received awards. Sal Caccavale was named to the All-South Atlantic Region Third Team, the 36th Eagle to be named on the team. Caccavale recorded four goals and the same number of assists for the 2005 season, and earned 12 points overall. AU performed in the classroom as well, with nine players, including five freshmen, named to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll.

# The Tradition

**D**uring head coach Todd West's 11 years in association with American soccer, he has been part of the program's transformation into one that commands national respect and recognition. In just the past five seasons, graduates Shawn Kuykendall, Bobby Brennan, Trevor Ellis, Stephen Franzke, Avery John, Larry McDonald, Antonio Otero, Scott Pearson and Scott Weber have all earned Regional All-America honors.

"I think we have a lot to be proud of here at AU. Our student-athletes come here with a great amount of responsibility and are put in charge of leading the program's image," West said. "They accept that challenge and are asked to play major roles on the team early in their careers, and against the best competition college soccer has to offer."

The team is comprised of players that fit West's style—hard-working, honest and well-rounded student-athletes.

"When we recruit student-athletes, we look for quality individuals, people who we feel will be successful at American and in their lives after college," West said. "There are a lot of different ways to contribute something unique to our program and develop individually as a person."

In April 1997, Pearson was honored with an award that transcends the playing field and the classroom when he received the prestigious Colonial Athletic Association's Randolph Inspiration

Award. This honor is given each year to a student-athlete "who through strength of character and human spirit serves as an inspiration to all those around to maximize their potential and ability for success."

AU has recruited this type of student-athlete in order to mold its soccer program. Since joining the Patriot League in 2001, American has had 12 athletes selected to the All-PL First Team and three athletes picked to the Second Team. In addition, the Eagles earned the 2004 PL Offensive Player of the Year (Shawn Kuykendall), the 2004 PL Goalkeeper of the Year (Thomas Myers) and West earned the 2004 PL Coach of the Year award.

"What's the secret?" you may ask.

"In my time at AU, we've tried to instill a creative, attacking style and encourage good decision making on the field," West says. "When you stress this in practice, you can give the players freedom to create and allow them to make the decisions for themselves. At the same time, with this freedom comes responsibility and discipline. For us, this is the key, to blend the individuals' abilities to create the framework of team goals."

And off the field?

Our primary goal is to make sure the players develop scholastically and as people," West said. "AU has the resources to make sure they are supported and therefore successful academically and athletically."

# 2006 EAGLES



**T**he most decorated player in American University men's soccer history, Michael Brady is also the only player with his number retired. In his four years as an Eagle, Brady was named the 1985 NCAA Men's Player of the Year by Soccer America, an All-American three times, and he led AU to the NCAA Tournament in 1984 and 1985 as AU advanced to the National Championship in 1985.

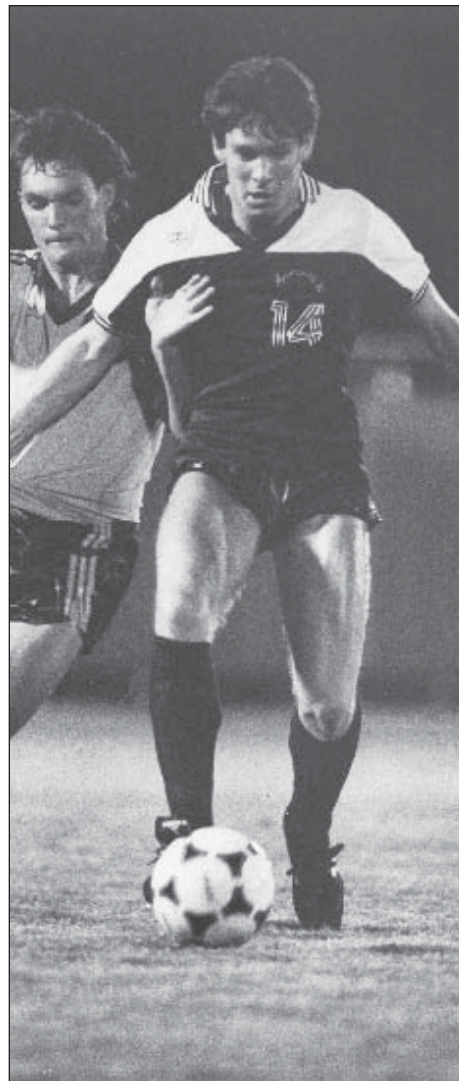
A midfielder, Brady continues to hold the American University school records for goals in a career (66) as well as points (161). His 24 goals in 1985 are a single-season school record as are his 56 points. Brady also found his teammates on the attack, dishing out 29 career assists (second all-time), including 11 in 1983. He was good in the

clutch, scoring 27 game-winning goals, including 11 in 1985.

Brady has the unique distinction of being named a player of the year in three different conferences—East Coast Conference, ECAC-South and Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). He was named to the All-South Atlantic Region squad four times and was named All-Conference for all four years of his career.

While leading the Eagles to the National Championship match in 1985, Brady earned honors from a number of different outlets. In the eight-overtime duel with UCLA, Brady was named the Most Valuable Offensive Player in the match, playing in the middle of the attack and taking eight shots in the match. In 1985, he received the Adi Dassler Award from adidas as the top collegiate player of the year. Brady was also runner-up for the Hermann Trophy in 1985, while being named to the KICK Magazine All-America Team. He was invited to play in the 1985 Senior Bowl as well.

Brady's soccer excellence was not limited to an AU uniform. He played with the U.S. National Team from 1984 to 1987 and participated in the 1985 World University Games. In 1983, Brady was on the U.S. Youth National Team that played in the FIFA Youth World Cup. Following his collegiate career, Brady played professionally for the Baltimore

Blast, a member of the Major Indoor Soccer League, as well as several other professional soccer teams in the United States.

On Sept. 17, 1986, in a pre-game ceremony, Brady's No. 14 became the first and only AU men's soccer number to be retired. He was inducted into the American University Athletics Hall of Fame in 1997. In 2005, Brady was inducted into the D.C. Youth Association Soccer Hall of Fame.

Brady returned to his alma mater and served as an assistant coach for the men's program from 1989 to 1992. He was head coach for the women's soccer team from 1991 to 1992 and reclaimed the helm in 2000. In the fall of 2002, Brady led the AU women's soccer team to the Patriot League title and its first-ever NCAA appearance.

**F**or a school of its size, American University has a presence on the collegiate soccer scene that is as distinct as any program's in the nation.

Eight trips to the NAAs in school history, wins over some of the biggest names in the game, three appearances in the Sweet 16, two trips to the elite eight and a trip to the 1985 National Championship game have all combined to build a legacy that few collegiate soccer programs can match.

The Eagles' first bid to the dance was in 1978, where they were quickly eliminated by Clemson, 4-0. It would be the only time in the program's history in which the team did not win at least one game in a respective tournament appearance.

Building off the success of the previous season, American made a follow-up trip to the tournament in 1979. This time, AU shocked regional power Virginia, 1-0, to advance to the second round for the first time in school history. Facing Clemson for the second straight year in the tournament, the Eagles fell, 1-0, in a tough match.

The Eagles' next appearance came in 1984, and this time American beat local rival George Mason, 2-1, to advance to meet Virginia. The Cavs exacted revenge for the previous meeting, finishing off American, 1-0.

By any account, a program's first trip to a Final Four is special, but in American's case, the 1985 season has become legendary.

Led by NCAA Player of the Year Michael Brady, American swept through the first two rounds, knocking off George Mason, 3-1, and South Carolina, 2-0. AU advanced to meet Hartwick in the third round for the right to go to the National Championship. In one of the greatest games in school history, AU defeated Hartwick, 1-0, on Reeves Field.

The National Championship provided fans and historians with enough drama for a lifetime. American and UCLA battled through eight overtimes before a late UCLA goal provided the winning margin. It remains the longest game ever played in NCAA soccer history.

American returned to the tournament in 1997 after a 12-year absence. The



Eagles beat conference rival William and Mary, 2-1, in two overtimes in round one, and then eliminated Maryland, 1-0, in the second round. Advancing to the Sweet 16 for the second time in school history, American played another epic game with Virginia, the eventual national runner-up, before falling 2-1 in double overtime.

Following a four-year drought, American returned to the NAAs in 2001 with a vengeance. On the heels of their first Patriot League Championship, the Eagles met Ohio State in the first round of the tournament, rolling past the Buckeyes, 2-1. A second-round matchup with Wake Forest proved to be much to American's liking, as the Eagles stung the host Deacons, 3-0, advancing to the Sweet 16 for the third time in school history.

The Eagles had a tough third-round date in Chapel Hill, N.C., with the host Tar Heels. American battled North Carolina through a dramatic regulation period, before finally falling to the eventual national champions, 1-0, in overtime.

AU returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2002, earning an at-large berth. The Eagles were rewarded with a home match against crosstown rival George Washington played on Reeves Field. A Shawn Kuykendall penalty kick in the 44th minute gave AU a 1-0 victory in front of nearly 2,000 fans. A tough match

with Maryland awaited the Eagles in the second round, and on a frigid night in College Park, AU was defeated, 1-0.

AU made a triumphant return to the NAAs in 2004, remaining undefeated in home Tournament games with a 3-0 lashing of LIU. The Eagles then gave Virginia a run for its money, leading 1-0 early in the second half, but eventually lost, 2-1.

In his wildest dreams, head coach Pete Mehlert would not have envisioned his team making it to the NCAA Division I soccer final in the Kingdome in Seattle. Nor would he have imagined being named National Coach of the Year. But for the Bethesda, Md., resident, the 1985 American University soccer season was not only a dream come true, but also the culmination of 14 years of long hours, persistence and hard work.

The Eagles finished the regular season 16-2-2, losing only to fellow CAA member William and Mary, 1-0, and defending national champion Clemson, also by a 1-0 tally. The record was good for a bid to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season. It was also good enough for a first-round bye in the 24-team event.

The first obstacle to the NCAA Championship was a rematch with George Mason, as the Eagles hosted their first NCAA championship event. AU's 3-1 decisive win was the third in a row over the Patriots, with whom they shared the CAA crown for the second straight season.

American then faced the surprising South Carolina Gamecocks, who had upset defending national champion Clemson. On a field more fit for motorcross, the Eagles slogged their way through the muck and mire for a 2-0 win.

The Eagles returned to Washington, D.C. to host the NCAA Semifinals against perennial powerhouse Hartwick College. An estimated 5,600 soccer fans crammed Reeves Field to witness college

soccer at its finest. As William Gildea of *The Washington Post* described, "It was a game of unrelenting intensity and suspense that wrought absolute joy among the AU players, an unprecedented campus celebration and utter anguish for a barely beaten Hartwick team." Fernando Iturbe's header in the game's 77th minute provided the Eagles a ticket to Seattle to face heavily favored UCLA for the National Championship.

In what most of the media played up as a "David versus Goliath" matchup, the Eagles took the Bruins beyond the limit of patience and physical endurance. In the game's 166th minute and eighth overtime, UCLA drilled home the game winner. The score ended the longest championship soccer game in NCAA history.

Thus, American University's most memorable season ended with perhaps a sigh of relief rather than one of disappointment. The Eagles' 19-3-2 season was the best ever in school history.

Among the many awards and recognition received by the 1985 team, head coach Peter Mehlert was named NSCAA Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year and CAA Coach of the Year, both for the second consecutive year.

Along with the 1985 NCAA Player of the Year Michael Brady, teammate Keith Trehy was an All-America selection. Brady, Trehy, and Nakhid were also named to the NCAA's All-South Atlantic team.



The 1985 Season

**E**pitomizing the notion that the whole is greater than the sum of its parts, in 1997 the American University men's soccer team (17-4-4) completed its second-best season in school history.

The Eagles marched methodically and heroically to the 1997 NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament Quarterfinals while earning the seventh seed in their first appearance since 1985 and only the fifth in the program's 49-year history.

The Eagles' path to the NCAA Quarterfinals included three consecutive thrillers in postseason play, two requiring overtime and two in front of rabid home fans at Reeves Field, where AU went unbeaten during the year. In the 'Elite Eight' game, AU dropped a heartbreaker to five-time champion Virginia, 2-1, in overtime to abruptly end its efforts to reach the Final Four. Previously, in the first two rounds of NCAA play at home, AU defeated Maryland, 1-0, in the second round with a goal in the last eight minutes, and, in the first round, the Eagles rallied to top William and Mary, 2-1, in overtime, netting two goals in the final eight minutes.

Under sixth-year head coach Bob Jenkins, the Regional and CAA Coach of the Year, AU became only the fourth team in CAA league history to complete the regular season and tournament play undefeated (8-0-3) as the Eagles captured their first CAA regular season title since 1985, and the top seed and home-field advantage for the tournament. AU advanced to the CAA finals, held

at Reeves Field, where the team battered Virginia Commonwealth with 32 shots for 150 minutes in a three-hour epic tie in freezing temperatures before bowing in a tournament tie-breaking shoot-out to the Rams.

Down the stretch, the Eagles were dominant, going 15-1-3 in their last 19 games before the NCAA quarterfinal game, outshooting each opponent and competing against one of the nation's toughest schedules. AU faced 15 nationally ranked opponents, going 9-3-3 against them. AU milestone victories included defeating national powers Virginia, Maryland (twice), Rutgers, Princeton, William and Mary (three times) and James Madison. The CAA was rated as the second-best conference in the nation and placed an NCAA-best six teams in the top 25 during the season.

The Eagles used Reeves Field magic to complete the team's first

home unbeaten season (9-0-3) since 1979, and extending their home unbeaten streak to 17 games dating back to Oct. 5, 1996.

Individual performances were recognized nationwide, highlighted by forward Scott Pearson, who earned Second Team All-America honors from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). AU placed four players on the NSCAA All-South Atlantic Region All-America squad. First-team selections included Pearson and midfielder Antonio Otero. Defenders Stephen Franzke and Avery John were selected to the second team. All four were named First Team All-CAA—a record for AU—while defender Todd Miller was selected to the All-CAA Second Team.

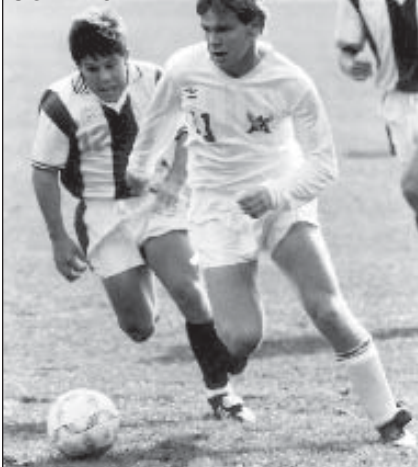

The approximately 5,400 undergraduates, 3,200 graduate students and 1,600 law students in our six schools—the College of Arts and Sciences, Kogod School of Business, School of Communication, School of International Service, School of Public Affairs and Washington College of Law—are a microcosm of the world's diversity. AU actively promotes international and multicultural understanding through our curriculum, our faculty research, a large percentage of international students and the regular presence of national and world leaders on our campus. Our graduates are prepared to turn ideas into action and action into service, and to succeed in today's rapidly changing world.

## Location

American University's 84-acre campus is located in a residential neighborhood at the top of Embassy Row, just a short distance from Washington's centers of government, business, culture, research and commerce. As an AU student, you have easy access to the city and surrounding Maryland and Virginia suburbs and are encouraged to use Washington's resources to expand your educational experience through on-site research, field trips and internships.



## Faculty

The AU faculty are scholar-practitioners offering a rich mix of academic and professional expertise. Our 476 full-time teaching faculty and our distinguished adjunct instructors are nationally and internationally recognized. More than 95 percent of our full-time faculty hold the highest degree in their field. Students have the opportunity to learn from professionals who work with such organizations as the World Bank, National Institutes of Health, Associated Press, Smithsonian Institution, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, National Public Radio and others in private industry. These faculty bring a real-world perspective to the classroom experience and, due to a student-faculty ratio of 15:1, have ample opportunity for one-on-one contact with students.

## Academic Facilities

Facilities include a state-of-the-art broadcast center; multimedia design and development labs; a language resource center; art and dance studios; biology, chemistry and physics laboratories; several specialized computing labs; and a sports center with an outdoor track, basketball and volleyball courts, a swimming pool and diving well, tennis courts and a modern fitness center with an aerobic studio and cardiovascular and strength-training equipment. There are 14 classroom buildings, a student activities and university center, a multifaith religious center, disability support services, a student health center, an international student services office, a counseling center, and an academic support center.



AU's Bender Library has more than 780,000 volumes, 3,500 journals and one million microforms. It also houses large collections of CD-ROM, multimedia, video and film, audio cassette and compact disc materials. ALADIN, the on-line catalog system, lists the holdings of American University and the other members of the Washington Research Library Consortium. You may borrow research materials from any of the libraries in the consortium as well as AU's Washington College of Law. You have 24-hour access to university computing labs and to computing resources through AU's EagleNet network, including many software applications, e-mail, connection to the Internet, electronic discussion groups, statistical packages, Blackboard and online research tools.

### Getting Involved

AU offers the best of two worlds. You have the opportunity to study, work and enjoy life in Washington, D.C., and also to live on a traditional campus with more

than 180 student groups and organizations serving a broad range of interests, including performing arts, Greek life, community service, religious issues, radio and television, newspaper, yearbook, student government and international and intercultural affairs. There is also a wide variety of intramural and club sports. The Student Union Board (SUB) sponsors concerts on campus each semester, including such recent groups as Green Day, Garbage, Cypress Hill and Weezer. And the award-winning student-run Kennedy Political Union brings well-known speakers to campus, such as Colin Powell, Winnie Mandela, Ralph Nader, Charlton Heston and Newt Gingrich.

### Off-Campus Opportunities

Both the university's Career Center and AU faculty work with you to develop field experience related to your educational and career goals—whether in private business, industry, galleries, theatres, museums, schools, international organizations and embassies, community and social service organizations, or local, state or federal government. At American University, you can study almost anywhere in the world through AU's World Capitals Program, with locations in the Andes, Australia, Beijing and Hong Kong, Berlin, Brussels, Buenos Aires, London, Madrid, the Mediterranean, Paris, Perugia (Art in Italy), Prague, Rome, Santiago and South Africa.

The Patriot League

"Today's Scholar-Athletes, Tomorrow's Leaders" – The Patriot League continually demonstrates that student-athletes can excel at both academics and athletics without sacrificing its high standards. The Patriot League's athletic success is achieved while its member institutions remain committed to its founding principle of admitting and graduating student-athletes that are academically representative of their class. Participation in athletics at Patriot League institutions is viewed as an important component of a well-rounded education.

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football

conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. In addition, the Patriot League finished first in the new NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR) among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid (combining with all eight of its full-time member institutions for

an average of 984 out of 1,000). The APR is used to measure academic eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes.

Patriot League student-athletes and teams continue to enjoy success at the national level, with opening round victories coming in several NCAA Championships, including consecutive wins in men's basketball, a final four appearance in men's lacrosse and a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

**R**eeves Field solidified its position as one of the premier soccer facilities in the Washington, D.C., area last fall, continuing its tradition as a dominating home site for American University soccer since 1949. Recently, the facility hosted its sixth NCAA Tournament game and served as the training site for the U.S. National Soccer Team during World Cup 2006 qualifying. In 2002, Reeves Field earned College Soccer Field of the Year.

In the summer of 2005, Reeves Field underwent a \$300,000 renovation to construct a new foundation, replace the drainage system and install a new playing surface.

After being named Soccer Field of the Year by the Sports Turf Managers Association, Reeves played host to almost 2,000 fans on Nov. 23, 2002, as the Eagles downed George Washington University, 1-0, in the NCAA First Round.

Utilized as a soccer competition site, Reeves Field has gained notoriety throughout the collegiate and professional ranks as one of the finest fields in the nation. In 2004, Barcelona, Blackburn, the U.S. National Team and the Women's World Cup team used Reeves Field as a training facility. In the summer of 2000, AU served as the practice site for Newcastle United, one of England's premier professional soccer clubs. Major League Soccer's D.C. United, Miami Fusion and San Jose Earthquakes also practice at AU. National teams from the USA, Bolivia and Portugal trained at Reeves in 1996 in preparation for Summer Olympic games held at RFK Stadium.

In 1997, the men's soccer team hosted two thrilling first- and second-round games of the NCAA Tournament, as

well as the CAA Championship game. In 1985, American's home-field advantage catapulted the Eagles into the national spotlight following their victory in the NCAA Semifinals over Hartwick before 5,000 fans at Reeves. The win sent the Eagles to the NCAA Championship in Seattle, where AU would go on to fall, 1-0, to UCLA in the national championship match.

Reeves Field also features a six-lane track that accommodates the track and field programs at AU and creates a multipurpose event site. The larger width from the track brings conveniences to the site, such as a 200-foot-long retaining wall and bleachers that seat 700 for games.

During the summer of 1994, Hendrix and Dail, Inc., of Greenville, N.C., replaced the original Reeves Field playing surface with the exclusive Bermuda Bluegrass Sod found at all of the 1994 World Cup venues. The prescription turf was laid atop four inches of an 80 percent sand, 20 percent soil mixture, complete with laser leveling. A state-of-the-art drainage system runs beneath the surface with the capabilities of draining several inches of rain per hour, giving the AU athletic programs the ability to play under almost any amount of rain. The exclusive soccer pitch conforms to both NCAA and international standards with a roomy 74-by-117-yard playing surface.

Originally designed as a multipurpose field to serve the entire university community, Reeves Field underwent its first major renovation in 1988, thanks to a \$250,000 donation from Mrs. John Reeves. Included in that facelift was an automatic sprinkler system and a computer-operated soccer scoreboard to keep fans on top of the action.

**T**he academic support program assists student-athletes in successfully reaching academic goals, exploring interests and abilities and gaining a broad academic experience. Promoting responsibility and initiative, the program emphasizes the development of the total person, taking advantage of the rich resources and facilities provided by American University in the continual pursuit of excellence.

The 2004-05 academic year was one of extreme success for the Academic Support Program and the athletic department, with an impressive cumulative grade point average of 3.22. American University athletics also placed 155 student-athletes on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll during the academic year.

A primary objective of AU's academic support program is to provide academic counseling for student-athletes. Academic counseling is a multifaceted activity that helps student-athletes maximize the educational benefits available at American. The coordinator and the graduate assistant work closely with faculty, facilitating communication and understanding of the academic needs of student-athletes. AU's academic counselors provide accurate information concerning educational options, requirements, policies and procedures.

## **Guided Study**

Guided study targets student-athletes who may confront a variety of academic challenges. Students in the program meet weekly with either the coordinator or the graduate assistant, who closely monitor academic progress and the development of skills such as time management and study strategies.

## **The Tutor Program**

Tutoring aids enhance the academic performance of the student-athletes. The program employs both graduate and undergraduate students who tutor all subject matter offered by American University. An important component of the academic support program, tutors help student-athletes understand subject matter, learn test-taking techniques and develop study skills.

## **Academic Study**

All first-year and transfer student-athletes are required to attend study hall for their first semester. AU student-athletes who successfully complete all the requirements of study hall and achieve a GPA of 2.5 or above will not be required to attend study hall during the spring semester.



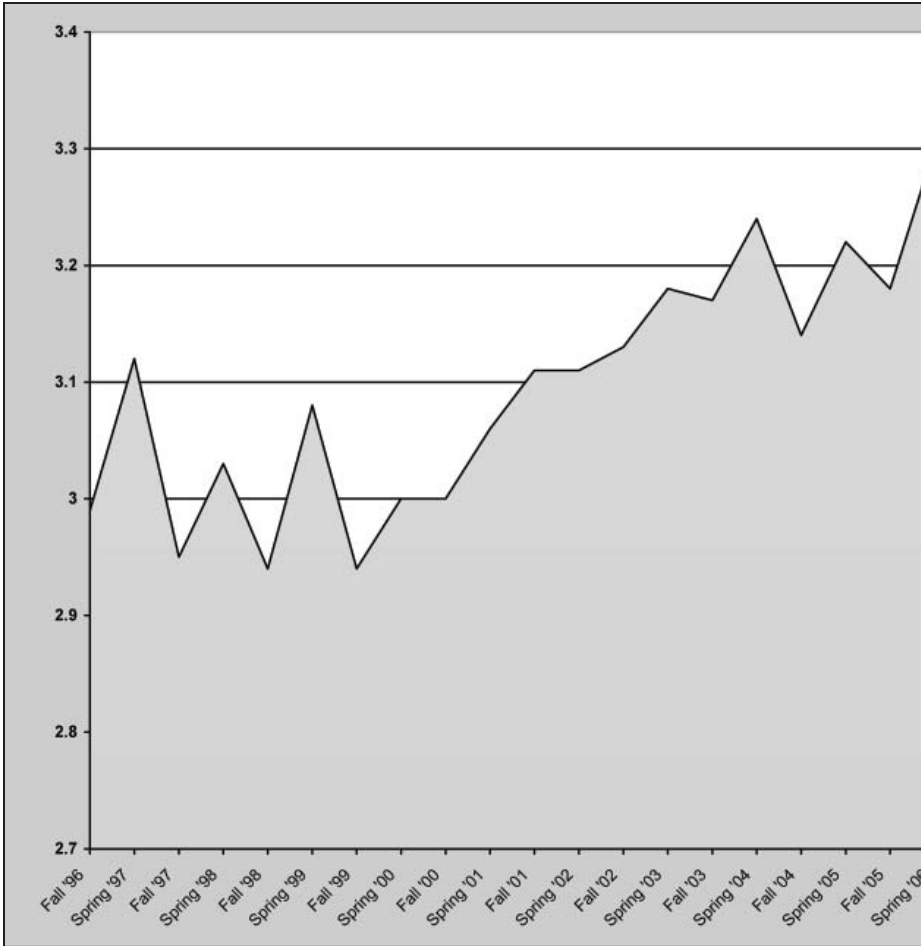
## **TALONS**

TALONS (Thinking and Learning Opportunity for New Student-Athletes) is a workshop series that aids first-year and transfer student-athletes by addressing relevant topics in an interactive format. TALONS is facilitated by both academic and personal developmental counselors who present information and run group discussions on a wide variety of topics that help first-year and transfer student-athletes understand and cope with academic, social, athletic and personal pressures related to the transition either from high school to college or from one college to another. The series provides new student-athletes with information and practical strategies to adjust to increased demands and pressures of college academics to adapt to competitive NCAA Division I athletics and develop lifelong learning and personal development skills.



## AU Academics on the Rise

American University's student-athletes have experienced unprecedented success in the classroom in recent years. American's approximately 250 student-athletes have registered at least a 3.0 GPA in each of the last 13 semesters. Over the last decade, AU's student-athletes' overall GPA has not fallen below a 2.94. Furthermore, 154 AU student-athletes earned spots on their respective sports' Patriot League Academic Honor Roll, which requires at least a 3.20 grade point average.



## American University Student-Athletes Compile Highest Grade Point Average Ever

*Eagles combine for a 3.3 GPA*

WASHINGTON -- American University's 243 student-athletes combined to earn a 3.3 grade point average in the Spring 2006 semester, the highest ever in the department's history.

In all, 103 male and 140 female student-athletes recorded a grade point average over 3.0 for the 13th consecutive semester. Also, nine student-athletes earned a perfect 4.0 GPA. Furthermore, 65% of student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or above. The Women's Cross Country and Track team secured the highest GPA among all teams with a 3.62 GPA; the Men's Swimming and Diving team earned the highest GPA among the men's teams with a 3.48 GPA.

The 3.3 GPA is the culmination of a history of success in the eight years of AU's Academic Support Program. AU's student-athletes' grade point averages have not fallen below 2.94 in more than a decade and have risen in eight of the last 12 semesters. AU student-athletes earned an overall semester GPA of 3.18 and 3.30 for the fall and spring semesters, respectively. According to Meredith Basil, AU's Coordinator of Academic Support, the student-athletes secured the highest GPA in the history of the academic support program for student-athletes for two consecutive semesters.

"I am very proud to congratulate our student-athletes on another record-setting performance in the classroom this year," said Dr. Comstock. "Eagles Athletics is now synonymous with achievement both academically and athletically. This level of accomplishment reflects the culture and the standard of AU Athletics.
