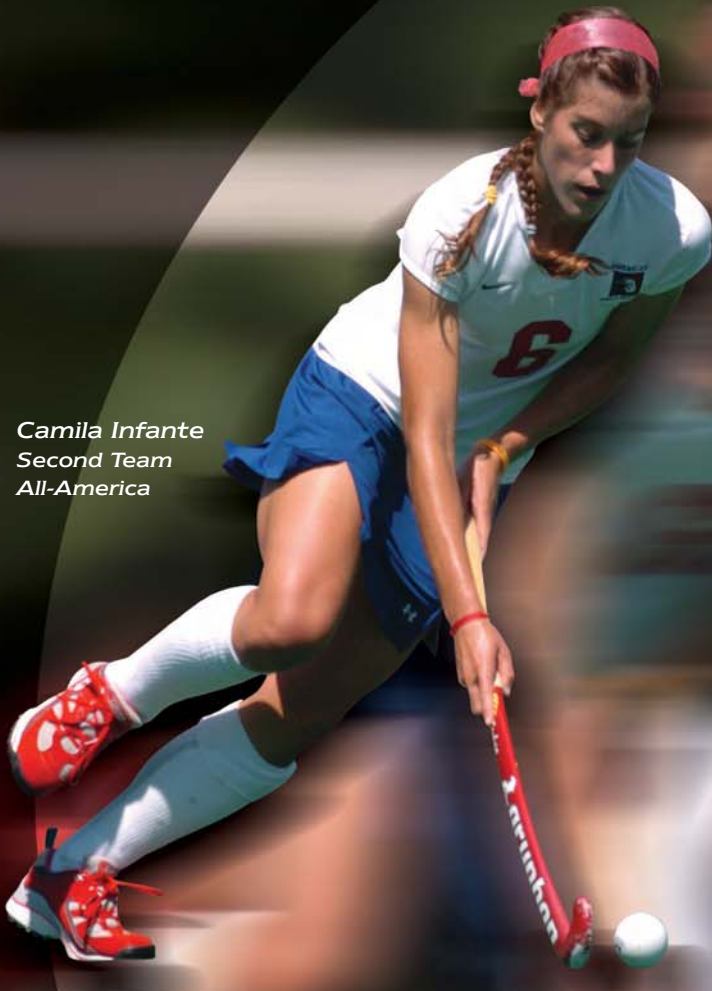

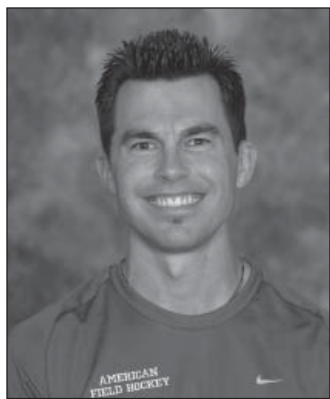

## Steve Jennings

Eighth Season • Maryland '97 • 90-42 Overall Record



Beginning his eighth year as head field hockey coach at American University, Steve Jennings has established himself as one of the nation's premier coaches, earning both the respect of his players and peers.

Jennings owns a career mark of 90-42 [.681] overall and is 24-5 [.828] all-time in the Patriot League.

2005 was Jennings most successful as a coach, as he led the Eagles to a 20-2 record, the most wins in program history with their only two losses coming against eventual National Champion Maryland. AU's .909 winning percentage was third best in all of Division I as the Eagles captured their third consecutive Patriot League crown and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with a 3-2 win over Penn State. At one point in the season the Eagles were ranked fourth in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, the highest ever, with American finishing the season sixth.

Under Jennings' guidance the Eagles were ranked first in the NCAA in margin of victory, outscoring opponents by an average of 2.68 goals per game in 2005. AU's 3.90 goals per game was second in the country, with their 1.22 goals per game allowed finishing seventh in all of Division I. Senior Javiera Villagra became the team's first two-time First Team All-American and the program's only three-time All-American. Senior Maureen Daniel, a Second Team All-America selection, was the Patriot League's Scholar-Athlete of the Year in addition to being named PL Defensive Player of the Year. Junior Camila Infante earned Second Team All-American honors while being named ECAC Division I Player of the Year and Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year. Jennings, the Patriot League Coach of the Year, also saw freshman Irene Schickhardt earn the 2005 PL Co-Rookie of the Year award.

In 2004 Jennings was named as NFHCA Division I National Coach of the Year after guiding the program to the team's most successful season up to that point. The Eagles finished the year with a 19-3 overall record while finishing seventh in the NFHCA poll, the teams highest ranking ever. 2004 saw the Eagles garner their first NCAA Tournament victory, a 2-1 win over Iowa in the opening round. The Eagles were perfect in the Patriot League for the second consecutive season, outscoring conference opponents by a 25-5 margin in the regular season. Junior Javiera Villagra was named as a First Team All-American selection, with Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year Camila Infante capturing Second Team All-America Honors. Freshman Maggie Hall was named as the Patriot League Rookie

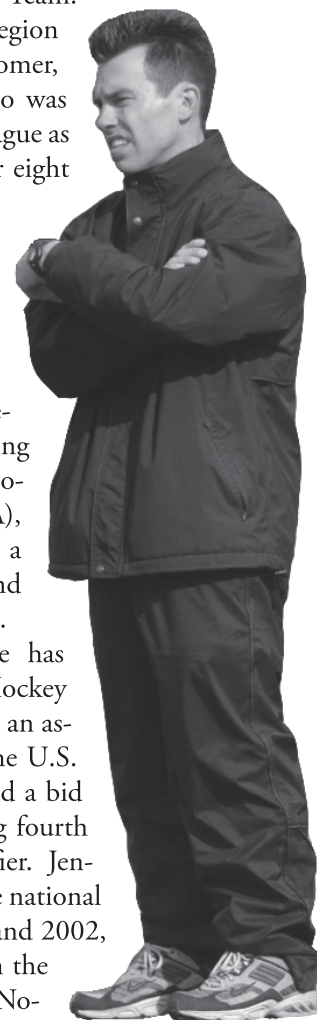
of the year.

In 2003, the Eagles finished the season ranked ninth in the country on the NCAA Field Hockey Ratings Percentage Index. Named DITA/NFHCA Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year and the Patriot League Coach of the Year in 2003, Jennings led his team to its first-ever Patriot League Championship and the team's first-ever berth in the NCAA tournament. Academically, the AU field hockey team placed third on the National Field Hockey Coaches Association's Academic Team list with a 3.37 grade point average. Bringing in eight new players in 2003, including two international standouts, Jennings led his team to a 17-4 overall record and a 6-0 Patriot League record. Playing some top teams in the nation (Maryland, Richmond and Duke), the Eagles were recognized on the STX/NFHCA Division I Coaches Poll Top-20 for the final five weeks of the season.

In 2003, Villagra became the program's third All-American, as well as a member of the STX/NFHCA Division I All-Region First Team. Joining Villagra on the All-Region First Team was another newcomer, freshman Camila Infante, who was also honored by the Patriot League as the Rookie of the Year for her eight goals and 11 assists.

Since joining the Patriot League in 2001, the Eagles have steadily improved in conference play, moving from a 4-3 record in both 2001 and 2002 to a three-straight undefeated seasons in the PL. During the final two years in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA), Jennings guided American to a 10-7 overall record in 2000 and an 8-8 finish in his first season.

Outside of American, he has been involved in U.S. Field Hockey at the national level, serving as an assistant coach in 2006 when the U.S. Women's National team earned a bid to the World Cup after taking fourth place in Rome at the qualifier. Jennings was also a member of the national team's coaching staff in 2001 and 2002, helping the United States earn the bid for the World Cup. In No-

ember 2002, he traveled to Perth, Australia, where the United States finished ninth out of 16 teams at the World Cup. Jennings has also coached the national team at the Championships Challenge in South Africa and more recently in Virginia Beach along with the World Cup Qualifier in England. His other destinations with the national team have been Holland, Germany, New Zealand and India.

No stranger to competition himself, Jennings is considered one of the finest U.S. field hockey players. He was a member of the U.S. Men's National Team from 1991 to 1999 and participated in 91 international test matches. He represented the United States in the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta, where he was vice captain of the team.

Jennings took a bronze medal in the 1995 Pan American Games and helped the United States to fifth place in the 1999 Pan American Games. He also participated in eight United States Olympic Festivals and won three gold and two silver medals. In addition, he was the first U.S. athlete to compete in the highest Dutch club division. Jennings was a member of the Athlete Representation to the U.S. Field Hockey Association Board from 1993 to 2000 and chaired a clinic on video analysis at the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Field Hockey Final Fours.

A native of Bethesda, Md., Jennings spent three seasons as

an assistant coach at Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio. There he helped guide the Buckeyes to three top-three finishes in the Big Ten Conference and several national rankings. In 1996, Jennings helped lead the Buckeyes to a No. 13 national ranking and a second-place finish in the Big Ten. In his three years at Ohio State, he oversaw many different facets of the program, ranging from individual tactical and technical skill sessions to match preparation and recruiting. Prior to his tenure at Ohio State, Jennings served as an assistant at American and helped guide the Eagles to their first-ever national ranking (15th) and first-ever victory over then-No. 1 Old Dominion. He also coached the North squad at the 1999 North-South All-Star Game and was an assistant coach with the 1999 Tidewater Tempest, a U.S. Field Hockey summer league team. He also served as the assistant coach of the U-16 national team in Holland.

A 1997 graduate of the University of Maryland with a bachelor's degree in psychology, Jennings began his career playing with the Greenwich Field Hockey Club in New York. In 1987 he was selected for the U.S. Junior National Team and participated in the 1989 Junior World Cup in Ipoh, Malaysia.

He is a 1987 graduate of Walter Johnson High School in Bethesda, Md., and currently resides in Washington, D.C.

## Sarah Thorn



Sarah Thorn returns for her sixth season as an assistant coach on Steve Jennings' staff.

In her six years at AU, Thorn has helped the Eagles to three consecutive Patriot League Championships and NCAA berths from 2003-2005, with last year's team achieving a ranking of fourth in the country. Thorn will work with the defense and the goaltenders, strengthening one of the top units in the country.

A 2001 graduate of the University of Iowa with degrees in communication studies and marketing, Thorn was a three-time All-Big Ten selection and an All-America pick as a four-year starter for the Hawkeyes from 1996-99. As a senior captain and the team co-MVP, Thorn was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament team while helping Iowa to the 1999 NCAA Final Four.

Thorn continues to coach at AU's various field hockey camps and clinics and has been a member of the coaching staff at the Champions Edge Clinics since 2001. This summer will mark the second year that the former defensive standout will hold her own field hockey camp in McLean, Va. In the past, she has coached at College Super Camp and was a National Futures Coach. In the fall she also referees local high school field hockey games. Thorn began her coaching career as an undergraduate assistant coach with the Hawkeyes in 2000.

Thorn currently resides in Washington, D.C.



## Tiffany Marsh



Tiffany Marsh begins her first season as an assistant coach with the Eagles.

Marsh comes to American after graduating from the University of Maryland, where she helped the team to their fourth title in program history in 2005. As a senior forward with the Terps, Marsh earned her third consecutive Second Team All-Region award after racking up 39 points on 12 goals and a team-high 15 assists. She was also named to the 2005 NCAA All-Tournament Team.

In four years with the Terrapins, Marsh accumulated 102 points while playing in 93 games, starting 80 of them. In her senior season she started all 25 games for Maryland, surpassing her 100th point on an assist during the Terps regular season game against American at Jacobs Recreational Complex. In 2004 she played in all but one game finishing the season scoring career-highs in goals and game-winning goals, with 13 and 3, respectively. In her first two seasons she played in 46 games, starting 35, picking up a pair of game-winning goals and a total of 29 points.

She has also been active in the International scene, playing for the U.S. Under-18 team, Under-19 team and Under-16 team. Marsh has also been involved in the National Futures program and was named to the USFHA EPTC Maryland Thundersticks.

Marsh was a senior on Maryland's 2005 National Championship team

Marsh competed for Marathon High School in New York where she was a three-time NFHCA All-American and a three-time all-state selection. She finished her career with 138 goals, 57 of which came in her senior season when she set the single-season New York State Section IV record.

The Marathon, N.Y. native, graduated in May 2006 with a degree in Business and Criminal Justice. Marsh currently resides in Washington, D.C.



## Javiera Villagra



Javiera Villagra enters her first season as a volunteer assistant coach after wrapping her career as AU's most decorated player in history.

As a member of Jennings's staff, the Santiago, Chile, native will work primarily in the midfield where she was a three-year starter and All-American for the Eagles.

Villagra will also be training with the team as she prepares to rejoin the Chilean National Team, which she has had involvement with since 1997.

During her three seasons at American, the former captain amassed 89 points on 41 goals and seven assists, good enough for sixth all-time in program history. As a senior Villagra was a First Team All-America selection, her second straight First Team honor and third overall, making her the first AU field hockey player to be named to the squad three times.

Villagra was also a three-time First Team All-Patriot League selection and a three-time First Team All-Region member. Villagra started and played in all 65 games while she was a member of the Eagles, finishing first on the team in goals as a sophomore with 17. The Santiago, Chile, native finished her career with seven game-winning goals for American.

Before transferring to AU as a sophomore, Villagra was enrolled at the Universidad Metropolitana de Ciencias de la Educacion. Villagra served as captain of the U-21 Chilean Junior National team, where she participated in the 2000 Junior Pan American Games and the 2001 Junior World Cup. As a member of the Chilean National squad she played in the 2003 and 2004 Pan American Games.

Villagra graduated in December of 2005 with a degree in Health Promotion and is currently in graduate school at American. She currently resides in Bethesda, Md.

# 2006 EAGLES

2006 Outlook

In three consecutive seasons the AU field hockey team, under the guidance of Head Coach Steve Jennings, has made a name for itself as one of the premier programs in the country. In 2003 the team earned its first Patriot League Championship and the school's first bid to the NCAA Tournament, defeating Quinnipiac in the play-in game. In 2004, Jennings led the Eagles to a 19-3 overall record while the Eagles advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Trumping that season seemed to be almost improbable, but AU did just that in 2005 when the Eagles went 20-2 overall and were ranked as high as fourth in the nation, with both of their losses coming against eventual National Champion University of Maryland.

"We are very excited about the upcoming season and believe strongly that we have the pieces in place to be an incredibly successful team," said Jennings. "We feel great about the progress made in the spring season and look forward to stepping onto the field to find out what this team will accomplish. Each year is its own unique moment and we will have to work hard to create our own destiny."

With the loss of seven seniors from last year's squad, Jennings and his coaching staff will have to rely on 15 returnees and six newcomers to carry the torch. Below is a position-by-position breakdown of the returning players, along with a quick look at the class of 2010 and the upcoming year's schedule.

## The Forwards

Once again, one of the most talent-laden positions on AU's team will be the forward position. A trio of seniors, including perennial offensive threat Heidi Hershberger,

Tiffany Carter and Kaitlin DeTroia will provide leadership, with the latter two players coming off their finest seasons with the Eagles. Ashley Foley is the lone junior forward on the team and will also provide guidance for the newcomers.

Patriot League Co-Rookie of the Year Irene Schickhardt will once again be one of the premier forwards in the country after finishing second on the team in scoring last season with 37 points. Sophomores Jesika Pufnock and Emily Harwood will also strengthen the Eagles' front line. Pufnock earned quality playing time as a freshman, appearing in 19 games, while Harwood excels at getting in the right place at the right time to create scoring opportunities.

"Our forward line will see a greater level of interchange than ever before due to the development of our attackers and the depth we have in that position," said Jennings. "Seniors Kaitlin DeTroia, Tiffany Carter and Heidi Hershberger add experience and great off-the-ball leads to open up the defense. Their ability to finish and create assists will be critical in our success. They will be joined by sophomore Irene Schickhardt who is incredibly dangerous on the ball and has great instincts on the baseline and in the circle. Junior Ashley Foley and sophomore Emily Harwood will round out the unit with their touch and speed."

## The Midfielders

Second Team All-American Camila Infante will anchor the midfield in her senior season. The two-time Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year has led the Eagles in each of the last two years in scoring and will be tough for opposing defenders to shut down. Junior Maggie Hall finished the 2005

season scoring in double digits for the second consecutive year, earning Second Team All-Region honors. Hall will be a focal point of the Eagles' offense. Sophomore Megan Henry has a year of experience behind her and will add depth to an already solid unit. Pufnock will also see some time in the midfield depending on the situation.

"I feel our midfield can be one of the best in the country," said Jennings. "Senior All-America Camila Infante is one of the best players in the nation and can create for us off the dribble or pass. Junior Maggie Hall is an excellent passer and should give us great control over the ball in the build up phase of our attack. Sophomores Jesika Pufnock and Megan Henry are great athletes who should be able to use their skills and quickness to set up players around them. I look forward to watching this unit work together."

## The Defense

Despite losing two starting defenders to graduation in 2005, the Eagles defensive corps will again be one of the stingiest in the country as senior Erin Rock and junior Denise Infante return. Rock has 56 games of experience in Jennings' system, knowledge upon which the team's sophomores and newcomers will draw. Infante, who earned her second consecutive Patriot League Tournament MVP award in 2005, has developed into one of the nation's top two-way threats and will feature prominently in the Eagles' penalty corner unit.

Sophomore Katie Turner also returns in the Eagle backfield in 2006. Turner saw action in just two games in 2005 but should make a bigger impact with a year's worth of experience in her pocket.

In goal, senior Allison Fayfich will



once again backstop the Eagles. Fayfich, a Second Team All-Region selection in 2005, has played in 41 games over two seasons, including both of American's NCAA tournament victories.

"Our defensive corps will be led by senior Erin Rock and junior Denise Infante," said Jennings. "Erin is strong, dependable and rarely beaten, while Denise is one of the hardest hitters and best tacklers in the country. They will be joined by Katie Turner, who brings tremendous toughness to the backfield. Organizing it all will be senior Allison Fayfich in goal and we expect big things from her in her final season."

## The Newcomers

Six newcomers comprise the class of 2010. Forward Savannah Graybill comes to American from Cocalico High School in Pennsylvania, where she was a Second Team All-State selection as a senior. The Ephrata, Pa., native led her section in scoring as a

junior and senior, earning her Lancaster-Lebanon All-League honors in each of those seasons. Local product Emily Stovicek will play in the front along with Graybill, but also may see some time at the midfield position. With Poolesville High School she was a two-time All-County selection, leading her squad to Region Championships all four of her years.

Jennings and the coaching staff also added depth to the defensive unit, signing two defenders and a goalkeeper in the offseason. Defender Carly Boyce, a New Egypt, N.J., native, was named Asbury Park Press Monmouth County Field Hockey player of the year after scoring 12 goals in 19 games as a senior. The two-time First Team All-Monmouth County selection also had 15 assists and four defensive saves as a senior. Mercedes Tully is the Eagles' other home-grown product, playing at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School where she was a First Team All-State and First Team All-Met member as a senior. In 2005 she led a defensive squad that allowed

just seven goals on 87 shots and recorded 11 shutouts in 16 games en route to capturing the Montgomery County Championship.

Anne-Meike De Wiljes, an international student-athlete from Hannover, Germany will help fill the gap in the midfield left from Javiera Villagra. De Wiljes has extensive experience playing international games for Germany's junior national squads and at the club level.

Rounding out the freshmen is goalkeeper Alyssa Poorman. Poorman had an outstanding career as a goaltender for Central Bucks South, setting the school record for most shutouts in a season (nine as a senior), most shutouts in a career (15 over two seasons), most saves in a year (134) and most saves in a career with 267.

"We are thrilled about the quality of student-athletes we have arriving on campus this year," said Jennings. "All of our incoming players have the opportunity to challenge for significant playing time immediately and we expect a tremendously positive impact from them both on and off the field. In the backfield, Carly Boyce and Mercedes Tully will bring great individual defensive skill and intensity. Joining them in defense will be goalkeeper Alyssa Poorman who has outstanding reactions and mechanics. In the midfield, Emily Stovicek will add depth to one of our strongest lines and her passing game will fit in very well. Anne-Meike will assist us greatly in the midfield. She is a very experienced and accomplished player on the international level and we will look for her to be a major focus of our team attack and defense.

Up front, Savannah Graybill will use her athleticism and touch to make a name for herself at this level. It should be a great fall and we are anxious to

## The Schedule

Once again the Eagles have stocked their schedule with some of the most competitive teams in the country in their quest for a fourth consecutive Patriot League title. American opens up the 2006 season with a three-game west coast road swing that has them facing off against Cal on Aug. 26 in the first game of the season. The next day AU will play Pacific in Berkeley, Calif., before heading south to play Stanford on the following Tuesday.

A pair of tournaments lie in wait for the Eagles when they return from California, starting with the Temple Tournament in Philadelphia, Pa. American will play Big Ten opponent Michigan State on Saturday before playing Rutgers on Sunday. The next weekend the Eagles will play in the ninth edition of the Terrapin Invitational Tournament, hosted by the University of Maryland. AU will play Northwestern in the first day of the tournament, and then face Temple in the second round.

After the Terrapin Invitational the Eagles finally return back to the Jacobs Recreational Complex for a three-game home stand. On Sept. 16 AU will host Towson University before gearing up for a matchup against James Madison on Friday, Sept. 22. American will face nationally-ranked Richmond for the final game of the home stretch. September wraps up with American playing their Patriot League conference opener heading up to Hamilton, N.Y., to play Colgate.

American starts up October with a game at Albany on the 1st before returning home for a pair of conference games against Bucknell and Lafayette. The Eagles will get their chance for revenge on the 2005 NCAA Na-

tional Champion Maryland Terrapins on Oct. 18, who bounced AU out of the national tournament last season. The Eagles and Terrapins are the DC area’s premiere programs, with Maryland winning three consecutive games in the series. AU will play a pair of games in the following weekend against Lehigh and Princeton. The Eagles complete the 2006 regular season at home when PL rival Holy Cross comes to town on Oct. 28.

The Patriot League Tournament will be held on Nov. 4-5 with the team earning the highest seed hosting the tournament. The first round of the NCAA Tournament will be held on Saturday, Nov. 11.

“Our schedule will see us facing some of the top programs in the country and is full of challenges,” said Jennings. “Outside of our ri-

valries in conference, we have tough matchups with Maryland, Michigan State, Richmond, James Madison, California-Berkeley; all of whom were ranked last year. In addition, Princeton, Northwestern, Stanford, Pacific, Rutgers and Temple will provide stiff tests to our team throughout the year along with local rivals Towson and up-and-coming Albany. I think this schedule will do a great job of preparing us for where we want to be at the end of the year and I look forward to seeing us throughout the season.”

# 2006 EAGLES

2005 Year In Review

After the way the 2004 season ended, expectations were set high for the Eagles, a team that would return all but two players. What was unexpected was the way in which AU field hockey would follow up that season with yet another record-breaking campaign, which included a 20-win season and numerous individual honors.

American opened the 2005 season playing Richmond and Old Dominion, two teams ranked in the top 15 at the end of the 2004 season. The Eagles came out strong against the Spiders, winning 3-1 and senior Javiera Villagra scored two second-half goals. The following day AU rallied to beat ODU after being behind twice, with junior Camila Infante registering a hat trick in the 3-2 win.

The next weekend the Eagles enjoyed their first set of home games on the new William I Jacobs Recreational Complex turf field with 650 fans in attendance. A player from each class scored against Princeton, giving the Eagles a 4-1 win. AU ended the weekend with its first shutout of the season, against Albany. They out-shot the Great Danes 19-4 and improved to 4-0. Infante earned Patriot League Offensive Player of the Week honors after compiling 14 points in just four games. Freshman Irene Schickhardt earned Rookie of the Week honors after scoring in the first 1:20 of play against Richmond and within the first 23 seconds against Princeton.

AU then traveled to its old home at College Park, Md., to play in the Maryland Invitational. In the first game American had a close match against Stanford, but Schickhardt tallied a late second-half goal giving

the Eagles their second shutout of the season. AU ended the weekend with a 3-1 win over Cal and senior Maureen Daniel tallied two goals off penalty corner shots. American swept the Patriot League awards that week with Daniel, junior Allison Fayfich and Schickhardt earning Offensive, Defensive and Rookie of the Week honors respectively. Fayfich posted a 0.5 goals against average and a .857 save percentage.

Its 6-0 start to the season earned AU a fifth-place ranking in the opening National Field Hockey Coaches Association poll, the highest ranking ever obtained in the program's history. The following week AU moved up to a fourth-ranked position in the polls after coming away with a close 2-1 win over Towson. The Eagles remained the only non-ACC team in the top five in the national rankings.

Against Longwood, the Eagles took an early 4-0 lead, with Hall, Schickhardt, Villagra and senior Shannon Goans all scoring. In the second half the team came out equally strong and netted another two goals to earn a 6-1 win. After tallying a hat trick against the Lancers, sophomore Maggie Hall earned PL Offensive Player of the Week honors. Daniel was named Defensive Player of the Week after the defense had allowed Longwood only one goal and three shots.

AU faced Bucknell for its opening game in the PL regular season and scored three second half goals for a come from behind win. Villagra scored two of the goals while Infante tallied the assists and the final goal. The following day the Eagles were back at home to face CAA opponent William & Mary. After being

down by one due to a penalty stroke, the Eagles responded with three goals of their own. American came out second half with another three goals, ending the game 6-1 and outshooting the Tribe 29-10. Fayfich made three clutch saves in the first half to keep the Eagles' first half lead.

After a seven-point performance in both games, Infante earned her second PL Player of the Week award. The Eagles improved to an 11-game winning streak after defeating Rutgers 6-1 and then had only a day to prepare for 16th-ranked James Madison. American was up 1-0 at the half and continued their trend of rallying after the break, scoring three goals to ensure a win. In its second PL game, American dismantled Lehigh 9-1 and outshot them by a margin of 44-2. Five different players scored and Schickhardt led that pack with two goals and three assists.

While preparing for ACC opponent UVA, American again swept the PL weekly honors. Infante, Daniel and Schickhardt each won Offensive, Defensive and Rookie of the Week awards, respectively, for the third time. In their first overtime game of the season, the Eagles came off with a hard-fought 2-1 win over UVA. In the last seven minutes of regulation time Villagra found the back of the net to break a 0-0 tie, but the Cavaliers kept themselves in the game with a goal in the last three minutes. It took Hall only 42 seconds in overtime to put in the game-winning goal.

Later that week, AU had another close game when facing league opponent Holy Cross. Although the Eagles held the advantage on shots and corners, it took their seven-aside

team to get the 3-2 win in overtime. Schickhardt tallied her first hat trick of the season, earning her a fourth PL Rookie of the Week award. On Oct. 26 the Eagles faced local rival Maryland, ranked third at the time, with an attendance of over 1,000 fans. AU started strong as Villagra scored the first goal of the game. Maryland tied it up with a penalty corner shot, then took the lead five minutes before the half. It was a hard fought second half as the Eagles had several scoring opportunities, but were unable to convert any and were handed their first loss of the season, 2-1. The game ended with a scoreless second half and an 11-9 shot and 5-4 corner margin in Maryland's favor.

The loss never slowed American's momentum. On Senior Day the Eagles rolled by Colgate with a 9-1

win. The Raiders scored the first goal, but AU put in five before the half and finished the game with another four scores. Goans led the offense with four goals and Villagra also came through with a hat trick. American ended their regular season with an earlier postponed road game against Lafayette. AU won 5-1, giving them a 5-0 regular season PL record and a first place standing for the third consecutive year.

American was finally entitled to hosting the PL tournament as the first place seed after having traveled the last two years due to not having a home field. In the semifinal game, AU put Lehigh away in a 7-0 shutout. Juniors Tiffany Carter, Kaitlin Detroia and Infante each posted two goals. Sophomore Denise Infante stopped three key breakaways to keep Lehigh off the

board. AU found would face Holy Cross in the final, fighting for their third NCAA tournament appearance. This time out the Eagles claimed a 3-0 lead first half and finished with a 4-2 win over the Crusaders, winning the tournament for the third straight year. Denise Infante scored two of the goals and was named Most Valuable Player of the tournament for a second consecutive year.

American was nationally ranked sixth going into the NCAA tournament and set to play-eighth ranked Penn State at College Park. American took a 2-1 lead in the first half with goals from Hall and Infante. In the second, Villagra scored off a deflection to strengthen the lead but Penn State put another in with less the four minutes remaining in the game. The clock was up, but the defense held strong against two consecutive Penn State penalty corners to give American its second NCAA victory.

Once again the Eagles were to face Maryland in the fight to go to the Final Four. AU began with several close shots early on but the game remained scoreless until 10 minutes left in regulation when UMD scored off a penalty corner. Maryland went on to win 3-0.

The team finished 20-2 for the season, setting the AU record for most wins in a season, suffering its only losses to Maryland, the eventual National Champions. American completed its third straight season of undefeated play in the Patriot League, winning the league championship for the third consecutive time and making it to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in back-to-back seasons. As a team the Eagles finished first in

the country in margin of victory, outscoring opponents by a 2.68 margin. American's .909 win percentage was third best in the nation along with finishing second in goals per game with 3.90 per contest and seventh in scoring defense, allowing just 1.22 goals per game.

Individually, 2005 marked a spectacular year for the Eagles capped off by Villagra becoming the program's only two-time First Team All-American and only three-time All-American. Daniel, a Second Team All-America selection, was the Patriot League's Scholar-Athlete of the Year in addition to being named PL Defensive Player of the Year. Camila Infante was named to the Second Team All-America squad for the sec-

ond consecutive season and led the Patriot League in points, earning her second straight Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year Award. She was also honored as the ECAC's Division I Player of the Year, while being named ECAC Division I Player of the Year and Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year. Jennings, the 2005 Patriot League Coach of the Year, also saw freshman Schickhardt earn the 2005 PL Co-Rookie of the Year award.

AU placed a record seven student athletes on the Dartfish/NFHCA Division I All-Region teams, including four on the First Team. The Eagles also had six All-Patriot League members and the three All-Americans are the most in program history. More importantly, once again the Eagles

were one of the elite schools in the nation academically. AU placed a league-high 18 players on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll, with Daniel becoming the third American player in four years to earn Scholar-Athlete of the Year. American's 14 student athletes on the NFHCA Division I National Academic Squad tied the team for second in the nation.

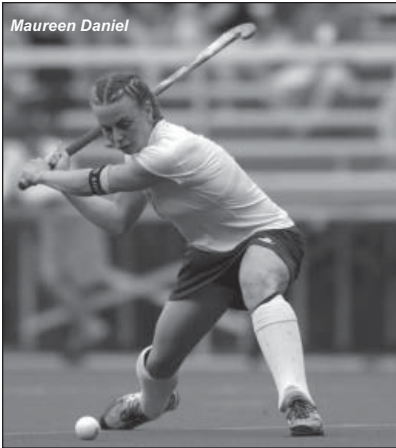

American's field hockey program has had 34 student-athletes named to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll and 25 players earn NFHCA Academic Squad spots.



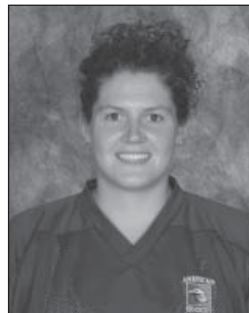

In the fall of 2005 American University athletics unveiled a new home for its nationally ranked field hockey team and women's lacrosse team, when the William I Jacobs Recreational Complex was opened.

On Sept. 3, 2005 AU's field hockey team hosted the Princeton Tigers for the first athletic contest on the new field, a game in which the Eagles emerged victorious 4-1. AU's field hockey team also earned the right to host the 2005 Patriot League Tournament on November 6-7, where American defeated Lehigh 7-0 in the semifinals before capturing the league crown for the third straight year by downing Holy Cross 4-2 in the Championship Game. AU's women's lacrosse team played its first game on the new field on March 1, 2006 when they hosted the Towson Tigers.

The Eagles' field hockey squad had spent close to the last decade practicing and playing their home games on the turf fields of local colleges and universities. The field, which was made possible through a generous gift by American University alum William I Jacobs, finally gave AU Field Hockey a place to call home, eliminating early morning practices and having to travel for home games. After years of playing on Reeves Field, American's women's lacrosse team also calls the complex home, completing its first full season on the turf in the spring of 2006. American will also now have the opportunity to host Patriot League Tournaments and put in bids to host rounds of the NCAA Tournament in both field hockey and women's lacrosse.

The state-of-the-art facility features an AstroTurf playing surface, a brand new softball diamond and two outdoor sand volleyball courts. In addition to varsity athletics, AU's club softball team also uses the field along with intramural flag football and softball.

- A brand new AstroTurf 12 playing surface
- State-of-the-art Daktronics scoreboard (made possible through a gift from AU alum **Cindy Christy**)
- Advanced watering system that will provide irrigation and keep the field wet during matches and practice for field hockey

- Softball diamond and two outdoor sand volleyball courts for AU students and intramural programs

**T**he academic support program assists student-athletes in successfully reaching academic goals, exploring interests and abilities and gaining a broad academic experience. Promoting responsibility and initiative, the program emphasizes the development of the total person, taking advantage of the rich resources and facilities provided by American University in the continual pursuit of excellence.

The 2004-05 academic year was one of extreme success for the Academic Support Program and the athletic department, with an impressive cumulative grade point average of 3.22. American University athletics also placed 155 student-athletes on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll during the academic year.

A primary objective of AU's academic support program is to provide academic counseling for student-athletes. Academic counseling is a multifaceted activity that helps student-athletes maximize the educational benefits available at American. The coordinator and the graduate assistant work closely with faculty, facilitating communication and understanding of the academic needs of student-athletes. AU's academic counselors provide accurate information concerning educational options, requirements, policies and procedures.

### Guided Study

Guided study targets student-athletes who may confront a variety of academic challenges. Students in the program meet weekly with either the coordinator or the graduate assistant, who closely monitor academic progress and the development of skills such as time management and study strategies.

### The Tutor Program

Tutoring aids enhance the academic performance of the student-athletes. The program employs both graduate and undergraduate students who tutor all subject matter offered by American University. An important component of the academic support program, tutors help student-athletes understand subject matter, learn test-taking techniques and develop study skills.

### Academic Study

All first-year and transfer student-athletes are required to attend study hall for their first semester. AU student-athletes who successfully complete all the requirements of study hall and achieve a GPA of 2.5 or above will not be required to attend study hall during the spring semester.



### TALONS

TALONS (Thinking and Learning Opportunity for New Student-Athletes) is a workshop series that aids first-year and transfer student-athletes by addressing relevant topics in an interactive format. TALONS is facilitated by both academic and personal developmental counselors who present information and run group discussions on a wide variety of topics that help first-year and transfer student-athletes understand and cope with academic, social, athletic and personal pressures related to the transition either from high school to college or from one college to another. The series provides new student-athletes with information and practical strategies to adjust to increased demands and pressures of college academics to adapt to competitive NCAA Division I athletics and develop lifelong learning and personal development skills.



**S**trength and conditioning and athletic training have become major factors in the quest for athletic excellence at every level of competition, and American University is committed to providing its student-athletes with the finest fitness and weight equipment available.

Located on the first level of the Bender Sports Center, the William I Jacobs Fitness Center is home to the varsity weight room and cardiovascular training area. The Jacobs Fitness Center allows all intercollegiate student-athletes the opportunity to build their strength and conditioning on a one-on-one basis with the strength coach, who is on duty at all times when the facility is open. In addition to regularly scheduled team workouts, student-athletes can arrange an appointment with the strength coach for an individualized workout to further supplement their training. The one-on-one approach allows for a quick and intense, yet controlled and well-supervised workout. In addition, each student-athlete has a strength and conditioning program tailored to his or her specific needs.

The 11,000-square-foot facility space is devoted entirely to workout equipment. Included among the numerous apparatus are complete free weight workstations, power rack station, hammer strength equipment and bench presses. A second level of the center houses the cardiovascular area, which features treadmills, stair climbers, rowing machines and stationary bicycles.

The newly upgraded facility is located on the



first floor of the Bender Sports Center, in the main hub of campus. The location allows easy access to Bender Arena, Reeves Field, athletics department offices and all on-campus academic buildings and housing.

Four full-time athletic trainers are on staff to provide daily treatment and application of therapeutic modalities to the student-athletes. In addition, trainers provide evaluation, injury prevention and, if necessary, rehabilitation to help student-athletes return to play. Two doctors, an orthopedic surgeon and general practitioner, are also on staff.

The athletic training room is fully stocked, including three taping tables, six treatment tables, two ice baths, two ultrasound machines, two electrical stimulus units, a paraffin bath, a hydrocollator for moist heat, a fitter, a slide board, a rehabilitation trampoline, an upper body ergometer, a stationary bike, a progressive weight set, medicine balls, physioballs and all the necessary emergency equipment. In addition, the facility has a separate physicians exam room and additional taping tables to provide to visiting teams.

The Patriot League

"Today's Scholar-Athletes, Tomorrow's Leaders" – The Patriot League continually demonstrates that student-athletes can excel at both academics and athletics without sacrificing its high standards. The Patriot League's athletic success is achieved while its member institutions remain committed to its founding principle of admitting and graduating student-athletes that are academically representative of their class. Participation in athletics at Patriot League institutions is viewed as an important component of a well-rounded education.

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football

conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. In addition, the Patriot League finished first in the new NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR) among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid (combining with all eight of its full-time member institutions for

an average of 984 out of 1,000). The APR is used to measure academic eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes.

Patriot League student-athletes and teams continue to enjoy success at the national level, with opening round victories coming in several NCAA Championships, including consecutive wins in men's basketball, a final four appearance in men's lacrosse and a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

- Army's Julie Jorgensen (first-team soccer) and Bucknell's Matt Capece (third-team baseball) were named to ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team
- 50 Patriot League student-athletes were named to ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District team
- Bucknell's men's basketball program became the first Patriot League team to ever crack the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches Top 25 Poll
- American's Keira Carlstrom turned in the highest finish in Patriot League history at the NCAA Women's Cross Country Championships, placing sixth overall en route to earning her third-straight All-America nod
- American's field hockey program ranked fourth in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, the highest ever for a Patriot League team and reached the final eight in the NCAA Field Hockey Championships for the second-straight year
- Four Patriot League men's lacrosse teams (Navy, Army, Colgate, Bucknell) spent portions of the season ranked in the top 20 of the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association Poll, with Navy spending the entire year in the top 15
- Holy Cross won the Patriot League's first-ever NCAA postseason contest in women's lacrosse, defeating Le Moyne in the NCAA Play-In game to advance to the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Tournament
- Lehigh's softball program became the first Patriot League team to post two victories in the NCAA Regionals
- Army's women's basketball program became the first female team from a service academy to advance to the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament
