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## ABOUT TRINITY



**J**oanne Berger-Sweeney, an accomplished neuroscientist and experienced leader in higher education, was inaugurated as the 22nd president of Trinity College on October 26, 2014.

The first African American and the first woman to serve as president of the college since it was founded in 1823, Berger-Sweeney is a champion of a liberal arts education, improving campus equity and diversity, fostering community and global engagement, caring for the school's proud alumni, and preparing students to lead

bold and transformative lives.

In 2017, Berger-Sweeney announced the completion of Trinity's ambitious strategic plan, Summit, created through an inclusive, multiyear planning process as the college prepares to celebrate its bicentennial in 2023. A cornerstone of the strategic plan is attracting and enrolling strong students and meeting those students with outstanding experiences. Berger-Sweeney has overseen several student-centered initiatives, including the creation of the Bantam Network mentoring program for first-year students and the Career and Life Design Center, and the introduction of Trinity Plus, an innovative liberal arts curriculum for the 21st century. She has strengthened the college's relationship with the dynamic capital city that is its home by expanding Trinity's campus footprint into downtown Hartford, establishing an innovation center and the Liberal Arts Action Lab, part of the Center for Hartford Engagement and Research, and launching an exclusive liberal arts partnership with the global technology firm Infosys.

In addition to approving the college's first sustainability coordinator, Berger-Sweeney has led the oversight of construction, renovation, and infrastructure improvements, including new athletic fields and the creation of the Crescent Center for Arts and Neuroscience and the Gruss Music Center.

Under Berger-Sweeney's leadership, the college has increased by 50 percent financial aid for undergraduate students, enriching the socioeconomic, racial, and international diversity of the student body. Student retention rates (91 percent) have increased, as have postgraduation career outcome success rates, with 97 percent of the Class of 2021 employed, in graduate school, or engaged in full-time military or public service within six months of graduating. Since implementing a Special Opportunity Hiring initiative and staff hiring initiative, the college has increased substantially the number of tenure-track faculty and staff of color.

Since Berger-Sweeney's arrival, Trinity has seen notable markers of financial success, including a string of balanced operating budgets, an endowment that has nearly doubled, and the launch of the largest fundraising campaign in the college's history, now more than halfway to its ambitious \$500M goal.

Berger-Sweeney has served on many boards in the Hartford region and beyond, including Hartford HealthCare, where she chairs the Governance Committee; the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges, for which she is the past chair; and the Hartford Consortium for Higher Education; and she was appointed to the board of the Capital Region Development Authority by Governor Malloy. She also serves on the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III Presidents Council and as a board member of Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory and the Luce Foundation, as well as a member of the Neuroscience Selection Advisory Board for the prestigious Gruber Prize.

Berger-Sweeney is the recipient of numerous awards. She has been honored with a Lifetime Mentoring Award from the Society for Neuroscience (2006) and a National Science Foundation Young Investigator Award. In 2022, she was honored by Tufts University for her legacy of transformational Black leadership and was the recipient of the Edward Bouchet Academic Leadership Award from the Institute for Cross-Cultural Awareness and

Transformative Education. She is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the International Behavioral Neuroscience Society (IBNS).

Before coming to Trinity, Berger-Sweeney served as dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at Tufts University (2010–14), creating the vision and setting the strategic direction for the university's largest school. She began her academic career as a member of the Wellesley College faculty, joining in 1991 as an assistant professor in the Department of Biological Sciences and rising through the ranks to become the Allene Lummis Russell Professor in Neuroscience. Her teaching and research career at Wellesley spanned 19 years, including serving as director of Wellesley's Neuroscience Program and an associate dean.

Berger-Sweeney received an undergraduate degree in psychobiology from Wellesley College, an M.P.H. in environmental health sciences from the University of California, Berkeley, and a Ph.D. in neurotoxicology from the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, where she did the proof of concept work on Razadyne, one of the most widely used Alzheimer's drugs in the world. She completed postdoctoral training at the National Institute of Health (INSERM) in Paris, France. Berger-Sweeney has authored more than 60 scientific publications, holds several scientific patents, and has held grants from the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, and numerous private foundations.

Her husband, Urs V. Berger, Ph.D., is a retired neuroscientist and music archivist. They are the proud parents of two children and Minty, a yellow Labrador retriever.

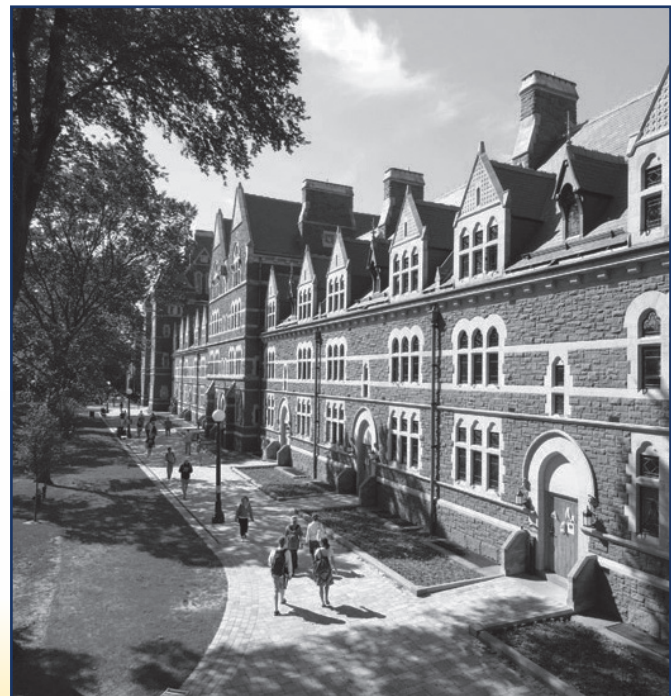
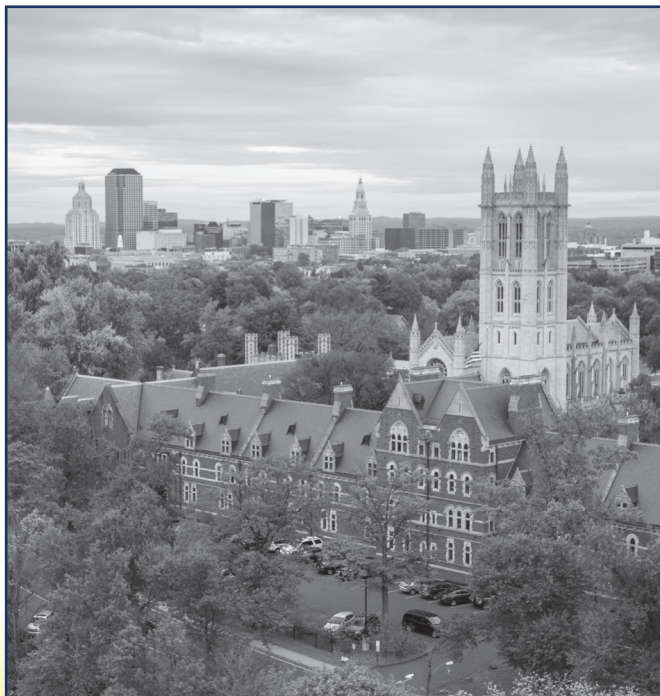

## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Trinity College appointed Drew Galbraith as director of athletics & chair of physical education on October 19, 2017, and he continues to make a significant impact on Bantam Athletics. Galbraith's experience spans 30 years of NCAA Division I, II and III collegiate athletics administration.

At Trinity, Galbraith is responsible for Trinity's 30 varsity teams, over 700 varsity student-athletes, as well as 80 coaches and staff. In addition, he oversees all club and intramural activities and chairs the

College's Physical Education Department, which offers dozens of classes each semester and plays a key role in the College's Wellness Curriculum.

The Trinity College Department of Athletics and Physical Education comprises three areas of interest for campus activities: athletics, physical education, and recreation. The department has a strong and storied tradition that prides itself on a broad-based program that sponsors 30 sports—15 men's and 15 women's. Sports have always been a part of the fabric of life at Trinity. Our students have played intercollegiate football for 139 years. In 1856, they created the College's first rowing club. They played their first baseball game against another organized team just three years after the Civil War. They have played basketball since 1896. In 1969, the College became a coeducational institution, and a women's varsity sports program blossomed. The varsity teams compete in the New England Small College Athletic Conference, arguably the toughest NCAA Division III conference in the nation. Since 2012, Bantam teams have captured seven national titles in five different sports. Trinity has earned 12 NESCAC titles over the past five years and 30 in the past 10 years, tied for third-most in the NESCAC during that span.

In an effort to create a sustainable financial future for the Athletic Department, Galbraith headed athletic fundraising initiatives leading to records for annual giving, new alumni donors and total athletic donors

in 2020-21. In addition, the College has secured several new athletic endowments in the past four years. Building on success of athletic facility projects completed in the past decade, Robin L. Sheppard Field was replaced in 2018 and Oosting Gymnasium received a facelift and all new seating in 2019 and a new floor in 2021. Sheppard Field and Jessee/Miller Field received new seating, press box and VIP spaces in 2021. Trinity will showcase the campus and its facilities by hosting four NCAA Championships between 2021 and 2025 with Division III Field Hockey (2021), Women's Basketball Final Four (2023), Men's Ice Hockey Frozen Four (2024) and Field Hockey (2025) all coming to campus.

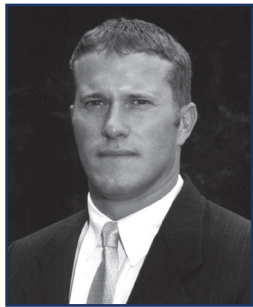
Galbraith came to Trinity after 14 years at Dartmouth College, where he was the senior associate director of athletics and executive director of Dartmouth Peak Performance, a program that integrates services and resources to help student-athletes achieve excellence. At Dartmouth, Galbraith helped lead a comprehensive athletics program of 35 varsity teams, 33 club sports, and 24 intramural sports. He served as sport administrator for the Dartmouth Big Green football program, as well as for women's rugby and men's and women's cross country and track and field. Over the years, Galbraith has served as sport administrator for 13 other teams at Dartmouth, overseeing coaches and all aspects of their programs. He also served as a liaison to health professionals who work with student-athletes. Galbraith is active in NCAA committee service, having served previously on the NCAA Academics, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet, the Division I Administration Cabinet, the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee (4 years), and the NCAA Men's and Women's Skiing Committee (6 years). He chaired the soccer committee for two years and the skiing committee for four years.

Galbraith earned both a bachelor's degree and a law degree from the College of William & Mary. He began his career in media relations and broadcasting at Virginia Commonwealth University. He joined Dartmouth in 2004 as associate director of athletics after serving in compliance roles in the athletics departments at William & Mary and at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.





## HEAD COACH JEFF DEVANNEY



Jeff Devanney begins his 19th season as head football coach at Trinity College in the fall of 2024. Trinity hired Devanney, a 1993 graduate of the College, as its 27th head coach in December of 2005. Prior to assuming the head coaching role, Devanney served as Trinity's defensive coordinator in 2005, its special teams coordinator from 2001 to 2004, its secondary coach from 2002 to 2005, and its defensive line coach in 2001. The Bantams have outscored their opponents, 2,947-1,164, in his 17-year tenure as head coach.

Last season, the Bantams captured a share of the NESCAC crown for the 11th time in program history, registering an 8-1 record on the season. As a team, Trinity ranked third in the country in redzone defense (.455), fourth in first-down defense, and sixth in rushing defense. Offensively, the Bantams ranked 12th in time of possession, 23rd in total offense and passing offense and 26th in scoring offense. Defensively, Trinity ranked 18th in total defense and 19th in scoring defense.

In the fall of 2022, Devanney led Trinity to its first ever 9-0 record to capture the New England Small College Athletic Conference crown for the ninth time in program history and boast the most regular season wins in program history. In 2016, Trinity posted a perfect 8-0 record to win the NESCAC title, and the Bantams three-peated as NESCAC Champions with an 8-1 record in 2018 and 2017. In 2021, Devanney guided the Bantams to an eight-win season for the fourth time in the last five years and earned his 100th career victory.

Devanney has a 121-21 record as a head coach, including a perfect 9-0 record in 2022 and 8-0 records in 2008, 2012 and 2016, giving him the best winning percentage in the history of Trinity football at .852. The Bantams won or shared the NESCAC title from 2002 to 2005, in 2008 and 2012, from 2016 to 2018 and in 2022 and 2023. Devanney was honored as the NESCAC Coach of the Year in 2008, 2012, 2016 2018 and 2022, garnered the Gridiron Club's Division II/III New England Coach of the Year award in 2012 and 2022, and added the 2022 New England Football Writers Division II/III Coach of the Year honor. He has seen 182 All-NESCAC selections from his teams the last 15 years including the NESCAC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Year in 2008, the Defensive Player of the Year from 2010 to 2012 and again in 2016, Offensive Player of the Year in 2018 and 2023 and the NESCAC Rookie of the Year five times since 2013.

In Devanney's 23 years on the Bantam staff, Trinity has been ranked No. 1 in total defense in the country five times and posted 29 shutouts. In 2022, Trinity led the nation with the least amount of first downs allowed (110) and ranked second nationally in rushing defense (49.1 ypg), ninth in scoring defense (10.9 ppg), and 14th in total defense (240.8 ypg). In 2021, Trinity ranked fourth in the nation in red-zone defense and seventh nationally in offensive pass efficiency, while the Bantams were among the top five nationally in fewest first downs allowed in both 2019 and 2021. The Bantams led the league and were ranked among the top 15 nationally in scoring defense, scoring offense, pass efficiency defense, and passing yards allowed in both 2017 and 2018. In 2015, the Bantams ranked No. 1 in the nation in red-zone defense (.458), and Trinity led the country in kickoff return average with 28.1 yards per attempt in 2014. In 2012, Trinity yielded NCAA Division III-lows of 195.5 yards per contest, 8.1 points per game, and 53.6 yards per game on the ground. Trinity also led the nation statistically in rushing defense (63.5 ypg), total defense (195.5 g), and scoring defense (8.13 ppg) while posting four shutouts in 2011, and finished first in the nation in rushing defense (45.50 ypg) in 2010. In 2006, Trinity led the country in scoring defense and total defense.

A star player in football and baseball for the College, Devanney was voted the NESCAC Football Defensive Player of the Year in 1992. He appears among the College's all-time leaders in punt returns and stolen bases in baseball. Devanney earned his master's degree in liberal studies from SUNY-Albany in 1995. Prior to Trinity, Devanney was the defensive coordinator at Central Connecticut State University from 1998-2000. He also served as a secondary coach at Georgia Tech and worked with the wide receivers and tight ends at Albany and Coast Guard. A professor in the Trinity athletic department, Devanney and his wife, Michele, along with their children Shea (Trinity '25), Caileb (University of New Brunswick '28) and Sean (Avon Old Farms '27), reside in Newington, CT.

## COACHING STAFF



### LEWIS ACQUARULO

Associate Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

**L**ewis Acquarulo begins his 31st season in college football, his 20th season as an assistant coach with the Bantams and his 19th as defensive coordinator in 2024. Acquarulo coaches the inside linebackers and also coordinates the kicking game. In 2011, Acquarulo was named as the New England Division II/III Assistant Coach of the Year by the Gridiron Club of Greater

Boston, after the Bantams boasted the top defense in all of NCAA Division III football.

Last season, the Bantams captured a share of the NESCAC crown for the 11th time in program history, registering an 8-1 record on the season. As a team, Trinity ranked third in the country in redzone defense (.455), fourth in first-down defense, and sixth in rushing defense. The Bantams ranked 18th in total defense and 19th in scoring defense nationally.

In his first year as defensive coordinator in 2006, the Bantams led the nation in scoring defense (6.8 points allowed per game) and total defense (160.0 yards allowed per game), and finished second nationally in pass efficiency defense (73.2 opponent efficiency rating). In 2007, the Trinity defense finished atop the league rankings in total defense, rushing defense, and sacks. Acquarulo's rushing defense ranked 15th nationally in 2008 (86.88 yards/game) and Trinity allowed just 140 points to tie for first in the New England Small College Athletic Conference. Trinity also finished sixth in the nation in rushing defense (68 ypg), fifth nationally in tackles for loss (9.38 per game), and second in the country in sacks (3.88 per game) that year.

Trinity led the nation statistically in three different defensive categories in 2011, having allowed just 63.5 rushing yards per game, 195.5 total yards per game, and 8.13 points per game. The Navy & Gold also claimed third place nationally in tackles for loss with 9.0 per contest, while posting shutouts in four of its eight games. In 2012, Trinity yielded an NCAA Division III-low 195.5 yards per contest, and surrendered an NCAA Division III-low 8.1 points per game, allowed an NCAA Division III-low 53.6 yards per game on the ground, and posted an 84.68 defensive pass efficiency rating (4th in nation). In 2013, the Bantams allowed just 13.9 ppg (9th in nation), yielded 138 yards through the air per game (5th in nation), and held opponents to 254.8 yards per game (8th in nation) and an 80.8 pass efficiency rating (3rd in nation). In 2014, Trinity

finished sixth nationally in pass efficiency defense with a 90.3 rating for opposing quarterbacks.

In 2015, the Bantams ranked No. 1 in the nation in red-zone defense (.458), third in scoring defense (10.1 ppg allowed) and pass efficiency defense (87.05), ninth in total defense (253.3 ypg), and 10 nationally in rushing defense (90.3 ypg). In 2016, Trinity concluded the year ranked fourth nationally in first downs allowed, ninth in scoring defense, fifth in pass efficiency defense, sixth in sacks and 12th in total defense. The Bantams led the league and were ranked among the top 15 nationally in scoring defense, scoring offense, pass efficiency defense, and passing yards allowed in both 2017 and 2018. The Bantam defense also led all of NCAA football with an average of just 3.2 yards allowed per play in 2018. In 2019, Trinity finished 24th in the nation in total defense with a NESCAC-low 285.7 yards allowed, ranked fourth in the nation in red-zone defense. Trinity was among the top five nationally in fewest first downs allowed in both 2019 and 2021.

The Navy & Gold defense boasts 73 All-NESCAC defensive players in the last 14 years, including four NESCAC Defensive Player of the Year selections in Tyler Berry (2008), Walter Fallas (2009, 2010), Rae Haynes (2012), and Spencer Donahue (2016).

Acquarulo arrived at Trinity in 2005 after serving as the defensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coordinator at the University of Rochester from 2001 to 2004. Prior to Rochester, Acquarulo coached the outside linebackers and special teams at the University of Pennsylvania for three years, linebackers and special teams at Southern Connecticut State University for two years, and the defensive line and linebackers at Union College. He was also the strength coach at both Southern Connecticut and Union.

Acquarulo coordinates the Trinity football academic program, and is an associate professor in the College's athletic department. Acquarulo earned a bachelor's degree from Union, where he helped the football team win an Eastern College Athletic Conference Championship, earn two NCAA championship bids, and post undefeated seasons in 1991 and 1993 as a starting defensive lineman. Acquarulo was recognized by Union for outstanding team leadership with the Ronald F. Plumb Award at the conclusion of his playing career. He also holds a master's degree from Trinity in American Studies.





## MARK MELNITSKY Offensive Coordinator/Offensive Line

**M**ark Melnitsky begins the 19th season as an assistant coach for the Bantams in 2024 and will serve as offensive coordinator for the 14th year. Melnitsky mentored Trinity's tight ends and wide receivers as a graduate assistant in 1998 and 1999 and coached the Bantam offensive line since his return to Trinity in 2006.

Last season, Melnitsky's offense set new program records for pass attempts (322), pass completions (205), passing yards (2,776), passing touchdowns (33), passing yards per game (308.4), receptions per game (22.8), total offensive yards (4,337), offensive yards per game (481.9), points scored (399), and touchdowns scored (51). In the NESCAC, the Bantams led the conference in points per game (44.1), total offense and offensive efficiency (166.7). Quarterback Spencer Fetter set the program records for career passing yards (7,481) and passing touchdowns (80), while wide receiver Sean Clapp set single-season marks for receiving yards (1,169) and receiving touchdowns (14). Five Bantams earned NESCAC All-Conference selections, while Fetter was named co-Offensive Player of the Year, the sixth player in program history to be recognized with the award. Fetter and Clapp received New England Football Writers (NEFW) All-New England Team honors as well.

Since taking over the reigns as offensive coordinator, the Bantams have earned four All-American selections (Austin Baiardi, Chris Simmons, Joe Magardino, Matt Porter), 15 D3football.com All-Region selections, 15 NEFW All-New England Team selections, two NESCAC Offensive Player of the Year selections (Spencer Fetter, Max Chipouras), six NESCAC Rookie of the Year selections, and 65 NESCAC All-Conference selections.

The Bantams offense has led the NESCAC conference in scoring (seven times), touchdowns (six times), rushing touchdowns (six times), rushing offense (four times), passing offense (three times), and passing touchdowns (three times) since 2012.

In 2012, The Bantams led the league and ranked seventh nationally in rushing, averaging 281 yards per game, while topping the league with 465 yards in total offense per game (2nd-most in College history), 35.1 ppg, and a 152.8 pass efficiency. In 2016, Trinity paced the league with 38 total touchdowns and ranked No. 6 nationally in the red zone with a 91.4% conversion rate, while pacing the league in both scoring defense (10.6 ppg, 7th in nation) and scoring offense (34.6 ppg) and turnover margin (+1.50, 6th in nation) in 2017. Trinity topped the NESCAC in rushing (228 ypg), total offense (464.3 yards, 3rd-most in College history), scoring (36.0 ppg), and passing yards (2,120), while setting a new college record at 6.49 yards per play in 2018. The Bantams paced the league with 44 total touchdowns while earning 22 of those from the running game that year as well. The Trinity offense led the league in touchdowns (39), passing yards per completion (18.7) and in pass efficiency (177.3) in 2019, and in pass efficiency (175.1) and total offense (286.6) in 2021.

Since 2021, the Trinity offensive line has led the NESCAC in sacks allowed for three straight seasons, including a league-low four sacks allowed in 2023, the sixth-best mark in the country. The Bantam offensive line led the nation in sacks allowed (two) in 2006.

Melnitsky was previously the offensive line coach at Fordham University in 2004 and 2005, and served as both the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Widener University in 2003 and Ursinus College in 2001 and 2002. Prior to Ursinus, Melnitsky served as an offensive line coach at the University of Pennsylvania in 2000. He earned his bachelor's degree in government from Hamilton College in 1997, where he was a four-year letterwinner at inside linebacker and captain as a senior, and added a master's degree in American Studies from Trinity in 2009. Melnitsky is also an associate professor in the Trinity athletic department. He has two daughters, Charlotte and Julia, and resides in Avon.





## COACHING STAFF



### DENVER WILLIAMS

Recruiting Coordinator/Wide Receivers

Denver Williams begins his 17th year on the Trinity staff as wide receivers coach in 2024 and boasts over 20 years of coaching experience at the Division II and III levels. He also serves as the team's recruiting coordinator and handles the Bantam kick return and punt return units. Trinity wide receivers have received All-NESCAC honors 17 times under Williams' tutelage, including 13 in the last 10 seasons. Most recently, Jonathan Girard '22 graduated as Trinity's all-time leader in pass receptions, receiving yards, and touchdown catches.

Williams played for Youngstown State University where his team won the NCAA Division I-AA National Championship in 1997. An All-State running back at Cadiz High School and a 2012 inductee into the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Hall of Fame, Williams holds the school's record for rushing yards as well as several state records for track and field. Williams has also served as the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Ashland University, and the receivers coach, offensive coordinator, and recruiting coordinator at Ohio Northern University. He is an associate professor in the Trinity athletic department and has been a track and field assistant coach for the Bantams. Williams is a member of the Trinity Athletics Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee.



### CHRIS SIMMONS

Offensive Line

Chris Simmons begins his fourth season as a Trinity football assistant coach in 2024. Simmons coaches the tight ends and is also responsible for recruiting in New England and on the West Coast. Simmons graduated from Trinity College in 2018 with a degree in sociology. A four-year starter on the Bantam offensive line, Simmons was the NESCAC Rookie of the Year and an All-NESCAC First Team honoree three times while leading Trinity to back-to-back conference titles in 2016 and 2017. He was named to American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) All-American Team as a senior. Simmons joins the Trinity football staff after coaching the offensive line at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute for two seasons. Prior to RPI, Simmons coached the post-graduate team at Bridgton Academy in Maine.



### MATT RUSSELL

Defensive Line

Matthew Russell begins his second season as Trinity's defensive line coach in 2024. Russell arrived at Trinity from Bryant University, where he was an assistant offensive line coach in 2022. From 2018-2021, he was the offensive line and tight ends coach at American International College. Russell began his coaching career at ASA College (N.Y.) before spending the following three spring seasons coaching the Lazio Ducks in Rome, Italy and coming back to the States in the fall to coach the running backs at the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota.



### MATT KLIER

Cornerbacks

Matt Klier begins his second season as Trinity's cornerbacks coach in 2024. Klier joined Trinity from Shepherd University, where he was a defensive graduate assistant since the summer of 2021. He helped the Ram's defense improve points per game (25.9 yds/g to 17.9 yds/g), rushing yards per game (117.9 yds/g to 85.2 yds/g) and the passing efficiency (136.2 yds/g to 124.6 yds/g). From 2020-21, Klier was the defensive intern at the University of Minnesota and initiated his coaching career as an analyst and youth assistant coach at Marshwood High School. Klier attended the College of the Holy Cross and was the football program's student assistant from 2017-2019. He assisted in creating scouting report materials for the defense, researched and prepared reports on trends and performance and helped run and setup recruiting camps and events.

## COACHING STAFF



### TIM GRAHAM

#### Tight Ends

Tim Graham begins his second season as Trinity's tight ends coach in 2024. Graham comes to Trinity after three stints as a Division III wide receivers coach in Pennsylvania. Most recently, Graham coached the receivers and managed the kickoff return unit at Dickinson College in 2021 and 2022. He was the wide receivers coach at Misericordia University in 2020-21 and held the same position at his alma mater, Juniata College, in 2019-20.



### RICKY CRAYTON

#### Running Backs

Ricky Crayton enters his third season as an assistant coach for the Trinity College football team in the 2024 season. Crayton will coach the Trinity running backs. A 2018 graduate of Thomas College in Maine with a bachelor's degree in psychology, Crayton began his coaching career at conference rival Colby as a defensive assistant in 2018. He was a running backs and tight ends coach at Maine Maritime Academy in 2019, before coaching most recently at Norwich University. Crayton coached the running backs and served as the Cadets' academic coordinator. He was a successful recruiter at all his stops and helped organize both on-campus and virtual visits for high school students at Norwich.



### PAUL PHILIPPON

#### Safeties

Paul Philippon begins his third season as an assistant coach in the 2024 season in his second stint for the Trinity College football team. Philippon, who previously coached the Bantam cornerbacks in 2011, will help coach the safeties. Philippon possesses 30 years of coaching experience in a wide variety of roles, most recently as secondary coach at Southington High School last fall when he helped that squad make the State playoffs. Philippon has had successful head coaching stints at Canton High School and Bristol Eastern High School, taking both of those teams to the State playoffs and earning a conference coach of the year award at Canton in 2014. He played high school football at Conard High School and walked onto the Central Connecticut State University squad, eventually earning a starting role at tight end for the Blue Devils.



## FOOTBALL PHILOSOPHY

**O**ur football program exists for our players. As coaches, we are responsible for preparing each individual to become the best football player he can be. Football is a microcosm of life. The most successful people in life exhibit discipline, a strong work ethic, loyalty, and teamwork. We demand that our players exhibit these characteristics. In our program, we teach our players to set goals, and they learn how to keep these goals in focus and achieve them. The ultimate purpose of our program is to have each student-athlete leave with a superior education and a feeling that his four years at Trinity, and in our football program, have been the best four years of his life.

The top priority of student-athletes is to enhance their education. The academic success of our players is, therefore, our primary focus. The support we give to student-athletes can contribute greatly to their accomplishments in the classroom. One way that our program seeks to nurture our players' academic success is through regular study halls for all first-years.

In recruiting student-athletes, our coaching staff looks for well-rounded individuals. In addition to athletic ability, maturity is of paramount importance to us. Great players are more than just superior athletes. They understand what it takes to excel in the classroom, to be active in the campus community, and to perform on the football field.

### OFFENSE

We will be flexible, multiple and creative offensively. We will attack the defense with multiple personnel combinations to take advantage of our offensive players' skills and to create mismatches for our opponents. We will be balanced between the run and pass. This means that we will run or throw the ball effectively from all formations and in all situations. While attacking the defense intelligently, we will never lose our physical and mental toughness. Football is still a physical game and we want to dominate the one-on-one elements of the game. We want the physical toughness to succeed in short-yardage and goal-line situations and the mental and emotional fortitude to succeed in long-yardage situations.

### DEFENSE

We run a 3-4 personnel defense and use a variety of fronts and zone coverages. We recruit for speed and emphasize swarming to the football with all eleven players on the field. Our priority is to take away our opponents run game and their strengths by gameplan, and then attack their weaknesses. Philosophically, we will play a lot of players, creating depth and staying fresh for the fourth quarter.

### KICKING

The kicking game is critical to our success. Special teams are as key to our results as offense and defense. A starter on special teams is a starter in our program. Consistent play on special teams allows us to maintain field position and control the tempo of a game. Our goal is to utilize the special teams component of a football game to gain an advantage over our opponents and ultimately win the game.

## FOOTBALL TRADITION

Trinity College football is steeped in tradition. Winning and excellence have been the hallmarks of Trinity teams since the football program's inception in 1877. Trinity Athletics had its first Hall of Fame ceremony in 2019, and Don Miller, a legendary former head coach for the Bantams, and football alums Ray Jones '97, Roger LeClerc '60, and Joe Shield '85 were each members of the first incoming class. Charlie Sticka '56 and Ron Duckett '74 were inducted into the second and third Hall of Fame classes, respectively, and Michael Blair '06 will be inducted this fall.

The Bantams had six undefeated seasons prior to the formation of the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) in 1970. In the past 41 years, the Bantams have won or shared the league's best record 14 times, including 8-0 records in 1993, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2008, 2012, 2016, and had No. 1 rankings in New England five times. Since NESCAC began its league-only schedule in 1992, Trinity has compiled a 180-47 record (.793), finished atop the league in 1993 and 1996, and captured official NESCAC titles in 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2008, 2012, 2016, 2017 and 2022. The Bantams own lengthy winning streaks against Hamilton (26), Bates (25), Bowdoin (21), and Colby (14). The Bantams also own the longest overall winning streak in New England Division III football history with 31 consecutive triumphs from 2002 to 2006.

Trinity has the third-highest number of victories of any Division III football program in New England, and the Bantams' recent history includes 17 consecutive winning campaigns and 40 records of .500 or better in the last 41 years. Head Coach Jeff Devanney, who owns the highest winning percentage (.838) in Trinity coaching history for coaches with at least 50 victories, is proud to represent his alma mater as it continues its winning tradition and reaffirms its position as one of the most prestigious and successful programs in the nation.

Longtime Trinity Head Coach Dan Jessee compiled a 150-76-7 record from 1933 to 1966, and his successor, Miller followed with a 174-77-5 mark over the next 32 seasons. Miller retired after the 1998 season as the all-time winningest coach in New England Division III football history, and currently ranks third on that list. Current Stony Brook head coach

Chuck Priore won four NESCAC title from 2000 to 2005, and Devanney has guided the Bantams to five more during his tenure. Since 2000, the Bantams have a 120-27 mark (.816).

In addition to the Hall of Fame inductees, there are many other former stand-outs for the Trinity football program. Mickey Kobrosky '36 set a new standard for excellence in 2012, becoming the first Trinity football player to earn induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. An All-Division All-American and a two-time Little All-American, Kobrosky went on to play professional baseball in the Cleveland Indians organization and for the NFL's New York Giants. Keith Miles '68 received an NFF National Scholar Athlete Award in 1967, and Mike Mancini '15 became the second Bantam to be so honored in 2014.

Shield holds Trinity's career passing yardage record and played in the National Football League (NFL) for the Green Bay Packers. James Lane '85 was the Connecticut Athlete of the Year as a senior, and Eric McGrath '09 was the NESCAC, the ECAC Division III Northeast Region, and the New England Football Writers Division II/III Player of the Year in his final year. In 2011, senior ILB Walter Fallas '12 became the first player to repeat as NESCAC Defensive Player of the Year, and received the Zabalski Award as the best player in New England Division III football. Evan Bunker '15 became the all-time rushing leader in NESCAC history in 2013 and current assistant coach Chris Simmons '18 and Austin Baiardi '20 were both two-time All-American offensive linemen.

LeClerc starred at Trinity in both football and baseball, earning Little All-American honors as a member of the Bantam defense. He played seven different positions in eight seasons with the Chicago Bears and the Denver Broncos.

Sticka, who has the most career touchdowns in Trinity history, with 37, and the most career points with 227, is perhaps the greatest football player ever to wear the Bantam uniform. He was a two-time All-American fullback, started in the East-West Shrine Game in 1955, and was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1956.



# 138 YEARS OF TRINITY FOOTBALL



The Trinity College nickname can be traced to two sources. In 1899, Judge Joseph Buffington was a guest of honor at a Princeton Alumni Banquet. In response to a toast, “to the sister colleges,” Buffington spoke of the football rivalry among Princeton, Harvard, and Yale - “the big chanticleers of the collegiate barnyard,” compared to which Trinity was a mere bantam.

However, the Judge did say, the Trinity Bantam, “can be at home anywhere, is glad to be here, feels not a whit abashed at your hugeness,

is satisfied with himself and his own particular coop, feels he is up to date, and has no bats in his belfry.”

Though Judge Buffington’s speech was stirring, it wasn’t until 1905 when the Bantams nickname became accepted by all. A sportswriter for the Detroit Free Press referred to Trinity’s heavy football scheduling, with such athletic “powers” as Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Brown, and West Point, the “game-bantam of the intercollegiate poultry.”

Whether the sports writer knew of Buffington’s previous use is unknown, but other sportswriters took up the name, and it has been used ever since.

# ADMINISTRATION

Founded in 1971, the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) is a group of eleven highly selective liberal arts colleges and universities that share a similar philosophy for intercollegiate athletics. The Conference was created out of a concern for the direction of intercollegiate athletic programs and remains committed to keeping a proper perspective on the role of sport in higher education.

The formation of NESCAC originated with an agreement among Amherst College, Bowdoin College, Wesleyan University, and Williams College first drafted in 1955. Along with these four institutions, Bates College, Colby College, Hamilton College, Middlebury College, Trinity College, and Tufts University are sustaining charter members. Connecticut College joined in 1982, bringing the Conference's membership to its current total of 11 institutions.

NESCAC members believe intercollegiate athletic programs should operate in harmony with the educational mission of each institution. The Conference is committed to establishing common boundaries to keep athletics strong but in proportion to the overall academic mission of the member institutions. In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents of each NESCAC institution control intercollegiate athletic policy. Conference tenets are usually more restrictive than those of the NCAA Division III with regard to season length, the number of contests, and post-season competition.

## NESCAC MISSION STATEMENT

The New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC), founded in 1971, consists of eleven highly selective liberal arts colleges. Its members are committed first and foremost to academic excellence and believe that athletic excellence supports our educational mission.

Each institution is committed to providing a comprehensive athletic program available to the entire student body. All participants in athletic activities are treated equitably.

The Conference is based on mutual trust, and all members are committed to the highest ethical standards in our relationships with each other. It encourages its members to compete with one another and is committed to promoting equitable competition among us. The Conference is committed to establishing common boundaries to keep

NESCAC institutions also believe athletic teams should be representative of the entire student body. Thus, admissions and financial policies are consistent with the NCAA Division III policies that prohibit athletic scholarships and award financial aid solely on the basis of need.

In 1999, the NESCAC formally became a playing conference and now sponsors 27 conference championship sports (13 for men and 14 for women). Member schools offer extensive and broad-based intercollegiate as well as club and intramural opportunities for both men and women. With member institutions sponsoring an average of nearly 30 varsity programs, NESCAC provides more than 7,500 opportunities for participation in intercollegiate competition at the Division III level. Teams and individuals have achieved great success on both a regional and national level. The NESCAC celebrated its 50th Anniversary in the spring of 2021. During the 2021-22 academic year, 88 teams were selected to participate in NCAA team championships. NESCAC teams won four national team titles (Middlebury field hockey, Conn. College men's soccer, Middlebury women's ice hockey, Middlebury women's lacrosse) and 13 student-athletes won individual NCAA Championships in women's indoor track & field, men's and women's swimming & diving, and men's and women's tennis.

In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents of each NESCAC institution control intercollegiate athletic policy. The day-to-day operation of the athletic program is conducted by the Director of Athletics. Students on all intercollegiate teams are to be representative of the overall student body and are admitted with the expectation of their full participation in the life of the college. In all sports, conference members give primary emphasis to in-season competition where programs have fixed starting and ending dates and where the number of contests is limited. The Conference and each member will manage competition and post-season play in a manner that minimizes conflicts with class schedules and examinations.



## ABUSIVE DRINKING AND HAZING

In addition to being partners in athletic competition, the 11 colleges and universities comprising the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) are united in efforts to provide safe environments in which students may mature intellectually and socially.

Recognizing that social life plays a role in the college experience, each campus has increased its efforts to encourage students to make responsible choices. Each school takes a strong stand against substance abuse, including alcohol. While the vast majority of students at NESCAC institutions who choose to drink do so responsibly, each school has disciplinary and educational programs in place for students who misuse alcohol and other substances.



## JESSEE/MILLER FIELD AT TANSILL MULDOON STADIUM

Jessee/Miller Field, named after Trinity's legendary head football coaches Dan Jessee and Don Miller, is the ninth oldest college football field in the United States. The playing surface, however, was changed from natural grass to FieldTurf in the summer of 2002. The entire complex, which also includes Trinity's men's lacrosse field and its track, was enhanced with the construction of Tansill Muldoon Stadium in the summer/fall of 2022.

The FieldTurf surface is a popular and widely used athletic turf that features individual polyethylene and polypropylene fibers arranged in a pattern that imitates real grass. A football scoreboard is also featured toward the right of the South end zone.

FieldTurf has become the playing surface of choice for major college and professional football teams. The revolutionary material is constructed with a shock-absorbing infill surrounding each blade of synthetic grass, allowing athletes to slide, pivot, and twist their cleats into the surface.

## ANNE G. & RICHARD J. HAZELTON FITNESS CENTER

With the growing focus on a healthy body, Trinity College has made a commitment to physical fitness. In October of 1993, the Anne G. & Richard J. Hazelton Fitness Center was opened in the area of the old swimming pool within Ferris Athletic Center. The facility is available to all Trinity students, faculty, and staff members.

In addition to the Fitness Center, Ferris Athletic Center contains a weight room, an eight-lane swimming pool, two regulation-size basketball courts, 10 international-size squash courts, and an expansive indoor field house that contains a 1/10th mile track, three tennis courts, and space to accommodate practices for the varsity baseball, softball, lacrosse, and track squads during the cold winter months.

Hazelton Fitness Center, named after retired Trinity Athletic Director Richard Hazelton and his wife, Anne, is also the home for physical education classes that are taught by members of the Trinity athletic department. In the fall of 2018 the facility was outfitted with new ellipticals, treadmills, climbills, ascent trainers, both upright and recumbent bikes, and brand-building communication in addition to its free weights, squat racks, platforms, and Precor equipment.

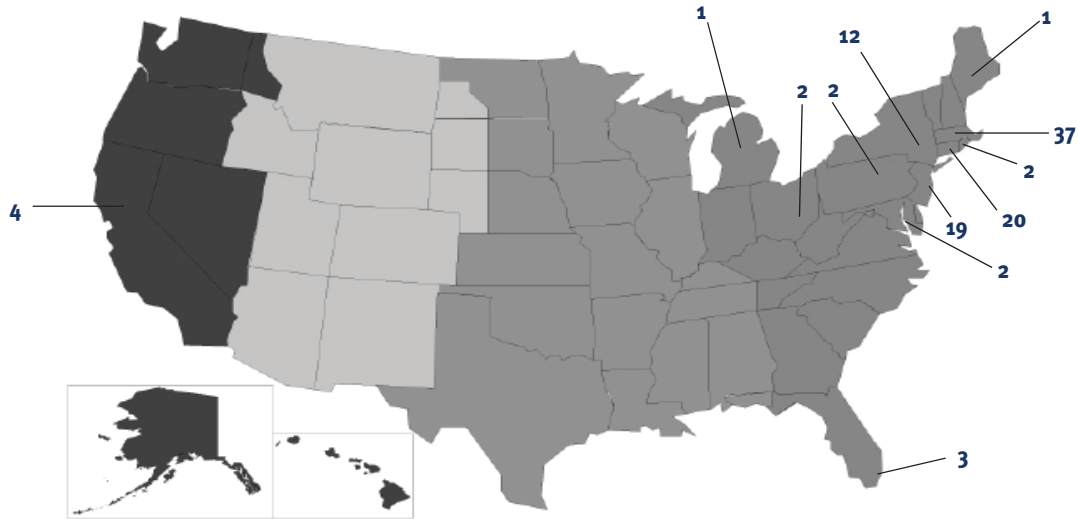
