EAGLES TAKE ON DUKE IN ACC TOURNAMENT

- The seventh-seed Boston College field hockey team will take on No. 2 seed Duke in the quarterfinals of the Atlantic Coast Conference Field Hockey Championships in Louisville, Kv.
- The Eagles and Blue Devils play on Thursday, Nov. 2 at 1:30 p.m. at Trager Stadium.
- In the 2017 regular-season meeting, Duke defeated BC, 3-2, in a shootout in Newton, Mass.
- Each time the Blue Devils went ahead, the Eagles answered, including senior Alesandra Miller's tying goal in the 49th minute, which eventually sent the game to overtime.
- Sophomore goalie Sarah Dwyer made six saves in the contest.
- This is the first time BC has faced Duke in the ACC Tournament and the two teams have never faced off on neutral territory.
- The Blue Devils lead the all-time series, 12-7, and have won the last five meetings.
- The last BC win came in 2012 in a 2-1 victory in Durham.
- BC is 1-2 in extra-time games, winning in 2006 in a double overtime victory and falling in overtime in 2014 and losing the shootout this season.

EAGLES IN THE ACC TOURNAMENT

- The Eagles are 1-12 in the ACC Tournament.
- Seven of the losses were by one goal and BC is 1-2 in overtime games in the league postseason.
- BC's first and only win came in 2015, in head coach Kelly Doton's first year at the helm. The
 Eagle defeated Wake Forest, 4-3, in double overtime in the first round. They lost, 3-2, to North
 Carolina in the semifinal game.
- This is the fourth time BC is the seventh seed (2013, 14, 15). Last year, the Eagles came in as
 the No. 3 seed, the highest spot in program history.
- They have been the fourth seed four times (2006, 07, 10, 12), the No. 5 seed three times (2005, 09, 11) and the sixth seed once (2008).

2017 ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

- Virginia holds the top seed in the 2017 ACC Championships. After a bye, the Cavaliers will
 play the winner of No. 4 Wake Forest and No. 5 North Carolina. No. 3 Louisville will open the
 tournament against No. 6 Syracuse and No. 4 Wake Forest will take on No. 5 North Carolina in
 the opening round.
- This is the first time Louisville is hosting the ACC Championships. The Cardinals joined the league for the 2014 season.

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2017

- BC had a near perfect non-conference record in 2017, falling only to No. 1 Connecticut in Storrs, Conn., to go 11-1.
- The Eagles could not muster an ACC win this season, the first time in program history they did not capture a victory in league play.
- BC lost at then seventh-ranked North Carolina in overtime and to No. 2 Duke in a shootout at home.
- The back-to-back losses at No. 13 Wake Forest and No. 1 UConn was the only time in 2017 BC lost two games in a row. Until the final game of the season, the Eagles had bounced back from every loss with a victory, finishing the year 5-1.
- The Eagles were 6-7 against ranked teams in 2017 with five losses to top-10 teams.
- The Eagles did not allow a goal in the first half to the Huskies. The loss also marked the first time BC lost after a halftime tie. They finished the regular season 4-1 tied at halftime but 7-0 when leading at halftime and 10-0 when scoring first.

THAT'S SO EXTRA

- Seven of the Eagles' 18 regular-season games went to extra time with BC winning five of them.
- The Eagles are 3-0 in double overtime games in 2017, 1-1 in overtime and 1-1 in shootouts.
- After a 2-1, double OT win at Albany (Aug. 27), BC took Northwestern to double overtime in Lancaster, Pa., pulling out a 3-2 victory (Sept.1).
- BC forced overtime against the Tar Heels in North Carolina with the equalizing goal coming in the 61st minute, but could not pull out the victory (Sept. 16).
- The Eagles combined with Pacific to score a season-high nine goals in a 5-4, double overtime win (Sept. 24), rallying from down one three times to win on senior **Brooke Matherson**'s first career game-wining goal

- Haverhals has seven points in the ACC Championships three goals and one assist. She scored twice against UVA in 2016.
- Gote and Mendonca logged asists in 2016 against Virginia.



- BC also forced overtime against second-ranked Duke (Sept. 29) and neither team could score in the 30 minutes of seven-on-seven play. Duke was able to notch the deciding goal in the shootout.
- The following weekend, the Eagles defeated Harvard, 2-1, in a shootout (Oct. 8), as sophomore Sarah Dwyer saved four of the five Crimson shots in the period after double overtime and freshmen Caroline McGovern and Jaime Natale scored on the BC side.
- After 23rd-ranked BU scored with just under seven minutes to go in the game, freshman Fusine Govaert netted the golden goal in the 74th minute to give the Eagles their sixth OT victory (Oct. 15).

EAGLES: RANKED

- The Eagles started the season ranked 12th in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) preseason poll, but remained in the top 10 until the last two weeks.
- After beginning the year 4-0 with three wins over top-25 teams, BC moved up to the No. 8 spot and received one first-place vote.
- The Eagles were ranked ninth after three straight wins over local opponents No. 13 Harvard, Northeastern and No. 23 Boston University.
- They fell to the No. 11 spot the lowest ranking since the preseason poll after a 3-0 loss at No. 13 Wake Forest on Oct. 20 and to No. 12 this week after the loss to UConn on Oct. 28.
- BC battled 13 ranked teams in 2017 and defeated six of them.
- All seven ACC teams are ranked in the top 20 for the 10th straight poll. Duke is in the No. 2 spot with Virginia at No. 4. North Carolina is sixth, Louisville 10th. Syracuse, BC and Wake round it out at 11th through 13th, respectively.
- The ACC teams combined to go a national-best 66-9 against the other leagues this season and are 28-7 against ranked non-conference opponents.
- The Eagles are 6-7 against ranked teams this season, falling to four top-10 opponents.
- The win over then-No. 6 Maryland (Sept. 3) was the seventh time under head coach Kelly Doton BC beat a top-10 team.

SPREADING THE LOVE

- The BC scoring has been spread out among 12 different Eagles.
- Freshman Fusine Govaert leads the way with six goals and is tied with senior Alesandra Miller for the team lead with 13 points.
- Senior Brooke Matherson and junior Lucy Lytle are second with five goals apiece.
- Govaert, Matherson and freshmen Jaime Natale and Caroline McGovern each have two of the Eagles' 11 game-winners with Lytle, junior Frederique Haverhals and freshman Elizabeth Warner notching one each.
- Miller has recorded a career and team-high seven assists in 2017. Juniors Ymke Rose Gote and Haverhals are next with five each.
- In all, 15 of the Eagles' 21 who have logged minutes have recorded at least one point.

TWO EAGLES EARN ACC HONORS

- Junior captains Ymke Rose Gote and Frederique Haverhals were named to the 2017 All-Atlantic Coast Conference Second Team, the league announced on Wednesday.
- It was the second time both players collected all-conference second-team accolades. They are both tied for second on the team with five assists each and have both scored two goals to notch nine points.
- Gote has started all 18 games in the midfield. She earned NFHCA Third-Team honors as a sophomore and was a member of the 2015 ACC All-Tournament team as a freshman.
- Haverhals has started all 18 games for the Eagles at back. She notched the game-winning goal in the 2-1 victory against Northeastern (Oct. 13). Haverhals was a 2016 NFHCA Third-Team All-American and earned All-Northeast Region Second Team honors as a freshman.
- Haverhals earned Preseason All-ACC accolades before the start of 2017.

YOUNG GUNS

- The Eagles freshman class has scored 19 of the team's 39 goals in 2017.
- The first-year class has also amassed 80 of the team's 108 total points.
- Freshman Fusine Govaert leads the Eagles with six goals and is tied for the lead with 13 points.
- Classmates Jaime Natale and Elizabeth Warner both have four goals apiece, tied for third.
- Govaert, freshman **Caroline McGovern** and Natale are three of four players on the Eagles to have two game-winners.

 Natale and McGovern converted during the shootout against Harvard (Oct. 8) to help lift the Eagles over the Crimson. Govaert netted the game-winner in overtime at BU (Oct. 15) to lift BC past its Comm. Ave. rivals.

THE ONE AND ONLY

- Sophomore Sarah Dwyer is the only goalie on the BC roster in 2017.
- She logged just over six minutes in her freshman campaign.
- · She notched her first career save in the season opener against Quinnipiac before logging two in the victory against Albany.
- Dwyer went on to record six saves in the double overtime win against Northwestern in the ACC/Big Ten Cup.
- In the 2-1 overtime loss to No. 7 North Carolina, Dwyer tallied a career-high nine saves, stopped 10 of 11 corners and 11 of 13 shots on goal.
- In the shootout victory against Harvard (Oct. 8), Dwyer recorded eight saves, including one on a penalty stroke, and stopped four of the five shootout attempts to help lift BC to victory.
- · She recorded her first career shutout in the win against Providence and repeated the feat at No. 18 William & Mary and at New Hampshire.
- She leads the ACC with 81 saves and her .692 save percentage is fourth in the league.

RPI RANKS

- The Eagles were ranked eighth in the latest NCAA RPI rankings.
- Twelve teams on BC's 2017 schedule were ranked in the top 25: Duke (1), Connecticut (2), Virginia (3), North Carolina (5), Maryland (9), Northwestern (10), Louis-ville (11), Wake Forest (13), Syracuse (14), William & Mary (17), Harvard (19) add Albany (22).
- Boston University (26) and Pacific (27) fell out of the top 25 in the most recent rankings.

CELEBRATING CHAMPIONS

- BC honored the 1997 Big East championship team on Oct. 6 against Louisville. It marked the 20th anniversary of one the Eagles' three conference tournament titles.
- The 1997 Eagles were also honored during the BC-Virginia Tech football game on Oct. 7.
- After starting the '97 season 5-4, the Eagles won 10 of their last 13 game
- The team featured two All-Americans in Andrea Durko and Joy Ramsbotham, the Big East Defensive Player of the year (Ramsbotham), the Big East Tournament Most Outstanding Player (Durko) and four named All-Big East.
- The Eagles defeated Providence and Connecticut, both by a score of 2-0, to capture the Big East title on their home turf, hosting in 1997.

MURPHY'S LAW

- The Eagles hosted the 11th annual MS Game in honor of former student-athlete **Kathleen Murphy**, a 2009 Boston College graduate, on Oct. 8 against Harvard.
- Murphy was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis (MS) in April 2007, then a forward on the BC field hockey team. MS is a disease of the central nervous system that disrupts the flow of information between the brain and body.
- Refusing to let the disease win, Murphy played 79 games in her BC career, scored 11 times, recorded nine assists and racked up 31 points.
- Since 2007, the BC field hockey team has participated in the MS Walk each year as part of "Murphy's Law."
- Murphy's former coach Ainslee Lamb, who was at BC's helm for 10 years, was in attendance and also honored in the pregame ceremonies as she an assistant coach for Harvard.

NEW ADDITIONS

- Two new faces joined the BC field hockey staff since the team's fourth straight NCAA Tournament bid last season. Third-year head coach Kelly Doton hired Mark Foster and Nicole Cordero as assistant coaches.
- Foster joined in February, coming to The Heights after two and a half years with one of the top club programs in the country, WC Eagles, based in Pottstown, Pa. With WC Eagles, Foster was part of the coaching staffs of five teams that won the USA National Club Championships. He's also spent two seasons as a staff member with USA Field Hockey's National Indoor Team. Before coming to the U.S., Foster began his coaching career in England at his alma mater, Durham University.
- Cordero joined the staff in August after spending four years as the Oak Park Forest High School in her native Illinois. She played forward at Massachusetts from 2009 to 2013, earning NFHCA Second-Team Regional All-American honors and Atlantic-10 Conference First-Team honors as a senior.

2017 CAPTAINS

- Juniors Ymke Rose Gote and Frederique Haverhals were named the captains of the team for the 2017 season, head coach Kelly Doton announced at the team's
 annual banquet in the spring.
- "I firmly believe the success of a team starts with its leadership," head coach **Kelly Doton** said. "Every spring, we go through a thorough captain selection process. Ymke and Frederique have been leaders since they stepped foot on our campus and have overwhelmingly impacted their teammates. And as a result, they were voted captains. With these two at the helm, I know the team will always be put first and they will strive to make sure everyone is living up to the standards of wearing a Boston College field hockey jersey."

USA EAGLES

- Sophomore Sarah Dwyer was selected to USA Field Hockey's Under-21 Junior National Camp. The goalie competed in the 2017 Young Women's National Championship, a five-day event that included most elite collegiate and post-collegiate field hockey players in the country at the Home of Hockey at Spooky Nook Sports in Lancaster, Pa.
- More than 130 athletes showcased their skills in front of coaches and selectors in order to progress within the Olympic Development Pipeline.
- Emily and Eryn McCoy '16, along with Leah Settipane '15, were named to USA Field Hockey's Development Squad National Camp.

Head Coach Kelly Dolon



Kelly Doton was promoted to head coach of the Boston College field hockey program on April 1, 2015. She is the eighth head field hockey coach in Boston College history.

In two seasons at the program's helm, Doton has led the Eagles to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 2015 and 2016. She is the first coach in program history to lead the team to NCAA Tournament appearances in each of her first two seasons at the helm.

While leading the Eagles, she has produced four NFHCA All-Americans, including two each in 2015 (Emily McCoy and Leah Settipane) and 2016 (Frederique Haverhals and Ymke Rose Gote), as well as 12 NFHCA All-Northeast Region honorees and six All-ACC performers. In 2016, a program-record four Eagles earned all-conference accolades: Gote, Audra Hampsch, Haverals and Emily McCoy.

The Greenfield, Mass., product has been with the Eagles since 2012 when she joined the program as associate head coach. She held the same position at Indiana prior to her arrival at The Heights.

In 2016, Doton's Eagles played the nation's second-toughest schedule and finished the year with a 10-10 mark. Of their 20 games, 14 were against ranked opponents – including all six ACC conference foes. Despite the challenge, BC went 3-3 in league play and tied its best-ever finish in the conference. The Eagles claimed the No. 3 seed in the ACC Championship. Boston College drew its fourth-straight NCAA Tournament berth, the longest run of consecutive appearances in program history.

In Doton's first year at the helm, the Eagles finished 13-9, defeating six ranked opponents and earning a 5-0 mark in overtime games. BC's highlights included the team's first-ever victory over Maryland, its first-ever ACC Championship victory and advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament for just the third time in program history and the first since 1998.

Before her promotion to head coach, Doton served as Ainslee Lamb's associate head coach for three seasons. After a three-year absence from the NCAA Tournament, the Eagles returned to the postseason in 2013 with a 12-8 record. In 2014, BC went 13-7 with five wins over ranked opponents, including upsets over No. 2 UConn, No. 4 Syracuse, No. 7 Louisville and No. 8 Virginia.

Doton came to BC from Indiana, where she had been coaching since 2008. She was an assistant coach for four seasons before being named the Hoosiers' associate head coach in 2011. In 2009, she was instrumental in helping Indiana reach the NCAA Tournament for the second time in program history after finishing second in league standings and reaching the Big Ten Tournament title game.

A 2004 graduate of Wake Forest, Doton was an asset to the Demon Deacons on both sides of the ball during her collegiate career, helping to lead her squad to back-to-back NCAA championships in 2002 and 2003. Providing her team with her disciplined defensive skills, and quickly establishing herself as one of the best attack corner hitters in the country, she was honored as the 2003 Honda Award winner, the National Field Hockey Player of the Year.

In addition to being named the ACC Player of the Year in 2002, she was also a two-time NFHCA First-Team All-American and a three-time All-ACC honoree during her career.

In addition to her collegiate playing experience, Doton was a member of the U.S. Women's Senior National Team from 2005-10. In 2008, she was part of the U.S. squad that competed in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China. She began her career with Team USA on the New Zealand Tour and scored her first international goal against Australia in 2005.

Prior to playing at Wake, Doton was a standout at Greenfield High School, where she broke the school's scoring record as a senior and was tabbed as the team's MVP in 1999. She earned all-league honors in 1997 and 1998, in addition to being named to the All-Western Massachusetts Squad. She also earned Northeastern All-American honors as a sophomore.

Doton earned her Master's Degree in Administrative Studies from Boston College in 2015.
