### **EAGLES OPEN 2017**

- The Boston College field hockey team begins the 2017 season with a home game Friday and a road tilt on Sunday.
- The Eagles host Quinnipiac at Newton Campus Field Hockey Complex to start the '17 slate. BC has not lost a match to the Bobcats in the 13 meetings between the two New England teams. The Eagles are 13-0 and have recorded nine shutouts in the series history, including last year's 2-0 win.
- On Sunday, BC hits the road to play 18th-ranked Albany. The Eagles are 2-0 against the Great Danes with 2-1 victories in 2007 and in the 2015 NCAA Tournament first round.

### **COMING IN AT NO. 12**

- The Eagles start the season ranked 12th in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Preseason Poll. Last year, they finished the season ranked 11th.
- All seven Atlantic Coast Conference teams were ranked in the top 15 with North Carolina and Duke going No. 1 and No. 2. Syracuse ranked fifth, Louisville seventh, Virginia 10th and Wake Forest 15th.
- BC plays 13 teams ranked in the top 25 in 2017, including No. 4 Connecticut (Oct. 29), No. 6 Maryland (Sept. 3) and No. 16 Boston University (Oct. 15).

### HAVERHALS EARNS PRESEASON HONORS

- Junior Frederique Haverhals was named to the Preseason All-Atlantic Coast Conference's Team. The Eagles' captain earned first-team All-America accolades a season ago.
- The Warmond, The Netherlands, native has started all 42 games in her BC career. She was an All-ACC Second-Team selection in 2016 and collected NFHCA All-Northeast Region Second-Team honors in 2015. Last year, Haverhals led the Eagles with seven assists and finished the year fourth on the team with 17 points, scoring five goals. She had a five-game point streak at the end of last season as BC made its fourth straight NCAA Tournament.
- Enrolled in the Carroll School of Management, Haverhals earned a spot on the NFHCA National Academic Squad and the All-ACC Academic Team.
- Seven of the 11 members of the preseason squad were named NFHCA All-Americans in 2016, including five who earned first-team honors.

### **BACK FOR MORE**

- Two of the Eagles' top four points scorers return for the 2017 season. Junior **Lucy Lytle** was second on the '16 squad with 24 points and led the team with 12 goals. Classmate **Frederique Haverhals** notched 17 points on a team-high seven assists and five goals. Her goals tied for fourth on BC.
- While top scorer Brittany Sheenan (26 pts) graduated, along with Eryn (18 pts) and Emily (13 pts) McCoy, the Eagles return seniors **Brooke Matherson** (7 pts) and **Chelcie Mendonca** (5 pts) and junior **Ymke Rose Gote** (5 pts).
- Haverhals, junior **Elizabeth Dennehy** and redshirt junior **Alyssa Olenick** recorded a defensive save last year.
- Sophomore **Sarah Dwyer** is taking over the goal-keeping duties after Audra Hampsch graduated. She played just over six minutes of the Northeastern game (Sept. 18) in her freshman campaign.

### **CELEBRATING CHAMPIONS**

- The BC field hockey team will honor the 1997 Big East championship team at the Eagles' game against Louisville on Friday, Oct. 6. It marks the 20th anniversary of one of BC's three conference tournament titles. It is also Boston College's Homecoming Weekend.
- The Eagles will honor the 1997 team at halftime of the ACC contest at the Newton Campus Complex, which starts at 6 p.m. There will also be a post-game reception for all field hockey alumnae.
- All former players and their families are also invited to a pregame tailgate on Saturday, Oct. 7
  before the BC football team takes on Virginia Tech at Alumni Stadium. The 1997 team will be
  honored during the game.
- To close out the weekend, the BC field hockey team hosts Harvard at 1 p.m. on Sunday.

- The 2015 victory in Storrs, Conn., in the first round of the NCAA Tournament advanced the Eagles to the quarterfinals for the third time in program history and the first time since 1998.
- Frederigue Haverhals and Chelcie Mendonca notched assists in the victory.

### **NEW ADDITIONS**

- Two new faces joined the BC field hockey staff since the team's fourth straight NCAA Tournament bid last season.
- Third-year head coach Kelly Doton hired Mark Foster and Nicole Cordero as assistant coaches during the offseason.
- Foster joined in February, coming to The Heights after two and a half years with one of the top club programs in the country, WC Eagles, based in Pottstown, Pa. With WC Eagles, Foster was part of the coaching staffs of five teams that won the USA National Club Championships. He's also spent two seasons as a staff member with USA Field Hockey's National Indoor Team. Before coming to the U.S., Foster began his coaching career in England at his alma mater, Durham University. As a player, he captained the men's field hockey team and was part of the squads that won the 2012 and 2014 Premier North division before advancing to the national tournament both seasons.
- Cordero joined the staff in August after spending four years as the Oak Park Forest High School in her native Illinois. She played forward at Massachusetts from 2009 to 2013, earning NFHCA Second-Team Regional All-American honors and Atlantic-10 Conference First-Team honors as a senior. After graduation, Cordero played for the Rockingham Redbacks in Australia, earning the team MVP Award and all-star status.

### 2017 CAPTAINS

- Juniors Ymke Rose Gote and Frederique Haverhals were named the captains of the team for the 2017 season, head coach Kelly Doton announced at the team's annual banquet in the spring.
- Both Gote and Haverhals are among the top field hockey players in the nation as each earned National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) All-America honors for their play during their sophomore seasons in 2016.
- Gote garnered NFHCA Third-Team All-America honors after anchoring the Eagles' midfield last year. As a sophomore, Gote started all 20 games and collected five assists, the second-highest total on the team. A key component of the Eagles' offensive and defensive corner units, Gote was also an

- NFHCA First-Team All-Northeast Region honoree, as well as an All-ACC Second Team performer. Off the field, Gote was a member of the 2016 ACC All-Academic Team. Additionally, she is on the Executive Board of the Boston College Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).
- Haverhals was one of the youngest players to earn 2016 NFHCA First-Team
  All-America honors, joining just three other sophomores. In 2016, she started
  all 20 games at center back and finished the season fourth on the team in
  scoring with 17 points (5 goals, 7 assists). Like Gote, she was a constant
  presence on both attacking and defensive corners while playing almost
  every minute of the season. Haverhals also garnered NFHCA First-Team
  All-Northeast Region and All-ACC Second Team honors. In the classroom,
  she earned placed on both the NFHCA National Academic Squad and the
  ACC All-Academic Team.

### **USA EAGLES**

- Sophomore **Sarah Dwyer** was selected to USA Field Hockey's Under-21 Junior National Camp. The goalie competed in the 2017 Young Women's National Championship, a five-day event that included most elite collegiate and post-collegiate field hockey players in the country at the Home of Hockey at Spooky Nook Sports in Lancaster, Pa.
- More than 130 athletes showcased their skills in front of coaches and selectors in order to progress within the Olympic Development Pipeline.
- Recent graduates Emily and Eryn McCoy, along with 2015 graduate Leah Settipane, were named to USA Field Hockey's Development Squad National Camp.

### **ACC PRESEASON POLL**

- The Eagles were picked to finish seventh in the league's preseason poll, voted by the conference's head coaches.
- North Carolina was chosen as the favorite to win the 2017 title.
- ACC teams have won 18 of the 36 NCAA field hockey titles, including 11
  of the last 15, and at least one ACC squad has advanced to the national
  championship game for 18 straight years. Six ACC programs earned bids
  to the 2016 NCAA Championship and all seven finished the 2016 season
  ranked nationally.

### Head Coach Kelly Doton



Kelly Doton was promoted to head coach of the Boston College field hockey program on April 1, 2015. She is the eighth head field hockey coach in Boston College history.

In two seasons at the program's helm, Doton has led the Eagles to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 2015 and 2016. She is the first coach in program history to lead the team to NCAA Tournament appearances in each of her first two seasons at the helm.

While leading the Eagles, she has produced four NFHCA All-Americans, including two each in 2015 (Emily McCoy and Leah Settipane) and 2016 (Frederique Haverhals and Ymke Rose Gote), as well as 12 NFHCA All-Northeast Region honorees and six All-ACC performers. In 2016, a program-record four Eagles earned all-conference accolades: Gote, Audra Hampsch, Haverals and Emily McCoy.

The Greenfield, Mass., product has been with the Eagles since 2012 when she joined the program as associate head coach. She held the same position at Indiana prior to her arrival at The Heights.

In 2016, Doton's Eagles played the nation's second-toughest schedule and finished the year with a 10-10 mark. Of their 20 games, 14 were against ranked opponents – including all six ACC conference foes. Despite the challenge, BC went 3-3 in league play and tied its best-ever finish in the conference. The Eagles claimed the No. 3 seed in the ACC Championship. Boston College drew its fourth-straight NCAA Tournament berth, the longest run of consecutive appearances in program history.

In Doton's first year at the helm, the Eagles finished 13-9, defeating six ranked opponents and earning a 5-0 mark in overtime games. BC's highlights included the team's first-ever victory over Maryland, its first-ever ACC Championship victory and advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament for just the third time in program history and the first since 1998.

Before her promotion to head coach, Doton served as Ainslee Lamb's associate head coach for three seasons. After a three-year absence from the NCAA Tournament, the Eagles returned to the postseason in 2013 with a 12-8 record. In 2014, BC went 13-7 with five wins over ranked opponents, including upsets over No. 2 UConn, No. 4 Syracuse, No. 7 Louisville and No. 8 Virginia.

Doton came to BC from Indiana, where she had been coaching since 2008. She was an assistant coach for four seasons before being named the Hoosiers' associate head coach in 2011. In 2009, she was instrumental in helping Indiana reach the NCAA Tournament for the second time in program history after finishing second in league standings and reaching the Big Ten Tournament title game.

A 2004 graduate of Wake Forest, Doton was an asset to the Demon Deacons on both sides of the ball during her collegiate career, helping to lead her squad to back-to-back NCAA championships in 2002 and 2003. Providing her team with her disciplined defensive skills, and quickly establishing herself as one of the best attack corner hitters in the country, she was honored as the 2003 Honda Award winner, the National Field Hockey Player of the Year.

In addition to being named the ACC Player of the Year in 2002, she was also a two-time NFHCA First-Team All-American and a three-time All-ACC honoree during her career.

In addition to her collegiate playing experience, Doton was a member of the U.S. Women's Senior National Team from 2005-10. In 2008, she was part of the U.S. squad that competed in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China. She began her career with Team USA on the New Zealand Tour and scored her first international goal against Australia in 2005.

Prior to playing at Wake, Doton was a standout at Greenfield High School, where she broke the school's scoring record as a senior and was tabbed as the team's MVP in 1999. She earned all-league honors in 1997 and 1998, in addition to being named to the All-Western Massachusetts Squad. She also earned Northeastern All-American honors as a sophomore.

Doton earned her Master's Degree in Administrative Studies from Boston College in 2015.
