FIRST-AND-10

» Boston College Football hosts Rutgers for their 2026 home opener on Friday, September 11 at 7:30 p.m. The game serves as the 13th annual Red Bandanna Game in honor of Welles Crowther '99 on the 25th anniversary of 9/11/01.

» The game will be televised on ESPN2. **Mike Monaco** (play-by-play) and **Jordan Rodgers** (analyst) are on the call with sideline reporter **Dana Boyle**.

» Coverage on the Boston College Sports Network begins 30 minutes prior to kickoff on WEEI 850 AM. **Jon Meterparel** (play-by-play) is joined on the call by former BC linebacker **Pete Cronan** in the booth and **Scott Mutryn** on the sideline.

EAGLES BY THE NUMBERS

» The Eagles added 28 players via the transfer portal in January, headlined by quarterback **Mason McKenzie** and running back **Evan Dickens**.

» **McKenzie** accounted for nearly 6,000 total yards of offense in 25 career games at Saginaw Valley State. The Caledonia, Mich. native also earned GLIAC Player of the Year honors in 2025.

» In his first start in a Boston College uniform at Cincinnati (9/5), **McKenzie** completed 18-of-35 passes for 223 yards, one touchdown and one interception while leading the team in rushing yards (78).

» **Dickens** rushed for 1,339 yards and 16 touchdowns in 2025 as a member of the Liberty Flames. The Marietta, Ga. native

ranked in the top 10 nationally in five major rushing categories last season: Rushing yards (5th), rushing touchdowns (4th), rushing yards per game (3rd), all-purpose yards per game (7th) and scoring per game (10th).

» **Dickens** found the end zone on a four-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter at Cincinnati (9/5), his first touchdown as a member of the Eagles.

» Wide receiver **Johnathan Montague Jr.** scored on a 23-yard touchdown reception from Mason McKenzie in the fourth quarter at Cincinnati (9/5). The touchdown marked McKenzie's first passing touchdown as an Eagle, and Montague's first touchdown since a 24-yard reverse he ran against North Carolina in 2024. The N.C. native missed all of 2025 due to injury.

» Wide receiver **Javarius Green** finished with six catches for 74 yards at Cincinnati (9/5), with both totals marking career highs for the North Carolina transfer.

» Linebacker **Anthony Palano** finished with 13 tackles at Cincinnati (9/5), the seventh-most tackles in a single game so far this season and his third career game with 10 or more tackles.

» Safety **KP Price** finished with 10 tackles in the 2026 season opener at Cincinnati (9/5), his sixth career game with 10 or more tackles as a member of the Eagles.

» 27 Eagles made their debut in a Boston College uniform at Cincinnati (9/5).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

» With a win in the home opener vs. Rutgers, Gregory P. Barber '69 and Family Head Coach Bill O'Brien moves to 2-1 all-time in the Red Bandanna Game in honor of Welles Crowther '99.

» The Eagles are looking for their seventh win in their last nine home openers with a victory over the Scarlet Knights. The last time the Eagles lost the home opener came during the 2023 season.

» Boston College's last victory over Rutgers came on September 21, 2019 when they beat the Scarlet Knights 30-16. Prior to the Eagles last meeting against the Big 10 opponent in 2022, they had won 11 straight games against Rutgers.

» Boston College defeated Michigan State on September 21, 2024 in the 11th edition of the Red Bandanna Game, which marks their last victory against a Big Ten opponent and their last victory in the Red Bandanna Game.

Gregory P. Barber '69 and Family Head Coach

Bill O'Brien enters his third season on The Heights as the Gregory P. Barber '69 and Family Head Coach after being hired as the 37th head coach in Boston College Football history on Feb. 9, 2024. As of 2026, O'Brien also serves as the Edward F. Connelly Offensive Coordinator.

With O'Brien at the helm, redshirt senior wide receiver Lewis Bond had a career year in 2025. He became Boston College's all-time leader in receptions, breaking a three-year record set by first-round draft pick Zay Flowers. In addition, Bond finished the season fourth nationally in receptions per game (7.3) and twentieth in the country in total receiving yards (993) en route to All-ACC Second Team honors. Bond's 88 catches for 993 yards marked career-highs in each category. The Chicago, Ill. native finished his Boston College career with 2,385 reception yards, which is fifth all-time in Boston College Football history.

Under O'Brien's guidance, the Eagles finished fourteenth in total passing offense in the country, averaging 280.2 yards per game in 2025. In 10 games with nine starts at quarterback in his first full season, redshirt sophomore Dylan Loneragan registered 190 completions, moving him inside the top-10 in single-season completions in school history.

In 2025, several key Eagles' defenders made a name for themselves. Junior safety KP Price led the team in tackles in back-to-back seasons, finishing with 94 tackles, including three for loss, three quarterback hits, two interceptions, and one fumble recovery en route to All-ACC Second-Team honors. Price's 5.4 solo tackles per game was second-best in the country and best in the ACC. Sophomore safety Omar Thornton forced 0.33 fumbles per game, which ranked sixth nationally and third-best in the ACC.

In his first season on the Heights, O'Brien guided the Eagles to a 7-6 record and an appearance in the Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl. BC started the season with a top-10 win at Florida State and entered the top-25 for the first time in six years after a 2-0 start. O'Brien and the Eagles also posted the first six-win season at Alumni Stadium since 2009 and sold out two home games for the first time since 2006.

Boston College posted top-25 rankings nationally in nine statistical categories across the FBS. BC was 12th nationally and first in the ACC in the fewest penalties per game at 4.46. The team's 0.69 turnover margin ranked 17th, led by a defense that totaled 17 interceptions; the seventh most in the country and tops in the conference. O'Brien's offense ranked 22nd in team passing efficiency at 114.9 and the defense 22nd in rushing defense at 114.9.

As a senior on O'Brien's first team, Donovan Ezeiruaku led the nation in sacks at 1.38 per game, while tying the BC single-season record at 16.5, which led all FBS players in the regular season. Ezeiruaku earned ACC Defensive Player of the Year and the Ted Hendricks Award as college football's top defensive end. Ezeiruaku also became the 13th consensus All-American in BC history with first-team honors from the AP, AFCA and Sporting News plus second-team honors from the Walter Camp Foundation.

A 32-year coaching veteran in the college and professional ranks, O'Brien was elevated to his first head coaching post at Penn State in 2012. He guided the Nittany Lions to an overall record of 15-9 and 10-6 Big Ten mark during the span of two seasons while directing the program through a postseason ban. He was named the head coach of the NFL's Houston Texans in 2014, leading the franchise to a 52-48 record, four AFC South Division titles, and four playoff appearances - including two Wild Card round wins - between 2014 and 2020.

While at Penn State, O'Brien was recognized in 2012 with a pair of national coaching awards - the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year, and the George Munger Award for Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club. The Nittany Lions' eight wins in 2012 were the most by a first-year head coach in school history, earning O'Brien Big Ten Coach of the Year honors. In 2013, O'Brien and Penn State won seven games, including two top 25 victories, downing No. 18 Michigan at home and winning at No. 14 Wisconsin. The Nittany Lions boasted two first team All-Americans during his tenure - linebacker Michael Mauti (2012) and wide receiver Allen Robinson (2013) - and 10 All-Big Ten selections.

O'Brien returned to the NFL in 2014 as the head coach of the Houston Texans. During his tenure, Houston posted five winning seasons, including back-to-back double-digit win seasons in 2018 (11-5) and 2019 (10-6). The 21 combined wins rank as the second-most in a two-year span in franchise history. Houston's offense ranked in the top-10 in rushing in the league on four occasions. The 2019 Texans' squad featured a 3,500-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher, and a 1,000-yard receiver for only the fourth time in franchise history.

After his time in Houston, O'Brien returned to the college game as the quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator at Alabama under Nick Saban in 2021 and 2022. He mentored Heisman Trophy winning QB Bryce Young and helped the Crimson Tide reach the College Football Playoff national championship game in 2021.

In his second season, Alabama was fourth nationally in scoring offense (41.1 points/game), 11th in total offense (477.1 yards/game) and 19th in passing offense (281.5 yards/game) en route to an 11-2 record and a victory in the Sugar Bowl.

O'Brien, who totaled six years across two stints on Bill Belichick's staff, helped guide the New England Patriots to two AFC titles and appearances in Super Bowl XLII and XLVI in six total years on the Patriots' coaching staff. Most recently, he spent the 2023 season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach of the New England Patriots.

He served in four different roles in Foxboro, including offensive coordinator during the 2011 season. With O'Brien as the OC, the Patriots went 13-3, earned the top-seed in the AFC, led the AFC in scoring (32.1 points per game), and ranked second in the NFL in total offense (428.0 yards per game) on the way to the Super Bowl.

O'Brien was also the quarterbacks coach for two seasons, working directly with Tom Brady. During that time, Brady earned 2010 Associated Press MVP and All-Pro First Team honors.

Before entering the NFL, O'Brien gained 14 years of experience at the collegiate level, including 12 years in the ACC. His coaching career began at his alma mater Brown, serving as the tight ends coach (1993) and inside linebackers coach (1994).

He then began an eight-year stretch at Georgia Tech as a graduate assistant (1995-97), running backs coach (1998-00) and offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach (2001-02). O'Brien then spent two seasons as the running backs coach at Maryland (2003-04) before a two-year stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Duke (2005-06).

Originally from Dorchester, Mass., O'Brien played linebacker and defensive end at Brown and graduated with a double concentration in political science and organizational behavioral management in 1992. O'Brien and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Jack and Michael.

Ted Roof

Kevin T. Fee Family Defensive Coordinator

Ted Roof enters his first season with the Boston College Football program as Kevin T. Fee Family Defensive Coordinator.

Roof first became a defensive coordinator in 1995-96 at Massachusetts. He has led defenses at Georgia Tech, Duke, Minnesota, Auburn, UCF, Penn State, North Carolina State, Appalachian State, Vanderbilt and Oklahoma during his career. He also served as Head Coach at Duke from 2004-07. In all, he has mentored over 110 student-athletes who went on to the professional ranks.

Roof has been part of teams that combined for 17 bowl appearances, including a Bowl Championship Series national title run as Auburn's defensive coordinator following the 2010 season. He has 30-plus years of Power 4 coaching experience.

Roof mostly recently served as Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers at UCF. Under Roof's tutelage, defensive back Mac McWilliams was selected by the Philadelphia Eagles in the fifth round (145th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft, becoming just one of two Knights drafted that season. In addition, two other members of Roof's defense, defensive back BJ Adams and defensive tackle Ricky Barber, signed contracts with the Miami Dolphins and Washington Commanders as undrafted free agents following the Draft.

Before his time at UCF, Roof spent two seasons at Oklahoma as Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers. In 2023, the Sooners ranked third nationally in takeaways per game (2.0), seventh in tackles for loss per game (7.5) and 14th in third down defense. Roof coordinated a 2022 Oklahoma defense that tied for fourth nationally with 104 tackles for loss (8.0 per game) and ranked seventh with 17 interceptions. Linebacker Danny Stutsman led the Big 12 and ranked 14th in the country with 125 total tackles. Fellow linebacker David Ugwoegbu ranked fourth in the conference with 109 tackles, which tied for 36th nationally.

Prior to his time at Oklahoma, Roof spent the 2021 season on Clemson's staff as a Defensive Analyst. That year, Roof assisted a Tigers defense that finished top-5 in the ACC in several categories, including second in sacks (42), third in fumbles recovered (8), and fifth in interceptions (12).

Prior to his season at Clemson, he was the Defensive Coordinator at Vanderbilt in 2020 and at Appalachian State in 2019. He helped the Mountaineers to a 13-1 record and No. 19 final AP ranking and guided a unit that led the nation in defensive touchdowns.

In 2019, Roof's defense helped pave the way for Appalachian State's sixth conference championship and fifth bowl victory in the past decade. The Mountaineers ranked among the nation's best in scoring defense (21st) and total defense (25th). The unit also ranked ninth nationally in third-down defense (30.7%), 16th in interceptions (14) and 19th in sacks (36).

Before his time at Appalachian State, Roof served as Associate Head Coach and Co-Defensive Coordinator at NC State in 2018, helping the Wolfpack to a 9-4 record and Gator Bowl appearance.

Roof's head coaching tenure came at Duke, where he first served as Defensive Coordinator during the 2002 and 2003 seasons. He was promoted to Interim Head Coach during the 2003 season and held the position for four more years.

After his time in Durham, Roof served as Defensive Coordinator at Minnesota (2008), Auburn (2009-11) and Penn State under Coach O'Brien (2012) before returning to his alma mater — Georgia Tech — for five seasons (2013-17).

As Auburn's Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers coach, he helped guide the Tigers to at least seven wins in each of his three seasons, which included a 14-0 campaign and BCS National Championship in 2010. In the national title game, Auburn held Oregon to 19 points, which was 30 points below the Ducks' season average.

During his most recent stint at Georgia Tech (2013-17), Roof helped the Yellow Jackets to an ACC Coastal Division title and a 2014 Orange Bowl victory over Mississippi State. The 2013 defense ranked in the top 30 nationally in points and yards allowed, and his 2015 group boasted the country's most-improved third-down defense while ranking sixth nationally in first downs allowed.

From 2008-20, Roof's defenses limited opponents to 110 or fewer rushing yards 57 times and posted a 48-9 record in such games.

Roof's first stint at Georgia Tech came in 1998 as Linebackers Coach before being promoted to Defensive Coordinator, a position he held from 1999-01.

Prior to moving to Atlanta, he was the Defensive Coordinator at Western Carolina (1997) and Massachusetts (1995-96). He coached the defensive line at UMass (1994) and linebackers at Duke (1990-93) and West Georgia (1989). Roof began his coaching career as a Graduate Assistant at Alabama from 1987-88.

A Lawrenceville, Ga. native, Roof was a four-year letterwinner (1982-85) and three-year starter at Georgia Tech as a linebacker. He earned Freshman All-America honors in 1982 and was a team captain and First-Team All-ACC selection as a senior in 1985 when the Yellow Jackets went 9-2-1 and beat Michigan State in the All-American Bowl. He remains among the top 10 in Georgia Tech history in career tackles with 417 stops, and was inducted into the school's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998. After his time in Atlanta, Roof had a brief stint with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers before going into coaching.

Matt Thurin**Special Teams Coordinator/Safeties**

Matt Thurin enters his seventh season as Boston College's special teams coordinator/safeties coach. Thurin came to the Heights after a five-year stint at Ohio State.

In 2025, Luca Lombardo garnered national attention. The redshirt junior ranked fourth in the country in field goal percentage (94.1%) after making 16-of-17 attempts, including a long of 52. He also made all 35 of his extra point attempts this season. Under Thurin's tutelage, the Eagles allowed just three yards per punt return this season, which ranked fifth nationally and second in the ACC. In addition, safeties KP Price, Omar Thornton and Carter Davis were the Eagles top three tacklers in 2025. Price finished with 94 tackles, including three for loss, three quarterback hits, two interceptions, and one fumble recovery en route to All-ACC Second-Team honors. His 5.4 solo tackles per game was second-best in the country and best in the ACC. Thornton's 82 tackles were second-best on the team to go with four forced fumbles, two sacks and one interception. He forced 0.33 fumbles per game, which ranked sixth nationally and third-best in the ACC. Davis finished the 2025 campaign with 59 total tackles, third-best on the team this season.

In the final game of 2024, Thurin coached a unit that blocked a PAT returned for two points and blocked a punt that set up a touchdown against Nebraska in the Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl. Under Thurin's tutelage, both Liam Connor and Luca Lombardo saw action in the kicking game, going 3-for-5 on field goals in total.

The BC special teams unit blocked two kicks in 2023 and did not allow a blocked kick or punt on the season. Thurin oversaw the development of Connor, who ascended to placekicker after serving as the kickoff specialist as a freshman in 2022. Connor went 11-for-14 on field goals, including three makes of 45 yards.

Thurin also coached safeties in his first four years with the Eagles. Under his tutelage, strong safety Jaiden Woodbey was a two-time All-ACC Honorable Mention.

Boston College's 2022 special teams unit was one of just four in the ACC to block two or more kicks. A blocked extra-point against Louisville proved to be the difference in the Eagles' first league win of the season.

In 2021, Connor Lytton was second in the ACC and 11th nationally in field goal percentage, connecting on 11 of his 12 attempts including both from 40+ yards. Grant Carlson ranked top-30 nationally in punting average (44.2) while Travis Levy ranked second in the ACC and 15th nationally in kickoff return average (27.5). In his first season at the Heights, Thurin made a major impact in the improvement of Boston College's special teams. BC finished 34th nationally in field goal percentage in 2020, the best finish for the Eagles since 2013. Aaron Boumerhi converted 16-of-20 of his field goal attempts while Grant Carlson averaged over 42 yards per punt, including 15 punts pinned inside the 20-yard line.

Thurin worked together with former BC head coach Jeff Hafley for one season with the Buckeyes as Thurin worked with the safeties and on special teams as a defensive quality control coach. Thurin was part of three consecutive Big Ten Conference championship teams at Ohio State and also victories in the 2019 Rose Bowl, the 2018 Cotton Bowl and the 2016 Fiesta Bowl.

A native of Louisville, Ohio, Thurin attended Baldwin Wallace University where he played football and baseball before an injury ended his playing career. He played for Baldwin Wallace's 2003 Division III playoff team and graduated in 2007 with a degree in early childhood education. He has a master's in education from Akron (2009).

Thurin came to Columbus after working three seasons – 2012-14 – as secondary coach and special team's coordinator at Columbia University. In 2011, Thurin was a graduate assistant at the University of Colorado, working along the offensive line and on special teams. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Akron as a defensive graduate assistant working with the Zip linebackers and secondary. Thurin's coaching career also includes a year at Walsh University.

Thurin is married to Elizabeth Tinto, from Chesapeake, Va. The couple has an eight year old daughter, Adaline, and a four year old son, Joseph Rhett.





Ben Albert **Defensive Line**

Ben Albert enters his fourth overall season with the Boston College Football program as Defensive Line Coach. He returns to The Heights in 2026 after coaching the Eagles' defensive line from 2013-15.

Prior to his return to Boston College, Albert served as Assistant Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator/Defensive Line at Massachusetts for three seasons (2022-24). In his first season back with the Minutemen, his alma mater, Albert helped the defense move from 130th to 55th in FBS.

Before arriving in Amherst, Albert spent six seasons (2016-21) on staff at Duke, serving as Co-Defensive Coordinator while coaching the defensive line.

In 2021, he saw two Blue Devil defensive ends, Chris Rumph II and Victor Dimukeje, drafted by the Los Angeles Chargers and Arizona Cardinals, in the fourth and sixth rounds of the 2021 NFL Draft. For the second straight year, Albert coached the pair to All-ACC honors.

In 2017, Albert oversaw a Duke defense that proved to be one of the best in the ACC, ranking among the league's leaders in opponent completion percentage (2nd), scoring defense (3rd) and total defense (4th).

He joined the Duke staff after spending three seasons (2013-15) coaching the defensive line at Boston College. Albert helped the Eagles to bowl game appearances in 2013 and 2014. He mentored defensive end Harold Landry, who was a second-round pick by the Tennessee Titans in the 2018 NFL Draft. Landry earned All-America accolades while at Boston College and established the school's single season record for sacks.

Prior to his time in Chestnut Hill, Albert served two seasons (2011-12) as Linebackers Coach at Temple. In 2011, he helped the Owls rank third nationally in scoring defense (13.9) as Temple posted a 9-4 overall record and defeated Wyoming, 37-15, in the New Mexico Bowl, for the program's first bowl victory in 32 years. While at Temple, Albert played a critical role in developing Tahir Whitehead, who earned All-MAC honors prior to being a fifth-round choice of the Detroit Lions in the 2012 NFL Draft.

Albert spent the 2010 season on staff with the Jacksonville Jaguars, serving as Assistant Defensive Line Coach.

A former All-Conference defensive lineman at Massachusetts, Albert coached the defensive line for two seasons (1995-96) before helping Richmond to a pair of conference championships during a four-year (1997-2000) stint coaching the Spiders' defensive line and linebackers.

After one season (2001) mentoring the defensive front at Rutgers, Albert returned to Massachusetts for two seasons (2002-03). During this stretch, he helped the Minutemen to the 2003 Atlantic 10 Conference Championship and aided in the recruitment of fellow Paterson, N.J. native, wide receiver Victor Cruz, to Massachusetts.

Albert graduated from Massachusetts in 1995 with a degree in political science and sociology. He later earned a master's degree in education from Massachusetts in 1997. Albert and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Maya and Elijah.





Kurt Anderson **Offensive Line**

Kurt Anderson enters his first season as Offensive Line Coach for the Boston College Football program.

Anderson comes to The Heights after spending last season coaching the offensive line at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst.

Anderson played a role in the development of two first-round NFL Draft selections while at Northwestern in Peter Skoronski (2023 – Tennessee Titans) and Rashawn Slater (2021 – Los Angeles Chargers) in his six years in Evanston. He saw Skoronski become the first unanimous First-Team All-American in Northwestern history while earning Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year, Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year and Outland Trophy honors in 2022. Under Anderson's tutelage, Slater was a three-year starter on the offensive line, and did not allow a sack in 11 games en route to a consensus honorable mention All-Big Ten selection in 2019. He graded out as the No. 2 overall among Power Five returning offensive tackles, per PFF, and was named to the Outland Trophy watchlist in 2020.

Before his time at Northwestern, Anderson spent two years as offensive line coach at Arkansas. With the Razorbacks, he mentored 2017 Detroit Lions first round draft pick and All-SEC offensive lineman Frank Ragnow. Anderson aided Ragnow in being named the nation's best offensive lineman, best run blocker, a First-Team All-American by PFF and a Second-Team All-SEC choice by the Associated Press. Anderson also coached Lions offensive lineman Dan Skipper, who was a 2016 American Football Coaches Association Second-Team All-American and a two-time All-SEC offensive lineman. In 2016, Anderson's offensive line helped pave the way for running back Rawleigh Williams III to capture the SEC regular-season rushing title with 1,326 yards while allowing quarterback Austin Allen to throw for an SEC-best 3,430 yards.

Prior to Arkansas, Anderson spent 2013-15 with the Buffalo Bills as assistant offensive line coach. In 2015, the Bills led the NFL in rush yards per game (152.0) and yards per rush (4.8) and were fifth in the AFC in total offense (360.9). Anderson served as the team's primary offensive line coach for the first six weeks of the season under head coach Rex Ryan. He also coached two 2015 NFL Pro Bowl selections in Eric Wood and Richie Incognito. In addition, running back LeSean McCoy was one of three Buffalo players to rush for 500-plus yards in 2015, marking the first time that feat has been accomplished by the Bills since 1962. During the 2013 season, the Bills ranked second in the NFL in rushing (2,307 yards).

Before joining the Bills, Anderson spent five seasons at Eastern Michigan, primarily as run game coordinator (2010-12). He helped the Eagles rush for over 2,000 yards in three consecutive seasons for the first time in program history. The Eagles posted 2,263 yards in 2012, 2,620 yards in 2011 (218.3 yards per game), marking the 14th-best run game in the nation, and 2,380 yards in 2010.

In 2011, Eastern Michigan was the only FBS school to have four players average over 50.0 rushing yards per game. He also had running backs tally over 100-yard individual rushing games nine times that season, while it occurred seven times in the season prior. Anderson's final three seasons with the Eagles saw nine games with rushing yards totaling over 300 yards. Anderson's time at Eastern Michigan began in 2008 as tight ends coach before moving to the offensive line and run game coordinator.

Anderson joined Eastern Michigan after a two-year stint at his alma mater, Michigan. While on staff with the Wolverines, Anderson spent the 2007 campaign as a graduate assistant coach for the offensive line, helping develop All-American tackle and the No. 1 overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft, Jake Long.

Prior to his time at Michigan, Anderson was an assistant coach at Indiana State, working with the offensive tackles and tight ends. He also was a defensive coordinator and defensive line coach at Glenbrook South High School in Glenview, Illinois, in 2003 and 2004.

A standout offensive lineman at Michigan, Anderson was a two-year letter winner (2000-01) as the starting center and received the Hugh R. Rader Jr. Memorial Award as the team's top offensive lineman. He was also named an All-Big Ten Honorable Mention following the 2001 season. As a player and coach, Anderson has been involved in seven bowl games, highlighted by Michigan's 1998 Rose Bowl win that sealed the program's national championship.

In 2002, Anderson was an undrafted free agent signee with the Arizona Cardinals.

Anderson, a native of Evanston, Illinois, graduated with a bachelor's degree in sport management and communication from Michigan in 2001.





Joe Dailey

Wide Receivers

Joe Dailey returns to The Heights in 2026 for his second stint as Wide Receivers Coach. Dailey initially coached the Eagles' wideouts from 2020-21.

Most recently, Dailey served as passing game coordinator/quarterbacks at Hampton University. Under Dailey's guidance, the Pirates totaled 400 or more yards on offense on five occasions in 2024.

Prior to his time at Hampton, Dailey was an offensive analyst at Kansas in 2023. That season, the Jayhawks capped a 9-4 season with their first bowl victory in 17 years. Dailey helped orchestrate an offense that ranked 17th nationally in scoring at 34.8 points per game and eighth in rushing with 206 yards per game.

Before arriving in Lawrence, Dailey coached wide receivers with the Carolina Panthers in 2022. Under Dailey's mentorship, D.J. Moore caught 63 passes for 888 yards for a then-career-high seven touchdowns. With Dailey on staff, Carolina won four of their final six games en route to a second-place NFC South finish.

In his first stint at Boston College as wide receivers coach, Dailey helped the Eagles to consecutive bowl-eligible seasons. He mentored future first-round draft pick Zay Flowers during his sophomore and junior seasons in which he compiled a total of 100 catches for 1,638 yards and 14 touchdowns en route to All-ACC recognition both years. He became just the second Boston College All-ACC first-team wide receiver in school history in his sophomore season, joining Alex Amidon (2012).

Dailey initially came to Boston College after serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at New Mexico in 2019. Prior to New Mexico, Dailey spent seven seasons on staff at Liberty.

At Liberty, he was on Turner Gill's staff since 2012, first serving as quarterbacks coach before becoming the offensive coordinator in 2014. In 2018 Liberty ranked 34th nationally in points per game, averaging 33.3 points per game.

The Flames ranked 46th in yards per game at 422.9, including 261.5 yards per game in the air, good for 33rd nationally. Liberty quarterback Buckshot Calvert was 25th nationally in yards per game at 255.7, throwing for 3,068 yards for the year. The Flames also had a 1,000-yard receiver in Antonio Gandy-Golden, who caught 71 passes for 1,037 yards.

Dailey tutored Liberty quarterback Josh Woodrum, who was one of just 22 FCS players invited to the 2016 NFL Combine, eventually going 25-for-36 in the preseason with 321 yards and four touchdowns. Over his seven seasons with Liberty, the Flames won four league titles, advanced to the FCS Playoffs once and never had a losing season.

After his first season with Liberty, Dailey was invited to attend and participate in the NFL-NCAA Coaches Academy. The organization provides an opportunity for current and former NFL players who are looking to continue their careers on the football sidelines to learn leadership, management, and administrative skills from football coaches at all levels.

Dailey got his start in coaching at the University at Buffalo, where he served as an offensive graduate assistant in 2008 before becoming tight ends coach in 2009, both seasons under Gill. In 2008, the Bulls captured their first Mid-American Conference title, finishing 8-6 and playing in the 2009 International Bowl in Toronto. In both of his seasons with Buffalo, the Bulls ranked in the top 40 in offense.

Dailey then moved to Kansas for a year, where he served as recruiting coordinator before serving as quarterbacks coach at Bethune-Cookman.

Dailey, one of the nation's most sought-after run-pass high school quarterbacks, started his collegiate career at Nebraska. As a sophomore at Nebraska, Dailey established new quarterbacking standards. In Nebraska's matchup against Colorado, he became the first quarterback in program history to throw 300 yards in a game and set a single-game passing record with 342 yards in a 59-27 victory over Baylor.

After starting all 11 games in 2004, Dailey finished the season with 2,025 passing yards, the third-best season passing mark in Nebraska history. Dailey was a team captain as a sophomore, as well as a two-time member of the Brook Berringer Citizenship Team.

Dailey transferred to North Carolina where he finished the last two years of his playing career. In 2006, he started seven games as quarterback and led the program with 1,316 passing yards and seven touchdowns. The following year, Dailey finished his Tar Heel days as a starting wide receiver.

Dailey completed his collegiate playing career by throwing for 3,458 yards and 26 touchdowns while completing 52.7 percent of his pass attempts (274-of-520).

A native of Freehold, N.J., Dailey and his wife Carrie have four children, Stella, Noah, Myles and Tyson.



Jonathan DiBiaso
Matt and Rebecca Carroll Family Quarterbacks Coach

Jonathan DiBiaso enters his third season as the Matt and Rebecca Carroll Family Quarterbacks Coach after being promoted by head coach Bill O'Brien in 2024. He spent the 2023 season as an offensive analyst, working closely with the BC quarterbacks.

DiBiaso commanded an Eagles passing attack that finished fourteenth nationally in total passing offense in 2025, averaging 280.2 yards per game. In 10 games with nine starts at quarterback in his first full season, redshirt sophomore Dylan Lonergan registered 190 completions, moving him inside the top-10 in single-season completions in school history. Lonergan threw for over 2,000 yards and 12 touchdowns in his first season at Boston College. Redshirt senior Grayson James appeared in seven games with three starts at quarterback, throwing for over 1,100 yards and seven touchdowns.

In 2024, under DiBiaso's mentorship, QB Tommy Castellanos completed 288-of-491 passes for 3,614 yards and 33 passing touchdowns. On the ground, he added 1,307 rushing yards and 15 touchdowns, becoming the first player in Boston College history with 2,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a single season. DiBiaso oversaw QB Grayson James become the starter for the final four games of the season, where he completed 106-of-166 passes for 1,202 yards, six touchdowns and two interceptions.

With DiBiaso's assistance, Castellanos finished with the second-most rushing yards by an FBS quarterback (1,113), trailing only Heisman Winner Jayden Daniels. Castellanos finished tied with the most rushing touchdowns of any quarterback in FBS (13), and led Boston College to a Fenway Bowl championship.

After starting his coaching career on the Heights as a graduate assistant from 2018-2020, DiBiaso took an offensive analyst job at Vanderbilt in 2021. The 2021 Commodores offense averaged 313 yards per game, including 124 rushing yards per game.

From Vanderbilt, DiBiaso took a graduate assistant position at Pittsburgh for the 2022 season before returning to Boston College. At Pitt, he worked with a Panther team that went 9-4 and defeated UCLA in the Sun Bowl.

DiBiaso, who played high school football at Everett High School in Everett, Mass. for his father John DiBiaso, played two seasons at Dartmouth (2013-14) and two seasons at Tufts (2015-16), earning his degree from Tufts in 2018.



Mike Hart

Running Backs

Mike Hart begins his first season with the Boston College Football program as Running Backs Coach. He was most recently an Offensive Analyst with Eastern Michigan in 2025.

Hart brings 14 years of college coaching experience at Western Michigan, Syracuse, Indiana, Michigan, and Eastern Michigan. He served as Michigan's Interim Head Coach for one game in 2023, a 35-7 win over UNLV, on the way to the Wolverines winning a national championship. Michigan's all-time leading rusher, Hart was a two-time Doak Walker Award finalist and finished fifth in the 2006 Heisman Trophy voting.

As an Offensive Analyst in 2025, Hart was critical in running back Dontae McMillan rushing for over 1,000 yards and four others posting 100-yard games. The Eagles finished first in the MAC in fourth down offense at 61.1 percent. In addition, red zone offense closed at 94.6 percent, ranking second nationally and first in the MAC.

Hart returned to Ann Arbor in 2021 as Running Backs Coach and was elevated to Run-Game Coordinator in 2022 before serving as Interim Head Coach for one game in 2023.

Under Hart, Michigan's rushing attack paved the way to three straight Big Ten titles and a run to the 2023 College Football Playoff National Championship. He helped Blake Corum become Michigan's first back-to-back 1,000-yard rusher since Denard Robinson, as he also set the program rushing record with 58 scores on the ground in four years. Corum led the offense with 1,245 rushing yards and a school record 27 rushing touchdowns, earning unanimous All-American honors and a second straight Big Ten Running Back of the Year Award.

In 2022, Hart guided the Wolverine rushing attack to a top-15 national rank and the No. 1 rank in the Big Ten, including finishing the season ranked No. 5 nationally at 238.9 yards per game. U-M eclipsed 3,000 yards on the ground in two of his three seasons to go along with 39 touchdowns in 2021 (No. 1 in the NCAA) and 41 in 2022 (No. 2 in the NCAA).

Hart has coached two Wolverines to first-team All-Big Ten honors: Corum (2022) and Hassan Haskins (2021). Both backs rushed for at least 1,200 yards and scored at least 18 touchdowns. Haskins scored a Michigan record 20 rushing touchdowns and totaled 169 yards and five touchdowns in the 2021 win over Ohio State, becoming the first-ever player to score five times on the Buckeyes.

In his 10 seasons coaching before Michigan, Hart mentored four 1,000-yard rushers and the 2014 MAC Offensive Player of the Year, Jarvion Franklin.

Before returning to Ann Arbor, Hart spent four years coaching running backs at Indiana University (2017-20). As a member of the Hoosiers coaching staff, Hart was a 2018 Broyles Award nominee. He was elevated to Associate Head Coach in 2020 after serving as an Assistant Coach during the 2018 and 2019 seasons.

Hart returned to his home state as the running backs coach at Syracuse University for the 2016 season before accepting the running backs post at Indiana.

He spent two seasons in Kalamazoo (2014-15), helping Western Michigan earn consecutive bowl bids for the first time in school history in the 2015 Bahamas Bowl and 2014 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Hart coached a pair of Broncos' running backs to MAC Freshman of the Year honors after 1,000-yard rushing seasons. Jamauri Bogan rushed for 1,051 yards and was second in the league with 16 TDs in 2015.

Hart began his coaching career at Eastern Michigan, serving as Offensive Quality Control Coach in 2011 before being promoted to Running Backs Coach in 2012 and 2013.

Hart was a four-year starter at running back for the Wolverines (2004-07), and set the school record with 5,040 yards on 1,015 carries and 41 rushing touchdowns. He holds the Michigan record with 28 career 100-yard rushing games, and his 117.2 rushing yards per contest is at the top in school history.

He was a three-time All-Big Ten first team selection and was named the 2004 Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Hart shared the Bo Schembechler Most Valuable Player Award in 2006 and received the honor again in 2007.

After graduating from Michigan in 2009, Hart was selected by the Indianapolis Colts in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL Draft. He played three seasons for the Colts, carrying the ball 71 times for 264 yards and two TDs in 21 career games. He was a member of the Colts' Super Bowl XLIV team that was a runner-up to the New Orleans Saints in 2010.

A native of Syracuse, N.Y., Hart attended Onondaga Central High School. He set the national high school career record with 204 rushing touchdowns and finished second with 11,045 rushing yards. Onondaga Central compiled a 46-1 record and won three state championships during Hart's career.

Hart and his wife, Monique, have three children.



Jules Montinar
Defensive Backs

Jules Montinar enters his first season with the Boston College Football program as Defensive Backs Coach.

A 16-year coaching veteran, Montinar arrives at The Heights after serving as Cornerbacks Coach at Oklahoma State last season. He spent the 2023 and 2024 seasons as Defensive Pass Game Coordinator/Cornerbacks at East Carolina, where he led a 2024 defensive unit that finished the regular season ranked No. 9 nationally in defensive touchdowns, No. 11 in tackles for loss, No. 16 in red zone defense, No. 25 in turnovers gained, and No. 27 in interceptions.

Montinar was critical in the development of cornerback Shavon Revel while at East Carolina, who earned All-AAC second-team and All-AAC Honorable Mention honors under Montinar's guidance. Revel was later selected in the third round (76th overall) by the Dallas Cowboys in the 2025 NFL Draft.

Prior to his time at East Carolina, Montinar spent one season at Temple in 2022 serving as Cornerbacks Coach. Under Montinar's tutelage, the Owls finished third in the American and 28th nationally in pass defense.

Montinar was Florida's Cornerbacks Coach for one season in 2021, where he mentored a unit that ranked No. 1 in pass defense in the SEC, improving from a ninth-place ranking in 2020.

In 2020, Montinar was South Florida's Recruiting Coordinator/Cornerbacks, where the Bulls finished second in the American with 10 interceptions. He spent the 2019 season as Defensive Quality Control coach at Georgia.

From 2016-18, Montinar spent three seasons as Cornerbacks Coach at Texas State. Here, he established himself as an elite recruiter, earning 247Sports' 2017 Sun Belt Recruiter-of-the-Year honors.

While at James Madison from 2014-15, Montinar commanded a secondary that collected a total of 22 turnovers and scored seven touchdowns, with the Dukes' corners leading the FCS with four pick-sixes in 2014.

Montinar spent two years as a Graduate Assistant coaching the defense at Alabama from 2012-13, working alongside Nick Saban and Kirby Smart. Montinar began his coaching career working with linebackers and defensive ends at his alma mater, Eastern Kentucky, in 2008 and 2009. He also took part in the NFL's summer coaching internship program with the Cincinnati Bengals in 2007 and 2008.

Prior to getting into coaching, Montinar played at West Virginia before transferring to Eastern Kentucky. He participated in a pair of Gator Bowls while at West Virginia, and was a starting defensive back and special teams captain at Eastern Kentucky. He won an Ohio Valley Conference championship as a senior in 2007.

He and his wife, Brittany, have two sons, Madden and Maverick, and two daughters, Maya and Macy.



Dan O'Brien
Linebackers



A 2005 graduate of Boston College, Dan O'Brien enters his third season as linebackers coach for the Eagles football program.

Under O'Brien's guidance in 2025, redshirt senior captain linebacker Owen McGowan finished fourth on the team in total tackles with 54. O'Brien's group saw three underclassmen earn significant playing time in freshmen Griffin Collins and Zacari Thomas, and redshirt freshman Kemori Dixon.

O'Brien played a significant role in the development of LB Daveon Crouch in 2024, who registered 77 tackles, four pass break-ups, two sacks and two forced fumbles. Crouch's 77 total tackles was third-best on the team that season. In addition, team captain Kam Arnold totaled 40 tackles in six games before a season-ending injury in October. Under O'Brien's guidance, LB Owen McGowan recorded just under 30 tackles in nine games of action.

Before arriving at The Heights, O'Brien spent three seasons at Southern Miss. He began as the safeties coach from 2021-22 before assuming the defensive coordinator role in 2023.

O'Brien spent the two previous seasons at Georgia (2019-20) in defensive quality control. Over his two seasons at Georgia, O'Brien helped the Bulldogs post a 20-4 record, which included a SEC East Division title in 2019 to go along with appearances in the Sugar Bowl and Peach Bowl.

Previously, O'Brien coached five seasons at the Naval Academy (2014-18) as the safeties coach. The Midshipmen went 38-28 in that span with four bowl appearances, including wins over Pittsburgh (2015) and Virginia (2017) in the Military Bowl. In 2015, Navy won a school-record 11 wins and claimed the Commander-In-Chief's Trophy for the third time in four years. The Midshipmen finished that season ranked No. 18 in the country.

O'Brien arrived at Navy following a stop at Elon (2011-13) as defensive backs coach and a four-year spell at Alabama as a defensive graduate assistant (2007-08) and defensive analyst (2009-10). Alabama went 43-11 over that four-year stretch and won the 2009 BCS National Championship.

O'Brien was a student assistant at BC and earned his degree in communications. Upon graduation, he spent the 2005 season with the New England Patriots as a scouting assistant intern.

O'Brien's father, Tom O'Brien, was the head coach at BC from 1998-06.

He is married to the former Alicia Marcum and they have two sons; Rowan and Charlie.





Craig Fitzgerald
Director of Football Performance

A veteran with more than 25 years of experience at the collegiate and professional levels, Craig Fitzgerald enters his third season with the Boston College Football program as the director of football performance. He previously worked with head coach Bill O'Brien at Penn State (2012-13) and with the Houston Texans (2014-17).

Fitzgerald spent four seasons with the New York Giants as the head strength and conditioning coach before accepting a position at Florida in the 2023-24 offseason, but ultimately made the move to Chestnut Hill to reunite with O'Brien and work with the Eagles. He also has head strength coach experience at Harvard (2005-09), South Carolina (2009-11) and Tennessee (2018-19).

Fitzgerald holds the highest honor awarded in his profession, the certification of Master Strength and Conditioning Coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA). He is also certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

As a player, Fitzgerald was a three-year letterwinner and starting tight end at Maryland, where he earned his degree in 1996, after beginning his career as a walk-on.

Fitzgerald and his wife Mary have three sons; Mac, Joe and Luke.





THE RED BANDANNA GAME

- » Each year, Boston College honors **Welles Crowther '99** with its annual Red Bandanna Game. The red bandanna was a defining feature used to identify Crowther, who died in the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. Crowther, known to survivors as “The Man in the Red Bandanna” is credited with saving at least a dozen people in the South Tower of the World Trade Center.
- » Crowther played lacrosse at BC and worked as an equities trader on the 104th floor of the South Tower in New York City following graduation.
- » BC began its Red Bandanna Game tradition in 2014 with a 37-31 upset of No. 9 USC. The Eagles are 5-7 all-time in Red Bandanna Games.

- » Wide receiver Lewis Bond found the end zone for a 42-yard touchdown with 90 seconds to go to put the Eagles up four before BC sealed the game with a Max Tucker interception.

BOSTON (AP) - Derrick Knight ran for 205 yards and one touch-down and caught a 52-yard pass for another score Saturday as Boston College beat Rutgers 44-14, extending the Scarlet Knights' Big East losing streak to 22 games.

Boston College (8-4, 3-4) is likely to go to its school-record fourth consecutive postseason game, the San Francisco Bowl on Dec. 31. The Eagles have won eight or more games in consecutive regular seasons for the first time since Tom Coughlin's 1992-93 teams.

BOSTON (AP) - Paul Peterson scored on a 1-yard run and threw for a touchdown to lead No. 24 Boston College to a 21-10 victory over Rutgers on Saturday.

Peterson was 22-of-38 for 296 yards for BC (6-2, 2-1 Big East), but also fumbled once and threw two interceptions. The Eagles, who moved into the rankings for the first time since the 2001 season after beating Notre Dame on Oct. 23, are eligible for a bowl game for the sixth consecutive season.

On a day when BC wore throwback uniforms from 1984 - the year of Doug Flutie's last-second touchdown pass to Gerald Phelan to beat Miami - the Eagles didn't need any luck.

BC took the lead on the fifth play of the game when Mathias Kiwanuka intercepted Hart at the Rutgers 32 and ran it in, stretching to put the ball over the goal line.

BC made it 21-10 when Peterson hit David Kashetta for a 13-yard touchdown with 13:31 left in the game. On the two drives after Rutgers took the lead, Peterson was 8-for-10 for 118 yards and two TDs - one running and one passing.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. - For the first time since 2003, Boston College earned road victory over a Big Ten opponent as the Eagles came away with a 30-16 victory at Rutgers Saturday afternoon.

The Eagles moved to 3-1 with the win, while the Scarlet Knights dropped to 1-2.

BC totaled 272 yards on the ground, including a 42-yard touchdown run by David Bailey on the first drive of the game.

Junior running back AJ Dillon led the way with his 14th career 100-yard game rushing for 150 yards and two touchdowns in the victory.

The Eagles took the opening drive 79 yards, including 70 on the ground, and capped it with a 42-yard TD run by Bailey.

The Eagles have scored 24 points off turnovers this season following Brown's QB keeper off a second quarter fumble forced by Brandon Barlow.

Dillon totaled his 14th career 100-yard game to move into a tie for fifth place in BC history with Andre Williams.

CINCINNATI (AP) — JC French ran for three touchdowns and threw for another to lead Cincinnati to a 34-15 season-opening win over Boston College on Saturday.

It marked Cincinnati's 25th straight win in a home opener — the second-longest streak in the country behind Oklahoma State's 30.

French, who was making his first start since transferring from Georgia Southern, completed 10 of 14 passes for 77 yards and rushed for 52 yards on 10 carries.

"I thought JC played great," Cincinnati coach Scott Satterfield said. "He made great decisions in the run game; was very efficient throwing the football."

French said the rushing touchdowns more than made up for the lack of pass attempts.

"Whatever it takes to win, honestly, I'm good with," said French. "I don't even know if I got three (rushing touchdowns) in high school."

Gi'Bran Payne, a transfer from Notre Dame, rushed for a team-high 108 yards on 14 carries as Cincinnati finished with 340 yards of total offense, including 255 rushing.

"He was behind two first rounders (Jeremiyah Love and Jadarian Price) at Notre Dame and he came in here and to his credit has just worked his butt off," Satterfield said.

French increased Cincinnati's 10-0 halftime lead to 24-0 when he scored on 4-yard runs on each of the first two drives of the second half. The second came after cornerback Jacob Finley recovered a fumble by Boston College tight end Brady Clough on the Cincinnati 44.

Mason McKenzie, making his first start after transferring from Saginaw Valley State, completed 18 of 35 passes for 224 yards for BC (0-1). He was also the team's leading rusher with 78 yards on 20 carries.

Boston College scored its first touchdown on a 4-yard run by Evan Dickens late in the third.

Stephen Rusnak made a 45-yard field goal late in the fourth and French scored on a 2-yard run.

The takeaway

Boston College: Last season the Eagles ranked last in the Atlantic Coast Conference in yards allowed per game (433.3) but they held Cincinnati to 139 yards in the first half before wearing down. This was a positive start for new defensive coordinator Ted Roof.

Cincinnati: The Bearcats have a new defensive coordinator in Nate Woody, who changed the scheme from the 3-3-5 alignment of the last few seasons to an aggressive 3-4. His unit was fast and physical, recording four quarterback sacks, numerous quarterback pressures and forcing two turnovers.

"It was a much more exciting brand of defense," Satterfield said. "We were in the backfield a lot. We were pressuring him. We had tackles for loss on running backs. That's what we want to see."
