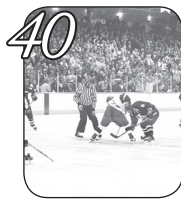

# BEMIDJI STATE Women's Hockey 2008-09

## 2008-09 OUTLOOK

The 2008-09 Bemidji State women's hockey team will have much to improve on from the 2007-08 squad that went 4-29-3 overall and 1-25-2 in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA). The team struggled to score goals and had a hard time hanging with the powerhouses. The 2006-07 team made history by going 11-20-5 overall and 9-15-4 in WCHA action, garnering a school-record 22 points and finishing sixth in the conference. The newest crop of Beavers will be looking to attain that same luster generated by the 2006-07 team, but it won't be easy competing in the WCHA, which consistently has four or five teams ranked in the top 10 in the country.

"Our goal is simple - we want to get a point every weekend," assistant coach **Shane Veenker** said. "It's a big accomplishment if you can get a point every weekend in this league because it's such a challenging conference. If we can get a point every weekend this season, then that will help us take this program where it needs to go."

Bemidji State will be considerably younger than years' past with the departure of 14 players from last year's team. BSU lost five graduating seniors, two juniors, four sophomores and three freshmen. Leaving with these players will be 18 of the team's 38 goals (47 percent) and 36 of the team's 55 total points (65 percent).

One of the departing players is Tara Hiscock, who ended her career 10th on the all-time points list at BSU with 56 career points (31 goals, 25 assists).

Although Bemidji State lost a large portion of its scoring, the biggest loss will be felt between the pipes. After four of the most historic years in school history, the Beavers were forced to say goodbye to Emily Brookshaw, who will go down as one of the greatest goaltenders to ever play the game. Brookshaw left BSU with multiple career records, including games played (110), minutes played (6075:02), shutouts (6), longest shutout sequence (120:13), lowest goals against average (2.98), highest save percentage (.911), and saves (3,075).

Brookshaw ended her illustrious career in the top five in the conference in three categories. She was second in the WCHA in minutes played, fourth in conference history in saves, and fifth all-time in minutes played.

She was also recognized as a finalist for the Patty Kazmeier award and earned a spot on the All-WCHA Third Team last season.

Many players exit from last season, but BSU has added 11 freshmen who have the potential to make up for those losses. Incoming players, by position, are six forwards, two defenders and three new goaltenders.

Bemidji State returns 12 letterwinners from 2007-08, which includes a two-year captain and the top two leading scorers. Senior defender **Brooke Collins** will wear the "C" this season for the second year, and her experience will be a necessity in teaching a young squad how to play at the Division I level. Also returning will be the top two scorers from last year in sophomore forwards **Erin Cody** (4 goals - 6 assists = 10 points last year) and **Annie Bauerfeld** (5-5=10).

"We have a young team and we want to build good habits within the team," assistant coach **Heather Farrell** said. "We are trying to create a sense of pride, passion and purpose to the program one step at a time. We want to create a culture here that's well-respected and that will allow us as a team to be leaders on campus."

One thing the Beavers will have in the upcoming season that they haven't had much of in years' past is consistency within the coaching staff. Coach **Steve Sertich** enters his third year at the helm, and his two assistants, Veenker and Farrell, are both entering their second seasons with the program. Together this group has brought in a plethora of talented young players that want to work and know what it will take to excel at this level.

"One of the strengths of this year's team is that we're young," Farrell said. "That is not a strength in a lot of programs, but our girls are impressionable. They're willing to work hard and learn, which is what it will take this year to maybe climb over a team or two in the league."

Creating an atmosphere of winning and breeding players with championship pedigree will be no easy task, but the coaching staff believes they have brought in the right combination of hockey players who, combined with the experience and abilities of the returning players, can continue building a foundation for present and future success at Bemidji State.

"It comes down to championship habits. We have to do the little things to make ourselves better. We have to pay attention to details because details are important," Veenker said. "We made a lot of changes coming off last year, but changes are exciting because a lot of these young players are going to get an opportunity to play right away, and it will be exciting to see what they will be able to do."

"One of our biggest goals for this year is to take a step forward. Taking one or two steps in this league will make for a great season for us. I think we're building something special here in Northern Minnesota that this community and this campus can be proud of."

### Forwards

As was the case going into last season, the biggest need for the Beavers this season is offense. Although BSU returns its top two scorers from last season, the team loses 65 percent of its total offense and 47 percent of its goal scoring. Also to note, BSU was last in the conference in goals scored with only 38 markers on the year.

BSU loses one of the greatest scorers in school history in Tara Hiscock. Hiscock ended her career with 31 goals and 25 assists for 56 points, tying her for 10th on the all-time points list in BSU history. She had a knack for finding the back of the net, and her production and leadership skills will be sorely missed this season. The three-time captain was third on the team in scoring her senior year, netting three goals and five assists for eight points. Other key losses are Julie Rising, Lisa Kissick, Jessica Pullar, Jaime LeDuc and Keeta Koalska.

Bemidji State returns eight forwards: one senior, two juniors and five sophomores. The Beavers top returning scorers are sophomores **Erin Cody** and **Annie Bauerfeld**. Both showed the ability to put the puck in the back of the net in just their first year of collegiate action, and the tandem will need to continue their progression and mature in order for the Beavers to succeed this season.

Cody (4-6=10) and Bauerfeld (5-5=10) will be looked upon to provide leadership for the freshman goal scorers on a team that is returning only six combined juniors and seniors. Bemidji State will be looking for these two players to be the spark plug on the offensive end and amass goals early and often.

They each earned a WCHA Rookie of the Week honor during their first year donning the green and white, which is no easy task, according to Veenker.

"Being named WCHA Rookie of the Week is a great reward because if you can do that in this league, it's an accomplishment," Veenker said. "Cody and Bauerfeld will be expected to improve on their performance from last year and add to it while leading our offense. It won't be easy, but those two will have to carry the mail for us up front."

Bemidji State scored a school-record four short-handed goals last season, but overall the special teams weren't exactly special. The Beavers were only 8-for-152 (5.3 percent) on the power play, and 149-for-186 (80.1 percent) on the penalty kill. These are numbers the young Beavers will look to improve upon going forward.

Senior **Monica Rawlings**, juniors **Franny Dorr** and **Nicole Rawlings**, and sophomores **Eva Schwaerzler**, **Erin Johnson** and **Carissa Ketcher** all return for BSU, and they will be looked upon to combine with Cody and Bauerfeld to bolster an offense that will be looking to score many goals this year.

Schwaerzler led the way for this group last season with two goals and three assists for five points. Dorr collected two goals and two assists for four points, and Johnson matched Dorr's four points with one goal and three assists. Monica recorded four assists last season, and Ketcher notched her first-career goal in the final home game of the season. Nicole recorded one assist last year.

BSU welcomes six freshman forwards in **Kaylee Keys**, **Emily Erickson**, **Erin Babineau**, **Marlee Wheelhouse**, **Hayley Williams** and **Lauren Williams**.

"We want to see this talented group of girls get better every shift, that's all we can expect," Veenker said. "There will be some growing pains, some tough lessons, but it will be our job to keep them going forward. There will be some tough shifts, some tough nights, but they are tough players who can handle adversity and they will learn from this season and get better for us."

### Defensemen

The back line for BSU will be the strong point of the team this season. Bemidji State's defense returns four players from a year ago who all played quality minutes and will look to show improvement.

The most valuable defenseman lost from a year ago would be Haley Balcom. Balcom was on the first defensive pairing all season, and was one of the biggest stalworths from a BSU squad that allowed 115 goals. The opposition scored 37 power-play goals and four short-handed goals against the Beavers.

Balcom scored one goal and three assists for four points. Wendy Bergh and Casey Irving are the only two other defensemen who will not be returning this year.

## 2008-09 OUTLOOK

Senior **Brooke Collins** (2-1=3) is the most experienced player returning to this year's squad, and for that she has been named the lone captain. This will be her second season donning the "C". Collins has played in every game during her career, and her consecutive-games-played streak now sits at 108. Farrell said Collins will be counted on to lead the defense, which is where the offensive attack will start from.

"Overall on the d-line we're going to be strong," Farrell said. "We have some good veteran defensemen coming back and Brooke will be leading the charge on the blue line.

"We start our offense from the goalie out and hopefully we get good first passes and get the puck out and we can transition quickly into the offense. It's nice that we have our captain back on defense to quarterback our offense."

Assisting Collins on defense will be three veterans in juniors **Jackie Robertson** and **Ashley Leopold** and sophomore **Lexy Parenteau**. These three players accounted for three goals and 10 assists for 13 points. Leopold led BSU in assists last season with six.

"Jackie's a warrior in games, and hopefully this will be Ashley's year to step up and contribute a lot as well," Farrell said. "We expect to be very strong on defense this season."

BSU welcomes two new members on the back line in **Montana Vichorek** and **Brittany DeBoer**. Farrell said she expects these two to jump right in and contribute early and often.

"Our freshmen coming in will have a big role to play in trying to figure out how to stop the offenses from the WCHA that they will be facing this season."

### Goaltending

The biggest unknown for Bemidji State this season will be in between the pipes. After losing the greatest goaltender in school history last season and the other two goalies on the roster, the Beavers will bring in three freshmen who will all try and collectively fill the void left by Emily Brookshaw.

Brookshaw set virtually every school record during her stellar four-year career at BSU, and whoever gets playing time this season will have to try and live up to those lofty expectations.

"Those will be some huge shoes to fill," Veenker said. "The bar has been set here at Bemidji State for goaltenders. We've been fortunate for a lot of years to have quality goaltenders, and we had one of the all-time greats graduate last season."

Also leaving the BSU program were Jessica Ptachick and Jennifer Bauer.

The three freshmen goaltenders who will fight for playing time will be **Alana McElhinney**, **Eri Kiribuchi** and **Zuzana Tomcikova**.

Not much is known about these players except they all have quality experience playing at a high level, and they all have what it takes to compete at the Division I level.

"It's a huge unknown back there, but Alana has been really impressive in fall camp," Veenker said. "For a 17-year old, we're expecting a lot from her. She expects a lot more out of herself than we do, and we knew right away that we found the right player for our program.

"The other two are unknowns. They're European kids

who've played for their national teams. All three have an opportunity to play and it will be exciting to see which ones step up and take the biggest strides this year."

### The Schedule

The Beavers open the exhibition season Sept. 26 against the University of Manitoba. This will be the third-straight year Bemidji State opens with the Bison.

New to the schedule this year is an exhibition game Sept. 27 against Team USA. The national team has planned games with most members of the WCHA in conjunction with its training for the upcoming Olympics, and BSU will play one of those games at the home ice arena, John Glas Fieldhouse.

The tenth season of BSU hockey begins Oct. 3-4, with a road series against Wayne State (Mich.) University, followed by the first home series of the season Oct. 10-11 against Northeastern University.

After the two non-conference opponents comes many consecutive weeks of conference play, and BSU will again have one of the toughest schedules in the country.

Oct. 17-18 will feature a home series with the University of Wisconsin, followed by two consecutive road trips to Ohio State University (Oct. 24-25) and Minnesota State University (Oct. 31-Nov. 1). Following that will be a home series with the University of Minnesota (Nov. 14-15) and a road series with St. Cloud State University (Nov. 21-22).

Moving into December brings the first meeting with the defending WCHA regular season, tournament and national champion University of Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs (Dec. 5-6).

After the road trip to Duluth, Minn., comes a home set with the University of North Dakota (Dec. 12-13) before the Beavers take off for the Christmas holidays.

Next on tap for BSU will be a road non-conference series with Robert Morris University (Jan. 2-3), followed by a home WCHA weekend against Minnesota State (Jan. 9-10).

The Beavers will bounce back and forth between hitting the road and staying at home from the Dec. 5-6 road matchup with the Bulldogs all the way until the two teams meet up again Feb. 6-7 in Bemidji.

BSU hits the road Jan. 16-17 in Minnesota, and comes back home for Alumni Weekend Jan. 23-24 against Ohio State.

The Beavers go back on the road to North Dakota (Jan. 30-31) before staying home for consecutive weekends against UMD (Feb. 6-7) and St. Cloud State (Feb. 13-14).

The final series of the season will be Feb. 20-21 against Wisconsin, and after that comes the WCHA Playoffs, the NCAA Regionals and the NCAA Frozen Four, which will be held in Boston, Mass., this season.

## Steve Sertich

Colorado College '74  
 Third year at Bemidji State



Steve Sertich enters his third season at Bemidji State. In his first season Sertich led the Beavers to an 11-20-5 overall record and a 9-15-4 record in Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) play, good for a sixth-place finish. The 22 points he garnered during that first year was the most points Bemidji State has earned in conference play in its nine-year Division I era. He also led the Beavers to its second win over the University of Minnesota in school history with a 2-0 shutout that was televised on Fox Sports Net North. Bemidji State compiled a six-game unbeaten streak, the longest unbeaten streak for the Beavers since the 2001-02 season.

Last year, coach Sertich compiled a 4-29-3 record and a 1-25-2 mark in the WCHA. The team recorded another shutout over a powerhouse, when the Beavers tied the then No. 2-ranked University of Wisconsin Badgers. This was the highest-ranked opponent to ever be shut out by a BSU squad.

During summer 2008, Sertich served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's

Under-22 Select team that played in the annual three-game Women's Under-22 Series with Canada, which took place from Aug. 20-23. The American squad finished with a 0-1-1-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record.

Sertich came to Bemidji State University after spending 13 years as the head varsity coach at Roseville Area High School. He coached the Roseville boys' team from 1993-2003, leading it to a 156-71-11 record and two Minnesota State tournament appearances. Under Sertich's guidance, Roseville finished third in the 2002 tournament and second in 2003. He led Roseville to Suburban East Conference Championships in 2002 and 2003. Sertich earned four Coach of the Year honors, as he was named Section 3AA boys' Coach of the Year in 1999, Section 2AA Boys' Coach of the Year in both 2002 and 2003, and Class AA Coach of the Year in 2003.

In 2003, Sertich moved to head coach of the Roseville girls' varsity team and in three seasons led the program to a record of 62-21-2. The Roseville girls finished fourth in the 2006 state tournament and captured Suburban East Conference titles in both '04 and '05. Sertich was named the 2004 Section 2AA Girls' Coach of the Year. Sertich began his coaching career in 1976 as the head boys' varsity coach at Northfield (Minn.) High School, and over the next 20 years he would hold a variety of head and assistant coaching positions at the high school, college and national levels.

After one year at Northfield, he moved on to Virginia (Minn.) High School as head boys' varsity hockey coach for one year, was an assistant with Team Midwest in the U.S. National Development Program at the 1979 Olympic Sports Festival, spent one year as an assistant at Colorado College in 1982-83, and served three years as an assistant coach at Palmer (Colo.) High School from 1983-86.

He returned back to Minnesota in 1987 as the assistant boys' varsity coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School and later served as an assistant at Richfield (Minn.) High School. In 1997, he was an assistant for Team Minnkota with the U.S. Development Program Select 17 program.

Sertich also has extensive camp coaching experience, starting as the director and head coach of the Minnesota Hockey Satellite Training Program in Roseville from 1995-2003. In addition, he has been the director of the Roseville Summer Hockey School since 2000 and the director and head coach of the Roseville Hockey Satellite Training Program since 2003.

Sertich began his playing career with the Colorado College Tigers in 1970 and assembled a standout four-year career, during which he played 125 games and scored 75-87=162 points. He had 28-25=53 points as a junior in 1972-73 and 25-36=61 points as a senior in 1973-74.

Sertich was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1973-75, and played on a team which trained in Bemidji. He was also a member of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, which finished fifth at the Innsbruck, Austria games. The U.S. team recorded wins over Finland and Poland en route to a 2-3 finish in Group A.

He also played two years in the German Professional League, spending the 1974-75 season as captain for Fussen and two seasons from 1978-80 playing for Nurnburg.

In May 2007, Sertich became the Vice President of Board of Directors for the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum located in Eveleth, Minn. Some of his responsibilities as Vice President of Board of Directors includes making decisions on marketing and purchasing endeavors, along with planning and making decisions for specific operations taking place throughout the year. Currently, Sertich is working on organizing the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum game which will be held in Eveleth. The first Hall of Fame game will take place Oct. 18 of this season, when the Beavers face the University of Wisconsin at the Hippodrome.

Sertich is a 1974 graduate of Colorado College with a bachelor's degree in elementary education and humanities. He received a master's degree in elementary education from Minnesota State in 1999.

Sertich's son, Marty Sertich, played for Colorado College from 2002-06 and scored 61-121=181 points during a stellar four-year career. He won the 2005 Hobey Baker Memorial Award, given to the most outstanding player in college hockey, and was a finalist for the award in 2006. He was First-Team All WCHA and WCHA Player of the Year in 2005 and was a second team All-WCHA selection in 2006. Marty is currently in the National Hockey League, playing in the Colorado Avalanche organization.

## A LOOK BACK AT 2007-08

### BSU finishes eighth in WCHA

Bemidji State ended the 2007-08 campaign with an overall record of 4-29-3, with all four wins coming at John Glas Fieldhouse. The four wins was the second-fewest in school history, and the fewest since the inaugural 1998-99 season. Although the Beavers were unable to get many wins, they still received much production from the young players on the squad. The 2007-08 squad went 1-25-2 in Western Collegiate Hockey Association play, garnering four total points for an eighth-place finish. The four points was the fewest points BSU has received in conference play in the nine-year history of the program. This came a year after the Beavers went 9-15-4 in conference play and earned a school-record 22 points in WCHA play.

### It's a celebration

Bemidji State is celebrating its tenth year of existence this season. The Beavers have created a special logo just for the occasion that will be used on all home game pucks and around the league. BSU is 87-214-32 (.309 win percentage) overall, and 51-158-23 (.269) all-time in WCHA action.

### Shutting out a powerhouse

Despite winning only four games during the 2007-08 season, the Beavers made history in one of their non-wins. On Nov. 24, 2007, BSU tied the University of Wisconsin 0-0 at John Glas Fieldhouse. The Badgers were ranked No. 2 in the country at the time, and were the two-time defending national champions. The Beavers earned just their second shutout over a ranked opponent in school history, and their highest-ranked opponent ever to be shut out. Goaltender Emily Brookshaw made 50 saves in the contest, stopping shots from everywhere. She recorded her sixth career shutout in the game.

### Playing the elite

BSU once again played against the toughest competition in Division I college hockey, competing against five of the top-10 teams in the nation. The Beavers played 18 games against five of the top-10s going 0-17-1 against the teams. The WCHA produced another national champion, this time with the University of Minnesota Duluth reclaiming the throne atop the land. UMD (5, 3, 2), Wisconsin (2, 5), Minnesota (4, 6), St. Cloud State (9) and Ohio State (10) were all ranked at some point in the season when matching up against BSU.

### WCHA weekly honors handed out

Three different Beavers earned WCHA Rookie of the Week honors last season. The first player to earn the award was Julie Rising in the first weekend Oct. 9. Erin Cody and Annie Bauerfeld each received the award in the month of January, with Cody earning the honor Jan. 3 and Bauerfeld receiving her award two weeks later on Jan. 15. Emily Brookshaw was named WCHA Defensive Player of the Week on two separate occasions, Oct. 16 and Nov. 27. The nomination in October was for saving a career-high 51 shots against the University of Minnesota Duluth. The nomination in November was for shutting out then No. 2-ranked Wisconsin in a 0-0 tie. During that game she broke the school record for saves in a career, which now stands at 3,075.

### Thirteen earn WCHA academic honors

BSU had 13 student-athletes, including all five seniors and all three goaltenders, named to the WCHA All-Academic Team. The number of honorees tied the school record for most players in BSU's nine-year Division I era to garner this award. Earning WCHA All-Academic honors for the Beavers were Haley Balcom, Jennifer Bauer, Wendy Bergh, Emily Brookshaw, Brooke Collins, Frances Dorr, Tara Hiscock, Kailee Jaeger, Lisa Kissick, Jaime LeDuc, Jessica Pullar, Jessica Ptachick and Monica Rawlings.

### WCHA scholar honors handed out

BSU had a school- and conference-record nine Beavers named to the 2007-08 WCHA Scholar-Athlete list. Haley Balcom, Jessica Pullar, Jennifer Bauer, Brooke Collins, Frances Dorr, Tara Hiscock, Lisa Kissick, Jessica Ptachick and Monica Rawlings were the Bemidji State players who were among the record 79 WCHA athletes bestowed the award for the 2007-08 season. The nine honorees are a record for Bemidji State, and tied the most by a female WCHA squad in the three-year history of the award.



### Short-handed goals

Bemidji State set the school mark for short-handed goals in a season last year, notching four during the 2007-08 campaign. Julie Rising notched a shorty in the first game of the season against Minnesota State University. Erin Cody registered a short-handed goal against the University of Vermont in BSU's second win of the season. Tara Hiscock scored her shorty against Minnesota State, and Lisa Kissick scored the fourth short-handed goal of the season during the last game of the campaign against the University of Minnesota Duluth, which was also the final game of her career.

### Entering the top 10

Tara Hiscock finished her career with 31 goals and 25 assists, giving her 56 career points and moving her into a tie for 10th place on BSU's career scoring list. She was third on the team in scoring last season with three goals and five assists for eight points.

### Losing alot

Bemidji State will be considerably younger than years' past with the departure of 14 players from last year's team. BSU lost five graduating seniors, two juniors, four sophomores and three freshmen. The seniors who graduated were Emily Brookshaw, Tara Hiscock, Haley Balcom, Jessica Pullar and Jaime LeDuc. The departing juniors were Lisa Kissick and Wendy Bergh. The sophomores no longer with the team were Jessica Tyra,

Jessica Ptachick, Casey Irving, and Kailee Jaeger, and the freshmen who left were Julie Rising, Jennifer Bauer and Keeta Koalska. Leaving with those players is 18 of the team's 38 goals (47 percent) and 36 of the team's 55 total points (65 percent).

### Special teams?

Bemidji State's special teams were not so special last season, as the Beavers went just 8-for-152 (5.3 percent) on power-plays and 149-for-186 (80.1 percent) on the penalty kill. Both marks were near the bottom in the WCHA. BSU did score four short-handed goals, but the team also gave up four short-handed markers. The Beavers also allowed teams to go 37-for-186 (20 percent) on man-advantages and 144-152 on the penalty kill (94.7 percent).

### Ending on top of everything

Emily Brookshaw finished her storied career atop virtually every BSU career category. She will go down as one of the greatest goaltenders to ever play the game. Brookshaw left BSU with multiple career records, including games played (110), minutes played (6075:02), shut-outs (6), longest shutout sequence (120:13), lowest goals against average (2.98), highest save percentage (.911), and saves (3,075). Brookshaw ended her illustrious career in the top five in the conference in three categories. She was second in the WCHA in minutes played, fourth in conference history in saves, and fifth all-time in minutes played. She was also recognized as a finalist for the Patty Kazmeier award, and earned a spot on the All-WCHA Third Team last season.

### Sertich ends second season

Bemidji State coach Steve Sertich completed his second season with the program, and he will enter his third season as the second-longest tenured coach in school history. In his first year with the team, he took the Beavers to an 11-20-5 overall record and a 9-15-4 mark in conference play, garnering a school-record 22 points in WCHA action. He has a career record of 15-49-8 overall and a 10-40-6 mark in the conference.

### Freshmen production

The Bemidji State freshmen led the team in scoring by far during the 2007-08 campaign. Three of the four leading scorers on last year's team were freshmen. The top two scorers from a year ago were Erin Cody (4-6=10) and Annie Bauerfeld (5-5=10), and Julie Rising (5-2=7) finished in fourth. Also assisting with the rookie point totals were Eva Schwaerzler (2-3=5), Erin Johnson (1-3=4), Lexy Parenteau (1-3=4), Keeta Koalska (1-0=1) and Carissa Ketcher. (1-0=1). Overall, the freshmen accounted for 20 goals and 22 assists for 42 points. BSU as a team scored 38 goals with 53 assists and 91 points.

### Battle tested

Tara Hiscock and Haley Balcom both played in 143 career games, which included all 36 from last year. The tandem moved into first place all-time in school history in games played, beating the old record of 141. Current senior defenseman Brooke Collins is on pace to snag this record from Hiscock and Balcom by seasons' end. BSU will play a minimum of 36 games, and if Collins can stay healthy and play in every game, she will beat the record by one, with 144. Collins has played in every game during her career.

It took an outstanding performance from the goaltender and the most goals scored in a single game all season, but BSU won its first game of the season 3-2 in the first-ever meeting with Robert Morris. The game started off slow, with neither team able to notch a first-period goal. BSU outshot RMU 10-5 in the opening frame, but couldn't find the net in the early going. There were five penalties called between the two teams, but they were unable to convert on their respective power plays. That was until Kylie Rossler of RMU was called for interference with 44 seconds remaining in the first. Bemidji State took the opening faceoff of the second period, and proceeded to pass the puck around the outside trying to set up a goal opportunity. Ashley Leopold dished it off to Franny Dorr on the right side along the blue line. Dorr passed it back to Leopold who was still waiting at center ice, and she fired a shot in the upper right-hand corner of the net, zooming past Colonials and Beavers along the way. The goal was scored 41 seconds into the second period and was just the second power-play goal of the season for Bemidji State. The Beavers came into the game 1-of-50 on the man advantage this season. They would finish the game 1-for-4. The goal was even more of a surprise considering the Colonials had killed 53 of the last 60 opposing

power-plays faced, which was ninth in the country. Julie Rising was the next Beaver to get in on the action. She stole the puck at mid ice and scored an unassisted goal 2:27 into the third period, putting BSU ahead 2-0. Less than a minute later, 3:15 into the third, Keeta Koalska scored a goal by rebounding a missed shot from Eva Schwaerzler. The goal was the first of Koalska's career, making her the sixth BSU freshman to score a goal this season. Schwaerzler notched her second assist in as many weeks, helping out on a goal last weekend at Niagara. With the game intact and BSU ahead 3-0, it appeared as if the team would cruise to its first victory. This was the largest lead the Beavers had all season, and they found out the hard way that wins don't come that easy. In a frantic few minutes filled with BSU penalties and RMU goals, Sara O'Malley and Kristen Miles each scored power-play goals to try and bring the Colonials back. O'Malley's goal came at the 14:05 mark and was her eighth of the season. She was assisted by Whitney Pappas (fourth assist of the season) and Jacki Gibson (second). Miles' goal came with just 2:12 remaining in the game, and was her second of the year. It was assisted by Rossler (third) and Megan Picinic (fifth). With just 1:23 remaining and both teams at full strength, Robert Morris pulled its goaltender to try and notch a game-tying goal. BSU was able to fend off many late attempts, and the Beavers held on for their first win of the season. The victory ended the longest winless drought in BSU history, which stood at 15 games dating back to last season. Emily Brookshaw was phenomenal in net for the Beavers, nearly pitching a shutout. She would have gotten that shutout had it not been for a few penalties late in the game that allowed the Colonials to score those two power-play goals. Brookshaw finished the game with 24 saves, and it turned out the Beavers needed every single one of them. She now has 21 career wins for BSU, five away from tying the all-time record set by Bre Dedrickson (1999-03). Brianna McLaughlin (4-7-1) played all but the last 1:23. She had 23 saves in the contest and was credited with the loss. Leopold's goal was her first of the season, the second-career power-play goal of her career and her third career goal. Her last goal came Nov. 18, 2006, in a game against Wisconsin. Dorr's assist gave her two for her career, with her last one coming on Feb. 4, 2007. Rising must like the home crowd because she scored three goals this season, with all of them coming in BSU's three home games. Friday's goal was the first for Rising since she scored two goals in her first two collegiate games back on Oct. 5-6, 2007, against Minnesota State, Mankato. Robert Morris is now 0-8-2 all-time against teams from the WCHA. The loss to BSU also snapped a four-game win streak for the Colonials.

Emily Brookshaw saved a shot from a Wisconsin player late in the second period to give her the all-time record for saves by a Bemidji State women's hockey player. That was only the beginning for the Beavers in terms of setting records. Bemidji State skated to a 0-0 overtime tie against the No. 2-ranked Badgers a day removed from being defeated 7-0. This marked the first time BSU had ever shut out the Badgers, and also snapped a 20-game losing streak to UW that dated back to a 2-2 tie on Dec. 6, 2002. The Beavers came out of the gates looking like a different team than the one that was defeated the night before. BSU controlled the puck for long stretches of the opening period, and even managed three shots on goal after only attempting one Friday. Bemidji State also allowed only 14 shots to UW, which were all saved by Brookshaw. Erin Johnson was the only Beaver to go into the penalty box in the first period, which was much better than the four penalties committed in the opening period of the first game of the series. The second period was more of the same for the two teams. Wisconsin attempted 14 shots, BSU got off three and neither team was able to put one in the net thanks in large part to more unbelievable saves by Brookshaw. Wisconsin cranked up the offense in the third period, and the Beavers didn't help themselves by committing three penalties after only having three in the first two periods. The Badgers peppered Brookshaw with 20 shots in the final frame, yet she continued to fend them all off with amazing save after amazing save. She finished the game with 50 saves, which is a career-high for her in that department. Her previous high was the 47 saves she had in a 4-0 loss to Minnesota Duluth Oct. 13 of this year. Brookshaw now has 2,405 career saves, which broke the previous record of 2,379 held by Bre Detricrickson (1999-2003). Brookshaw also passed Detricrickson earlier in the season in career games played with 90 to Detricrickson's 81. The stellar Bemidji State goaltender also moved into sixth place in Western Collegiate Hockey Association history for career saves. Brookshaw's career games played are good for eighth all-time in conference history, and she is one shy of tying for seventh on that list. She is ninth all-time in minutes played in WCHA history, and is also tied for 15th with her six career shutouts. Speaking of shutouts, this was the first time Bemidji State had ever shut out Wisconsin in 36 games played in the series. This was also the first time UW had been shut out since Nov. 24, 2006, when the Badgers were shut out by Minnesota Duluth. The tie with Bemidji State also marked just the eighth time in the last six years that Wisconsin had been shut out. Minnesota (3), Minnesota Duluth (2), New Hampshire and St. Cloud State are the only other teams that can boast a shut out of the Badgers during that span.

Emily Brookshaw had 22 saves against St. Cloud, but it wasn't enough for the BSU as the Beavers fell 1-0 to the Huskies. The Beavers got down by three goals early in the opening period, but Balcom made sure they wouldn't be shut out for the seventh-straight game. Felicia Nelson scored her second goal of the game 18:14 into the first period, giving SCSU a 3-0 lead. It took Balcom only 35 seconds to respond with a goal of her own. Bemidji State controlled the puck deep in the Huskie zone, and Erin Cody attempted a shot that was deflected behind the SCSU net. One of the Huskies attempted to clear the puck by passing it up the boards, but it was intercepted by Balcom who skated down on the right side of the net. She saw a small window and wasted no time in firing the puck from deep on the right side above the right shoulder of the goalie into the upper left corner of the net. The goal was Balcom's fifth of her career and the first by a member of the senior class this season. St. Cloud State notched one more goal in the second period to leave Bemidji with the two-game sweep and drop the Beavers to 1-14-3 on the season and 0-12-2 in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. BSU hadn't played a game in nearly three weeks, and that might have been just the break it needed. The Beavers returned to action by scoring four first-period goals en route to a 4-1 win over Vermont. Lisa Kissick got things started by blasting her first goal of the season into the net just 8:38 into the game. Brooke Collins and Jessica Pullar added assists on the goal that gave the Beavers their third 1-0 lead of the season. BSU followed that up by jumping out to two, three and four goal leads. The Beavers have had two and three goal leads just once this year, both coming in the first win of the season, which was a 3-2 victory over Robert Morris on Nov. 16. This was the first four-goal lead of the season. Ashley Leopold was whistled for checking 11:44 into the game, but it was the Beavers who took advantage of the Vermont power play. Erin Cody stole a Catamount pass deep in their territory and, at the 12:49 mark, fired a one-timer top shelf past the UV goaltender for her second goal of the year, giving Bemidji State its second short-handed goal of the season and the first since the opening game of the 2007-08 campaign when Julie Rising scored short-handed against Minnesota State, Mankato. The two goals tied last year's mark of short-handed goals in a season. It didn't take BSU long to add another goal, when Annie Bauerfeld scored at the 14:25 mark with assists from Cody and Wendy Bergh. Cody helped on her third career goal and Bergh notched her second career assist and point. Tara Hiscock scored her first goal of the season and the 29th of her career with 3:15 remaining in the opening period. Kissick and Pullar added helpers on the goal, giving them the first and fourth multi-point games of their careers, respectively. Pullar tied her career high with two assists in the game, which was the second time she had accomplished the feat in her career and the first since Nov. 6, 2004. Molly Morrison prevented the shutout by scoring a power-play goal with 3:56 left in the second period off assists by Jackie Thode and Saleah Morrison. Emily Brookshaw had 20 saves and allowed just the one goal in net for the Beavers. She improved to 2-13-3 on the season, increased her incredible save percentage to .927 and lowered her goals against average to 2.47. Kristen Olychuck took the loss after allowing the four first-period goals and saving 31 shots. Brookshaw now has 2,553 career saves, which puts her fourth all-time in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for most goals in a career. BSU moves to 2-0-1 all-time against Vermont and 2-5-1 against teams for the Hockey East Association. Cody was credited with the game-winning goal, and now both game-winners have been scored by freshmen. Bemidji State has now scored seven first-period goals, tying with the third period for most goals per period. The 4-0 lead after the opening frame was the first lead after one period all season, and the 4-1 lead after the second period was the second lead after two periods this year, with the other coming in the victory over Robert Morris. BSU outshot the Catamounts 35-21, which tied for the most shots attempted this season and is the first time the Beavers have won when outshooting their opponent. The four goals were the most scored since a 4-1 win over North Dakota Jan. 12, 2007. This also marked just the 12th time in school history the Beavers have scored at least four goals in a single period, and the first time since Jan. 25, 2003. BSU sports a 10-1-1 record in games when scoring at least four goals in one period.

Special teams play contributed to four goals, but it was the one even-strength goal that proved to be the difference in BSU's 3-2 victory over Vermont. BSU went to work early after Saleah Morrison was whistled for tripping 30 seconds into the game. The Beavers worked the puck around the zone trying to find a weakness to attack in the Catamount defense, and they struck with 20 seconds left in the power play. Annie Bauerfeld received a pass on the left side along the boards, and she passed the puck near the blue line to Ashley Leopold. Leopold fired a shot wide right of the net, but Julie Rising was there to deflect the puck into the net for her fourth goal of the season, giving BSU a 1-0 lead for the second-consecutive game and just the fourth time this year. Bauerfeld and Leopold both added their second helpers of the season. Instead of taking the early advantage and running with it like in Saturday's 4-1 victory, the Beavers had to work a little harder for the win after allowing Vermont to hang around by committing numerous penalties and giving the Catamounts a plethora of chances to score with a man advantage. Kailee Jaeger entered the penalty box 5:10 into the first period after being whistled for tripping, and Celeste Doucet tied the game at 1-1 exactly one minute into the power play off an assist by Teddy Fortin. Lisa Kissick gave BSU a 2-1 lead after she beat the UV goaltender for the only even-strength goal of the game with just 1:52 remaining in the opening frame off an assist from Jessica Tyra. Kissick rifled a shot in front of the net that ricocheted behind the goal line. Tyra calmly collected the rebound, dumped the puck back across the line to Kissick who pumped in her second goal of the season and second goal in as many games. Tyra notched her second career point, second career assist and first point of the 2007-08 campaign. After all the frantic scoring of the first period, both teams decided to take a period off in the second, even though Bemidji State attempted 10 shots - which were the most in any period for the Beavers during the game - and the two teams combined to go 0-for-3 on the power play. Karen Sentoff gave BSU its last chance to score on a power play when she was whistled for holding 7:31 into the final period. The Beavers used as much of the two-minute penalty as they could, but were finally able to score with just 10 seconds remaining in the man-advantage. Haley Balcom fired a pass to Erin Johnson, who gave the puck to Tara Hiscock near the center of the left circle of the Catamount zone. She didn't hesitate and smoked the puck top-shelf right past the UV goaltender for her second goal of the season and second goal in as many games. Balcom added her third helper of the year and Johnson notched her first career point in what proved to be the eventual game-winning goal. Peggy Wakeham scored a goal with 9:27 remaining in the game to move the score to the 3-2 final, and the Catamounts gave a valiant effort to tie the game up, but it wasn't enough as they dropped to 4-11-1 on the season and have now not won a game in their last 12 attempts. Vermont had numerous chances late in the game, but Jennifer Bauer made tremendous saves late in the game in net for the Beavers and the BSU defense held strong for the last remaining minutes - which included another penalty kill and a pulled goalie for the final 37 seconds of the game - to put the Catamounts away in the Beavers first series win and sweep of the season. Bauer earned her first collegiate victory after saving 25 shots for Bemidji State. Ashley Walenty fell to 0-2-0 on the season after saving only 22 shots and allowing three goals. The series sweep snapped a 16-series non-sweep streak, dating back to a Jan.12-13, 2007 series sweep over North Dakota. The non-sweep streak was one shy of tying the longest such streak in school history. The seven goals scored in the series were the most in any series this year, with the next closest being three. Hiscock scored her team-leading 30th career goal, and she now has 14 career power-play goals, which moves her one shy of the all-time BSU record for power-play goals in a career set by Amber Fryklund (2000-03). Hiscock became the first non-freshman to score a game-winning goal this season, and she now has six career game-winning goals, which is also one shy of the school record set by Fryklund. Bemidji State finished the game 2-for-4 on the power play, which was a far cry from its 2-for-85 numbers it had put up on the man-advantage this year. Vermont ended the contest 2-for-7 on the power play after scoring on just seven percent (6-for-75) coming into the matchup. Dorr's numbers might have been the most impressive considering she has played defense all season and moved to center on the second forward line for the weekend series with Vermont.

For the second time in three weeks, BSU jumped out to a quick 2-0 lead. But, just as before, the Beavers gave up multiple goals to lose the game, this time in a 6-3 loss against Ohio State. Jessica Pullar got BSU on the board 8:53 into the first period by pumping a rebound into the back of the net. Erin Cody assisted on Pullar's goal, and then scored a power-play goal of her own just 2:51 later off assists by Ashley Leopold and Julie Rising. Erin Keys netted a goal for Ohio State at the 14:30 mark off assists from Mallory Peckels and Lisa Chesson, and the Beavers were able to fend off the other 19 shots of the period to skate into the first intermission with a 2-1 advantage. After giving up a late goal to Jenna Kilpatrick at the 15:41 mark of the second stanza, it looked as if BSU would be able to get into the second intermission with a 2-2 tie, with the chance of netting a game-winner in the third frame. It may have taken 116 games, but it was well worth the wait. In her final game at John Glas Fieldhouse, Jaime LeDuc scored her first collegiate goal to help lead BSU to a 3-2 loss Saturday afternoon against Ohio State on her day - Senior Day. The Buckeyes jumped out to a 1-0 lead just 29 seconds into the contest when Erin Keys found the back of the net off assists by Morgan Marziali and Hayley Klassen. There was a scrap in front of the net after Emily Brookshaw made an impressive save, and Keys was able to pick up the loose puck and sneak it by the BSU goaltender. Instead of giving up and allowing the Buckeyes to skate out of Bemidji with an easy win, the Beavers made OSU earn the victory. The scoring began for BSU when LeDuc controlled the puck behind the Ohio State goal, and, at the 14:10 mark, sniped a pass through the Buckeye defense to linemate Carissa Ketcher, who easily beat the goaltender for her first collegiate goal. It was LeDuc's first assist of the season, and now every BSU freshman has scored a goal this year. Bemidji State was ready to skate into the first intermission with all the momentum and a 1-1 tie. That was until Tessa Bonhomme was able to sneak one by Brookshaw with just 1:25 left in the period off assists by Marziali and Klassen to give Ohio State the lead heading into the break. The Beavers scratched and clawed their way through the second period, getting multiple solid looks at the net without being able to light the lamp. Then, after Monica Rawlings made a crucial error by being called for a holding penalty, the Buckeyes jumped on their chance as Shannon Reilly netted a power-play goal at the 13:40 mark off assists by Lisa Chesson and Bonhomme to give OSU the 3-1 advantage. Then, at the 17:12 mark of the second period, Rawlings was taking a faceoff in the right circle of the OSU zone. She won the draw, and the puck went through the legs of Ketcher, off the boards and onto the stick of Lexy Parenteau. Without hesitation, Parenteau rifled a shot just wide of the OSU goaltender, Liana Bonanno, on the left side. Bonanno was unable to cradle the shot, and the puck hit off the head of LeDuc, falling harmlessly to the ground. Bonanno was caught too far out of her net trying to stop Parenteau's shot, and LeDuc was able to take the puck and bash it into the back of the net for the first time in her career. The BSU bench erupted and all LeDuc's teammates celebrated the goal that was 116 games in the making. That goal seemed to be the spark the Beavers were looking for, as they cranked up the pressure in a third period that saw them get numerous great opportunities on net. Their best chance was in the last few minutes, when they kept firing shot after shot at Bonanno with no luck. Eventually, after pulling Brookshaw and still being unable to notch a goal, Bemidji State simply ran out of time and ended the game with a 3-2 loss. Brookshaw saved 34 shots and allowed the three goals in net for Bemidji State, and Bonanno gave up the two goals and saved 25 en route to another victory over BSU. Ohio State outshot the Beavers 37-27, but Bemidji State took the faceoff battle 38-37. BSU received a superb effort from Emily Brookshaw in a losing effort as the Beavers fell 6-0 to No. 3-ranked Minnesota Duluth. The first game of the first round of the WCHA Quarterfinals went to UMD, who attempted 53 shots. The shots were the most ever against Brookshaw in a single game, and she matched her second-most saves ever in a game with 47. The previous high for shots faced happened, ironically, the first time these same Beavers traveled to Duluth earlier this season to face the powerful Bulldogs. On Oct. 14, Bemidji State fell to UMD 4-0, and the Bulldogs attempted 51 shots with Brookshaw saving 47. That set her career mark for saves in a game until later in the season when she saved 50 against then-No. 2 Wisconsin in a 0-0 tie. The goal spree started after Bemidji State was able to skate to a 0-0 tie after the first period. Laura Fridfinnson scored a short-handed goal with assists from Haley Irwin and Heidi Pelttari just 55 seconds into the second, and after they got started, it was hard to slow down the offensive-minded Bulldogs. Saara Tuominen and Myriam Trepanier each notched second-period goals with assists to Trepanier, Sara O'Toole, Tuominen and Elin Holmlöv. Emmanuelle Blais put in two third-period goals, including the final goal with just 32 seconds remaining in the game. Karine Demeule also notched a third-period marker. Irwin, Fridfinnson (2), Erin Olson, Jocelyne Larocque and Tara Gray each recorded a third-period assist. Bemidji State went 0-for-7 on the power-play and the Bulldogs were 1-for-6. The Beavers were out-shot 53-13. Minnesota Duluth played all three of its goaltenders. Kim Martin recorded the win after playing the first two periods and a chunk of the third, saving 10 shots. Johanna Ellison came on in relief and saved two shots, and Amie Meyer finished the game, saving one. Tara Hiscock led the Beavers in the shot department with four. She and Haley Balcom both played in their 142nd career game, taking over sole possession of the No. 1 spot in Bemidji State history. BSU ended its season with a 5-1 loss to No. 3-ranked Minnesota Duluth. After getting shut out in the first game of the first round of the WCHA Quarterfinals Friday, Lisa Kissick made sure BSU would not be shut out again as she scored her first career short-handed goal with 41 seconds left in the game. Her goal gave BSU a school record four short-handed markers for the season. Julie Rising, Erin Cody and Tara Hiscock were the other Beavers to score shorty's this year. Bemidji State was unable to shut out the Bulldogs in the first period, something it had done the night before. Sara O'Toole put the puck in the net just 1:20 into the game with assists to Elin Holmlöv and Saara Tuominen, and Minnesota Duluth entered the first intermission with a 1-0 lead. Jocelyne Larocque and Laura Fridfinnson each netted goals in the second period off assists by Myriam Trepanier, O'Toole, Heidi Pelttari and Haley Irwin. Emmanuelle Blais and Fridfinnson put UMD ahead 5-0 in the third period with goals just 50 seconds apart midway through the final stanza. Irwin, Pelttari, Trepanier and Libby Guzzo all had assists on the two goals. Kissick got her goal at the 19:19 mark to give the Beavers their first goal of the two-game sweep. She finished the year tied with Annie Bauerfeld and Rising for the most goals on the team with five. Bemidji State ended its season with a 4-29-3 record overall and a 1-25-2 mark in conference play. The four wins are the second-lowest in school history, with the two wins in the team's first season (1998-99) being the only other year the Beavers didn't achieve at least five wins. Emily Brookshaw saved 43 shots in net for BSU, giving her a final total of 3,075 for her illustrious four-year career. She sits alone on top of the Bemidji State record books in multiple categories, including career saves, shots faced, shutouts, minutes played, games played, goals against average and save percentage. She had a career save percentage of .911 and a 2.98 goals against average, making her the only Beaver goaltender to ever finish a career with a GAA less than 3.00, and a save percentage higher than .900. She finished just two saves shy of tying for third place for career saves in Western Collegiate Hockey Association history. She did, however, move into second all-time in conference history with 110 career games played, and is fifth in minutes played with 6075:02. The top two leading scorers on the team this year were Bauerfeld (5-5=10) and Cody (4-6=10), both freshman. Hiscock finished in third with three goals and five assists. She and Haley Balcom both played 143 career games, making them each first in BSU history. Jessica Pullar finished her career with 139 games played, putting her in a tie for sixth place on the all-time school list.

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association Women's League looks to continue the success it had the previous nine seasons, as the league has amassed nine national championships. In its first year of existence, Minnesota took home the 2000 ACHA Championship, while Minnesota Duluth captured the 2001, 2002 and 2003 NCAA Championships. Minnesota solidified the league's fifth and sixth national titles by bringing home the trophy in 2004 and 2005. In 2006, Wisconsin beat Minnesota 3-0 at Ridder Arena to bring home the league's seventh title, and the Badgers won the title again in '07. Not to be outdone, the Bulldogs reclaimed the top spot in the land with a championship by beating Wisconsin last year.

The WCHA is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA. It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League. It is not only the oldest league, but the most successful as well. In the league's 46-year history, member schools have claimed 34 NCAA Championships.

The WCHA Women's League began for the 1999-00 season with seven charter members: Bemidji State University; University of Minnesota; University of Minnesota Duluth; Minnesota State University; Ohio State University; St. Cloud State University and University of Wisconsin.

Three of the schools, Minnesota Duluth, Ohio State and Wisconsin, are in their ninth year of their programs while programs at Bemidji State, Minnesota State and St. Cloud State are beginning their tenth year of existence. Minnesota started its program in 1997-98 and is the first of the league's teams to reach the 11th season. North Dakota will be going into its fifth season in the WCHA.

The WCHA took its first step towards creating a women's league at its annual meeting in Marco Island, Fla., April 29, 1999. The unanimous vote followed a year-long planning process. On June 29, 1999, the WCHA announced the hiring of Sara Martin as associate commissioner with primary responsibilities for the women's league.

The WCHA followed up on that commitment in 1999-00. In its first year, the league race came down to the wire as Minnesota Duluth edged Minnesota by one point for the league title. The two teams met for the league championship March 4, 2000, in Bloomington, Minn., as the Bulldogs claimed the title in a 2-0 victory.

Minnesota would rebound from its narrow second-place regular-season finish in 1999-00, turning the tables and topping Minnesota Duluth by four points for the 2000-01 regular-season crown. The Golden Gophers would be upset by Ohio State in the second round of the WCHA Tournament, which UMD would go on to win with a 3-0 win over Ohio State before advancing to the NCAA Championship.

Minnesota claimed both the regular-season and WCHA Tournament titles in 2001-02, but again the Bulldogs finished as the national champion by defeating Brown 3-2. The Bulldogs earned a triple crown of sorts in the 2002-03 season, as UMD earned the WCHA regular-season title, the WCHA Tournament title and their third-consecutive national title with a 4-3 overtime triumph over Harvard.

Minnesota finally broke Minnesota Duluth's reign atop the Division I women's hockey world in 2003-04, as UM compiled a 30-4-2 overall record and a 19-3-2 conference record en-route to its third WCHA regular-season title. The Golden Gophers used a home-ice advantage at Ridder Arena to win the WCHA Final Five Championship 4-2 over Minnesota Duluth. Minnesota then took home the biggest prize, the 2003-04 NCAA National Championship.

Minnesota made it a clean sweep in 2004-05 as they won the WCHA regular season title, conference tournament title and the Division I National Championship. The Gophers compiled an overall record of 36-2-2 and a conference record of 25-1-2. It was the Gophers fourth WCHA regular-season title.

Wisconsin snapped the Minnesota's run of two-straight championships as they won the WCHA regular season title, conference tournament title and the Division I National Championship in the 2005-06 season. The Badgers garnered an overall record of 36-4-1 and a conference record of 24-3-1. It was UW's first WCHA regular season title, and its first national title.

The Badgers garnered a 23-1-4 overall record in 2006-07, again claiming the trifecta of the WCHA regular season title, the conference tournament title and the Division I National Championship.

Minnesota Duluth reclaimed its spot atop the country in 2007-08, sweeping the three titles as the Bulldogs won the WCHA regular season title, the conference tournament title and the D-I National Championship over Wisconsin.

# BEMIDJI STATE Women's Hockey 2008-09

## JOHN S. GLAS FIELDHOUSE



The John S. Glas Fieldhouse debuted as the fourth home of the Bemidji State men's ice hockey program on Nov. 17, 1967 with the introduction of the Fieldhouse Expansion to the BSU Physical Education Complex. In the 36 seasons since, the BSU men developed one of the most secure home-ice advantages in college hockey playing at the Glas, and in 1998 the storied Fieldhouse became the home of BSU's women's ice hockey program.

The Bemidji State women have posted a 48-103-22 record all-time in their home arena, including a school-record 8-7-2 home-ice campaign in 1999-00. BSU finished 5-9-2 at home in 2006-07, but that record came against a tough schedule that saw the Beavers play six of 16 home games against teams ranked or receiving votes in the coaches poll.

Perhaps BSU's most dramatic home weekend came Jan. 12-13, 2002, against the then No. 2-ranked Minnesota Golden Gophers. BSU skated to a 2-2 draw in Game 1 of that series, and saw a 2-0 lead evaporate when the team lost a tough 3-2 overtime decision in Game 2. At one stretch in the series, BSU goaltender Anik Cote held the Gophers without a goal for a span of 82:00.

Final plans for the \$970,000 Fieldhouse expansion were laid in the mid-1960s under the direction of then-BSU President Dr. Harry Bangsberg and Athletics Director Dr. Vic Weber. The Minnesota legislature granted authority to build the expansion in 1965, and the fieldhouse expansion was dedicated on Feb. 10, 1968.

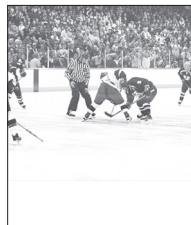
In addition to its role as BSU's home facility for both men's and women's ice hockey, the Glas Fieldhouse also plays a prominent role in a variety of events for the BSU and Bemidji communities. High school contests and area youth figure skating shows occur while the ice is in place, and when the ice is removed the building plays host to events varying from the annual Jaycees Home, Sport and Travel Show to BSU's commencement ceremonies.

### John S. Glas

From the time of its completion until Oct. 1, 1975, BSU's hockey facility held the name of BSU Fieldhouse. But it was renamed in honor of the retiring John S. Glas (right), the acting president of Bemidji State University at the time of the arena's completion. Glas arrived in Bemidji in 1939 to serve as business manager under then-BSU President Charles R. Sattgast and would remain with BSU for 36 years. When Glas arrived, the campus consisted of just two buildings - Deputy and Stanford halls - which served as the educational environment for the institution's 340 students.

In 1957, Glas was appointed assistant to the president, and in 1968 he was elevated to Vice President for Administrative Affairs and later earned the title Vice President Emeritus.

The decision to rename the Fieldhouse was recommended by the Men's Physical Education Department. The Long Range Planning Committee endorsed the change, and President Dr. R.D. Decker submitted a request to the State University Board that it officially name the fieldhouse for Glas, "in recognition of his long and dedicated service to Bemidji State University."



### BSU at the Glas

Since making its debut as a varsity program in 1998-99, Bemidji State's women's ice hockey program has steadily developed a solid home-ice reputation.

In 1999-00, when the program won a school-record eight games on its home ice, the BSU women put together a school-record eight-game home unbeaten streak. The team went 7-0-1 during that streak, which started with a 7-1 win over Wayne State (Mich.) on Oct. 29, 1999 and ended with a tight 4-2 loss to sixth-ranked Minnesota on Jan. 10, 2000.

BSU survived a brutal home schedule in 2001-02, posting a 4-7-5 record in a 16-game home slate which included 12 games against teams ranked or receiving votes in the USA Today / American Hockey Coaches Association Coaches Poll at the time of the game. BSU picked up one win and four ties in those 12 games.

The next three seasons the Beavers posted an 11-32-5 mark facing the eventual national champions in all three of those seasons at home. In 2002-03, BSU picked up two weekend series sweeps at home, the first coming against St. Cloud State University on Jan. 24-25, 2002, and the second coming against Findlay on Feb. 14-15, 2003.

The Beavers struggled in 2003-04 and 2004-05 picking up just six wins at home with just one weekend sweep against St. Cloud State on Dec. 12-13, 2003.

The 2005-06 season saw the Beavers post their best home record at home with a 5-8-2 mark since the 2002-03 season when they were 5-6-3. The Beavers picked up their biggest win since making its Division I debut with a 2-1 win over then-No. 5 Minnesota on Jan. 7, 2006, at Ridder Arena.

The 2006-07 saw the Beavers continue to improve as they once again upset the Gophers with a 2-0 shutout win on Feb. 9, 2007, at Ridder Arena. The Beavers ended the season with a 5-9-2 mark at home. Bemidji State picked up two weekend series sweeps at home in 2006-07 with a sweep over St. Cloud State on Oct. 13-14, 2006, and then a sweep over North Dakota on Jan. 12-13, 2007, at the John S. Glas Fieldhouse.

Bemidji State had a 4-12-2 home record in the 2007-08 season. The Beavers had one of the biggest games in school history on Nov. 24, 2007, when they tied then-No. 2-ranked Wisconsin at home. The Badgers became the highest-ranked opponent to get shut out by BSU in school history.

## WELCOME TO BEMIDJI



The Bemidji area is home to a population of more than 30,000 and includes the Leech Lake, White Earth and Red Lake Indian Reservations, and Lake Itasca, the headwaters to the Mississippi River. The City of Bemidji provides a focus for educational, business and medical services. Recreational and cultural activities reflect a multicultural heritage that includes American Indian, European and Canadian influences.

Bemidji is a "golden city" along the river's bank, only miles from where the mighty Mississippi River begins its 2,552 mile journey to New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, a city at the center of the legends of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox.

Bemidji's natural beauty and bounty as a meeting or group tour destination is also enhanced with historic character. From world renown statues and architecture listed on the National Register of Historic Places, to ancient earth mounds and burial grounds, the past takes an interesting turn in Bemidji.

Bemidji's waterfront is home to the world-famous statues of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Nearby is Bemidji's Tourist Information Center. In addition to Paul Bunyan memorabilia, The Bunyan House features the Fireplace of States built with stones from every state in the U.S. and Canadian provinces.

To the north, you'll encounter Library Park and the statue of Bemidji's founding Chief Bemidji, as well as the Community Arts Center in the Carnegie Building, also on the National Register.

At the south end of Lake Bemidji is Nymore Beach, site of the Crookston Lumber Co. The burning of the mill in 1924 marked the end of the county's logging era.

On the way into Bemidji, you may cross over the historic Mississippi River Bridge, built in 1916. This structure is listed on the National Register as one of the earliest examples of a steel-reinforced concrete bridge. At the southern end of Minnesota Avenue lies the Great Northern

Depot, completed in 1913. On the Historic Register, the Depot is the last early 20th century railroad building left in its original condition.

The Commercial Building on Third Street, built in 1910, is cited in the Architecture of Minnesota Guide as a successful prairie-style solution for a single-story building.

Other examples of historic architecture include the Beltrami County Courthouse built in 1902. Across the street you'll find the 1917 Colonial Revival-style former Post Office.

Perhaps Bemidji's best-known historic district is the eight-block section of Lake Boulevard. Once known as Bemidji's "Gold Coast," among the many venerable homes to be viewed is the Dr. Johnson House built in 1910 with a showcase garden.

The Bacon House was also built in 1910, later used for a Catholic convent. An unusual log structure, the Fisk House was reconstructed log-by-log at the present site. Judge Fisk enjoyed entertaining many distinguished guests, including writer F. Scott Fitzgerald. Further along you'll find Warfield House, the 1912 home of the man who built Bemidji's electric light plant.

Two lady teachers resided at the 1930s Parker & Mangelsdorf House, also known for its large, informal gardens.

Birchmont Drive displays two art deco classics built in 1937, one with a semicircular glass projection, is located at Bemidji State University, the only lakeshore campus in the state with architecture dating back to 1919.

Located about midway between Minneapolis/St. Paul to the south and Winnipeg, Canada to the north, Bemidji has easy access by air, motor carrier, and automobile to metropolitan areas and international airports.

## BEMIDJI STATE UNIVERSITY

### Goals

Bemidji State approaches the 21st century with a deep sense of commitment to its region, a national reputation for quality programming and an international perspective for its 5,020 students. Founded on a sound liberal education, university programs are designed to educate students so that they may live as responsible, productive and free citizens in a global society.

### History

Bemidji State began as a state Normal school in 1919, became a leading teachers' college in the region, and achieved University status in 1975. Currently, BSU recognizes over 28,000 alumni.

### Academic Program

The only baccalaureate institution in northern Minnesota, Bemidji State

offers more than 65 major fields of study housed in one of three major colleges: Arts and Letters, Social and Natural Sciences, and Professional Studies. Quality education is a priority at BSU, as many programs have earned national acclaim. The accounting program ranks among the nation's Top 10 in preparing students for the CPA examination, and scientific research has gained national exposure in a variety of fields.

### Students / Faculty

Nearly 70 percent of Bemidji State students come from northern Minnesota, but the University broadens its services to attract students and faculty from diverse backgrounds and aspirations. Through teaching and informed attention to the educational needs of students, the university seeks to instill the spark of openness and commitment for lifelong learning. In fact, many BSU faculty members continue to pursue knowledge as specialists and educators in their fields.

### Location

Bemidji State University lies in the heart of the city of Bemidji, midway between Minneapolis/St. Paul and Winnipeg, deep within Minnesota's lakes and forest region. With stands of pine, oak and birch reflecting the nearby presence of the northern woods, the east side of campus lines the shores of Lake Bemidji. The city of Bemidji, which serves a population of approximately 40,000, provides a regional focus for educational, business and medical services. Entertainment and activities include lively downtown Bemidji, shopping malls, theatre, art, downhill and cross country skiing and various forms of water recreation.

### Facilities

The modern campus spans 89 acres on the shores of Lake Bemidji, including the recently-renovated Physical Education Complex which houses the John S. Glas Fieldhouse, host to several NCAA Championships. The BSU Gymnasium hosts the basketball and volleyball events, and a 3,000 square foot weight room, human performance laboratory, indoor track, tennis, racquetball and swimming areas complete the complex.

Football fans can catch a spectacular view of Lake Bemidji through the east end zone of Chet Anderson Stadium.

### Financial Aid / Scholarships

Eighty-two percent of students at Bemidji State receive some form of financial assistance. More than \$16 million was awarded last year to students, including \$6 million in grants and scholarships.

### Internships

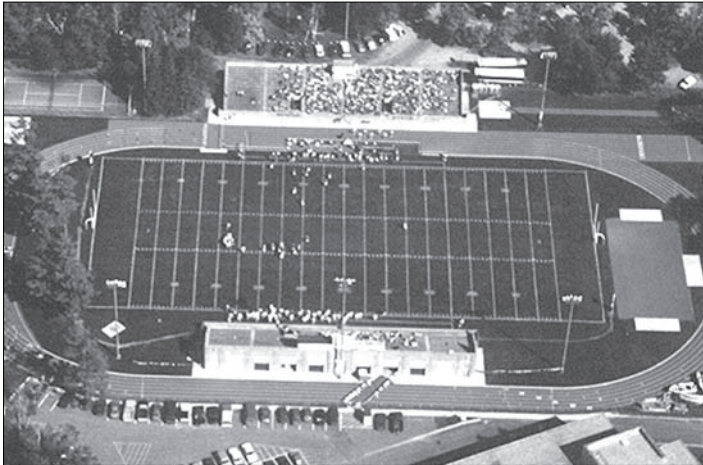
Each year, students complete internships with the NASA space program in Houston, Disneyland, Compaq, Rubbermaid and a host of architectural firms.

**Chet Anderson Stadium** is home to BSU's football and outdoor track and field programs. It is one of just three collegiate football stadiums in the nation with a lakeside setting.



**BSU Baseball Field** plays host to the Beaver baseball program in the spring. The stadium grandstand was completed for the 2002 season and the facility underwent a \$170,000 renovation project including the installation of new dugouts and a Fair-Paly electronic LED scoreboard in 2007.



**BSU Gymnasium** is the home of BSU's men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. BSU's men and women each won a home-court first-round NSIC playoff game in 2004.



Bemidji State's softball program plays its home contests at the **BSU Softball Field**, adjacent to the baseball field. In the spring of 2008, the school unveiled a new permanent scoreboard at the facility.



**John S. Glas Fieldhouse** is the legendary home of BSU's men's and women's ice hockey programs. BSU's men have won five national championships in the building.



The BSU indoor track and tennis teams make their home in the **Gillett Recreation/Fitness Center**. One of the finest indoor facilities in the region, the center also serves as the campus recreational center.

## Internet Services

## Game-Day Services

Gameday packages containing programs, game notes and other information will be available in the press box prior to all home contests.

Final statistics include an official NCAA box score, game summary, individual and team statistics. Game notes and quotes from coaches and selected players will also be available. Telephone, copier and fax services are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

## Credentials / Pass List

Season credentials will be issued to all media covering the Beavers on a regular basis.

For single-game passes and credentials, contact the BSU athletic media relations department no less than 24 hours before the scheduled starting time of the event. Credential requests must be submitted via fax on official letterhead.

Credentials will be issued only to representatives of an accredited media outlet who will be working in an official capacity to cover a BSU athletic event. No credentials will be issued to friends, spouses, children or other family members.

Credentials remain the property of Bemidji State University and may be revoked at any time.

## Interview Policies

All player interviews outside of post-game and practice time must be arranged through the BSU athletic media relations department. For interviews with coaches, contact the athletic media relations department at (218) 755-2763.

By NCAA rule, no player interviews will be available on gameday until the conclusion of that day's contest. Contact the athletic media relations department with questions or for assistance.

## Directions

Highway 2 passes through Bemidji east-west, and Highway 71 is the main north-south thoroughfare. Each leads to Bemidji Avenue/Paul Bunyan Drive. Follow Bemidji Avenue / Paul Bunyan Drive to BSU. Turn right; John S. Glas Fieldhouse is on the right.

## Who Are Boosters?

You are considered a booster or a representative of Bemidji State University Athletics interests if you:

- Participated in or are currently a member of any athletics department booster group, including Beaver Pride
- Have made a donation to the athletic program
- Have assisted or been asked to assist with recruiting of prospective student athletes
- Have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or families
- Have helped to promote BSU athletics or BSU athletic interests in any way

Once a person has become identified as a booster to BSU they retain that identity indefinitely even if they no longer support the athletics program.

## Who Are Prospective Student-Athletes?

The NCAA defines a "prospect" as anyone who has started classes for the ninth grade.

In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospect, if the institution provides any financial assistance or other benefits not provided to any prospective student.

## What Are Permissible Activities by Boosters?

The following are activities that BSU boosters can participate in:

- May attend events such as contests or banquets where prospects are present so long as the booster is there on their own initiative. Boosters are NOT able to contact prospects or prospect's relatives at such events.
- Boosters can inform BSU coaches of prospects in their area by contacting the BSU staff and/or sending newspaper clippings about the prospect.
- Boosters may arrange employment for prospects. Prospects may not start the job until after completion of their senior year in high school, and compensation must be based on actual work performed at a normal rate.
- Boosters can continue to establish family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with prospects are permitted as long as they are NOT for recruiting purposes and are NOT initiated by BSU staff members.

## What is a Contact and what is Considered Recruiting?

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or their parents/guardians and a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) during which dialogue occurs in excess of a greeting.

Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or the prospect's relatives by a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and eventual participation in the BSU intercollegiate athletics program.

## **DR. JON QUISTGAARD**

**President, Bemidji State University**  
University of Arizona (1970)

Dr. Jon E. Quistgaard became the ninth president of Bemidji State University in August, 2001. The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees named him to the position in late May, 2001 following a national search.

A member of the BSU community for 23 years, he had served since 1997 as the vice president for academic and student affairs. As the chief academic officer of the institution, he was responsible for academic programming in three colleges, integrative studies,



distance learning, academic services, international student services, counseling, career services, the American Indian Resource Center, and student development programs.

Quistgaard began his association with BSU in 1979 as an admissions representative. He became the director of admissions and advising in 1980; was named the dean of undergraduate admissions and graduate studies in 1988; served as acting vice president for academic and student affairs from 1993-94; and was the associate vice president for academic affairs and dean of academic services from 1994-97.

Quistgaard is an active presenter on the national level in the areas of continuous quality improvement, challenges in higher education, planning, assessment models, and transforming higher education. He received a doctorate in political science from the University of Arizona, where he also earned his master's and bachelor's degrees in government.

## **DR. RICK GOEB**

**Director of Athletics**  
North Dakota State University (1989)

A new era in Bemidji State University athletics began July 13, 2001, when Dr. Rick Goeb was named BSU's first full-time director of intercollegiate athletics.

Goeb directs a 17-sport varsity athletics program at BSU with NCAA Division I men's and women's ice hockey and 15 Division II sports.

Beaver athletics has undergone dramatic changes in Goeb's tenure, having seen more than a dozen positions created or filled with new hires - including head coaches for women's hockey, men's and women's basketball, soccer, softball, baseball, women's golf, tennis and volleyball - and the hiring of BSU's first full-time athletics fundraiser.

In Goeb's seven years overseeing BSU athletics, the program has entered one of the best all-around eras in the program's history. Men's ice hockey has won three College Hockey America regular-season titles, two tournament titles and made its first Division I NCAA Tournament appearance; men's basketball won its first NSIC Championship in decades, advanced to its first-ever NCAA Tournament and has hosted first-round NSIC playoff games four different times; women's basketball hosted and won its first-ever NSIC playoff game; indoor track won its first-ever NSIC Championship; men's and women's golf have made NCAA regional



appearances with both full teams and individual performers.

BSU athletics has also assembled a strong academic reputation under Goeb's leadership. Men's hockey has set a CHA single-season record for number of Academic All-CHA performers four times and produced the 2005 CHA Student-Athlete of the Year; women's ice hockey posted three consecutive WCHA Student-Athletes of the Year from 2002-04; and nearly two dozen BSU student-athletes have been recognized on the CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District V Team with four Academic All-America honorees.

Goeb came to Bemidji State after six years as senior associate athletics director at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks. At Fairbanks, Goeb served as NCAA compliance officer, monitored academic eligibility and acted as the liaison for booster clubs.

Prior to his position at Fairbanks, Goeb spent two years as an administrator at North Dakota. Goeb also served as the head wrestling coach at St. Cloud State from 1990-93 when he was an instructor in physical education and a facility coordinator; was the strength and conditioning coach at Northern Colorado from 1989-90; and served as an assistant wrestling coach at North Dakota State from 1988-89.

Originally from Anoka, Minn., Goeb received his undergraduate degree at North Dakota State, where he was also a Division II national wrestling champion. Goeb earned his master's from Northern Colorado and doctorate from North Dakota. He and his wife Carol have two daughters, Amber and Anne and a son, Jordan.

## **BRAD FOLKESTAD**

**Director of Athletic Media Relations**  
Bemidji State University (2001)

Brad Folkestad is in his seventh year in the Sports Information office at Bemidji State. As Director of Athletic Media Relations, he oversees all publicity and media relations operations for BSU's 17-sport athletics department, and directly handles the university's football, men's hockey, golf and track and field programs.



Entering his ninth year in the athletic media relations field, Folkestad was promoted to the Director post in spring 2007.

Folkestad has spent six years of his professional career at BSU. Starting with a two-year stint as a graduate assistant in 2002, he returned as the Assistant SID in fall '04 after a one-

year assignment in the same capacity at the University of Minnesota Duluth.

In addition to serving as the men's and women's basketball contact during each of the first four years in the business, Folkestad's interests and experience in collegiate basketball run deep. He has volunteered at numerous conference, regional and national tournaments including the 2003 and '06 NCAA Division I Men's Midwest Regional Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn., the '05 NCAA Division II Elite Eight in Grand Forks, N.D., and at the 2003 NCAA Division II Women's Frozen Four.

He is an active member of the College Sports Information Directors of America and has been recognized for excellence in publications on a number of occasions including a ninth-place in the nation finish for his 2005 BSU Volleyball Media Guide.

Folkestad, 30, received his bachelor's degree in communication from BSU in 2001 and continues to work toward a master's degree in sports studies. He resides in Bemidji, Minn. with his wife Lisa and their five children Tim, Nicole, Carly, Mackenna and Baylor.

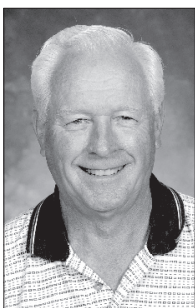
