Season Outlook

The Bemidji State women's hockey team made history last season claiming its first-ever playoff victories and first-ever trip to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association FINAL FACE-OFF. Finishing the season with a record of 12-19-7 (9-12-7-3 WCHA) the Beavers tied a school record for most conference wins, and finished tied for fifth in the WCHA.

The 2010-11 squad will return the top four scorers from the past two seasons: forwards, Erin Cody, Erin Johnson, Annie Bauerfeld, and defensemen Montana Vichorek. The four combined for 54 percent of the Beaver's offensive output in the 2009-10 season.

The team will also be returning junior goaltender Zuzana Tomcikova who garnered WCHA Co-Player of the Year and All-WCHA Second Team honors last year after posting a .938 save percentage, while making 795 saves.

Seniors Cody and Bauerfeld will be team captains for the 2010-11 campaign. This will be the second year as captain for Cody.

Forwards

Bemidji State will return more than 85 percent of its offensive production from the 2009-10 season.

Erin Cody, BSU's leading goal scorer for the past two years, had another standout season last year lighting the lamp 20 times and picking up 13 assists. Out of her 20 goals scored five came on the power play and two were game-winners. Cody also led the team in shots (156), which was a single-season record. She won WCHA Offensive Player of the Week for the week of Dec. 9-15 after putting the puck in the back of the net four times, twice on the power play, while also picking up one assist on the weekend.

Along with Cody, seniors Annie Bauerfeld and Erin Johnson were the teams second and third leading goal scorers, respectively. Bauerfeld tallied 27 points last season (9G, 18A). Her 18 assists were good for first on the team. Johnson amassed 18 points (11G, 7A) while missing 10 games due to injury. She led the team in power-play goals (6) and game-winners (4).

The trio of Cody, Bauerfeld, and Johnson will be called upon to lead the BSU offense this year as the three provided for over 40 percent of the total offense last year. They

also provided for the majority of the offense on special teams scoring a combined 14 out of a total 18 power play goals. Their production on the power-play will be a key to the success for the Beavers this season.

"We're lucky to have our top three scorers coming back this season," said head coach Steve Sertich. "While Cody, Bauerfeld, and Johnson have been our main offensive players for the past few years they'll need help too. To be successful this year we'll need everyone to chip in and hopefully we can get some scoring from the younger players as well."

Other key contributing forwards were red-shirt-sophomore Emily Erickson, tacking 15 points last season (6G, 9A), and sophomore Sadie Lundquist, adding another 10 points (2G, 8A).

Also returning for the Beavers at the forward position are junior Lauren Williams, and sophomores MacKenzie Thurston, Molly Arola and Jamie Hatheway.

Newcomers to the Bemidji State forwards include Tess Dusik and Emily McKnight. Both played prep hockey at Balmoral Hall in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Defensemen

The Bemidji State defense saw one of it's best efforts last season setting a school record for fewest goals against in a season with 98. Leading the Beaver D-Line this year will be junior Montana Vichorek. She was the teams fourth-leading goal-scorer last season after notching five goals and 12 assists. She led all defensemen in points (17) and goals. Vichorek's efforts did not go unnoticed as she was honored with All-WCHA Third Teams honors following the 2009-10 season.

Also returning for the Beavers on defense are sisters Marlee and Erika Wheelhouse. Marlee returns for her junior year while Erika will be entering her sophomore year. Between the two, they posted 20 assists, 14 by Erika and six by Marlee. On Jan. 13 Erika was named WCHA Newcomer of the Week after posting two assists, blocking nine shots and helping kill off nine penalties against Minnesota State in the Jan. 8-9 weekend series.

"Vichorek, Erika, and Marlee will be our main anchors on defense this year as those three have proven themselves in the

league," commented Sertich. "Vichorek had a tremendous year last season and hopefully she'll continue to be one of the top defensemen in the league."

Also returning on the blue line for BSU is junior Kimberly Lieder who picked up four assists last season.

New to the defensive corps for the 2010-11 season are freshmen, Allie Duellman, Alex Ehlert, and Danielle Williams.

Goaltending

Goaltending for Bemidji State has always been a strong point, and juniors Zuzana Tomcikova and Alana McElhinney are keeping the tradition going strong.

Last season the duo combined for the fewest goals allowed in school history (98) and lowest team goals against average (2.54). Tomcikova and McElhinney also combined to post a single-season high seven team shutouts, five by Tomcikova and two by McElhinney.

"It's a nice problem to have that both goalies have shown that they can play in the league," Sertich said. "We feel comfortable with both of them in net and we know we can have success if we can limit the back-door plays and keep the shots to the outside."

After a stellar freshman Tomcikova made an even better sophomore debut season gathering 795 saves on 848 shots. She finished with a .938 save percentage on the season while recording a 2.06 goals against average. She was also nominated for the 2010 Patty Kazmaier Award; an award of The USA Hockey Foundation that recognizes the accomplishments of the most outstanding player in NCAA Division I women's ice hockey each season. At the end of the season, Tomcikova was named WCHA Co-Player of the Year and was named to the All-WCHA Second Team.

Tomcikova left the Beavers in February to represent her native country in the 2010 Winter Olympic Games in Vancouver where she played in all five games for the Slovakian National Women's Ice Hockey Team. In those five games she faced 235 shots on goal, more than any other goaltender, male or female, in the 2010 Winter Games.

During her absence, McElhinney was called upon to help fill the vacancy in net. She

played in nine games after Tomcikova left posting a .914 save percentage and a 2.55 goals against average. She recorded her first WCHA win on Feb. 7 when she blanked the then No. 9 Wisconsin Badgers 2-0. She picked up her second WCHA win and second career shutout a week later shutting down North Dakota 1-0.

Also in net for the Beavers is sophomore Jessica Havel who joined the squad last year as a walk-on.

The Schedule

Arguably one of the most exciting things the Beavers are looking forward to this season is playing in its new home at the Bemidji Regional Events Center.

"The players are really excited," Sertich said. "To have state-of-the-art locker rooms, a lounge, and all the features that come with having a new arena is pretty thrilling."

However, the team will have to wait a few weeks as they play one exhibition against the Toronto Jr. Aeros on Sept. 24 before starting the 2010-11 season on Oct. 1 when the Beavers head out to Detroit, Mich. where they will face-off against Wayne State University. The following weekend on Oct. 8-10 the Beavers travel to Madison, Wisc. to take-on the Badger in the first conference games of the 2010-11 season.

On Oct. 15 the women's hockey team will christen the new home arena as they host heavyweights Mercyhurst. The game will be played at 2:07 p.m. and will be the first-ever hockey game played at the Bemidji Regional Events Center. The men's hockey team will open their home schedule later the same night as they host North Dakota at 7:37 p.m. Mercyhurst and BSU will play again the following day at the BREC.

"It's going to be an exciting weekend with the men playing North Dakota and us playing Mercyhurst, I think both those teams will be in the top three of the country," commented Sertich.

After opening the home schedule, the Beavers remain at home for the following four weeks, starting with the Minnesota Whitecaps on Oct. 22-23. The Beavers will host St. Cloud State on Oct. 29-30. Last season BSU ended St. Cloud State's hopes for a playoff run, beating them in St. Cloud in a best-of-three series in the first round of WCHA Playoffs. Bemidji State then opens

November with two home weekends against defending National Champions Minnesota Duluth on Nov. 5-6 and North Dakota on Nov. 11-12.

The Beavers will take a week off before traveling to Ohio State University during Thanksgiving weekend, before returning home to host the Golden Gophers of Minnesota on Dec. 3-4. BSU will then travel to Mankato, Minn. to take on the Mavericks on Dec. 10-11 before going on break for the holidays.

Opening up the new year, Bemidji State will travel to St. Cloud on Jan. 7-8 and to North Dakota on Jan. 15-16. The rest of the season will see the Beavers rotating back-and-forth between home and away series, hosting Minnesota State on Jan. 21-22, heading to Duluth on the following weekend, hosting Wisconsin on Feb. 4-5, traveling to the University of Minnesota on Feb. 11-12, and finally closing the season at home with a series against Ohio State University on Feb. 18-19.

The first round of the WCHA Playoffs are set for the weekend of Feb. 25-27 and will be hosted by the high seed.

Colorado College '74
Fifth year at BSU

Steve Sertich enters his fifth season as head coach of the BSU women's hockey program. At the end of the 2009-10 regular season, Sertich was honored as the 2010 WCHA Coach of the Year as the team soared to new heights never-before-seen at Bemidji State. Finishing tied for fifth place in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association with a 12-19-7 overall record (9-12-7-3 WCHA), the team claimed its first-ever playoff victory. The team eventually won its playoff series and made the debut trip to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF in Minneapolis, before bowing out after losing to the eventual National Champions Minnesota Duluth.

In the spring on 2010, Sertich was inducted into the Minnesota High School Hockey Coaches Hall of Fame. The honor, which is bestowed by the Minnesota Hockey Coaches Association, is given to coaches that have outstanding contributions to the sport of hockey in the state of Minnesota.

Under his tutelage, the BSU women's hockey team has posted its most conference wins in a single season, with nine in both 2009-10 and 2006-07. Sertich has also coached two Olympians while at Bemidji State, Nina Ziegenhals who played for Team Germany in the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, and Zuzana Tomickova who played for Team Slovakia in the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver.

During summer 2008, Sertich served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's Under-22 Select team that played in the annual three-game Women's Under-22 Series with Canada, which took place from Aug. 20-23.

Sertich came to Bemidji State University after spending 13 years as the head varsity coach at Roseville Area High

School. He coached the Roseville boys' team from 1993-2003, leading it to a 156-71-11 record and two Minnesota State tournament appearances. Under Sertich's guidance, Roseville finished third in the 2002 tournament and second in 2003. He led Roseville to Suburban East Conference Championships in 2002 and 2003. Sertich earned four Coach of the Year honors, as he was named Section 3AA boys' Coach of the Year in 1999, Section 2AA Boys' Coach of the Year in both 2002 and 2003, and Class AA Coach of the Year in 2003.

In 2003, Sertich moved to head coach of the Roseville girls' varsity team and in three seasons led the program to a record of 62-21-2. The Roseville girls finished fourth in the 2006 state tournament and captured Suburban East Conference titles in both '04 and '05. Sertich was named the 2004 Section 2AA Girls' Coach of the Year. Sertich began his coaching career in 1976 as the head boys' varsity coach at Northfield (Minn.) High School, and over the next 20 years he would hold a variety of head and assistant coaching positions at the high school, college and national levels.

After one year at Northfield, he moved on to Virginia (Minn.) High School as head boys' varsity hockey coach for one year, was an assistant with Team Midwest in the U.S. National Development Program at the 1979 Olympic Sports Festival, spent one year as an assistant at Colorado College in 1982-83, and served three years as an assistant coach at Palmer (Colo.) High School from 1983-86.

He returned back to Minnesota in 1987 as the assistant boys' varsity coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School and later served as an assistant at Richfield (Minn.) High School. In

1997, he was an assistant for Team Minnkota with the U.S. Development Program Select 17 program.

Sertich also has extensive camp coaching experience, starting as the director and head coach of the Minnesota Hockey Satellite Training Program in Roseville from 1995-2003. In addition, he has been the director of the Roseville Summer Hockey School since 2000 and the director and head coach of the Roseville Hockey Satellite Training Program since 2003.

Sertich began his playing career with the Colorado College Tigers in 1970 and assembled a standout four-year career, during which he played 125 games and scored 162 points (75G, 87A). He had 53 points (28G, 25A) as a junior in 1972-73 and 61 points (25G, 36A) as a senior in 1973-74.

Sertich was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1973-75, and played on a team which trained in Bemidji. He was also a member of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, which finished fifth at the Innsbruck, Austria games. The U.S. team recorded wins over Finland and Poland en route to a 2-3 finish in Group A.

He also played two years in the German Professional League, spending the 1974-75 season as captain for Fussen and two seasons from 1978-80 playing for Nurnburg.

In May 2007, Sertich became the Vice President of Board of Directors for the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum located in Eveleth, Minn. Some of his responsibilities as Vice President of Board of Directors includes making decisions on marketing and purchasing endeavors, along with planning and making decisions for specific operations taking place throughout the year. Currently, Sertich is working on organizing the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum game which will be held in Eveleth. The first Hall of Fame game will take place Oct. 18 of this season, when the Beavers face the University of Wisconsin at the Hippodrome.

Sertich is a 1974 graduate of Colorado College with a bachelor's degree in elementary education and humanities. He received a master's degree in elementary education from Minnesota State in 1999.

Sertich's son, Marty Sertich, played for Colorado College from 2002-06 and scored 181 points (61G, 121A) during a stellar four-year career. He won the 2005 Hobey Baker Memorial Award, given to

the most outstanding player in college hockey, and was a finalist for the award in 2006. He was First-Team All WCHA and WCHA Player of the Year in 2005 and was a second team All-WCHA selection in 2006. Marty is currently in the National Hockey League, playing in the Colorado Avalanche organization.

Farrell enters her fourth year at BSU serving as an assistant coach with the women's hockey team. She works with defensemen and runs the strength and conditioning program for BSU's women's ice hockey program. She also serves as the travel coordinator and academic advisor.

Coming to BSU after spending the 2006-07 season as the women's hockey interim head coach at Bowdoin College, Farrell led the Polar Bears to a 17-7-2 (.692) overall record and an 11-3-2 (.750) mark in the NESCAC. She also led her team to the conference semifinals, losing to Amherst 2-3 in overtime. The Mt. Iron, Minn. native graduated in 2007 from the University of Minnesota with a degree in sport studies.



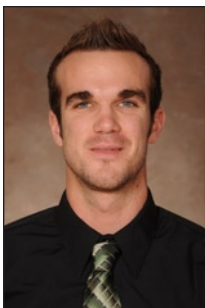

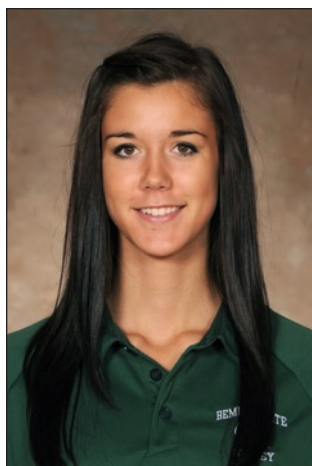

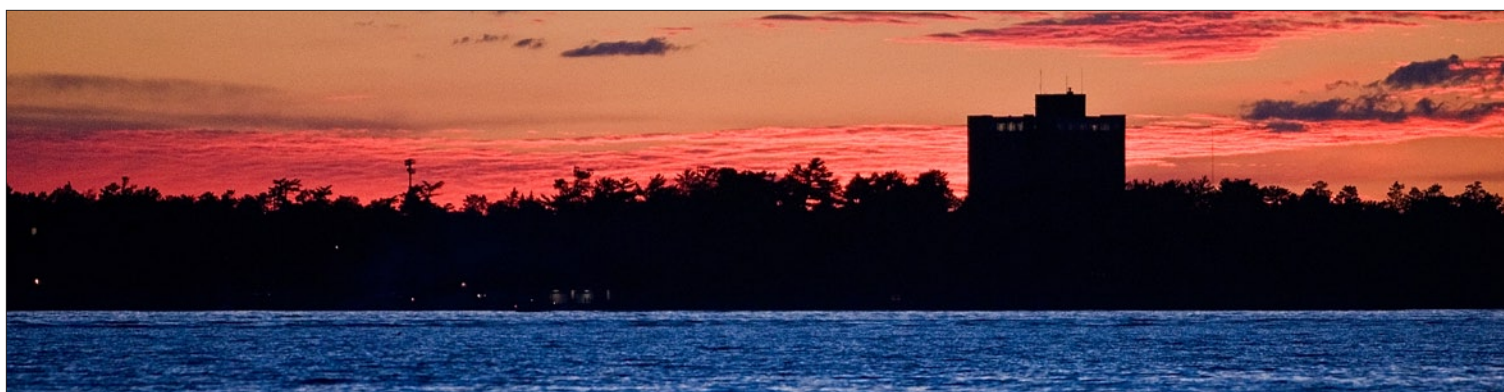

The City

The Bemidji area is home to a population of more than 30,000 and includes the Leech Lake, White Earth, and Red Lake Indian Reservations, and Lake Itasca, the headwaters to the Mississippi River. The City of Bemidji provides a focus for educational, business, and medical services. Recreational and cultural activities reflect a multicultural heritage that includes American Indian, European and Canadian influences.

Bemidji is a "golden city" along the river's bank, only miles from where the mighty Mississippi River begins its 2,552 mile journey to New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, a city at the center of the legends of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox.

Bemidji's natural beauty and bounty as a meeting or group tour destination is also enhanced with historic character. From world renown statues and architecture listed on the National Register of Historic Places, to ancient earth mounds and burial grounds, the past takes an interesting turn in Bemidji.

Bemidji's waterfront is home to the world-famous statues of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Nearby is Bemidji's Tourist Information Center. In addition to Paul Bunyan memorabilia, The Bunyan House features the Fireplace of States built with stones from every state in the U.S. and Canadian provinces.

To the north, you'll encounter Library Park and the statue of Bemidji's founding Chief Bemidji, as well as the Community Arts Center in the Carnegie Building, also on the National Register.

At the south end of Lake Bemidji is Nymore Beach, site of the Crookston Lumber Co. The burning of the mill in 1924 marked the end of the county's logging era.

On the way into Bemidji, you may cross over the historic Mississippi River Bridge, built in 1916. This structure is listed on the National Register as one of the earliest

examples of a steel-reinforced concrete bridge. At the southern end of Minnesota Avenue lies the Great Northern Depot, completed in 1913. On the Historic Register, the Depot is the last early 20th century railroad building left in its original condition.

The Commercial Building on Third Street, built in 1910, is cited in the Architecture of Minnesota Guide as a successful prairie-style solution for a single-story building.

Other examples of historic architecture include the Beltrami County Courthouse built in 1902. Across the street you'll find the 1917 Colonial Revival-style former Post Office.

Perhaps Bemidji's best-known historic district is the eight-block section of Lake Boulevard. Once known as Bemidji's "Gold Coast," among the many venerable homes to be viewed is the Dr. Johnson House built in 1910 with a showcase garden.

The Bacon House was also built in 1910, later used for a Catholic convent. An unusual log structure, the Fisk House was reconstructed log-by-log at the present site. Judge Fisk enjoyed entertaining many distinguished guests, including writer F. Scott Fitzgerald. Further along you'll find Warfield House, the 1912 home of the man who built Bemidji's electric light plant.

Two lady teachers resided at the 1930s Parker & Mangelsdorf House, also known for its large, informal gardens.

Birchmont Drive displays two art deco classics built in 1937, one with a semicircular glass projection, is located at Bemidji State University, the only lakeshore campus in the state with architecture dating back to 1919.

Located about midway between Minneapolis/St. Paul to the south and Winnipeg, Canada to the north, Bemidji has easy access by air, motor carrier, and automobile to metropolitan areas and international airports.



The ninth hole at the Bemidji Town and Country Club offers a breath-taking view of Lake Bemidji and the surrounding area.

Athletics Facilities



Chet Anderson Stadium is home to BSU's football program. It is one of just three collegiate football stadiums in the nation with a lakeside setting.



BSU Baseball Field plays host to the Beaver baseball program in the spring. The stadium grandstand was completed for the 2002 season and the facility underwent a \$170,000 renovation project including the installation of new dugouts and a Fair-Play electronic LED scoreboard in 2007.



BSU Gymnasium is the home of BSU's men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. BSU's men and women each won a home-court first-round NSIC playoff game in 2004.



Bemidji State's softball program plays its home contests at the BSU Softball Field, adjacent to the baseball field. In the spring of 2008, the school unveiled a new permanent scoreboard to the facility.



Built in 1996, the BSU Soccer Complex is the home to the BSU women's soccer team. In 2006 a state of the art irrigation system was put in place, allowing the field to remain green throughout the year.



The BSU indoor track and tennis teams make their home in the Gillett Recreation/Fitness Center. One of the finest indoor facilities in the region, the center also serves as the campus recreational center.

Bemidji Regional Events Center



The Bemidji Regional Event Center, on the south shore of Lake Bemidji, will be the new home of Beaver hockey beginning October 2010.

Within the 193,000 square-foot facility featuring a 4,000-seat arena with 25 private luxury suites and first-class club room area, is the 32,300-square foot "Home of the Beavers." Incorporated into this hockey-specific area are: BSU hockey coaching and support staff offices and meeting rooms, athletic training room facilities, state-of-the-art locker rooms and team rooms, and weight room and training facility for exclusive use by the Bemidji State men's and women's ice hockey teams.

In addition to hockey, the Bemidji Regional Events Center will be the site of numerous community events and trade shows. The versatile facility has been designed to house everything from small business meetings; to large banquets or public speeches with room for visitors to browse up to 160 booths; or exciting live entertainment with a number of different seating options to host events such as martial arts, wrestling or concerts.



Compliance and Media Services

Who Are Boosters?

You are considered a booster or a representative of Bemidji State University Athletics interests if you:

- Participated in or are currently a member of any athletics department booster group, including Beaver Pride
- Have made a donation to the athletic program
- Have assisted or been asked to assist with recruiting of prospective student athletes
- Have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student athletes or families
- Have helped to promote BSU athletics or BSU athletic interests in any way

Once a person has become identified as a booster to BSU they retain that identity indefinitely even if they no longer support the athletics program.

Who Are Prospective Student-Athletes?

The NCAA defines a "prospect" as anyone who has started classes for the ninth grade.

In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospect if the institution provides any financial assistance or other benefits not provided to any prospective student.

What Are Permissible Activities by Boosters?

The following are activities that BSU boosters can participate in:

- May attend events such as contests or banquets where prospects are present so long as the booster is there on their own initiative. Boosters are NOT able to contact prospects or prospect's relatives at such events.
- Boosters CAN inform BSU coaches of prospects in their area by contacting the BSU staff and/or sending newspaper clippings about the prospect.
- Boosters may arrange employment for prospects. Prospects may not start the job until after completion of their senior year in high school, and compensation must be based on actual work performed at a normal rate.
- Boosters can continue to establish family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with prospects are permitted as long as they are NOT for recruiting purposes and are NOT initiated by BSU staff members.

What is a Contact? What is Considered Recruiting?

Contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or their parents/guardians and a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) during which dialogue occurs in excess of a greeting.

Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or the prospect's relatives by a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and eventual participation in the BSU intercollegiate athletics program.

Additionally, information from previous seasons is archived and remains available on the website, providing a valuable research tool for media or others covering the Bemidji State women's hockey program. Complete season stats are available beginning with the 2000-01 season. More information is being added to the archive sections of the website on a frequent basis, so if you cannot find what you're looking for check back or contact the athletic media relations office for assistance.

Also available at the site are complete media guides for men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's basketball, football and volleyball in Adobe PDF format. Previous media guides are also available in the archives.

Media Services

Credentials / Pass List

Season credentials will be issued to all media covering the Beavers on a regular basis.

For single-game passes and credentials, contact the BSU athletic media relations office no less than 24 hours before the scheduled starting time of the event.

Credentials will be issued only to representatives of an accredited media outlet who will be working in an official capacity to cover a BSU athletic event. No credentials will be issued to friends, spouses, children or other family members.

Credentials remain the property of Bemidji State University and may be revoked at any time.

Professional Scouts

By NCAA regulation, persons in attendance at a Bemidji State women's hockey contest for the purpose of scouting players for professional leagues or franchises must purchase a ticket in order to gain access to the contest.

Scouts will be provided with a pass which will give them access to the press box for the purpose of obtaining line charts and statistics. **Requests for these passes must be made in advance through Director of Athletic Media Relations Brad Folkestad.**

Interview Policies

BSU Administration

Dr. Richard Hanson

President, Bemidji State University
North Dakota State University (1971)

The tenth president of Bemidji State University, Dr. Richard Hanson, took office officially on July 12, 2010. He also serves as president of Northwest Technical College.

The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees announced Hanson's appointment on May 19, with Chancellor James McCormick formally presenting the president-elect to the faculty and staff of both campuses the following day.

Hanson, 60, had been interim president of North Dakota State University since Dec. 1, 2009. Previously, he served as



president of Waldorf College; professor of sociology, vice president for academic affairs and dean of the college, all at Augustana College; associate vice president for academic affairs, associate director of human development in the Extension Service and director of the Family Studies Institute, all at North Dakota State University; and chair of the Department of Home Economics at California State University, Chico.

Hanson also has held interim positions at North Dakota State University that included vice president for academic affairs and dean of the College of University Studies. Hanson earned his bachelor's degree in sociology and his master's in child development and family relations, both from North Dakota State University, and a doctorate in applied behavioral science from the University of California-Davis.

Dr. Rick Goeb

Director of Athletics
North Dakota State University (1989)

A new era in Bemidji State University athletics began July 13, 2001 when Dr. Rick Goeb was named BSU's first full-time director of intercollegiate athletics.

Goeb directs a 17-sport varsity athletics program at BSU with NCAA Division I men's and women's ice hockey and 15 Division II sports.

Beaver athletics has undergone dramatic changes in Goeb's tenure, having seen more than a dozen positions created or filled with new hires - including head coaches for women's hockey, men's and women's basketball, soccer, softball, baseball, women's golf, tennis and volleyball - and the hiring of BSU's first full-time athletics fundraiser.

In Goeb's five years overseeing BSU athletics, the program has entered one of the best all-around eras in the program's history. Men's ice hockey has won two College Hockey America regular-season titles, two tournament titles and made its first Division I NCAA Tournament appearance; men's basketball won its first NSIC Championship in decades, advanced to its first-ever NCAA Tournament and has hosted first-round NSIC playoff games each of the last four years; women's basketball hosted and won its first-ever NSIC playoff game; indoor track won its first-ever NSIC Championship; men's and women's golf have made NCAA regional appearances with both full teams and individual performers.



BSU athletics has also assembled a strong academic reputation under Goeb's leadership. Men's hockey has set a CHA single-season record for number of Academic All-CHA performers three times and produced the 2005 CHA Student-Athlete of the Year; women's ice hockey posted three consecutive WCHA Student-Athletes of the Year from 2002-04; and nearly two dozen BSU student-athletes have been recognized on the CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District V Team with four Academic All-America honorees.

Goeb came to Bemidji State after six years as senior associate athletics director at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks. At Fairbanks, Goeb served as NCAA compliance officer, monitored academic eligibility and acted as the liaison for booster clubs.

Prior to his position at Fairbanks, Goeb spent two years as an administrator at North Dakota. Goeb also served as the head wrestling coach at St. Cloud State from 1990-93 when he was an instructor in physical education and a facility coordinator; was the strength and conditioning coach at Northern Colorado from 1989-'90; and served as an assistant wrestling coach at North Dakota State from 1988-'89.

Originally from Anoka, Minn., Goeb received his undergraduate degree at North Dakota State, where he was also a Division II national wrestling champion. Goeb earned his master's from Northern Colorado and doctorate from North Dakota. He and his wife Carol have two daughters, Amber and Anne and a son, Jordan.

Brad Folkestad

Director of Athletic Media Relations
Bemidji State University (2001)

Brad Folkestad is in his eighth year in the Office of Athletic Media Relations at Bemidji State. As Director, he oversees all publicity and media relations operations for BSU's 17-sport athletics department, and directly handles communications for the university's football, men's hockey, golf and track and field programs.

Entering his 10th year in the athletic media relations field, Folkestad was promoted to the Director post in the spring of 2007.

Folkestad has spent seven years of professional career at BSU. Starting with a two-year stint as a graduate assistant in 2002, he returned as the Assistant SID in the fall of 2004 after a one-year assignment in the same capacity at the University of Minnesota Duluth.

In addition to serving as the men's and women's basketball contact during each of the first four years in the business, Folkestad's interests and experience in collegiate basketball run deep. He has volunteered at numerous conference, regional and national tournaments including the 2003 and 2006 NCAA



Division I Men's Midwest Regional Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn., the 2005 NCAA Division II Elite Eight in Grand Forks, N.D. at the 2003 NCAA Division II Women's Frozen Four.

He is an active member of the College Sports Information Directors of America and has been recognized for excellence in publications on a number of occasions including a Ninth in the Nation finish for his 2005 BSU Volleyball Media Guide.

Folkestad, 31, received his bachelor's degree in communication from BSU in 2001 and continues to work toward a master's degree in sports studies. He resides in Bemidji, Minn. with his wife Lisa and their five children Tim, Nicole, Carly, Mackenna and Baylor.

Luckily, BSU's special teams stepped up yet again, and killed off the remainder of Johnson's penalty before riding out the overtime period to tie with the Bulldogs. For the tie both teams picked up a point toward WCHA standings, but a shootout was needed to decide who would walk away with the pivotal second point. Zuzana Tomcikova (So., Bratislava, Slovakia) played stellar all night including the shootout. After stopping a blistering 46 shots including three in overtime. Tomcikova went on to stop all three shooters in the shootout. Scoring the only goal of the shoot was none other than Erin Cody putting the puck past Harss for the third time on the weekend. While the goal doesn't count for Cody's season totals it was good enough to give the Beavers two points for the shootout win. The tie breaks a 34-game losing streak against the Bulldogs and is the second non-loss in history for the Beavers against Duluth. On the weekend Erin Cody contributed on all three Beaver goals, tallying three assists (2G, 1A). The BSU penalty-kill unit has now killed off 17 of the last 18 penalties. Tomcikova has stopped 14 of 16 shoot attempts she has face so far this season. Bemidji State has also won every shootout it has entered this year (3-3).

The Bemidji State women's hockey team returned to the ice after a 25-day hiatus hosting Minnesota State, Mankato on Friday night at the John S. Glas Fieldhouse. The Mavericks erased a two-goal lead by the Beavers to send the game into overtime. After a scoreless overtime the Mavericks went on to win the shootout 2-1 in three rounds. The tie gives Bemidji State (6-11-4, 5-6-4-3 WCHA) one point in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association standings, while Minnesota State (4-6-5, 2-6-5-3) picks up two for the shoot-out win. BSU looked a bit rusty starting off the first period getting out-shot 13-9, but the Beavers played to a 0-0 stalemate after the first. In the second period, the Beavers found their stride netting two goals while out-shooting MSU 14-10. Erin Cody (Jr., Roseville, Minn.) picked up her 11th goal of the season off a Minnesota State turnover. Erika Wheelhouse (Fr., Crookston, Minn.) stole the puck away from a Maverick winger along the boards while trying to break out. She then dished it off to Cody who skated into the slot and fired a shot at the top right corner of the net. MSU goaltender Paige Thunder got her glove on it, but ended up flicking the puck up and over her before trickling past the goal line. Minutes later Bemidji State would go on the power play off of a slashing call. This time sophomore defenseman Montana Vichorek (Moose Lake, Minn.) would do the scoring. She received the puck after it was cycled by Franny Dorr (Sr., Roseville, Minn.) and Erika Wheelhouse. She then fired a shot from the point and put it top shelf past Thunder. The Beavers would skate into the third period with the 2-0 lead. Having gone winless in over a month, Minnesota State wasn't ready to roll over that easily. Coming out in the third, the Mavericks put two quick ones in, tying the game up at 2-2 just under three minutes into the period. Bemidji State rode out the Maverick storm in the third period to go into an overtime period. Just before the end of the period however, the Beavers were caught with six skaters on the ice and had to enter OT down one player for a minute and a half of playing time. The Mavericks erased the man advantage quickly into the OT period as they were assessed a penalty of their own. Moira O'Connor was called for hooking and enabled BSU to go on the power play. Unfortunately for the Beavers they were unable to score the game winner they were looking for after outshooting MSU 3-0 in OT and were forced to take the tie. In the shootout Minnesota State went first sending Ashley Young. Zuzana Tomcikova (So., Bratislava, Slovakia) made the save to her right for her 15th shoot-out save of the season. Cody went first for the Beavers and put the puck in the back of the net to give BSU a 1-0 lead in the shootout. However, MSU would score with their next two shooters, while Thunder put up a brick wall stopping Vichorek and Annie Bauerfeld (Jr., Woodbury, Minn.). The one point for the tie now brings Bemidji State to 17 points in the WCHA standings. Wisconsin sits in third place, still with 19 points after losing to North Dakota 3-1 Friday night. Bemidji State is now 12.1 percent (11-91) on the power play and 82.5 percent (80-97) on the penalty kill. This is the fifth game in a row that Erin Cody has scored a goal in. In the last five games Cody has netted seven goals and tallied one assist. Erika Wheelhouse is tied for first among freshman and first among defenders in scoring with eight points (OG, 9A). Zuzana Tomcikova made 29 saves on 31 shots for a .935 save percentage. She is currently fifth in the nation with saves (527) and ninth in save percentage (.933). Bemidji State keeps its unbeaten streak against the Mavericks alive with the tie extending the streak to five games. Out of ten total games that have entered into overtime between the two teams nine of them have ended in ties.

Glas Fieldhouse. The three points from the weekend improves Bemidji State to 6-6-4-3 conference record (7-11-4 overall), good for 19 points in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association Standings. BSU netted two quick goals three minutes into the game. Erin Johnson (Jr., Farmington, Minn.) picked up her 10th goal of the year after stealing the puck in the corner of the offensive zone. Johnson then skated into the slot and slipped the puck past Maverick goalie Ali Altmann. Just 33 seconds later, while on the power play, Bemidji State would strike again. When the opponent scored first against the Bemidji State women's hockey team this season the Beavers had a knack of walking away without a win, not anymore. After going down 1-0 after the first, the Beavers battled back scrapping a 2-1 win over the St. Cloud State Huskies, marking the first win after failing to get on the board first. The win was also the team's first in playoff action, snapping a 14-game losing streak in the postseason. The first period was completely different from the night before with the Beavers jumping out with a lot more energy. The Bemidji State women's hockey team made history Sunday night beating St. Cloud State 4-1 in game three of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association first-round playoffs to advance on to the WCHA Final Face-Off for the first time in school history. It is also the first time in conference history that a sixth seeded team advanced on to the Final Face-Off., and the first time this season the Beavers have scored four goals in one game. Bemidji State, a unanimous last-place pick in the preseason coaches poll, is one of four teams that remains alive in the hunt for the WCHA tournament championship. The other three remaining teams are Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota and Ohio State. Zuzana Tomcikova (So., G., Bratislava, Slovakia) had another great performance in net for the Beavers turning away 27 shots. The win is her 10th of the season, and the teams 12th. The 12 wins ties a team record for most wins in a season since the 2001-02 season. It is also the most in a season of Serich's tenure at BSU. St. Cloud State started out of the gates with a lot more jump to their stride than the Beavers, taking over the play of the game early on. It took a while, but BSU found its stride and kept up with the pace keeping it scoreless after the first period. St. Cloud State's Caitlin Hogan was called for hooking with 30 seconds left in the first period which gave BSU a shortened power play to start the second. It only took a little over a minute into

the period for Bemidji State to get on the scoreboard. Erin Cody (Jr., For., Roseville, Minn.) and Keirstin Visser (Fr., Def., Crapaud, Prince Edwards Island) cycled the puck before dishing it off to Annie Bauerfeld (Jr., For., Woodbury, Minn.) who was sitting near the left face-off dot. Bauerfeld sniped the puck ringing it off the crossbar and down for her ninth goal of the season, and her second of the weekend. The two sides would battle it out for the rest of the period and BSU would retire to its locker room with the one-goal lead. Entering the third period, the Beavers weren't satisfied with a one-goal lead. Just minutes later Bauerfeld found herself on a breakaway opportunity, but Nixon made the save for the Huskies. However, at the 11:25 mark of the period St. Cloud State found their first goal of the game to cut the Beaver lead to one. Capitalizing on a Husky error, Erin Johnson (Jr., For., Farmington, Minn.) found herself with the puck after a turnover in front of the St. Cloud State net. Johnson stick-handled across Nixon's left and took a back-hander that went bar down to give the Beavers a 3-1 lead with nine

minutes left in the game. Cody would later score an empty-net goal with 2 minutes left in the game to secure the win for the Beavers. Annie Bauerfeld had four points (2G, 2A) in the two wins over the Huskies. Bauerfeld led the team in points over the weekend followed by Montana Vichorek who had three points (1G, 2A) on the weekend. The win marks the second time in conference playoff history that a team came back to win a three-game series after losing the first game. The Bemidji State women's hockey team historic playoff run came to an end Saturday afternoon as the No. 2 Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs defeated the Beavers 7-3 in the semifinal round of the 2010 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF. Bemidji State ends the season with a record of 12-19-7 (9-12-7-3 WCHA). The number-two team in the country over powered the Beavers as the Bulldogs top line of Laura Fridfinnson, Katie Wilson, and Emmanuelle Blais had a combined 14 points in the game. It didn't take long for the Bulldogs to jump on the scoreboard as Fridfinnson scored for UMD 24 seconds into the game off a broken play by the Beavers. UMD's Katie Wilson would add another goal for the Bulldogs poking in a loose puck that was carried in on net from Blais. Zuzana Tomcikova (So., G., Bratislava, Slovakia) did her best to battle back including making a huge glove save off a rebound to halt the Minnesota Duluth blitz. However, with under a minute left in the first period Fridfinnson would strike again on a scramble in front of the net poking in another loose puck. The start of the second period was not much different from that of the first as UMD put two quick goals in the back of the net to go up 5-0. The Western Collegiate Hockey Association's women's league, sporting a record 11 consecutive national team championships since it's founding in 1999, today (August 20) released it's 2010-11 composite schedule, highlighted by the appearance of the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF on March 4-5 at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, Minn., and the opening of new arenas at league-members Bemidji State and defending national champion Minnesota Duluth.

Bemidji State will play it's first game in the new building on Oct. 15, when the Beavers host eastern power Mercyhurst for a two-game non-conference series. Minnesota Duluth will officially open Amsoil Arena on Dec. 30 with the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame men's game between the Bulldogs and North Dakota while the women's team will first play in the new facility Jan. 21-22 against WCHA-foe Wisconsin.

"We also look forward to a highly competitive regular season in the WCHA. Each year our teams get stronger and the race to the championship gets tighter. Last year's co-championship between Minnesota Duluth and Minnesota was historic for us and just four points separated the next four teams at the end of the regular season. We feel the upcoming 2010-11 campaign may be our most tightly-contested season to date."

The WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF will again be contested at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis and hosted by the University of Minnesota, but with a new twist.

The initial on-ice action of 2010-11 will consist of three exhibition contests slated for Sept. 25-26 as St. Cloud State and Minnesota take turns hosting the University of Manitoba and North Dakota entertains the Toronto Jr. Aeros.

The first regular season action will occur the weekend of Oct. 1-3. In non-conference matchups Minnesota travels east to face Clarkson, St. Cloud State heads to Mercyhurst, Bemidji State is off to Wayne State, Wisconsin hosts Rensselaer and North Dakota hosts Boston University (Sat/Sun). In exhibition play, the UMD Bulldogs host the Minnesota Whitecaps for a pair of games.

The weekend of Oct. 8-10 will bring the first league encounters of the 2010-11 season as Minnesota Duluth ventures to North Dakota (Sat/Sun) and Wisconsin entertains Bemidji State (Fri/Sun). Outside the WCHA, Ohio

State plays at Robert Morris, Minnesota State hosts Niagara, and St. Cloud State and Minnesota will take turns hosting Wayne State and the Minnesota Whitecaps (exh).

Other conference openers, by member team, are: Minnesota (Oct. 15-16 vs North Dakota), Minnesota State (Oct. 16-17 at Minnesota Duluth), Ohio State (Oct. 15-16 vs St. Cloud State), and St. Cloud State (Oct. 15-16 @ Ohio State).

Additional non-conference action this season, by member team, consists of the following matchups: Bemidji State (vs Mercyhurst, Oct. 15-16); Minnesota (vs Harvard, Nov. 26 & 28); Minnesota Duluth (vs Connecticut, Oct. 23-24); Minnesota State (@ Wayne State, Nov. 26-27 and vs Robert Morris, Dec. 3-4); North Dakota (@ Vermont, Jan. 7-8); Ohio State (vs Syracuse, Oct. 29-30 and vs Wayne State, Dec. 30-31); St. Cloud State (vs Mercyhurst and Northeastern as host of Easton Holiday Showcase, Jan. 1-2); and Wisconsin (@ Robert Morris, Nov. 19-20 and vs Northeastern and Mercyhurst @ Easton Holiday Showcase in St. Cloud, Jan. 1-2).

The pursuit of the WCHA playoff championship will get underway the weekend of Feb. 25-27 with the four first round conference playoff series. The top four ranked teams in the final regular season standings will host best-of-three playoff series against the bottom four ranked teams as the No. 1 seed hosts the No. 8 seed, No. 2 hosts No. 7, No. 3 hosts No. 6 and No. 4 hosts No. 5.

Those four first-round conference playoff winners will then advance to the 2011 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF, set for March 4-5 at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, Minn. There will be two semi-final matchups on Friday at 4:07 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT with the championship contest set for 7:07 pm CT on Saturday evening. Minnesota Duluth is the defending WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF champion.

Following the league playoff championship, four NCAA Div. 1 Women's Regional tournaments will be contested the weekend of March 11-14 at sites to be determined.

The four regional winners will then earn a trip to the 2011 NCAA Women's Frozen Four, which will be contested March 18 and 20 in Erie, Pa.
