Season Outlook

The Bemidji State University women's hockey team is coming off a historic season in 2010-11. The Beavers accomplished firsts last season including beating a No. 1 team for the first time in program history, recording the program's first-ever win over University of Minnesota Duluth and snapping a 17-game losing streak to University of Minnesota on its way to a 14-17-4 (11-13-4-2 WCHA) mark and a fifth-place WCHA finish.

Bemidji State will look to build off its historic season heading into 2011-12 despite the loss of seniors Annie Bauerfeld, Erin Cody and Erin Johnson. Cody and Bauerfeld both ended their careers as Top 10 scorers in the BSU record books.

With the loss of much of its scoring, BSU will turn to a strong defensive core in All-WCHA goaltender **Zuzana Tomcikova** (Sr., Bratislava, Slovakia) along with seniors **Kimberly Lieder** (D, Eagan, Minn.), **Montana Vichorek** (D, Moose Lake, Minn.) and **Marlee Wheelhouse** (D, Crookston, Minn.) and sophomore **Erika Wheelhouse** (D, Crookston, Minn.). Tomcikova posted a 1.84 goals against average and 692 saves last season. The senior is on the verge of capturing career records in both wins and saves.

On the offensive side, the Beavers will need strong seasons from **Emily Erickson** (Jr., F, Coleraine, Minn.) and **Sadie Lundquist** (Jr., F, Cloquet, Minn.). They will also turn to several other returnees and newcomers to step up as they look to fill the void of their trio of departed seniors.

Forwards

Bemidji State will have to replace nearly 40 percent of its scoring with the loss of Bauerfeld, All-WCHA selection Cody and Johnson.

"We have some big shoes to fill scoring-wise with those three graduating," said head coach **Steve Sertich**. "Sadie and Emily both had good years last year and we are expecting good things from them this year."

The pair was the second and third-leading scorers for the Beavers behind Cody last season. Lundquist had a breakthrough sophomore year scoring eight goals and tallying 14 assists while Erickson had 16 goals and 11 assists and led the team with six power-play scores.

Other key contributors last season were senior **Lauren Williams** (Eagan, Minn.), juniors **Abby Williams** (Alexandria, Minn.) and **Mackenzie Thurston** (Ottawa, Ontario) and sophomore **Tess Dusik** (Oak Bluff, Manitoba). Lauren tallied five points last season (3g-2a). Abby had two goals in her first season playing for the Beavers after sitting out 2009-10 after transferring from Minnesota State University. Thurston had two assists during her sopho-

more season.

"I believe Mackenzie is ready to take her game to the next level," Sertich said. "Offensively I think she has some confidence coming into the season. We are also looking for some scoring out of Tess, Abby and Lauren."

Also returning to the fray are juniors **Molly Arola** (Walker, Minn.) and **Jamie Hatheway** (Trenton, Ontario) and sophomore **Emily McKnight** (Carman, Manitoba). Arola scored her lone goal of the year on a power-play at University of Minnesota Duluth. Both Hatheway and McKnight contributed last season but neither player scored.

The Beavers add several newcomers for the 2011-12 season at the forward position. Joining the program are Maine transfer **Kristi King** (So., Stillwater, Minn.) along with freshmen **Alex Citrowske** (Prior Lake, Minn.), **Kristin Huber** (Kelwona, British Columbia), **Rachael Kelly** (Rosemount, Minn.), **Natasha Kostenko** (Fannystelle, Manitoba) and **Whitney Wivoda** (Fairbanks, Alaska). King had two goals and one assist for the Black Bears during her freshman campaign.

Defensemen

Bemidji State will be anchored by a defensive unit that returns every member from a group that set the school record for fewest goals allowed (88) last season.

Anchoring the blue-line for the Beavers will be seniors Lieder, Marlee Wheelhouse and Vichorek and junior Erika Wheelhouse. Vichorek led all BSU defensemen in scoring last season with 16 points (2g-14a). The Wheelhouse sisters also had strong campaigns in 2010-11. Marlee had 10 points (2g-8a) while sister Erika posted eight points (1g-7 a). Lieder added four points (1g-3a), as a junior.

"Defensively we have a nucleus of Montana, the Wheelhouse sisters and Kim who are returners who played a lot last season," Sertich said.

Also returning to the blue-line are sophomores **Allie Duellman** (Maplewood, Minn.), **Alex Ehlert** (Portage, Wis.) and **Danielle Williams** (Waconia, Minn.). Duellman and Williams both had two points last season (1g-1a) while Ehlert tallied one assist.

Joining the ranks of the defensive corps are freshmen **Kayleigh Chapman** (Virden, Manitoba) and **Tegan Rose** (Gibbons, Alberta).

"Hopefully some of the younger players can raise their game to another level and provide some support to the upperclassmen.," Sertich said.

Goaltending

Goaltending for Bemidji State continues to be

one of the team's strongest areas as they head into the 2011-12 season.

All-WCHA second team selection Tomcikova anchors the position for the Beavers heading into her senior season. Tomcikova already holds school records in goals against average and winning percentage. She will be chasing the program's records for career wins and saves during her senior campaign. Her goals against average of 1.84 was good for the school record for lowest goals against average in a season. Tomcikova also set season records for most wins (13) and most shutouts (six) during her junior season.

Joining Tomcikova in the crease is **Alana McElhinney** (Sr., Calgary, Alberta). McElhinney started eight games last year including a win over No. 1 Mercyhurst. She grabbed 235 saves last season.

The pair of BSU goaltenders combined to set a school record with the fewest goals allowed (88) in one season.

"We have veteran goaltending with both Zuzana and Alana returning," Sertich said. "Both players have played in the league and played against good teams. We look forward to having both of them back for their senior seasons."

Jessica Havel (Jr., Grand Rapids, Minn.) also returns at goaltender for the Beavers.

The Schedule

The 2011-12 slate features 16 games at Sanford Center including 14 contests within the WCHA, which remains the nation's premier women's hockey conference having accounted for every NCAA Division I women's hockey championship in the sport's 11-year NCAA history.

"I always say it is a curse and a blessing to play in the WHCA," Sertich said. "We know every weekend is going to be a challenge no matter who you are playing or where you are playing. The entire league is extremely competitive and I'm sure this year will be a battle just like every other year."

The 35-game regular-season slate will hit the ice Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 as the Beavers welcome Providence College to Bemidji for the first time to begin their second season at Sanford Center.

"Providence is a perennial powerhouse out east," Sertich said. "They have a great goaltender in Genevieve Lacasse and have done well in recent years. I expect them to be a very good team even at the beginning of the year when they come to Bemidji."

The Beavers open their conference schedule Oct. 7 and 8 in Columbus, Ohio against the Buckeyes of Ohio State University. Ohio State

is coming off a 14-19-3 mark last season and a sixth place finish in the final WCHA standings.

Oct. 14 and 15 BSU heads to the Pine Tree State to face the University of Maine for the first time since 2006. The Black Bears are coming off a 12-17-5 mark on the 2010-11 season.

"Maria Lewis, who used to be an assistant coach at the University of North Dakota, did a nice job there in her first season," Sertich said. "It is going to be a long trip out to Maine. It will be interesting to see how our team responds to that road trip."

BSU's next conference tussle marks the WCHA home-opener for the Beavers as they welcome St. Cloud State University Oct. 21 and 22. The contests will both commence with 2:07 p.m. puck drops. The Huskies are coming off a 1-33-1 record and a last place finish in the WCHA.

BSU remains at home the next weekend as it welcomes the University of Minnesota to the First City on the Mississippi Oct. 28 and 29. Both games are scheduled for 7:07 p.m. starts at Sanford Center. The Golden Gophers went 26-10-2 during the 2010-11 season finishing in a tie for second place in the conference. Minnesota lost in the regionals of the NCAA tournament to Boston College, 4-1.

The Beavers will hit the road for a five-game swing beginning Nov. 4 and 5 in Mankato, Minn. against Minnesota State University. The Mavericks went 8-25-3 in Eric Means' second season at the helm finishing in seventh place in the WCHA standings.

BSU's road trip continues Nov. 10 as it heads to Eveleth, Minn. for the second-consecutive season for a neutral site battle with Lindenwood University. The Lions enter Division I play in their first year of a two-year candidacy period before being granted full Division I membership.

The Beavers wrap up their five-game road trip against the University of Minnesota Duluth squad Nov. 18 and 19 at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn. This will be UMD's first full season at their new arena. Both games are set to commence at 3:07 p.m. The five-time national champion Bulldogs are coming off a 22-9-3 mark last season and a tie for second place in the WCHA standings. UMD lost to eventual national champion University of Wisconsin in the regionals of the NCAA tournament, 2-1.

BSU returns home for the first time in nearly a month Nov. 25 and 26 to host North Dakota. The first game will count as a home game for Bemidji State but will be played on neutral ice in Crookston, Minn. The Nov. 26 match will be played at Sanford Center. Both games

are slated for 7:07 p.m. starts. UND went 20-13-3 last season guided by Minnesota transfer's Jocelyne Lamoureux and Monique Lamoureux-Kolls.

The Beavers will wrap up the 2011 portion of their WCHA schedule against defending national champion Wisconsin Nov. 9 and 10 at Sanford Center. Puck drop is scheduled for 2:07 p.m. for both contests. The Badgers went 37-2-2 during the 2010-11 season in order to earn their fourth national title.

Bemidji State will play its final games of 2011 Dec. 30 and 31 as it wraps up its nonconference slate versus Robert Morris in Pittsburgh, Pa. Friday's game will commence at 1 p.m. and Saturday's game is set for a 5 p.m. puck drop. The Colonials went 6-21-7 last season. BSU and Robert Morris are looking to play at least one of the games at CONSOL Energy Center, the home of the National Hockey League's Pittsburgh Penguins. Bemidji State and Robert Morris last met in 2009.

"Robert Morris is going through a coaching change this season but they have a lot of good players returning," Sertich said. "We are looking forward to going back out to Pittsburgh. We were there a couple of years ago and hopefully we can get at least one of those games where the Pittsburgh Penguins play."

BSU will open 2012 as Minnesota State comes to Sanford Center Jan. 6 and 7. Both games are scheduled to start at 7:07 p.m. The Beavers will remain at home the next weekend as Ohio State comes to Bemidji Jan. 13 and 14. Those games are also slated for 7:07 p.m. puck drops.

The Beavers will face another long road trip over the next three weekends as it heads to Minnesota (Jan. 20 and 21), Wisconsin (Jan. 27 and 28) and North Dakota (Feb. 3 and 4). BSU will return for its final home games of the season Feb. 10 and 11 versus Minnesota Duluth. Both games will begin at 2:07 p.m. Bemidji State will wrap up the regular season Feb. 17 and 18 on the road against St. Cloud State.

The first round of the WCHA Playoffs will again be played on campus sites from Feb. 24-26. First-round winners will advance to the WCHA Final Face-off at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn. March 2 and 3.

The Beavers will play one exhibition game in 2011-12 as the Thunder Bay Queens will visit Bemidji Sept. 23. The exhibition contest is slated for 7:07 p.m.

Colorado College '74
Sixth year at BSU

Steve Sertich enters his sixth season as head coach of the BSU women's hockey program. Sertich has helped propel the program to heights never seen before. At the conclusion of the 2010-11 season, the team finished in sole possession of fifth place in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, a program best. The same season saw the Beavers open their new home, the Sanford Center, and claim the best home winning record in program history going 9-5-2 on home ice. The Beavers also captured their first ever wins over a top-ranked team, a 5-3 win over then-No. 1 Mercyhurst on Oct. 16, 2010, and their first ever win over Minnesota Duluth, a 1-0 win on Nov. 5, 2011.

At the end of the 2009-10 regular season, Sertich was honored as the 2010 WCHA Coach of the Year. Finishing tied for fifth place in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association with a 12-19-7 overall record (9-12-7-3 WCHA), the team claimed its first-ever playoff victory. The team eventually won its playoff series and made the debut trip to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF in Minneapolis, before bowing out after losing to the eventual National Champions Minnesota Duluth.

In the spring on 2010, Sertich was inducted into the Minnesota High School Hockey Coaches Hall of Fame. The honor, which is bestowed by the Minnesota Hockey Coaches Association, is given to coaches that have outstanding contributions to the sport of hockey in the state of Minnesota.

Under his tutelage, the BSU women's hockey team has posted its most conference wins in a single season, with nine in both 2009-10 and 2006-07. Sertich has also coached two Olympians while at Bemidji State, Nina Ziegenhals who played for Team Germany in the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, and Zuzana Tomickova who played for Team Slovakia in the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver

During summer 2008, Sertich served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's Under-22 Select team that played in the annual three-game Women's Under-22 Series with Canada, which took place from Aug. 20-23.

Sertich came to Bemidji State University after spending 13 years as the head varsity coach at Roseville Area High School. He coached the Roseville boys' team from 1993-2003, leading it to a 156-71-11 record and two Minnesota State tournament appearances. Under Sertich's guidance, Roseville finished third in the 2002 tournament and second in 2003. He led Roseville to Suburban East Conference Championships in 2002 and 2003. Sertich earned four Coach of the Year honors, as he was named Section 3AA boys' Coach of the Year in 1999, Section 2AA Boys' Coach of the Year in both 2002 and 2003, and Class AA Coach of the Year in 2003.

In 2003, Sertich moved to head coach of the Roseville girls' varsity team and in three seasons led the program to a record of 62-21-2. The Roseville girls finished fourth in the 2006 state tournament and captured Suburban East Conference titles in both '04 and '05. Sertich was named the 2004 Section 2AA Girls' Coach of the Year. Sertich began his coaching career in 1976 as the head boys' varsity coach at Northfield (Minn.) High School, and over the next 20 years he would hold a variety of head and assistant coaching positions at the high school, college and national levels.

After one year at Northfield, he moved on to Virginia (Minn.) High School as head boys' varsity hockey coach for one year, was an assistant with Team Midwest in the U.S. National Development Program at the 1979 Olympic Sports Festival, spent one year as an assistant at Colorado College in 1982-83, and served three years as an assistant coach at Palmer (Colo.) High School from 1983-86.

He returned back to Minnesota in 1987 as the assistant boys' varsity coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School and later served as an assistant at Richfield (Minn.) High School. In 1997, he was an assistant for Team Minnkota with the U.S. Development Program Select 17 program.

Sertich also has extensive camp coaching experience, starting as the director and head coach of the Minnesota Hockey Satellite Training Program in Roseville from 1995-2003. In addition, he has been the director of the Roseville Summer Hockey School since 2000 and the director and head coach of the Roseville Hockey Satellite Training Program since 2003.

Sertich began his playing career with the Colorado College Tigers in 1970 and assembled a standout four-year career, during which he played 125 games and scored 162 points (75G, 87A). He had 53 points (28G, 25A) as a junior in 1972-73 and 61 points (25G, 36A) as a senior in 1973-74.

Sertich was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1973-75. He was also a member of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, which finished fifth at the Innsbruck, Austria games. The U.S. team recorded wins over Finland and Poland en route to a 2-3 finish in Group A.

He also played two years in the German Professional League, spending the 1974-75 season as captain for Fussen and two seasons from 1978-80 playing for Nurnburg.

In May 2007, Sertich became the Vice President of Board of Directors for the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum located in Eveleth, Minn. Some of his responsibilities as Vice President of Board of Directors includes making decisions on marketing and purchasing endeavors, along with planning and making decisions for specific operations taking place throughout the year. Currently, Sertich is working on organizing the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Museum game which will be held in Eveleth. The first Hall of Fame game will take place Oct. 18 of this season, when the Beavers face the University of Wisconsin at the Hippodrome.

Sertich is a 1974 graduate of Colorado College with a bachelor's degree in elementary education and humanities. He received a master's degree in elementary education from Minnesota State in 1999.

Sertich's son, Marty Sertich, played for Colorado College from 2002-06 and scored 181 points (61G, 121A) during a stellar four-year career. He won the 2005 Hobey Baker Memorial Award, given to the

most outstanding player in college hockey, and was a finalist for the award in 2006. He was First-Team All WCHA and WCHA Player of the Year in 2005 and was a second team All-WCHA selection in 2006. Marty is currently playing professional hockey in Switzerland for EHC Olten.

Fryklund, BSU's all-time leading scorer, returns to Bemidji as an assistant coach in 2011 after concluding her playing career in 2003.

"Amber Fryklund is no stranger to Beaver hockey," said Athletic Director Dr. Rick Goeb. "As we know, Amber played hockey here and she still holds the record as the program's leading scorer. She was an outstanding captain here and went on to get some very good coaching experience in the Duluth area. We are excited to bring her back to Bemidji State."

Fryklund helped lay the groundwork for the Bemidji State women's hockey program in its infancy. She became the first women's player to surpass the 100-point milestone and remains the school's leader in both points and goals scored and is second all-time in assists. Fryklund was also BSU's first All-Western College Hockey Association selection with a second team nod following the 2001-02 season. As a senior, she was invited to try out for the US National Team. Following her collegiate career, Fryklund went on to play for the Minnesota Blue Jays Senior A Team and Duluth North Stars Senior A team before playing in 2006-07 for the Minnesota Whitecaps of the Western Women's Hockey League.

Fryklund not only brings a familiarity with the Bemidji State University women's hockey program but also a familiarity with high school hockey in the state of Minnesota. The native of Hibbing, Minn., who was once a Miss Minnesota Hockey Finalist in her prep playing days, was co-head coach of the Duluth Northern Stars from 2004-09 and an assistant coach for the Proctor-Hermantown-Marshall Mirage for the past two seasons. In addition, Fryklund has worked hockey camps across the state of Minnesota and also served as an evaluator for USA Hockey in Minnesota for girls ages 16 and 17.

In addition to coaching, Fryklund spent seven years teaching physical education to students grades five through eight at the Marshall School and Duluth Public Schools Academy, both in Duluth, Minn.

Fryklund received her Bachelor of Science degree in physical education teaching K-12 from Bemidji State in 2003. She received her Master's degree in educational leadership from University of Minnesota Duluth in 2007.

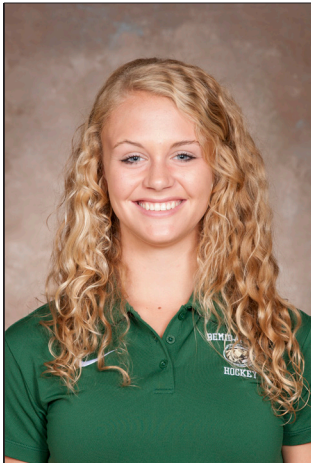

Even though the Beavers were out-shot in the contest 59-31, BSU jumped out to a huge leading scoring the first four goals of the contest. Mercyhurst almost had the first goal of the game, but the referees ruled no-goal on the play as they determined that the Mercyhurst played had kicked the puck into the net. Cody then pulled back to the left and with half her body over the end line, fired the puck into the far corner of the net. Four minutes later while on the penalty kill, Annie Bauerfeld (Sr., Fwd., Woodbury, Minn.) entered the offensive zone with one player to beat, but waited for Cody to enter the zone to make it a two-on-one. Bauerfeld made a nice centering pass to Cody who put the puck in the back of the net for the team's first short-handed goal on two seasons. Montana

Vichorek (Sr., Def., Moose Lake, Minn.) picked up an assist on the play. With the period winding down, St. Cloud State's Lisa Martinson was assessed a penalty for holding. On the power play, Vichorek had the puck up high and played it down low to Cody. Cody didn't see anything that she liked and cycled the puck to Bauerfeld who then took the puck on net. Sooner or later is was bound to happen. In a series spanning 50 games and over a decade, the Bemidji State University women's hockey team was due for a break in the lopsided rivalry and tonight it came off the stick of sophomore forward Emily Erickson (Coleraine, Minn.) in the form of a power-play goal. Locked in a scoreless tie with No. 3 University of Minnesota Duluth through more than 53 minutes of play, Bemidji State's head coach Steve Sertich called a time out to allow his top power-play unit to catch its breath. The Beavers returned from the break to complete the power-play with a face off in their own offensive zone. Senior Annie Bauerfeld (F, Woodbury, Minn.) won the face off to Erin Cody (Sr., F, Roseville, Minn.) at the top of the circle. Chased by a Bulldog defender, Cody found Erika Wheelhouse (So., D, Crookston, Minn.) across the slot. Wheelhouse centred the puck to Erickson who was crashing the net and tipped the puck passed the blocker of UMD goaltender Kim Martin, just inside the left post. The Bemidji State University women's hockey team skated to its second consecutive tie on Friday night, tying the No. 9/10 Ohio State Buckeyes 2-2. The Buckeyes went on to claim the extra point winning the shootout 1-0 in three rounds. The Buckeyes opened the scoring netting their first goal just five minutes into the game. Two of Ohio State's top-three scorers, Laura McIntosh and Hokey Langan, combined on the assists to give OSU the early lead. Bemidji State was unable to respond in the first period and headed to the locker room for the first intermission with the one-goal deficit and being out-shot 10-6 in the period. In the second the Beavers found their stride as they took control of the shots, out shooting the Buckeyes 14-8. While on the power-play in the middle stretch of the period, Annie Bauerfeld (Sr., Fwd., Wodbury, Minn.) found Emily Erickson (R-So., Fwd., Coleraine, Minn.) for a breakaway. After being denied on an earlier breakaway chance, Erickson was determined not to leave empty handed. Making a move to her left, Erickson ten cut back to the right and put in a back hander past the glove of Lisa Steffes. Zuzana Tomickova (Jr., G., Bratislava, Slovakia) was also credited with an assist on the play. The assist is her second of the season and career. Unfortunately, Ohio State's Olympian Natalie Spooner scored on the opening shot. BSU was unable to score on their first two shooters and Tomcikova stopped the next two from OSU. Erickson took the third shot for the Beavers and needed to score to keep the shootout going. After scoring against Steffes on a breakaway, Erickson again deked past the freshman goalie, but the goalie's best friend came through as Erickson rang the post giving Ohio State the extra point in the WCHA standings.

Snapping a 17-game winless streak against the University of Minnesota, the Bemidji State University women's hockey team downed the Golden Gophers for the third time in program history by a score of 2-0 at the Bemidji Regional Event Center on Friday afternoon. The last time the Beavers defeated the Gophers was on Feb. 9, 2006 at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis also by a score of 2-0. The win is the first home-win over Minnesota in BSU history and is a great indicator of how far the BSU women's hockey program has come since its inception. After having a quiet weekend against Ohio State in the previous week, Cody came out firing and gave the Beavers an early lead. Just six minutes into the start of the game, a failed attempt at the Gophers to clear the puck out of their zone resulted in Cody corralling the puck at the right face off circle. With traffic between her and the UM tender Noora Raty, Cody saw an opening and rifled the puck on net. Her shot went bar-down over Raty's glove. Cody's linemate Sadie Lundquist (So., Fwd., Coleraine, Minn.) picked up the first assist on the play. Freshman defender Allie Duellman (Maplewood, Minn.) picked up her first-collegiate assist, second career point, as she stopped the clearing attempt at the blue line to gain the second assist on the play. It was the sixth multipoint game for Cody this season and while she has recorded a point in all, but four games so far this season, a lot of the credit for the win is due to the brilliant play between the pipes by Zuzana Tomcikova (Jr., Bratislava, Slovakia). In her fourth shutout of the season and 12th of her career, Tomcikova turned aside 29 shots including a handful of two-on-one chances by the Gophers. With the early lead over the nationally-ranked Gophers, the were not about to rest on their laurels. BSU went on to out-shoot the Gophers 9-10 in the first period and eventually 16-11 in the second. One area this season where the Beavers have found themselves struggling has been in the third period. Bemidji State has been out-scored 14-4 in the third period so far this season and the Gophers took to the ice in the final frame looking to take advantage of that weakness. However, Bemidji State had other intentions in mind, and while being out-shot for the period, played a great defensive period shutting down the

Gopher scoring chances. With under two minutes left in the game and the score still 1-0 in BSU's favor, Minnesota opted to replace Raty for an extra attacker. The extra attacker didn't seem to phase the Beavers as they stepped up their play and actually controlled the puck behind the goal line of UM's empty net. Annie Bauerfeld (Sr., Fwd., Woodbury, Minn.) had an open shot at the vacant net, but hit the side pipe on her attempt. Cody came out on the next shift and eventually found the back of the net to seal the fourth BSU victory over a nationally-ranked team this season. In the game the Beavers blocked a total of 16 shots, with four each coming from Marlee Wheelhouse (Jr., Def., Crookston, Minn.) and Erika Wheelhouse (So., Def., Crookston, Minn.). The Bemidji State University women's hockey team picked up its first overtime victory of the season downing the Mavericks of Minnesota State 2-1 just 56 seconds into the OT period. All three seniors of the Bemidji State University women's hockey team score all the goals in Friday's afternoon game to help the Beavers down St. Cloud State 3-1 at the National Hockey Center. The three seniors, Erin Cody (Fwd., Roseville, Minn.), Annie Bauerfeld (Fwd., Woodbury, Minn.) and Erin Johnson (Fwd., Farmington, Minn.) each registered a goal and an assist in the Beavers ninth win of the season. Starting out of the gate the Beavers looked a bit sluggish. However, the slow start didn't deter Bemidji State as Cody scored her 13th goal of the season to put the Beavers on top heading into the first intermission. The play started behind the St. Cloud State net, when Emily Erickson (R-So., Fwd., Coleraine, Minn.) carried the puck out and dished it off to Montana Vichorek (Jr., Def., Moose Lake, Minn.) who was at the top of the right circle. Vichorek then passed it to Cody in the slot, and Cody ripped a shot past SCSU tender Ashley Nixon. Bemidji State University women's hockey senior Erin Cody (Roseville, Minn.) became the third player in school history to record 100 points in a career on Friday night as the Beavers lose to the No. 6 Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs by a score of 4-3 at the AMSOIL Arena. Not only did Cody become the second most point leader in school history, but she also did it in style recording a hat trick, including back-to-back goals in the second intermission when the Beavers were down 3-1 to tie the game heading into the third. Making her fourth start of the season, Alana McElhinney (Jr., G., Calgary, Alberta) made 31 saves in the contest. McElhinney is seeing her first full series of the season, as Zuzana Tomcikova (Jr., G., Bratislava, Slovakia) is with her national team in Turkey playing in the World University games. The Beavers opened the scoring in the first period at the 3:04 mark as Cody stole the puck at the Bulldog blue line. Skating down on net, fending off a defenseman, Cody pulled UMD's Olympic goaltender, Kim Martin, out of position before slipping it past her left side. However, Minnesota Duluth's Tara Gray answered back for the Bulldogs just three minutes later. Gray took a slap shot that McElhinney never saw and the puck went into the back of the net. Starting off the second period, the Bulldogs took advantage of a slow start by the Beavers and netted two goals within the first five minutes. Laura Fridfinnson netted both goals for UMD. With the Beavers feeling a bit deflated, they got a lucky bounce, literally. While on the power play, Cody was trying to break into the UMD zone but was cornered off at the blue line against the boards. Cody then flipped the puck high in the air for a dump in. The puck bounced in front of Kim Martin as she dropped into butterfly to stop the bouncing puck. However, as she dropped the puck took a bounce through her five hole and found its way into the back of the net. Montana Vichorek (Jr., Def., Moose Lake, Minn.) and Erin Johnson (Sr., Fwd., Farmington, Minn.) were credited with assists on the play. Just over a minute later Cody found the back of the net again to complete her hat trick. On a rebound off Martin that went behind the net, Cody picked the puck up and curled around the net on her forehead side. When she got in a good shooting angle, Cody sniped a beauty over Martin's right shoulder to tie the game at 3-3. Marlee Wheelhouse (Jr., Def., Crookston, Minn.) and Vichorek picked up the assists on the goal. After climbing back from a two-goal deficit, the Beavers entered the third period tied with the No. 6 team in the nation. Unfortunately, the Bulldogs would be the only ones to score in the period and even with an extra attacker in the waning minutes, Bemidji State couldn't capitalize for a fourth time. The Gophers took advantage of a sluggish defensive corps that started the game for the Beavers, scoring all four goals in the first period, including three goals within a three minute span. An early deficit was too much to overcome as the Bemidji State University women's hockey team fell 4-1 to the No. 4 Minnesota Golden Gophers on Friday night at Ridder Arena. The Gophers took advantage of a sluggish defensive corps that started the game for the Beavers, scoring all four goals in the first period, including three goals within a three minute span. The Beavers knew they needed to come out with some determination if they wanted to skate with the Gophers for 60 minutes. Off the opening draw, BSU went on the offensive and ended up catching UMN's Megan Bozek freezing the puck in the crease which resulted in a penalty shot for Bemidji State. Senior Erin Cody (Fwd., Roseville, Minn.) became the first player in Bemidji State University women's hockey history to record two 20-goal seasons on Friday afternoon as her efforts helped the Beavers claim a 4-1 victory over the Ohio State Buckeyes at the Sanford Center. The win also marked the most conference wins (11) and home wins (9) in a single season. With a fifth-place finish already secured, the Beavers looked to snap a six-game losing skid. Bemidji State struggled offensively against Minnesota last weekend, but that wasn't a factor tonight as BSU jumped out of the gate recording 17 shots on goal in the first period alone. The Beavers actually kept the Buckeyes from recording any shots for the first 14 minutes of play. The Beavers tallied a blistering 44 shots on goal in the game and it was the first time four years that BSU has recorded more than 42 shots on goal. In program history, the 44 shots ranks as the 11th most shots on goal in a single game. Emily Erickson (R-So., Fwd., Coleraine, Minn.) started the scoring off for the Beavers at the 9:48 mark. Cody created a turnover that caused an odd-man rush for BSU. Erickson skated down the left side of the ice and fired the puck on net, beating OSU's Lisa Steffes five-hole to score her 14th goal of the season. Just over a minute later, the Beavers went to back on the score sheet again, this time from the other redshirt-sophomore Abby Williams (Fwd., Alexandria, Minn.). Annie Bauerfeld (Sr., Fwd., Woodbury, Minn.) made a pass in the neutral zone to Sadie Lundquist (So., Fwd., Cloquet, Minn.) who was advancing into the Ohio State zone. Lundquist then cut across the slot and fired a puck on net and the rebound was bobbled by Steffes and the puck ended up behind her in the crease. Williams then came crashing into the net and knocked in the loose puck to score her second goal of the season. The Beavers would walk away from the first period having completely dominated the Buckeyes in the first period, outshooting them 17-3. However, Bemidji State knew the Buckeyes would come out stronger in the second period and that's just what they did. The Western Collegiate Hockey Association's women's league, sporting a record 11 consecutive national team championships since its founding in 1999, today (August 20) released its 2010-11 composite schedule, highlighted by the appearance of the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF on March 4-5 at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, Minn., and the opening of new arenas at league-members Bemidji State and defending national champion Minnesota Duluth.

Bemidji State will play its first game in the new building on Oct. 15, when the Beavers host eastern power Mercyhurst for a two-game non-conference series. Minnesota Duluth will officially open Amsoil Arena on Dec. 30 with the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame men's game between the Bulldogs and North Dakota while the women's team will first play in the new facility Jan. 21-22 against WCHA-foe Wisconsin.

"We also look forward to a highly competitive regular season in the WCHA. Each year our teams get stronger and the race to the championship gets tighter. Last year's co-championship between Minnesota Duluth and Minnesota was historic for us and just four points separated the next four teams at the end of the regular season. We feel the upcoming 2010-11 campaign may be our most tightly-contested season to date."

The WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF will again be contested at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis and hosted by the University of Minnesota, but with a new twist.

The initial on-ice action of 2010-11 will consist of three exhibition contests slated for Sept. 25-26 as St. Cloud State and Minnesota take turns hosting the University of Manitoba and North Dakota entertains the Toronto Jr. Aeros.

The first regular season action will occur the weekend of Oct. 1-3. In non-conference matchups Minnesota travels east to face Clarkson, St. Cloud State heads to Mercyhurst, Bemidji State is off to Wayne State, Wisconsin hosts Rensselaer and North Dakota hosts Boston University (Sat/Sun). In exhibition play, the UMD Bulldogs host the Minnesota Whitecaps for a pair of games.

The weekend of Oct. 8-10 will bring the first league encounters of the 2010-11 season as Minnesota Duluth ventures to North Dakota (Sat/Sun) and Wisconsin entertains Bemidji State (Fri/Sun). Outside the WCHA, Ohio

State plays at Robert Morris, Minnesota State hosts Niagara, and St. Cloud State and Minnesota will take turns hosting Wayne State and the Minnesota Whitecaps (exh).

Other conference openers, by member team, are: Minnesota (Oct. 15-16 vs North Dakota), Minnesota State (Oct. 16-17 at Minnesota Duluth), Ohio State (Oct. 15-16 vs St. Cloud State), and St. Cloud State (Oct. 15-16 @ Ohio State).

Additional non-conference action this season, by member team, consists of the following matchups: Bemidji State (vs Mercyhurst, Oct. 15-16); Minnesota (vs Harvard, Nov. 26 & 28); Minnesota Duluth (vs Connecticut, Oct. 23-24); Minnesota State (@ Wayne State, Nov. 26-27 and vs Robert Morris, Dec. 3-4); North Dakota (@ Vermont, Jan. 7-8); Ohio State (vs Syracuse, Oct. 29-30 and vs Wayne State, Dec. 30-31); St. Cloud State (vs Mercyhurst and Northeastern as host of Easton Holiday Showcase, Jan. 1-2); and Wisconsin (@ Robert Morris, Nov. 19-20 and vs Northeastern and Mercyhurst @ Easton Holiday Showcase in St. Cloud, Jan. 1-2).

The pursuit of the WCHA playoff championship will get underway the weekend of Feb. 25-27 with the four first round conference playoff series. The top four ranked teams in the final regular season standings will host best-of-three playoff series against the bottom four ranked teams as the No. 1 seed hosts the No. 8 seed, No. 2 hosts No. 7, No. 3 hosts No. 6 and No. 4 hosts No. 5.

Those four first-round conference playoff winners will then advance to the 2011 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF, set for March 4-5 at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, Minn. There will be two semi-final matchups on Friday at 4:07 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT with the championship contest set for 7:07 pm CT on Saturday evening. Minnesota Duluth is the defending WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF champion.

Following the league playoff championship, four NCAA Div. 1 Women's Regional tournaments will be contested the weekend of March 11-14 at sites to be determined.

The four regional winners will then earn a trip to the 2011 NCAA Women's Frozen Four, which will be contested March 18 and 20 in Erie, Pa.

The Campus



- Named a top-tier Midwest university for 2009, 2010 and 2011 academic years by U.S. News and World Report.

- A wooded, lakeside campus offering arts, sciences, and select professional programs in a personal learning atmosphere focused on the environment, civic engagement, and the global family.

- Location: In the heart of northern Minnesota's lakes and forest region. Four hours northwest of St. Paul-Minneapolis; two hours northeast of Fargo, ND.

- Approximately 5,000 undergraduate and about over 300 graduate students.

- Faculty research and expertise include: bioremediation, child development, women in the workplace, emergency responders and stress, poetry and creative writing, e-learning, digital literacy and computer-mediated communication, business in the Middle East, the internet in business, the therapy of sex offenders and sexual abuse within families, women and the criminal justice system, Minnesota environmental and economics issues, the Ojibwe language, and Native American culture.

- The nationally-recognized Outdoor Program Center has a lakeside facility for offering educational programs and renting kayaks, canoes, pontoons, sailboats, mountain bikes, and camping equipment. Weekend trips and semester break trips are available at student-discounted prices. The center also rents winter recreational equipment at the University's recreational center.

- BSU recreation center offers 6 basketball courts, 8 outdoor tennis courts, 4 indoor tennis courts, 5 racquetball courts, 200-meter indoor track, 8-lane outside track, 6-lane 25-yard pool, 3 baseball and softball fields, 4 indoor volleyball courts, 2 sand volleyball courts, free and fixed weights, 13 cardio machines, and a state-of-the-art rock climbing wall; the center is located near the residence halls.

- Men's hockey: winner of 13 national championships, 22 conference championships and, with an all-time winning percentage of .664, has the highest winning percentage of any NCAA Division I team.

- A total of 95 BSU athletes earned academic achievement recognition in 2009-2010.

The City

The Bemidji area is home to a population of more than 30,000 and includes the Leech Lake, White Earth, and Red Lake Indian Reservations, and Lake Itasca, the headwaters to the Mississippi River. The City of Bemidji provides a focus for educational, business, and medical services. Recreational and cultural activities reflect a multicultural heritage that includes American Indian, European and Canadian influences.

Bemidji is a "golden city" along the river's bank, only miles from where the mighty Mississippi River begins its 2,552 mile journey to New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, a city at the center of the legends of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox.

Bemidji's natural beauty and bounty as a meeting or group tour destination is also enhanced with historic character. From world renown statues and architecture listed on the National Register of Historic Places, to ancient earth mounds and burial grounds, the past takes an interesting turn in Bemidji.

Bemidji's waterfront is home to the world-famous statues of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Nearby is Bemidji's Tourist Information Center. In addition to Paul Bunyan memorabilia, The Bunyan House features the Fireplace of States built with stones from every state in the U.S. and Canadian provinces.

To the north, you'll encounter Library Park and the statue of Bemidji's founding Chief Bemidji, as well as the Community Arts Center in the Carnegie Building, also on the National Register.

At the south end of Lake Bemidji is Nymore Beach, site of the Crookston Lumber Co. The burning of the mill in 1924 marked the end of the county's logging era.

On the way into Bemidji, you may cross over the historic Mississippi River Bridge, built in 1916. This structure is listed on the National Register as one of the earliest

examples of a steel-reinforced concrete bridge. At the southern end of Minnesota Avenue lies the Great Northern Depot, completed in 1913. On the Historic Register, the Depot is the last early 20th century railroad building left in its original condition.

The Commercial Building on Third Street, built in 1910, is cited in the Architecture of Minnesota Guide as a successful prairie-style solution for a single-story building.

Other examples of historic architecture include the Beltrami County Courthouse built in 1902. Across the street you'll find the 1917 Colonial Revival-style former Post Office.

Perhaps Bemidji's best-known historic district is the eight-block section of Lake Boulevard. Once known as Bemidji's "Gold Coast," among the many venerable homes to be viewed is the Dr. Johnson House built in 1910 with a showcase garden.

The Bacon House was also built in 1910, later used for a Catholic convent. An unusual log structure, the Fisk House was reconstructed log-by-log at the present site. Judge Fisk enjoyed entertaining many distinguished guests, including writer F. Scott Fitzgerald. Further along you'll find Warfield House, the 1912 home of the man who built Bemidji's electric light plant.

Two lady teachers resided at the 1930s Parker & Mangelsdorf House, also known for its large, informal gardens.

Birchmont Drive displays two art deco classics built in 1937, one with a semicircular glass projection, is located at Bemidji State University, the only lakeshore campus in the state with architecture dating back to 1919.

Located about midway between Minneapolis/St. Paul to the south and Winnipeg, Canada to the north, Bemidji has easy access by air, motor carrier, and automobile to metropolitan areas and international airports.



The ninth hole at the Bemidji Town and Country Club offers a breath-taking view of Lake Bemidji and the surrounding area.

Athletics Facilities



Chet Anderson Stadium is home to BSU's football program. It is one of just three collegiate football stadiums in the nation with a lakeside setting.



BSU Baseball Field plays host to the Beaver baseball program in the spring. The stadium grandstand was completed for the 2002 season and the facility underwent a \$170,000 renovation project including the installation of new dugouts and a Fair-Play electronic LED scoreboard in 2007.



Bemidji State's softball program plays its home contests at the BSU Softball Field, adjacent to the baseball field. In the spring of 2008, the school unveiled a new permanent scoreboard to the facility.



BSU Gymnasium is the home of BSU's men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. BSU's men and women each won a home-court first-round NSIC playoff game in 2004.



Built in 1996, the BSU Soccer Complex is the home to the BSU women's soccer team. In 2006 a state of the art irrigation system was put in place, allowing the field to remain green throughout the year.



The BSU indoor track and tennis teams make their home in the Gillett Recreation/Fitness Center. One of the finest indoor facilities in the region, the center also serves as the campus recreational center.

Sanford Center



located on the south shore of Lake Bemidji, the Sanford Center provides the people of northern Minnesota with a signature sports and entertainment facility. The home of Bemidji State men's and women's hockey, the facility has enabled Bemidji to attract a variety of civic, convention and entertainment events and enhance its position as a regional center for northern Minnesota.

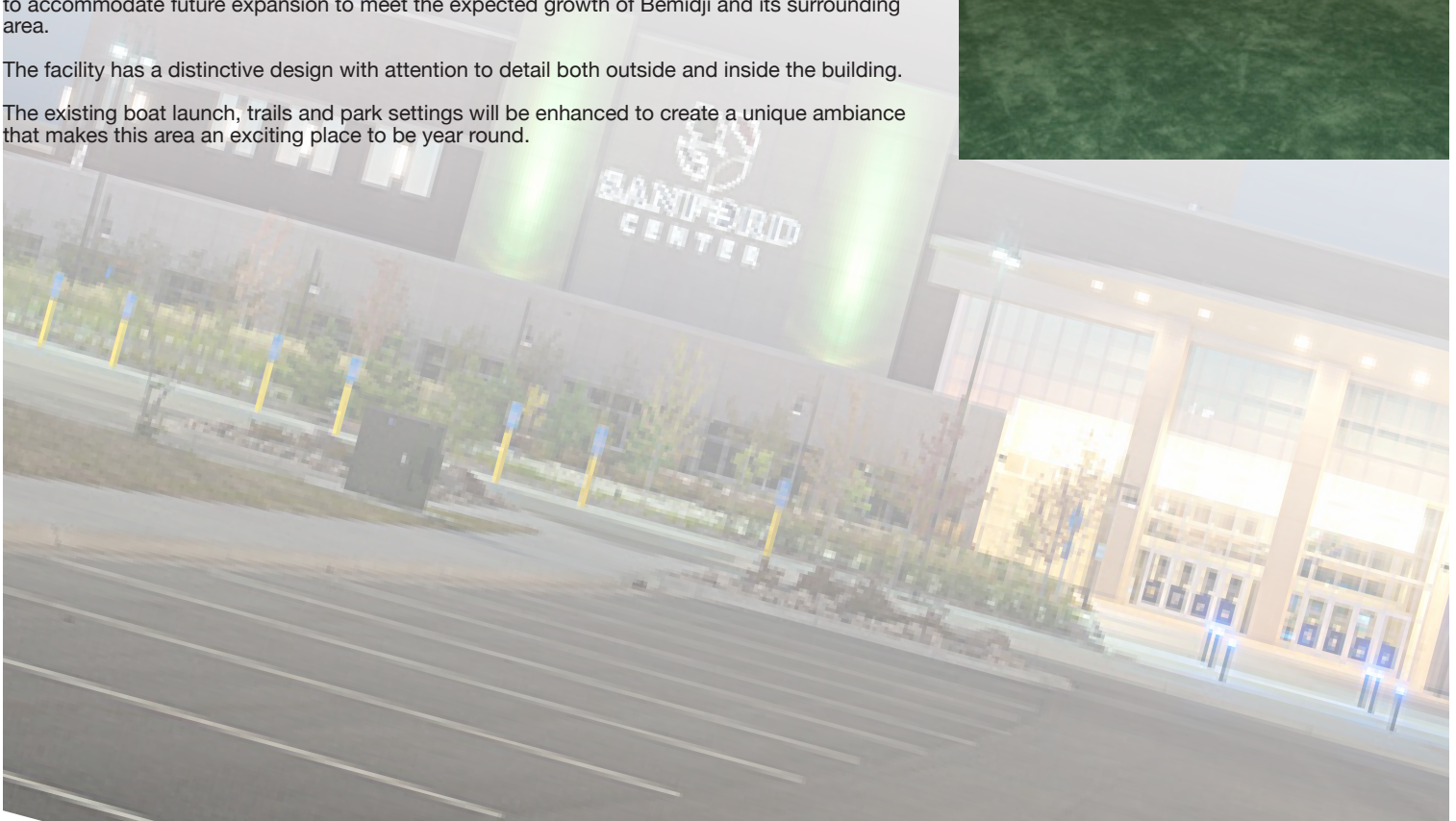
The Sanford Center encompasses approximately 185,000 square feet and include all amenities required to host concerts, family shows, trade shows and community events. It has also been designed as an elite Division I hockey facility, providing the BSU men's and women's programs with one of the finest home venues in the nation.

The arena seats 4,373 around a 200'x85' ice sheet for hockey and can be reconfigured to accommodate approximately 6,000 guests for concerts and trade shows. Seating includes a club level and 26 luxury suites, and all areas of the arena will have access to full-featured concessions areas.

The building also includes convention facilities, featuring a 10,000-square-foot dividable ballroom and 4,000 square feet of meeting space. The convention and meeting facilities have been designed to accommodate future expansion to meet the expected growth of Bemidji and its surrounding area.

The facility has a distinctive design with attention to detail both outside and inside the building.

The existing boat launch, trails and park settings will be enhanced to create a unique ambiance that makes this area an exciting place to be year round.



Compliance and Media Services

Who Are Boosters?

You are considered a booster or a representative of Bemidji State University Athletics interests if you:

- Participated in or are currently a member of any athletics department booster group, including Beaver Pride
- Have made a donation to the athletic program
- Have assisted or been asked to assist with recruiting of prospective student athletes
- Have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student athletes or families
- Have helped to promote BSU athletics or BSU athletic interests in any way

Once a person has become identified as a booster to BSU they retain that identity indefinitely even if they no longer support the athletics program.

Who Are Prospective Student-Athletes?

The NCAA defines a "prospect" as anyone who has started classes for the ninth grade.

In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospect if the institution provides any financial assistance or other benefits not provided to any prospective student.

What Are Permissible Activities by Boosters?

The following are activities that BSU boosters can participate in:

- May attend events such as contests or banquets where prospects are present so long as the booster is there on their own initiative. Boosters are NOT able to contact prospects or prospect's relatives at such events.
- Boosters CAN inform BSU coaches of prospects in their area by contacting the BSU staff and/or sending newspaper clippings about the prospect.
- Boosters may arrange employment for prospects. Prospects may not start the job until after completion of their senior year in high school, and compensation must be based on actual work performed at a normal rate.
- Boosters can continue to establish family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with prospects are permitted as long as they are NOT for recruiting purposes and are NOT initiated by BSU staff members.

What is a Contact? What is Considered Recruiting?

Contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or their parents/guardians and a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) during which dialogue occurs in excess of a greeting.

Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or the prospect's relatives by a BSU staff member or athletics representative (booster) for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and eventual participation in the BSU intercollegiate athletics program.

The website contains typical schedule and roster information, biographical sketches of the Beavers and the coaching staff, comprehensive statistical information and news release archives.

Additionally, information from previous seasons is archived and remains available on the website, providing a valuable research tool for media or others covering the Bemidji State women's hockey program. Complete season stats are available beginning with the 2000-01 season. More information is being added to the archive sections of the website on a frequent basis, so if you cannot find what you're looking for check back or contact the athletic media relations office for assistance.

Also available at the site are complete media guides for men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's basketball, football and volleyball in Adobe PDF format. Previous media guides are also available in the archives.

Credentials / Pass List

Season credentials will be issued to all media covering the Beavers on a regular basis.

For single-game passes and credentials, contact the BSU athletic media relations office no less than 24 hours before the scheduled starting time of the event.

Credentials will be issued only to representatives of an accredited media outlet who will be working in an official capacity to cover a BSU athletic event. No credentials will be issued to friends, spouses, children or other family members.

Credentials remain the property of Bemidji State University and may be revoked at any time.

Professional Scouts

By NCAA regulation, persons in attendance at a Bemidji State women's hockey contest for the purpose of scouting players for professional leagues or franchises must purchase a ticket in order to gain access to the contest.

Scouts will be provided with a pass which will give them access to the press box for the purpose of obtaining line charts and statistics. Requests for these passes must be made in advance through Director of Athletic Media Relations Brad Folkestad.

Interview Policies

The tenth president of Bemidji State University, Dr. Richard Hanson, took office officially on July 12, 2010. He also serves as president of Northwest Technical College.

The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees announced Hanson's appointment on May 19, with Chancellor James McCormick formally presenting the president-elect to the faculty and staff of both campuses the following day.

Hanson, 60, had been interim president of North Dakota State University since Dec. 1, 2009. Previously, he served as



president of Waldorf College; professor of sociology, vice president for academic affairs and dean of the college, all at Augustana College; associate vice president for academic affairs, associate director of human development in the Extension Service and director of the Family Studies Institute, all at North Dakota State University; and chair of the Department of Home Economics at California State University, Chico.

Hanson also has held interim positions at North Dakota State University that included vice president for academic affairs and dean of the College of University Studies. Hanson earned his bachelor's degree in sociology and his master's in child development and family relations, both from North Dakota State University, and a doctorate in applied behavioral science from the University of California-Davis.

Dr. Rick Goeb

Director of Athletics
North Dakota State University (1989)

A new era in Bemidji State University athletics began July 13, 2001 when Dr. Rick Goeb was named BSU's first full-time director of intercollegiate athletics.

Goeb directs a 17-sport varsity athletics program at BSU with NCAA Division I men's and women's ice hockey and 15 Division II sports.

Beaver athletics has undergone dramatic changes in Goeb's tenure, having seen more than a dozen positions created or filled with new hires - including head coaches for women's hockey, men's and women's basketball, soccer, softball, baseball, women's golf, tennis and volleyball - and the hiring of BSU's first full-time athletics fundraiser.

In Goeb's five years overseeing BSU athletics, the program has entered one of the best all-around eras in the program's history. Men's ice hockey has won two College Hockey America regular-season titles, two tournament titles and made its first Division I NCAA Tournament appearance; men's basketball won its first NSIC Championship in decades, advanced to its first-ever NCAA Tournament and has hosted first-round NSIC playoff games each of the last four years; women's basketball hosted and won its first-ever NSIC playoff game; indoor track won its first-ever NSIC Championship; men's and women's golf have made NCAA regional appearances with both full teams and individual performers.



BSU athletics has also assembled a strong academic reputation under Goeb's leadership. Men's hockey has set a CHA single-season record for number of Academic All-CHA performers three times and produced the 2005 CHA Student-Athlete of the Year; women's ice hockey posted three consecutive WCHA Student-Athletes of the Year from 2002-04; and nearly two dozen BSU student-athletes have been recognized on the CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District V Team with four Academic All-America honorees.

Goeb came to Bemidji State after six years as senior associate athletics director at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks. At Fairbanks, Goeb served as NCAA compliance officer, monitored academic eligibility and acted as the liaison for booster clubs.

Prior to his position at Fairbanks, Goeb spent two years as an administrator at North Dakota. Goeb also served as the head wrestling coach at St. Cloud State from 1990-93 when he was an instructor in physical education and a facility coordinator; was the strength and conditioning coach at Northern Colorado from 1989-'90; and served as an assistant wrestling coach at North Dakota State from 1988-'89.

Originally from Anoka, Minn., Goeb received his undergraduate degree at North Dakota State, where he was also a Division II national wrestling champion. Goeb earned his master's from Northern Colorado and doctorate from North Dakota. He and his wife Carol have two daughters, Amber and Anne and a son, Jordan.

Brad Folkestad

Director of Athletic Media Relations
Bemidji State University (2001)

Brad Folkestad is in his ninth year in the Office of Athletic Media Relations at Bemidji State. As Director, he oversees all publicity and media relations operations for BSU's 17-sport athletics department, and directly handles communications for the university's football, men's hockey, golf and track and field programs.

Entering his 10th year in the athletic media relations field, Folkestad was promoted to the Director post in the spring of 2007.

Folkestad has spent seven years of professional career at BSU. Starting with a two-year stint as a graduate assistant in 2002, he returned as the Assistant SID in the fall of 2004 after a one-year assignment in the same capacity at the University of Minnesota Duluth.

In addition to serving as the men's and women's basketball contact during each of the first four years in the business, Folkestad's interests and experience in collegiate basketball run deep. He has volunteered at numerous conference, regional and national tournaments including the 2003 and 2006 NCAA



Division I Men's Midwest Regional Tournament in Minneapolis, Minn., the 2005 NCAA Division II Elite Eight in Grand Forks, N.D. at the 2003 NCAA Division II Women's Frozen Four.

He is an active member of the College Sports Information Directors of America and has been recognized for excellence in publications on a number of occasions including a Ninth in the Nation finish for his 2005 BSU Volleyball Media Guide.

Folkestad, 33, received his bachelor's degree in communication from BSU in 2001 and continues to work toward a master's degree in sports studies. He resides in Bemidji, Minn. with his wife Lisa and their five children Tim, Nicole, Carly, Mackenna and Baylor.

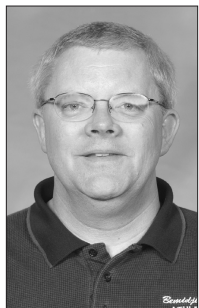
