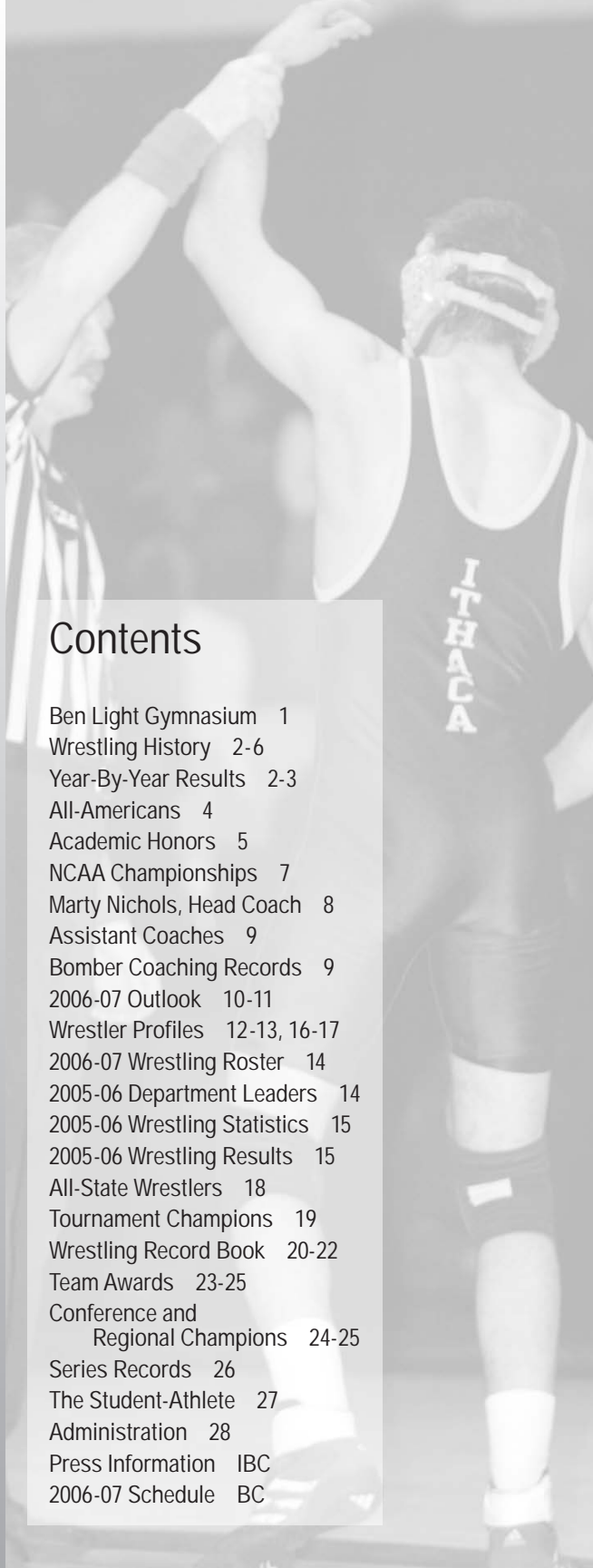

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Ithaca College's main gymnasium was dedicated on December 5, 1964. The facility was later named after former administrator **Ben Light** in action taken by the school's board of trustees in February of 1968. The wrestling arena, with seating capacity for 2,600 spectators, is housed in the Laurence S. Hill Physical Education Center.

Ben Light was a football, basketball and baseball standout at Ithaca College. A 1936 graduate, he was hired as a faculty member and coach. Following World War II Light took over the men's basketball program and guided the Bombers to a 70-51 record over the next seven seasons. In 1952 he was named the school's first director of admission and placement, and seven years later he became secretary of Ithaca College. In 1968 **Light** was named vice president of development, a position he held until his death.

Laurence S. Hill was dean of physical education at Ithaca from 1929 until 1957. Both **Light** and **Hill** are members of the Ithaca College Athletic Hall of Fame.

Ben Light Gymnasium has played host to a number of important wrestling events, including the 1990 NCAA Division III championships. The Bombers, encouraged by the hometown crowd, captured their second straight national championship in that competition, capped by heavyweight **Mike Fusilli's** individual title in the final match.

The season-opening Ithaca Invitational, now in its 24th year, has showcased some of the nation's top collegiate wrestling talent. In 1989 Ithaca inaugurated the Division III National Dual Wrestling Championship. An event with a unique team format, the tournament

returned to Ithaca in 1994. The Bombers hosted the NCAA Division III Northeast Regional qualifying tournament in 1986, the NCAA East Regional qualifier in 1989 and the ECWC Championships in 1995 and again in 2001. Ithaca is scheduled to host the competition again in 2007. Ithaca was the site of the 1998 New York State Collegiate Championship, an all-division tournament that also was held at Ben Light Gymnasium in 1985.

Ithaca's wrestlers have excelled in Ben Light Gymnasium over the years. In addition to winning the national championship at home, the Bombers posted a 63-17-1 (.784) dual-match record in **John Murray's** 15 years as coach. The Bombers have won their last 13 dual matches at home, including both last winter.

The floor of Ben Light Gymnasium was resurfaced during the summer of 1997. The facility is also the home arena for men's and women's basketball and intercollegiate gymnastics and volleyball.

The Ithaca College wrestling program is one of Division III's most successful. The achievements of Ithaca's program include:

- three national team titles, (a total surpassed only by Brockport and the College of New Jersey);
- back-to-back NCAA championships in 1989-90;
- eight top-five team finishes at the NCAA meet;
- seven individual national champions;
- 51 all-Americans, who have accumulated 77 total honors.

The Bombers have won three national team titles in the last 17 years.

Ithaca wrestling had its beginning in 1930 at the Seneca Gym in downtown Ithaca under the direction of **Walter O'Connell**, who had started the wrestling program at neighboring Cornell University in 1908. Although his record at Ithaca was a modest 8-17-1 in six seasons, his efforts laid the program's foundation.

A collegiate wrestling pioneer, **O'Connell** was inducted into the Ithaca College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1991. He had earned membership earlier in the Cornell Athletic Hall of Fame and the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

The program was temporarily discontinued in 1936 but was brought back by **O'Connell** protégé and former Ithaca captain **Clyde "Whitey" Cole** in 1946. Ithaca College president **Leonard Job**, a wrestler as an undergraduate at Indiana University, also played a key role in the rebirth. An outstanding athlete, **Job** was known to participate in practice sessions with Bomber wrestlers. Ithaca made its first mark on the national level under **Cole's** guidance with a 14th-place finish at the NCAA championships in 1949. The Bombers followed with a seventh-place showing the next season.

One standout during **Cole's** four-year tenure was **Jim LaRock**. Unbeaten in four years of dual-meet

competition with 31 wins and 26 falls, **LaRock** developed into one of the top 165-pound wrestlers in the U.S. While at Ithaca he earned a second-place finish in the NCAA tournament for all-American honors, won national YMCA and AAU championships and gained a spot on the 1952 U.S. Olympic team.

Former **Cole** assistant **Herbert Broadwell** took over as head coach in 1950. His 20-year career included 99 victories and five all-Americans. The Bombers placed at the national championships six times during **Broadwell's** career and on another two occasions when the event was the NCAA College Division championships.

During **Broadwell's** tenure, **Jim Howard** earned all-American honors twice at 130 pounds, finishing third and second in the NCAA tournament in 1953 and

1954, respectively. **Howard** also captured individual titles in the 4I and Wilkes Open tournaments. **Orlando Iacovelli** was another two-time all-American, reaching the semifinals twice at 147 pounds.

Bob Marella was Ithaca's first all-American in the heavyweight division, placing second at the NCAA championships in 1959. Nicknamed "**Tiny**" during his undergraduate days, **Marella** once pinned an opponent in 18 seconds and was known for performing a cartwheel on his way to the mat. **Marella** went on to a professional wrestling career with the World Wrestling Federation under the name "**Gorilla Monsoon.**"

Heavyweight **Jack Stanbro** followed **Marella** with a second-place finish at nationals in 1960, and **Terry Habecker** rounded out the list of all-American

wrestlers under **Broadwell** by placing fourth at 137 pounds in 1969.

The program's fortunes sagged in the 1970s, although **Paul Iacovelli**, **Ron King** and **Ralph Salem** were all-Americans. Ithaca was 45-59 in the decade under four different coaches. The period marked a divisional realignment by the NCAA, and Ithaca began

competing in the Division III ranks. The Bomber program also joined the Independent College Athletic Conference. ICAC wrestling championships were held from 1970 to 1984, and Ithaca claimed the conference crown in 1974 and 1984.

The program was at a crossroads in 1980 when **John Murray** was hired as Ithaca's eighth wrestling coach. Within two years **Murray** began producing nationally contending teams. During his last 12 seasons, **Murray** guided the Bombers into the top 15 at the national

tournament 11 times. When he retired from coaching in 1995, he stood first among Ithaca wrestling coaches with 150 dual-match wins.

In **Murray's** 15 coaching seasons, 27 wrestlers earned 50 all-American honors, including three-time winners **Mike Fusilli, Kent Maslin, Chris Matteotti, Bart Morrow, Mike Murtha, Marty Nichols** and **Bob Panariello**. **Morrow**, who wrestled primarily at 134 pounds during his career, posted a perfect 48-0 dual-match record and was the Division III runner-up in his weight class in 1985 and 1986. **Panariello** excelled at 118 pounds and still holds the school record with 129 career wins.

The 1987-88 season marked the beginning of Ithaca's most successful three-year stretch. **Mike Cronmiller** became the school's first male athlete to win an individual national championship and, along with five other all-American efforts, helped Ithaca to a team-best third at the 1988 NCAA meet. The following year second-place showings by **Dan Bieller, Fusilli** and **Ron Gross**, and fifth-place finishes from **Joel Lamson** and **Nichols** brought the Bombers a national championship.

In 1990 Ithaca played host to the national championship meet and successfully defended its title. **Fusilli** capped off the championship by winning the heavyweight title in the final match. He was joined by four other all-Americans: **Cronmiller, Gross, Lamson** and **Nichols**.

Another key contributor to the Bombers' success was assistant coach **David Auble**. A two-time NCAA

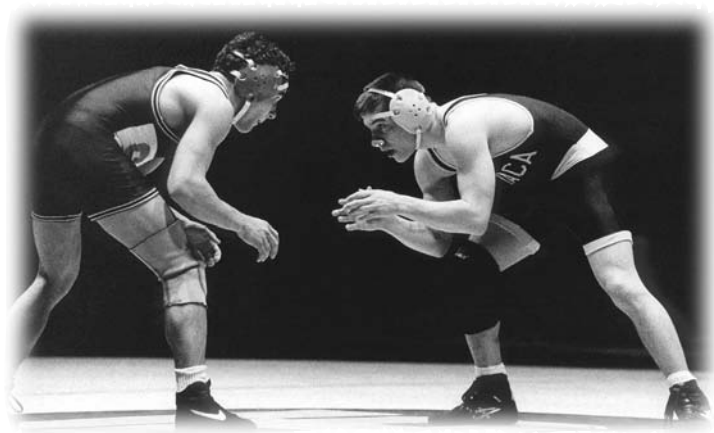
champion at Cornell, **Auble** brought his considerable experience to the Ithaca program in 1987. He was named Division III assistant coach of the year by *Wrestling USA* magazine after Ithaca's first NCAA championship and continued to help coach the middle weights for a number of years. He returned to the program in 2004 as a volunteer assistant.

The Bombers won their third national championship in 1994. Ithaca jumped out to an early lead at the NCAA tournament and fought off a Wartburg rally to win the title. **Steve Farr** won the 190-pound class, **Maslin** and **Matt Sorochinsky** both finished second and **Matteotti** and **Murtha** were awarded all-American recognition.

The 1995 season, **Murray's** last, saw **Matteotti** and **Jason Bovenzi** win national championships at 190 and 118 pounds, respectively.

John Gemmell became Ithaca's first individual state champion at 118 pounds in 1996 and twice placed second at the Division III meet at that weight. In 1998 **Gemmell** capped his career with a national championship at 126 pounds. He was the first Ithaca wrestler to reach the finals three times.

A new era began in 1996 with the hiring of Bomber all-American **Marty Nichols** as head coach. **Nichols** has coached 17 all-Americans in his nine years; six of those wrestlers reached the championship match, including national champions **Gemmell** and **Tommy Hall**.

1988-89

UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS, Ohio—The Ithaca wrestling team used a balanced attack, including five all-Americans, to win the program's first national championship.

John Murray was selected by the National Wrestling Coaches Association as NCAA Division III coach of the year following the tournament.

Three wrestlers finished second for Ithaca. At 142 pounds, **Ron Gross** pinned his first two opponents and won superior decisions in the quarterfinals and semifinals. He lost in the championship match to three-time national champion **Shaun Smith** of Delaware Valley. **Dan Bieller** lost a one-point decision in the 177-pound final, as did **Mike Fusilli** at 190 pounds. **Fusilli** had a difficult run, including two overtime decisions, before settling for second.

Joel Lamson claimed a 1-0 overtime decision in the consolation to earn fifth place. **Marty Nichols** rounded out the all-Americans, placing fifth. After being eliminated in the semifinals by three-time national champion **Karl Monaco** of Montclair State, **Nichols** won by fall.

Ithaca's other qualifiers were **Tim Cotter** and **Randy Cotton**, at 134 pounds and heavyweight, respectively.

Ithaca's previous top finish was third at the 1988 championship.

1989-90

ITHACA, N.Y.—The year of preparation that went into hosting the 1990 NCAA Division III Wrestling Championships at Ithaca paid off in a smooth-running event. No amount of planning, however, could have guaranteed a more exciting outcome for Ithaca fans.

Coach **John Murray's** team successfully defended its 1989 title. A crowning touch was **Mike Fusilli** winning an individual championship at heavyweight in the final match of the tournament. A jam-packed Ben Light Gymnasium watched **Fusilli** post a 13-5 win over Luther's **Tom Eye**.

Two other Ithaca wrestlers reached the finals. At 126 pounds, **Joel Lamson** was edged out 2-0 by pretourney favorite **Fritz Zagorski** of Brockport, while 150-pounder **Marty Nichols** lost 7-3 to top-seeded **Shawn Voight** of Cornell College (Iowa). The runner-up results were a three-spot improvement for each Ithaca wrestler.

Mike Cronmiller and **Ron Gross** rounded out Ithaca's all-Americans in 1990. **Cronmiller** placed third in the 158-pound class and **Gross** was fifth at 142 pounds. **Tim Habecker** and **Dan Bieller** completed the list of Ithaca qualifiers at nationals.

The Bombers joined Brockport and the College of New Jersey as the only schools to successfully defend Division III championships.

1993-94

STEVENS POINT, Wis.—In a title chase that came down to the 190-pound championship match, Ithaca won its third national championship by edging out Wartburg, 77.75-75.

Ithaca and Wartburg went head-to-head in the 190 bout to determine the title, and **Steve Farr** won a 2-1, overtime, sudden-death decision over **Jon Dawley**. The two were tied 1-1 after regulation, then wrestled a scoreless overtime period. In the tiebreaker, **Dawley** won the coin toss and chose the down position. **Dawley** needed only an escape to win, but **Farr** held on for the 30-second period to earn the victory. In the process, he became Ithaca's third individual national wrestling champion.

Like **Farr**, **Kent Maslin** and **Matt Sorochinsky** each reached the championship match. **Maslin** lost 8-7 in the 150-pound final, while 158-pounder **Sorochinsky** lost 2-1 in an overtime tiebreaker.

Chris Matteotti and **Mike Murtha** also earned all-American recognition by placing fourth and fifth at 118 and 177, respectively. **Vinnie DiGiacomo**, a 126-pound competitor, and 167-pounder **Karl Zenie** scored points for the Bombers as well.

John Murray was named Division III coach of the year by the National Wrestling Coaches Association after guiding seven qualifiers to the championship.

Three-time all American Marty Nichols has continued success as the Bombers' coach. The 1990 Ithaca graduate was named NCAA rookie coach of the year after leading the Bombers to a 7-5 mark (improving on an 0-8 mark) and a 16th-place finish at the 1997 NCAA championships.

Over the past nine years he has led Ithaca to five more top-20 finishes at nationals. In 2002 Ithaca recorded a sixth-place NCAA finish, won the ECWC title and produced four all-Americans, including national champion Tommy Hall. Eight more all-Americans have been crowned over the past four years.

One of eight three-time all-American wrestlers at Ithaca and a member of the program's first two NCAA champion teams, Nichols was inducted into the Ithaca College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

Nichols qualified for nationals all four years, winning four 150-pound regional titles. As a sophomore he finished sixth at the NCAA meet. His junior season featured 32 wins, a 13-2 dual-match mark and a fifth-place finish at nationals, helping the Bombers win their first NCAA title.

As a senior Nichols recorded a 32-5 mark, eight pins, an Ithaca Invitational title and runner-up showings at the state and NCAA championships as Ithaca defended its national title. Nichols earned a spot on the NWCA all-academic team and was presented with Ithaca's Clyde "Whitey" Cole Scholar-Athlete Award after receiving the Jack Stanbro "Heart" Award as a junior.

Nichols is fourth on Ithaca's career list with 115 overall victories and 42 dual-match wins.

From 1990 to 1992 he was an assistant coach at Division I Cornell. The Big Red won the Ivy League title both seasons and claimed the eastern title in 1992. Nichols then spent two years coaching at Ithaca High School, before returning to Ithaca College as an assistant for the 1994-95 season. The Bombers placed third at the NCAA championships that year.

One of the program's most successful wrestlers, Ryan Ciotoli is in his fourth year with the coaching staff. He has played an integral role in the development of Ithaca's middle-weight wrestlers during his coaching career.

Ciotoli posted a record of 90-22 despite missing nearly all of his senior season with an injury. His total of 39 dual-match wins is exceeded by only four Bombers.

Ciotoli earned all-America honors three times and finished as national runner-up in 2000 and 2001. He is one of four Ithaca wrestlers to reach the title match twice and the eighth three-time all-American in Bomber wrestling. As a sophomore he was named Outstanding Wrestler at the ECWC Championship. A year later he went 17-0 in dual meets (the best record ever by a Bomber).

A 2002 graduate, Ciotoli is pursuing his master's degree. He is a substitute teacher in the Ithaca School District and also competes in mixed martial arts events around the country.

Three time all-American Mike Fusilli is spending a second season with the Bomber coaching staff this winter.

Fusilli, a 1991 Ithaca graduate, spent seven years as the head coach at Division I Binghamton

Dave Auble rejoined the coaching staff in 2004.

He helped the program to three national titles during his first stint, including 1989 when he was named Division III Assistant Coach of the Year by *Wrestling USA* magazine after the Bombers won their first NCAA title.

Auble was a standout wrestler at Ithaca High School and Cornell University. Competing at 123 pounds, he won NCAA championships in 1959 and 1960 and Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association titles in 1958, 1959 and 1960. In 1960 he was named the outstanding wrestler at the NCAA championship meet. Four years later he competed at the Olympics in Tokyo, placing fourth.

Auble spent the previous seven seasons as head coach at Division I Campbell. His coaching career also includes a stint as head coach at UCLA as well as time as an assistant at Cornell, Michigan State and North Carolina State.

won 115 career matches with his final victory coming in the heavyweight title match in the 1990 NCAA meet.

A 1997 inductee into Ithaca's Hall of Fame, Fusilli was a volunteer assistant coach at Ithaca for the 1990-91 season.

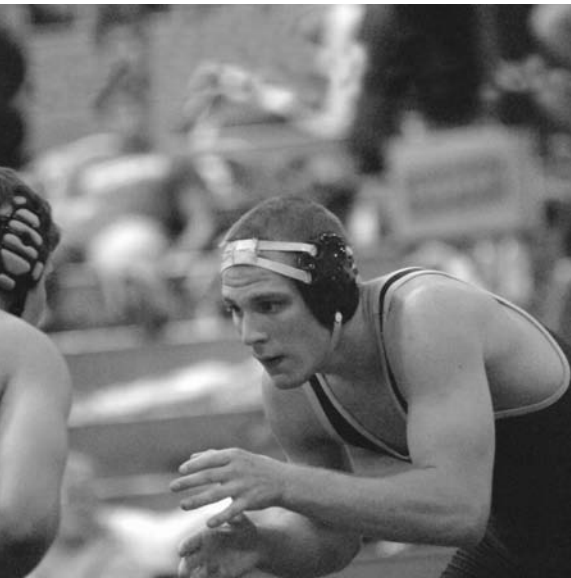

The Bombers welcome back eight wrestlers, including a pair of letter winners. Ithaca's wrestlers, who placed 13th at last year's national meet, posted a 7-8 dual-meet record. The Bombers are ranked 28th in the NWCA preseason poll.

2005-06 RECAP: The Bombers enjoyed another successful season, placing 13th at the NCAA championships behind the contributions of four national qualifiers. For the 24th straight year, at least one Bomber earned all-America honors: **Matthias Keib** (174) placed fifth, **Jad Duca** (157) took seventh and **Rob Stubbs** (184) placed eighth. **Duca**, **Stubbs** and **Nick Calandrino** (197)—Ithaca's other national qualifier—all won Empire Collegiate Wrestling Conference (ECWC) titles. **Calandrino**, **Keib**, **Stubbs** and **Brian Lockard** were named Scholar All-Americans by the NWCA. **Lockard**, who also lettered in soccer as a Bomber, received the James K. Harris Award as the top multi-sport athlete in Ithaca's senior class. A fourth-place finisher at 165 pounds at the state championships, he and **Lance Dolson** (sixth at 141) earned all-state honors.

KEY LOSSES: The Bombers graduated nine seniors from last year's roster. All-Americans **Duca**, **Keib** and **Stubbs** all rank among the program's 20 winningest wrestlers. **Dolson** and **Lockard** were all-state performers. **Macario Alvarez**, **Scott Aronowitz**, **Brian Murphy** and **Marcus Terry** combined to earn five letters as Bombers.



Tyler Daffinee saw action at both 165 and heavyweight last season.

125 POUNDS: Three freshmen are in the running—New Jersey state tournament qualifiers **Jon Gregory** (a fourth-place finisher from Phillipsburg) and **Anthony Lebbard** (Hopewell Valley) and **Justin Seifried** (Mohawk), a three-time place winner and 2006 runner-up at New York's state championships.

133 POUNDS: Sophomore **John Paxos** is the top returning Bomber at this weight class. He went 5-5 as a freshman with a pair of pins. **Chad Winowich**, a two-time district champion from Abington Heights High School, is another contender.

141 POUNDS: Freshman **Willie Horvath** (Liberty) was a District XI champion and seventh-place finisher at Pennsylvania's state meet last year.

149 POUNDS: Senior **Adam Johnson**, a former all-state wrestler who missed last year with an injury, is the most experienced Bomber at this weight. A team captain, he has won nearly half of his career victories by fall. Sophomore **Mike McCormick** (5-5 as a freshman) also returns.

Junior **Gregory Davis**, a national qualifier for last year's NJCAA Championships while wrestling at Alfred State, should be one of Ithaca's top newcomers. Freshman **Simon Ho**, a regional runner-up as a scholastic wrestler, also joins the roster.

157 POUNDS: Sophomore **Mike Toscano**, a starter at 149 pounds last year, is Ithaca's most experienced contender. Another sophomore, **Scott Edwards**, missed last season with an injury. Freshman **Greg Hatheway** is new to the program.

165 POUNDS: Senior **Justin Dwork** is Ithaca's most experienced contender. He's won 14 matches—five by fall—and has been a two-time tournament placewinner in his Bomber career. Freshman **John Dale**, a two-time regional placewinner from North Penn High School, is another possibility.

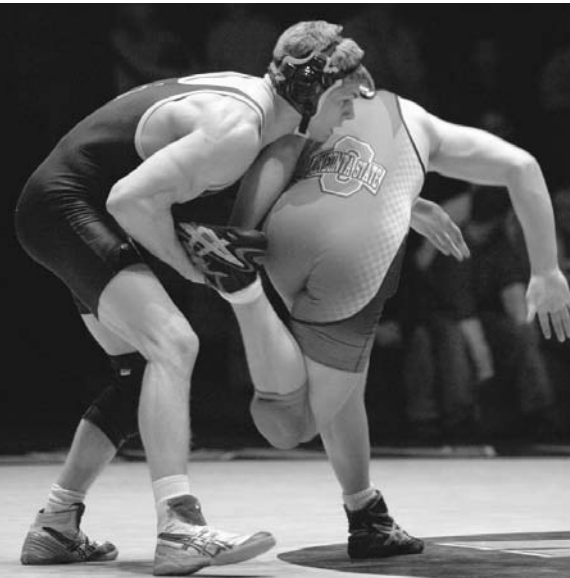
174 POUNDS: Senior **Tyler Daffinee** has gone 20-30 over the past three seasons, while wrestling at 165, 184 and heavyweight. He's a three-time tournament placewinner in his career.

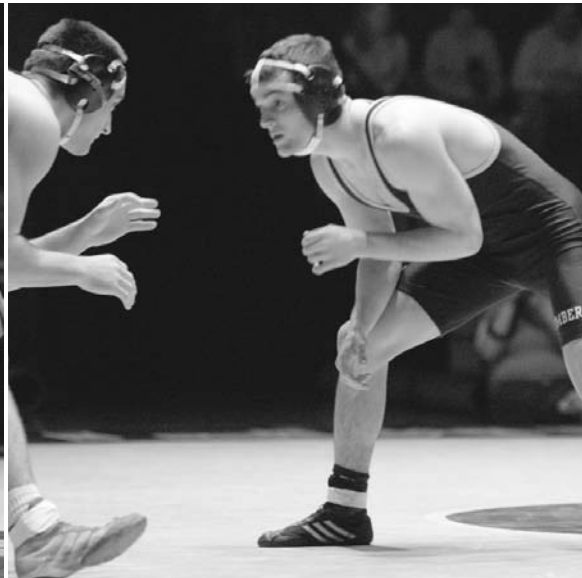

The New York State Collegiate Wrestling Conference Championships will be held at Buffalo. For the first time since 2001, the Empire Collegiate Wrestling Conference Championships will be held in Ithaca's Ben Light Gymnasium. The NCAA Championships will be held in Dubuque, Iowa, hosted by Loras College.



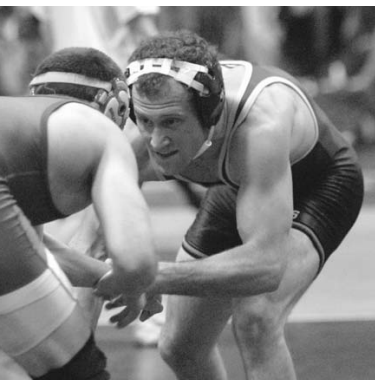


NICK CALANDRINO 197, Sr.; Emerson, N.J.

22. He opened the season with a runner-up finish at the Ithaca Invitational (losing to the top seed in the final) and took fourth at Buffalo's UB Open. Calandrino went 4-1 with three pins at the Budd Whitehill National Duals, helping the Bombers win their first team title. He was named an NWCA Scholar All-American and ranked second on the team in points. Calandrino was named to the Empire 8 Presidents' List following the spring semester. **2003-04:** Calandrino led the team with seven pins, becoming just the third Bomber freshman to win Ithaca's Jim LaRock Award. He was a third-place finisher at the ECWC meet. At the RIT Invitational he recorded a pin 38 second into his first collegiate match and went on to place second (after being unseeded), knocking off the top seed along the way. At the Budd Whitehill National Duals title match, he pinned the nation's eighth-ranked wrestler (from Wisconsin-La Crosse). Calandrino won the 197-pound title at the Jamestown Community College Invitational. Only one Bomber posted a higher winning percentage in dual meet competition. **High School:** A 2003 graduate of Emerson High School, Calandrino was coached by Stan Woods. He was a fourth-place finisher at the state championships. **Personal:** A physical education major, he is the son of Tony and Connie Calandrino.

2005-06: Johnson missed the season with an injury. **2004-05:** Johnson opened the season by winning his first three matches at the Ithaca Invitational. 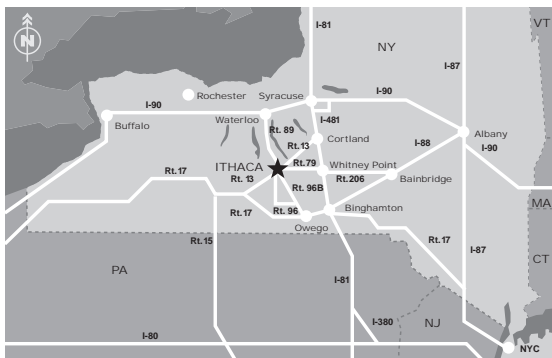
FACILITIES

Ithaca has close to 70 modern buildings, including science facilities with state-of-the-art laboratories, music center with concert and recital halls, health sciences center, and observatory plus 26 residence halls and two apartment complexes offering a variety of living accommodations. The library contains 400,000 materials in various formats. Academic computing is available in over 15 general-access and over a dozen program-specific computer labs. Athletic facilities include a 2,600-seat gymnasium and a 5,000-seat football stadium. The new fitness center houses two smaller gyms as well as aerobics and exercise rooms with cardio machines, stair-stepers and treadmills.

ADMISSION AND FINANCIAL AID

Admission to Ithaca College is based on high school record, personal recommendations, SAT or ACT scores, and, for some programs, auditions or portfolios. Candidates should submit an application by March 1. The application deadline for early decision candidates is November 1.

Over 80 percent of incoming students receive some form of financial assistance. Applicants seeking financial aid must submit the FAFSA (free application for federal student aid), available from high school guidance offices. The FAFSA form should be sent directly to the address indicated on the form; the submission deadline is February 1. Early decision candidates interested in seeking institutional and federal financial aid should submit the Profile application with the College Scholarship Service by November 1 and the FAFSA with the U.S. Department of Education by February 1.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

Ithaca teams have won three national championships in football and wrestling, two each in baseball, women's crew and women's soccer and one each in field hockey, gymnastics and softball. Bomber teams have also produced individual national champions in gymnastics, men's and women's swimming and diving, wrestling and track and field. Ithaca is sponsoring 25 varsity sports during the 2006-07 school year—13 for women and 12 for men.

During the 2005-06 academic year, Bomber teams were a combined 223-132-6 (.632), and 10 were represented in the NCAA playoffs. Ithaca won 11 Empire 8 championships and finished 26th in the Division III NACDA Directors' Cup standings. A total of 19 Ithaca student-athletes earned all-American recognition or academic all-American recognition.

NCAA PHILOSOPHY STATEMENT

Colleges and universities in Division III place highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience. In so doing, they seek to strengthen the integration of objectives and programs in athletics with academic and developmental objectives and to ensure the integration of athletes with other students.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

Injury prevention and care of Ithaca's student-athletes are overseen by a staff of six full-time athletic trainers, plus a graduate assistant and over 65 undergraduate students in the athletic training major. Several fully equipped facilities are devoted to athletic training.



PEGGY R. WILLIAMS President

Peggy R. Williams assumed the presidency of Ithaca College on July 1, 1997. She is the College's seventh president and its first female president.

Since taking the helm, President

Williams has led a collaborative effort to pursue the vision of making Ithaca "the standard of excellence for residential comprehensive colleges." To that end, she launched a campus-wide strategic planning process that culminated in a blueprint for achieving the College's essential priorities and goals. Since the adoption of the Institutional Plan in 2001, progress has been made in a number of areas. For example, initiatives such as the Martin Luther King Jr. Scholar Program and the Center for the Study of Culture, Race, and Ethnicity further the College's commitment to diversity and to interdisciplinary education. The Campus Master Plan provides a road map for major facilities and land use for the next two decades. The academic profile of the student body has been strengthened, and the Center for Faculty Research and Development encourages faculty to pursue innovative teaching and research projects. In addition, President Williams's strong interest in community service, evidenced by the establishment of a full-time coordinator of community service and such annual programs as the Celebration of Service and Community Plunge, has resulted in an increase in campus volunteerism.

Williams came to Ithaca from Lyndon State College, where she had been president since 1989. She had previously worked at Trinity College in Burlington, Vermont, as associate academic dean, chair of the business and economics department and associate professor. She also held various positions within the Vermont State Colleges system. Before entering the field of higher education, Williams was a social worker for the Medical Center Hospital of Vermont and the Monroe County Department of Social Services in New York.

In 1990 the publisher of *Creating Excellence* magazine named Williams one of Vermont's "top 10 achievers." She was the first recipient of the Jackie M. Gibbons Leadership Award in 1984 from the American Council on Education (ACE). The organization also established an honor in her name—the Margaret R. Williams Emerging Professional Award—to recognize the accomplishments of young female professionals in higher education.

Active in community and professional organizations, President Williams currently serves on the NCAA Division III Presidents Council and the Executive Committee Subcommittee on Gender and Diversity Issues, and on the boards of directors of the Canada-

U.S. Foundation for Educational Exchange and the Tompkins Trust Company and the governing board of the Wye Faculty Seminar. She is also a member of the Commission on Women of the American Council on Education (ACE) and an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Ithaca. She previously served on the ACE board of directors and its executive and nominating committees, the board of directors of the Council of Independent Colleges, the board of directors of the Sacred Heart School of Montreal (past chair) and the Policy Advisory Group for Outcomes and Assessment and Institutional Effectiveness for the New York State Education Department.

Williams holds a bachelor of arts degree in psychology from St. Michael's College of the University of Toronto; a master of education degree from the University of Vermont; and a doctorate in administration, planning and social policy from Harvard University.

A native of Montreal, Williams has lived in the United States since 1968 and is a citizen of both the United States and Canada. She has many interests beyond higher education—sailing, skiing, bicycling, wilderness expeditions, music, reading and photography. She and her husband, David, reside at Two Fountain Place, the home of Ithaca College presidents since 1938.

KEN KUTLER Director of Intercollegiate Athletics

Ken Kutler is in his fourth year as Ithaca's director of intercollegiate athletics and recreational sports.

Kutler came to Ithaca after serving as director of athletics at two other Division III institutions: Frostburg State University (1978 to 1986) and Hartwick College (1986 to 2003). At Hartwick, he oversaw a 24-sport intercollegiate athletic program (including two sports that competed at the Division I level).

He is a past president of the Empire 8 athletic conference. Kutler spent 10 years as women's soccer coach at Hartwick (1986 to 1993 and again in 2001 and 2002) and guided the Hawks to five appearances in the NCAA championship tournament including two trips to the national quarterfinals.

He is a 1964 graduate of East Stroudsburg University, where he was an all-region soccer player. Kutler holds a master's degree in education from Temple University and a doctorate in education from West Virginia.
