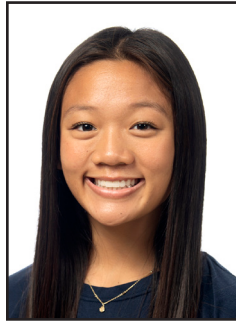

SCHOOL NICKNAME

“Bronchos” was the nickname selected for Central Oklahoma in 1922 by Mrs. C.W. Wantland, wife of long-time UCO football coach C.W. Wantland. The name was chosen from a number of suggestions for the name of UCO’s football team and became the nickname for all athletic teams at the school.

Mrs. Wantland was made an honorary member of the Letterman’s Club as a result of selecting the nickname, becoming the first woman admitted to that organization.

SCHOOL COLORS

Bronze and blue were chosen as Central Oklahoma’s school colors early in the fall of 1895 by school president Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh. The first public display of the bronze and blue was in Guthrie when a student represented UCO in the first oratorical contest ever held in Oklahoma.

COACHES/ SEASON OUTLOOK

HEAD COACH

EDGAR MIRAKU

Edgar Miraku has built the Central Oklahoma program into a consistent winner and perennial national contender during a sensational nine-year tenure.

UCO has been one of the winningest programs in NCAA Division II with Miraku at the helm, having compiled a stellar 200-68 record in nine seasons. He reached the 200-win mark in Central's 2019 home finale with a four-set upset of No. 14-ranked Northwest Missouri.

The 2020 season was canceled due to the pandemic. UCO competed in 20 matches during an unofficial spring season, though those results didn't count.

Edgar has guided the Bronchos to 25-plus wins five times, with the 2015 and '16 teams each eclipsing the 30-win mark.

Miraku has coached eight All-Region and seven All-America players at UCO. Seven of the eight All-Americans in school history have come under Miraku's guidance.

He's also had 46 players earn All-MIAA honors. The Bronchos have excelled in the classroom as well during Edgar's tenure, with 42 players having been named to the MIAA Honor Roll.

UCO joined the MIAA in Edgar's first year at the controls in 2012 and went 13-18 before making a big

jump the next season, finishing fourth in the league in a 24-10 campaign.

The Bronchos continued their upward climb in 2014, putting together a fabulous 28-5 record. Central beat three teams ranked in the top 15 nationally -- including first-ever wins over league rivals Central Missouri and Nebraska-Kearney -- in finishing third in the conference, but were denied a national tournament berth.

Miraku guided the Bronchos to a fantastic 31-5 campaign in 2015, ripping off 16 straight wins during one stretch. UCO captured the rugged MIAA championship for the program's first league title since 2007 as Edgar was named Coach of the Year for the second straight time.

UCO broke into the NCAA Division II national rankings for the first time ever that season and were in the polls for the final 12 weeks, ending the season at No. 12. The Bronchos earned their first national tournament berth since 2007 and won a first-round match in the Central Regional before falling to No. 1-ranked Concordia-St. Paul.

Central set a school-record for winning percentage in 2016 (88.2), finishing 30-4 and going a perfect 15-0 at home without dropping a set. The Bronchos had 3-0 wins over five top-25

teams -- including two in the top 10 -- and were ranked in the top 15 all season, but were denied a berth in the national tournament.

Seven players earned All-MIAA honors, with three making the first-team unit.

Central put together a 17-match winning streak en route to a 29-6 finish in 2017 and made it to the national tournament before falling to eventual champion Concordia-St. Paul. Six players were named All-MIAA, with Taylor Bevis claiming MIAA Player of the Year recognition in addition to earning All-America honors.

The Miraku-led Bronchos put together a 27-7 record in 2018 and were ranked in the top 20 all season. Eight players earned All-MIAA recognition.

A youthful and inexperienced UCO squad the had just one senior put together an 18-13 record in 2019.

Five players earned All-MIAA recognition and Dominique Lipari led the nation in digs per set in becoming just the fifth four-time all-conference player in program history.

Miraku came to UCO following a seven-year stint as head coach at Edmond Memorial, guiding the Bulldogs to a phenomenal 209-48 record and four Class 6A state titles.

He took over the Memorial reigns in 2005 and won



the first of his four state titles that season, with the Bulldogs also taking the gold ball in 2007, '09 and '10.

Miraku also worked with USA Volleyball and the USA Men's National Sitting Team while at Memorial, serving as head coach for two years and assistant coach for five. He participated in numerous international competitions during that span, including the 2007 Para-Pan American Games, the 2006 and 2010 World Championships, the 2010 World Cup and the 2011 Continental Cup.

Edgar is a UCO alumni and completed his bachelor's (Business Administration) and his MBA, while serving as volunteer and later graduate assistant from 1995 to 2000 under Mark Herrin.

Edgar is a native of Albania, where he played professional volleyball for four years and was a member of the Albanian Junior National Team from 1992-95, winning a silver medal in the 1993 Balkan Championships.

Miraku has also been involved and coached for the Oklahoma Peak Performance since its inception and has placed third in nation twice (2009 & 2014).

Edgar is married (Amy) and has two children (Abiana and Arden).

ASSISTANT COACH

EMILY TODD



Tech prior to moving to Henderson State. She helped the Golden Suns to a sensational 35-1 season in 2017, with ATU's only loss coming in the NCAA Division II national tournament.

Emily was a two-year stand-out player at ATU before joining the coaching staff. She led the Golden Suns to 54 wins, two conference titles and two national tournament bids while twice earning first-team All GAC honors.

Todd also played at Colorado and Navarro Junior College before finishing her career at Arkansas Tech.

Emily received her bachelor's degree in Health & Physical Education and has a master's degree in College Student Personnel, both from ATU.

Joining the Central Oklahoma volleyball program in 2021 is assistant coach Emily Todd.

Todd came to the Bronchos from Henderson State, where she spent three seasons as assistant coach. She helped guide HSU to back-to-back 20-win seasons and one appearance in the GAC Championship.

SEASON OUTLOOK

There are a myriad of questions confronting Central Oklahoma as the 2021 season looms, but the Bronchos are eager to get back on the court and search for the answers.

The worldwide health crisis forced the cancellation of the 2020 campaign, so UCO hasn't played an official match in nearly two years. That created a unique situation last year as the Bronchos were able practice and then played 20 matches during an unofficial spring season.

Nine players are back from last year -- including six who were on the 2019 squad that finished 18-13 -- and five freshmen join the team for this season.

"We have some returners and will certainly lean on their experience," said 10th-year head coach **Edgar Miraku**. "Our newer players will contribute, but the question is at what positions and how soon will they be ready."

Leading Central's returners are a pair of second-team All-MIAA selections from 2019 -- junior setter **Amanda Desch** and sophomore outside hitter **Courtney Lane**. Both rank among the best all-around players in the conference and the Bronchos will be counting heavily on their production this season.

Others veterans back from the 2019 club are juniors **Lauren Jenkins** and **Alycia Bradley-Adriano** along with sophomores **Bella Burns** and **Nalani McCrary**.

Sophomore transfer **Jaedynn Evans** and freshmen **Payton Bell** and **Mallory Hendrix** went through a full year of practice and the unofficial spring matches in 2020-21, gaining experience that should pay big dividends this fall.

"You can practice all you want, but getting that match feeling in the spring was huge for us," said Miraku, who has a 200-68 career record with the Bronchos. "We obviously didn't have a fall season, so getting some match experience was important and should really help those players."

UCO will open the season with nine non-conference matches before beginning play in the rugged MIAA, which ranks as arguably the toughest conference in Division II.

"It's a demanding and rugged conference," Miraku said. "The competition is fierce every night and we will have to be ready to play at a high level every time we take the court."

"But everybody is excited about playing and we're looking forward to having a season, especially after what everybody went through last year."

Here's a position-by-position look at the Bronchos:

HITTER

Three players with experience are back to lead this group of outside/right-side hitters, with a pair of freshman set to provide additional depth.

Sophomore **Courtney Lane** leads the way and has shown she's among the best in the conference. Lane had a team-high 277 kills along with 211 digs as a freshman in 2019 in earning second-team All-MIAA honors, then made even more improvement last year.

Junior **Lauren Jenkins** will also be counted on heavily this fall. Jenkins proved what she can do in 2019 when she collected 223 kills in earning honorable mention All-MIAA accolades.

Junior **Alycia Bradley-Adriano** provides more experience, while second-year freshman **Mallory Hendrix** saw some time at hitter last spring and should also help out. Rookies **Mallorie Koehn** and **Brynn Egger** will both contend for action.

MIDDLE BLOCKER

Easily the most inexperienced position on the team, with sophomore **Nalani McCrary** the lone player with real match experience.

McCrary showed flashes of what she's capable of in 2019 -- finishing with 65 kills and 43 total blocks in limited action, -- and appears ready to become a major force at the net.

Second-year freshman **Payton Bell** was with the team in 2020-21 and gained valuable experience during the unofficial spring season, while rookie **Jenna Karp** is expected to provide immediate help.

LIBERO/DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST

UCO has plenty of options with its back-row defense, though experience is again limited.

Sophomore transfer **Jaedynn Evans** should step in and take over as the main libero, with the Bronchos expecting big things from her. She came to UCO from Iowa last year and proved to be a valuable defender during the spring campaign.

Sophomore **Bella Burns** had 162 digs and 18 service aces while seeing extensive action in 2019, then added more experience last year.

Freshmen newcomers **Katie Le** and **Berit Jones** provide quality depth and will push for playing time.

SETTER

The Bronchos have one of the most versatile players in the league here in junior **Amanda Desch**, who is set for another big season.

UCO's team captain was a second-team All-MIAA pick in 2019 after collecting 247 kills, 635 assists, 359 digs, 54 blocks and 25 aces as she also saw time at outside hitter to take advantage of her talents.

Desch is expected to handle the bulk of the setting duties, though second-year freshman **Mallory Hendrix** showed in the spring that she is a reliable option.

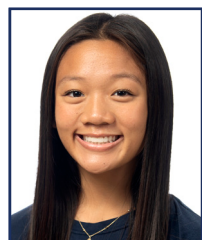

HAMILTON FIELD HOUSE

Central Oklahoma plays its home matches in Hamilton Field House, which opened its doors in 1965.

The Bronchos have an impressive 294-97 record (.752 winning percentage) at Hamilton Field House, including an 88-23 (.792) mark under ninth-year head coach Edgar Miraku.

UCO boasts a dazzling 63-9 home record since 2015.

Hamilton Field House was renamed from Broncho Field House on May 1, 1993 in honor of longtime coach and athletic director Dale Hamilton, who helped design the building in the 1960s.

The 3,000-seat facility underwent renovation in the summer of 2001 with



the installation of individual chairback seats on the floor and LED boards capable of showing live statistics were added five years ago.

More improvements are currently underway and scheduled to be done this

fall, including the addition of a new basketball/volleyball practice facility and improved locker rooms for volleyball and numerous other sports

Hamilton Field House also serves as the home for UCO's wrestling team

in addition to the men's and women's basketball squads.

Numerous other events, including the university's graduation ceremonies, are also held in the building.

Central Oklahoma has had 44 players earn first- or second-team all-conference honors a combined 86 times since 1988.

The Bronchos were NAIA members in District Nine in 1987-88 before moving to NCAA Division II in 1989. UCO was in the Lone Star Conference from 1989-10, played as an independent in 2011 and joined the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association in 2012.

Only five players -- Alma Brahimaj (1999-02), Stacey Meek (2000-03), Taylor Bevis (2015-18), Jordan Spence (2015-18) and Dominique Lipari (2016-19) -- have been four-time all-conference selections. Nine players earned all-conference honors three times -- Amy Parten (1990-92), Kate O'Neill (1995-97), Adriana Crovador (1997-99), Katy Wallace (2000-02), Lexy Fortner (2000-02), Kristen Wilson (2008-10), Barbara Jackson (2013-15) and Katy Davis (2014-16).

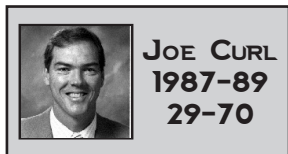

UCO ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

The Central Oklahoma Athletics Hall of Fame, founded in 1990, includes six members of the Broncho volleyball program. Here's a look at UCO's volleyball Hall of Famers:



AMY PARTEN (2002)

Amy Parten put UCO volleyball on the Lone Star Conference map from 1989-92, ending her sensational four-year career as the holder of 13 school records and leading the Bronchos to 89 wins.

Amy had 410 kills and 328 digs as a freshman to earn honorable mention All-LSC honors, then collected 879 kills and 615 digs the following two seasons in picking up second-team All-LSC recognition.

Parten became UCO's first-ever first-team All-LSC player as a senior in 1992 with a spectacular season that included what were then single-season school records for kills (624) and digs (548).

Parten finished her career with 1,913 kills in 5,098 attacks, both school records then that rank second now, along with 1,491 digs and 70 solo blocked shots.



KRISTIN VINCENT (2008)

Kristin Vincent was one of the top middle blockers in the Lone Star Conference throughout her career as a four-year starter at UCO from 1990-93.

Vincent started all season as a freshman, then was an honorable mention All-LSC pick in 1991 after collecting a single-season school record 164 assisted blocks while finishing second in the LSC in hitting percentage (.306).

Kristin earned honorable mention All-LSC acclaim again in 1992 while finishing second in the conference in both total blocks (211) and hitting percentage (.311). She was a first-team All-LSC selection as a senior after leading the league in hitting percentage (.377) while making 313 kills and 155 total blocks.

Vincent finished with a league- and school-record 515 assisted blocks and a school-record 177 solo blocks.



KATE O'NEILL (2016)

Kate O'Neill was a four-year starter for the Bronchos at middle blocker from 1994-97 and finished her career with 1,701 kills, 439 assisted blocks and 79 solo blocks.

She was named Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year in 1994 after making 345 kills and 116 blocks in helping UCO make its initial appearance in the NCAA Division II national tournament.

O'Neill came back the next season to earn second-team All-LSC honors and then was a first-team All-LSC pick as a junior after collecting 438 kills, 158 blocks and a .356 hitting percentage.

Kate put together a sensational senior season in 1997, hitting a league-leading and school-record .430 in racking up 444 kills and 151 blocks as a first-team All-LSC North Division selection.



ALMA BRAHIMAJ (2017)

Alma Brahimaj was a dominating presence on the court throughout her four-year career from 1999-2002 in becoming the first-ever four-time All-Conference selection for the Bronchos. She was twice named Lone Star Conference North Division Player of the Year and also earned All-Region accolades as a sophomore and senior.

Brahimaj led UCO to its first two LSC North Division titles during her junior and senior seasons.

She finished her career with school records for kills in a single-match (46), single-season (644) and career (2,404). The career ranks among the best in NCAA Division II history.

Brahimaj is also first in career 20-kills matches (45) and career attacks (6,057) at UCO while ranking second in career aces (215) and fourth in career digs (1,833).



MARK HERRIN (2020)

Mark Herrin took over the coaching reigns at Central Oklahoma in 1990 and amassed a 304-155 record in 13 years at the helm.

The Bronchos finished below .500 just once with Herrin at the controls and he led Central to two Lone Star Conference North Division titles and its lone overall LSC championship.

Herrin's 1994 team set a school record for wins (32) that still stands, finishing 32-5 in winning the LSC and advancing to the second round of the NCAA Division II national tournament. His final team in 2002 captured its second straight LSC North Division crown and went 30-7 in making the national tournament.



LACIE ALLEN (2021)

Lacie Allen was a sensational back-row defender for the Bronchos during her career from 2004-07 and became the first player in program history to earn All-America honors.

Allen, who also played basketball for two seasons, helped the Bronchos reach the national tournament twice and led the team to a 101-34 record during her career. She was Lone Star Conference North Division Libero of the Year as a junior in 2006 after finishing with 790 digs, the second-most in school history.

Lacie shattered that mark the next season, setting an NCAA Division II record with 996 digs in earning LSC Libero of the Year honors once again while also being named a first-team All-American. Her 2,765 career digs is a school record and ranks eighth in Division II history.

Edmond is the fastest growing, most economically dynamic city in Oklahoma. Thriving technology firms, diverse retail and commercial opportunities and small corporate office headquarters have enhanced its reputation as the affluent residential suburb to the metropolitan area.

There are many more activities in Edmond, with a variety of music, art, theatre, water and sporting events that make for spectacular family fun.

Heard on Hurd is a monthly festival where Downtown Edmond is transformed into an exciting mix of food trucks, family-friendly excitement and music that has become one of the premier, socially engaging events in the area.

Edmond also boasts one of the best Fourth of July fireworks shows in the country. More than 125,000 people attend the event. LibertyFest has been previously chosen by CNN and USA Today as one of the top 10 places to be in America on July 4.

Another Edmond attraction is Lake Arcadia. Home to the Center for Outdoor Adventure Recreation, Lake Arcadia offers trails for running, hiking, and cycling, as well as 1,820 surface acres for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing, and 26 miles of shoreline for more fun.



OKLAHOMA CITY

The largest city in the state, Oklahoma City borders Edmond to the south and sits at the crossroads of I-35, I-40 and I-44, leaving OKC with more than 130 miles of federal and interstate highways.

More than 1.3 million people call metro Oklahoma City home.

The City, as it is commonly referred to around the state, offers numerous things to do on any given day of the week – or year for that matter. Whether it is sports, music, art, or just getting outside on a nice day, OKC offers it all.

Paycom Arena in downtown Oklahoma City is not only home to the NBA's Oklahoma City Thunder, but it also hosts concerts year-round, as well as other events such as pro wrestling, bull riding and more.

Bricktown, the central hub of entertainment in downtown, is home to Bricktown Ballpark, where the Oklahoma City Dodgers – Triple-A affiliate to MLB's L.A. Dodgers – play ball. The ballpark also hosts high school games, collegiate tournaments, as well as concerts of its own.

There is plenty more to do, especially on the booming, Oklahoma River.

The UCO rowing team calls the river home and has a state-of-the-art boathouse on the river to prove it. Visitors can also enjoy the Riversport Adventure District, where you can challenge yourself through a white-water rapids course, zip line across the river, or bungee



jump among other fun activities.

There are also five lakes in the greater OKC metro area that offer ample fun including fishing, running or cycling trails and swimming.

There are also more than a dozen golf courses to choose from.

Along with art museums, a science museum, and many more, there is always something to do in OKC.

The Adventure District is just 10 minutes from UCO and offers many fun things to do.

Remington Park races horses more than half of the year, the Oklahoma City Zoo is always a top-pick, and it sits right next to the science museum.

If you venture west of downtown toward the fairgrounds, you can find more fun.

Home to the Oklahoma State Fair every September, as well as shows year-round,



the fairgrounds offer countless entertainment options.

Oklahoma City is in a warm southwest climate. It sees more than 300 days of sunshine on average per year.

The average temperature annually is 60 degrees ac-

cording to the Oklahoma City Visitors Convention Bureau. OKC also sees on average 32.03 inches of rain and nine inches of snow every year.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION



PRESIDENT PATTI NEUHOLD-RAVIKUMAR

Patti Neuhold-Ravikumar is the 21st president of the University of Central Oklahoma and the institution's first female president in its 130-year history. She has been a contributing member of the Central community since 2007. She served in a variety of roles during that time; most recently serving as the institution's Vice President of Finance and Chief Financial Officer.

Her multidimensional experience in private business and higher education includes business operations, finance, human resources, organizational development, strategic planning, institutional budget development, business process improvement and governing board relations. As a result of her commitment to developing others, she led the creation of the award-winning UCO Management Development Program. Under her leadership, UCO's compensation structure and health insurance plan were modernized to help create a contemporary people-centered benefits culture.

Among her contributions to UCO, she has served as chair or member of a number of institutional committees and task forces. These include the university branding initiative, program prioritization, budget model exploration, Affordable Care Act implementation, the creation of the University Planning Council, strategic planning and enrollment management planning. She currently serves on the Strategic Enrollment Planning Council as well as the University Planning Council at UCO. She has served as the chair of the Regional University System of Oklahoma Business Officers, chair of the Pension Committee for the Regional University System of Oklahoma and vice chair of the Oklahoma Higher Education Employee Interlocal.

As UCO's vice president of finance and chief financial officer, she helped to navigate the financial turbulence created by the precipitous decline in enrollment and the significant loss of state funding. While the institution had lost more than \$10.5 million in tuition revenue and \$12.3 million in state funding by 2019, her leadership ensured the preservation of every job on campus and buffered our classrooms from negative impact. For her work in successfully guiding the institution through these rough waters, she was awarded the President's Award in Applied Leadership in 2018.

A champion for progress and improvement, she leads the university's pursuit of innovation in shaping the future of higher education. This includes educating for tomorrow's skills, growing more fully online programs designed and taught by our talented faculty, partnering with businesses in the metropolitan area to expand non-credit offerings and capturing opportunities for growth through institutional responsiveness to student demand and economic need.

President Neuhold-Ravikumar currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology (OCAST), and Oklahoma State Chamber. She serves as an ex-officio member of the Edmond Chamber of Commerce Board of Advisors.

Patti earned her bachelor's degree in psychology with an emphasis in management from Oklahoma Christian University. She earned her master's degree in industrial/organizational psychology from the University of Tulsa and is currently a doctoral candidate in organizational leadership at Concordia University – Chicago.



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR STAN WAGON

Stan Wagon took over as Central Oklahoma's athletic director in August 2020, becoming just the ninth director in the school's storied athletic history.

He came to Central following a four-year stint as commissioner of the Sooner Athletic Conference. Wagon held the same position at the Lone Star Conference, spending 11 years there within the conference's administration and as commissioner.

An Edmond native, Wagon earned his bachelor's degree from Central in 1995. His father (Skip) served as director of athletics from 1986-2003.

Wagon worked in the UCO sports information office as a student, then served as SID at Midwestern State, where he received his master's degree, and Tarleton State.

Stan moved from Tarleton to the NCAA Division II's Lone Star Conference office and eventually served as commissioner. He spent 11 years in that role before moving to the same post at the NAIA's Sooner Athletic Conference, where he served from July 2016 until returning to UCO.

At the LSC, Wagon's most noteworthy accomplishment was creation of the Lone Star Football Festival, held annually at Arlington's AT&T Stadium, home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys. The event generated nearly a half-million dollars back to the conference office.

Throughout his career, Wagon has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. He has served as Chair of the NCAA Division II Nominating Committee and the NCAA Men's Basketball Regional Advisory Committee. He also served on committees for the D2 CCA and College Sports Information Directors of Association (CoSIDA).

Stan is married (Jill) and has three children (Abby, Macy, and Knox).

SENIOR ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

JEREMY ROGERS

Jeremy Rogers, a native of Medford, Oklahoma, serves as Senior Associate Athletic Director at Central Oklahoma.

Joining the department in November 2012, Rogers served the compliance department in an assistant role before moving to Director of Athletic Compliance and Legal Affairs, overseeing all aspects of the crucial facet of the department. He was named Senior Associate Athletic Director in July 2021, continuing to lead the efforts of the compliance department while adding oversight of the internal operations of the athletic department. Rogers also oversees operations in athletic training, strength & conditioning, ticketing, and facilities.

Rogers has been heavily involved in projects, committees, forums, and the like both inside the university as well as on the national stage.

He holds positions in charge of student-athlete development and the Student Athlete Advisory Committee, he is Deputy Title IX coordinator and a member the University's Behavioral Assessment Team (BAT). Rogers serves on the NCAA Division II Coaching Enhancement Grant Committee which is designed to provide financial assistance to the division's member schools that are committed to enhancing ethnic minority and gender representation in newly created assistant coaching positions for any NCAA-sponsored sport. He is also a representative of the NCAA Eligibility Advisory Group which provides support and feedback on content and functionality to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

Rogers was a member of the Southern Nazarene University football team (two-year starter) and earned all-conference honors at tight end. He received his Bachelor's degree in Sport Management from SNU in 2007.

Rogers went on to earn his Juris Doctor from the University of Oklahoma College of Law in 2012. While at OU he worked as an intern for the Athletic Compliance Department and Office of Legal Counsel. Rogers is licensed to practice law in the state of Oklahoma and is a member of the Oklahoma Bar Association.

Melissa Paul enters her fourth year at the University of Central Oklahoma and enters her second year in the role of Assistant Athletic Director for Business and Senior Woman Administrator (SWA).

Paul spent two years serving as an assistant registrar at Central and also helped out as a volunteer assistant for the softball program in 2020.

Paul played softball collegiately at Division I Marist and later served as head coach for her alma mater. She coached at Marist from 2002-06, leading the Red Foxes to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference championship and their first-ever national tournament appearance in her final season.

Melissa then spent seven years as assistant coach at Missouri, helping lead the team to a 288-89 record in that span. The Tigers made three straight appearances in the Women's College World Series and Paul mentored three All-America selections while coaching the team's outfielders.

Paul went to Division II West Florida as assistant coach in 2013 before taking over the head coaching reigns the following season. She put together a 138-83 record in four seasons at WFU and led the Argos to three Division II national tournament appearances.

CHUCK BAILEY

Chuck Bailey moved into the position of Senior Strategic Advisor in August 2020 following a brief stint as interim athletic director, for which he served from May 1, 2020 through the end of August.

Bailey came to UCO in 1984 as an assistant football coach. He helped lead the Bronchos to two Lone Star Conference championships and four NCAA Division II playoff appearances during his coaching tenure.

Chuck assumed the additional responsibilities of Director of Football Operations in 2003 and served both roles until moving into athletic administration in 2006. He served as Assistant Athletic Director for Operations before becoming Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2007.

Bailey left UCO to become the District Athletic Director for Mustang Public Schools in 2009 where he served until retiring in 2016.

He returned to UCO in 2017 as Development Director for Athletic Scholarships and contributed in that capacity for two years.

MID-AMERICA INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS ASSOCIATION

Central Oklahoma enters its 10th year as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The MIAA, a 14-member conference of NCAA Division II institutions in Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma, was first organized in 1912 as the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Over the past 100 years, the MIAA has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA schools have won 35 NCAA team championships and over 300 individual national championships over the past four decades.

The MIAA currently conducts championships in nine sports for both men and women.

For the men, champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, baseball, tennis, golf, and wrestling. The MIAA crowns champions in bowling, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track & field.

The MIAA turned a new page on July 1, 1992, when the NCAA Division II conference changed its name from the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association to the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The decision to make the change originated in 1989, when Pittsburg State and Washburn became the first schools outside the state of Missouri to gain membership in the MIAA.

The conference was first organized in 1912 with 14 member institutions. Of those original members, Central Missouri and Northwest Missouri still remain a part of the MIAA.

The first change in membership came in 1924, when the MIAA reorganized to include only the five regional Missouri state colleges: Central Missouri, Truman (at the time known as Northeast Missouri State), Northwest Missouri, Southeast Missouri State and Southwest Missouri State (now Missouri State).

Over the next 56 years, three schools joined the membership: Missouri School of Mines (later Missouri-Rolla) in 1935, Lincoln in 1970 and the Missouri-St. Louis in 1980.

Ken Jones became the first full-time commissioner of the MIAA in 1981 and would be in the position for 16 years, retiring in 1997. Ralph McFillen succeeded Jones, serving 10 years before his retirement in 2007.

Jim Johnson succeeded McFillen in July of that year and served as commissioner until September of 2010, when Dr. Bob Boerigter took over. Mike Racy is the current commissioner and began in January of 2017 following Boerigter's retirement.

Southwest Baptist brought membership back to eight schools



in 1986, before the major expansion of the conference in 1989. Pittsburg State, Washburn, Missouri Southern and Missouri Western began competition in the 1989-90 season.

Southeast Missouri State left the MIAA following the 1990-91 season and was replaced by Emporia State in the 1991-92 season.

Missouri-St. Louis departed the MIAA in 1996, Missouri-Rolla left in 2005 and Lincoln forfeited its membership in 1999. Fort Hays State joined the MIAA in 2006, Nebraska-Omaha entered the league in 2008 and Lincoln re-joined the conference in 2010.

UCO, Lindenwood, Nebraska-Kearney and Northeastern State all become league members with the start of the 2012-13 academic year.

Nebraska-Omaha left the league in 2011 and Truman State did the same in 2013.

Southwest Baptist, which had not competed in football in the MIAA since 2014, and Lindenwood, departed the MIAA altogether in 2019. Lincoln, who like SBU had been competing as associate members without football, returned to fill the void left by Lindenwood to keep the MIAA with 12 football playing schools.

Newman (Kan.) and Rogers State (Okla.) also joined the league in 2019 to give the MIAA 14 total schools. Newman had been an associate member in wrestling.
