## School Nickname

“Bronchos” was the nickname selected for Central Oklahoma in 1922 by Mary Agnes Lindsey Wantland, wife of long-time UCO football coach C.W. Wantland. The name was chosen from a number of suggestions for the name of UCO’s football team and became the nickname for all athletic teams at the school.

Mrs. Wantland was made an honorary member of the Letterman’s Club as a result of selecting the nickname, becoming the first woman admitted to that organization.

## School Colors

Bronze and blue were chosen as Central Oklahoma’s school colors in 1895 by school president Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh.

The first public display of the bronze and blue was in Guthrie when a student represented UCO in the first oratorical contest ever held in Oklahoma.

# Head Coach Mike Cook



Mike Cook has been with the Central Oklahoma soccer program since its inception and has built the Bronchos into a perennial NCAA Division II contender, reaching the NCAA Tournament 14 times in 24 seasons of play.

The dean of the UCO coaching staff, Cook came to Edmond when the school started the program in 1998 and has guided the Bronchos to an amazing 336-124-36 record over the past 24 years. He has a 25-year women's record of 424-146-37, ranking among the Division II coaching leaders in all-time wins and winning

percentage (.728).

Mike has led UCO to 14 national playoff appearances since 2000, with the Bronchos winning six regular-season titles and five tournament crowns during their tenure in the Lone Star Conference. Cook earned LSC Coach of the Year accolades six times and was named Midwest Regional Coach of the Year twice.

Cook won his first Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association regular season and postseason tournament titles in 2018 and was also named MIAA Coach of the Year and Central Region Coach of the Year. He followed that up with a second MIAA postseason championship in 2019 and another conference title in 2021 (UCO played a modified spring season in '21 after the 2020 fall season was canceled due to the pandemic). Although the wins and losses were not official in 2021, Central still made the postseason tournament and won it all for a third season in a row.

He's coached 67 players to all-conference selections a combined 120 times, 47 players to all-region honors a combined 82 times, and 11 players to All-American status a combined 12 times during his highly-successful UCO tenure.

Central Oklahoma posted a 13-5-3 record in 2021, playing an official Fall season for the first time since before the pandemic. The Bronchos finished fourth in the MIAA regular season standings, won their conference championship quarterfinal matchup, and reached the semifinals before falling there. UCO also received an at-large bid to the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Championship. The Bronchos tied Bemidji State in the first round before losing on penalties and ending their season there.

The Bronchos went 14-5-3 in 2019, earning the fourth-seed in the MIAA tournament. The Bronchos won their opening-round game in Edmond before going to Warrensburg, Mo. and knocking off top-seeded host Central Missouri in the semifinals. UCO then tied Northeastern State 1-1 in the championship before winning a penalty shootout 3-1 to take its second consecutive MIAA postseason tournament championship.

2018 might be the most successful season in Central's history. Cook led the Bronchos to a 22-2 season, finishing its historic season in the NCAA Championship Round of 16. The Bronchos set a new school record most wins in one season (22), most wins to start a season (16) and longest win streak in school history (16). The Bronchos had eight players earn All-MIAA honors, seven players All-Region, and three (also a school record) earn All-American honors in one season. UCO also posted 14 shutouts, one shy of the school record.

UCO was 11-9 in its first year of varsity competition in 1998, then went 13-5-1 in 1999 while breaking into the Division II top 20 rankings during the season.

The Bronchos had a breakthrough season in 2000, finishing 20-3 in winning both the regular season and league tournament titles. UCO made its first national playoff appearance, beating Mesa State before falling to eventual champion UC San Diego in the quarterfinals.

UCO followed that with a 15-6 league runner-up campaign in 2001, then tied for the regular season conference crown and won the LSC Tournament in 2002 before falling to Metropolitan State in the national tournament to finish 20-3.

The Bronchos made a repeat national tournament appearance in 2003 in finishing 15-5-2, then went 13-6-2 and won the league title in 2004.

Cook led the Bronchos to a 16-3-2 record and second consecutive LSC crown in 2005, with UCO losing a shootout in the playoffs.

It was more of the same in 2006 as the Bronchos captured a third straight regular-season league championship before falling in a shootout in the national tournament to finish 18-3-1.

UCO claimed a fourth consecutive LSC regular-season title and made its longest Division II playoff run in 2007, winning two games to advance to the Sweet 16 before losing to St. Edward's in the Midwest Regional finals to end a 19-5-1 campaign.

The Bronchos had a lengthy league winning streak snapped in 2008 in having their four-year string of LSC titles ended and ended up finished 13-6-3.

UCO bounced back in 2009, finishing 14-6-3 and winning the LSC Tournament title in a shootout to earn a national tournament berth before losing a shootout in the first round of the regional.

The Bronchos went 11-8-1 in 2010 and started 0-3 in 2011 before winning a school-record 15 games in a row to qualify for the national playoffs despite playing an independent schedule. UCO hosted one of the South Central Regional tournaments and received a first-round bye before dropping a tough 1-0 decision to Dallas Baptist in the second round.

Central joined the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association in 2012 and Cook led the Bronchos to a runner-up finish and a second straight national tournament appearance. UCO won its first-round playoff game before falling 1-0 in the second round in finishing the season 16-3-3.

The Bronchos went 9-10-2 during an injury-plagued 2013 season, pulling off two upsets in the MIAA Tournament to make the finals before losing in overtime.

UCO got back on track in 2014, returning to the national tournament and winning a first-round game en route to a 14-5-3 finish. The Bronchos went 12-5-3 and finished as MIAA runners-up in 2015.

Cook had his team back in the national playoffs in 2016, with UCO making it to the second round before being eliminated. The Bronchos went 15-7-1 and handed Central Missouri its lone regular season loss before falling to the Jennies in the MIAA Tournament finals and again in the national tournament.

Central had just its second losing season in 20 years in 2017, going 7-10-2.

Mike came to UCO after a highly-successful tenure at Southern Nazarene. He started his career as an assistant coach for the SNU men's team from 1987-92 before taking over head coaching duties for both the men's and women's teams in 1993.

He had a combined record of 146-66-3 in five years at the helm of both programs, going 88-22-1 with the women and 58-44-2 with the men.

Cook directed the women's team to a pair of Southwest Regional championships and took the 1995 and '96 teams to the NAIA National Championships, finishing third both years. He was a three-time District 9 and NAIA Southwest Regional Coach of the Year selection at SNU.

Cook also enjoyed great success as a player, both at SNU and in the professional ranks. He was a two-time All-District 9 and All-Southwest Region performer for the Redskins and played professional, and semi-professional soccer for nine years, getting inducted into the United Soccer Leagues Hall of Fame in 2006.

Mike, a native of Toronto, Canada, received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from SNU. Cook is married (Sandy) and has two children (Cody and Taylor) and one grandson (Karsten).

## Associate Head Coach Amel Muhamedagic



Amel Muhamedagic is in his 16th year at Central Oklahoma assisting the women's soccer team that has won over 300 games in program history and is a regular contender on the national stage. He was named Associate Head Coach in August 2021.

Muhamedagic has played a key role in keeping UCO among the NCAA Division II elite, having helped the Bronchos win 194 matches over the last 15 seasons with nine NCAA Division II national tournament appearances (2007, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2019, and 2021).

Amel is involved in all facets of program including recruiting, on field training, academic progress, scouting and game preparation.

In 2007, Muhamedagic's first year with the program, he guided the back line and goalkeeper Carly Fisher to 13 shutouts while allowing one goal in going a perfect 10-0 and capturing the regular season Lone Star Conference title.

In 2009, Muhamedagic coached goalkeeper Megan Riley and the back line to 13 shutouts and another LSC championship.

In 2012, Muhamedagic helped guide the Bronchos to a runner-up finish in their first year of competition in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

In 2014, Amel led the way as the Bronchos register a school-record 15 shutouts in making another Division II national tournament appearance.

He helped guide the Bronchos to one of the best seasons in school history in 2018. Central won a school record 22 games, had a school record 16-game win streak, and the Bronchos' 16-0 start is also the best start in school history. Central made it to the NCAA Championship Round of 16 and had nine All-MIAA selections, seven All-Region selections, and three All-Americans.

In 2019, Muhamedagic helped Central to a second consecutive MIAA postseason tournament championship and another NCAA tournament appearance, finishing the year 14-5-3. Central's 2020 season was canceled due to the pandemic. The Bronchos did play an unofficial spring season in 2021 to make up for lost time and did win the MIAA title for the third year in a row.

In 2021, Muhamedagic helped Central to a 13-5-3 overall record and a fourth-place finish in the MIAA standings. UCO made an appearance in the 2021 MIAA Women's Soccer Championship semifinals and earned an at-large bid to the national tournament for the ninth time with Muhamedagic on the sidelines.

Amel has helped coach 67 All-Conference selections, almost 50 All-Region and nine All-Americans while with UCO. Muhamedagic came to UCO after three years at Mount Mercy University in Iowa. His 2005 team set a school record for wins.

Amel led Waterloo (Iowa) High School in goals for three straight years and then played two years for Northern Iowa, earning both bachelor's and master's degrees from UNI.

Muhamedagic has been involved with Oklahoma Olympic Development Program and Region III Program. Muhamedagic is also involved with the Oklahoma Football Club, the largest soccer club in Oklahoma. He has served as staff coach for the boys and girls since 2008, with his teams having won numerous state cups and qualified to regional tournaments.

Muhamedagic holds Premier License from National Soccer Coaches Athletic Association (NSCAA highest distinction from this organization), "A" license from United States Soccer Federation (USSF highest distinction from this organization), National Youth License (USSF), and National Goalkeeping License (NSCAA).

Amel, a native of Bosnia, is married (Cynthia) and has three daughters (Mia, Leila and Ella) and one son (Kyler).



# Players

## Season Outlook

Central Oklahoma soccer boasts a large group of returners in 2022 with hopes of continuing the traditional dominance the program has established in the 21st century.

Central is receiving votes in the national rankings, landing just outside the United Soccer Coaches Top 25 Preseason Poll. UCO was also picked third in the MIAA's Preseason Coaches' Poll. The 2022 Bronchos return 17 letter winners from last season's squad that made it to the MIAA Championship Semifinals and the NCAA Division II national tournament.

Mike Cook enters his 25th year and will coach his 24th season with the Bronchos this Fall. One of the winningest coaches in Division II history, Cook says versatility is this year's strong suit.

"We're looking forward to getting started," Cook said. "We've got a lot of versatile players this season. We're working on finding out who is best together and who is best at what spot. But what we like is that several of our girls can play more than one position and a lot of that is determined on matchups. We did well in the preseason and we're ready to get started for real this week."

Central Oklahoma has 17 student-athletes on this year's roster back from the 2021 squad that made it to nationals and the Bronchos have 14 back with starting experience. UCO went 13-5-3 last season, posting a winning record for the 21st time in 23 seasons. Cook started the program in 1998 and has a 336-124-36 overall record in 23 seasons – a .716 winning percentage.

A junior class of four leads the Bronchos onto the field this Fall with each of them in their fourth year of college soccer (2020-21 did not count against their eligibility).

Monika McGee served as captain last season and is expected to be the leader on and off the field again this season. She has played in all 43 games for UCO since 2019, making 42 starts, and has led the team to two national tournament appearances (2019 & 2021). McGee earned All-MIAA honors in 2021 as well as All-Region accolades. She's scored 11 goals and has 12 assists in her career.

Eden Jones has also played in all 43 games for the Bronchos since 2019, making 40 starts. She has scored eight goals and has two assists in two official seasons on the field. Jones also helped the Bronchos reach the NCAA tournament in 2019 and 2021. Both McGee and Jones helped Central win the 2019 MIAA postseason tournament championship and the unofficial 2020-21 league title.

Avery Holland transferred to UCO from Rose State before last season and had an immediate impact. She played in 19 of 21 games last season and made 14 starts. She was a key defender in helping the Bronchos back to the national tournament. Amaya Grace joined the Bronchos earlier this year and gained a valuable Spring semester of experience being in the program. She comes from North Texas after spending two seasons at Seminole State and is looking to bolster the Central front lines from the forward position.

The sophomore class makes up most of the entire roster for the Bronchos, but there's a line down the middle of this group. With the 2020 season canceled, there are six sophomores in their third year in the program. There are also nine more that are true sophomores in their second year with the program.

The first part of that bunch is led by Kassidy Collins, an

All-MIAA performer from a year ago. Collins can play all over the field and does at different times. The Owasso native has been solid up front and as a defender while also succeeding, and earning All-MIAA honors, as a midfielder. She played in 15 games, starting 13, and scored five goals and made four assists last season.

Linsey Gordon played in and started all 21 games last season. The center back is poised to continue dominating the back line for the Bronchos. She can mark the opposing team's best player and keep that back line in position for 90 minutes. Gordon played a team-high 1,960 minutes in her first official collegiate season.

Kylee Wickersham played in 19 of 21 games last season and made 16 starts. A defensive mid, she scored one goal in Central's 2-1 win over then third-ranked Emporia State in Edmond last Fall. Wickersham is a physical presence in the middle of the field and gives UCO control of the game. Emily Tincher appeared in 13 games last season and made four starts. She posted three assists and is a possession-minded midfielder that helps the Bronchos stay on track.

Caroline Faulkner played in two games as goalkeeper last season but is expected to contend for the starting job this Fall. She made eight saves in her limited action. Brooke Franklin sat out 2021 with an injury and is aimed at making a big return this Fall. She spent the pandemic year at Central Arkansas before transferring to UCO in 2021.

The true sophomores group is led by a few youngsters with experience and a few more ready to gain more minutes on the field.

Madison Linavong played more minutes (1,470) than any other true freshman last season. She appeared in all 21 games and made 16 starts. Linavong scored four goals and had three assists and should be a contender this season for more. Madison Hayes played in 16 games and made five starts for the Bronchos, playing a key role with Central's defense. And Adria Ramirez played in 18 games, making one start, in helping the Bronchos up front.

Harmony Turner, Lauren Hinnenkamp and Megan Wilson all made their own impressions as freshmen a year ago. Turner played in 15 games, making six starts. She scored one goal and had one assist. Hinnenkamp appeared in 14 games, making four starts, and had one assist. Wilson made 11 appearances with two starts.

Olivia Vigil made just one appearance in goal a year ago, but made four saves and didn't allow a goal in helping the Bronchos to one of 12 shutouts posted on the year. She'll contend with Faulkner for the starting job this Fall.

Matilda Torres did not play last season due to injury but is poised to make a strong debut. Albany Adair joins the Bronchos this Fall after starting her collegiate career at Oral Roberts.

Central Oklahoma has seven freshmen on this year's squad and some will look to contribute right away. Avery Bass and Abigale Howard are both goalkeepers looking to contend for time in the net. Jayme Dowell, Zoe Ross and Lauren Piper are midfielders, Sofia Magana will fight for time on the back line and Rebecca Tweedy will look to bolster the front half of the Broncho offense.

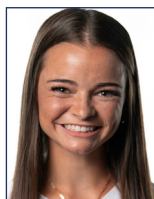

## All-Conference Selections

Central Oklahoma has had 67 players earn All-Conference honors a combined 120 times since the program started in 1998.

The Bronchos were members of the Lone Star Conference from 1998-2010 before joining the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association in 2012.

Katie Killion became the first Broncho to be named to four All-MIAA teams (2015-16-17-18). Asha Haile followed that by earning the honor each year from 2016-19. Five players - Kim Brown, Carly Fischer, Valerie Gutierrez, Lisa Hansen and Alli Miller - were four-time All-LSC performers.

In 2018, Central Oklahoma unprecedently swept the MIAA's postseason awards. Killion was named MIAA Offensive Player of the Year, Kelsey Gordon MIAA Defensive Player of the Year, Kelsi Gibson MIAA Goalkeeper of the Year, and Taryn Kedzior MIAA Freshman of the Year while head coach Mike Cook was named MIAA Coach of the Year.

## Tom Thompson Soccer Field

Central Oklahoma plays its home games at Tom Thompson Field, located on the corner of Chowning & Ayers just east of Hamilton Field House on campus. The field is named for UCO graduate Tom Thompson, who donated funds to help start the soccer program in 1998.

It now ranks as one of the finest soccer facilities in NCAA Division II after undergoing a number of renovations over the past several years. Central upgraded the facilities entry-way and installed bleacher seating to accommodate large crowds the Bronchos have grown accustomed to seeing. UCO most recently added a four-pole light system to allow for night games to be played. The Bronchos play on a natural grass surface.

UCO has enjoyed great success on its home field, entering the 2022 season with a glittering 175-39-13 record, a winning percentage of .799, at the field. The Bronchos played their first home game on Sept. 13, 1998, beating St. Gregory's 3-0, and went 8-2-1 at home in 2021.

UCO has also played 24 home games away from Tom Thompson Field. The Bronchos are 20-3 at UCO's football stadium, Chad Richison Stadium, and 0-1 at nearby Edmond Soccer Club. The Bronchos drew what was then an NCAA Division II-record 2,139 fans to Chad Richison Stadium in 2008 in a game against Dallas Baptist and went 8-2 while playing all 10 home games there in 2010.

## Edmond

Edmond is located in the heart of Oklahoma, just north of the state capital in Oklahoma City, and has a population of over 90,000 as one of the fastest growing cities in the state.

Edmond has the best of both worlds, including easy access to the city with just enough distance to maintain a close-knit community atmosphere.

The city offers outstanding hotels, nostalgic shopping areas and conveniently located attractions for your enjoyment. Known for its outstanding golf courses, Edmond has hosted some of the most exciting PGA and celebrity events in the past two decades at world-famous Oak Tree Golf Club.

Edmond is the fastest growing, most economically dynamic city in Oklahoma. Thriving technology firms, diverse retail and commercial opportunities and small corporate office headquarters have enhanced its reputation as the affluent residential suburb to the metropolitan area.

There are many more activities in Edmond, with a variety of music, art, theatre, water and sporting events that make for spectacular family fun.

Heard on Hurd is a monthly festival where Downtown Edmond is transformed into an exciting mix of food trucks, family-friendly excitement and music that has become one of the premier, socially engaging events in the area.

Edmond also boasts one of the best Fourth of July fireworks shows in the country. More than 125,000 people attend the event. LibertyFest has been previously chosen by CNN and USA Today as one of the top 10 places to be in America on July 4.

Another Edmond attraction is Lake Arcadia. Home to the Center for Outdoor Adventure Recreation, Lake Arcadia offers trails for running, hiking, and cycling, as well as 1,820 surface acres for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing, and 26 miles of shoreline for more fun.



## Oklahoma City

The largest city in the state, Oklahoma City borders Edmond to the south and sits at the crossroads of I-35, I-40 and I-44, leaving OKC with more than 130 miles of federal and interstate highways.

More than 1.3 million people call metro Oklahoma City home.

The City, as it is commonly referred to around the state, offers numerous things to do on any given day of the week – or year for that matter. Whether it is sports, music, art, or just getting outside on a nice day, OKC offers it all.

Chesapeake Energy Arena in downtown Oklahoma City is not only home to the NBA's Oklahoma City Thunder, but it also hosts concerts year-round, as well as other events such as pro wrestling, bull riding and more.

Bricktown, the central hub of entertainment in downtown, is home to Bricktown Ballpark, where the Oklahoma City Dodgers – Triple-A affiliate to MLB's L.A. Dodgers – play ball. The ballpark also hosts high school games, collegiate tournaments, as well as concerts of its own.

There is plenty more to do, especially on the booming, Oklahoma River.

The UCO rowing team calls the river home and has a state-of-the-art boathouse on the river to prove it. Visitors can also enjoy the Riversport Adventure District, where



you can challenge yourself through a white-water rapids course, zip line across the river, or bungee jump among other fun activities.

There are also five lakes in the greater OKC metro area that offer ample fun including fishing, running or cycling trails and swimming.

There are also more than a dozen golf courses to choose from.

Along with art museums, a science museum, and many more, there is always something to do in OKC.

The Adventure District is just 10 minutes from UCO and offers many fun things to do.

Remington Park races horses more than half of the year, the Oklahoma City Zoo is always a top-pick, and it sits right next to the science museum.

If you venture west of downtown toward the fairgrounds, you can find more fun.



Home to the Oklahoma State Fair every September, as well as shows year-round, the fairgrounds offer countless entertainment options.

Oklahoma City is in a warm southwest climate. It sees more than 300 days of sunshine on average per

year.

The average temperature annually is 60 degrees according to the Oklahoma City Visitors Convention Bureau. OKC also sees on average 32.03 inches of rain and nine inches of snow every year.

## Administration



### President, Patti Neuhold-Ravikumar

Patti Neuhold-Ravikumar is the 21st president of the University of Central Oklahoma and the institution's first female president in its 129-year history. She has been a contributing member of the Central community since 2007. She served in a variety of roles during that time; most recently serving as the institution's Vice President of Finance and Chief Financial Officer.

Her multidimensional experience in private business and higher education includes business operations, finance, human resources, organizational development, strategic planning, institutional budget development, business process improvement and governing board relations. As a result of her commitment to developing others, she led the creation of the award-winning UCO Management Development Program. Under her leadership, UCO's compensation structure and health insurance plan were modernized to help create a contemporary people-centered benefits culture.

Among her contributions to UCO, she has served as chair or member of a number of institutional committees and task forces. These include the university branding initiative, program prioritization, budget model exploration, Affordable Care Act implementation, the creation of the University Planning Council, strategic planning and enrollment management planning. She currently serves on the Strategic Enrollment Planning Council as well as the University Planning Council at UCO. She has served as the chair of the Regional University System of Oklahoma Business Officers, chair of the Pension Committee for the Regional University System of Oklahoma and vice chair of the Oklahoma Higher Education Employee Interlocal.

As UCO's vice president of finance and chief financial officer, she helped to navigate the financial turbulence created by the precipitous decline in enrollment and the significant loss of state funding. While the institution had lost more than \$10.5 million in tuition revenue and \$12.3 million in state funding by 2019, her leadership ensured the preservation of every job on campus and buffered our classrooms from negative impact. For her work in successfully guiding the institution through these rough waters, she was awarded the President's Award in Applied Leadership in 2018.

A champion for progress and improvement, she leads the university's pursuit of innovation in shaping the future of higher education. This includes educating for tomorrow's skills, growing more fully online programs designed and taught by our talented faculty, partnering with businesses in the metropolitan area to expand non-credit offerings and capturing opportunities for growth through institutional responsiveness to student demand and economic need.

President Neuhold-Ravikumar currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology (OCAST), and Oklahoma State Chamber. She serves as an ex-officio member of the Edmond Chamber of Commerce Board of Advisors.

Patti earned her bachelor's degree in psychology with an emphasis in management from Oklahoma Christian. She earned her master's degree in industrial/organizational psychology from Tulsa and is a doctoral candidate in organizational leadership at Concordia University – Chicago.



### Director of Athletics, Stan Wagon

Stan Wagon is the University of Central Oklahoma's director of athletics, becoming the ninth director in the school's more than 125-year athletic history.

He was hired August 2020 and came to Central following a four-year stint as commissioner of the Sooner Athletic Conference, serving that post since July 2016. Prior to that, Wagon held the same position at the Lone Star Conference, spending 11 years there within the conference's administration and as commissioner.

An Edmond native, Wagon earned his bachelor's degree from Central in 1995. His father (Skip) served as director of athletics from 1986-2003 following a 15-year stint as head athletic trainer.

Wagon returns to UCO after a 25-plus year career in athletics. After working in the UCO sports information office as a student, Wagon had stints in the same role at Midwestern State, where he received his master's degree, and Tarleton State.

Wagon moved from Tarleton to the NCAA Division II's Lone Star Conference office and eventually served as commissioner. He spent 11 years in that role before moving to the same post at the NAIA's Sooner Athletic Conference.

At the Lone Star Conference, Wagon's most noteworthy accomplishment was creation of the Lone Star Football Festival, held annually at Arlington's AT&T Stadium, home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys. The event generated nearly a half-million dollars back to the conference office.

Throughout his career, Wagon has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. He has served as Chair of the NCAA Division II Nominating Committee and the NCAA Men's Basketball Regional Advisory Committee. He also served on committees for the D2 CCA and College Sports Information Directors of Association (CoSIDA).

Wagon is married (Jill) and has three children (Abby, Macy, and Knox).

## Administration



### **Chuck Bailey - Senior Strategic Advisor**

Chuck Bailey moved into the position of Senior Strategic Advisor in August 2020 following a brief stint as interim athletic director, for which he served from May 1, 2020 through the end of August.

Bailey came to UCO in 1984 as an assistant football coach. He helped lead the Bronchos to two Lone Star Conference championships and four NCAA Division II playoff appearances during his coaching tenure.

Bailey assumed the additional responsibilities of Director of Football Operations in 2003 and served both roles until moving into athletic administration in 2006. He served as Assistant Athletic Director for Operations before becoming Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2007.

Bailey left UCO to become the District Athletic Director for Mustang Public Schools in 2009 where he served until retiring in 2016. He returned to UCO in 2017 as Development Director for Athletic Scholarships and contributed in that capacity for two years.

Bailey is married (Crystal) and has two children (Burke and Brylee).



### **Jeremy Rogers - Senior Associate Athletic Director**

Jeremy Rogers, a native of Medford, Oklahoma, serves as Senior Associate Athletic Director at Central Oklahoma.

Joining the department in November 2012, Rogers served the compliance department in an assistant role before moving to Director of Athletic Compliance and Legal Affairs, overseeing all aspects of the crucial facet of the department. He was named Senior Associate Athletic Director in July 2021, continuing to lead the efforts of the compliance department while adding oversight of the internal operations of the athletic department. Rogers also oversees operations in athletic training, strength & conditioning, ticketing, and facilities.

Rogers has been heavily involved in projects, committees, forums, and the like both inside the university as well as on the national stage.

He holds positions in charge of student-athlete development and the Student Athlete Advisory Committee, he is Deputy Title IX coordinator and a member the University's Behavioral Assessment Team (BAT). And he has sport oversight of the men's golf, women's track & field and cross country, and wrestling programs.

A member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), Rogers is also involved with the National Association of Academic and Student-Athlete Development Professionals (N4A), College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA), and National Association of Athletics Compliance (NAAC) serving on the association's DII Reasonable Standards Committee.

Rogers serves on the NCAA Division II Coaching Enhancement Grant Committee which is designed to provide financial assistance to the division's member schools that are committed to enhancing ethnic minority and gender representation in newly created assistant coaching positions for any NCAA-sponsored sport. He is also a representative of the NCAA Eligibility Advisory Group which provides support and feedback on content and functionality to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

Rogers was a member of the Southern Nazarene University football team (two-year starter) and earned all-conference honors at tight end. He received his Bachelor's degree in Sport Management from SNU in 2007.

Rogers went on to earn his Juris Doctor from the University of Oklahoma College of Law in 2012. While at OU he worked as an intern for the Athletic Compliance Department and Office of Legal Counsel. Rogers is licensed to practice law in the state of Oklahoma and is a member of the Oklahoma Bar Association.

### **Melissa Paul, Assistant A.D., Finance, SWA**

She is a native of Mustang, Oklahoma and graduated from Mustang High School in 2007.

## Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association

Central Oklahoma enters its 10th year as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The MIAA, a 14-member conference of NCAA Division II institutions in Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma, was first organized in 1912 as the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Over the past 100 years, the MIAA has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA schools have won 35 NCAA team championships and over 300 individual national championships over the past four decades.

The MIAA currently conducts championships in nine sports for both men and women.

For the men, champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, baseball, tennis, golf, and wrestling. The MIAA crowns champions in bowling, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track & field.

The MIAA turned a new page on July 1, 1992, when the NCAA Division II conference changed its name from the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association to the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The decision to make the change originated in 1989, when Pittsburg State and Washburn became the first schools outside the state of Missouri to gain membership in the MIAA.

The conference was first organized in 1912 with 14 member institutions. Of those original members, Central Missouri and Northwest Missouri still remain a part of the MIAA.

The first change in membership came in 1924, when the MIAA reorganized to include only the five regional Missouri state colleges: Central Missouri, Truman (at the time known as Northeast Missouri State), Northwest Missouri, Southeast Missouri State and Southwest Missouri State (now Missouri State).

Over the next 56 years, three schools joined the membership: Missouri School of Mines (later Missouri-Rolla) in 1935, Lincoln in 1970 and the Missouri-St. Louis in 1980.

Ken Jones became the first full-time commissioner of the MIAA in 1981 and would be in the position for 16 years, retiring in 1997. Ralph McFillen succeeded Jones, serving 10 years before his retirement in 2007.

Jim Johnson succeeded McFillen in July of that year and



served as commissioner until September of 2010, when Dr. Bob Boerigter took over. Mike Racy is the current commissioner and began in January of 2017 following Boerigter's retirement.

Southwest Baptist brought membership back to eight schools in 1986, before the major expansion of the conference in 1989. Pittsburg State, Washburn, Missouri Southern and Missouri Western began competition in the 1989-90 season.

Southeast Missouri State left the MIAA following the 1990-91 season and was replaced by Emporia State in the 1991-92 season.

Missouri-St. Louis departed the MIAA in 1996, Missouri-Rolla left in 2005 and Lincoln forfeited its membership in 1999. Fort Hays State joined the MIAA in 2006, Nebraska-Omaha entered the league in 2008 and Lincoln re-joined the conference in 2010.

UCO, Lindenwood, Nebraska-Kearney and Northeastern State all become league members with the start of the 2012-13 academic year.

Nebraska-Omaha left the league in 2011 and Truman State did the same in 2013.

Southwest Baptist, which had not competed in football in the MIAA since 2014, and Lindenwood, departed the MIAA altogether in 2019. Lincoln, who like SBU had been competing as associate members without football, returned to fill the void left by Lindenwood to keep the MIAA with 12 football playing schools.

Newman (Kan.) and Rogers State (Okla.) also joined the league in 2019 to give the MIAA 14 total schools. Newman had been an associate member in wrestling.
