SCHOOL NICKNAME

“Bronchos” was the nickname selected for Central Oklahoma in 1922 by Mrs. C.W. Wantland, wife of long-time UCO football coach C.W. Wantland. The name was chosen from a number of suggestions for the name of UCO’s football team and became the nickname for all athletic teams at the school. Mrs. Wantland was made an honorary member of the Letterman’s Club as a result of selecting the nickname, becoming the first woman admitted to that organization.

SCHOOL COLORS

Bronze and blue were chosen as Central Oklahoma’s school colors early in the fall of 1895 by school president Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh. The first public display of the bronze and blue was in Guthrie when a student represented UCO in the first oratorical contest ever held in Oklahoma.

COACHES/ SEASON OUTLOOK



HEAD COACH

EDGAR MIRAKU

Edgar Miraku has built the Central Oklahoma program into a consistent winner and perennial national contender during a sensational career with the Bronchos.

UCO has been one of the winningest programs in NCAA Division II with Miraku at the helm, having compiled a stellar 302-93 record the last 12 seasons.

He reached the 300-win mark in the first match of the 2024 NCAA Division II Central Regional and needs three wins to surpass Mark Herrin for the most wins in program history.

Miraku has guided the Bronchos to 25-plus wins seven times, with the 2015, 2016, and 2024 teams each eclipsing the 30-win mark.

Miraku has coached 14 All-Region picks by nine players and 13 All-America awards by eight players, with Taylor Bevis becoming the first three-time All-American in program history in 2018. For UCO, 12 of the 13 All-America selections in school history have come under Miraku's guidance.

Edgar has also had 68 All-MIAA players during his tenure and the Bronchos have excelled in the classroom as well, with 79 recognitions on the MIAA Academic Honor Roll.

UCO joined the MIAA in Edgar's first year at the controls in 2012 and went 13-18. The Bronchos made a big jump the next season, finishing 24-10 for the winningest season since 2007.

Central continued its upward climb under Miraku in 2014, putting together a fabulous 28-5 record. UCO beat three teams ranked in the top 15 nationally in finishing third in the conference, but were denied a national tournament berth.

Miraku guided the Bronchos to a fantastic 31-5 campaign in 2015, ripping off 16 straight wins during one stretch. UCO captured the rugged MIAA championship for the program's first league title since 2007 as Edgar was named Coach of the Year for the second straight time.

UCO broke into the NCAA Division II national rankings for the first time ever that season and earned its first national tournament berth since 2007. The Bronchos won a first-round match in the Central Regional before falling to No. 1-ranked Concordia-St. Paul.

UCO followed with a fantastic 30-4 season in 2016 and was a perfect 15-0 at home without dropping a set. The Bronchos had 3-0 wins over

five top-25 teams -- including two in the top 10 -- and were ranked in the top 15 all season, but were denied a berth in the national tournament.

Central put together a 17-match winning streak en route to a 29-6 finish in 2017 and made it to the national tournament before falling to eventual champion Concordia-St. Paul.

The Miraku-led Bronchos put together a 27-7 record in 2018 and were ranked in the top 20 all season.

A youthful and inexperienced UCO squad the had just one senior put together an 18-13 record in 2019, with the Bronchos knocking off No. 14 Northwest Missouri in the home finale to hand Edgar his 200th career win.

The 2020 season was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. UCO did compete in an unofficial spring season in 2021 and the Bronchos won 12 matches, though they don't count on Edgar's record.

Central came back in 2021 to finish 19-10 and a young team enjoyed a fine season in 2022, finishing 24-7 and tying for third in the MIAA despite starting all underclassmen. The Bronchos knocked off four top-20 teams.

UCO posted a 26-5 record and league runner-up finish in 2023, but were again denied a national tournament berth.

Miraku guided the Bronchos to the best season in school history in 2024 as UCO shot out to a best-ever 18-0 start en route to winning a school-record 33 matches in finishing 33-3.

The Bronchos were runner-up in the regular season league standings, then enjoyed a sensational postseason run that resulted in the program's first MIAA Tournament title followed by the first regional championship that led to a first-ever Elite Eight appearance.

UCO won three consecutive five-set matches to claim the Central Regional crown, capped by a stirring comeback victory over tournament host St. Cloud State in the finals. The magical season ended with a tough five-set loss to San Francisco State in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Volleyball Championship.

Miraku came to UCO following a seven-year stint as head coach at Edmond Memorial, guiding the Bulldogs to an amazing 209-48 record and four Class 6A state titles.



He took over the Memorial reigns in 2005 and immediately led the team to the state championship. Edgar and the Bulldogs added gold balls in 2007, '09 and '10.

Miraku also worked with USA Volleyball and the USA Men's National Sitting Team while at Memorial, serving as head coach for two years and assistant coach for five.

He participated in numerous international competitions during that span, including the 2007 Para-Pan American Games, the 2006 and 2010 World Championships, the 2010 World Cup and the 2011 Continental Cup.

Edgar is a UCO graduate, earning bachelor's and graduate degrees while serving as volunteer and later graduate assistant from 1995 to 2000 under Mark Herrin.

A native of Albania, Miraku played professional volleyball for four years and was a member of the Albanian Junior National Team from 1992-95, winning a silver medal in the 1993 Balkan Championships.

Miraku has also coached and been involved with Oklahoma Peak Performance since its inception and captured a national championship this past summer.

Edgar is married (Amy) and has two children (Abiana and Arden).

ASSISTANT COACH

EMILY TODD

In her fifth year as Central Oklahoma's assistant coach is Emily Todd, who leads and manages recruiting duties for the Bronchos while also assisting in the day-to-day operations of the program.

Todd has helped lead UCO to a sensational 102-25 record the past four seasons.

The Bronchos went 19-10 in Emily's first season in 2021 before coming back with a 24-7 campaign in 2022.

UCO was nationally-ranked most of the 2023 season in going 26-5 and Todd helped lead the Bronchos to the best season in school history last year.

Central opened the 2024 season a best-ever 18-0 and went on to a runner-up finish in the MIAA before capturing its first-ever league tournament title. The Bronchos followed that with three straight five-set wins to claim their first Central Regional championship in advancing to the Elite Eight.

UCO dropped a heartbreaking five-set quarterfinal decision there in finishing with a school-record 33 wins (33-3).

Emily came to the Bronchos after a three-year assistant coaching stint at Henderson

State, where she helped guide the Reddies to back-to-back 20-win seasons.

Todd started her coaching career as an assistant at Arkansas Tech, spending three years there. The Golden Suns won the Great American Conference and finished 35-1 season in her final season.

Emily played one year each at Colorado and Navarro Junior College before spending her final two seasons at ATU. Todd led the team to 54 wins, two league titles and two national tournament berths as a two-time All-GAC selection.

Todd received her bachelor's degree in Health & Physical Education and has a master's degree in College Student Personnel, both from Arkansas Tech.

SEASON OUTLOOK

Following up the best season in school history will be a daunting task for Central Oklahoma in 2025, but the Bronchos aren't about to shy away from the challenge.

Three starters and four other letterwinners are back from last year's team that won a school-record 33 matches, captured the MIAA Tournament title for the first time and claimed its first-ever NCAA Division II Central Regional championship. Eight talented newcomers complete the roster, with several of those expected to play key roles.

So UCO is hardly devoid of talent, with the Bronchos once again expected to be a top contender in the MIAA and Division II.

"We're going to stick with our blue collar approach and work hard at getting better every day," said head coach **Edgar Miraku**, who enters his 13th season with a stellar 302-93 record. "Our depth is a little concerning and we have to stay healthy, but we have good pieces in place and I'm excited about seeing what this team can become."

UCO is led by a trio of senior veterans -- setter **Lindsey Houran**, outside hitter **Sydney Huck** and middle blocker **Lari Migliorino**. All three are entering their fourth season as starters and each ranks among the best in the league at their position.

Senior middle blocker **Mikiah Perdue**, junior outside hitter **Sawyer Franz**, junior libero **Kaitlyn Parrott** and junior setter **Riley Roberts** all saw extensive playing time last year and give the Bronchos much-needed experience.

Six freshmen and two transfers round out the roster, with senior middle blocker **Kedron Burk** expected to have the biggest impact of the newcomers.

The MIAA is the toughest conference in Division II and will once again present a big challenge, with UCO also playing several high-level teams during the early-season schedule.

"We have a tougher non-conference schedule than usual, but that makes good teams better," Miraku said. "Those matches will help prepare us for the MIAA, which is always a grind."

Here's a position-by-position breakdown of the 2025 team.

SETTER

Senior **Lindsey Houran** makes the high-powered offense go with her precision passing and keen understanding of the game. She was a First-Team All-MIAA pick last year and enters her fourth year as the starter with 3,892 career assists. UCO's undisputed team leader is also a fantastic server and top-notch defender.

Junior **Riley Roberts** has gained great experience the past two seasons and looks to be the main back-up once again. She should also help the Bronchos defensively.

Freshman **Taylor Nielsen** brings boundless energy to the position and is poised to help, though she's also a redshirt candidate.

DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST/LIBERO

UCO is looking for a new starter here, with junior **Kaitlyn Parrott** the favorite to take over the top role. A versatile athlete who knows the Broncho system, Parrott has seen extensive action the last two years and is ready to show what she's capable of.

Morgan Manning is expected to help out here, with the feisty freshman making up for her lack of collegiate experience with hard work and can-do attitude.

Junior transfer **Emma Halstead** will also contribute, bringing maturity and experience to the position as well as being a true team player.

Freshman **Jordyn Baker** is an excellent server who could also help out and rookie **Mayli Whetter** provides even more depth.

HITTER

The Bronchos have one of the best in the conference here in senior standout **Sydney Huck**, who is back for her fourth year of starting duty.

Huck earned First-Team All-MIAA honors for the third straight time last season and enters her final season with 1,133 career kills. She's a proven point provider who has improved her game from last year and will continue to contribute on the front and back rows.

Junior **Sawyer Franz** lettered in a reserve role last season and UCO is looking for her to provide consistency and steadiness to the position this fall. A key team leader, Franz has the ability to be a big-time contributor in 2025.

Freshmen **Kamryn Glover** and **Myla Unterweger** will also push for playing time despite their lack of collegiate experience.

Glover has been a quick learner of UCO's system and should contribute immediately, while Unterweger also has the ability to help on the left or right side.

MIDDLE BLOCKER

A trio of experienced seniors will provide major offensive and defensive support at the net this season.

Lari Migliorino enters her fourth year as a starter for the Bronchos, excelling in UCO's high-tempo offense with her offensive versatility and blocking prowess. She has a .297 career attack percentage with 501 kills and ranked 10th in the MIAA last year with 109 total blocks.

Transfer **Kedron Burk** looks to make a major impact this season after starting 50 matches during three years at Oral Roberts. She brings athleticism and height to the middle and should be a big-time contributor. Burk had 102 kills and 57 total blocks last year.

Mikiah Perdue is the final senior and will also play a major role as a reliable defender who brings great energy to the court. She can help at right-side hitter as well and is a tremendous blocker. Perdue has 222 kills and 103 total blocks in two years at UCO.

2024: Enjoyed sensational season, racking up 1,446 assists – eighth on UCO's single-season list – to go along with 391 digs, 61 kills, a team-high 34 service aces and 29 assisted blocks ... First-Team All-MIAA selection while also making the MIAA and Central Regional all-tournament teams ... Ranked second in the league and 10th nationally in assists per set (11.3) ... Had 17 matches with 40-plus assists, including seven with at least 50 ... Handed out season-high 64 in four-set MIAA Tournament finals win over Nebraska-Kearney while adding 18 digs and two kills ... Amassed double-digit digs in 20 matches, with career-best 26 coming in first-round Central Regional Tournament win over Southwest Minnesota ... HAMILTON FIELD HOUSE

Central Oklahoma plays its home matches in Hamilton Field House, which opened its doors in 1965.

The Bronchos have an impressive 340-104 record (76.6 winning percentage) at Hamilton Field House, including a 133-30 (81.6) mark under 13th-year head coach Edgar Miraku.

UCO boasts a dazzling 108-15 home record (87.8) since 2015.

Hamilton Field House was renamed from Broncho Field House on May 1, 1993 in honor of longtime coach and athletic director Dale Hamilton, who helped design the building in the 1960s.

The 3,000-seat facility underwent renovation in the summer of 2001 with



the installation of individual chairback seats on the floor and LED boards capable of showing live statistics were added five years ago.

Major improvements that included the addition of a new basketball/vol-

leyball practice facility and new locker rooms for volleyball, men's and women's basketball, soccer and tennis were completed in 2020.

Hamilton Field House also serves as the home for UCO's wrestling team

in addition to the men's and women's basketball squads.

In addition, HFH is the home for UCO's graduation ceremonies every May and December while hosting concerts, pep rallies, and many other events.

HISTORY

ALL-CONFERENCE PLAYERS

Central Oklahoma has had 51 players earn first- or second-team all-conference honors a combined 105 times since 1988.

The Bronchos were NAIA members in District Nine in 1987-88 before moving to NCAA Division II in 1989. UCO was in the Lone Star Conference from 1989-10, played as an independent in 2011 and joined the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association in 2012.

Only six players -- Alma Brahimaj (1999-02), Stacey Meek (2000-03), Taylor Bevis (2015-18), Jordan Spence (2015-18), Dominique Lipari (2016-19) and Jenna Karp (2021-24) -- have been four-time all-conference selections.

The Bronchos have also had four players named Player of the Year. Brahimaj earned the LSC North Division award in 1999 and '00, while Barbara Jackson claimed the MIAA honor in 2014, Bevis in 2017 and Addison Wimmer in 2024.

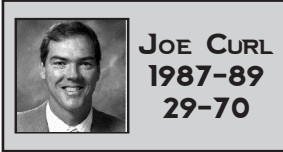

The Central Oklahoma Athletics Hall of Fame, founded in 1990, includes seven past members of the Broncho volleyball program.



AMY PARTEN (2002)

Amy Parten put UCO volleyball on the Lone Star Conference map from 1989-92, ending her sensational four-year career as the holder of 13 school records and leading the Bronchos to 89 wins.

Amy had 410 kills and 328 digs as a freshman to earn honorable mention All-LSC honors, then collected 879 kills and 615 digs the following two seasons in picking up Second-Team All-LSC recognition. She became UCO's first-ever First-Team All-LSC player as a senior in 1992 with a spectacular season that included what were then single-season school records for kills (624) and digs (548).

Parten finished her career with 1,913 kills in 5,098 attacks, both school records then that rank second now, along with 1,491 digs and 70 solo blocked shots.



KRISTIN VINCENT (2008)

Kristin Vincent was one of the top middle blockers in the Lone Star Conference throughout her career as a four-year starter at UCO from 1990-93.

Vincent was an honorable mention All-LSC pick in 1991 after collecting a single-season school record 164 assisted blocks while finishing second in the LSC in hitting percentage (.306). She earned honorable mention All-LSC acclaim again in 1992 while finishing second in the conference in both total blocks (211) and hitting percentage (.311).

Kristin was a First-Team All-LSC selection as a senior after leading the league in hitting percentage (.377) while making 313 kills and 155 total blocks. She finished with an LSC- and school-record 515 assisted blocks and a school-record 177 solo blocks.



KATE O'NEILL (2016)

Kate O'Neill was a four-year starter for the Bronchos at middle blocker from 1994-97 and finished her career with 1,701 kills, 439 assisted blocks and 79 solo blocks.

She was named Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year in 1994 after making 345 kills and 116 blocks in helping UCO make its initial appearance in the NCAA Division II national tournament. O'Neill came back the next season to earn Second-Team All-LSC honors and then was a First-Team All-LSC pick as a junior after collecting 438 kills, 158 blocks and a .356 hitting percentage.

Kate put together a sensational senior season in 1997, hitting a league-leading and school-record .430 in racking up 444 kills and 151 blocks as a First-Team All-LSC North Division selection.



ALMA BRAHIMAJ (2017)

Alma Brahimaj was a dominating presence on the court throughout her career from 1999-2002 in becoming UCO's first-ever four-time First-Team All-Conference selection.

She was twice named Lone Star Conference North Division Player of the Year and also earned All-Region accolades as a sophomore and senior. Brahimaj led UCO to 95 wins, two LSC North Division titles and a national tournament appearance.

Alma ranks first (644), third (624), fourth (622) and seventh (528) in single-season kills at UCO. She also owns school records for single-match (46) and career kills (2,404), single-match (125) and career (6,057) attacks and season (15) and career (45) 20-kill matches. Brahimaj ranks second in career aces (215) and fourth in career digs (1,833).



MARK HERRIN (2020)

Mark Herrin took over the coaching reigns at Central Oklahoma in 1990 and amassed a 304-155 record in 13 years at the helm.

The Bronchos finished below .500 just once with Herrin at the controls and he led Central to two Lone Star Conference North Division titles and its lone overall LSC championship.

Herrin's 1994 team set a school record for wins (32) that still stands, finishing 32-5 in winning the LSC and advancing to the second round of the NCAA Division II national tournament. His final team in 2002 captured its second straight LSC North Division crown and went 30-7 in making the national tournament.



LACIE ALLEN (2021)

Lacie Allen was a sensational back-row defender for the Bronchos during her career from 2004-07 and became the first player in program history to earn All-America honors. She led UCO to a 101 wins and two national tournament berths.

Allen was named Lone Star Conference North Division Libero of the Year as a junior in 2006 after finishing with a school-record 790 digs.

Lacie shattered that mark the next season, setting an NCAA Division II record with 996 digs in earning LSC Libero of the Year honors once again while also being named a first-team All-American. Her 2,765 career digs is a school record.



STACEY MEEK (2025)

Stacey Meek is one of UCO's few four-time All-Conference performer and led the Bronchos to a 99-34 record from 2000-03. She racked up 5,604 career assists – a school record that still stands – along with 1,227 digs, 336 kills, 279 blocks and 115 service aces.

Meek was the Lone Star Conference North Division Freshman of the Year in 2000 and came back as a sophomore to claim First-Team All-LSC North Division honors after tallying 1,536 assists. Meek repeated as a First-Team All-LSC North Division honoree in 2002 with a school-record 1,660 assists for a 30-7 team that advanced to the national tournament.

Stacey garnered First-Team All-LSC North Division accolades for the third straight season as a senior in 2003 after finishing with 1,401 assists. She was also a Second-Team Academic All-America selection after earning Third-Team honors in 2002.

The largest city in the state, Oklahoma City borders Edmond to the south and sits at the crossroads of I-35, I-40 and I-44, leaving OKC with more than 130 miles of federal and interstate highways.

More than 1.3 million people call metro Oklahoma City home.

The City, as it is commonly referred to around the state, offers numerous things to do on any given day of the week – or year for that matter. Whether it is sports, music, art, or just getting outside on a nice day, OKC offers it all.

Paycom Arena in downtown Oklahoma City is not only home to the 2025 NBA champion Oklahoma City Thunder, but it also hosts concerts year-round, as well as other events such as pro wrestling, bull riding and more.

Bricktown, the central hub of entertainment in downtown, is home to Bricktown Ballpark, where the Oklahoma City Comets – Triple-A affiliate to MLB’s L.A. Dodgers – play ball. The ballpark also hosts high school games, collegiate tournaments, as well as concerts of its own.

There is plenty more to do, especially on the booming, Oklahoma River.

The UCO rowing team calls the river home and has a state-of-the-art boathouse on the river to prove it. Visitors can also enjoy the Riversport Adventure District, where you can challenge yourself through a white-water rapids course, zip line



across the river, or bungee jump among other fun activities.

There are also five lakes in the greater OKC metro area that offer ample fun including fishing, running or cycling trails and swimming.

There are also more than a dozen golf courses to choose from.

Along with art museums, a science museum, and many more, there is always something to do in OKC.

The Adventure District is just 10 minutes from UCO and offers many fun things to do.

Remington Park races horses more than half of the year, the Oklahoma City Zoo is always a top-pick, and it sits right next to the science museum.

If you venture west of downtown toward the fairgrounds, you can find more fun.

Home to the Oklahoma State Fair every September,



as well as shows year-round, the fairgrounds offer countless entertainment options.

Oklahoma City is in a warm southwest climate. It sees more than 300 days of sunshine on average per year.

The average temperature

annually is 60 degrees according to the Oklahoma City Visitors Convention Bureau. OKC also sees on average 32.03 inches of rain and nine inches of snow every year.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION



PRESIDENT TODD LAMB

Todd G. Lamb became the University of Central Oklahoma’s 22nd president July 1, 2023, marking a new chapter in a distinguished career that spans public service, statewide elected office, private law practice and business ownership.

In his role leading Oklahoma’s metropolitan university, President Lamb ensures the Central team remains focused on educating students through transformative learning and meeting the critical workforce needs of our state and nation.

President Lamb champions a commitment throughout campus to what he has coined “The B.R.O.N.C.H.O. Way” – Being Reflective of Our Neighborhood, Community, History and Oklahoma. This commitment connects the university mission and values to relevant action that ensures accessibility to a quality university education for students.

Born in Enid, Oklahoma, President Lamb earned his bachelor’s degree from Oklahoma State University, also attending classes at UCO during his undergraduate pursuit. He earned a Juris Doctor from Oklahoma City University.

Early in his career, Lamb was a special agent with the U.S. Secret Service. He was appointed to the Joint Terrorism Task Force and was assigned to portions of the 9/11 investigation. He also served on details protecting President Bill Clinton and President George W. Bush.

Following his tenure with the U.S. Secret Service, President Lamb worked on the staff of U.S. Sen. Don Nickles. He was elected to the Oklahoma State Senate in 2004, where he represented portions of Edmond and northwest Oklahoma City. He rose to the position of majority floor leader during his senate tenure.

President Lamb was elected as the lieutenant governor of the state of Oklahoma, a position he held from 2011 to 2019. During his time in elected office at the Oklahoma State Capitol, he served in a number of leadership roles, focusing on educational, financial and commerce matters. He also was the recipient of the Oklahoma State Regents Distinguished Service Award for his dedication to strengthening higher education in Oklahoma.

Upon reentering the private sector in 2019, he was involved in a number of private business ventures, including the practice of law, focusing on business and governmental matters.

President Lamb’s diverse background in government, law, financial management and industry is helping guide UCO into the future as a leading university in career readiness.

President Lamb has been married to his wife, Monica, for 28 years. A longtime educator, she most recently taught at Cashion Public Schools. Monica stepped away from the classroom to commit herself to serving UCO students, faculty and staff as the university’s first lady. The Lambs have two children.



VICE PRESIDENT FOR ATHLETICS STAN WAGON

Stan Wagon is the University of Central Oklahoma’s first Vice President for Athletics. Wagon previously served as Central’s director of athletics, becoming the ninth director in the school’s more than 125-year athletic history.

An Edmond native, Wagon earned his bachelor’s degree in journalism/public relations from Central in 1995, when he was named Outstanding PR Student of the Year. He also holds a master’s degree from Midwestern State University. His father, Skip, worked at Central for 30-plus years and was athletic director from 1986-2003.

Under his leadership, the Bronchos have claimed three NCAA national championships, three national runner-up finishes and 12 conference titles. The university’s teams also have made 26 NCAA postseason appearances in eight different sports and claimed eight NCAA regional championships.

Wagon also has overseen major enhancements to Chad Richison Stadium, including seating expansion to more than 12,000, a new playing surface and improved digital signage. He has helped create opportunities for UCO to host outside events such as OKC Spark professional softball, NAIA Stunt National Championship and the OSSAA high school state football championship games, which recently garnered UCO attention from Sports Destination magazine as a Champion of Economic Impact.

Stan returned to UCO after a 25-plus year career in athletics. After working in the UCO sports information office as a student, Wagon went on to serve in athletic departments at Midwestern State University and Tarleton State University.

Wagon joined the NCAA Division II’s Lone Star Conference as assistant commissioner, before eventually becoming the league commissioner — a position he held for nearly eight years. After that, he went on to join the NAIA’s Sooner Athletic Conference as commissioner for four years.

Throughout his career, Wagon has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. He has served as chair of the NCAA Division II Nominating Committee and a member of the NCAA Division II Men’s Basketball Committee. Most recently, he served a two-year term as chair of the MIAA Athletics Administrators Council and was selected by Edmond Mayor Darrell Davis to represent UCO on the Visit Edmond tourism advisory board. He currently serves on the NCAA Division II Championships Committee.

Wagon and his wife, Jill, have three children -- Abby, Macy and Knox.

CHANDLER SHORT

Chandler Short joined the University of Central Oklahoma in February 2023 and serves as Deputy Athletic Director for Corporate Sales & Marketing in addition to her role as Senior Woman Administrator.

Short oversees UCO's corporate sales program and the marketing efforts of the department and its 14 varsity sports. McLaughlin joined UCO's athletic department after spending six years at Emporia State University and one year at Wichita State University. He joined Emporia State in 2017 as the Director of Marketing, was promoted to assistant athletic director, associate athletic director and then Senior Associate Athletic Director of External Operations in 2022.

COBY MACKIN

Coby Mackin joined the University of Central Oklahoma in December 2024 and serves as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Administration.

Mackin, who came to Central from Oklahoma City University, oversees administration in the athletics department's day-to-day operations.

Mackin arrived to OCU in 2023 as the assistant athletics director for internal affairs and in the early stages of 2024 Mackin was named Associate Athletics Director for Compliance and Academics and Senior Woman Administrator.

Before arriving at OCU, Mackin served as associate athletics director at Bayside Academy in Daphne, Ala, where she also owned and operated a facility for training athletes, The Fieldhouse, and was founder and president of a non-profit amateur sports organization, Southern Spirit Sports.

Prior to that, Mackin served as the pitching coach for the softball program at the University of South Alabama, where two of her pitchers were named Top 25 finalists for the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year award, and both were selected in the National Pro Fastpitch Draft.

Mackin began her coaching career in 1998 as the first head coach in Spring Hill College softball program history. The Badgers made three national tournament appearances, including a third-place finish in the program's second season of competition. Mackin coached 10 All-Americans, 25 All-Region picks, and 48 all-conference selections while compiling a 289-138-4 record in eight seasons. In 2003 Mackin was promoted to director of athletics in addition to her head-coaching duties. She was inducted into the SHC Hall of Fame in 2023.

During her collegiate playing career, Mackin was a four-year letter winner and was a member of four squads that advanced to the NAIA Championships at the University of Mobile (Ala.). She became a three-time NAIA scholar-athlete and First Team All-American in 1996. Mackin spent one season playing professionally in the Women's Professional Fastpitch league for the Durham Dragons.

Originally from Houston, Mackin graduated from Mobile in 1995 with a Bachelor of Science degree in communications and earned a second bachelor's degree in Spanish in 1997. She is married (Lee) and has two children (Marlee and Luke).

MID-AMERICA INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS ASSOCIATION

Central Oklahoma enters its 13th year as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The MIAA is one of the nation's oldest conferences and one of the most successful in NCAA Division II. The conference dates all the way back to 1912 and currently has 14 full-time members. The MIAA also has its own streaming network called The MIAA Network.

The MIAA's Success

Over the past 110 years, the MIAA has gained the reputation of being one of the best NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. Student-athletes have won 62 NCAA Division II team championships and well over 400 individual national titles. In the classroom, hundreds of student-athletes have earned Academic All-America and All-District honors.

The MIAA Footprint

The footprint of the conference reaches five states: Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, and Oklahoma with schools in the metro area of Kansas City, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, and Wichita.

The MIAA Conference Office

The conference office is located in Kansas City's historic West Bottom's District, just blocks away from the city's downtown business and entertainment area. The office is headquartered in Hy-Vee Arena.

Mike Racy oversees the conference and the conference office staff as the full-time Commissioner. The office has four full-time employees with assistance from an intern over the year and correspondent for The MIAA Network.

The MIAA's Governance Structure

When it comes to how the Association operates, the MIAA has three administrative councils and dozens of committees comprised of head coaches and administrators from around the conference. The three administrative councils that approve amendments or rule changes are the CEO Council which consists of University Presidents, the AAC (Athletic Administrators Council) which is made up of senior woman administrators and athletic directors and the IRC (Institutional Representatives Council) which is SWAs, ADs, and faculty athletic representatives.

Each head coach in the MIAA is a part of the coaching group for their sport and the group can suggest rule changes or new rules for the conference to be approved by the AAC, IRC and CEO Councils. Like the coaches group, any committee within the Association can suggest new rules or rule changes to the three councils.

The student-athletes have a voice in the MIAA as well. The annual SAAC Summit provides student-athletes with the chance to talk, discuss and suggest any new rules or changes to the current rules to be approved by the three councils.



The MIAA's Championships

The MIAA currently conducts championships in 18 sports. For men's athletics, champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, baseball, tennis, golf, and wrestling. Championships are awarded in women's athletics for volleyball, cross country, soccer, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, softball, golf, and tennis.

The MIAA Network

Fans or family can follow their favorite team or student-athlete anywhere in the world and whenever they want, thanks to The MIAA Network! The Network is a platform powered by BlueFrame Technology and allows each school to produce its own games. Broadcasts can be viewed on a desktop, mobile devices, and Internet-connected television devices anywhere in the world.

The MIAA Network content is available live, via live DVR, and is also immediately archived for on-demand viewing after each event. Fans can find all of the action on The MIAA Network website and on The MIAA Network apps for Amazon Fire TV, Android TV, Apple TV, and Roku. Any revenue generated by the Network is directed back to the schools as well.

The MIAA Network is not only a resource for fans but students as well. Universities have taken the opportunity to have students on their campuses get hands-on experience by broadcasting and producing games.
