Broncos Meet Nemesis Gators

When the Broncos open tonight's home season it will be against a team which has given them nothing but TROUBLE since the series began back in 1950.

San Francisco State has not only won 12 of the 13 meetings through the years with Cal Poly, but the Gators have managed to snatch seven straight victories since 1963. The last time the Broncos came out on the long end of the score was in 1962 when Cal Poly's football coach was Don Warhurst. Of course now Warhurst is the University's Athletic Director and he's never been able to witness a Cal Poly victory over SFS, a streak he would like to see ended tonight.

For trivia buffs, the final score of the '62 win was CP 12-9.

The Gators are coached by Vic Rowen, who is entering his 19th season at the school. Rowen, who is respected among his peers for the way his teams are prepared, is the sixth winningest coach in NCAA Division II football with 104 career victories (at the start of the season), 92 at SFS.

Two times Cal Poly coach Jim Jones has had teams face the Gators and has lost twice by scores of 16-14 (78) and 21-48 (77). However, there is some renewed opinit in playing the Gators again as their record tumbled to 1-9 last season (0-5 in the Far Western Conference).

San Francisco State does have the return of its top three offensive weapons in the form of Dan Priest, Carl Crews, and

McKinney Inks Pact

Former Cal Poly women's basketball star Musiette McKinney has signed a contract with the San Francisco Pioneers of the Women's Professional Basketball League (WBL).

McKinney, who wound up her stellar career last season as the all-time Cal Poly scorer with 1,379 points was selected by the Pioneers in the fourth round of the draft.

McKinney, from Pomona's Ganesha High, scored 13.3 points per game in the 1978-79 season and added 149 assists, a Bronco record for a single season. She also holds the career assist record with 439 in 116 games. McKinney, a guard, hauled down 198 rebounds (6.8 per game) last year.

She was selected to the All-Southern California Athletic Association team the past two seasons.

McKinney joins her former teammate, Joan Uhl, as the second Cal Poly player to go to the pro ranks. Uhl plays for the California Dreams in Long Beach. Alan Dewart. Priest averaged 50 yards per game rushing despite playing with two broken hands; Crews hauled in 34 passes last season for a 17.4 average; and Dewart, the Gators' record-shattering kicker was the best sophomore punter in Division III last season with a 39.4 average.

Defensively, the linebacking crew is sharp with Joe Garrity (79 tackles), Dave McCrery (74 tackles) and Chuck Werk (100 tackles) returning. Four-year cornerback Andre Wood returns, as does free safety Don Sutton who led the nation in interceptions last season as a mere freshman with 10.

From a fan's standpoint, the game with the pesky Gators should be enjoyable, as San Frnacisco State tries to extend its domination over Cal Poly for another year, while the Broncos will do anything in their power to improve the won-loss

Cross Country Team As Good As Ever

"Cal Poly's distance program has traditionally been very weak except for '68-'69 when it went to the National Championships. This year, with the aid of some new recruits, I feel we have the best talent this school has ever had together in cross country.

"And because of that, we're rather optimistic," said an enthusiastic Bronco cross country coach Jim George as he and his spikers begin the 1979 season with ample positive expectations.

Although the cross country competition for Poly didn't begin until Sept. 8 at Long Beach, George had his crew participating in a grueling training camp at Big Bear from Aug. 25-31. Thirteen runners (seven returning lettermen and six newcomers) were involved in the session.

"The majority of them were in good shape. Most of them had run 600-700 miles during the summer and then went up there to run nearly 100 more in the week. They were impressive," said

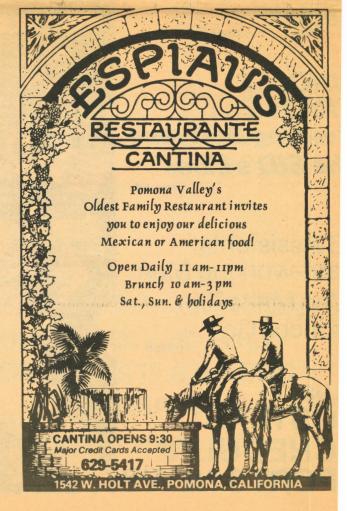
Impressive? To say the least. Out of the top seven finishers in the training camp course, four were freshmen, including Matt Blaty (21:05) who broke the course record by 40 seconds.

Blaty, last year's Athlete of the Year at Marina High School is an athlete to be reckoned with. His credentials include the two-mile title in the Sunkist Indoor Meet with a record time of 9:11.0. He finished third in the country in the 3,000-

Jones Remains Optimistic As He Begins Third Season

It has been reported, probably erroneously, that when General Custer surveyed Indians on all sides of him, he yelled, "Now I've got you where I want you!"

The point of the story is not to draw a wrong comparison between Custer and Cal Poly's head coach Jim Jones, but to stress two other points. First, Jim Jones is as optimistic about the fortunes of Cal Poly football as when he took over three years ago. Second, despite facing his toughest schedule, Jones feels that the 1979 edition of the Broncos will continue the steady improvement he started on the Cal Poly practice field in the Spring of 1977.

of 1977.
"I know we have a tough schedule,"
Jones reasons," and I know our record

has been 5-15 over the past two years, but we're a better football team and a better program. 1, my staff and our players, can't wait to prove it in 1979."

Contributing to his "1-got-you-where-l-want-you", philosophy is the fact that Jones' dedication to bringing in freshmen to play when he took over the Bronco reins will show positive results in the coming season.

"When you start freshmen—and we've started 13 over the past two years—then you're going to have seasons which become learning experiences," Jones relates. "I think that's what we had my first two years here."

A quick check of the statistics proves that Jones is right. In 1977, after losing the first seven games of the season, the Broncos played three solid games to end the year, winning two of them. It was the same story in 1978. After struggling to a 1-5 record to open the season, the Broncos then played four fine football games, winning two and almost pulling out a last-second come-from-behind win against Cal State Fullerton, a Division I opponent.

"Now we have some players who have been around," Jones notes. "We have players who know what we're talking about, who have been here right along with the coaching staff."

Using two Bronco student-athletes as examples will emphasize the point. Offensive guard Mike Seymour, now a junior, has been a starter since a freshman at Cal Poly. On defense, nose guard Don Drake, also a junior, has likewise started since a frosh. This type of experience should give Bronco supporters their first good look at a real Jim Jones team this season.

To possibly get a look into the future, check out the Jim Jones' teams at South Hills High School in West Covina where he was the head coach 11 years prior to coming over the hill to Cal Poly. There, his 72-26-3 record produced six Sierra League championships and one California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) 4A title in 1974. In his last four years at South Hills, Jones' teams were an

amazing 42-5-1, an .885 percentage.

Jones served as head coach at the Shrine All-Star Football Game at the Rose Bowl in 1976 and in the same capacity at the San Gabriel Valley All-Star Game in 1975. In his last seven years at South Hills he also served as Athletic Director and as a teacher in the physical education and business departments.

As a collegiate player he was part of the winning tradition at the University of Oklahoma. He received his B.A. in business administration from the Norman, Oklahoma, campus after an athletic career as a football and baseball player. He attended Central High School in Oklahoma City, earning All-State honors in football.

Jim and his wife Mary live in West

meters (8:21) and ran the fourth fastest two-mile (9:07) in Orange County last year.

Gary Borbon, from Upland High School finished second at camp with a time of 21:20. Another promising freshman, Borbon was San Antonio League champion in the mile (4:18:1) and two-mile (9:37). He also gained Most Valuable Runner and Athlete of the Year honors at Upland.

Tony Reyes, from Damien High clocked in fourth. Reyes was the San Antonio League runner-up to Borbon in both the mile and two mile. He finished third in the CIF 3A mile run with a time of 4:19.3.

Tom Hays, from Arlington High School finished seventh to round out the top freshmen. Hays was the Riverside City Champion and San Andreas League Champion in the two-mile last year, with a time of 9:40.

"We go to camp for a variety of reasons and one of those is to let the guys get to know each other. Guys like Borbon and Reyes went 1-2 in everything in the San Antonio League. They were arch enemies and now all of a sudden they're teammates.

"That, along with isolation and mileage were our concern," said George.

To further compliment the squad willbe some outstanding returning lettermen including Mark, Turner, Kirk Buhler, Armando Pesqueira, Rod Cline and Cal Poly's Mr. Everything, team captain David Edds.

Rounding out the freshmen and transfers will be Roger Caswell, Larry Hadley, Keith Zalud, Tom Hughes, Keith Janes and David Brown.

Cal Poly will be involved in eight meets including the Western Regionals and CCAA Championships (Oct. 27) and the National Championships at UCR (Nov. 10).

As far as predictions go George concedes the top three spots in the Western Regionals to defending National Champion Cal Poly SLO, then fourth place finisher Sacramento State, and the third slot to UCR.

"I think the biggest competition will be between ourselves, Cal State Northridge and Cal State Los Angeles for the fourth spot in Regionals and a chance for a trip to the National Championships," said George.

"Most people will probably rate us as underdogs but the Nationals are a very realistic goal for us."

What to Look for and Into In '79

As Cal Poly enters into its home phase of the 1979 season (after last week's opener at Puget Sound) there are some "keys" to consider:

KEY PLAYERS. The Broncos, at least in the minds of the coaches have three players who just might get some postseason honors. Since two of the players might not get that much recognition (they very rarely are seen with the ball) it's important that they're mentioned here. On the right side of the offensive line, the Broncos have a couple of veterans who have started most of their three years at Cal Poly. At offensive guard on the right side is 6-6, 265-pound, junior Mike Seymour, a standout at Fountain Valley before coming to the Cal Poly campus. He'll be wearing #68. Next to him at offensive tackle is #74 Greg Schammel. Greg, a product of Servite, is 6-3, 245. To a large extent the Broncos running game will depend on these two offensive linemen. And look for the quarterback to hide behind these two when throwing.

It's difficult to watch the offensive line but it may be worth a peak with these two outstanding anchors.

The other All-American candidate will base his postseason honors hopes on how many times he does handle the football. Jim Middleton, a senior from Pomona High School, will be starting his third year at free safety for the Broncos. Probably the best athlete the Broncos have on defense, the coaching staff is hoping he'll be around the ball especially when the opposition throws it. His sophomore year, he intercepted six passes his first five games. Look for #2 to be where the ball is when Cal Poly's opponents have the ball.

KEY PLAYS. In what might be an understatement, Cal Poly has had trouble moving the ball the last few years. But the coaches feel that the offense is much better this season, and they've indicated that Bronco watchers

might be seeing some different things this year. First of all, Cal Poly will not "ban the bomb." Look for the Broncos to throw long—and often. You might check couple of areas. First, is Cal Poly throwing on first down Second, you might keep unofficial count of how mantimes the Broncos throw the ball as opposed to runnin, it. Last year the rush-to-pass ratio was 4-to-1. This year i might be closer to 1-to-1.

Also, look to see who the targets are. Since the wid receivers have speed this year, the Broncos just might be going to them as opposed to tight ends or runningbacks.

KEY GAMES. Well, the home opener with San Francisco State sure has to be one. The Broncos only having hour home games this year and a definite goal will be to win every one. That won't be easy with teams like San Francisco State (winners of 12 out of 13 with Cal Poly) UC Davis (a perennial Division II powerhouse) and Can State Northridge (a team still smarting from the Cal Poly win a year ago at their Homecoming).

The Cal Poly SLO game looms big because the Bronco have finished strong the past two years. This season, the Broncos end the season with three road games—Cal Poly SLO, Northern Arizona, then five days later, Tennessee State. A win against the Mustangs, which would be the Broncos' first in the series, would give them momentum

for the two final road encounters.

KEY TRENDS. Injuries are always key in a team's hope: for a winning year, but they just might be more of a factor this year. The reason: the Broncos play the toughest part of their schedule the last six games of the year. If they can avoid early injuries then a healthy squad will have the best chance.

It will be most interesting to see which game predominates for the Broncos—the passing or the run-

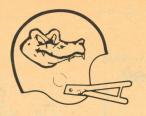

Cal Poly Assistant Coaches: Keeping Up With Jones

BILLIE DRAKE, Defensive Coordinator.

Entering his third year as an assistant to Jim Jones, who he played under as an outstanding prep football player at South Hills High School, Billie Drake is known as 'General Patton" to the Bronco staff and players. Drake's impersonation of the famous military hero (or his impression of George Scott playing Patton) has been the highlight of practice sessions the past two years

To inspire the troops last year before the Northridge game, Drake was brought to the practice field in an army jeep. Dressed in army fatigues, a helmet with stars on it, and the name "Patton" stitched over his pocket, Drake gave the famous opening speech from Patton to his troops, er, players

But Drake's knowledge of and devotion to football is not an act. He was a High School All-American at South Hills and then went onto the University of Colorado where he was an All-Big 8 selection. A couple of knee operations ended a potential pro career and directed Drake to coaching.

In his short coaching career, he has been on the staffs at Colorado, Nevada-Las Vegas, University of Washington, Nevada-Reno and Cal Poly Pomona.

Drake, an avid water skier and golfer, his wife Julie and their two children live in West Covina

CHRIS KINCAID. Defensive Secondary.

Like Coach Drake, Chris Kincaid has been part of the Bronco coaching staff for all three years of the Jim Jones regime. It might be an old coaching cliche that "we play 'em one at a time," but the enthusiastic Kincaid takes it one step further. His motto is, "Got to make the Broncos better today!" Kincaid doesn't wait until game day. Each practice day is an entity in itself. As a result, Kincaid is the most active Bronco coach during practice.

Kincaid, dimunitive in size, has had that philosophy during his playing and coaching career. As a player in high school in San Luis Obispo and later at Cal State Northridge he was known as a "hustler who went out everyday and got the job done." At Northridge he obtained his degree in physical education.

He has coached at Culver City, College of the Canyons, St. Bernard's, Servite, UCLA and Cal Poly

A bachelor, Kincaid lives in West Covina.

CLINT SOUTH, Offensive Line.

The temptation is to talk about the 48-year old Clint South, as "the new coach at Cal Poly." But that statement is not exactly accurate. True, South was not a full-time assistant last year, but was more or less a part-time helper. It definitely turned out to be "more" as the bespectacled South was around as much as anybody giving his guidance to the offensive line.

Now it's all official and South is indeed a full-time assistant coach for the Broncos and head coach Jim Jones couldn't be happier. The main reason, of course, is the fact that South brings over 20 years of coaching experience to every "X" and "O" he draws on the blackboard.

South played football at South Gate High School then went on to play for UCLA, where he also obtained a masters degree in physical education. His coaching career, which also includes tutelage in wrestling, has been at two venues—Cal High School in Whittier and Rio Hondo College

A devotee of the outdoors (not just a gridiron), South enjoys fishing in his off-hours. He and wife Georgene live

JOHN ERDHAUS, Quarterbacks and Receivers.

To John Erdhaus, new addition to the Bronco coaching staff, don't talk about "banning the bomb." No, politics is not the subject here, but football. On the gridiron, the tall, good-looking Erdhaus is definitely a "hawk." He likes to get up the field in a hurry and he reasons that it takes too much time to keep moving the chains after every tenyard gain. Besides, an 80-yard pass play looks so good in the statistics

Erdhaus talks about experience. As a quarterback at Cal State Los Angeles in 1968, he was named to the Little All-America team. All during that season he battled another pretty fair quarterback for the statistical passing leadership, Terry Bradshaw, then of Louisiana Tech.

Outstanding play was a pattern for Erdhaus as he was an All-League player in football and baseball at Beverly Hills High School. Then he led his Santa Monica team to a J.C. National title while earning All-American honors.

Fowler signed with the Rams before an elbow injury ended his career. He'll work with the offensive line. RICH FORCE will help with the linebackers, a position he excelled at for the Broncos over the last two years. He signed this summer with the Rams as a free agent and made it through a number of cuts before being released. GILBERT MARTINEZ, an aide on the offensive line, was a center at San Jose State and Rio Hondo Junior College. This is his first year coaching.

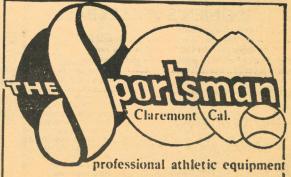
