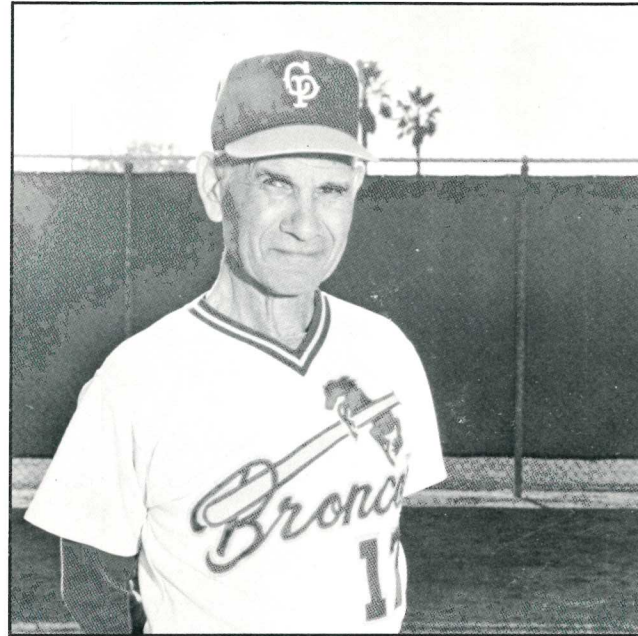

WINNINGEST ACTIVE COACH: SCOLINOS BEGINS 42ND SEASON OF COLLEGIATE COACHING



**JOHN SCOLINOS
HEAD COACH**

The year was 1946. America was just one year removed from World War II. It was a transition year for the country, as soldiers re-entered the work force and the production of tanks turned into the production of automobiles.

Harry S. Truman was The president of the United States; Ronald Reagan was an actor. The best picture of the year was "The Best Years Of Our Lives," with the star of the film Fredrick March garnering Best Actor honors.

The one-step camera, which produced a finished dry picture and a completely developed negative in one minute was one of the years' top invention.

In the world of sports, the St. Louis Cardinals finished off the Boston Red Sox in a seven-game series to claim the World Championship and in college, a young man by the name of John Scolinos took over as head baseball coach at Pepperdine University.

Just one year after Scolinos took over at Pepperdine, Jackie Robinson broke

the black barrier in baseball and two years later the Cleveland Indians led the major leagues in attendance (2.6 million) and captured a World Championship.

"When blacks entered the game, the game got better," said Scolinos. "When Jackie Robinson broke the color line through Branch Rickey, that was one of the biggest changes in the game.

"There's better coaching today, the equipment is better and the facilities are better," he said. "The ballplayers are still the same. Some are dedicated, some are not. Some are good, some aren't very good."

But has Scolinos, a man who has been involved in coaching for 40 years, changed with the times?

"I'm still learning. I'm over-the-hill, but I'm still learning," Scolinos said with a chuckle. "Nobody has all the answers in this game, except the almighty."

"If I could apply what I know now, I'd be a 15-year-man in the big leagues," he added.

Although Scolinos, who played in the St. Louis Browns' organization, never

realized his dream of making it to the major leagues, he has achieved a status in college baseball that few will ever reach.

Scolinos is an institution at Cal Poly and his presence is felt throughout the campus. Trophies and sports memorabilia line the walls of his office and deck the halls of the Physical Education Building. The Administration Building features a photograph of the 1976 National Championship team.

The list of his accomplishments as a coach go on and on:

* He is the winningest active college baseball coach with 1,129 victories over the span of 41 seasons (27 with Cal Poly).

* Under his guidance the Broncos have claimed three NCAA Division II National Championships — 1983, 1980 and 1976.

* Scolinos has been named NCAA Division II Coach of the Year three times (1983, '80, and '76).

* Was named "Coach of the Decade" for the 1970's by the College Baseball newspaper.

* He was selected by Rod Dedeaux, former Head Baseball Coach at USC, to be the pitching coach for the 1984 United States Olympic Baseball team.

* Has led Cal Poly to six CCAA crowns (1988, 1985, '83, '80, '79 and '76).

* In 1985, he was named Diamond Baseball District 8 Coach of the Year.

* Scolinos has been the recipient of CCAA Coach of the Year honors on five occasions, including 1988.

* In 1974, he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the American Association of Collegiate Baseball Coaches (AACBC).

Perhaps the achievement that stands ahead of the rest is the naming of the university's baseball facility "Scolinos Field" by a special proposal by Cal Poly President Hugh O. La Bounty to the Board of Trustees. This type of proposal was rare because the State system has specific rules and regulations forbidding the naming of a facility or institution after a living person. But Scolinos' way of life and "teach by example" attitude were important factors in the Board's decision.

In January, 1987, the highest honor was bestowed on Scolinos by his peers as the American Baseball Coaches Association in conjunction with Collegiate Baseball newspaper presented him with the Wilson Sporting Goods Lefty Gomez Award. The award was presented for his "outstanding contributions and distinguished service to college baseball."

This award is just one of many recognizing his achievements and service to the game. In fact, in 1976, Cal Poly's students, faculty and staff named him Professor of the Year.

The year 1976 turned out to be one of the most exciting and surprising years in coaching for Scolinos.

After starting off the season with a 2-11 record the Broncos turned their year around and ended up winning the college championship.

"Going back there (So. Illinois-Edwardsville) and losing the first game

and then winning all the rest had to be one of the most unbelievable memories," said Scolinos. "Our guys were tough. They never gave in."

"The national championships are memorable. The Olympics are memorable. Just being out here is memorable," said Scolinos. "Every year is memorable and every year has its ups and downs."

For Scolinos the downs have been few and the up have been many. He began his coaching career while still a student at Pepperdine. In 14 season at Pepperdine he amassed a 376-213 record and had four teams make the NCAA playoffs.

Unable to play baseball in high school, Scolinos played sandlot and semi-pro ball during the summers and signed a pro contract with the old St. Louis Browns. He played in the minors until the outbreak of World War II. After briefly attending USC following the war, he transferred to Pepperdine. Unable to compete there, because of his professional play, Scolinos was named Head Baseball Coach even though he was a student.

Since taking over the reins at Cal Poly in 1962, Scolinos has recorded 18 winning seasons despite playing the best Division I teams in the nation in non-conference games and competing in the rugged California Collegiate Athletic Association. At Cal Poly his record stands at 753-646 in 27 years of coaching.

The Broncos are the only team to have swept two NCAA College World Series, as they won four consecutive games in 1983 and '80 and Scolinos has the best winning percentage for any Division II coach in post-season play (32-13, .711 percent). The Broncos defeated So. Ill.-Edwardsville (17-3) for the 1976 crown, New Haven (13-6) in 1980 and Jacksonville State in (9-7) 1983.

Prior to the 1986 season and for the first six games into the 1987 season, Scolinos traveled to Holland and Italy to conduct coaching clinics arranged by the Sports Exchange USA. He

has had many experiences coaching internationally, including taking the Pacific Coast College All-Stars to Japan in 1952. It was the first U.S. team to travel to Japan to play baseball after World War II. Later Scolinos piloted the USA All-Star team against Japan in 1975 and he coached the USA All-Star team in the World Cup Games in 1980.

Some of his players have been fortunate enough to continue on to professional baseball. Names like Wayne Gross, Mitchell Page, Darrell Miller, Alan Fowlkes and Vic Bernal have all worn both Cal Poly and pro uniforms. Many more talented prospects dot the rosters of minor league teams awaiting their chance to prove themselves.

These players and hundreds of others have been responsible in part for the success of the baseball program. Although percentage-wise few make the big leagues, they have a solid foundation that they can build on in their chosen profession.

Scolinos graduated from Manual Arts High School in Los Angeles in 1937. He was a member of the Army Air Force from 1942-45, serving time as an Air Craft Recognition instructor and a B-29 radio operator in the Pacific Theater. In 1947, he saw action as a merchant seaman.

Upon completion of the war, he continued his academic years at Pepperdine University where he obtained his B.A. General Secondary Credential, Special Credential and General Junior High Credential. He earned his M.S. in education after that.

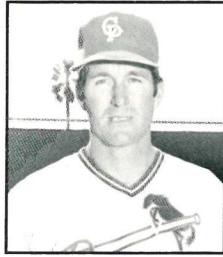

The country has survived the Korean War and the Vietnam War. The U.S. has landed astronauts on the moon.

So what's ahead for the remainder of 1989? As Scolinos himself would say, "only the almighty knows."

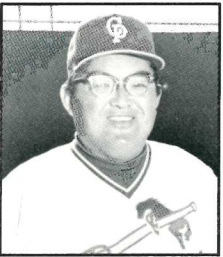
BOB WAGNER

1983 Championship Team

1976 - "Battling Broncos" Capture First NCAA Title

The 1976 baseball season was one that had special meaning to Head Coach John Scolinos as the team known as the "Battling Broncos" claimed their first ever National Championship.

After losing the first game of the College World to Livingston University in extra innings, the Broncos swept through the tournament in four straight games. The Broncos wrapped up the title with back-to-back victories over So. Illinois, Edwardsville (6-5, 17-3).

In the title tilt, 6-foot-4 speedster Dennis Sherow set an NCAA record with six hits (four singles, a double and a triple), while ace righthander Bruce MacPherson atoned an opening round loss with a well pitched victory.

The Broncos, in characteristic fashion, started the season slowly with a 2-9 standing after 11 contests. From that point on, the team won 38 out of 57 games and captured its first ever California Collegiate Athletic Association title with an 11-7 conference mark.

Cal Poly was led by the likes of Sherow, who later became a second round pick by the Montreal Expos in the Major League draft and belted 12 home runs on the season. Ken Hellyer paced the team in both batting (.399) and RBI's (62) and MacPherson finished with an impressive 13-8 mark and a nifty 3.50 ERA to head the pitching corps.

"Our three assistant coaches, Jim Ramos, Scotty Cassells and Bob Wagner, did an unbelievable job on their scouting reports of the other tournament teams," Scolinos would later say. "Their scouting report on SIU was a masterpiece. I'm going to frame it and hang it in my office."

His office would have another addition as well - the first ever National Championship trophy in the university's history.

1980 - Broncos Bring Home Second Title In Five Years

The date was May 27, 1980. Pat Cronin fielded a ground ball and tossed it to Ken Foster for the final out of what was a year to remember. The Cal Poly baseball team had just captured its second NCAA Division II National Championship in five years, beating New Haven (CT.), 13-6.

It was a year of individual and team fulfillment as the Broncos broke over 50 school and NCAA records, four players earned All-America honors and five signed professional baseball contracts. The squad compiled a 42-25-1 record (20-10 in the CCAA) under Head Coach John Scolinos.

In perhaps the biggest single-season pitching performance in the collegiate ranks, Bronco righthander Alan Fowlkes set an NCAA record by winning 21 games, but the Collegiate World Series Star for Cal Poly turned out to be the little known Brian Zell.

Zell batted .400 (6-15), knocked in nine runs, had two home runs, two triples and a double as he was named the Outstanding Player in the tournament. His three run home run in the final game put the Broncos ahead of the Chargers 8-3 after six innings. Chris Clark and catcher Bill Vangalis also homered in the title game and freshman pitcher Mike O'Hara picked up the win with an outstanding effort in relief (4-1/3 innings, one run allowed).

The story of the Broncos four game world series sweep was the hitting as Cal Poly scored 41 runs on 54 hits, including 15 doubles, two triples and six home runs. Hitting was also the Broncos strength during the season as Cal Poly established school records in team batting (.325), runs scored (430), doubles (153), and hits (746).

1983 - Beardman Ignites Broncos To Third Championship

At the beginning of the 1983 baseball campaign, there was little indication that the young Cal Poly team would end up as National Champions, but as John Scolinos has said so often it's not where you start but where you finish that counts.

The Broncos started out by losing eight of their first 11 games in what was regarded by many as a rebuilding year. Things didn't get much better when Cal Poly began play in the CCAA, as the Broncos bowed in their first four games. However, the team then picked itself up and won 21 of its final 25 league games to clinch a CCAA title (21-8 in conference).

Where the Broncos finished was on top of the world as the squad won 41 games and swept through the Division II College World Series, winning the final game in Riverside over Jacksonville State (AL.), 9-7. Cal Poly increased its World Series winning streak to 12 games with the sweep.

A large reason for the Broncos turnaround was due to a long and heralded hitting streak by junior sensation Larry Beardman. On April 9, Beardman began a 31-game hitting streak to lift his team-leading average to .405 by season's end. His efforts earned him selections to the first team All-Conference and second team Division II All-American teams, as well as the Most Valuable Player for the World Series when he hit .315 with five RBI's and six hits.

Freshman pitcher Kirk Washington also came through in a big way for the Broncos with a World Series shutout of Valdosta State - a game Cal Poly won 3-0.

On the season, the pitching was steadied by Steve Ziem and Steve Gomez each with 12 victories, while Washington turned in the top earned run average of 2.79.

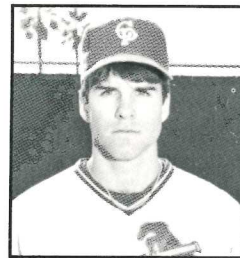
