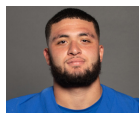

A WIN WOULD...

- Move Boise State to 54-30-1 in season openers all-time.
- Advance Boise State's all-time record on ABC to 6-1.
- Up Boise State's record against ranked teams in season openers to 4-5, marking the first win since 2011.
- Push the Broncos' record against ranked opponents all-time to 18-19.
- Be better than a loss.

OPENING KICKOFF

1 Boise State opens the 2023 season at No. 10/11 Washington on ABC, marking the seventh time the Broncos have been on the network. Boise State, a team that is receiving votes in both polls, is 5-1 all-time when playing on ABC. BSU's only loss on the network, coincidentally, was against the Huskies in the 2019 Las Vegas Bowl. The Chris Petersen-led Washington squad upended Boise State, 38-7.

2 Did that name ring a bell? It should. Former Washington head coach Chris Petersen was wearing Blue and Orange on the sidelines long before he donned the Purple and Gold. Petersen led Boise State to a 92-13 (.876) record over his eight seasons in the Treasure Valley with seven bowl appearances and five conference championships. The Broncos finished ranked in the Top 15 in six of Petersen's eight years at the helm of the program.

3 One of the nation's best defenses a year ago returns plenty of production and will be put to the test early as the Broncos - led by sixth-year linebacker DJ Schramm - will face a Husky team that was second in the nation in total offense last season.

4 We suppose turnabout is fair play. This is the sixth meeting between the two storied football programs but, of those six meetings, this is just the first time in the series history that the two squads meet on the gridiron with Boise State not ranked (although receiving votes) and Washington listed in the rankings.

5 There's no rest for the weary. For the first time since 2005, Boise State will open the season in back-to-back weeks against Autonomous 5 opponents. The Broncos start the year at No. 10/11 Washington before returning home to host Big 12 member Central Florida on The Blue.

A LOOK AT OUR OPPONENT

SCOUTING WASHINGTON

- Washington enters Saturday's game ranked No. 10/11 and is coming off an 11-2 campaign that saw the Huskies win their final seven games, including a 27-20 win over Texas in the Alamo Bowl. It's true, even bowl wins are bigger in Texas.
- UW posted an unblemished 7-0 record at home last season and has not lost at Husky Stadium since Nov. 26, 2021.
- Washington's offense was prolific last season, leading the nation in scoring, passing and 3rd down conversion percentage while ranking second in the nation in sacks allowed.
- A lot of that offensive firepower starts with QB Michael Penix, Jr. The gunslinger led the nation in total offense (364.1) and passing yards per game (357.0) last season while ranking second nationally in passing yards (4,641) and third in completions per game (27.85). Nobody likes a showoff, Michael.
- No man is an island, however. Penix's achievements last season came with a pair of talented receivers helping him out. Rome Odunze and Jalen McMillan both ranked top 25 nationally last season in receiving yards per game, receiving yards and receptions per game. As both receivers are back, expect Boise State to call itself the Barbarians in hopes of prompting a second fall of Rome.
- The Huskies topped Kent State, 45-20, in their home opener last season. That was better than the previous season, when UW suffered a shocking 13-7 loss at home to Montana.
- Head coach Kalen DeBoer is no stranger to Boise State, having faced the Broncos once prior in his two seasons as head coach of Fresno State. In that game, a ranked team at home led by DeBoer lost to Boise State, 40-14. Here's hoping history repeats itself.
- With a nickname of Huskies, it's easy to have a live mascot. UW's live mascot is named Dubs II and is an Alaskan Malamute. Boise State's live horse/bronco that leads the team onto The Blue at home is actually from Idaho.
- This marks Washington's last season in the Pac-12 Conference. The Huskies begin play in the Big Ten Conference next season. A one-way flight to soon-to-be conference rival Rutgers is just under 2,900 miles, a flight that will last over five hours. Sounds like Husky fans will get to earn their frequent flier miles in the coming years.

Broncos Lose Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl to Washington

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Jacob Eason threw for 210 yards and a touchdown and Washington sent out coach Chris Petersen with a 38-7 victory over No. 18 Boise State in the Las Vegas Bowl on Saturday night.

Richard Newton rushed for 69 yards with a short touchdown run and threw a touchdown pass for the Huskies (8-5). They capped an erratic season with a dominant finale for Petersen — who left Boise State to coach Washington — after he announced Dec. 2 he was stepping down after six seasons. Myles Bryant and Elijah Molden had interceptions, and coordinator Jimmy Lake's defense allowed 266 yards. Lake is taking over as head coach.

Jaylon Henderson threw for 48 yards and a touchdown for the Broncos (12-2). They lost for the first time in five appearances in the Las Vegas Bowl. Henderson replaced Hank Bachmeier in the second half after the freshman threw his second interception.

ROAD WARRIORS

Boise State is one of four schools nationally to post a winning record on the road each of the last nine seasons. The other are college football royalty in Alabama, Georgia and Ohio State. The Broncos are 18-1 in their last 19 Mountain West road games.

EASY AS 1-2-3?

The Jackson 5 said it best and that number is quite appropriate. Boise State is 5-1 all-time when playing games aired live on ABC. The Broncos look to continue that trend Saturday and the Huskies should know that Teacher's gonna show you. That being said, the lone aberration in that trend was against the Huskies in the 2019 Las Vegas Bowl as BSU dropped a 38-7 decision to UW in Chris Petersen's final game as head coach. MAY THE LORD OPEN

The season in a positive manner, that is. Boise State is 53-30-1 (.637) all-time in season openers, including a 17-10 mark since moving up to the I-A/FBS ranks. That includes the Broncos winning six of their last eight season openers.

When facing ranked teams in a season opener, Boise State has seen some success as well. The Broncos are 3-5 all-time when opening the season against ranked opponents.

BLOCK LIKE AN EGYPTIAN

Known for setting records, Boise State has achieved another first. Defensive lineman Ahmed Hassanein, who was raised in Cairo, Egypt, is the first player from Egypt to ever play Division I football. Even more remarkable, he did not even speak English until five years ago. Anyone who speaks to the bilingual Hassanein would be surprised to learn that fact as he is nearly fluent in English.

But how rare is that recruiting area? In all of Division I sports (not just football), there were only 53 Egyptians participating in intercollegiate athletics during the 2021-22 academic calendar year (the last year of data publicly available).

SAY WHAT?

If Boise State opponents think a little noise is going to throw off the Broncos defensive line, they might want to rethink that strategy. The unit led by Erik Chinander has learned to communicate regardless of the decibel level and that was the easy part. Across the line, Chinander's unit speaks a total of eight different languages including: English, Arabic, German, Spanish, French, Samoan, Greek and ASL. Ready, Set, Hutt! jahizi, jahizi, hut! Auf die Plätze, fertig, Hutt! Listo, listo, Hutt! A vos marques, prêts, Hutt! Sauni, Seti, Hutt! Έτοιμος, Σετ, Χατ!

THE MAGIC NUMBER IS 140

Boise State is 13-1 under Andy Avalos when rushing for 140 yards or more, including 7-1 last season (the only loss was to Fresno State in the Mountain West Championship Game).

GAMES AGAINST AUTONOMOUS FIVE

The Broncos are 16-10 against schools from conferences that comprise the Autonomous Five since the start of the 2006 season. Since notching its first such victory, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the Broncos have gone 18-14. Boise State is 18-26 all-time in such games. STANDING OUTSIDE THE FIRE

If you see a little extra effort given by Kaonohi Kaniho this Saturday, know that he's playing for more than just Bronco Nation. Kaniho, the 6-0, 180-pound defensive back may have gone to high school in Kahuku, Oahu, Hawaii, but his extended family hails from the devastated town of Lahaina. Approximately 40 of his friends and family have been affected by the wildfires which began Aug. 8, claiming the lives of hundreds of people and caused millions of dollars in damage. Thankfully, the redshirt junior said his family is all accounted for.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY

The Broncos are the second-winningest football program by percentage in the country since 2000 (.240-53; .819), trailing only Ohio State (.236-47; .834).

FOR PETE'S SAKE!

If you are looking for a notable tie between the Boise State and Washington programs, you shouldn't have to look far. Chris Petersen, who led the Broncos to their first two Fiesta Bowl titles, initially began his tenure in the Treasure Valley in 2001 as the offensive coordinator before being promoted to head coach in 2006. Following the 2013 season, Petersen headed northwest to become the head coach at UW before retiring following the 2019 season.

NOT HIM AGAIN!

Saturday's game will mark the fifth time Andy Avalos will face the Huskies in a coaching capacity and the Broncos leader seems to have the Seattle-based program's number. Avalos is 3-1 all-time against Washington as an assistant coach and will carry that success into this week's game, his first against Washington as a head coach.

It has to be, considering the Broncos have four players on its roster that have come from overseas in order to play football at Boise State. So yes, it's more than just lip service when we proclaim that student-athletes come from far and wide to play on The Blue. BSU's roster features the following players with international roots: James Ferguson-Reynolds (Geelong, Australia), Ahmed Hassanein (Cairo, Egypt), Prince Strahan (Freeport, Grand Bahama) and Max Stege (Cologne, Germany).

AMONG THE LEAGUE'S LEADERS

With four players hailing from overseas that have come to play football at Boise State, the Broncos rank tied for second in the Mountain West Conference with the most international players on their roster. Hawai'i (6 or 13) leads the way while Colorado State and New Mexico also have four each. No, we didn't forget how to read a globe. The difference of opinion in Hawai'i's number is because the Warriors have seven players on their roster from American Samoa which is actually a U.S. Territory and not an independent nation. Mrs. Morris in Ninth Grade World Civ would be proud we actually did pay attention in class.

NO SURPRISE HERE

Boise State is the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West in 2023, marking the 16th straight season that the Broncos have been picked to claim either a conference or division crown, including every year since joining the MW in 2011. The Broncos earned 28 of 37 first-place votes to top the preseason poll with 433 points.

SACK IT TO ME

Since 2010, Boise State's defensive line has maintained a close and personal relationship with opposing quarterbacks. During that span, the Broncos have registered 438 sacks, a mark that ranks seventh in FBS and the highest of any Group of 5 program by 26 sacks as Marshall has tallied 412 in that time span.

Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate were blue, orange and white, and the jerseys featured new stripes on the sleeves and "Blue Collar" on the inside off-the-neck. The Broncos added a black set of uniforms that were unveiled against Air Force, Sept. 20, 2019.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles – fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

\\ BOUNCE-BACK BRONCOS

Boise State has not lost consecutive games in the same regular season since the 2015 campaign (New Mexico and Air Force). Additionally, the Broncos have not lost a conference game coming off a nonconference loss in the same regular season since 1998 (Louisiana Tech and North Texas).

\\ TWO-FOUR GOING FOR THREE

Redshirt senior George Holani has bookended his career with 1,000-yard rushing seasons, recording 1,014 yards on the ground during his freshman season in 2019 and then grinding out 1,157 yards last season. Entering the 2023 campaign, Holani is looking to hit four figures on the ground this year to become the first Bronco to do so in back-to-back seasons since current Minnesota Viking Alexander Mattison achieved the feat on The Blue in 2017-18.

\\ GREEN DAY

Last season, Taylen Green rushed for 105 yards and two touchdowns in his first ever collegiate start, leading Boise State to a 35-13 victory over San Diego State on Sept. 30, 2022. Earning Mountain West Freshman of the Week honors for his performance against the Aztecs, he became the first Boise State quarterback to run for 100 or more yards in a game since Grant Hedrick eclipsed the century mark against New Mexico on Nov. 8, 2014. Having ran for 102 yards in the season opener at Oregon State, Green also became the first-ever Bronco signal caller to record multiple 100-plus-yard rushing performances in the same season. Hedrick was the only other QB to achieve that feat throughout his Boise State career. Green added a 119-yard rushing performance against North Texas in the 2022 Frisco Bowl, where he was named the Offensive MVP.

\\ HE'S NOT THE ONLY ONE

George Holani posted six performances last season where he recorded 100 yards or more on the ground, including a season-high 157 yards against Fresno State on Oct. 8, 2022. That gives the redshirt senior 12 performances of 100-plus yards on the ground in his career entering the 2023 season.

\\ SEALED WITH A KISS

Did you know that Boise State is 13-0 when George Holani surpasses the century mark on the ground?

\\ STOP THE COUNT!

Last season, Boise State allowed just 19.5 points per game, a mark that ranked the Broncos 15th in the country. The Blue Collar Stampede gave up 23 points or less in every conference game last season, a low allowance mark had not been achieved by the Broncos since the 1980 campaign, when Boise State won the I-AA National Championship.

That followed the 2021 season where Boise State allowed just 19.0 points per game, ranking 12th nationally. BSU did not allow a touchdown in the second half or overtime of six games during that 2021 campaign.

\\ HIGH FIVE!

The Broncos wrapped up the 2022 season ranking fifth nationally in passing defense, yielding just 167.7 yards per game. Boise State held their first two conference opponents under 100 yards passing for the first time since 2010 when BSU achieved that feat against New Mexico State and San Jose State in Western Athletic Conference (WAC) play.

Last season at Wyoming (Nov. 19), Boise State allowed 30 yards passing on three completions and intercepted three passes. Since 2000, it was the ninth time nationally a school has allowed three completions or less while recording at least three interceptions and the first time since 2018. Boise State is the only school to accomplish the feat twice having also done so against North Texas in 2000.

Boise State's passing efficiency defense (109.70) last season was the best in the Mountain West and eighth in the NCAA. Here's hoping history repeats itself on Saturday.

\\ DOLLAR DALMAS

Why should we call Jonah Dalmás by the nickname "Dollar"? Because he's money scoring one after touchdowns. Dalmás enters the season with 116 career points after touchdown, a mark that ranks eighth in program history. He needs just one more PAT to move into a tie for seventh to match Tyler Rausa's 117 PATs from 2014-16. The school record for career PATs is Kyle Brotzman who successfully converted 238 PATs during his career from 2007-10.



\\ AND I GUESS THAT'S WHY THEY CALL IT THE BLUE(S)

Under Andy Avalos, Boise State opponents have reached the red zone 73 times. More often than not, those possessions have resulted in three points or the opponent coming up empty.

The Broncos' defense has allowed 58 scores, 33 of which were touchdowns. To put another way, in the red zone, Bronco opponents kicked 25 field goals and failed to score 15 times – three or zero on 40 of 73 trips inside the Boise State 20-yard line (55% of the time). Last season, Boise State gave up 12 field goals and 16 touchdowns on 35 opponent possessions inside the 20-yard line.

\\ OUR SPECIAL TEAMS ARE SPECIAL

PUNT RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN

Boise State is one of only three schools nationally (San Diego State and Kansas State) to have a punt return for a touchdown in each of the last six seasons. The Broncos extended their streak last year with a blocked punt for a score against New Mexico when Andrew Simpson broke through the Lobos' line and Deven Wright recovered in the end zone.

BOISE BLOCKS

Last season Kaonohi Kaniho blocked a field goal at Nevada on Nov. 12. That block gave the Broncos multiple blocked kicks in five consecutive seasons, the longest active streak in the nation.

BOISE BLOCKS - PART II, ELECTRIC BOOGALOO

In 2021, the Broncos tied for 10th nationally with four blocked kicks. Last season Boise State stopped two kicks to rank 36th nationally. That extended another streak as Boise State has blocked a punt in eight consecutive seasons entering the 2023 campaign.

\\ A BRONCO LEADS THE BRONCOS

Boise State is in its third season with Andy Avalos at the helm of the program. As a Bronco student-athlete, Avalos was a four-year letterwinner, served as team captain, earned a pair of first-team all-conference accolades at linebacker and was a member of the All-Blue Team – a selection of the 30 greatest players in school history, as voted on by the Bronco fanbase, in the 30th anniversary season of the world-famous turf. Avalos initially returned to The Blue in a coaching capacity in 2012 as defensive line coach, took over as linebackers coach in 2014 and was then promoted to defensive coordinator in 2016. After three seasons leading the Bronco defense, Avalos left for Oregon, where the Ducks captured a Rose Bowl victory in his first season and earned a spot in the Fiesta Bowl in his second.

Andy Avalos is in his third season as the head football coach at Boise State. He is a former Bronco student-athlete, assistant coach and defensive coordinator.

His second year at the helm of the Broncos witnessed a perfect record in conference play with eight consecutive Mountain West wins to host the MW Championship Game and a Frisco Bowl Championship. That marked the 25th-consecutive season the Broncos have been bowl eligible courtesy of a squad that ranked sixth nationally in total defense (292.5 ypg). Boise State ranked 14th in the country with 15 interceptions on the year, a number that led the Mountain West.

In 2021 - Avalos' first season - Boise State was bowl eligible (7-5) for a 24th-straight season while being ranked 12th nationally in points allowed (19.0 per game) and 17th in turnover margin (+0.67).

Avalos, a team captain and all-conference linebacker during his playing career (2000-04) under head coaches Dirk Koetter and Dan Hawkins, is just the second graduate of Boise State to lead the Broncos' football program (Bryan Harsin). He previously coached at Boise State from 2012-18 under head coaches Chris Petersen and Harsin, ascending to defensive coordinator for the 2016-18 seasons before accepting the same role at Oregon for the 2018-19 seasons under then-head coach Mario Cristobal.

In addition to coaching stops at Boise State (2012-18) and Oregon (2019-20), Avalos also spent time working under Hawkins at Colorado (2006-08), and also at Sacramento State (2011) and at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10).

The Broncos achieved bowl-eligible status for the 24th-consecutive season in Avalos' head coaching debut, ultimately receiving an invitation to the Barstool Sports Arizona Bowl. Boise State's 24-straight seasons of bowl eligibility is the third-longest streak in the country, trailing only Ohio State (33) and Georgia (25). The Broncos also picked up a pair of road wins over top-25 teams for the first time in school history, and defeated five bowl-eligible teams, tied for the 14th-most in the country during the 2021 regular season.

The Broncos' 13 selections to All-Mountain West Teams were the most among Mountain Division schools in 2021, including first-team honorees Jonah Dalmas (K), John Ojukwu (OL) and Khalil Shakir (WR). Additionally, five student-athletes were named to the NCAA Division I CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team, the most among all schools in District 7, which encompasses Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

Shakir and fellow team captain, Kekaula Kaniho, received invitations to the Reese's Senior Bowl and the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl, respectively, slated to take place following the conclusion of the season.

During his five seasons as a defensive coordinator, Avalos established himself as one of college football's premier coordinators. He was named a semifinalist for the Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach, during his first season at Oregon in 2019.

The Ducks won Pac-12 championships each season with Avalos in charge of the defense, adding to three Mountain West Championships the Broncos captured with Avalos on staff (2012, 2014 and 2017) and two Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference championships while at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10). As a student-athlete, Avalos won three Western Athletic Conference championships (2002, 2003, 2004) in his four years as a starting linebacker.

In Avalos' two seasons at Oregon, the Ducks earned a victory in the 2020 Rose Bowl and played in the 2021 Fiesta Bowl, a game the Broncos also appeared in during the 2014 season, defeating Arizona (38-30) for Boise State's third victory in the game. With Avalos on staff, Boise State also appeared in the Las Vegas Bowl (2012 and 2017), the Hawai'i Bowl (2013), the Poinsettia Bowl (2015) and the Cactus Bowl (2016), and was selected to play in the First Responder Bowl (2018). While Avalos was playing for the Broncos, Boise State appeared in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl and the 2004 Liberty Bowl, a game in which he returned an interception 92 yards for a touchdown.

Avalos has overseen the development of 50 student-athletes that have garnered all-conference honors, and multiple All-Americans, of whom several will be familiar to Bronco Nation - DeMarcus Lawrence, Curtis Weaver and Leighton Vander Esch. Ducks defensive end Kayvon Thibodeaux picked up All-America accolades this past season, in addition to being one of four student-athletes to earn Freshman All-America honors in Avalos' two seasons with Oregon (linebacker

Noah Seweill in 2020, and Thibodeaux, defensive back Verone McKinley III and linebacker Mase Funa in 2019). Thibodeaux and Sewell were named Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons (2019-20).

Vander Esch was named MW Defensive Player of the Year for the Broncos in 2017 before declaring early for the National Football League Draft and ultimately being selected in the first round by the Dallas Cowboys. Lawrence and Weaver also opted to forego their final seasons of eligibility with the Broncos, being selected in the second and fifth rounds, respectively.

Oregon led the Pac-12 in sacks over the course of his two seasons as coordinator, and ranked third in the conference in both rush defense and total defense. Oregon finished the 2019 season ninth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 16.5 points per game. The Ducks ranked 13th nationally in rushing defense (108.93 yards per game) and 22nd in total defense (329.1 YPG). Avalos' defense disrupted opposing offenses, finishing second in the country in interceptions (20), sixth in passes defended (76), 13th in sacks (41.0) and 21st in tackles-for-loss (97.0).

Prior to joining the Oregon staff, Avalos spent seven seasons coaching at Boise State, including the final three as defensive coordinator. During his time as coordinator the Broncos led the MW in sacks, ranked second in rush defense and third in total defense. While at his alma mater he also served as defensive line coach (2012-13) and linebackers coach (2014-15).

Avalos started his coaching career in his hometown of Corona, Calif., where he coached linebackers at Corona High School. He then spent three seasons as a graduate assistant at Colorado before coaching two seasons at Nebraska-Kearney and one at Sacramento State.

A four-year letterwinner for the Broncos, Avalos earned first-team All-WAC honors at outside linebacker in each of his final two seasons. He completed his career ranked fourth all-time with 355 tackles, and led the Broncos in the statistical category in each of his final three seasons. He was named to the All-Blue Team during the 2016 season, a list of the 30 greatest players at Boise State since the inception of The Blue in 1986.

Avalos and his wife Summer had their first child, a daughter named Paityn, Jan. 31, 2014, and added a second daughter, Paige, April 12, 2016.
