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To Stevenson Field:

Located on the corner of Hope Street and Lloyd Avenue, Stevenson Field is tucked behind Brown's Olney-Margolies Athletic Center. From Route 95 South, take the Route 195 East Exit. Proceed to Exit 2 (Gano St.). At the end of the exit ramp, take a left onto India Street, and then a right at the stop sign onto Gano Street. Go through one flashing light and three traffic lights until you reach a four-way stop sign at Lloyd. Turn left onto Lloyd and follow it up the hill. There will be a stone wall on the left. The second driveway is the entrance to the parking lot behind Stevenson Field. From Route 95 North, take Exit 24 (Branch Ave.). Turn left off the ramp onto Branch Ave. Continue straight through the intersection onto Cypress St. Stay on Cypress through one flashing light to a traffic light, then turn right onto Hope Street. Continue on Hope through the first traffic light, and take a left onto Lloyd at the second light. The second driveway on the right is the entrance to the parking lot behind Stevenson Field.

BROWN MEN'S SOCCER HISTORY

Renowned for its academic standards, Brown University achieves that same excellence in its nationally competitive soccer program. Scholar-athletes at Brown have proven that they can excel in their chosen academic field and participate on one of the most successful soccer squads in the country as well.

Brown soccer first attained varsity status under coach Samuel Fletcher in 1926. Brown did not post a winning season until 1933, when a string of six highly successful seasons began. Perhaps the best of the early Brown teams were Fletcher's squads of 1936 (7-0-3) and 1937 (8-1-2). Led by Brown Hall of Famers William Margeson '37 and Walter N. Jackson '39, both these teams were New England Intercollegiate Soccer Association champions.

Thereafter, under Fletcher and the second of Brown's five soccer coaches, Joe Kennaway, outstanding teams included the 1945 team (6-1) in Fletcher's final season with the Bears, and the 1956 team (7-3). The latter was led by Brown's first All-Ivy selection, Bruce Yeutter. However, it was not until 1963 that Brown became a consistent powerhouse in New England soccer.

Under the direction of Cliff Stevenson, who retired in 1990 after his 31st and final season at Brown, the Bears produced 11 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances from 1968 to 1978, and a total of 13 from 1963. Four times, in 1968, 1973, 1975 and 1977, Brown has reached the NCAA semi-finals, and the Bears won 10 Ivy titles and seven New England crowns during Stevenson's tenure.

Brown soccer returned to national prominence in 1994 under head coach Trevor Adair, earning its first NCAA Playoff berth since 1978, capturing the Ivy League title, and advancing to the NCAA Quarterfinals. Along the way, Brown defeated number one ranked Boston University

in the second round of the NCAA Playoffs.

The national resurgence of the Brown soccer program continued under coach Mike Noonan as the Bears made their second consecutive NCAA Quarterfinal appearance while earning their second straight Ivy title in 1995. Brown returned to the NCAA Championship in 1997, falling in the last minutes to defending National Champions St. John's.

In 1998, the Bears won their fourth Ivy title in five years and became the first Brown team to go undefeated in the Ivy League since 1976. In the NCAA Tournament, Brown faced a familiar foe in St. John's, falling 1-0 in double overtime. In 1999, Brown received an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament after finishing second in the Ivy League. The Bears defeated Rhode Island, 2-1, in overtime at Stevenson Field for their first opening round NCAA victory since 1995. Brown advanced to the second round, but fell to host Virginia, 3-1.

In 2000, Brown advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals with a decisive 2-0 win over Vermont and a hard-fought 1-0 defeat of Duke, before dropping a 1-0 decision to eventual national champion UConn in Storrs. The following year in 2001, the Bears captured a share of their second consecutive Ivy title by posting a 5-1-1 league mark. The title was the Bears' fourth in the last five years and sixth in the last eight.

2002 proved to be one of the toughest seasons for the Bears in over a decade. Plagued by injuries, Brown finished with a 5-8-4 record. Adom Crew '04 was on his way to a record-breaking season before an injury took

him down for the remainder of the year. Crew had recorded 10 goals and two assists in just eight games.

The Bears bounced back in a big way in 2003 as they went from a seventh place Ivy finish to a first place finish. The title was Brown's seventh in the past ten years as it made its 20th appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Noonan's team stayed in the national rankings throughout the season and went undefeated in Ivy play with a 6-0-1 record. Crew and Jeff Larentowicz '05 earned All-America status at the end of the season.

In 2004, Brown battled to a second place finish in the Ivy standings, finishing the year with an 8-7-2 overall record. The team faced a total of eight opponents that were nationally ranked at some point during the season. In 2005, the Bears returned to the top of the Ivy standings, earning a share of their eighth title in the last 12 years and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Brown finished the 2006 with an 11-5-3 record and took third in the Ivy League. The team received an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament, and lost to Duke in the second round. The Bears had a tremendous 2007 season, defeating #5 ranked Santa Clara in their season opener during the adidas-Brown Classic. Bruno claimed the Ivy League Championship with an unblemished 7-0-0 record and went on to make its 23rd NCAA appearance when hosting Old Dominion on Stevenson Field in the second round. Brown lost 2-1 in double overtime, and finished its season 15-2-1. For the first time ever, Brown earned both the Ivy League's Player and Rookie of the Year honors.

Cory Gibbs '01

Cory Gibbs '01 had tremendous success while playing for Brown from 1997-2000. During his tenure, he led the Bears to four straight NCAA Tournament appearances, including the Elite Eight his senior year in 2000. The 2000 Ivy League Player of the Year, Gibbs guided Brown to a perfect 7-0-0 record in the Ivy League that year.



Since graduating from Brown, Gibbs has gone on to even greater success on the soccer field. He was added to the U.S. National Men's Soccer Team roster in January of 2003 and signed a contract with the Dallas Burn of the MLS in February of 2004 after three years with St. Pauli of the regional Bundesliga. A year later, Gibbs signed a four and a half year contract with the elite Feyenoord Rotterdam, becoming just the third active American in the Dutch Premier League.

In May of 2006, Gibbs inked a deal with Charlton of the F.A. Premier League a few days after being selected to the 2006 U.S. FIFA World Cup roster.

Unfortunately for Gibbs, an injury suffered during a match against Morocco later that month, sidelined him from the World Cup. In May 2008, it was announced that he would leave Charlton on June 30, at the end of his contract. He never played a game for Charlton due to injuries.

Up until his injury, Gibbs had racked up 19 caps for the U.S. National Team. Gibbs saw action in seven matches in his inaugural campaign in 2003, including three starts in the Gold Cup and two in France. He played all 90 minutes in the World Cup Qualifier against Guatemala on March 30, 2005, helping lead the U.S. to a 2-0 shutout victory.

Gibbs was acquired by the Colorado Rapids in August of 2008, and was immediately part of the starting lineup. He battled back from injuries in 2006-07 to earn the 2008 Rapids' Defender of the Year honors. He made his Rapids debut playing 90 minutes on 8/16 vs. Kansas City and then appeared in nine games with nine starts and tallied his first career MLS goal, which was also an MLS Goal of the Week nominee, against LA on Oct. 12. Currently, he has started in 13 of his 14 games played.

Jeff Larentowicz '05 Darren Eales '95

Jeff Larentowicz '05 made 66 appearances on Stevenson Field when playing at Brown. He helped guide the Bears to two Ivy League Championships and scored seven goals and six assists. A two-time second-team NSCAA All-America selection and a four-time All-Ivy performer, Larentowicz was selected by the New England Revolution in the fourth round (45th overall) in the 2005 MLS Supplemental Draft.

Although primarily a reserve during his first season with the Revolution, he quickly worked his way into the lineup and established himself as a legitimate starting-caliber midfielder during the 2006 season. That year, he started in 19 total matches and appeared in all four postseason games. He recorded his first-career MLS goal on Aug. 27 after he netted the game-winner against Columbus. Larentowicz was arguably MLS' most-improved player from 2006 to 2007, establishing himself as one of the league's top up-and-coming talents in the midfield. In 2007, he started 28 games in the defensive midfield, scoring three goals and adding four assists. Had a career day against Chicago on May 6, scoring a goal off a corner kick and later assisting on a game-winner in the second half for his first-career multiple point game. He started all four of the Revs' postseason games

In 2008, Larentowicz started 28 regular-season games, playing both as a defensive midfielder and a central defender. He combined for four goals, marking a new single-season high, and added two assists. Overall, he has made 36 appearances, all starts, including regular season, SuperLiga, Champions League and playoff games. This season, Larentowicz has played and started in all 16 contests thus far, and tallied a game-winning assist.

A native of Cambridge, England, Darren Eales '95 was one of the best offensive players to come through Brown University. In his three-year career, Eales combined for 83 points (31g, 21a) and was named the Ivy League's Player of the Year and was named an NSCAA First Team All-American after a stellar senior campaign. Eales' hard work and dedication to the Brown soccer program is still remembered, as his 83 career points ranks fourth all-time in Brown soccer history, as well as his 31 goals that rank sixth and 21 assists that rank fifth.

Eales, a transfer from West Virginia University, earned First Team All-Atlantic 10 during his rookie year with the Mountaineers. He effortlessly made the transition to Brown, and helped rebuild a struggling team.

He earned both first team All-Ivy and Second Team All-New England honors during his sophomore and junior season, and was named the

Bears' Best Offensive Player in 1993. He was also selected to be an Academic All-Ivy, and GTE Academic All-American (District 1) selection his junior year. His sophomore year he led both his team and the League in goals (9) and was honored as the team's MVP and Best Offensive Player.

In 1995, he signed with the Hampton Roads Mariners of the USISL. He spent two seasons with the Mariners, scoring 24 goals in 19 games in 1995. He returned to England where he read law at Cambridge, and gained his Cambridge Blue in 1998. He became a member of the bar in 2000 and eventually joined 2 Temple Gardens.

Eales continued to play at the amateur level. In 2001, he joined the Newmarket Town F.C. Reserves in the Kershaw League. He later moved to the Lancashire County Football Association where he played for Millhead Reserves in from 2004 to 2006 and Higher Poynton from 2006 to 2007. On May 6, 2006, Eales was hired as an in-house legal counsel by West Bromwich Albion and is currently serving as the Legal Director/Secretary of West Bromwich.

Under the direction of Head Coach Mike Noonan, the Brown University men's soccer team is gearing up for another exciting season this fall. The squad endured its ups and downs in 2008, but the team's four seniors and the return of 18 letterwinners show promise as the Bears embark on the 2009 campaign.

With an extremely tough schedule in 2009, the Bears will be battle tested early with non-conference games that include preseason No. 5 ranked SMU, St. John's, who reached the 2008 Final Four, WCC Champions San Francisco, runner-up Santa Clara, as well as Boston University and Rutgers. But year-in and year-out, Noonan will get as much as he can out of his core group of veterans and his 10 newcomers to place the squad in the hunt for its 20th Ivy League title.

Brown's 2008 squad featured a youthful presence with its freshman and sophomore class making up more than half the roster. The Bears return just five starters from last year's edition and have big shoes to fill after the departure of unanimous first team All-Ivy selection and leading scorer, Rhett Bernstein '09. Brown also lost four-year starter and captain Steven Sawyer '09 and 2007

leading scorer Dylan Sheehan '09.

Of the eight players returning for their second season, six of them have played in at least 10 contests during their freshman season, including two with double-digit starts. They join an equally strong junior class and a hard-working senior class that help form a solid nucleus of returners.

Forwards

Brown fans will continue to see an explosive, creative and attack-oriented team that will be led by second leading scorer junior Jon Okafor (Verona, NJ) and senior TJ Thompson (Atkinson, NH). Okafor posted three goals last season and two assists for Bruno in 2008 and will be joined by Thompson, who started in nine of 14 contests and notched one goal and posted two assists.

Adding depth to the front line are sophomores Sean Rosa (Montreal, Quebec) and Austin Mandel (Tarzana, CA). Both are expected to play a key role. Rosa competed in 14 games and received 12 starts last year. Mandel will add quickness to the offense and

has the potential to be one Brown's top goal scorers this season. As a rookie, he saw action in all 17 of Bruno's games last year and tallied one goal.

TJ Popolizio (Rexford, NY) will add strength and versatility to Brown's offense, along with freshman Mitch Justus (Asheville, NC).

Also joining Bruno's offense will be newcomer Mitch Justus (Asheville, NC), a four-year letterwinner from West Henderson High School. He guided his squad to an undefeated record and a conference championship his senior year, and was selected as All-Area and All-Conference four times, All-Region three times and was a two-time All-State selection.

Midfield

Leading Brown's midfield is second team All-Ivy selection senior Nick Elenz-Martin (Encinitas, CA). Elenz-Martin received Brown's Heinz Kubel award, which is given to the best offensive player. He started in 14 of his 15 games played, and tallied three goals, which included two game-winners.

Joining Elenz-Martin is sophomore Rob Medairos (Stafford, VA), who saw action in 13 games and handed out an assist for the Bears last season. He earned a spot on the Aaron Olitsky Memorial/ Nike Soccer Classic and is expected to play an even bigger role for Bruno this year.

Senior captain Thomas Thunell (Columbia, SC), and sophomores Taylor Gorman (Freeport, ME) and Jay Hayward (Acton, MA) will also add depth to Brown's middle line. Thunell's senior leadership both on and off the field will add strength to the defense, while Gorman and Hayward will add offensive power. Gorman tallied one assist last season, and Hayward posted two assists in his eight games played.

Also seeing time at midfield will be sophomore Mike Manella (Toluca Lake, CA), who saw action in 10 games last season, and rookies Bobby Belair (Myrtle Beach, SC), Max Fowler (Newport, RI), Thomas McNamara (West Nyack, NJ) and Joseph Stall (Tulsa, OK).

McNamara, a four-year varsity letter winner hailing from Don Bosco Preparatory, received first team All-New Jersey, All-North Jersey, All-Country and All-League during his senior season. He was a member of FC West Chester and guided the squad to three Eastern New York State Cup Championships. McNamara also attended the U-18 US National Team Camp, and was a Super Y League National Team Player in 2007 and 2008. Belair, a four-year center midfielder and a three-year captain from Socastee High School, combined for 35 goals and 16 assists during his senior year. He was named the Sun News Toast of the Coast Player of the Year, Regional Player of the Year, and was selected to play in the Clash of the Carolinas. Stall led his high school squad to two Southwest Preparatory Conference Championships and was named All-SPC his senior season.

Defenders

Brown will continue to display an organized and disciplined defense that has the potential to be one of the best in the country. While the team lost

both Bernstein and hard-nosed defender Stephen Sawyer '09, there are a lot of questions as to who will step up and help lead captain David Walls (Leeds, England) hold down the defense. Walls, selected as a team captain this year, played and started in all 17 games for Bruno in 2008 and played in 17 of 18 games during his rookie campaign. Last year, Walls scored one goal and dished out three assists, and played 1,550 minutes, the most out of anyone on the Brown squad.

Junior Ian Smith (Arlington, TX) was going to play a key role in Brown's defensive efforts this season, but unfortunately, has been sidelined due to an injury sustained during pre-season. Noonan is expecting Evan Coleman (Amherst, MA) and junior Sean McGrath (Indian Orchard, MA) to help fill the void. Coleman played in 14 games for Bruno last year and handed out one assist. He was awarded the team's Britton Chichester award, which is given to the freshman that contributed the most to the team. McGrath, who competed in four games in 2008, will add quickness to the back line.

Newcomers Kevin Gavey (Fairfield, CT), Ryan McDuff (Plano, TX), Dylan Remick (Inverness, IL) and Eric Robertson (San Antonio, TX) will add depth to the defensive unit.

McDuff was a three-year letter winner and starter at Plano Senior and helped lead his team to the Texas 5-A State Championship and was named an ESPN Rise Third Team All-American. Gavey was a four-year letterwinner from Fairfield Warde High School where he was the all-time leading scorer and a two-year captain.

Goalkeeping

Noonan will rely heavily on 2007 Ivy League Rookie of the Year and Second Team All-Ivy selection Paul Grandstrand (Orono, MN) in goal this season. Grandstrand split time in net with Honorable Mention All-Ivy selection, Jarrett Leech '09. During his rookie campaign, Grandstrand allowed just 10 goals, posted five shutouts and tallied 43 saves on the year and posted a spectacular 10-1-1 record. Last season, Grandstrand saw action in nine games and went 3-5 overall with three shutouts.

Also adding strength will be senior Jarrod Schlenker (Cranford, NJ) and newcomer Sam Kernan-Schloss (Arlington, VA). Kernan-Schloss helped guide Sidwell Friends to an undefeated season during his senior season and earned an outstanding 55-4-1 overall record during his three-year varsity career. He also combined for 36 shutouts in net, ranking third in the *Washington Post* Metro rankings.

Head Coach Mike Noonan has proven to be among the nation's outstanding coaches, compiling an impressive 149-74-26 record in 13 years at Brown. During his tenure with the Bears, Noonan, the fifth head soccer coach in Brown University's 81-year soccer history, has led the Bears to nine NCAA Tournament berths, including NCAA Quarterfinal appearances in 1995 and 2000, eight Ivy League Championships, and the team's highest national ranking ever (third) during the 1995 season. Furthermore, ten of Coach Noonan's players have been selected in the annual Major League Soccer draft. All three members of Noonan's class of 2005 signed contracts with the MLS at the conclusion of their Brown careers



Noonan's 1995 team set a school record for victories with a 16-4 record. During the 1996 season, he guided the Bears to an 8-5-4 record. The Bears came back in 1997 with an Ivy League title, a berth in the NCAA Playoffs, and an 11-6-1 overall record, compiling a 7-0-1 mark over the last eight games.

In 1998, Noonan's team went undefeated in Ivy play, shutting out six of seven Ivy League opponents en route to back-to-back Ivy titles and an NCAA Tournament appearance. Noonan's defense allowed the fewest goals (2) in Ivy League play in

Brown men's soccer history, becoming the first Brown team to go undefeated in the Ivies since 1976.

In 1999, the Bears finished second in the Ivy League and earned an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament.

Brown recorded its first NCAA opening round victory since 1995 with a 2-1 overtime win against Rhode Island on Stevenson Field.

In 2000, Noonan led Brown to its fourth NCAA Tournament berth in as many years, as Brown became the first team in 20 years to finish a perfect 7-0-0 in Ivy play. The Bears qualified for the NCAA Quarterfinals for the first time since 1995,



defeating Vermont 2-0 and Duke 1-0 to advance to the third round of the NCAA Tournament.

In 2001, the Bears earned a share of their second consecutive Ivy League title by posting a 5-1-1 league mark. The 2002 season was one of the most difficult years for the Bears as they were plagued with injuries all season long and dropped several close contests, finishing 5-8-4 overall. It marked the first losing season for Brown since 1992.

In 2003, Noonan put Brown back on the map, as it retained a national ranking throughout the entire season, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the sixth time in his career. The Bears went undefeated in Ivy play, posting a 6-0-1 record en route to the League Title. In addition, Noonan was named the New England Division I Coach of the Year. In 2004, Brown finished in a tie for second in the league standings before returning to its place atop the Ivy League in 2005, earning its eighth Ivy Title in the last 12 years. In 2006, the Bears received an At-Large bid into the NCAA Tournament and made it to the second-round. They defeated Adelphi at home, but lost to #1 Duke in the second round.

Brown closed out the 2007 regular season with a 15-2-1 overall record, including a perfect 7-0-0 mark in the Ivy League. It was the second time in seven years (2000, 2007) one of Noonan's teams has achieved an unblemished Ivy record, the last being 32 years ago (1976) under the direction of Cliff Stevenson.

The 2007 squad earned their 19th league title, and an automatic bid with a first-round bye to the Division I NCAA Tournament. The sixth-seeded Bears featured five players on the First Team All-Ivy, including one who is a unanimous selection, and a sixth player who made the Second Team. Brown also swept the Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year awards for the first time in Brown soccer history.

Prior to his arrival at Brown, Noonan led the University of New Hampshire to an NCAA Tournament berth in 1994 for the first time in the school's history, ironically losing to Brown in the first round at Stevenson Field. His Wildcats finished with a 15-5-2 record in 1994, playing 11 matches against top 20 teams, while setting a school record for victories. New Hampshire also captured the North Atlantic Conference's regular season championship that year.

Noonan compiled a 48-23-9 record in four years as head coach at New Hampshire and was the winningest coach in Wildcat history. He was the 1993 New England Coach of the Year, and in 1992 was named the North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year.

Prior to New Hampshire, Noonan served as the head soccer coach at Wheaton College from 1989 to 1990, where he was the first coach in the

program's history. He was also an assistant coach at the University of Vermont from 1986 to 1989, and an assistant coach at Bates College in 1983.

A 1983 graduate of Middlebury College, where he was a four-year starter and two-time first team All-American, Noonan embarked on a professional playing career in Sweden before returning to the United States to play for both the MISL and the AISA. He was voted to the AISA All-Star team in 1985. Noonan, 48, currently holds a UEFA "A" license from the English FA and an "A" license from the United States Soccer Federation as well. He is also a National Staff Coach for the National Soccer Coaches Association.

Mike and his wife, Deb Belcher, reside in North Kingstown, Rhode Island with their daughters, Caleigh and Meghan.

Patrick Laughlin

Patrick Laughlin joined the Brown men's soccer staff in July of 2009. He joins the Bears from the University of Maine, where he spent two seasons as head coach of the Black Bears.



In just two seasons with Maine, Laughlin improved on a team that was riding a 26-game winless streak and made positive improvements in all areas of the program. During his first year, he guided his squad to a thrilling 1-0 overtime win over UMass, a team that played in the 2007 College Cup, in his first game behind the bench and went on to improve to 2-0 at home early in the season with a 3-2 win over Long Island University. After a 1-1 draw with UNH, Laughlin earned his 100th career victory with a 2-1 victory over Hartford.

At the conclusion of the season, the Black Bears had a freshman named to the 2007 America East All-Rookie team, becoming the first player since the 2004 season to garner that honor. Another one of Laughlin's players earned the same honor in the 2008 season, while two earned spots on the America East Men's Soccer All-Academic Team. Laughlin also had a senior captain chosen to play in the 2009 New England Intercollegiate Soccer League All-Star game.

The Black Bears, who were in contention for an America East playoff berth until nearly the last week of the season, jumped 69 spots from the previous season in the 2007 final RPI rankings. It was one of the most significant increases in the nation, as Maine tangled with two teams ranked in the top five in both Boston College and Brown, and also 10 teams in the top 55.

Prior to Maine, Laughlin spent the 2006 season as an assistant coach at the University of Rhode Island where he served as the recruiting coordinator and prepared and assisted with all training sessions. While there, the Rams won the Atlantic 10 Championship with an impressive 12-5-6 record and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Before joining the Rams, Laughlin was head coach at Dean College for six years. Laughlin helped take the program to new heights, which included its first-ever trip to the NJCAA National Finals in 2002. During his tenure, the Bulldogs captured the New England Region Championship in 2002 and 2003, and were finalists in 2005. He coached four NJCAA All-Americans and four

Academic All-Americans, and combined for a record of 69-36-6 and was named the New England Regional Coach of the Year and was also a finalist for the National Coach of the Year in 2002. Prior to his arrival at Dean, Laughlin built a program at Champlain College and posted a 28-21-3 record in his three seasons there, and also assisted at Cleveland State University.

A native of Dallas, Texas, Laughlin is a 1992 graduate of the University of Maine, where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in History, and went on to earn his Master's of Education in Sports Management at Cleveland State University in 1996 while serving as an assistant coach.

Laughlin enjoyed a successful collegiate career playing for the Black Bears, as his teams were ranked among the top 10 in the New England Region three out of his four years. He captained the team as a senior in 1992, and during his career was named to the North Atlantic Conference All-Academic team in addition to receiving University of Maine Scholar-Athlete honors three times.

Laughlin is a member of the Region I Olympic Development Program regional staff, and was head coach of the Region I under 15 boys team. Laughlin holds a "B" Coaching License from the United States Soccer Federation and an Advanced National Diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Philip Jones

Philip Jones arrived at Brown in August of 2009 as an assistant men's soccer coach. Jones joined the Bears from Embry-Riddle, where he served as an assistant coach for four seasons.



Jones graduated from Embry-Riddle in 2004 with a degree in Communications and a minor in Business, and also earned a Master's Degree in Human Factors. He is a native of St. Helen's, England, and began his collegiate playing career with the Eagles in 1999. He established himself as a leader on and off the field and was selected as team captain as a junior and remained in that role through his senior season.

In 2001, Jones led the Blue and Gold to its first regional title and the program's first national

tournament appearance. While the Eagles did not advance past the first round, their only match at the 2001 tournament was a memorable one for all in attendance as the Eagles, the only team in the tournament with less than 10 wins, took eventual runner-up Auburn-Montgomery to penalty kicks. Jones led his team onto the field later that evening for the Parade of Champions amidst thunderous applause from appreciative soccer fans.

Jones ended a very successful college career in 2002 with two goals (both coming in his senior year) and 15 assists for 19 points in 67 games (66 starts). His efforts on the field did not go unnoticed as the four-time All-Florida Sun Conference selection was recognized as an Honorable Mention All-American in 1999.

Jones resides in Providence, and currently has a premier coaching license with the NSCAA.

Gregg Miller

Gregg Miller enters his second season on the Brown soccer staff, having spent the previous 14 seasons as head men's coach at Johnson & Wales University. During his time at JWU, he led the men's team to five conference championship titles



(1995, 2002, 2003, 2005, 2007) and four appearances in the NCAA tournament ('02, '03, '05, '07). He was named as conference coach of the year on three occasions and holds the league record for tournament championships.

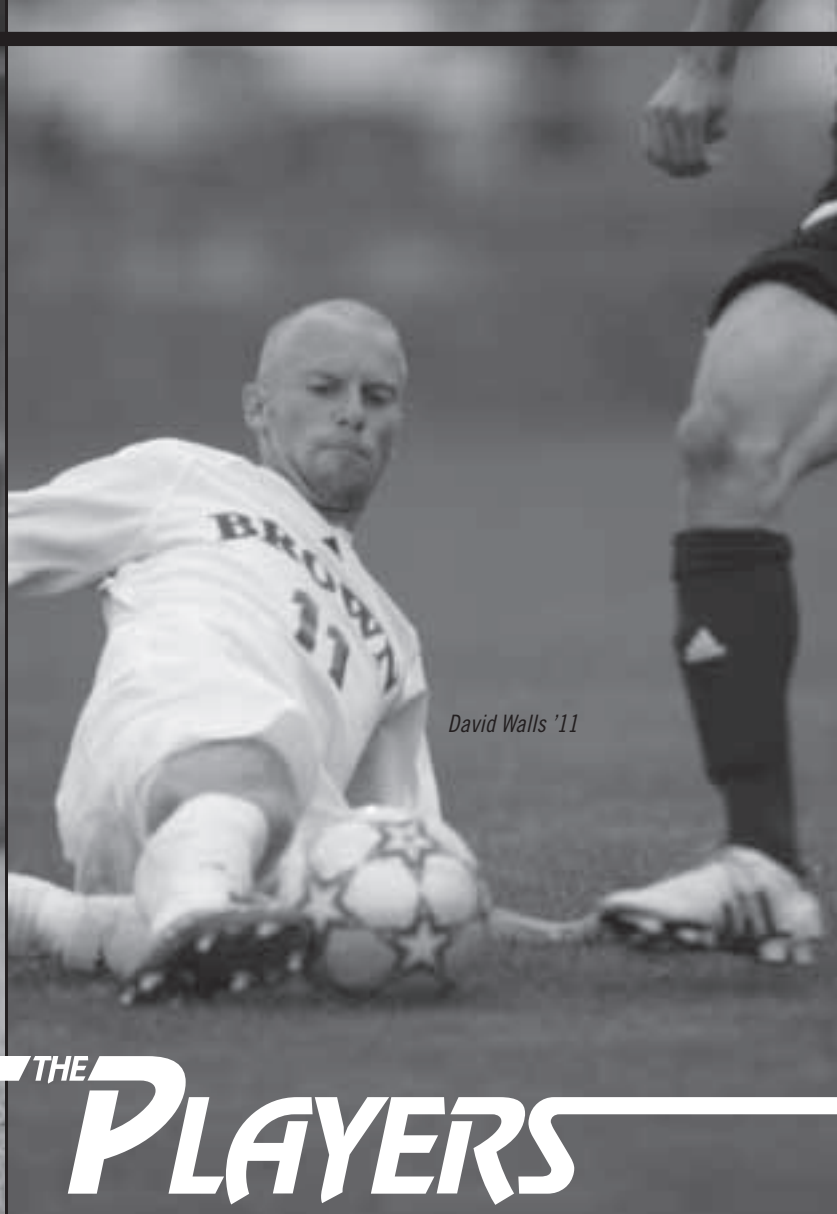
Miller was appointed as Director of Coaching with Bruno United FC in August 2007, overseeing thirteen premier teams and two academy programs. He has also coached successful premier teams (Northern Lightning, Bruno United) since 1998.

A 1994 graduate of Johnson & Wales, Miller was a co-founder and captain on the university's original men's soccer team. He also played on various youth select and county representative teams in his native England before arriving in the United States in 1991.

Miller holds an NSCAA Premier Diploma and a Level 1 Goalkeeping Diploma. He resides in Riverside, Rhode Island with his wife, Marwa.

Ask Before You Act

NCAA regulations are complex and ever-changing, and the consequences of breaking them can affect the eligibility of current and prospective student-athletes. For that reason, it is important to be diligent about compliance with the rules, and the Brown Athletic Department is available to assist you with any questions you may have as you support the University and its teams.

The following summary of frequently asked questions is designed to help you familiarize yourself with NCAA regulations, and also to clear up some of the confusion you may have about what the rules say. Always ask before you act, and please contact the Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance at 401-863-7584 if you require clarification or more information.

Do these rules apply to me?

You are a Representative of the University's Athletic Interests (a booster), and therefore governed by these rules, if you have ever:

- been a member of any organization promoting Brown Athletics;
- are, or have been, a season ticket holder in any sport;
- are the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a current student-athlete;
- have ever made a donation to the Athletic Department, a men's or women's athletic team, or any friends organization;
- have ever assisted in evaluating or recruiting prospects;
- have ever helped to arrange or have provided employment to enrolled student-athletes, prospects, or their parents and relatives;
- participated in the Brown University Intercollegiate Athletics program; or
- otherwise promoted the University's athletics program.

Once you become a Representative of the University's Athletic Interests, you retain this status FOREVER!

Who is a Prospective Student-Athlete?

A prospective student-athlete, commonly known as a "prospect," is any individual who has started classes for the 9th grade. In addition, student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are considered prospects. Ultimately, a student remains a prospect until enrollment at a four-year collegiate institution.

What kind of contact may I have with a prospect?

YOU MAY NOT:

- make any recruiting contacts with prospects or their relatives. This includes telephone calls, letters,

emails, text messages, chat rooms and facsimiles, along with any face-to-face contact either on or off-campus;

- assist Brown coaches by picking up transcripts, films, or any other information pertaining to a prospect's ability from the prospect's educational institution;
- provide financial aid or benefit or any kind (e.g., clothing, special discounts, lodging, meals, transportation, tickets, loans of money) to prospects or their relatives;
- make contact with a prospective student-athlete or his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.
- contact a prospective student-athlete to congratulate him/her on an offer of admission to Brown University;
- provide transportation or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect or his/her relatives or friends to visit campus;
- earmark funds for specific prospects to attend a Brown summer camp;
- employ or arrange for employment of a prospect before the completion of his/her senior year. After graduation, you may employ a prospect at a rate commensurate with experience and also the going rate. This is the only exception which allows you to contact a prospect before he or she enrolls at Brown. Please contact the Compliance Office for more details.
- provide ANYTHING to a prospect or the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office; or
- bring any guest to an alumni gathering or booster event if he or she is participating in athletics at the high school or junior college level. Your own son or daughter would be an exception, but limits to the type of interaction your son or daughter could have with coaching staff members at the event still apply.

YOU MAY:

- forward information about prospects to the appropriate coaching staff member;
- view a prospect's athletics contest on your own initiative, provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her relatives, coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the academic or athletic abilities of the prospect. If contact is unavoidable, only greetings may be exchanged. Additionally, you are responsible for all incurred costs or fees at a contest;
- speak to a prospect on the telephone ONLY if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call cannot be prearranged by the athletic department. You MAY NOT have a recruiting conversation, but you may refer questions about the athletics program to the athletics department staff;
- provide lodging, meals and transportation to coaching staff members when they are recruiting in your area;
- join a friends group to help provide support and funding for recruiting, special trips and receptions at home and away contests; or
- invite a team to meet with alumni or friends in a city where they play. Student-athletes may receive

benefits as a team in conjunction with an away contest, which individual student-athletes may not, but such arrangements must be made through the head coach.

What if I have a pre-established relationship with a prospect?

If you have an established relationship with a prospect, his or her parents or relatives, you may continue normal contacts with the understanding that such contacts are not made for recruiting purposes and are not arranged by members of Brown's coaching staff. Essentially, a relationship is established if it predates the individual's status as a prospect, if it predates the athlete's status as a result of her or her athletic ability or reputation, and the relationship did not develop as a result of the individual's participation in athletics.

What kind of involvement may I have with enrolled student-athletes?

YOU MAY NOT:

- pay for or arrange for payment of room, board, or any type of transportation at any time for currently enrolled student-athletes, their relatives, or their friends;
- provide student-athletes with any sort of extra benefit, which refers to any special arrangement to provide a student-athlete or his/her relatives or friends with a benefit unavailable to the general student population;
- provide student-athletes, their relatives, or their friends with any special discount, payment arrangements (e.g., cosigning a loan), credits on a purchase (e.g., airline ticket, clothing), or services (e.g., dry-cleaning, transportation);
- allow student-athletes, to use your telephone to make free calls;
- provide awards or gifts to student-athletes for any reason. This also prohibits honorariums for speaking engagements. All awards to student-athletes must meet all NCAA legislation and be approved by the Compliance Office;
- use the name, picture or appearance of an enrolled student-athlete to advertise, recommend or promote sales or use of a commercial product or service of any kind. Any use of the name, picture or appearance of a student-athlete must receive authorization from the Compliance Office; or
- entertain student-athletes or their family and friends. The only exception to this is that YOU MAY, on an occasional basis, provide a student-athlete or team (not family members or friends) with a meal. The meal can be catered, but it must be in your home and be approved in advance by the Compliance Office.

Faculty

The Brown faculty is one of the finest in the nation. By tradition, even the most distinguished senior professors teach undergraduates. Brown's faculty welcomes both undergraduate and graduate students as collaborators in research labs and in the field, and its many preeminent scholars make important contributions to the world through research and writing. The student faculty ratio is 8:1.

Unique Curriculum

Brown is internationally known for its dynamic undergraduate curriculum, developed via student and faculty collaboration and implemented by faculty vote in 1969. More than 2,000 undergraduate courses support more than 100 concentrations, or majors, many of them interdisciplinary, as well as a wide variety of independent

studies. The curriculum does not require distribution or core courses outside the concentration.

At the heart of the Brown curriculum are three basic principles: that students are active participants in learning; that acquiring analytical and critical skills is as important as mastering factual knowledge; and that learning requires opportunities for experimentation and cross-disciplinary synthesis. According to Barron's Guide, "Students see this [curriculum] as Brown's greatest offering and work hard to take advantage of it."

Innovative Grading

In most courses, students may elect to have their work graded with either "ABC/No Credit" or "Satisfactory/No Credit." Students may change their grading options at any time before the middle of the semester.



Degree Requirements

The average course load is four per semester, which translates into 12 hours of classroom time per week, not including lab sessions. Brown undergraduates must pass 30 courses and complete the requirements for a concentration in order to receive a bachelor's degree. From eight to 21 of the courses taken – depending on the department and degree selected – must be concentrated in a single major field of study. Students select their concentrations by the end of second semester of the sophomore year.

Degrees Offered

- Bachelor of arts in 80 areas of humanities, social sciences, mathematics, engineering, and life and physical sciences.
- Bachelor of science in, among other science-focused areas, applied mathematics, aquatic biology, biochemistry, biology, biophysics, chemistry, cognitive science, computer science, engineering, environmental science, geological sciences, mathematics, neuroscience, physics and psychology.
- Program in Liberal Medical Education for 60 well-qualified freshmen who may combine undergraduate and medical studies in an eight-year continuum. Students may earn an A.B. or Sc.B. degree and the M.D. degree.
- Bachelor of arts/bachelor of science *(combined degree program)*.
- Bachelor of science/master of science *(combined degree program)*.
- Bachelor of arts/master of arts *(combined degree program)*.
