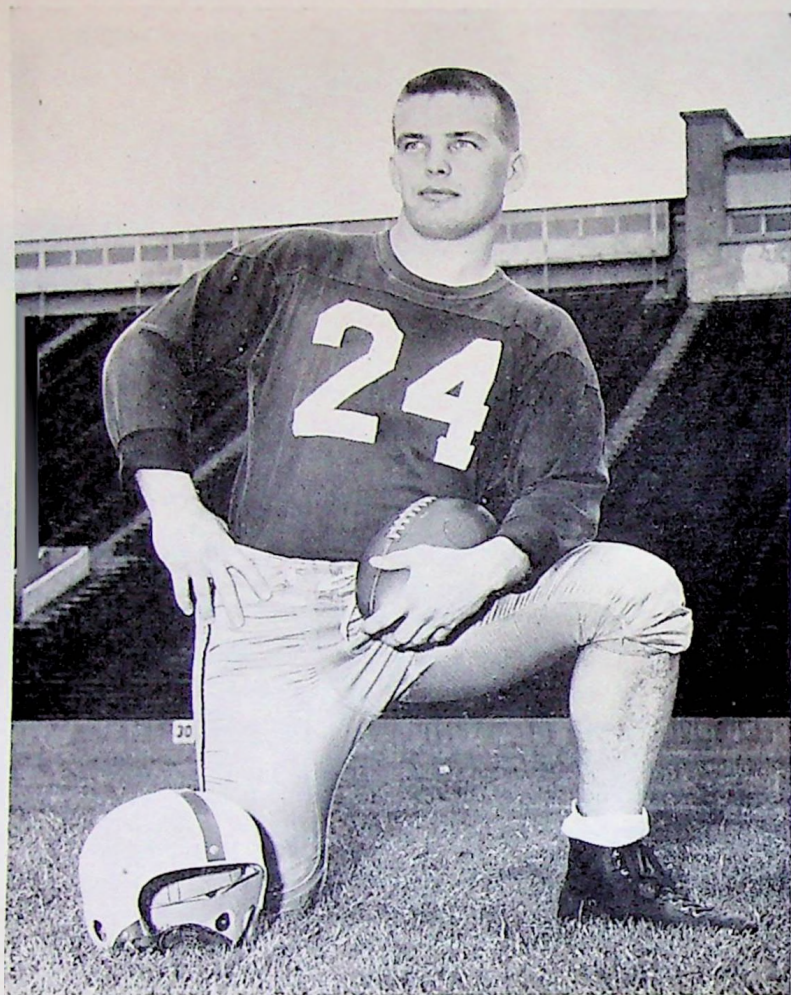

A Word From Coach Al Kelley..

"For the first time in my four years at Brown we will have known experience and quality backing up our play. Accordingly, we express the hope for steady and continued improvement during the 1954 season.

We will have little if any immediate help from the freshman team of last season, so our ranks will be spread dangerously thin. This will be particularly true in the backfield where we lose five capable senior backs from our 1953 squad.

However, quickness and good over-all speed will keynote our backfield showing this year. The return of Vit Piscuskas from the service will add considerably to the power-running which has been noticeably lacking in recent years. Thompson, Williams and Zucconi are set to go at the halfback slots, while Captain Ev Pearson will most likely divide time between the halfback and fullback positions.

Little Pete Kohut will start his third varsity season at quarterback, and the development of a capable replacement for Pete will be one of our more serious problems.

The line, as last year, will lack size, but will show plenty of speed and adequate depth.

We are approximately four and five deep at both tackle and guard positions, and there is a lot of experience at the center slot with Charlie Brown and Michael Reilly on hand.

Brown alumni can look forward to a well drilled team that will try to make speed rather than size its "pay-off" asset."

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES OF RETURNING LETTERMEN

BARTUSKA, PETER, End — Pete is in his second season as a Bruin varsity end, and won a letter last season in his sophomore appearance. A resident of Nanticoke, Pennsylvania, Pete played football for Nanticoke High. He caught 5 passes for 43 yards and one touchdown last season.

BORJESON, HOWARD, Tackle — Howard is a husky senior from Holden, Mass., where he played football for Monson Academy. He came into his own at the tackle slot for the Bruins last season, winning his first letter. Standing 6-2 and packing a solid 205 pounds, Howard should prove a strong bulwark in the Brown line this season.

BROWN, CHARLES, Center — Charlie is a two letter winner coming into his senior season. A one-time resident of Waban, he now calls Wellesley, Massachusetts his home town. Charlie proved the big surprise of the 1952 season, and held down the first string pivot post all last season. This 1954 year could well be his finest season of all. He stands 5-10 and weighs in at 190 pounds.

COUKOS, JAMES, Guard — This two letter senior from Lynn, Massachusetts will be strongly counted on by Coach Al Kelley this season. Jim, who played mostly substitute football in 1952 as a sophomore, is an all around Brown athlete, also playing on the Bruin baseball team. Coukos has both offensive and defensive ability, and will be a key figure in the 1954 gridiron plans.

HARRIS, WILLIAM, Guard — Another strong contender who won his first letter last season, Bill should see plenty of service at the rugged guard slot. A 6-1, 195 pounder from Tarentum, Pennsylvania, he played high school football at Har-Brack high.

JOSEPHSON, HARRY, End — Harry won his first letter at end in 1953, turning in a good performance in pass receiving that saw him nab 3 tosses for a total of 58 yards. A solidly built youngster, he stands 6-2 and weighs 195 pounds. He played high school football at Canton, Massachusetts.

KLAESS, WILLIAM, Tackle — Another two letter winner playing his final season for the Bruins. Bill Klaess has been tabbed by pre-season prognosticators as a man to watch for Eastern honors. Standing 5-11 and packing a solid 195, he will be a strong anchor in the Bruin line. Bill played high school football at Chaminade H. S. in Rockville Centre, N. Y.

KOHUT, PETER, Quarterback — Starting his senior year, "Pete" could well have his finest. As a junior last season, Pete attempted 120 passes and connected on 55 for a net gain of 685 yards and 8 touchdowns. That's a good mark to shoot for, and chances are the Ambridge, Pennsylvania youngster will be aiming for higher achievements in his senior season with the Bruins.

KOVALCHICK, ROBERT, End— Hailing from Indiana, Pennsylvania, this 6-1, 185 pound junior should make opposing backs think twice before touring around his terminal. Bob garnered his first letter last season on sterling play with the Bruin varsity, and his junior year should show an even better performance.

LOHR, JAMES, Guard — Jim, a 6-0, 190 pound junior from Somerset, Pennsylvania, won his first varsity letter last year. As a sophomore performer, he showed up well in action and gives promise of being a top flight man in the middle of the Bruin line this season.

McGUINNESS, JAMES, Tackle — A husky junior performer from Rumson, N. J., Jim won his first varsity letter with the Bruins in 1953. He's a big youngster, standing 6-0, and weighing 200 pounds, and played high school football at Rumson H. S.

O'BRIEN, JOHN, Tackle — A former player for Cheshire Academy, this 6-0, 205 pound senior from Rockland, Massachusetts won his first letter last year. A solidly built youngster, his heft in the forward wall will make plenty of misery for opposing runners.

PEARSON, EVERETT, Halfback — Captain of the 1954 Brown eleven, Pearson was second only to T.D. Thompson in rushing for the 1953 season. He gained a net yardage of 194 in 47 tries for a 4.1 average and scored 12 points for the Bruin cause. A fine leader and capable performer, he should be one of the shining lights in the Brown galaxy for the coming campaign.

PEAVY, LESTER, End — A 6-1, 195 pound husky from Bridgeport, Connecticut, Lester will be starting his junior year on the Bruin varsity. He played high school football at Warren Harding High School in Bridgeport, and could prove a strong candidate for a starting berth on the flanks this season.

PISCUSKAS, VITOLD, Fullback — A welcome returnee from the service is this Brockton, Massachusetts strong boy with a lot of drive. After two years with Uncle Sam, Vit will bring 190 pounds on a 6-1 frame into the fullback slot and could well wreak havoc among Bruin opposition this 1954 season.

REILLY, MICHAEL, Center — Mike garnered his first letter last season with the Bruins and will be the man right behind Charlie Brown for pivot duty. He covers a 6-0 frame with 200 pounds and played his high school football at Gorton H. S. in Yonkers, N. Y.

SAN SOUCI, WILLIAM, Guard — Another junior prospect who won his first letter last season, Bill is a fast and alert performer who stands 5-11 and weighs 180 pounds. He calls Pascoag, Rhode Island home and played high school football at Burrillville H. S.

SMITH, JAMES, Guard — Jim will be playing his senior season with the Bruins, and hauled down a letter last year with a good performance. He's the short, husky type, standing 5-9 and weighing 190 pounds. He played high school football at Ferndale in Johnstown, Pennsylvania.

THOMPSON, TOMMY, Halfback — Here's the youngster with the appropriate initials, T.D., who may well become one of the flashiest performers in the East. T.D. led the Bruins in three departments last season, scoring, rushing, and pass receiving. And he was just a sophomore. He carried the leather 71 times for a net gain of 378 yards and a 5.3 yards per carry average. Thompson, hailing from Newton, Massachusetts stands only 5-7 and weighs but 155, but he is the living example of the old expression "dynamite comes in small packages." He is a top contender for Eastern honors this year.

WILLIAMS, ARCHIE, Halfback — Another junior hopeful who should see plenty of action during the coming season. Archie is a top notch two way performer who has plenty of speed for offense and is a capable defensive back. He stands 5-11, weighs 165 pounds, and played high school football for Technical H. S. in Springfield, Massachusetts.

ZUCCONI, DAVID, Halfback — A small but fast senior who will be playing his final season with the Bruins. David won his first varsity letter last fall. He played high school football at Cardinal Hayes H. S. in the Bronx, N. Y.

The Brown Coaching Staff

ALVA E. KELLEY, *Head Coach*—
In his fourth season as head coach of the Bruins, Al Kelley could well experience his best year at Brown. With good depth in every position, including returning experience in the person of Vit Piscuskas, Kelley's Brown team will present a well balanced squad with plenty of speed, but lacking in depth in the backfield.

After a slow start last season, his Bruin squad showed signs of strength each progressing week, and this year's squad will be a well co-ordinated well drilled team.

Depth in the line is not overly critical this season as far as numbers go. However, the gaps left by the graduation of regular tackle Phil Noel and regular guard Bruce Hunt will not be easily filled.

A native of Natrona Heights, Pa., Kelley is a graduate of Cornell with the Class of 1911. An end for three seasons with the Big Red, he was named to the Associated Press All-Eastern team in 1939 and the following year received honorable mention on several All-American elevens.

As an undergraduate, the Brown coach not only was skilled as an athlete, but as a scholar as well. An honor graduate of Cornell's School of Mechanical Engineering, he was elected to Tau Beta Pi, the engineering honorary fraternity, his junior year.

After graduating from Cornell, he entered the U. S. Army, and for the next five years served as an officer in the Ordnance Department. It was during his last year in the Army that he started out on his coaching career. In addition to his Army duties at Watervliet Arsenal, he was allowed to coach the football team at La Salle Military Academy at nearby Troy.

Kelley returned to his Alma Mater following his discharge from the service and for the next four seasons served as end coach. He left Ithaca in the spring of 1950 to accept the position of line coach at Yale and a year later came to Brown.

ASSISTANTS

J. ROBERT PFLUG, Line Coach—Bob Pflug came to Brown following a distinguished high school coaching career at Bradford, Pa. A graduate of Grove City College in 1928, he spent 19 years at Bradford High School as a teacher-coach and had seven undefeated and untied football teams. Prior to coaching at Bradford, he spent four years as head coach at Knox (Pa.) High School. His high school teams compiled a record of 125 wins, 30 losses, and 5 ties over a twenty-three year span. He has directed the Brown linemen for the past three seasons.

VICTOR H. FUSIA, Backfield Coach—Vic Fusia is in his fourth season as backfield coach. One of Manhattan's outstanding backs during the middle thirties, he also was a member of the school's track, basketball, and boxing squads. In football he was an All-American mention in 1936 and in 1937 was selected to the All-East team. Following his graduation, he was a member of an American football team that toured France. He was in the United States Navy for four years during World War II and was discharged with the rank of Lieutenant. After his release from the service, he coached at Rankin (Pa.) High School and later was the coach of Indiana High School.

MATTHEW J. BOLGER, JR., End Coach—Matt Bolger is expected to return to the varsity staff as end coach this season. A one time end at Notre Dame and Cornell, he is a graduate of the latter institution with the Class of 1948. During the war he served as a pilot with the Marine Air Corps and for a time played football for the Iowa Pre-Flight team. Before coming to Brown he coached the line at St. Benedicts Prep and later held a similar position at Upsala.

ALEX NAHIGIAN—The only holdover from the staffs of Rip Engle and Gus Zitrides, Alex Nahigian is expected to return to his duties as coach of the junior varsity team. For the past two seasons, Nahigian taught the varsity backs defensive football. Well respected for his coaching ability, he is a graduate of Holy Cross, where he played football until an injury sidelined him his sophomore year. However, he continued to star in athletics although he no longer could play football. An outfielder on the Crusader baseball team for three seasons, he captained the team his senior year.

STAN WARD, Freshman Coach—Stan Ward joins the Brown staff for the first time, taking on the duties as freshman football coach and varsity basketball coach. A graduate of Canisius College, 1912, Stan will become Brown's first full time basketball coach since the '30's. His first coaching position was at Suffield Academy, Suffield, Connecticut, where he was quite successful in basketball. Ward served in the Army from 1943 to 1946, and after a five year tour of duty at Suffield, he joined the staff at the University of Connecticut.

A HISTORY OF BROWN UNIVERSITY

Brown University was founded in 1764 in Warren, Rhode Island. Then known as Rhode Island College, it was the seventh college in America and the third in New England. In 1770 the institution was moved to Providence, and University Hall was built on College Hill, now the historic residential section of the city.

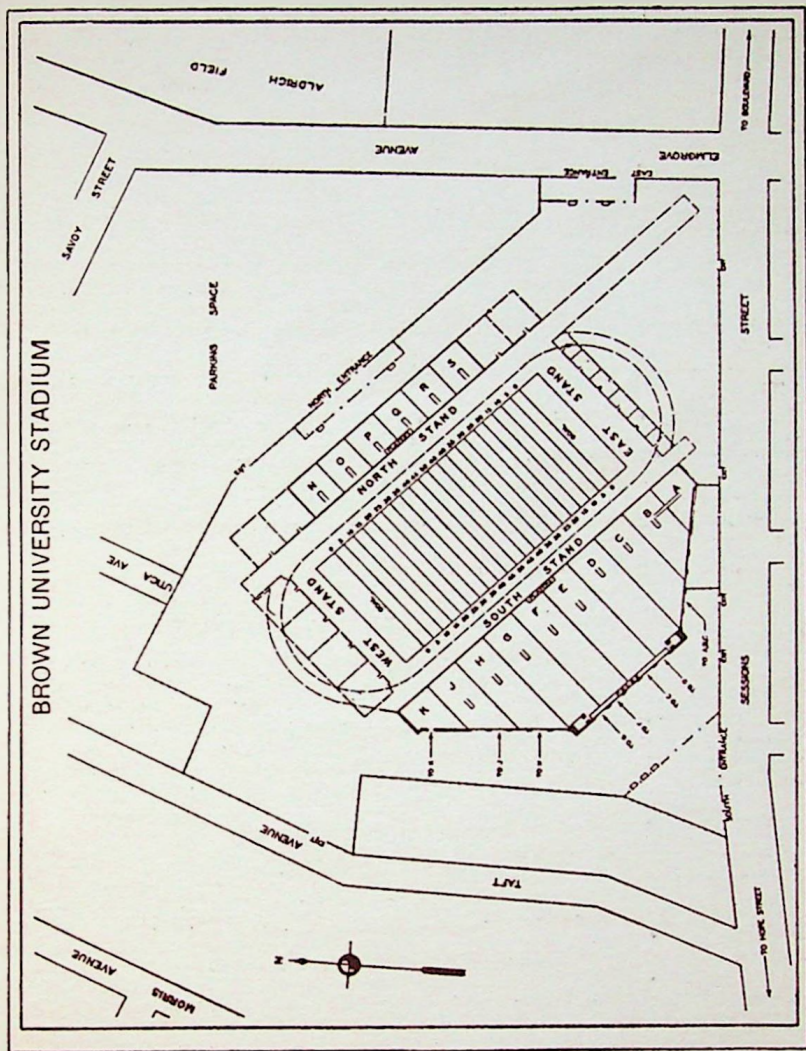
During the Revolutionary War the College was closed, and University Hall was used as a barracks and hospital for American and French troops. In 1790 President George Washington visited the College, received an honorary degree, spoke in an assembly, and in the evening, with Thomas Jefferson and other members of his party, viewed the illumination of University Hall from the College Green.

In 1801 Nicholas Brown, of the Class of 1786, made a substantial gift to the College in recognition of which its name was changed to Brown University. As a result of his generosity Hope College (1882), a dormitory, and Manning Hall (1835), originally library and chapel (now a lecture hall), were built.

Through the remainder of the nineteenth century Rhode Island Hall (now geology and philosophy), Rogers Hall (now classrooms), Slater Hall (a dormitory), Wilson Hall (mathematics and physics), Sayles Hall (chapel and classrooms) and several other buildings were added to the campus. During this period, under the leadership of such outstanding presidents as Francis Wayland and E. E. Benjamin Andrews, the College enrollment grew from less than 100 to more than 700, Pembroke College, the undergraduate college for women, was doubled, and the material resources of the University were multiplied many times.

Since 1900 the remainder of the buildings have been built, including, notably, the John Carter Brown Library (world famous collection of early Americana), Faunce House (the student union, for which funds were generously provided by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., of the Class of 1897), the Metcalf Chemical Laboratories, the John Hay Library (approximately 700,000 volumes, named for John Hay, of the Class of 1858, secretary to Abraham Lincoln and later Secretary of State), the Stadium and Marvel Gymnasium, and Hegeman, Caswell, Littlefield Maxcy and Brunonian Halls (dormitories). Although graduate degrees had been awarded since 1887, the Graduate School was formally established in 1927, and by 1941, in spite of constantly more selective entrance requirements, the undergraduate men's enrollment had increased to 1400.

The physical facilities of the University have been considerably expanded under the guidance of Dr. Henry M. Wriston, president since 1937. A Housing and Development Campaign realized some \$10,000,000 to be spent on new buildings. Whitehall, a modern classroom building, was erected in 1946 and Andrews Hall, a Pembroke dormitory, was ready for occupancy in 1947. The biggest development of all was the residential quadrangle dedicated this past June. With accommodations for 877 men, the quadrangle, including the rectory capable of feeding over 2,000 at one sitting, occupies a two-block area south of the main campus. It is expected that the enrollment of undergraduate men will continue to be in the vicinity of 2,000.
