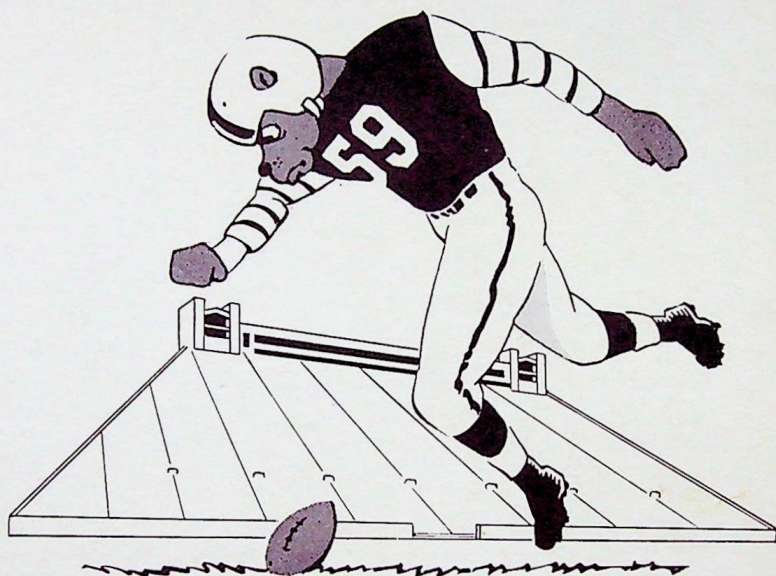

# THE UNIVERSITY

Brown is one of the nation's oldest universities, dating back before the American Revolution, and to that War of Independence when University Hall was used as a barracks to house American and French soldiers.

Founded in 1764 in Warren as the Rhode Island College, it was the seventh college in America and the third in New England. In 1770 it was moved to Providence, and University Hall, one of the nation's architectural treasures and nerve-center of the present-day administration, was built.

In 1804, it became Brown University, changing its name in recognition of a substantial gift made by Nicholas Brown, of the class of 1786.

But Brown boasts so much more than its rich historical tradition, for while it is one of the nation's oldest educational institutions, it has kept pace with the times, and is at once one of its youngest colleges, in terms of vigor and new ideas.

It is a university in the liberal tradition. It respects the right to explore, examine, discuss . . . it seeks to educate the full man, rather than the narrow specialist. In keeping with its ancient heritage in liberal education, it offers undergraduate and advanced degrees in all major areas of the liberal arts and sciences.

It is a leader in developing new approaches to liberal education. Its recently developed Identification and Criticism of Ideas program has been described as the most exciting and stimulating for freshmen and sophomores in America today and its pioneering approach to engineering is establishing a new pattern across the nation in the teaching of that vital field.

Brown is a laboratory of ideas, experiments and discoveries in the fields of science and the humanities, as well as in educational theories. More than 100 foundations and business concerns are presently underwriting experimnts and other activities in various departments of the University.

The faculty is the heart of a university and by any measurements, Brown is fortunate here: in skill and experience, scholarship and leadership, the international reputation of its present leaders, and in academic policies and research opportunities that enable it to attract brilliant teachers in every field.

The incoming freshman class this fall averages in the top 10 per cent of the nation in intelligence, and those men numbered in its ranks earned their place in the face of tremendous competition.

It has a charming campus. The old campus of Hope, Sayles, Faunce and University Hall reflects what has been. The new campus with its eye-catching refectory and new quadrangles reflects the promise of an even brighter future. Centrally located are the John Hay Library (1,000,000 volumes) and the John Carter Brown Library, with its world-famous collection of Americana.

It has a friendly atmosphere. Its size (2,350 undergraduates — smallest in the Ivy League) is such that a feeling of warmth and intimacy pervades all the activities and experiences of campus life. It has realized the almost impossible achievement of maintaining the remote atmosphere of the "country college" in the heart of one of America's great historical cities.

It has been called "the biggest small university in the land."

That is Brown. And in today's hurried pace of American life and intense public interest in athletics, it is well to remember that Brown is first — a university, and that the young men who represent it on the athletic field, do so as part of the educational process at the institution they have chosen for no other reason than that it ranks as one of America's greatest.

# THE STAFF

## HEAD COACH:

### JOHN J. McLAUGHRY

#### First Season

(Previous Record: Won 61, Lost 29, Tied 5)

The son of the famous Brown and Dartmouth coach, Tuss McLaughry, an outstanding Brown athlete in the late 30's, and its football captain in 1939, John returned to his alma mater last winter, being appointed to succeed Alva E. Kelley after the latter had accepted the head coaching job at Colgate.

McLaughry's return has ignited a new spark of enthusiasm among Brown alumni and all followers of Brown football as well who remember him not only as one of the best all-around athletes ever to represent the Bruins on the athletic field but also as an outstanding member of the class of 1940, of which he was president in his senior year.

As an undergraduate, he played three years of varsity football after serving as captain of his freshman eleven, was the university boxing champion all four years, won three varsity track letters and was named to the All-American track squad as a hammer thrower. He quarterbacked the East team in the East-West Shrine game and was co-captain of the 1940 Eastern College All-Stars, the first collegiate team to defeat the New York Giants.

He played quarterback for the Giants in 1940 and entered the service in 1941. He was discharged as a first lieutenant from the Marine Corps after serving as a line officer for two and a half years in the Pacific Theater.

McLaughry began his coaching career in 1946 as an assistant at the University of Connecticut and moved on to Union College as head coach the following year. At Union his teams won 17 games, lost six and tied one in three seasons, going undefeated in 1949.

At Amherst he compiled a nine-year record of 44 victories, 23 losses and four ties. His 1953 team was unbeaten and included Brown among its victims, 7-6. He introduced his side-saddle wing-T in 1956 and his 1957 eleven led the East in total offense with an average of 391 yards a game.

In becoming the first alumnus-coach since Edward North (Bobby) Robinson, '98, yielded the duties to Tuss in 1926, John is as happy about returning to Brown as the Brown family is to have him back. He believes Brown football has made great strides and that there is a good foundation on which to build. He is looking forward to trying out his system and his ideas against Ivy League teams.



## THE ASSISTANTS:

**MILTON J. PIEPUL**, Backfield Coach — The veteran of the Brown staff in point of service, Milt also is one of the old-timers in the Ivy League, having served 11 years under John McLaughry's father, Tuss, at Dartmouth before coming to Brown in 1955. He is an excellent teacher, a fact underlined by the development of Frank Finney, an unheralded member of the 1955 Brown freshman team, into the Ivy League's top quarterback in '58. A stickler for detail, Piepul was largely instrumental in the Bruins' placing second in the nation in pass defense last season. A smashing offensive fullback and a strong linebacker at Notre Dame, Milt captained the Irish in 1940 and then played a year of professional football with the Detroit Lions before entering the coaching ranks at Cathedral High School in Indianapolis. He joined the Dartmouth staff in 1943 under Earl Brown and stayed on through Tuss McLaughry's regime at Hanover. Milt is married and has four children.



**RICHARD M. GOWEN**, Line Coach — A native of Amesbury, Mass., Gowen played under John's father and Piepul on the strong Dartmouth teams of the late 40's. A midterm graduate in 1950, Dick actually began his coaching career as an assistant freshman coach at Dartmouth in 1949 when his eligibility expired. He joined the Amherst staff when the younger McLaughry took over as head coach there in the fall of 1950 and has been John's right-hand man ever since. A strong believer in football fundamentals and an excellent teacher of the techniques of line play, the happy-go-lucky redhead is expected to make the most of the limited material at Brown this year. He is single.



**JOHN L. ZILLY**, End Coach — The former Notre Dame ('47) and National Football League star joined the Brown staff last spring as a replacement for Joe Restie, who moved on to Colgate with Al Kelley. A native New Englander, Zilly attended Lewis High School in Southington, Conn., and Cheshire Academy before entering Notre Dame in 1941. As a member of the Navy ROTC unit at South Bend, he received his commission in 1944 and served in the Pacific until his discharge in 1946. He returned to Notre Dame, was named game captain twice during the '46 season and was selected on several All-American squads that year. He competed in the All-Star game in Chicago in 1947 before joining the Los Angeles Rams with whom he played through the 1951 season. He concluded his pro career with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952 and entered private business before launching his coaching career as an assistant at Montana University. He returned to his alma mater in 1956 as an assistant to Terry Brennan and remained there through the 1958 season. Zilly is married and the father of six children.



**ALEX F. NAHIGIAN**, Assistant Coach — Currently serving his 11th season as a member of the Brown staff, Alex is the lone holdover from the regimes of Rip Engle, Gus Zitrides and Al Kelley. A graduate of Holy Cross, '42, Nahigian played football there until an injury ended his grid career, and was an outstanding baseball player for three seasons. After graduation he played pro ball in the New England League for several seasons. He has been associated with the Pawtucket school system since 1942 as a teacher and coach, though his football coaching has been restricted to Brown since 1949. His 1958 baseball team at Tolman High School won the state championship and his '59 team was eastern division champion. Alex is regarded as one of the best scouts in collegiate football today. He is married and the father of three daughters.

## THE PROSPECTS FOR '59

The annual business of sizing up the prospects for Brown's football team has a familiar ring to it this fall. The losses far outnumber the gains — 21 lettermen, seven of whom were starters in '58, have graduated; only nine lettermen are returning — and the Bruins again have been picked by the experts to fight it out with Columbia to escape the ignominy of a last-place finish in the Ivy League.

Add to this the problem created by a change in head coaches and the need for mastering a new system and it's difficult to come up with an optimistic forecast. Despite such forebodings, however, Brown's new coach, John McLaughry, and his partly new staff refuse to accept an "also ran" role for the Bruins as they look ahead to the Ivy race.

The tendency toward a reasonably optimistic approach is predicated upon the quality of the returning veterans, the promise shown by many of the upcoming sophomores as well as several holdover reserves, and the belief that the new offense will afford greater flexibility in the use of the Bruins' limited material.

To get down to particulars on the plus side of the ledger, the Bruins are expected to field a reasonably sound first team, by Ivy Standards, headed by All-Ivy fullback Paul Choquette and All-Ivy tackle Tom Budrewicz. Backing up this star pair are two other '58 starters, guards Tom Clingan and Dave Waterman, Captain Bob Carlin, a heavy-duty performer at halfback last season, quarterback Nick Pannes, the sturdy and capable understudy to Frank Finney the last two seasons, halfback Ray Barry, the team's third leading ground gainer and scorer last fall who has been tabbed for the starting tailback spot, and end Charley Olobri, a two-year letter-winner who proved himself a tough defensive player and an excellent pass receiver.

This group gives McLaughry and his staff a good starting point and, barring injuries, should provide a strong nucleus around which to build. The starting backfield rates as one of the better starting units in the league.

The main weakness will be at center. Two-time All-Ivy Don Warburton and his top replacement last year, John Hansen, have graduated, leaving no experienced operator to take over. The next most critical point appears to be at quarterback, or more specifically, the problem of developing a capable replacement for Pannes. Ned Ormond, a senior who logged only nine minutes of playing time last season, looms as the No. 1 candidate unless sophomore Frank Balieki can move in ahead of him. At end there are a number of players of good potential but only one — Olobri — with any real game experience.

Gone are three solid ends from last year's team, Bill Traub, second-team All-Ivy choice, Dick Judkins and Jack Cronin. But the returning crop includes, in addition to Olobri, Tim Orcutt, 6-2, 205-pound junior who was unable to play last year, Pete Dauk, 190-pound senior who saw considerable relief duty in '58, and a trio of top sophomore prospects in Levi Trumbull, John Holbrook and Dick Laine. Lack of experience is the chief concern here.

Budrewicz will anchor the short side of the line at tackle and Waterman is expected to alternate between tackle and guard on the strong side. Behind them are senior Bob Courtemanche (220), junior John Hoover (205) and sophomores Roger Krouse (200) and Joe Dyer (210).

Clingan, the small but fiery performer who played 321 minutes in '58, and junior Harry Swanger (200) are the leading candidates for the starting guard positions. Best bets to move up from among the reserves are sophomores Bob Auchy (200), Jack Mancuso (200) and Gary Graham (200) and junior Jim Childs, who saw spot service last year.

With Warburton and Hansen monopolizing the position last season, neither senior Jack Dillon nor junior Bill Packer saw much action at center. But both have good potential and should wage a spirited fight for the starting berth. Sophomore Wendell LaFreniere could help, too.

Matt Connors, a steady player and a letter-winner at halfback last year, and junior John Phipps will back up Carlin at wingback while junior Frank Monahan and sophomores Bob Klarsch and Paul Murphy are the leading candidates to spell Barry at tailback.

Fullback will be in the capable hands of Choquette, the best in the league and one of the best in the East. The 205-pound senior will be supported by junior Bay Childs, who saw some action last year, and Dave Tyler, up from the freshman team.

If the Bruins are lucky as far as injuries are concerned, and at the same time can master the new offense and develop adequate reserve strength, McLaughry feels they can make a good showing in '59 — which means they could field another representative Ivy League team.

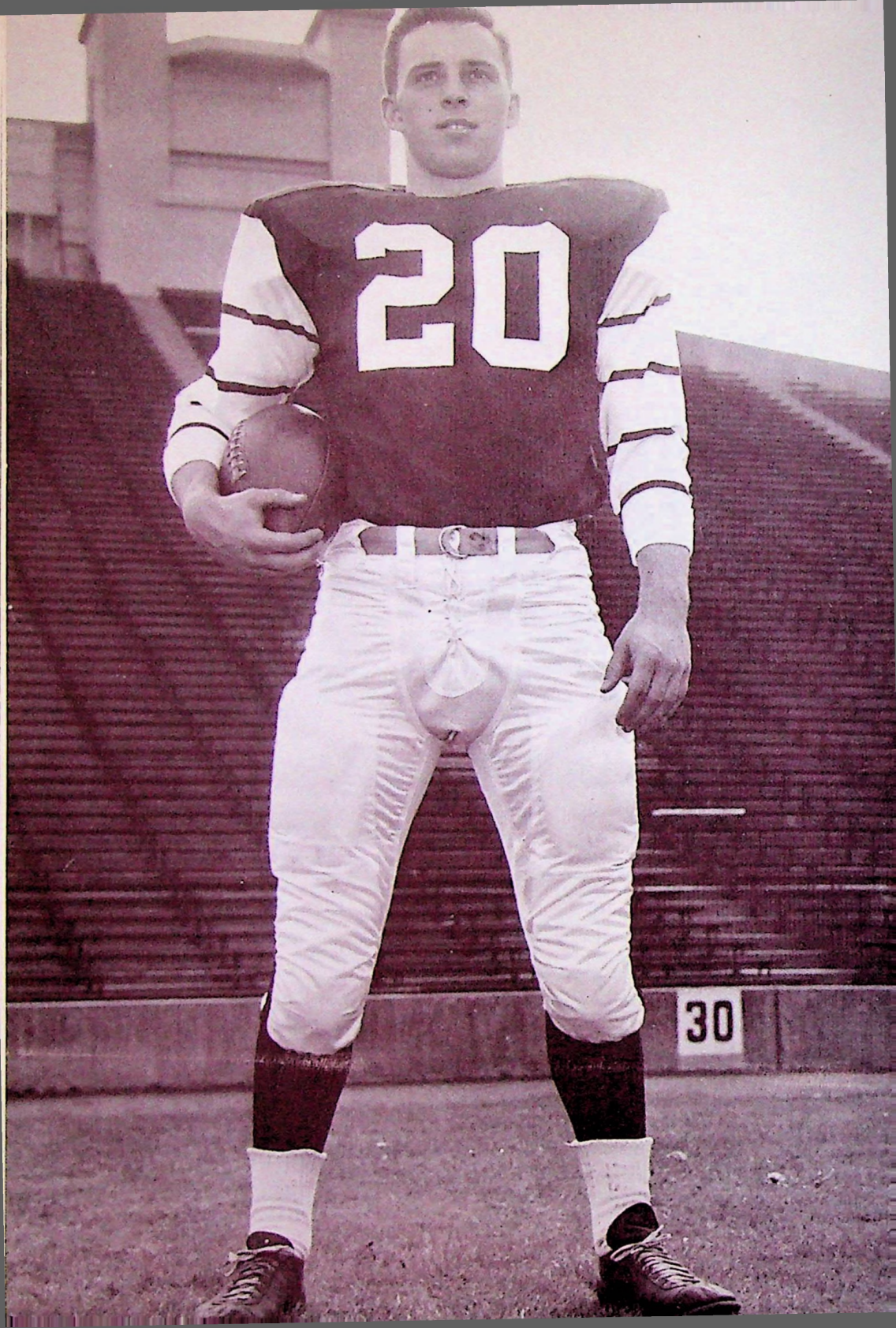

# Leading Player Candidates

## ENDS

**Peter J. DAUK Sr. 23 6-2 190 New Canaan, Conn.**

Sidelined early in his career by illness and injury, Dauk came back strong last year and made a big contribution in a reserve role. He has better than average speed, good size and good reactions. He should be a big help, especially on defense. His major is English.

A promising sophomore prospect who has the speed and agility required of a good offensive end. He won all-league and all-county honors in football at Westwood, N. J., High School and Stony Brook School and also won letters in basketball, wrestling and track.

**Richard R. LAINE Soph 19 6-3 210 Weymouth, Mass.**

Here is a big, strong boy with good potential who, the coaches feel, can make the grade if he is willing to work this fall. He has all the necessary physical requirements. He was a two-way starter on Weymouth High School's Class A championship team in 1956 and won all-scholastic honors. He also earned letters in baseball and basketball and was a pitcher on the Brown freshman nine last spring.

**Charles L. OLOBRI Sr. 22 6-0 190 Pawtucket, R. I.**

A two-year letterman, Olobri is rated a strong two-way player. Last season he ranked third in pass-receiving with 12 receptions for 161 yards and two touchdowns. He is tough on defense, especially against inside attack. He was an All-State selection at St. Raphael Academy. His major is Psychology.

Orcutt didn't play football last season but off what he showed as a freshman two years ago, he ranks as the leading candidate for other starting berth at end. He's big and tough, a good runner and an excellent pass receiver. He probably will be the wingman on the short side of the line.

**Levi S. TRUMBULL Soph 20 6-2 190 Bernardsville, N. J.**

A strong, tough defensive end, Trumbull also has all the attributes of a good offensive player — speed, maneuverability and good hands. He played outstanding ball for the freshmen last season before being sidelined by an arm injury. He compiled an outstanding record in football and baseball at Delbarton Prep, Morristown, N. J., and won all-county honors in football as a senior.

## TACKLES

**Thomas P. BUDREWICZ Sr. 21 6-3 230 Greenfield, Mass.**

From a spot relief role as a sophomore, Budrewicz made the big jump last fall to Brown's heavy-duty tackle and gained a berth on the coaches' first All-Ivy team as a climax to a brilliant season. He's surprisingly fast for his size, has amazingly fast reactions, good coordination, all of which make him effective both offensively and defensively. He will be the bulwark on the Bears' short side of the line. Last season he did most of the team's punting and kicking off. He averaged 35.7 yards with 22 punts. He played 55 minutes against Cornell and 49 against Princeton. He missed the Colgate game because of injury but still wound up tied for the most time played by the returning lettermen, 321 minutes. His major is Psychology.

**Robert A. COURTEMANCHE Sr. 21 6-0 220 Methuen, Mass.**

Bob is quick for his size and showed considerable progress after midseason last year after having been plagued by injuries. He saw 81 minutes of relief duty in '58 but should get in much more playing time this fall. He is also a member of the Brown lacrosse team.

**Joseph P. DYER Soph 19 6-2 210 Manchester, Conn.**

A big, strong lad with the potential of developing into a fine all-around tackle is the coaches' rating of this former high-school All-American. An ankle injury sidelined him for much of his freshman season so it may take time for him to work up to playing level this fall. He was a weightman on the Brown freshman track team last spring.

**John S. HOOVER Jr. 20 6-2 205 Altoona, Pa.**

Hoover is another holdover who figures prominently in the battle for the tackle positions this season. Playing at the third-string level as a sophomore, he saw only 11 minutes of action last fall but he has the size and speed to be of help this year. He is a weightman on the Brown track team.

**David G. WATERMAN Sr. 22 5-10 210 Halifax, Mass.**

A guard for the last two years, Waterman is listed as a tackle this season, but because of his size and speed he is expected to see service at both positions. He logged 95 minutes of playing time as a sophomore and 206 last year. He's a good offensive blocker and tough to move on defense. His major is Geology.

## GUARDS

**Robert O. AUCHY Soph 19 6-0 200 Haverford, Pa.**

A starting tackle on last year's freshman team, Auchy will be groomed for the strong-side guard duties in Brown's new offense. He has surprising maneuverability for a big man and showed great pursuit and blocking ability last fall. He was the catcher on the Bruin freshman nine.

**Thomas O. CLINGAN Sr. 21 5-10 185 Youngstown, Ohio**

Injuries to Brown's front-line guards early last season thrust the small but fiery Clingan into the breach and he filled the gap admirably. One of the hardest workers on the squad, he is a decisive blocker and a tough linebacker. He played only 30 minutes as a sophomore but equaled Budrewicz' playing time of 321 minutes last season. His major is Economics.

**Gary L. GRAHAM Soph 19 5-9 200 Harwick, Pa.**

An All-Western Pennsylvania selection at guard in his junior year of high school, Graham gained the same honor as a fullback in his senior year at Springdale High School. In addition to proving himself an outstanding blocker, linebacker and tackler last fall, Gary also handled all of the punting chores for the Bruin frosh. His speed and agility belie his fireplug build.

**Jack G. MANCUSO** Soph 20 5-11 200 Reading, Pa.

Mancuso compares favorably with Auchy and Graham in all-around ability though a fractured cheek bone sidelined him early in the season last year. Like Graham, he does everything well and should come along fast his first year on the varsity. He won four letters in both baseball and football and maintained an honor rating in the classroom all four years at Central Catholic High School.

**Harry F. SWANGER** Jr. 20 5-11 200 Lebanon, Pa.

A rugged 200-pounder, Swanger made rapid strides as a sophomore last year when pressed into service because of injuries to regulars at midseason. Though he was not awarded a letter, Swanger compiled 90 minutes of playing time and should rank high on the list this season. He's a good blocker and has surprising speed for his size.

## CENTERS

**M. John DILLON** Sr. 21 5-10 190 Torrington, Conn.

Dillon saw 54 minutes of action last year, mostly at guard, but he filled in at center considerably during practice and should find no trouble making the switch this season. He is rated strong on defense but will have to master the offensive duties of the pivot position. A broken leg sidelined him for his entire sophomore season.

**Wendell E. LAFRENIERE** Soph 18 6-2 215 Walpole, Mass.

"Wendy" is expected to push his rival upper classmen hard for the starting center berth. Possessing the ideal physical attributes for the position, LaFreniere may have the edge in offensive ability and according to freshman coach Charlie Markham, he has the necessary speed and football savvy to develop into a first-rate center. He won three letters each in football and baseball and two in basketball at Walpole High School.

**William J. PACKER** Jr. 20 5-10 190 Pawtucket, R. I.

Brown coaches are hoping Packer will follow in the footsteps of the graduated Don Warburton. Like Don, Bill played fullback at Tolman High School and was switched to center when he came to Brown. He is not as big as Warburton but he is a rugged lad, a vicious tackler and a good blocker. He played a total of 14 minutes last season.

## QUARTERBACKS

**Edward S. Ormond** Sr. 21 5-9 170 Zanesville, Ohio

Injuries, plus the presence of two top-flight quarterbacks (Frank Finney and Nick Pannes) have hampered Ormond's development the last two seasons. But the coaches rate him as a dependable player, a good signal-caller and runner and capable on defense. He is the leading candidate for the No. 2 quarterback spot. He played only five minutes as a sophomore and nine minutes last season.

**Nicholas PANNES** Sr. 21 5-10 175 Lynn, Mass.

This rugged all-around athlete had the misfortune of playing behind the fabulous Frank Finney the last two seasons but, keen competitor that he is, he never gave less than 100 per cent, either in the game or on the practice field. Despite Finney's success, Pannes saw considerable action both seasons and proved himself as a versatile quarterback, an effective passer, a strong running threat and extremely quick and able on defense. In his sophomore year he completed touchdown passes against Harvard and Colgate. Last season he threw the winning pass against Yale and also fired a scoring aerial against Rhode Island. Over the season he completed 12 of 24 passes for 159 yards. Pannes also has won two letters in baseball at first base. As a freshman, he earned numerals in football, basketball and baseball. His major is Economics.

# NEW LOOK IN BROWN FOOTBALL

## WING-T WITH SIDE-SADDLE QUARTERBACK

Old-timers will tell you there's nothing new in football and John McLaughry, Brown's new football coach, concurs. However, necessity sometimes is the mother of invention, or at least of an innovation of the old tried and tested methods.

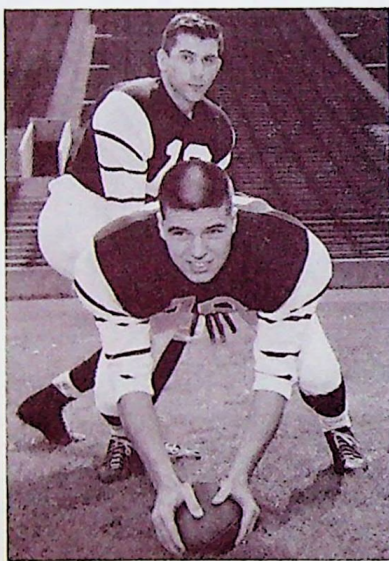
The side-saddle wing-T formation that will be employed by Brown this season emerged from just such a situation. As McLaughry explains it, "We were using a conventional (wing) T at Amherst in 1955 and we were faced with that old problem of tipping our hand on fourth-and-one situations. If we were going to run, we came out in the T. If we were going to kick, we came out in punt formation.

"I wanted to do something about it, so we moved our punter to the deep spot and left the other two backs at their normal positions. Of course, we had to get the quarterback out of the way so we could make the direct snap if we wanted to, but still leave him in a position to hand off if that was our strategy. So we set him in this new position, where his hands are placed exactly the same as they would be in the T, but one foot is pivoted so that he faces the sidelines."

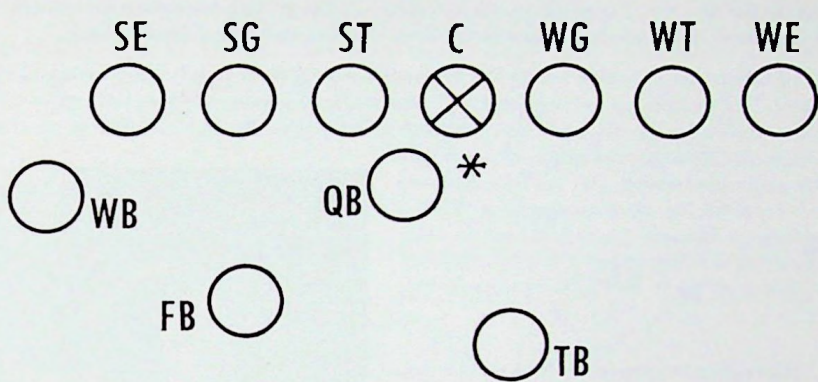
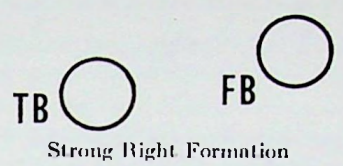
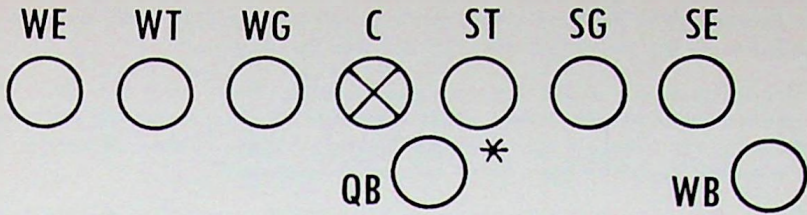
Amherst used the formation only occasionally that year, but during the following winter McLaughry studied it more thoroughly and saw numerous possibilities in this setup, especially for a squad of limited personnel and ability. He then developed his whole offense around it. The success he has enjoyed with it is indicated by the performance record of his last three Amherst elevens, which averaged 353 yards a game. His 1957 team led the East in total offense with an average of 391 yards a game.

Although the formation gets its name from the position of the quarterback with relation to the center, it is distinguishable from the T in other ways. For one, the other three backs assume single-wing positions, i.e., tailback, fullback and wingback. The line is not designated by left end, left tackle, left guard, right guard, etc., as in the case in the T. As in the single wing, a lineman will play a strong-side end, strong-side tackle, etc., or a short-side end, short-side tackle, etc. The alignment of the backfield always determines whether the formation is strong right or left. Thus the strong-side players always will be lined up on the same side as the wingback is set. They switch from right to left according to the backfield shift called.

The strong-side tackle plays next to the center while the short-side tackle plays next to the end. The line is always balanced, however, three men on either side of the center. The so-called strong side, as mentioned, is determined by the set of the back-

\*Quarterback may line up on either side of center regardless whether the formation is right or left

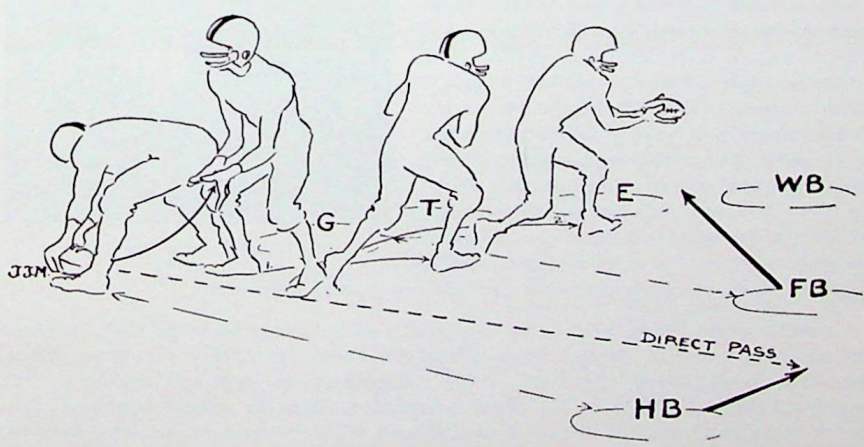


Diagram Shows Quarterback Making Open Pivot

field. This side will be manned by the bigger linemen who prove to be the better blockers. Usually the smaller, faster men will be on the short (or weak) side.

McLaughry readily admits that the mechanics of his offense aren't new, though the manner in which he employs them makes it difficult to classify it within any of the basic categories in use today. It combines the thinking of three different offenses — the Minnesota and Tennessee single wings, and the conventional T.

But the Brown coach doesn't regard his side-saddle T as merely a gimmick. It can be deceptive, but it isn't fancy. Occasionally, split ends and/or wide flankers may be used, but mostly a conventional wing-T setup will be employed.

"I think you win games on fundamentals and toughness," he says. "When you see us doing something fancy, it's just to impress the scouts and please the folks in the stands."

Blocking in the line is patterned after the single wing, with lots of double-teaming. On direct-snap plays, the quarterback can be used as a blocking back and he can trap all along the line. On T type plays, the quarterback has greater lateral maneuverability, and can move up or down the line faster than the conventional T quarterback.

The center determines whether the formation will be right or left when he forms the huddle. "We do this for several reasons," McLaughry explains. "First, the center calls our own defensive signals, and therefore knows how the position on the field enters into the offensive strategy. Secondly, it's one less thing our quarterback has to be concerned with. And thirdly, since quarterbacks have a tendency to become "right-handed" in their play-calling, I think we get a much better balance between right and left formations this way."

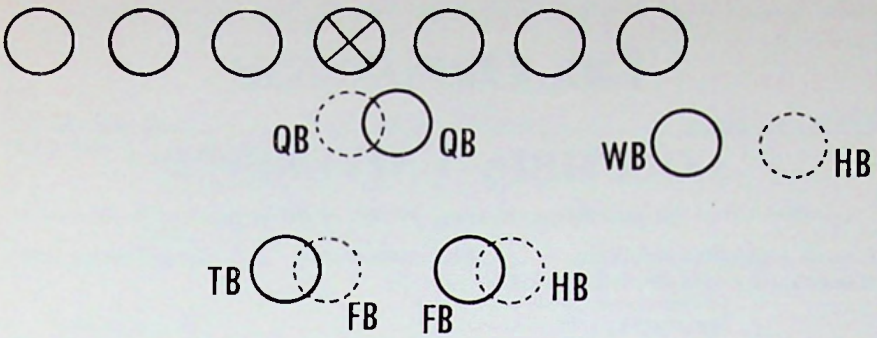
McLaughry is completely sold on the system because, he feels, it combines the best of two systems — the power of the single wing and the deceptiveness and the quick-striking attributes of the T. He believes it is especially suitable to the situation he faces in his first season at Brown because it takes less time to install, is less complicated than most of the multiple offenses in use today, and it affords greater flexibility in the use of the limited material at hand. Elaborating on the latter point, McLaughry explains that he will use a rotating system of substitution whereby three top men play two positions, which allows for resting of individuals but does not weaken the team as a whole, as would be the case where a number of second-team players were in at one time.



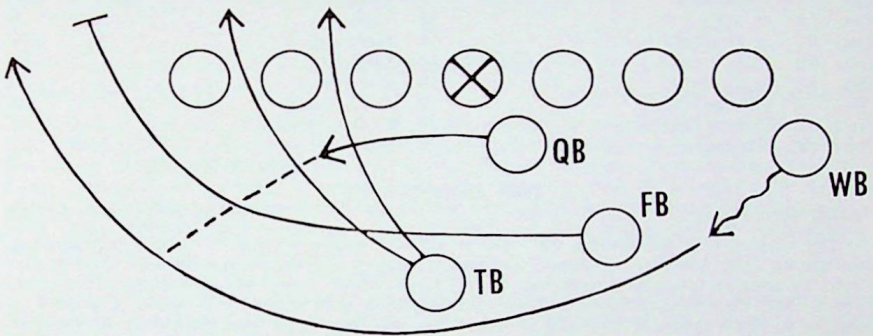

Another point in his favor is the availability of a starting backfield that compares favorably with any in the Ivy League. Paul Choquette, an All-Ivy first-team choice, who last season proved one of the best T fullbacks in the East, will remain at that position. Captain Bob Carlin, the speed merchant, is slated for duty at wingback, Bay Barry at tailback and Nick Pannes at quarterback. If this veteran quartet stays healthy, the new offense will get a fair test.

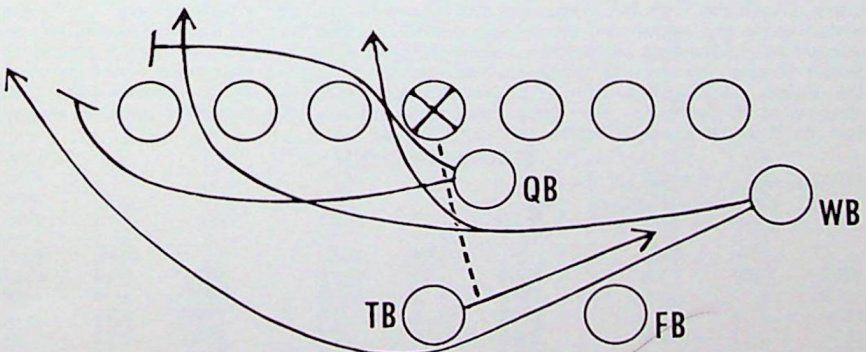
It should be interesting to watch.

When the ball is snapped directly to the tailback, the quarterback can trap all along the line on cutback plays or lead on sweeps.

The loss of five starters (three of them backfield men) among the 13 graduated lettermen has left Coach Lefty James with a rebuilding problem as he launches his second year with his slot-T offense. # Brown's Roll of Honor

## NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

### FREDERICK DOUGLAS (Fritz) POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest Negro players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 win against (7-3) Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

### EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate — to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football, but more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 19, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

### THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, the 1926 team earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarterback; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, fullback.

# FRESHMAN FOOTBALL



**CHARLES D. MARKHAM**, head coach of Brown's freshman football team, became the University's first "full time" freshman mentor three seasons ago, coming to Providence after compiling a brilliant record in three sports over an 11 year period at Tabor Academy, and a single season at Turner Falls, Mass. High. Markham attended both Williams College and NYU, being graduated from the latter in 1944. He played both basketball and baseball in college. At Tabor, he coached football, baseball and basketball in addition to his teaching duties, turning in four undefeated grid seasons and one in basketball.

**PHILIP E. COEN**, former star guard at Boston College, joined the collegiate coaching ranks last year as freshman line coach after heading the football program at Rogers High in Newport for three seasons. An All-State selection in his senior year at Rogers, Coen won three varsity football letters at B.C., where he was graduated in 1951. He was an All-New England choice in each of his last two seasons, captained the Eagles as a senior, and won honorable mention All-American honors his last campaign.



**L. STANLEY WARD**, head basketball coach, handles the freshman end squad as a member of Markham's staff in the fall. Ward was head coach of freshman football at University of Connecticut before coming to Brown five years ago, and also served as head coach of freshman football at Brown for several seasons. He was a standout basketball player at Canisius, where he was graduated in 1942.
