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The University

Brown is one of the nation's oldest universities, dating back before the American Revolution, and to that War of Independence when University Hall was used as a barracks to house American and French soldiers.

Founded in 1764 in Warren as the Rhode Island College, it was the seventh college in America and the third in New England. In 1770 it was moved to Providence, and University Hall, one of the nation's architectural treasures and nerve center of the present-day administration, was built.

In 1804, it became Brown University, changing its name in recognition of a substantial gift made by Nicholas Brown, of the class of 1786.

But Brown boasts so much more than its rich historical tradition, for while it is one of the nation's oldest educational institutions, it has kept pace with the times, and is at once one of its youngest colleges, in terms of vigor and new ideas.

It is a university in the liberal tradition. It respects the right to explore, examine, discuss . . . it seeks to educate the full man, rather than the narrow specialist. In keeping with its ancient heritage in liberal education, it offers undergraduate and advanced degrees in all major areas of the liberal arts and sciences.

It is a leader in developing new approaches to liberal education. Its Identification and Criticism of Ideas program has been described as the most exciting and stimulating for freshmen and sophomores in America today and its pioneering approach to engineering is establishing a new pattern across the nation in the teaching of that vital field.

Brown is a laboratory of ideas, experiments and discoveries in the fields of science and the humanities, as well as in education theories. More than 100 foundations and business concerns are presently underwriting experiments and other activities in various departments of the University.

The faculty is the heart of a university and by any measurements, Brown is fortunate here: in skill and experience, scholarship and leadership, the international reputation of its present leaders, and in academic policies and research opportunities that enable it to attract brilliant teachers in every field.

The incoming freshman class this fall averages in the top 10 per cent of the nation in intelligence, and those men numbered in its ranks earned their place in the face of tremendous competition.

It has a charming campus. The old campus of Hope, Sayles, Faunce and University Hall reflects what has been. The new campus with its eye-catching refectory and new quadrangles reflects the promise of an even brighter future. Centrally located are the John Hay Library (1,000,000 volumes) and the John Carter Brown Library, with its world-famous collection of Americana.

It has a friendly atmosphere. Its size (2,350 undergraduates -- smallest in the Ivy League) is such that a feeling of warmth and intimacy pervades all the activities and experiences of campus life. It has realized the almost impossible achievement of maintaining the remote atmosphere of the "country college" in the heart of one of America's great historical cities.

It has been called "the biggest small university in the land."

That is Brown. And in today's hurried pace of American life and intense public interest in athletics, it is well to remember that Brown is first -- a university, and that the young men who represent it on the athletic field, do so as part of the educational process at the institution they have chosen for no other reason than that it ranks as one of America's greatest.

HEAD COACH

JOHN J. McLAUGHRY

Brown Record: Won 5, Lost 21, Tied 1

Overall Record: Won 66, Lost 50, Tied 6



John J. McLaughry, outstanding Brown athlete in the late 30's, its football captain in 1939, and president of his senior class, is beginning his fourth season as head football coach.

As an undergraduate, he played three years of varsity football after serving as captain of his freshman eleven. In addition, he was university boxing champion all four years, won three varsity track letters and was named to the All-American collegiate track squad as a hammer thrower. He quarterbacked the East team in the East-West Shrine game and was co-captain of the 1940 Eastern College All-Stars, the first collegiate team to defeat the New York Giants.

He played professionally as quarterback for the Giants in 1940 and entered the service in 1941. He was discharged as a first lieutenant from the Marine Corps in 1946 and his service included two and a half years as a line officer in the Pacific Theater.

McLaughry began his coaching career the same year as an assistant at the University of Connecticut and moved on to Union College as head coach in 1947. At Union his teams won 17 games, lost six and tied one in three seasons, going undefeated in 1949.

In 1950 he became head coach at Amherst, where he compiled a nine-year record of 44 victories, 23 losses and four ties. His 1953 team was undefeated and included Brown among its victims.

John is married and has three children.

THE ASSISTANTS:

MILTON J. PIEPUL, Backfield Coach — The veteran of the Brown staff in point of service, Milt also is one of the old-timers in the Ivy League, having served 11 years under John McLaughry's father at Dartmouth before coming to Brown in 1955. He is an excellent teacher, a fact underlined by the development of Frank Finney, an unheralded member of the 1955 Brown freshman team, into the Ivy League's top quarterback in '58. A smashing offensive fullback and a strong linebacker at Notre Dame, Milt captained the Irish in 1940 and then played a year of professional football with the Detroit Lions before entering the coaching ranks at Cathedral High School in Indianapolis. He joined the Dartmouth staff in 1943 under Earl Brown and stayed on through Tuss McLaughry's regime at Hanover. Milt is married and has four children.



RICHARD M. GOWEN, Line Coach — A native of Amesbury, Mass., Gowen played under John's father and Piepul on the strong Dartmouth teams of the late 40's. A midterm graduate in 1950, Dick actually began his coaching career as an assistant freshman coach at Dartmouth in 1949 when his eligibility expired. He joined the Amherst staff when the younger McLaughry took over as head coach there in the fall of 1950 and has been John's right-hand man ever since. A strong believer in football fundamentals and an excellent teacher of the techniques of line play. He is single.



JOHN L. ZILLY, End Coach — The former Notre Dame ('47) and National Football League star joined McLaughry's staff in 1959. A native New Englander, Zilly attended Lewis High School in Southington, Conn., and Cheshire Academy before entering Notre Dame in 1941. As a member of the Navy ROTC unit at South Bend, he received his commission in 1944 and served in the Pacific until his discharge in 1946. He returned to Notre Dame, was named game captain twice during the '46 season and was selected on several All-American squads that year. He competed in the All-Star game in Chicago in 1947 before joining the Los Angeles Rams with whom he played through the 1951 season. He concluded his pro career with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952 and entered private business before launching his coaching career as an assistant at Montana University. He returned to his alma mater in 1956 as an assistant to Terry Brennan and remained there through the 1958 season. Zilly is married and the father of six children.



ALEX F. NAHIGIAN, Assistant Coach — Currently serving his 14th season as a member of the Brown staff, Alex is the lone holdover from the regimes of Rip Engle, Gus Zitrides and Al Kelley. A graduate of Holy Cross, '42, Nahigian played football there until an injury ended his grid career, and was an outstanding baseball player for three seasons. After graduation he played pro ball in the New England League for several seasons. He has been associated with the Pawtucket school system since 1942 as a teacher and coach, though his football coaching has been restricted to Brown since 1949. A versatile man, he coaches the varsity baseball team at Providence College in the spring. Alex is regarded as one of the best scouts in collegiate football today. He is married and the father of three daughters.



The Prospects for '62

Unhappily, Coach John McLaughry is faced with the same challenging job of rebuilding Brown's football forces this fall as he encountered in 1961. For what had been expected to be a sizable and experienced group of returning lettermen has been riddled by several academic casualties involving key operatives.

Chief among them are John Harenski, a 240-pound tackle who logged more playing time than any other Brown interior lineman last season, Lee Trumbull, another big tackle, halfback Tom Draper and center John Hoover. In addition, halfback Bill Stone, the leading ground-gainer and scorer on the Bruin freshman team last year, is ineligible.

Losses by graduation were slight, numbering only four players. But they included fullback Ray Barry, a three-year veteran who led the team in rushing the last two seasons, and quarterback Jack Rohrbach, who holds the school record for pass completions in a single season with 76. Bob Auchy and Gary Graham, three-year letter-winners at guard, also have been graduated.

The picture is not all black, however. Eighteen lettermen are returning and some immediate help can be expected from a dozen or so sophomore candidates, a few of whom appear capable of moving into first-string berths. The most critical positions will be center, tackle, quarterback and linebacker, each of which lacks experience and/or depth. The Bruins will be better fortified at end, guard and halfback and reasonably well off at fullback.

The end squad will be built around four returning lettermen, Captain Nick Spiezio, Don Boyle, Dave Nelson and Dick Greene, all of whom saw considerable action last season. Joining them will be three good sophomore prospects, Ron Ferraris, John Parry and Herb Lenker.

The loss of Harenski and Trumbull will weaken the tackle corps from the standpoint of ability, experience and depth. Lettermen Bill Savicki and John Arata, the latter a center last year, will be backed up by numerous sophomores, chief among them being Jack Lutz, a 6-3, 210-pounder, and Mike Allara, a 6-2, 200-pounder.

The guard positions present the brightest picture with four returning lettermen and abundant sophomore potential. The veterans are headed by Gerry Bucci, Tony Matteo, John Miles and John Hornyak, though the latter has been handicapped by knee injuries the last two years and his status is doubtful.

With Arata moved back to tackle, the center position is up for grabs among holdovers Bill Caroselli and Matt DeGennaro and sophomore Dave Krafchik, a 6-2, 215-pounder possessed with good speed and blocking ability.

The important quarterbacking position is left with no logical heir-apparent to Rohrbach, the No. 1 signal-caller the last two years. Senior Dennis Hauffaire, who saw only limited service as Rohrbach's understudy, and junior Dewey Moser will battle it out with sophomores Jim Dunda and Don Carcieri, who shared the duties fairly equally with the freshman team. The best passer most likely will get the job.

Despite the loss of Draper, who had a 4.2-yard rushing average last year, and sophomore Stone, the Bruins still have three good bread-and-butter runners in Parker Crowell, Jan Moyer and Bill Lemire. Moyer, though slowed by injuries, was the second leading ground-gainer last fall and turned in the highest single-game total by a Brown back since 1954 with 135 yards against Harvard. Lemire and Crowell ranked third and fifth, respectively, among the rushing leaders. Bill Vareschi, a junior who played mostly defense last year, will play right half along with Lemire.

The fullback spot, which has produced Brown's leading ground-gainer the last five seasons in Paul Choquette and Barry, will be a bone of contention among lettermen Jon Meeker and Frank Antifonario and sophomores John Kelly and Lou Vodopivec. Meeker, who was switched from halfback the latter part of last season, is a hard, deceptive runner.

Overall, the same "ifs" crop up that were present a year ago. If the key regulars can avoid disabling injuries and if the top sophomores can make a successful adjustment to varsity competition, the Bruins could emerge from the rebuilding stage and move out of the depths.

A transfer student who was limited to practice sessions with the freshmen last season, Mike is a real tough lad who likes contact . . . Defense is his forte but the Brown coaches feel he has the ability to develop into a top offensive tackle.

John W. ARATA Sr. 22 6-5 245 Rutherford, N. J.

Switched back to his original position after filling a gap at center the last two years, Big John is expected to strengthen the tackle squad . . . earned two letters with a total of 501 minutes played . . . does a real good job of blocking and gives the team a real solid man in the line.

John S. LUTZ Soph 19 6-3 210 Garden City, N. Y.

An extremely mobile lineman for his size, he stands a good chance of nailing down a regular assignment this fall . . . will be a tough man to handle on defense . . . excelled in the hammer and shot on the Brown freshman track team last spring.

William A. SAVICKI Sr. 20 6-3 220 Stoughton, Mass.

The veteran among the tackles, he earned a letter as a sophomore with 173 minutes of playing time and logged 285 more last season despite an injury that slowed him down during the middle stages . . . He has good size for the position and the coaches are looking for him to have a good senior year.

GUARDS

Gerald A. BUCCI Jr. 20 5-11 190 Ridgewood, N. J.

The only regular guard returning, he was a standout as a sophomore both offensively and defensively . . . calls the defensive signals from his linebacking spot . . . a tough, two-way player.

Anthony T. MATTEO Jr. 19 6-2 205 Lawrence, Mass.

Played 267 minutes at tackle last year but has been moved to guard to make better use of his speed . . . a solid, two-way player with great pursuit . . . injuries hampered him part of sophomore season.

John P. MILES Jr. 20 6-1 195 Castlecove, N.S.W., Australia

Logged considerable playing time as a sophomore and gained valuable experience . . . he has good speed and hustle . . . strong defensively . . . now resides in Australia but played his prep school football at Staunton Military Academy.

CENTERS

William R. CAROSELLI Sr. 20 5-11 175 North Braddock, Pa.

A two-year letterman who has alternated between guard and center the last two seasons . . . small for the position but he makes up for lack of size by his scrap and ability.

Matthew M. DeGENNARO Jr. 20 5-11 190 North Bergen, N. J.

A promising sophomore prospect who was sidelined for a considerable part of last season by a shoulder injury . . . a sound offensive center.

David J. KRAFCHIK Soph 19 6-2 215 Nanticoke, Pa.

Strong, fast and a good blocker with excellent promise . . . has the physical equipment and ability to move into a starting berth . . . will play linebacker on defense.

QUARTERBACKS

Donald L. CARCIERI Soph 19 6-1 175 East Greenwich, R. I.

A heady quarterback, good passer and sound defensive player . . . completed 14 of 41 passes for 172 yards for the freshmen last fall . . . his passing may give him an edge for the starting job . . . an All-League selection at East Greenwich High School.

James J. DUNDA Soph 18 5-11 175 Avenel, N. J.

A good, all-around quarterback . . . speedy runner . . . adequate passer . . . strong on defense . . . completed 16 of 41 passes for 200 yards and one touch-down with the Cubs . . . an All-State choice at Woodridge High School.

Dennis L. HAUFLAIRE Sr. 21 5-11 185 Downers Grove, Ill.

Understudy to Jack Rohrbach the last two seasons, he was limited in playing time . . . turned in a good performance in clutch against Yale . . . handles team well . . . completed 21 of 49 passes for 192 yards last year.

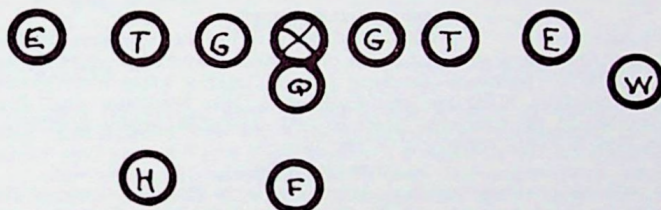
Brown Offense for '62

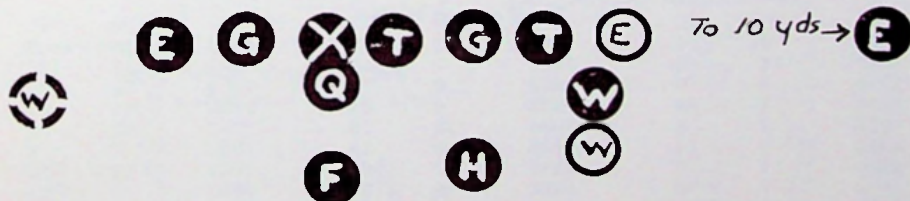
The offense this year will be very similar to that used the last half of the 1961 season, when due to personnel changes it was felt advisable to switch to a balanced line. The main difference is that the line will not "flop" over as it did a year ago, when there was a "strong" side and "short" side. With all backs being runners, and it being possible for any back to be a wingback, it could give us the flexibility we will need with the personnel available.

At this counting, it is not known how the ends will measure up as pass receivers, so it will remain to be seen what variations we will use on the standard formation.

Overall, we expect the running attack to be much stronger than in 1961, but the passing at this time is questionable.

Brown's Roll of Honor

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A. C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS (Fritz) POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest Negro players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head-coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N. C.

THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, the 1926 team earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarterback; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, fullback.

At Tabor, he coached football, baseball and basketball in addition to his teaching duties, turning in four undefeated grid seasons and one in basketball.

PHILIP E. COEN, former star guard at Boston College, joined the collegiate coaching ranks in 1958 as freshman line coach after heading the football program at Rogers High in Newport for three seasons. An All-State selection in his senior year at Rogers, Coen won three varsity football letters at B.C., where he was graduated in 1951. He was an All-New England choice in each of his last two seasons, captained the Eagles as a senior, and won honorable mention All-American honors his last campaign.

NO NEED TO GET LOST When Coming To Brown

FROM BOSTON: Follow Route 1 through the Pawtucket Expressway; make an S turn at traffic light at junction of George St. and Pawtucket Ave., turning left on Pawtucket Ave., then a sharp right on East Ave. (very short distance); East Ave. becomes Hope St. at Pawtucket-Providence city line; follow Hope St. past the traffic light at Rochambeau Ave. to Savoy St.; take left on Savoy St. to Brown Field.

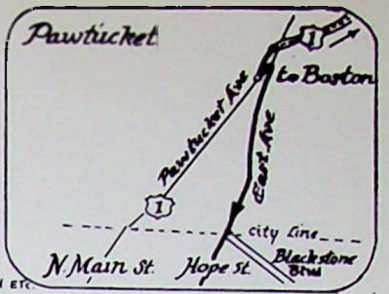
FROM WORCESTER: Take Branch Ave. exit off Route 146; follow Branch Ave. to North Main St. (cemetery on left); go directly across North Main St. at light, up Cypress St., crossing Camp, Ivy and Hope Sts. to Morris Ave.; take left on Morris Ave. and right on Sessions St. to the field.

FROM CONNECTICUT (via Route 44): Follow Smith St. (44) past the State Capitol to North Main St.; take left on North Main, bearing right up the hill; take right on Doyle Ave. (third traffic light from top of hill, Goodyear Tire Store on corner); follow Doyle Ave. to Elmgrove Ave. (bottom of hill); take left on Elmgrove to the field.

FROM NEW YORK AND CONNECTICUT (via Route 6): Follow Route 6 after leaving Roberts Expressway along Westminster, Winter, Lockwood and Friendship Sts. to the Providence River Expressway; after crossing river, take Wickenden St. exit; turn left at first traffic light (Benefit St.); follow Benefit all the way until it joins North Main St.; take right on Doyle Ave. (second traffic light, Goodyear Tire Store at corner); follow Doyle Ave. up the hill, then all the way to the bottom of hill to Elmgrove Ave.; take left on Elmgrove to the field. (This route is slightly longer but much easier because of the traffic pattern.)

NOTE: Football practice will be conducted this fall at the University's new Aldrich-Dexter athletic field on the corner of Hope St. and Lloyd Ave. (No. 3 on map). **FROM BOSTON:** Stay on Hope St.; field is just beyond Hope High School (on right) and Moses Brown School (on left), Hope St. bears left beyond the two schools. **FROM WORCESTER:** Turn right off Cypress St. at Hope St. (School for Deaf on corner) and follow Hope St. to the field. **FROM CONNECTICUT (44):** Turn right off North Main St. at Olney St.; continue up Olney to Hope St. (traffic light); take right on Hope St. and continue on Hope to Lloyd Ave. **FROM NEW YORK AND CONNECTICUT (6):** Turn right off Benefit St. up Waterman St. Hill; continue on Waterman St. to Hope St. (fourth traffic light); take left on Hope to the field.
