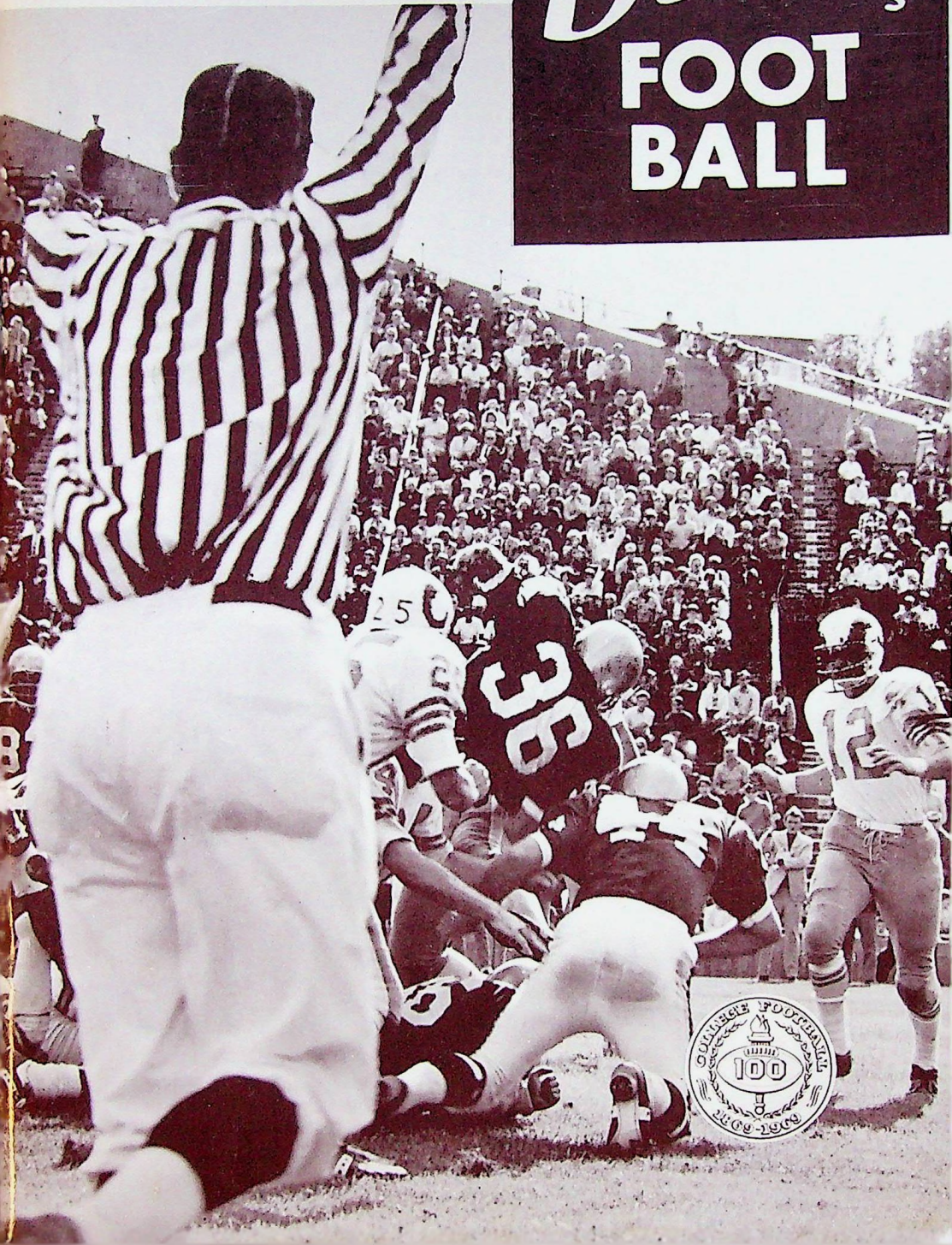

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The University

The charter of Brown University aimed to preserve "a succession of men duly qualified for discharging the offices of life with usefulness and reputation."

Brown University has been doing this successfully for more than 200 years — since it came into existence in March, 1764, twelve years before the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Brown is the seventh oldest collegiate institution in the nation and the third oldest in New England, yet young in vigor and new ideas.

Brown's beginnings could not have been more humble. There was one student and one teacher in one room in Warren, R. I. Today Brown is located in some 120 buildings on College Hill in Providence.

Its student body numbers more than 2,700 undergraduate men, some 1,100 undergraduate women in the coordinate Pembroke College and nearly 1,500 men and women graduate students. Approximately 85 per cent of the faculty of 650 have doctorates.

For the undergraduate, Brown offers a Bachelor of Arts degree in 28 areas of the liberal arts and sciences. In addition there are 14 programs of interdepartmental concentration leading to the A.B. Graduate students go on to master's and doctorate degrees in numbers that increase annually.

Brown University continues to keep pace with its carefully planned program of physical growth. A new biological sciences building for the university's six-year education program is being dedicated this fall. A new combined office building and bookstore and a central heating plant were opened this year and a new 14-story sciences library will be ready for occupancy in the near future. An art building is under construction and plans for the immediate future include a new athletic and recreation complex, a humanities building, and a geological sciences-mathematics complex.

Brown, however, does not measure its success in the number or size of its buildings. Barron's Profiles of American Colleges says: "In a generation, Brown has grown from a regional gentleman's school into a national university."

It says also: "Brown has concentrated its funds in library and lab facilities and in faculty . . . For all that, the University takes pride in undergraduate teaching, professional standards for faculty are unrelenting. It is because of these standards that Brown is better able . . . to attract good teachers who are also good scholars.

"When faced with a choice between breadth and excellence in a department, the University almost invariably chooses excellence.

"Virtually every member of the faculty, from the deans on down, teaches undergraduates. There are some professors limited to research; but Brown does not attract 'stars' just to have their names on the faculty roster."

Thus, by all standards, Brown appears to be succeeding in carrying out the purpose for which it was established more than 200 years ago.

It's still turning out "a succession of men (and, since 1891, women too) duly qualified for discharging the offices of life with usefulness and reputation."

HEAD COACH

Leonard C. Jardine

(Third Season)

It was one of the greatest challenges of Len Jardine's life when he became Brown's head coach in 1967. Then, he was only 29 and one of the youngest major collegiate coaches in the country and possibly for all-time.

However, age only belies the passage of time and is no pre-requisite for talent, desire or flexibility — the ability to react effectively in all situations.

These aforementioned characteristics aptly describe Jardine. He's proved a master in the fine art of diplomacy, as he has effected a solid rapport with the alumni, administration, press, radio and TV, students and just everybody in general. He's that rare individual who promotes himself successfully by simply being himself.

Thus, at the "golden age" of 31, he enters his third season as coach with a highly-talented sophomore group that are the first complete results of his recruiting ventures. It is enough to say that Brown's 1968 freshman team compiled a 5-1 record and were the strongest Cub squad physically in the school's history. The '69 frosh promises to be another impressive aggregation — again an example of Jardine's enormous recruiting powers.

Frustrating, indeed, were his initial two seasons as his Bruin teams were usually out-manned and just overwhelmed by most of their opposition. Despite the setbacks, though, each Brown gridder played the "Jardine Way" — pridefully, selflessly and with vigor. This was a major breakthrough.

Jardine's background in sports is ample testimony that the best is yet to come. A native of Chicago, he was an outstanding student and football player during his undergraduate days at Purdue. A strong, two-way end, he was captain of both his freshman and varsity elevens. In his final semester he earned a 6.0 (perfect) scholastic index in the School of Science and was graduated with a distinguished rating.

He was named the most valuable player on the 1959 Purdue squad and was selected on the All-America and Big Ten Academic Teams. He was co-captain of the Blue squad in the Blue-Gray game and received Purdue's Noble E. Kizer Scholastic Award as a fitting climax to a brilliant college career.

He accepted his first football coaching job at his prep school alma mater, Loyola Academy of Wilmette, Ill., which had been the doormat of the strong Chicago Catholic League with a record of only five victories in 33 games the previous four years. During the next four seasons under Jardine, Loyola captured two championships and compiled a 28-2 record.

Then came the call from his college alma mater and he joined Jack Mollenkopf's staff as coach of offensive backs and ends. In this assignment he established himself as the developer of Purdue's fine corps of pass receivers. In his final effort he saw his Boilermakers defeat Southern California in the 1967 Rose Bowl.

So, using a cliché, Brown football is on the up-and-up. This is owed entirely to an indefatigable young man who accepted a challenge and is doing the job.

THE ASSISTANTS

JIM HEALY

Offensive Line Coach



One of Holy Cross' all-time football greats, he won just about every conceivable post-season honor. When the 1959 season was completed, Healy had been selected to the All-New England, All-East and Catholic All-America teams, besides an honorable mention All-America. He played a year of professional football with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League and briefly with the Denver Broncos of the American Football League. Like Jardine himself, Healy compiled an imposing schoolboy coaching record. In six seasons at St. Peter's High in Worcester, Mass., he was 45-12-2 and his career record was 68-16-2. At St. John's High in Washington, D. C., he was a four-sport letterman and was selected the best football player in the Washington area. He was included in "Who's Who in American Colleges" in 1959. Healy is married and has three children.

JIM COLLETT

Offensive Line Coach



A starring member of UCLA's 1966 Rose Bowl champions, the 24-year-old should be a fine replacement for Marv Nyren. A three-year starter, Colletto was selected to the All-Coast team as a defensive end, besides being the team's co-captain. He also starred in baseball for three years, co-captaining the powerful Bruins in '66. He came to UCLA in 1962 from Monterey (Calif.) High where he lettered in football, baseball and basketball. He won 1961 All-Northern California prep grid honors. He has served on the UCLA coaching staff the past two years, being the head freshman coach during his first year and with the varsity last season. He is married to the former Suzanne Gratiot, a former UCLA song girl who also graduated in 1967.

DICK SELCER

Defensive Backfield Coach

The former Notre Dame football and baseball star joined Jardine's staff after five years of collegiate coaching experience. The Cincinnati native served three seasons as backfield coach at Xavier University and the last two years directing the backs and ends at the University of Cincinnati. Before entering Notre Dame, Dick was a standout in football, basketball and baseball at Elder High School in Cincinnati. He was team captain in all three sports, was chosen all-state quarterback and played in the all-state football and baseball games his senior year. In 1954 he led the Elder eleven to the only undefeated season in the school's history. At Notre Dame he was a three-year letterman at halfback during Terry Brennan's regime, captained the Irish baseball team and was named to the All-America third team as a second baseman. A 1959 graduate, he was employed in the accounting division of General Motors for two years before launching his coaching career. He is married and the father of four children.



JACK GEORGE

Offensive Backfield Coach



The Boston native came to Brown after a highly successful high school tenure in Westchester County (NY) area. He is a graduate of Boston Latin High School, where he starred in football and baseball and was named to the National Honor Society. He earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education from the University of Massachusetts in 1958 after interrupting his education to serve two years in the Army. At UMass George was a varsity letterman three years in football and lacrosse and was named to the Dean's List several times. Upon graduation, he was awarded a teaching fellowship at Penn State University, where he received his Masters Degree in Physical Education and served as freshman backfield coach. He was backfield coach at Archbishop Stepinac High School in White Plains, N. Y., before moving to Fox Lane High School as head football and wrestling coach. Competing in the Northern Westchester League, his football teams placed second three times and his wrestling team won one league championship. He is the brother of Brown's head athletic trainer, Frank George.

ALEX NAHIGIAN

Assistant Coach

Currently serving his 21st season as a member of the Brown staff, Alex is the lone holdover from the regimes of Rip Engle, Gus Zitrides, Al Kelley and John McLaughry. A graduate of Holy Cross, '42, Nahigian played football there until an injury ended his grid career, and was an outstanding baseball player for three seasons. After graduation he played pro ball in the New England League for several seasons. He has been associated with the Pawtucket school system since 1942 as a teacher and coach, though his football coaching has been restricted to Brown since 1949. A versatile man, he coaches the varsity baseball team at Providence College in the spring. Alex is regarded as one of the best scouts in collegiate football today. He is married and the father of three daughters.

1968 FRESHMAN RECORD: Won 5, Lost 1

The return of 21 lettermen notwithstanding, 1969 figures to be the Year of the Sophomore for Brown University's football squad — a year in which such assets as youth, aggressiveness and enthusasm must outweigh the shortcomings of experience if Coach Len Jardine is to produce a winner in his third season.

The losses from last year's squad were significant, including as they do the two leading ground-gainers of '68, Tom Lemire and Steve Wormith, the No. 1 pass-receiver, Greg Kontos, and two-time All-Ivy League center, Gerry Murphy. This quartet represented the core of the Bruins' scoring punch last fall.

On the plus side, however, is the availability of numerous sophomores of size and talent who will be moving up from the strongest freshman squad in 15 years. They will provide the speed, depth, balance and versatility that has been lacking the last several seasons.

The newcomers' impact will more likely be felt on offense than defense, or, as Jardine puts it, "We'll be going into the season with what we think is a better all-around group of backs than we've had the last two years. This will enable us to balance our attack more and not be forced into passing situations as we were in the past."

In addition to a greater number of good running backs, Jardine feels he has the wherewithal to develop a much stronger offensive line. Several sophomores will hold the key here.

Defensively, the team should be much better off than last season because of the return of eight starters plus several backup men. The sophs could strengthen the line considerably if they develop according to the coaches' timetable.

DEPTH ANALYSIS

ON OFFENSE

ENDS — Senior Jim Lukens is the only varsity holdover with experience . . . at tight end he has good size and speed, is a good blocker and fair receiver . . . Sophomores will have to step in and make the grade for this to be considered a strong area . . . Best bets are Nick Albertson at tight end, Kurt Franke and Roger Quinn at split end . . . Greg Brown, a junior who has been shifted from halfback, also could help here . . . All have good speed.

TACKLES — Jim Bruen, a senior who saw limited duty last fall, is the lone holdover . . . Two sophs — Dave Siegfried, 6-3, 220, and Tom Dunlap, 6-0, 230 — appear to have the best chance to gain starting berths . . . Both are strong and possess good speed and agility . . . Lack of depth the big problem here.

GUARDS — Pat McCarthy, a hard-hitting, 200-pound junior, and Dick Murphy, 194-pound senior, head returning lettermen . . . Sophomore Jay Bartley, at 6-1, 225, could provide needed heft . . . he was outstanding as a freshman . . . same lack of depth here as at tackle.

CENTER — Loss of two-time All-Ivy center Gerry Murphy leaves a big hole here . . . Senior Dee Hibner will be pressed by sophomore Mike Marino . . . Position remains a question mark.

QUARTERBACK — Bryan Marini gained considerable experience as a sophomore last season and should prove to be more effective with a stronger line in front of him . . . excellent runner and good passer . . . Soph Bob Zink will make a strong bid for the job.

HALFBACKS — Junior Bob Flanders, a 5-11, 195-pounder, appears the best of the running backs . . . But he will have strong competition from a pair of sophomore standouts, Tom Spotts (6-0, 209) and Jim Rianoshek (6-0, 192) . . . Senior Eric Johnson (6-2, 210) and junior Bob Warren (5-10, 170) furnish depth and versatility to the position.

FULLBACK — Loss of Steve Wormith, who gained 455 yards last season, will hurt . . . But junior Gerry Hart (5-11, 195), who gained 178 yards last year, and soph Rob Cohen (5-10, 192) make this one of team's stronger points.

ON DEFENSE

ENDS — Senior John Stone only returning letterman . . . Bob Gill, another senior, is the man to beat out for the other end spot . . . Sophs Ralph Vuono (6-0, 220) and Dan Lee (6-0, 205) have the size and potential to press the upper classmen for starting berths . . . Should be a strong position.

TACKLES — Same situation holds as at end — Pete Zwarg, 6-1, 215-pound senior, is the only experienced returnee . . . But sophs Jack Thompson (6-4, 218) and Tom Moser (6-4, 227) possess good size and ability and could move into the starting lineup . . . Position overall will have more size and depth.

MIDDLE GUARD — This spot regarded most critical because of lack of size . . . Mike Abbott and Lou Schepp shared duties last year . . . Senior Mike Murray being shifted from tackle . . . Soph Tom Misuraca (5-11, 220) has more speed and size and could be the answer.

LINEBACKERS — In real good shape here with two senior veterans back . . . Co-captain Dave Chenault (6-0, 191) and Tony Renzi (5-11, 190) are rich in experience and ability and should have their best years . . . Good backup strength will be provided by sophomore Steve Bennett (6-1, 190) and senior Joe Cox (6-0, 195).

DEFENSIVE BACKS — All of last year's regulars back except John Rallis, '68 captain . . . Cornerbacks Bill O'Donnell, Greg Kuhn and Spencer Crew all gained considerable experience and have good speed and football savvy . . . They will be fortified by Bob Wieck, a 6-2, 195-pound sophomore . . . Co-captain Pat Foley will move into Rallis' strong safety position and junior Mark Lahey is a strong candidate for the free safety spot . . . Junior Bob Thorley and sophomore Chuck Petty will furnish good depth here.

SPECIALISTS — This is an unknown quantity with the departure of all of last year's kickers . . . Foley and Flanders will be groomed for the punting chores . . . Ernie Moritz, an untested junior, will do the place-kicking.

CAPSULE SUMMARY — Offensive strengths: size and potential ability in line . . . better speed and depth in backfield. Offensive weaknesses: inexperience . . . passing game a question mark . . . lack of depth at guard and center. Defensive strengths: experience at linebacker and secondary positions plus good support from several sophomores . . . better size at tackle. Defensive weaknesses: inexperience in interior line . . . middle guard big question mark.

Led freshman pass receivers with 13 receptions, 165 yards and three touchdowns . . . good size and speed for position . . . three-sport star at Staples High . . . father was outstanding soccer player at Cornell . . . a Liberal Arts major.

Kurt D. FRANKE So. 19 6-3 195 Amelia, Ohio

Has all the attributes to become standout at split end — size, speed, maneuverability and savvy . . . most versatile performer on freshman track team . . . set numerous football and track records at Amelia High . . . was defensive back on freshman team . . . hopes to become a lawyer.

Robert M. GILL Sr. 21 6-0 205 Arlington, Va.

Played behind three-year veteran Dan Stewart last year, gaining valuable experience in the process . . . will be definite asset at defensive end once again . . . has outstanding athletic family . . . brothers, Tom, Dave and Steve, excelled in football and basketball at Washington-Lee High and father was fine pitcher in college . . . majoring in History.

Daniel G. LEE So. 19 6-1 205 Cincinnati, Ohio

Had very impressive freshman season at defensive end . . . tremendous speed and agility . . . especially strong and the fastest man at his position . . . track and football star in high school . . . a Psychology major.

James W. LUKENS Sr. 21 6-4 215 Hamilton, Ohio

A big, strong, tight end who was rated the most consistent lineman last fall . . . Rhodes Scholar nominee . . . had perfect 4.0 scholastic average last two semesters . . . fine blocker who came on strong as receiver toward the end of the season, catching nine passes for 121 yards and a touchdown . . . an All-County selection at Taft High School . . . father co-captained Syracuse University track team and brother, Tom, is a tight end on Taft squad . . . an English major . . . hopes to attend law school after graduation.

John H. STONE Sr. 20 6-1 190 Washington, D. C.

Steady, dependable and aggressive . . . saw no action as a freshman but intense desire catapulted him into starting defensive end position in '68 . . . put himself into Jardine's plans despite being unheralded . . . good 'rags-to-riches' story here . . . two-year letterman . . . father, a minister, played football for San Diego State . . . majoring in Engineering.

Ralph A. VUONO So. 19 6-2 220 Lyndhurst, N. J.

Drew constant raves for aggressive performances as freshman defensive end . . . agile, strong with quick reactions . . . earned many honors as schoolboy gridder . . . should be top candidate for starting job . . . majoring in Economics.

TACKLES

James G. BRUEN Sr. 21 6-3 230 Hudson, Mass.

Started a few games last year at offensive tackle . . . has experience, size . . . should be contender for starting job . . . outstanding schoolboy baseball and football player at Hudson Catholic . . . undecided about future plans.

Thomas F. DUNLAP So. 18 6-1 230 Cincinnati, Ohio

Will definitely bolster offensive tackle slot . . . mobile, good speed and quickness . . . stalwart on strong frosh interior line . . . All-League in high school . . . works in lumber yard during the offseason . . . a mathematics major.

Thomas U. MOSER So. 19 6-4 225 Palm Beach, Fla.

Has all the qualifications for stardom at defensive tackle — size, toughness and competitiveness-plus . . . earned all the honors as a schoolboy fullback imaginable . . . made switch to lineman easily and successfully . . . rich family athletic background . . . late father was standout semi-pro boxer and expert mountaineer . . . had school record in shot put at Cardinal Newman High . . . majoring in pre-med . . . another soph-to-watch with much talent and potential.

David L. SIEGFRIED So. 19 6-3 220 Red Bank, N. J.

Another fine offensive tackle prospect . . . played with injury on frosh team last fall but still showed immense potential . . . aggressive, fast and a hard tackler . . . was All-New Jersey selection in football at Middletown Township High and established school record in discus throw . . . added honor was being picked for two years running on New York Daily News All-Star team . . . a Political Science major.

John W. THOMPSON So. 18 6-4 220 Indianapolis, Ind.

A hard man to move, with good speed . . . proved a rugged defensive tackle as a freshman . . . an All-City pick as a schoolboy and All-Capitol District selection for two years . . . hopes for career as a chemical engineer.

Peter D. ZWARG Sr. 21 6-3 215 Haddonfield, N. J.

Experienced, dependable and a real 'firebrand' . . . will push Moser and Thompson for defensive tackle job . . . very quick, with keen reactions . . . an undefeated heavyweight wrestler at Memorial High School and an All-League and All-Conference pick in football . . . an Engineering major.

GUARDS

Jay M. BARTLEY So. 19 6-1 225 New Canaan, Conn.

Could earn himself a starting offensive guard job . . . speed, agility and fierce dedication stamp him as an athlete to be reckoned with . . . proved great leader on Cub squad . . . Connecticut Class B champion in the discus throw during the spring of '68 . . . played in Nutmeg Bowl as a high school senior . . . rated very highly by Jardine . . . majoring in Economics.

James W. GRONEFELD So. 18 5-10 190 Norwood, Ohio

One of the best freshman linemen . . . hampered somewhat by size but still a tough, mobile defensive tackle who will be in there fighting for that starting middle-guard position . . . an All-League and All-City selection at Purcell High . . . member of the National Honor Society . . . future plans include politics and education.

Patrick M. McCARTHY Jr. 20 5-10 200 Skokie, Ill.

A real tough kid, probably most aggressive on entire squad . . . Played 208 minutes at the offensive guard spot in '68 . . . a great leader . . . not particularly big for his position but a fearless blocker . . . a vital man at a position that lacks depth . . . an All-Conference selection at St. George's High . . . majors in Civil and Mechanical Engineering and hopes to be a building contractor . . . spends summers as a construction laborer.

Thomas L. MISURACA So. 191 6-0 220 St. Clair Shores, Mich.

Another fine lineman from that strong frosh team . . . will be leading candidate for starting middle-guard spot . . . main forte is quickness, but also strong and mobile . . . an All-League and All-City pick at Austin Prep . . . a Liberal Arts major.

Richard G. MURPHY Sr. 21 6-0 194 Decatur, Ga.

Saw a lot of action (163 minutes) at offensive guard last year . . . fair speed but strong competitor . . . impressive schoolboy record (All-State AA, All-Greater Atlanta) . . . started on occasion . . . a History major.

Michael L. MURRAY Sr. 20 6-0 205 Atlanta, Ga.

Missed most of last season because of mononucleosis . . . has successfully made switch from halfback to tackle to middle guard over last three seasons . . . noted for quickness, agility and toughness . . . should be big help to troublesome position . . . an All-State selection in football at St. Joseph's High and one of Atlanta's top hurdlers . . . a History major.

THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, the 1926 team earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarterback; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, fullback.

Brown's Roll of Honor

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A. C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeORMOND (Tuss) McLAUGHRY

A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Sharon, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War II. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history. His 1928 and 1932 teams lost only one game. Before leaving Brown for Dartmouth in 1941, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob, played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He now resides in Norwich, Vt.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS (Fritz) POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest Negro players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

Brown's Roll of Honor

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

WILLIAM EARL SPRACKLING, '12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aeriels, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910, still a Brown record, and holds the school record for field goals in a season (6) and career (10). He also owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-11 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. He is now retired from his position as president of the Anaconda Wire and Cable Company.

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head-coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N. C.

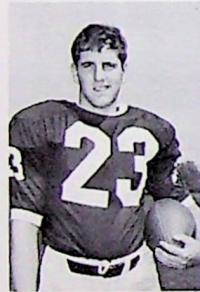

Another alumnus of Len Jardine's staff at Loyola Academy, Gourley came to Brown after three successful years as head football coach at North Chicago, Ill., High School. The Mascot

That Brown teams are known as the Bears is a matter of design, full credit for which belongs to one of Brunonia's most illustrious sons — the late Senator Theodore Francis Green '87. Following is a digest of an account he wrote in 1923 on how the bear came to Brown:

"From time to time, like a lot of other Brown men, I had felt the lack of a definite symbol for our college.

"So I set about selecting an appropriate symbol. I wanted something alive, and though not human, such as we endow with humanlike qualities. First of all, I thought our symbol should be a mammal and one of fair size, so as to be capable of portrayal in the graphic and plastic arts impressively and without absurd exaggeration.

"The animal should if feasible be indigenous American to emphasize the sturdy American quality of the college. But above all, our symbol must in some way suggest those elemental qualities which I believe characterize Brown men: strength, independence and courage.

"By process of elimination there emerged a symbol more filling these requirements than one could reasonably have expected — The Brown Bear.

"It is a mammal and the largest on the continent. It has been used heraldically. It is truly American and, most important of all, it embodies and suggests those qualities we want to emphasize. While somewhat unsociable, it is good-natured and clean. While courageous and ready to fight, it does not look for trouble for its own sake, nor is it bloodthirsty. It is not one of a herd but acts independently. It is intelligent and capable of being educated (if caught young enough!) Remember, an athlete can make Phi Beta Kappa. Furthermore the bear's color is brown; and its name is Brown.

"I bided my time. It came when Rockefeller Hall was built. I happened to be one of the Building Committee and on its completion had charge of the furnishing. The central feature of the building was the trophy room and the central feature of the room was the great arch. Here, over the arch, at the central point of student life at Brown, I put a head of a real Brown Bear labeled beyond misinterpretation.

"The building was formally opened January 20, 1904, so that is, I suppose, the bear's birthday.

"The idea caught on at once. The newspapers gladly received the new symbol, and the next fall the students took a live bear as a mascot to the Dartmouth game at Springfield. Songs were written about him, and it was not long before the Brown Bear was so firmly established that in the quick succession of college generations, it was looked upon as a grand old tradition.

"You remember in 'Waverly,' the description of the banquet at Tully-Veolan, when the baron brought out for Waverly a golden goblet in the shape of a rampant bear. 'It represents,' he said, 'the chosen crest of our family — a bear, as ye observe, and rampant; because a herald will depict every animal in its noblest posture.' On the cup was the motto 'Beware the Bear.'"

Bear cub mascots have been appearing on the sidelines at Brown games for many years. They are currently presented to the University by an animal farm, and their care and feeding is entrusted to the Brown Key organization.

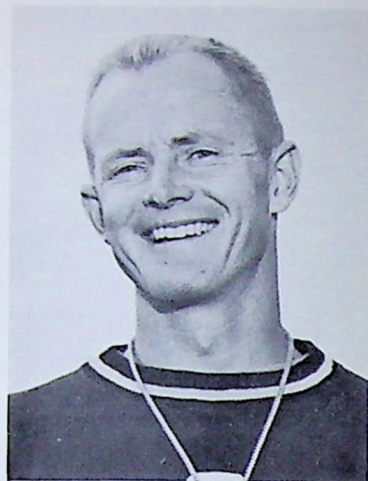

FROM BOSTON (*via Route 95*): Take Branch Ave. (exit No. 24) off 95; go left on Branch Ave. to junction of North Main Street (cemetery on left); go directly across North Main St. at light, up Cypress St., crossing Camp, Ivy and Hope streets to Morris Ave.; take left on Morris Ave. and a quick right on Sessions St. to the field.

FROM WORCESTER (*via Route 146*): Take Branch Ave. exit off Route 146 and follow same instructions as above.

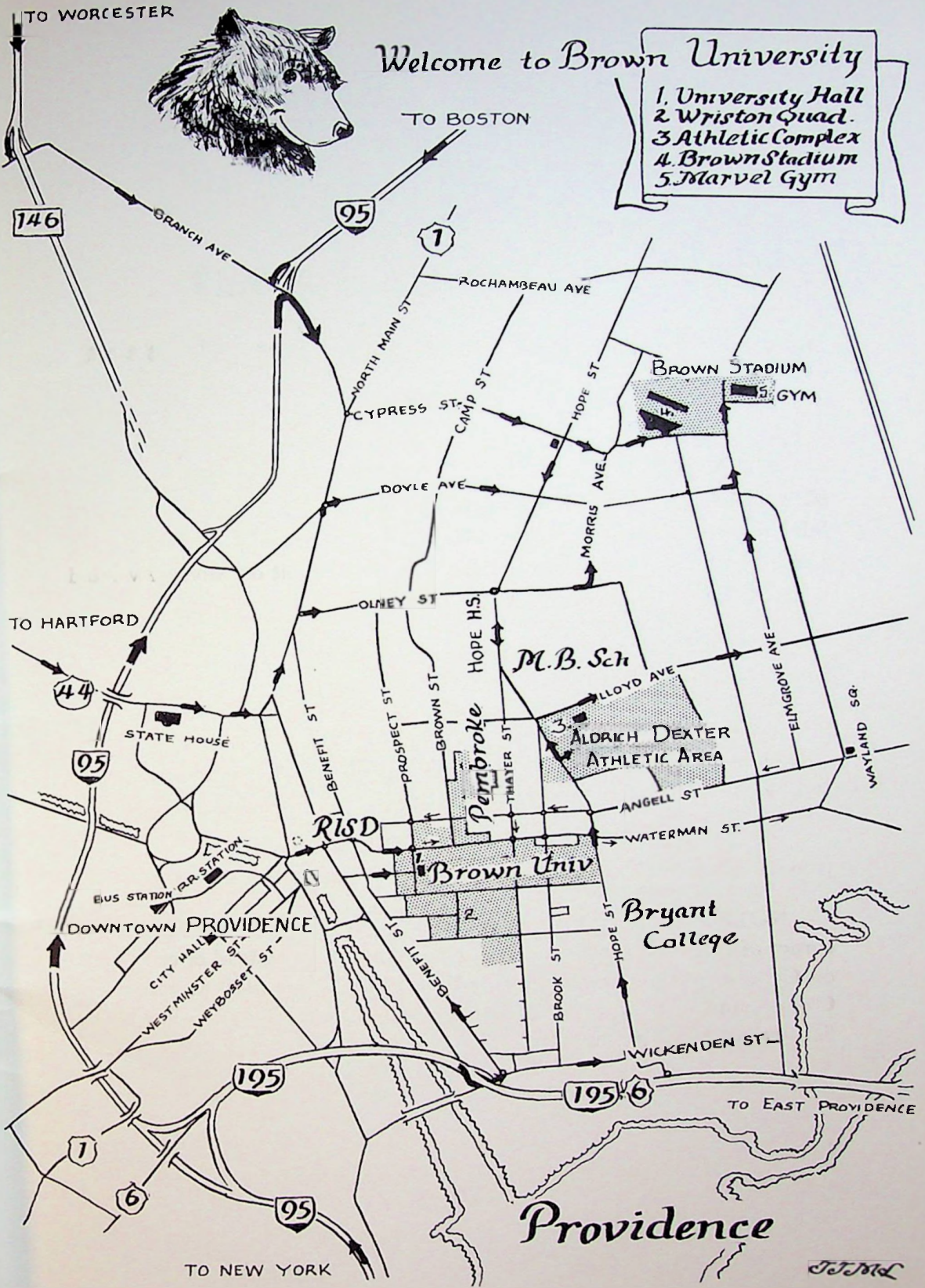
FROM NEW YORK AND CONNECTICUT (*via Route 95*): Take Branch Ave. exit off 95 (beyond center of Providence); turn right on Branch Ave. and proceed as above.

FROM NEW YORK AND CONNECTICUT (*via Route 6*): Switch from Route 6 to 95 North in center of Providence and proceed as above.

NOTE: Football practice is conducted on Aldrich-Dexter Field at the corner of Hope St. and Lloyd Ave. (No. 3 on map). Instead of continuing on Cypress St. to the stadium as outlined above, turn right at junction of Cypress and Hope streets (School for Deaf on corner) and follow Hope St. about a half-mile to field.
