/ ABOUT BROWN UNIVERSITY /

Brown University is located in the City of Providence, the capital of Rhode Island, at the head of Narragansett Bay. The main campus of the University is on College Hill in a residential area overlooking the center of the city. Brown is a coeducational Ivy League school where one of the most innovative and flexible curricula in the nation combines with over two hundred years of New England tradition to form an academic community of intellectual depth and social diversity.

The history of Brown reaches back over more than two centuries and tells of a university constantly undergoing change. Brown was established with a charter from the Colony's General Assembly in 1764 as the seventh college in America, and the third in New England.

In September 1765, the first men registered at the college, then known as Rhode Island College and located in Warren, Rhode Island. In 1770 the school was moved to a hill in Providence and in 1804 its name was changed to Brown University in recognition of the contributions of Nicholas Brown. In the 1880's graduate courses were first offered and the Graduate School was established in 1927.

Brown maintains a strong tradition of dedication to both undergraduate and graduate education in the humanities, arts and sciences. While the University's two centuries of existence have involved constant expansion and adaption of academic programs to encompass expanding spheres of knowledge, these changes have been accomplished with an overriding concern for the importance of sustaining an environment of scholarship and community with the growing university.

The admission officers in making their appraisal of a candidate, must reconcile the need to select a Freshman Class, whose size can be only a fraction of the number of generally qualified applicants, with the absolute necessity for recognizing the unique capabilities of each applicant. For this reason a candidate's credentials are reviewed in the light of the individual's own strengths and as they relate to a number of admission criteria.

The Brown curriculum is intended to give students freedom in the selection and creation of academic programs. An undergraduate, at Brown, must be able not only to cope with, but more importantly, to profit from this flexibility. An applicant should exhibit, therefore, a genuine interest in learning, a readiness for intellectual independence, and a willingness to accept responsibility.

It is important that Brown maintain an academic and extracurricular atmosphere that is as diverse as its perspectives as in its programs. This atmosphere should represent a lively, not just formal, interest in scholarly inquiry and activities. For this reason, the Board of Admission is concerned with the extent to which each applicant might contribute in his or her own way to the total life of the University.

Brown today has a one-to-ten faculty-student ratio and offers its undergraduates opportunities to study with first rate faculty who also teach at the graduate level. A development of major significance at Brown was the initiation in 1969 of a liberalized New Curriculum which offered the student the opportunity to design and control the pattern of his or her undergraduate education. Considered at the time one of the most flexible and progressive academic programs to be found at any major university in the country, the New Curriculum was the result of three years of discussion and debate among students, faculty and the University officials.

In its administrative structure, Brown University is divided into the *Graduate School* and the undergraduate *College*, both coeducational. However, faculty members teach both undergraduate and graduate level courses.

Women were first admitted in 1891 when the Women's College in Brown University was established. In 1928 that division was renamed Pembroke College and for many years the women had a separate campus and extracurricular life while participating in classes with the men and earning Brown degrees. The two undergraduate colleges were merged in July 1971.

In recent years the University has grown physically to encompass the Main Campus, the Pembroke Campus and the East Campus (formerly Bryant College), as well as other sections of College Hill. In the spring of 1973, the Corporation approved a Medical Education Program leading to the degree of Doctor of Medicine. In 1974, the University accepted the first freshman class into its new seven year medical program. Brown's is the first full-fledged medical school in the state of Rhode Island.



THE BROWN UNIVERSITY SPORTS FOUNDATION

Brown University, in a major commitment to the future of its athletic programs, has created the Brown University Sports Foundation to endow all athletics. This is a pioneer approach - the direction of the future - for support of athletics. The Foundation demonstrates Brown's commitment to excellence in all its endeavors - excellence in academics and in athletics.

In addition to guaranteeing continuation of athletic financial support in future, the Foundation will make possible increased athletic funding to provide greater exposure for Brown and enhance the quality of athletics at the University.

ATHLETICS AT BROWN

Brown University offers an exciting athletic program which includes 15 men's and 15 women's varsity sports.

For Men . . .

football, soccer, cross country, water polo, ice hockey, basketball, wrestling, indoor track, swimming, baseball, tennis, lacrosse, golf, crew and outdoor track.

For Women . . .

Soccer, volleyball, cross country, field hockey, basketball, ice hockey, swimming, gymnastics, squash, indoor track, lacrosse, tennis, softball, crew and outdoor track.

In addition, the University offers a number of club sports, and a wide range of intramural and physical education activities.

With the completion of the new Olney-Margolies Athletic Center, Brown has now the finest overall facilities for a University of its size in the United States.

The complex includes Brown Stadium (football), Smith Swimming Center (swimming and water polo), Meehan Auditorium (men's and women's hockey), Marvel Gymnasium (men's and women's basketball and volleyball), Sayles Gym (gymnastics), Stevenson Field (men's and women's soccer and lacrosse), 16 tennis courts, 14 squash courts and almost 40 acres of playing fields in addition to the new center.

/ PRESIDENT HOWARD SWEARER /



Howard R. Swearer, a 49-year-old political scientist and former president of Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota, was named president of Brown University in August of 1976 and assumed office in January of 1977. He is the 15th president in Brown's 218 year history.

Raised in Wichita, Kansas, Swearer received his B.A. with high honors from Princeton's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs in 1954, his M.A. (1956) and Ph.D. (1960) from Harvard and his LL.D. from Princeton (1977).

Swearer came to Carleton from the Ford Foundation, where he served as program officer in the international division (1967) and program officer in charge, European and international affairs (1968-70). In those capacities, he was responsible for a multi-million dollar international scholar-exchange program.

From 1960 to 1967, Swearer taught in the political science department of the University of California at Los Angeles. While at U.C.L.A., Swearer directed U.C.L.A.'s Peace Corps training programs for Nigeria, Chile, Ecuador, and Ethiopia, and was chairman of a statewide committee on Peace Corps activities. In 1964, he served as acting director of the university's Russian and East European Studies Center.

Prior to joining the U.C.L.A. faculty, Swearer was an American Political Science

Association Congressional Fellow (1959), and served as a lieutenant in the U.S. Army (1957-58).

He is currently a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and is a member of the Board of Directors of Textron, Inc. and a member of the Board of Directors for A Better Chance, Inc. He is also a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education.

Swearer and his wife, Janet Baker Swearer, have three sons, aged 26, 24, and 21.

PRESIDENT HOWARD SWEARER ON ATHLETICS — "I am very optimistic about the kind of athletic program we offer in the Ivy League. We are trying to maintain a balanced athletic program for men and women which fits into the total educational process. The fact that a large portion of athletic expenses are paid by the general college budget is a telling factor and explains our interest in, and commitment to, a well-rounded athletic program.

"We like to have winning teams, but this cannot overshadow other important objectives of the University — the most important of which is that every student can test his or her interests and abilities, develop skills, and gain knowledge and values which will be of use to them in their lifetime.

/ ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JOHN PARRY /



John C. Parry now directs the athletic program in which he once was a co-captain and All-Ivy football player and a letter-winner in basketball and lacrosse. The 40-year-old administrator became Brown University's director of Athletics in January of 1979. He oversees 30 men's and women's varsity sports and an extensive intramural, physical education, and recreational program.

Parry is a member of the NCAA men's lacrosse Division I national championship committee, and The ECAC Executive Council, Chairman of the ECAC Finance Committee, and the 1983-84 Chairman of the Ivy Committee on Administration. He was very instrumental in the design and in the construction of the award-winning 88,000 square foot Olney-Margolies athletic center that was dedicated in the fall of 1981.

Following his 1965 graduation with a degree in economics, Parry earned his master's in business administration in 1967 from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton Graduate School. While at Penn he served as assistant coach of the freshmen football and lacrosse teams and completed his six-year service in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve.

Parry spent the next eight years in the data processing field, first as a marketing representative for IBM, then vice-president and co-founder of Instant Data Inc., a Philadelphia-based computer services firm.

In 1975, he returned to Brown as assistant athletic director and two years later was elevated to associate director. During those years he had responsibilities in scheduling, team travel, recruiting, admissions, eligibility, and as an assistant football and lacrosse coach.

A native of Marcellus, N.Y., Parry is a graduate of Marcellus Central High School where he lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track and field. He, his wife Anne Brodhead Parry, and two children, Alyson and Jennifer, reside in Barrington.

John Parry on the Brown Student/Athlete — "Bright . . . articulate . . . questioning . . . skilled young men and women. Some may harbor dreams of professional athletics but when they do, at least they hedge their chances by securing the best education possible. Brown is a happy place . . . our athletes host visiting prospects and the feedback is mostly positive."

On Brown Athletics — "All of Brown experienced an upbeat decade in the 70's. We are committed to athletic programs for all . . . recreational, instructional, intramural and inter-collegiate. Close to 80% of the Brown Community participates in one or more of the above programs . . . The intercollegiate program is broad-based; 15 varsity sports for men and 15 varsity sports for women."

On Coaching in the Ivy League — "The Ivy League is the toughest intercollegiate league in the country to coach in. We ask our coaches to compete on a Division I level with no scholarships and no control over admission decision and they do it. Players play on a completely voluntary basis; when skilled players decide to concentrate on their studies there is no retribution or penalty involved. When players have a late class, they miss practice; studies are the number one priority and we recruit with that in a positive sense."

Brown's freshman football team was 3-3 last season.

/ PRESS INFORMATION /

PRESS BOX FACILITIES: The Brown Stadium press box can handle 150 people to include press, radio, and television so there is usually no problem in handling media requests. However, we do ask that all press requests be made no later than four days before a game and radio requests no later than two weeks before a game.

PRESS PASSES: We mail out press passes 7-10 days before a game. Late requests will be left at the Will Call window at the Stadium or they can be picked up on Saturday (until noon) at the sports information office in Marvel Gymnasium.

PRESS CREDENTIALS: All accredited media who are assigned to cover our home games will be assigned press box seats. Wives, husbands, children or friends of media personnel will not be allowed in the press box. This rule is strictly enforced and we ask that you please abide by it.

PHOTOGRAPHY PASSES: Photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, student newspaper, wire service, yearbook and official team photographers. If space allows we will issue passes to freelance photographers with the stipulation that they give the sports information office a complete set of proofs and four 8 x 10 prints at no charge.

OUR PHOTOGRAPHER: Tom Maguire is a nationally recognized sports action photographer whose work has appeared in a number of regional and national publications. If you would like to take advantage of Tom's service, please notify sports information director Phil Langan.

RADIO BOOTHS: We have four radio booths in the press box. Priority of location is given to our flagship station — WEAN — and our student station — WBRU. If needed temporary radio space can be set-up.

PARKING: Special parking areas have been set aside for press, radio, television, photographers and game film crews. A map will be sent along with your parking passes when they are mailed out. All press parking areas are adjacent to the stadium.

SPOTTERS: We can provide spotters at a \$10.00 per game fee (cash to the spotter), but we need at least four days notice.

PRESS BOX SERVICES: We provide complete play-by-play, defensive statistics, halftime and end of game quick stats, complete end of game team and individual stats, scoring summary and third down and fourth down conversion sheets. If media personnel need anything further, we ask them to contact us a week before the game. Coffee and coke are available throughout the game, and hot sandwiches and pastry are served at the half.

PRESS BOX PHONES: Our regular press box numbers are 751-2390 and 751-3370.

TELECOPIER USE: We have two telecopiers available on a first come, first serve basis. The fee is \$20.00 per game. Usually we leave one telecopier in the press box for anyone that has a fast deadline and we bring the other one back to our office.

FACILITIES FOR WRITING GAME STORIES: Our office in Marvel Gymnasium is located just across the street from the football stadium and there is plenty of room to work.

LOCATION OF TEAM DRESSING ROOMS: The visiting team dressing room is located on the bottom floor of Marvel Gymnasium. The Brown dressing room is located in the new Olney-Margolies Athletic Center.

POST GAME PRESS CONFERENCE: This visiting team coach will be available 10-15 minutes after the game in the bottom floor of Marvel Gym. John Anderson will meet with the media in the press lounge of the Athletic Center 15 minutes after the game.

SPORTS INFORMATION OFFICE: The SID office is located on the first floor of Marvel Gymnasium second door on the left as you walk in the main entrance.

AVAILABILITY OF COACH DURING THE SEASON: John Anderson is available during pre-season from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and from 6-7:30 in the evening. During the season, the best time to reach John is 10-12:00 on weekdays and from 2:00 to 4:00 on Sundays.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: We would appreciate it if you would arrange all player interviews through the office of sports information so we can arrange a time that will not interfere with the student's academic or practice schedule.

TICKET INFORMATION: Brown ticket information phone is 401-863-2773.

PRO SCOUTS: All pro scouts must pay for press box seats.

Message Phone: The Brown University Sports Line is open 24 hours a day from Aug. 15 until June 1st. The message phone contains up-to-date scores, previews of upcoming events and ticket information.

Radio Coverage: WEAN (Providence) is the flagship station for the Brown Radio network. Eric Reid will handle the play-by-play this year, while Chuck Wilson will do the color.

Sports Information Staff: Phil Langan is the director, Jean Elliott is the assistant director, and Eileen McCarten is the secretary.

Sports Information Phone: The SI office numbers are 401-863-2219 and 2259. We can also be reached at 863-2211.

Sports Information Releases: We mail a weekly football notes release, along with complete up-to-date statistics, every Monday afternoon.

Press Comp Tickets: If you are working the game in an official capacity and bring your wife, husband, son or daughter to the game, we will provide you with a good ticket in the stands. There is a limit to the number of tickets available, so we should have notice at least a week before the game.

Sunday Morning: The Sports Information Office is open each Sunday during the football season from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

FACTS ABOUT BROWN STADIUM

Brown Stadium was dedicated in the fall of 1925. It was built by subscription, raised by a committee headed by Clinton C. White '00. The current seating capacity of the stadium is 20,000. New seating was installed in 1978.

Prior to the building of Brown Stadium, Bruin home games were played at Adelaide Park in Elmwood or on Lincoln Field, which occupied land then known as Lower Campus.

At the start of the century a new field was opened off Hope Street. It was called Andrews Field in honor of E. Benjamin Andrews, beloved president of Brown from 1889-1898.

BRUNO- BROWN'S MASCOT

The birth date of the Brown Bear is January 20, 1904 when he was introduced to the university by no less a personage than United States Senator Theodore Francis Green, Class of '87.

Senator Green was a member of the building committee in charge of bringing into existence the recreation building known as the Brown Union.

In 1923 Senator Green wrote of his search for an identification to complement the furnishings, and at the same time to represent Brown University, and of his final selection of the Brown Bear.

"I wanted something alive, and though not human, such as we endow with humanlike qualities. First of all, I thought our symbol should be a mammal and one of fair size, so as to be capable of portrayal in the graphic and plastic arts impressively and without absurd exaggeration."

The central feature of the building was the trophy room and the central feature of the room was the great arch. Here, over the great arch, the central point of Brown student life, Senator Green placed the head of a real Brown Bear mounted on a shield, where it was discovered during the dedication ceremonies. The idea caught on at once. The following year students took a live Brown Bear to the Dartmouth game and the era of the Brown Bruin was launched.

"The Brown Bear is truly American and, most important of all, he embodies and suggests those qualities we want to emphasize," the Senator wrote. "While somewhat unsociable, he is good-natured and clean. While courageous and ready to fight, he does not look for trouble for its own sake, nor is he blood-thirsty. He is not one of a herd but acts independently. He is intelligent and capable of being educated (if caught young enough!). Remember, an athlete can make Phi Beta Kappa. Furthermore, the bear's color is brown; and its name is Brown."

Bear cub mascots appeared on the sidelines at Brown games for many years. They were presented to the University by an animal farm, and their care and feeding was entrusted to the Brown Key organization.

The live bear mascot was replaced by a costumed bear in 1963.

/ BRUINS SHOW PLUS TWO IMPROVEMENT IN '82 /

Brown University football coach John Anderson felt his 1982 football team could improve on the 1981 performance of 3-7. It did, posting a 5-5 mark and coming within three close losses of an undisputed Ivy League title.

The Bruins defeated Yale, Rhode Island, Cornell, William & Mary and Columbia. They were blitzed by Harvard and fell to Holy Cross 17-6. However, the real disappointments were close losses to Princeton (28-23), Penn (24-21) and Dartmouth (22-16).

"We outplayed all three of those teams," Anderson remarked. "We blew a 17-0 lead against Princeton, and decisively outgained both Penn and Dartmouth. We were a much better team than 1981, and I feel we will be even better this year."

One key returnee this year will be quarterback Joe Potter, who converted over from defensive back last year and proceeded to set the one-season record for total offense. He rushed 121 times for 607 yards, a 5.0 avg. and eight touchdowns, and completed 111 of 219 passes for 1,516 yards and seven TDs. His 2123 yards in total offense broke the old mark of 2067 yards set last year by Hank Landers. Potter was not the only standout, though. Offensively, Bill Barrett, Paul Farnham, Bill Flutie and

Bud Brooks contributed solid showings, and on defense, Jeff Gradinger, Dennis Slott, John Daniel and Brian O'Neill all showed well.

Potter led the Bruins in rushing. He was followed by Rod Jones with 121x463 yds. and three TDs, and Barrett with 106x368 yds. and 11 touchdowns. The leading receivers were Farnham with 34x550 yds. a 16.2 avg. and three TDs, and Flutie with 17x283 a 16.6 avg. and one TD.

Barrett led Brown in scoring with 12 touchdowns for 72 points. Those 12 TDs tied a school record. Potter was second with eight TDs for 38 points and Brooks was third with 40 points. Brooks was 5x9 on field goals and a perfect 25x25 on PATs.

Punter Pete Bogdanovich enjoyed his second straight solid year for the Bruins with 54 punts for a 39.2 avg. Brothers was the top kick returned for Brown with 20 kickoff returns for a 23.9 average.

Defensively, Gradinger tied a Brown one-season record for interceptions with seven. Slott (91), Daniel (78) and O'Neill (63) were the three leaders in tackles made. Slott missed one game with injuries and Daniel two.

As a team, Brown averaged 354 yards per game in total offense and allowed opponents 338.1.

Defensive tackle Chuck McGrath garnered a wide range of post season honors. McGrath was a Second Team I-AA All-American team choice, a First Team 1-AA All-ECAC pick and a Second Team All-New England choice.

Gradinger was both an Honorable Mention All-American choice and a Second Team All-New England selection.

Dave Folsom spent only two years at Brown, but they were meaningful ones. After a fine two-year career at Ricks Junior College, where he distinguished himself in academics and athletics, Folsom came to Brown in 1981 and maintained his fine record.

Dave started every game at defensive back over the past two seasons, totaling 74 tackles, five interceptions and six pass deflections.

In the classroom, he maintained a 3.84 average in pre-med and that performance, combined with his football accomplishments, resulted in his being awarded a National Football Foundation Postgraduate Scholarship and being named to the Academic All-American team. Offensive guard Travis Holcombe received the same awards in 1981.

Folsom's overall work becomes even more impressive when you consider that he is married; became a father last year; was the oldest member of the team since he had spent two years as a lay missionary in Taiwan before enrolling at Ricks J.C.; and was a leading administrator for the Mormon Church in Providence.

"Brown was a great experience for me," Folsom emphasized. "I will always be happy that I decided to come here. Brown gave me everything I needed to advance myself as a student, as a person and as an athlete."

Graduated fullback Bill Barrett totaled 17 touchdowns from his fullback position in 1981 and 1982.

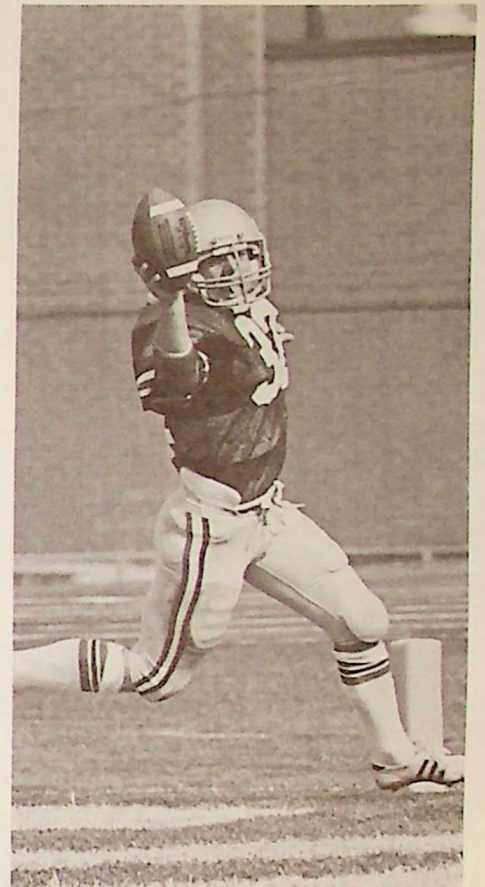

"In selecting assistant coaches, I look for people who can communicate with me and with the players. If coaches can't communicate they should not be in the profession ...

"I feel our staff is as organized as any staff in the country, but we also try to make it a fun experience ...

"College football should be a meaningful experience for the people who play the game. Formation of friendships, ability to handle pressure situations, discipline to play and study, dealing with victory and defeat in a mature way, and conditioning yourself to think of the team first are some of the things I'm talking about. And don't let anyone tell you they are easy things to do ...

"I'm proud to be a part of the Ivy League and I'm especially proud to be associated with Brown. The academic-athletic philosophy we have makes coaching a constant challenge — but a most rewarding experience ...

"I feel we offer exciting football at Brown. In the last seven years we have been below third in total offense only once, and we have been number one in two of the past five years."

John Anderson feels Brown football is on its way back to title contention in the Ivy League. After a disappointing 3-7 season in 1981 - his first losing campaign at Brown - Anderson led his team to a 5-5 record last season, and he expects even more improvement this year.

Brown football had suffered through losing seasons in 13 of the previous 14 years and had gone through eight straight losing seasons with a 12-59 record, before Anderson's arrival. John turned things around fast with imaginative two-way football, good recruiting and good assistants. Those factors helped to produce eight straight winning seasons before the 1981 campaign.

People talk a lot about a number of offensive set-ups, including the heralded multi-flex at Harvard, but the records show Brown's attack to be both multi-faceted and highly successful, and over the course of the last 10 years the Bruins' offense has no peers in the "Ancient Eight".

John W. Anderson, the 15th head coach in the 104-year history of Brown football, arrived on College Hill in 1973. Ever since then, Brown teams have successfully erased former records, accrued new honors and established themselves as annual Ivy League title contenders.

Anderson now ranks among the nation's top 30 active college football coaches with his overall collegiate record of 77 wins, 45 losses and 2 ties for a .625 percentage. His record at Brown, 56-34-2 (.620 percentage), is the best of any Brown football coach.

Anderson, the second winningest coach in the Ivy League over the past 10 years, and his staffs directed Brown to eight consecutive winning seasons from 1973-80, the longest string since 1937-42. Additionally, a Brown game has been aired on regional television in seven of the past 10 years.

Anderson's success at Brown has been an extension of a positively planned coaching career. When he accepted his first collegiate coaching position at Middlebury College, he faced the challenge of rebuilding a team which had won just eleven games in five years. Over four years, the Panthers steadily improved until Middlebury finished with an 8-0 season in 1972. Anderson's overall record at the Vermont school was 21-11.

When he came to Brown, John Anderson found a football program in trouble. The Bruins had won just one of their previous 18 games. In that first year, he removed the Bruins from the ranks of the losers. Anderson's squads were 4-3-1, 5-4, 6-2-1, and finally in 1976, 8-1, with a share of the Ivy League Championship, a first since the league was formalized in 1955. From 1977-79, the Bruins were in contention for the title until the very end and finished second each year with 7-2 (1977) and 6-3 (1978, '79) overall records. In 1980 a last minute two point conversion miss and a controversial penalty cost Brown a share of the title.

Anderson's second year, 1974, wasn't as long as the record reflects. Five games into the season, Brown had won only one game. Pressed by a questioner, Anderson noted, "We are so close, this team could win the final four." Anderson's prediction was absolutely right. The Bruins won four straight, all against league opponents, an accomplishment greater than any previous Brown team. Those victories included a 10-7 regionally televised upset of Harvard. For his team's play in that game, UPI named Anderson the National Coach of the Week.

In Anderson's third year, his team moved closer to any Ivy League title. Finishing with four consecutive wins in 1974, Brown ran off three straight victories in 1975 before losing to Harvard in a critical league showdown. The 5-1-1 Ivy League record, just one-half game behind champion Harvard, was, at the time, Brown's finest finish ever in league competition, until 1976 when Anderson's club wrote its own special piece of Ivy League history.

Brown's football team has produced National Football Foundation Scholarship winners in 1981 and 1982.

Anderson began his college coaching career at Dartmouth, where he spent one year as freshman coach and three seasons as offensive line coach under Bob Blackman, former coach at Cornell. He then moved on to Boston College where he worked as defensive line coach for one year under Joe Yukica, now head coach at Dartmouth.

Prior to his college coaching, Anderson spent seven years on the high school level in western Pennsylvania, close to his hometown of Carlisle. The high school career included a stint under Joe Yukica at Central Dauphin High in Harrisburg, followed by two head coaching positions, Selinsgrove (Pa.) High and Cumberland Valley High in Mechanicsburg.

A 1954 graduate of Ursinus College, Anderson and his wife Marjorie have three children: Kurt, a graduate of Williams College where he competed in football and hockey, Jill, a graduate of Skidmore College, and 15-year-old Scott who attends school in East Greenwich, Rhode Island.

While at Brown, the Rhode Island and the New England sportswriters have twice named Anderson Rhode Island and New England Coach of the Year and in 1976, UPI named him New England Coach of the Year. **Birthdate:** January 6, 1933

JOE WIRTH — ASSOC. HEAD COACH/DEF. COORDINATOR



Joe Wirth returned to Brown last year as associate head coach and defensive coordinator following two years as head coach at Union College.

Wirth coached the defensive line at Brown from 1973-79 before taking over at Union where he turned the Dutchmen program around. After a 1-7 campaign in 1980, he led his '81 club to a 4-4-1 mark, the first .500 or above record at the school in 10 years. One of those wins was a major 10-7 upset over Albany State.

Wirth's influence was in solid evidence last year as Brown finished second in the Ivy League in total defense.

After receiving a Bachelor's degree in physical education from West Virginia, Wirth spent four years as head wrestling coach and assistant foot-

ball coach at South Hills Catholic High in Pittsburgh.

In 1964, he returned to his alma mater, North Carolina High, as head football coach, and won the Catholic Championship in 1965.

He joined the collegiate coaching ranks in 1968 when he was named defensive coordinator and line coach at Holy Cross. In 1969, he joined the football staff at Colgate, where he held the same position until his arrival at Brown.

After graduating from high school in 1952, Wirth played semi-pro football in the Greater Pittsburgh League before entering the Army in 1954. He and his wife Carole Johnson Wirth, have six children: Tom, Joe, David, Coleen, Carolyn and Gretchen. They reside in Barrington, R.I. **Birthdate:** December 28, 1935.

RAY TELLIER — OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/OFF. BACKS



Ray joined the Brown staff as receivers coach in May, 1978 after spending one year as defensive backfield coach at Boston University. He took over the offensive backs in 1979 and last season was named offensive coordinator. A 1973 graduate of the University of Connecticut, Tellier quarterbacked the Huskies to the Yankee Conference Championship his junior year, was a two-year starter and led the Huskies to their best record in 12 years.

After earning a B.S. degree in physical education, he spent a year at UConn as a graduate assistant coach before moving to Dartmouth for one year.

Then Tellier went to Wabash College (Ind.) to coach the offensive backs and receivers for head coach Frank Navarro, now at Princeton.

A native of West Haven, Ct., Tellier attended Notre Dame High School and played football for his dad, coach Ray Tellier Sr. After directing Notre Dame to two 9-1 seasons, Tellier was twice named First Team All-State quarterback and gained All-American honors his senior year. Ray, his wife Susan Cooke Tellier, and their son Matthew reside in Lincoln, R.I. **Birthdate:** June 10, 1951.

MARK WHIPPLE — RECEIVERS



Mark was named an assistant football coach at Brown last January. Whipple, who had been an assistant football and baseball coach at Union College for the previous two years, will work with the Brown receivers this year.

Whipple was the starting quarterback at Brown in 1977 and 1978 and led the Bruins to an overall 13-5 record and a pair of second-place Ivy League finishes. He completed 175 passes in 340 attempts for 1465 yards and 13 touchdowns, during his varsity career, and also ran for 518 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Whipple is a graduate of Camelback High School in Phoenix, Ariz. where he was an All-State performer in both football and baseball. He was also a four-year baseball letter winner at Brown before

receiving his B.A. degree in political science in 1979. He worked as a graduate assistant at St. Lawrence under Andy Tally for one year before joining Joe Wirth's staff at Union. Mark is single and resides in Prov. **Birthdate:** April 1, 1957.



MIKE GOLDBERGER — DEFENSIVE BACKS

Mike came to Brown in 1973 after starring for three seasons as a defensive back on John Anderson's Middlebury College teams. He was Middlebury's captain in 1971.

Goldberger was an assistant freshman football coach during his first two seasons at Brown. In 1975 he joined the varsity staff and then in 1976 took over the secondary, which was ranked second in the nation in pass defense in 1977. He coached the tight ends as a part-time assistant in 1979, and then became head freshman coach in 1980. In two years he led the frosh to a 7-5 record. He took over his old spot as defensive backfield coach in 1982.

Last year the Bruins intercepted 16 passes, 13 more than 1981, and displayed the aggressiveness that were Goldberger trademarks in the mid 70's.

Mike has also been working as the building director for the new Olney-Margolies Athletic Center.

During the past seven springs Goldberger has served as assistant varsity baseball coach, after spending two previous seasons directing the freshman baseball program.

A native of Westbury, N.Y., Goldberger was an exceptional schoolboy athlete at W.T. Clarke High. He earned all-league honors in football and lettered in basketball and baseball.

At Middlebury, Goldberger was an outfielder/pitcher and received letters in both baseball and football while earning a Bachelor's degree in history.

After graduation, he taught math at a Vermont youth correctional center and coached part-time at Middlebury. Goldberger, his wife Kathy McDevitt Goldberger, and son Kevin reside in Barrington, R.I. **Birthdate:** October 3, 1950.

JACK CHARNEY — OFFENSIVE LINE



Jack is in his sixth year as the offensive line coach and his area of responsibility has always been one of the Bruins strongpoints.

Before he came to Brown, Charney had spent four years (1974-1977) as defensive coordinator at American International College (Mass.) and six years (1968-73) as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Norwich University. While at the Vermont school he taught physical education and attained an assistant professorship. JOHN LOVETT — LINEBACKERS



John Lovett, an assistant football coach and defensive coordinator at Union College for the past five years, was named an assistant football coach at Brown last April. Lovett will handle the linebackers for the Bruins and will be reunited with Brown Associate head coach and defensive coordinator Joe Wirth, who was head coach at Union in 1980 and 1981.

Lovett attended C.W. Post College and graduated in 1972 with a B.A. degree in History and Education. At Post, Lovett was a three-year letter winner in football and captained the Pioneers in 1971. After graduation from Post, he attended the University of Denver for two years and received an M.A. degree in Health and Education in 1975.

After teaching at St. Joseph's Regional High School in Montvale, N.J. for two years, Lovett moved to Union in 1978, and was in charge of the defensive ends and linebackers. He also directed the football team's weight-training program. In addition to his football responsibilities at Union, Lovett was the school's head coach of wrestling. **Birthdate:** December 1, 1950.

RON BROWN — FRESHMAN COACH



Ron, a 1979 Brown graduate, was appointed head freshman coach last March. The former Bruin defensive back will also help with the varsity when time allows.

Brown was a two-time first team All-Ivy pick during his career with the Bruins. He had seven interceptions in his first two seasons, then none as a senior when opponents threw away from him. He had 115 tackles in his career and was ranked as "the best safety I've ever had," by John Anderson when he closed out his career.

He had a free agent tryout with the Dallas Cowboys after graduating from Brown, but a shoulder injury ended it. He also signed contracts with the New England Patriots, the New York Jets, the

Chicago Bears and the U.S. Football League's Philadelphia Stars. Last year he was defensive backfield coach of the New Jersey Rams semi-pro football team.

A native of Vineyard Haven, Mass., he earned his A.B. degree in sociology with an emphasis on medicine and public health. He went on to grad school at Columbia, getting his M.P.H. in 1982 in health administration with specialization in health education. He also served as a program fund raiser for the Columbia Alumni Association from 1980 to 1982.

JIM TRESSLER — DEFENSIVE ENDS

Jim became a member of the Brown staff as defensive line and head wrestling coach in May of 1980. Prior to coming to Brown he had spent two seasons as an assistant football coach at the University of North Carolina. Last year, Jim began working strictly with the defensive ends, and will drop wrestling this year to focus all of his efforts on football.

A 1962 graduate of Muskingum College (N. Concord, Ohio), Tressler began his coaching career on the high school level in two highly successful programs. He spent five years (1962-66) at Sandusky (Ohio) High as head wrestling and assistant football coach and in 1965 helped direct the football team to the state championship. In 1966 he moved to Massillon (Ohio) High for two years and held the positions of defensive coordinator, head wrestling and assistant track coach.

Tressler got his start in college coaching in 1967 when his own college coach, Ken Wable, hired him as an assistant at Mount Union College (Alliance, Ohio). During his eight years there, Tressler also served as head wrestling coach and he earned his Master's degree in education at Akron University.

In 1974 Tressler moved to Miami University in Oxford, Ohio and coached the defensive line under head coach Dick Crum. When Crum took the head job at the University of North Carolina in 1978 Tressler went with him as assistant defensive line coach. In 1979 the Tar Heels finished with a 7-3-1 record and then defeated Michigan 17-15, in the Gator Bowl.

A native of Steubenville, Ohio, Tressler, his wife Janet, and their two children, Tami and Christy, reside in Barrington, R.I. **Birthplace:** April 4, 1940.

The Brown women's swimming and soccer teams were Ivy Champions last year.

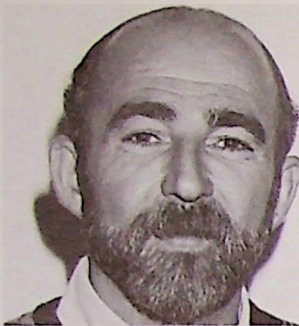

Richard C. Sardella joined the Brown Athletic Department in 1970 as ticket and business manager. In 1973, he was named assistant athletic director and on July 1, 1977 he was elevated to associate athletic director.

In 1980 he was a supervisor of athletic trainers for the Winter Olympic Games at Lake Placid. He is also associate editor of the Year Book of Sports Medicine.

TRAINER FRANK GEORGE ON INJURIES

"Injury prevention is one of the most important duties of any athletic trainer. There are many aspects of injury prevention, from screening examination, to proper conditioning programs, to the education of athletes and coaches in safe techniques of participation. Most important may be recognizing the seriousness of an injury and not allowing the athlete to continue participating until adequate healing and rehabilitation has occurred.

"Even under the most ideal conditions all who engage in physical activities are subject to the possibility of injury. Working under the supervision of the team physician, proper first aid can greatly reduce the severity of many injuries. With adequate treatment and sufficient rehabilitation, we hope to return our athletes to participation safely."

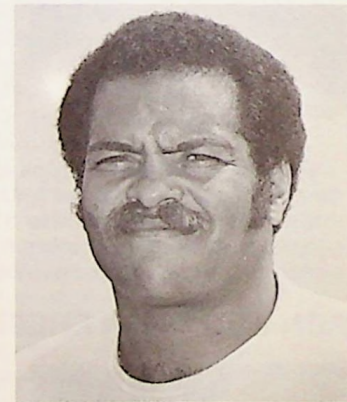

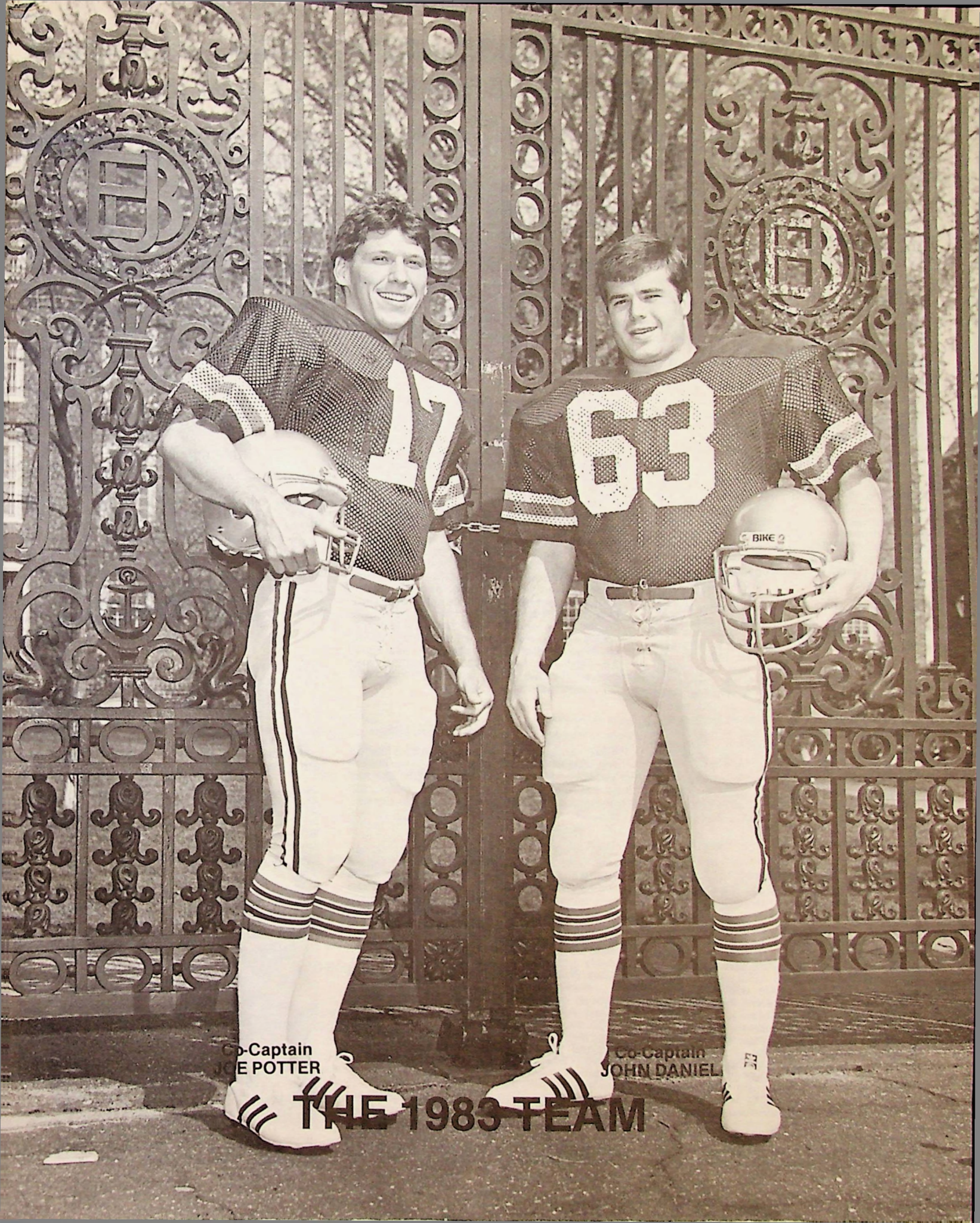

THE 1983 TEAM

/ 1983 BROWN FOOTBALL PROSPECTUS /

The Brown football team was 5-5 last year and, depending on how you look at it, the record could have been 8-2 or 2-8. Brown won decisions by seven points, four points and one point, and lost games by five points, three points and six points. Still the 5-5 mark was a two game improvement over 1981 ... The Bruins lost heavily through graduation - 21 lettermen, including 14 starters. It will be a challenging year for Head Coach John Anderson and his staff who have 32 lettermen back. Here's the outlook.

MAJOR LOSSES: On offense the losses include starting offensive guard Kevin Powers and tackle Bob Giunta, fullback Bill Barrett, tailback Rod Jones, the five leading receivers - Paul Farnham, Bill Flutie, Ron Mosley, Kelly Brothers and Rod Jones - punter Peter Bogdanovich and placekicker Bud Brooks ... Defensively, the major losses were tackle Chuck McGrath, end Mark Walsh, linebackers Dan Nelson and Pat Dillon and backs Jeff Gradinger, Dave Folsom and Steve Brown, all starters.

A LOOK AT THE OFFENSE

LINE: The Bruins lost three starters through graduation including All-Ivy and All-New England tackle Bob Giunta. There are three key returnees, though, in seniors Bob Mangiacotti (6'2, 250), at tackle, guard Jeff Trauger (6'1, 232) and center Jeff Nikor (6'3, 267). Mangiacotti and Trauger started all last season while Nikora moved over from guard to start the last seven games at center. Brown did not have a strong center on the freshman team last year so Nikora, Chris Vaughn (Jr., 6'4, 230) a fine prospect who missed 1982 with injuries, along with juniors Mike Biegalski (6'3, 225) and Mike Pindak (6'2, 220) who saw duty with the junior varsity, are the prime candidates ... At guard, senior Joe Novi (5'11, 230) and junior Mike Stypula (6'3, 235), who saw limited varsity action in 1982, and junior Matt Paknis (6'3, 237), who was injured all year, will battle for the other starting position alongside Trauger with sophomores Ron McMullen (6'3, 240) and Scott Sullivan (6'2, 220) ... J.V. performers from last season who will challenge for the second tackle position include junior Dan Devine (6'5, 240) and, maybe Paknis and McMullen ... They will be joined by sophomore prospects Richard Huffman (6'5, 235) and Bill Mitchell (6'6, 245).

RECEIVERS: Brown lost its five top receivers through graduation ... One of the losses was starting tight end Ron Mosley, but junior Rich Chapman (6'4, 235) looked good when he played and might turn out to be a major plus for the Bruins this Fall. Mike McGuire (6'5, 210) a junior varsity regular, and sophomores Greg Roth (6'3, 220) and Jay Koeper (6'4, 225), who missed most of the frosh season with injuries, are the other major hopefuls ... At **Wide Receiver**, Paul Farnham, Bill Flutie and Kelly Brothers, who were 1-2-4 in receiving, have all graduated. Senior Steve Gorriaran (5'11, 175), who missed seven games with injuries, junior Vince Stephens (5'9, 170), who was not in school last season, and junior Brad McCaulley (5'8, 161), who played well in spots, are the veteran hopefuls. Pat Turchick (6'0, 170), a walk-on who led the 1982 frosh team in receiving with 20 catches for 416 yards, and Jamie Potkul (5'9, 160) (16 x 170) are the best of last year's freshman wide receiver group ... Stephens was a running back as a sophomore, but his

great speed and moves could make him a standout receiver this year.

QUARTERBACK: Joe Potter (Jr., 6'1, 200) made the switch from defensive back to quarterback last season in superb fashion, setting a school one-season total offense record of 2,123 yards in the process ... Potter averaged 212 yards per game in total offense, ran for eight touchdowns and passed for seven. With a year of experience, he should be one of the best in the league this season. Junior Eric Rosso (6' 185), who spelled Potter last season, and sophomore Steve Kettelberger (6' 175), who passed for 632 yards and eight TDs and ran for 304 yards and five touchdowns with the freshmen last Fall, will provide solid competition for Potter.

RUNNING BACKS: Starting fullback Bill Barrett, who tied the school record for touchdowns in a season with 12, and tailback Rod Jones, who was second in rushing behind Potter, have graduated. However, there are some very solid replacements. Junior Steve Heffernan (6'0, 200) came on strong at fullback in the last two games, and senior Dave Waldron (5'11, 195) also played well. Heffernan's brother, Brian (6'2, 210), logged over 200 yards rushing and a 4.1 average for the frosh team. These three will battle for the starting job. Either one of the Heffernans could also be moved to tailback if the occasion demands. At **tailback**, the exciting Kenny Jones (Jr., 5'11, 180), who rushed for 210 yards last season and caught 10 passes, is a fine talent and could emerge as a blue chipper this season. Jeff Doherty (Jr., 5'9, 165) also showed signs of brilliance during his time on the field last season, averaging 7.6 yards for his 14 carries. Potkul, who rushed for 290 yards with the frosh, and Stephens may also be used here.

A LOOK AT THE DEFENSE

LINE: All-East and All-New England performer Chuck McGrath will be tough to replace at **tackle**. Senior Neil Monagle (6'3, 230) will be the leading contender to replace McGrath alongside returning starter Gary Cloutier (Sr., 6'2, 235) ... A good sophomore group will provide competition and depth at the tackle slot. This unit includes Richard Collett (6'1, 245), Chris Good (6'5, 220) and Paul Yonen (6'0, 225) ... At **middle guard**, John Daniel (Sr., 5'11, 220) returns. Daniel, second team All-Ivy the past two seasons, should be the top man at his position in the league. Sophomore Ted Moskala (6'0, 230), veteran Robinson Alson (Sr., 5'10, 205) and soph Tom Catena (6'2, 220) will back-up Daniel ... At end, senior Thom Heckard (6'2, 230) started every game in '82 and totaled 48 tackles. Mark Walsh, the other starter, has graduated ... Senior Terry Schoenborn (6'2, 200), who moved over from fullback last year; junior Chris Aiderman (6'4, 220), a fine prospect who missed last season with a back injury; and senior Chuck Brawley (6'0, 200), who has started several games over the past two years, will battle for the other starting position.

LINEBACKER: Seniors Dennis Slott (6'3, 230) and Brian O'Neill (6'3, 220) will anchor a fairly solid group. Slott started nine games, missing one with an injury, and O'Neill started five. Juniors Bill Kramer (5'11, 196) a hard hitter, and Mark Ogden (6'1, 214) and

sophomores Mike Giambattista (6'2, 190) and Gordon Taylor (6'2, 205) should also see a lot of action this year.

BACKS: A major rebuilding job is in order since the Bruins lost all three starters, including honorable mention All-American Jeff Gradinger ... Senior Mike Gibbons (6'1, 190), who has played extensively for two years, senior Scott Schultz (5'11, 170), and juniors Richard Gray (5'9, 160), John Monaghan (5'11, 175), Pete Gundermann (6'1, 190) and Greg Hausler (6'0, 195) will get a chance to start as will seniors Bob Chiaradio (6'0, 175), a letterman in 1981, and Jim Rhodes (6'0, 190), who both missed last year with injuries ... Again, sophomores could play a key role here ... Sophs Darren Muller (6'0, 180), who led the 1982 frosh team with four interceptions, Chris Girard (6'2, 180), Mark Kachmer (5'10, 175) and Geoff Soriano (6'1, 185) are all rated fine prospects by the Bruins' coaching staff.

KICKING GAME

Brown lost a two-time All-Ivy punter in Pete Bogdanovich, and a good placekicker in Bud Brooks, but help is on the way ... Sophomore Paul Bogdanovich (6'0, 175), Pete's brother, averaged 36 yards a punt for the frosh last year and will probably handle the varsity chores in '83 ... Senior John Gallander (6'1, 175) will battle sophomore Chris Ingerslev (5'9, 160) for the placekicking job. Ingerslev was 14x15 on PATs and 3x9 on field goals, but most of his tries were from long range.

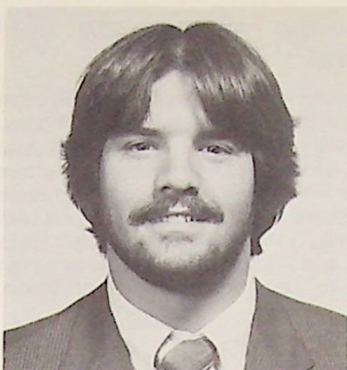
OVERALL

"We have some big gaps to fill in every area, but especially on the offensive line, and in the defensive backfield," Head Coach John Anderson remarked. "There are a lot of question marks. I feel we will have more team speed this season, and probably more depth. If we solve our problems in the aforementioned areas, we can be very competitive within the Ivy League."

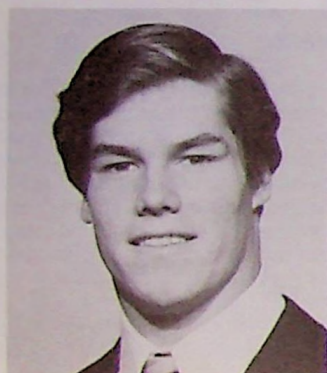


Potter

Joe authored some exciting scoring runs including a 49 yarder vs. URI, a 55 yarder vs. Princeton and a 31 yarder vs. Cornell. Potter, who consistently came up with the big play, was named to the ECAC Weekly honor roll four times, was an Honorable Mention All-New England and All-Ivy selection, and won the New England Football Writers Golden Helmet Award for his performance in the 23-22 win over William & Mary when he rallied the Bruins back from a 22-9 second half deficit ... a severe case of flu. On Friday I was told that I would make the trip and, if able, to play the game.

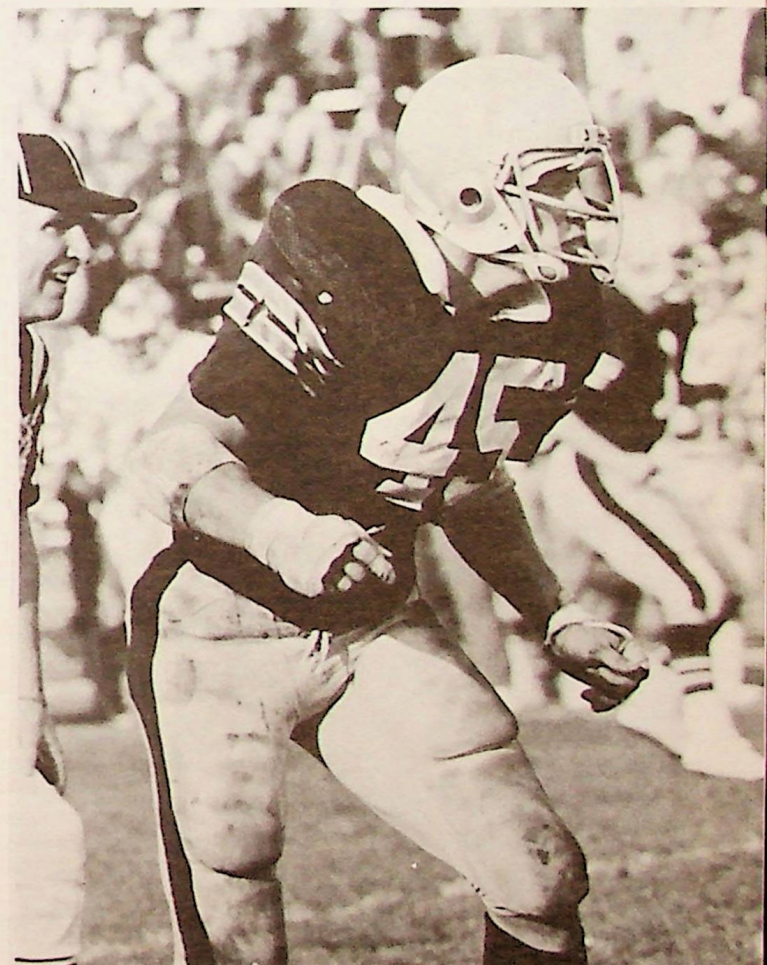
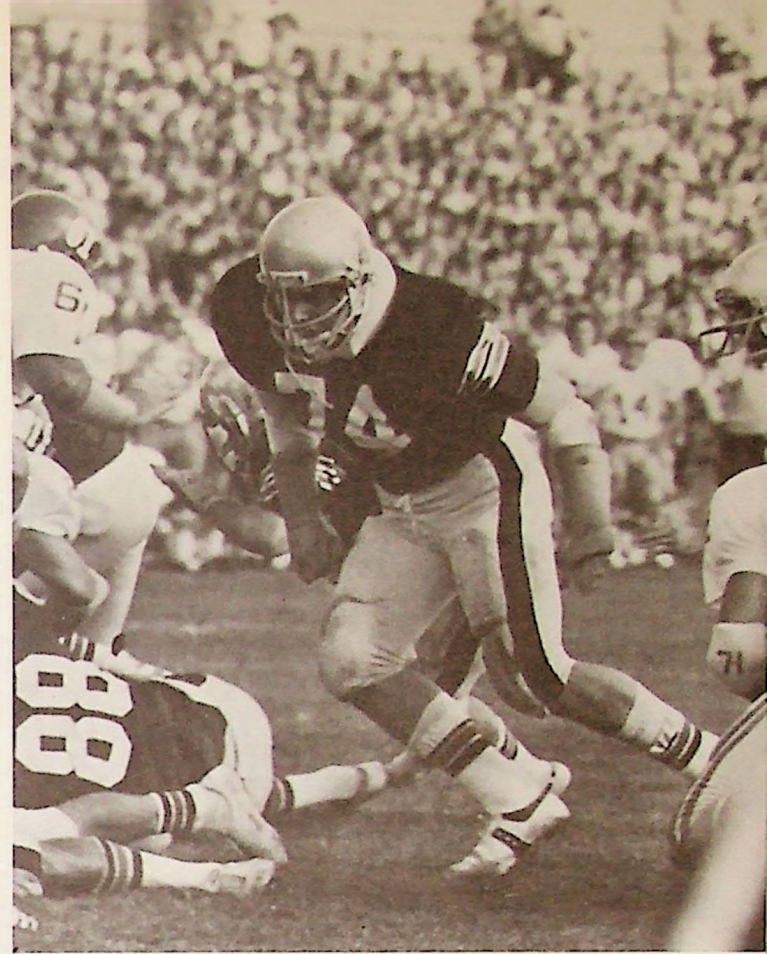
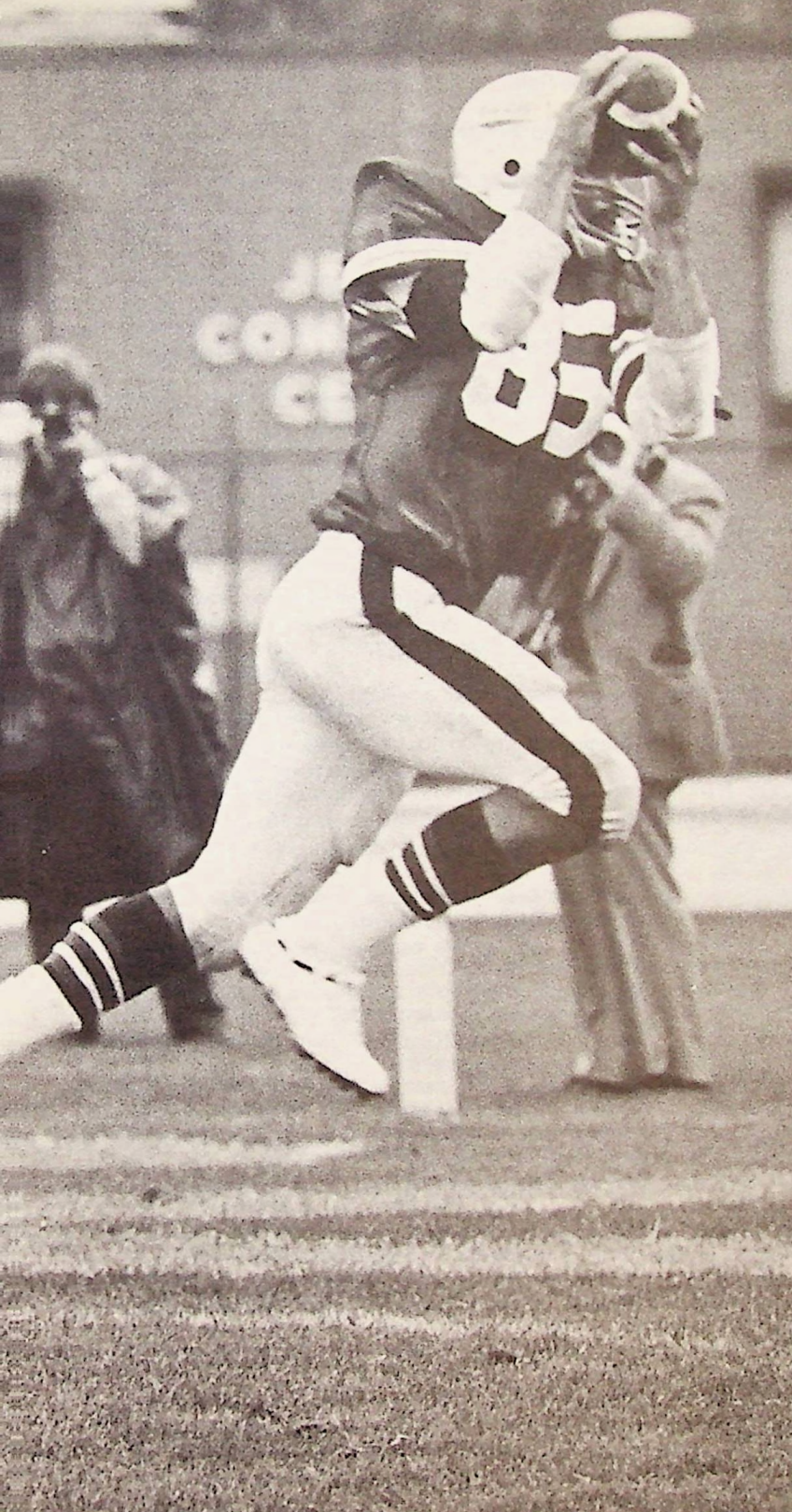

Nov. 13, 1878 — Brown plays its first game of intercollegiate football travelling to Amherst to do battle with the Lord Jeffs.

Nov. 24, 1895 — In first meeting with Dartmouth at Outing Park, Springfield, Mass. Brown wins, 20-4.

Nov. 29, 1894 — The first Thanksgiving Day game in Brown's history, a 20-4 victory over MIT at Adelaide Park, Providence.

1894 Season — Paced by its first set of touchdown twins, William Burr Hopkins and Charles D. Millard, Brown finishes the season 10-4 and is ranked fifth in the nation.

1896 Season — Brown may not have had the best team in the country, but it did have the richest manager — John D. Rockefeller, Jr. '97.

Nov. 6, 1898 — Willie Richardson kicks first Brown field goal in 16-5 victory over the Newton A.C.

1899 Season — Brown moves into its new football home on Camp Street. Called Andrews Field after former Brown president, Benjamin Andrews, the field remained Brown's football home through the 1925 season.

Nov. 30, 1899 — In its first inter-sectional game, Brown meets the University of Chicago at Marshall Field on Thanksgiving Day.

Oct. 18, 1902 — Capt. Tom Barry scores all Brown's points on TD runs of 50 and 31 yards and on a 28-yard field goal as Bruins beat Penn for the first time, 15-6, at Franklin Field.

Nov. 25, 1905 — The bear makes its first appearance as a Brown mascot at the Dartmouth game in Hanover.

Sept. 29, 1906 — The forward pass was legalized for the 1906 season and QB Vic Schwartz threw the first pass for Brown in the opener against New Hampshire.

Nov. 24, 1906 — Halfback Johnny Mahew scored twice on spectacular runs in 23-0 victory over Dartmouth and becomes first Bruin named to Walter Camp's All-America first team.

Sept. 26, 1908 — QB Bill Sprackling completes first Brown TD pass, a 40-yarder to end Spike Dennie.

Nov. 5, 1910 — Sprackling has the greatest day of any Brown back in leading Brown to 21-0 victory over Yale. He kicked three field goals and accounted for 456 yards.

Jan. 1, 1916 — Brown meets Washington State in first official Rose Bowl game.

Nov. 18, 1916 — Fritz Pollard has two TDs and gains 140 yards rushing in leading Brown to 21-0 victory over Harvard and earning first team All-America honors from Walter Camp.

Oct. 24, 1925 — Brown Stadium is dedicated during Brown-Yale game before 27,000.

Oct. 23, 1926 — The Brown Iron Men team is born as 11 starters play full 60 minutes in 7-0 victory over Yale at Yale Bowl.

Nov. 25, 1926 — Close to 30,000 see Brown end the season undefeated after battling Colgate to 10-10 tie on Thanksgiving Day morning at Brown Stadium.

1932 Season — Brown's Cinderella team meets previous undefeated opponent eight straight weeks, defeating URI, Springfield, Yale, Tufts, Harvard, Holy Cross, and Columbia before losing Thanksgiving morning to undefeated, untied, and unscored-upon Colgate before 33,000, the largest home crowd in Brown history.

Nov. 24, 1938 — In a Turkey Day thriller, Shine Hall scores 27 points in leading Brown to a 36-27 victory over Columbia and its star, Sid Luckman.

Oct. 10, 1942 — Junior Halfback Bob Margarita sets an all-time Brown record with 233 yards rushing in 28-21 victory over Columbia and its star, Paul Governelli.

Nov. 24, 1949 — Trailing 26-7 with 17 minutes left, Brown rallies to crush Colgate, 41-26, Thanksgiving morning on the running and passing of Joe Paterno.

Oct. 4, 1958 — With fullback Paul Choquette rushing for 113 yards, Brown beats strong Yale team, 35-29.

Oct. 13, 1973 — Using rollout quarterback Dennis Coleman the first half and passing quarterback Pete Beatrice after intermission, Brown befuddles Yale, 34-25, for Coach Anderson's first victory.

November, 1976 — Brown defeats Harvard, Dartmouth, and Columbia in the final three games to gain a share of the Ivy League title.

Nov. 5, 1977 — Ruben Chapa's 32-yard field goal with 9 seconds left gives Brown 13-10 victory over Dartmouth at Hanover.

1978 Season — Centennial Anniversary.

Nov. 4, 1978 — Rick Vilella snares two point conversion pass from Mark Whipple in final minutes as Brown comes from behind to nip Harvard, 31-30, in Cambridge.

Oct. 20, 1979 — The Bruins put together near flawless game while beating high flying Cornell, 28-7, at Brown Stadium.

1980 Season — Bruins beat Princeton, Cornell and Columbia for eighth straight year under John Anderson.

1982 Season — Brown beats Yale for first time since 1976, 28-21.

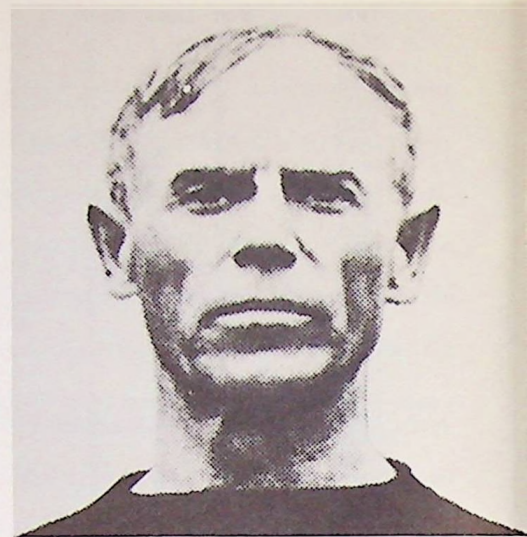

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the downtown A.C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeORMAND (Tuss) McLAUGHRY

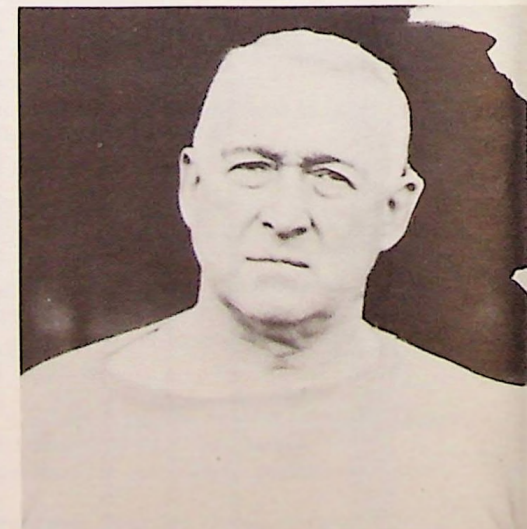
A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Sharon, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War II. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history, His 1928 and 1932 teams lost only one game. Before leaving Brown for Dartmouth in 1951, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He died in 1975.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS (Fritz) POLLARD '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest black players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New Rochelle, N.Y.

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892 when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid

Take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

WILLIAM EARL SPRACKLING, '12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aeriels, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910. He owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-11 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. Born in Cleveland, Ohio on September 6, 1890, he died on March 27, 1980.

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

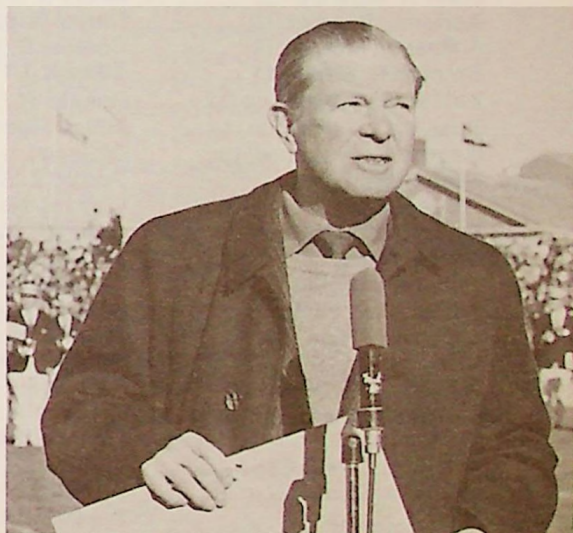
A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N.C.

CHARLES A. "RIP" ENGLE

the latest member of Brown's football family inducted into the Hall of Fame is Charles "Rip" Engle, head coach of the Bruin gridiron teams from 1944 through 1949 and then head mentor at Penn State until his retirement in 1966. Engle was inducted January, 1973. Recognized as one of the top coaches in his profession, Engle guided Brown to a 28-20-4 record in six years, including marks of 7-2-0 and 8-1-0 his final two seasons. His success at Penn State, where he compiled a 104-48-4 record, was amazing. He guided Penn State to post-season Bowl appearances almost every season, or so it seemed, and he coached in all-star games too numerous to mention. Engle learned his football under the old master, Dick Harlow, while at Western Maryland. He graduated in 1930 and moved into the high school ranks, where he coached at Waynesboro High (Pennsylvania) for 11 years. He joined the Bruin staff in 1942 as an assistant to Neil "Skip" Stahley and when the latter entered the Navy, Engle was appointed head coach. Engle passed away earlier this year.

A LOOK AT SOME OF THE EARLY INDUCTEES

Joseph "Iron Joe" Coulter '05, set a record in Brown football that never can be surpassed when he played every minute of every game for four years.

Frank E. "Spike" Dennie '09, end, had the unusual record of making Walter Camp's second All-American team in 1908 and repeating ten years later on Camp's All Service team 1918, while an officer with the 89th Division.

The captain of the 1911 gridmen was **W. Earl Sprackling '12**, Brown's three time All-American, a brilliant quarterback and one of the toughest men ever to wear a Brown uniform.

Another mighty mite of Brown's early years was **George "Kid" Crowther '13**, weight 133 lbs. He was so small that Percy Haughton, famous Harvard coach, begged Brown Coach Ed Robinson to take Crowther out of the game before he was hurt, only to turn and see him gaining ground through the legs and over the backs of the Harvard lineman. In 1912 Crowther was selected as first team All-American quarterback.

The game was won in the last 13 seconds when Marty Moran kicked the extra point. There were three reasons why the game sticks out in my mind.

I was in on the final drive and can still remember a downfield block on their linebacker as Frank Finney rolled out into the end zone.

3. Finally, the score itself — how many games do we get involved in that go down to the wire.

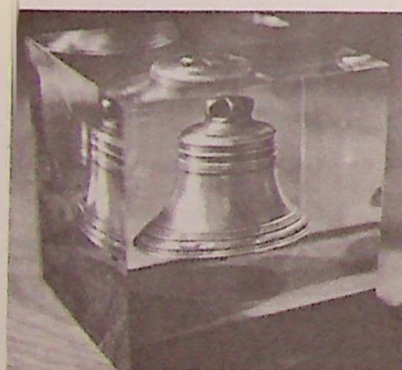
Brown 17, Harvard 7

We did not have a good season in my senior year (2-6-1). Yet, the team never gave up despite only 38 men on the varsity and most of the starters averaging 58 minutes. Typical of this determination was the upset of Harvard which followed Harvard's consecutive victories over Penn (League champion) and Princeton and its subsequent victory over Yale. It maintained our victory string over Harvard (seven years in a row) and provided a bright light at the end of a tough season.

/ THE IRON MEN /

A legend will come alive again this year. The Iron Men of Brown — and what a legend they are — will be 57 years young.

The Iron Men! A nickname to stir the memories of the old raccoon coat crowd and arouse the curiosity of those who have grown to gridiron maturity in the years that have followed.

Ah, 1926 — the height of the Roaring 20's. The nation was 150 years old, President Coolidge was in his second term, the nation wept when Rudolph Valentino died, and all college hops were sure to include that new rival of the Charleston — the Black Bottom.

People were being shocked by "The Great Gatsby," the Broadway set was enjoying a successful season with "The Desert Song," "Rio Rita," and the nation was singing "Baby Face," "Charmaine," "In a Little Spanish Town," and the haunting "Blue Room" by Rodgers and Hart.

This was the age of the hip flask, the garter flask, bath tub gin, and the speakeasy. It was also the age of Ruth, Dempsey, Tilden, Jones, Rockne, Grange, the Four Horsemen — and the Brown Iron Men. Athletic heroes were in great demand in the Roaring 20's. The Iron Men filled the bill, and few college teams before or since have captured the heart of a nation as did those 11 heroes of the Jazz Age. People from all sections of the country, many of whom knew little about football or Brown, waited anxiously each weekend to see how those lads from Providence made out.

Obviously, a team of such renown grows legendary and maybe on this 57th Reunion it might be in order to set the record straight. The four most common observations heard are: 1) The Iron Men played every minute of every game; 2) Brown was unscored upon in 1926; 3) the Bruins went to the Rose Bowl; 4) this was Brown's only undefeated team.

Of these four statements, only the last one is true. The Iron Men didn't play every minute of every game. They earned their nickname by playing only two complete games, Yale and Dartmouth, back-to-back. To refute another story, the Bears were not unscored upon in 1926. They gave up 36 points in 10 games, 26 of them by the scrubs. Finally, it was the 1915 Brown team, not the Iron Men, that went to the Rose Bowl.

How did the Iron Men happen? Well, when Coach Tuss McLaughry, in his first year at Brown, greeted his 23 hopefuls at Quonset Point, he had no idea of turning 11 of them into men of iron. Capt. Hal Broda sums up the success of the team with one word — "moxie." According to Hal, the men would fight each other tooth and nail in the daily scrimmages but when Saturday afternoon came they would close ranks and play together as a unit.

The impetuous nature of the Iron Men resulted in several rhubarbs. Captain Broda and his men had a habit of talking to the opposing players, usually in language that

even today might be censored. Against Yale, the Brown linemen kept needling one burly Eli tackle to the point where he lost his composure and took a swing at a Bruin. This cost Yale 15 yards. Later in the game, when an official tuned in on some of the jockeying, Brown was set back 15 yards.

The next week against Dartmouth, the Iron Men opened up on the Indians' great All-American, Eddie Dooley. When the Big Green star entered the game late in the opening period, Paul Hodge and Orland Smith joined hands in daisy chain fashion and danced and danced around the Indian star, all the while singing an improvised chorus of that song hit of the day, "Oh Mr. Dooly-ooley-ooley." Brown received an "A" for the music and 15 yards for the lyrics.

Before the Harvard game, the referee called Captain Broda to one side and solemnly said, "I want it definitely understood, Mr. Broda, that we want no talking to the opposition by your men this afternoon." Broda solemnly nodded in agreement, then in a less serious mood, the referee added, "I've heard a great deal from other officials about the caustic comments you fellows employ. Personally, I'd like to hear you in action. But every time I do it will cost Brown 15 yards."

Tuss McLaughry used all 23 players in the first four games without settling on any "first" team. Then on Oct. 23 in the Yale Bowl, the Iron Men legend was born. McLaughry admitted later that he had planned to substitute freely against Yale, but something, maybe fate, made him change his mind. Brown took an early 7-0 lead and those 11 starters stayed in there all the way, protecting the advantage against the heavily favored Bulldogs.

The next morning, newspapers all across the country sang the praises of the "gallant 11 iron men from Providence." Seven days later, the Iron Men played 60 minutes again as the Bears clawed Dartmouth, 10-0. Later, against Harvard, the Iron Men played the first 57 minutes and built up a 14-0 lead. Then with the crowd roaring to "leave them in," Coach McLaughry pulled his starters to let the subs earn their letters. The subs, incidentally, pushed over another TD for good measure to make the final, 21-0.

On Thanksgiving morning, Colgate blotted an otherwise perfect record by holding the Iron Men to a 10-10 tie.

Brown trailed 3-0 at the half, but early in the third period, Dave Mishel kicked a 34-yard field goal. Then Ed Lawrence raced 71 yards behind key blocks by Lou Farber and Al Cornsweet, to set up a dive into the end zone by Randall. Now the Iron Men led, 10-3, and things were finally going according to plan.

Then Colgate surprised the Bruins with a 50-yard pass play that set up the tying touchdown early in the fourth period. The crowd was getting its money's worth. The game had fake punts, passes thrown from the end zone (Mishel completed one to Towle for 28 yards), end-around plays. Colgate even

pulled a fast one, a quick kick coming out of the huddle.

Colgate had taken Brown's passing game away and the Bears were having trouble getting good field position. Then Randall boomed a punt 55 yards down field which Broda downed on the Colgate three. Dumont of Colgate hurried his return punt and Brown had the ball at the 24. The Bears drove to the nine and when the march was halted Dave Mishel stepped back to the 15 for a field goal from directly in front of the posts. An accomplished drop-kicker who hadn't missed an extra point all season, Mishel calmly dropped the ball to the ground and kicked it. The ball started true but then with the mythical Eastern title on the line — it curved left, hit the upright, and bounced back to the field of play.

And that's the way it ended, 10-10. Roger Birtwell of the Boston Post called it "one of the most thrilling and superbly played games that has ever taken place on any field." The Iron Men, with only one substitute, Curley Edes, had completed their job and had become part of football history. They will remain a part of that history as long as the game is played.

The Iron Men of 1926 represent an era that we are not likely to see again. Could the Iron Men stand up to a modern team, with its offensive and defensive specialists? Probably not. Yet, one Iron Man, tackle Paul Hodge, didn't necessarily buy this theory.

Hodge was seated in his customary spot in the University Club having lunch one day in the late 1960's when Brown was having a less than successful season. "Do you think your Iron Men could beat this Brown team?" a needler asked. "I think we could stay with them for about three periods," Hodge replied. "But remember, most of us are in our 60's now."

BROWN IN FIRST OFFICIAL ROSE BOWL — 1916

Since the late 1940's, Rose Bowl participants have been representatives of the Pacific-8 and Big Ten Conferences. It has not always been so, however. It was under Ed Robinson, a graduate in 1896 and for many years head coach, that Brown journeyed westward in 1915 to play in the first Tournament of Roses New Year's Day classic at Pasadena, California.

The Bruins were chosen as the Eastern representative after posting a 5-3-1 mark. Those losses came via a 7-0 setback to Amherst and 6-0 to Syracuse, a 16-7 loss to Harvard and a scoreless game with Trinity. Brown outscored its opponents 167-32 that year, defeating URI 38-0, Williams 33-0, Vermont 46-0, Yale 3-0 and much heralded Carlisle 39-3.

In that first game, played January 1, 1916, Brown, with its brilliant Fritz Pollard, was opposed by the powerful team of Washington State. It came up mud on that day memorial in Brown gridiron history and Pollard was unable to cut loose as he had been accustomed to do on Eastern gridirons. WSU won, 14-0, but to Brown always will belong the distinction of having been the first Eastern team to play in the Rose Bowl.

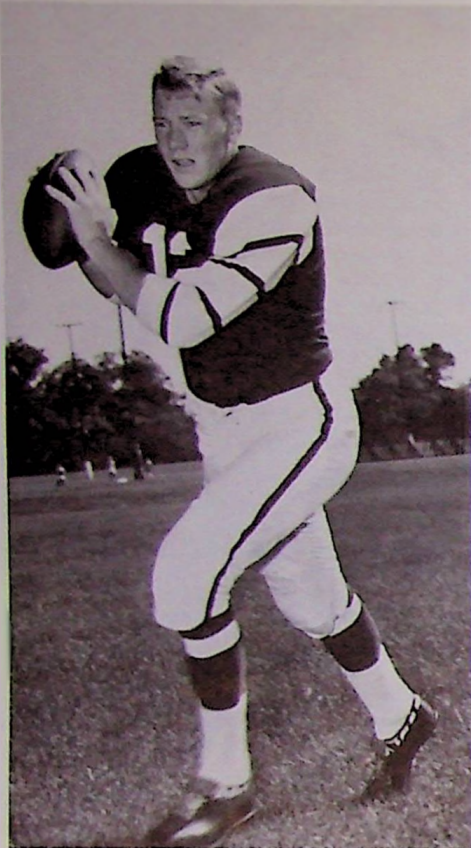

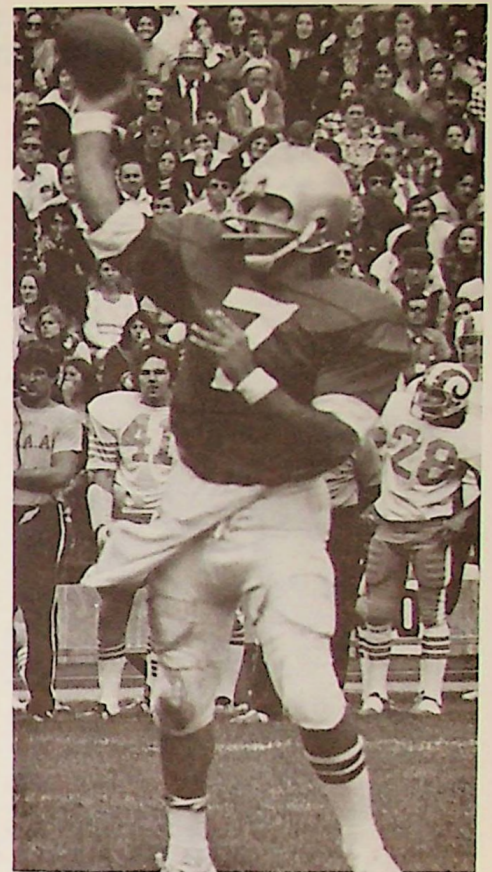

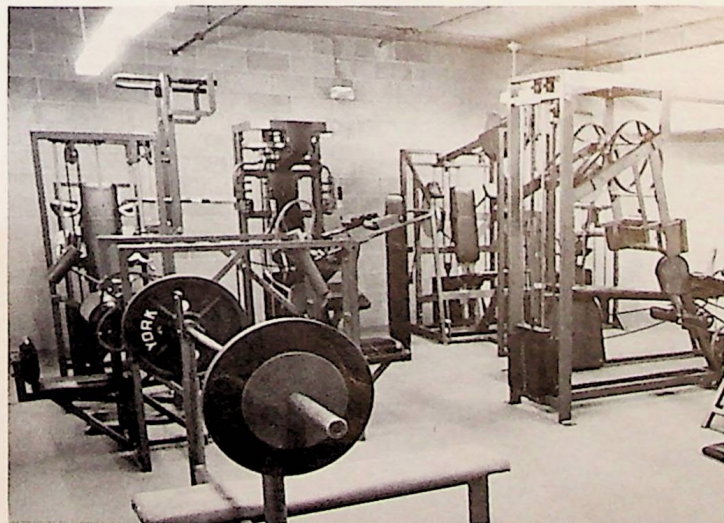
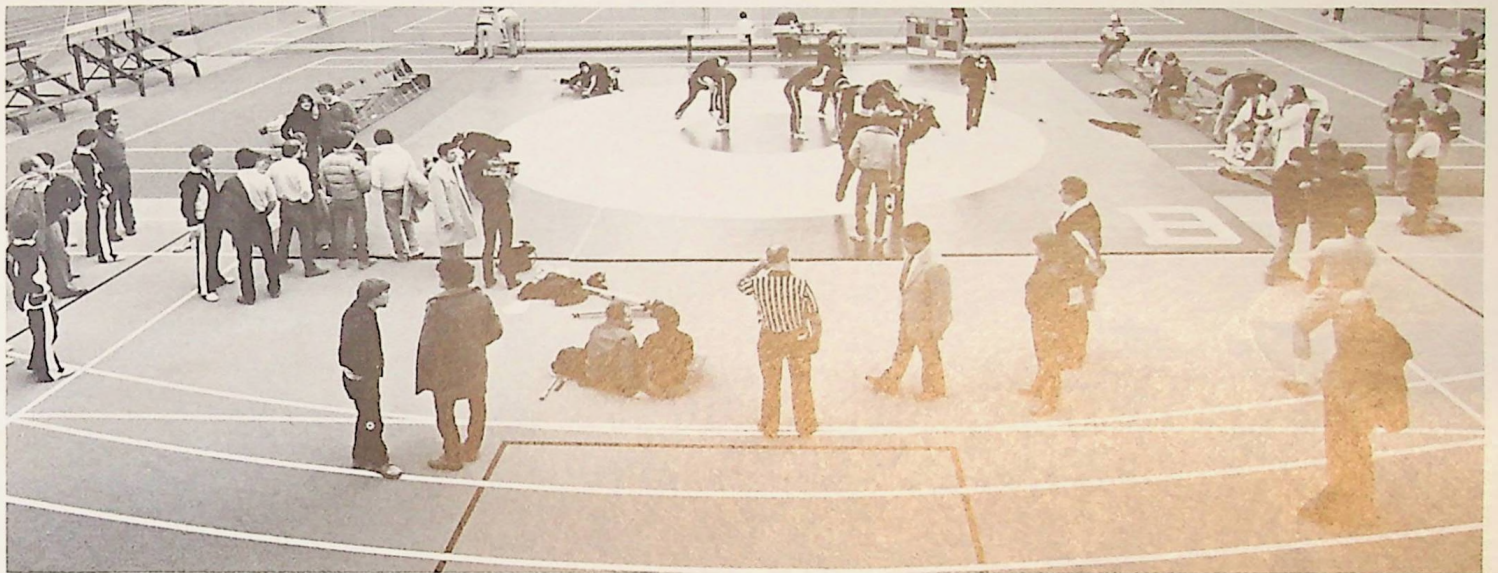
