2005 SEASON OUTLOOK

With six starters returning from Cal's successful 2004 lineup, the Golden Bears could be on the brink of one of their best seasons in Cal history, vying for their fifth consecutive NCAA tournament berth. Sixth-year head coach Kevin Grimes will look to his veteran seniors, all of whom were 2004 postseason honorees, to lead the Bears into yet another NCAA tournament.

Last season marked the fourth year in a row that Cal earned an NCAA tournament berth. It's 2-1 first-round overtime win over No. 17 Santa Clara was Cal's third postseason victory in school history. The Bears finished the regular season tied for second in the Pac-10 at 4-3-1, concluding the year 13-4-3 overall.

While Cal loses six seniors from the 2004 squad, it retains six experienced seniors and welcomes back 18 lettermen. First-team All-Pac-10 leading scorer, senior Nick Hatzke, will be forced to redshirt this season after tearing his ACL this past April. He will be missed this season but looks to come back healthy for the 2006 season. Grimes and the 2005 squad also look forward to the arrival of the deep and talented recruiting class, with eight incoming freshmen and one sophomore transfer, all eager to contribute immediately.

"We are all looking forward to the 2005 season," Grimes said. "The 2004 season we had some great success. Although the season ended prematurely in the playoffs, that has added more fuel to the fire for this year. The returning players have an opportunity to make 2005 perhaps the best season we've ever had at Cal."

FORWARDS

Cal's forward line brings remarkable experience and talent to the field with seniors **Pieter Berger** and **Calen Carr** up front. Carr earned first-team All-Pac-10 and first-team All-Academic Pac-10 honors for the second time in his career while contributing five goals and four assists. A first-team Pac-10 All-Academic for the second year in a row, Berger recorded three game-winning goals for the Bears last season, while being named to the 2004 CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII men's soccer team.

The Golden Bears will also be looking for significant contributions from Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention junior **Matt Holtrust**, sophomore **Javier Hil** and sophomore **Luke Sassano** who will also contribute to the midfield.

"Our forward line is very deep and talented," said Grimes. "Calen Carr and Pieter Berger have a tremendous amount of talent and experience. We also have a younger core of forwards in Javier Hill, Luke Sassano and Matt Holtrust that add quality depth up front."

MIDFIELDERS

The midfield continues to be deep for the 2005 season, with four returning players taking the field and six newcomers who will be battling for playing time. Although playing time may be hard to come by in the crowded group, Grimes looks forward to the competition it will spawn.

"Our midfield has always been a strength of our team, particularly the depth," said Grimes. "We have plenty of players who can contribute again this year. Andrew Jacobson will return this season and Eric Ebert, who made great strides as a sophomore, looks to have a breakout year."

Junior **Eric Ebert**, an All-Pac-10 team honoree, had a successful 2004 season starting 19 of 20 games and scoring four goals, three of which were game-winners. Ebert will be joined by sophomore **Andrew Jacobson**, who will eagerly return to the field this year after spending the 2004 season rehabbing. Playing beside him will be sophomore **Luke Sassano**, who looks to contribute significantly to the midfield position this year. The midfield will also gain substantial momentum from the highly touted freshmen **Michael Nieraeth**, **Ryan Villalpando**, **Ian Ebert**, **Pat Marion**, **Tyler Barry** and transfer **Brad Yuska**.

DEFENDERS

After the adjustments made this past spring, this year's back line remains one of the Pac-10's stingiest defenses. The starting back four is comprised of two seniors and two juniors, who have combined for 159 starts and 187 appearances. All-Pac-10 second team **Tyson Wahl** anchors the defense, having started every game for Cal during his career. Wahl is joined by fellow senior **Angel Quintero**, who recorded three assists last season and earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention.

The back four will also be counting on the junior trio, **Justin Delacruz**, **Steve Purdy** and **Andrew Felder**. Purdy, an All-Pac-10 pick, started all 20 games for the Bears and looks to make significant contributions to the defense. Felder was active in six games last season and will look to earn some more playing time this season. Delacruz played in 17 games last season and will look to play a large role in the back line.

Sophomore **Jeff Serafini** and incoming freshman **Kyle Rice** will be expected to make an impact coming off the bench.

"The adjustments that we have made this past spring in our back line have turned out to be great ones," said Grimes. "With the presence of Tyson Wahl, Steve Purdy and Angel Quintero, our back four hasn't missed a beat. Andrew Felder and Jeff Serafini have also made a significant contribution to the back four."

GOALKEEPERS

Cal is blessed with depth in the net. Four goalkeepers will be competing for the starting job this fall, including two keepers with All-Pac-10 experience.

Returning starter, All-Pac-10 second-team senior **Eric Kronberg**, provided solid defense for the Bears last season, starting in 19 out of 20 games. Kronberg recorded 61 saves and posted eight shutouts, which ranks fourth in Cal history. Also vying for playing time is junior **Mike Oseguera**, an All-Pac-10 honoree in 2003, who recorded six saves last season and boasted a goals-against average of 0.70.

Sophomore **Justin Myers** and freshman **Stefan Frei** also look to battle for playing time in the goal.

"All four of our goalkeepers have great qualities in their game," said Grimes. "This position has the most competition for playing time out of any other on the field."

SCHEDULE

For one of the toughest schedules in the nation, one needs to look no further than Cal. Eight of their 18 opponents were in the 2004 NCAA tournament. Five of Cal's opponents this year finished 2004 ranked in the top 25 in the nation, including UCLA (No. 3), UC Santa Barbara (No. 5), Washington (No. 15), San Francisco (No. 19) and Santa Clara (No. 20). Luckily for the Bears, they found themselves with a preseason national ranking of their own, at No. 20. That ranking will be put to the test throughout the season, as the Bears face three 2004 conference champions, in USF (WCC), UCSB (Big-West) and UCLA (Pac-10). While Cal must face one challenge after another as it works the way through the 2005 schedule, the Bears are primed for the journey. "Once again, Cal is going to have a top 10 (in the nation) strength of schedule ranking," Grimes said. "Our players and coaches wouldn't want it any other way."

Sixth Year at Cal



Head coach Kevin Grimes enters his sixth season as the leader of the California men's soccer program after coming off his best season as a Golden Bear. The continued momentum of the men's soccer program is evident heading into 2005.

Grimes led the Golden Bears to their fourth consecutive NCAA tournament appearance and along the way achieved his 50th career victory in the Oct. 21, 3-0 win over UC Davis. Fifty wins is an accomplishment achieved by only four Cal coaches. Legendary Cal player and coach Bob DiGrazia is No.1 on the list, with 202 career victories.

Highlights of the 2004 season featured an overtime victory over No. 17 Santa Clara to advance to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Cal finished the season 13-4-3 overall, tied for second in the Pac-10 at 4-3-1. The Bears matched a program-high nine game unbeaten streak to kick off the season and defeated No. 3 Santa Clara 1-0 to capture the Stanford Nike Invitational title, which ended a 15-match home win streak for the Broncos. Late in the season Cal had two exciting double overtime victories over rival Stanford, winning 3-2, and against No. 5 Washington, coming out with the 1-0 win.

In 2003 Grimes led the Bears to their third consecutive NCAA tournament, beating San Jose State 2-0 to advance to the second round of the tournament. Cal finished the season 11-9-2 overall, tied for third in the Pac-10 at 5-4-1. Highlights from the 2003 season include a two-game sweep of rival Stanford, as well as a four-game winning streak which included two wins over 2003 WAC champions San Jose State. Other key games include an early season 0-0 draw against No. 6 nationally ranked Santa Clara, as well as a late season 1-0 road victory against No. 8 Washington.

Grimes led the Bears squad to a 14-6-2 mark in 2002. The season marked Grimes' second consecutive winning campaign and second consecutive NCAA tournament bid. He was rewarded by being named the NSCAA/adidas Division I Far West Region Coach of the Year, becoming only the third Golden Bears coach, Bob DiGrazia (1977) and Bill Coupe (1983), to receive this award.

The regular-season highlights included a nine-match winning streak that stretched over a month and 1-0 regular-season wins over eventual NCAA finalists UCLA and Stanford. Even more remarkable was Cal's 10-1-0 record at home serving notice to the country that Goldman Field was not a welcome place to play.

Head Coach Kevin Grimes has taken Cal to the NCAA Tournament the last four seasons.

Cal's first postseason victory came in 2002 over UC Santa Barbara, 2-1, in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Although the Bears fell to eventual champion UCLA in the third round, 3-2, they finished the season ranked No. 14 in the country. Grimes had Cal on its way to becoming a premier program in the nation.

In 2001, Grimes guided Cal to a number of big victories that would later play a vital role in the Bears' first postseason berth in five years. After starting the season 1-3, Cal upset then-No. 14 San Jose State, 3-2. The win proved to be pivotal as Cal proceeded to reel off six consecutive games without a loss.

Other key victories in Grimes' sophomore season at the helm included a 1-0 overtime win over Santa Clara and a 1-0 upset of then-No. 3 Washington. Making his first appearance in the NCAA Tournament as the Bears' coach, Grimes faced Santa Clara in the first round of the NCAA playoffs. The Bears fell short against the Broncos, 1-0, giving up the game-winning goal with just over two minutes to play in the third overtime period.

Grimes also had bright moments in his first season as Cal's coach when he led the Bears to a 1-0 victory over then-No. 7 ranked UCLA. After dropping the next two games, Grimes guided his team to the biggest victory of 2000 when Cal toppled No. 3 Indiana, 2-1.

Grimes, 37, came to Cal after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Southern Methodist, for three seasons. During his tenure at SMU, the Mustangs recorded a 50-11-2 record and earned three NCAA Tournament bids.

Before joining the SMU coaching staff, Grimes spent three seasons (1995-97) as coach of the Mission Viejo (CA) Pateadores Soccer Club, which is one of the nation's premier soccer clubs with numerous players competing at Division I programs across the country. He also coached the Irvine (CA) High School girls' varsity team from 1995-97 and the San Juan (CA) Soccer Club from 1993-94.

Originally from St. Louis, Mo., Grimes was a stellar soccer player in high school. In 1986, he was named a Parade All-American and Parade Magazine's National Defender of the Year as a senior at Rosary High School.

As a collegiate athlete, Grimes helped build the SMU program into one of the nation's perennial soccer powers from 1986-89. A two-year team captain, he was a two-time first team All-American and a two-time Herman Award Finalist, which is given annually to the best collegiate men's and women's soccer players. Grimes graduated from SMU in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in economics.

Grimes played with the U.S. National team from 1988-91, acquiring seven full international caps and appearing in more than 50 matches. He went on to play professional soccer for eight years, most recently with the Orange County Zodiac of the A-League in 1997, where he was selected to the A-League All-Star Game in Rochester, N.Y. Grimes spent early 1996 with the San Jose Clash (now Earthquakes) of Major Soccer League.

Grimes' coaching credentials also include both the U.S. Soccer Federation "A" license and the National Soccer Coaches Association Advanced National license.

Grimes and his wife, Nori, reside in El Cerrito.



ASSISTANT COACHES

BRAD AGOOS

*Assistant Coach
Sixth Season at Cal*



Brad Agoos, who has a long history of winning as a player and coach, enters his sixth season as an assistant coach for the California men's soccer team.

Agoos, 34, joined the Cal program in 2000 after spending the previous seven years playing professionally, most recently in 1999 for Quick Den Haag of the Dutch Third Division. He also has played professionally for AC Santa Barbara of the Costa Rican First Division, the Worcester Wildfire of the A-League, D.C. United of Major League Soccer, along with three seasons in the USISL and one season in Germany.

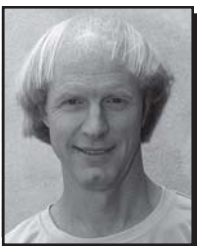
In the coaching ranks, Agoos was a volunteer coach in 1998 for the University of San Francisco and in 1996 for the University of North Carolina-Charlotte, which advanced to the NCAA Final Four. Agoos was also a player and coach for the Vermont Voltage (PDSL). In addition, he has expertise developing youth players, including in 1994-95 when he coached the Park Sharon Soccer Club in Charlotte, N.C.

Agoos' credentials include a U.S. Soccer Federation "A" badge and a KNVB Trainer Coach III license.

Prior to joining the professional ranks, Agoos won three national championships as a midfielder at the University of Virginia from 1989-93, under now U.S. National team head coach Bruce Arena. Agoos was named MVP of the 1993 ACC Tournament and currently ranks third all-time for assists in Cavalier history.

HENRY FOULK

*Goalkeeper Coach
Sixth Season at Cal*



Henry Foulk, a nationally-regarded goalkeeper at California from 1981-83, returns to his alma mater for a sixth season as the goalkeeper coach.

A three-time All-Pacific Conference selection, Foulk ranks second in Cal history with a lifetime 0.90 goals-against average and fourth with 20 career shutouts. He also ranks among the school's all-time best in the season record books with a 0.74 GAA in 1981 (third) and eight shutouts in both 1981 and '83 (fourth).

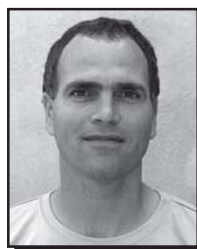
Foulk was a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic soccer team, which did not compete in Moscow due to the U.S. boycott of the Games.

After graduating from Cal in 1984, Foulk gained many years of professional playing experience, including with the NASL's Los Angeles Aztecs, the ASL's Sacramento Gold and with teams in Switzerland and Germany.

Raised overseas in Europe and now a resident of Walnut Creek, Foulk also has several years of coaching experience in the Bay Area. He spent two years as the head boys varsity coach at De La Salle High School in Concord and the last four and a half years as coach of the Diablo Valley Soccer Club.

PIETER LEHRER

*Volunteer Assistant Coach
First Season at Cal*



Pieter Lehrer, who has a long list of coaching experience, enters his first season at Cal as a volunteer assistant for the Golden Bears.

Lehrer joins the Bears from the University of Evansville in Indiana, where he spent the 2004 season as an assistant coach. Previously, he spent four years as an assistant coach for Stanford from 1999-2001 and in 2003, with three teams making NCAA Final Four appearances. During that time he was honored with the AFLAC National

Assistant Coach of the Year award.

In 2001 he joined the staff of the MLS Los Angeles Galaxy as an assistant coach. While with the Galaxy, his team was MLS Cup champions as well as Open Cup champions. Lehrer was also an assistant coach for the ODP U-18 Region IV team, as well as the head coach for the ODP District II team.

Before his coaching days began Lehrer played collegiate soccer for UCLA and was a member of the 1985 NCAA Championship team. He also played professional soccer in Europe from 1986-1988.

Lehrer graduated from UCLA in 1990 with a degree in history.

BEARS RECORD FOURTH CONSECUTIVE NCAA BID

California continued where it left off after 2003's record-breaking season, reaching the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in as many years, setting a program record. After a first round 1-0 overtime victory over No. 17 Santa Clara, the Golden Bears came up short against Southern Methodist University, 1-0, in the second round. Cal finished the season 13-4-3 overall and tied for second in the Pac-10 with a mark of 4-3-1. The Bears were successful both at home (9-1-1) and on the road (3-3-1).

BEARS PLACE 12 ON ALL-PAC-10 TEAM

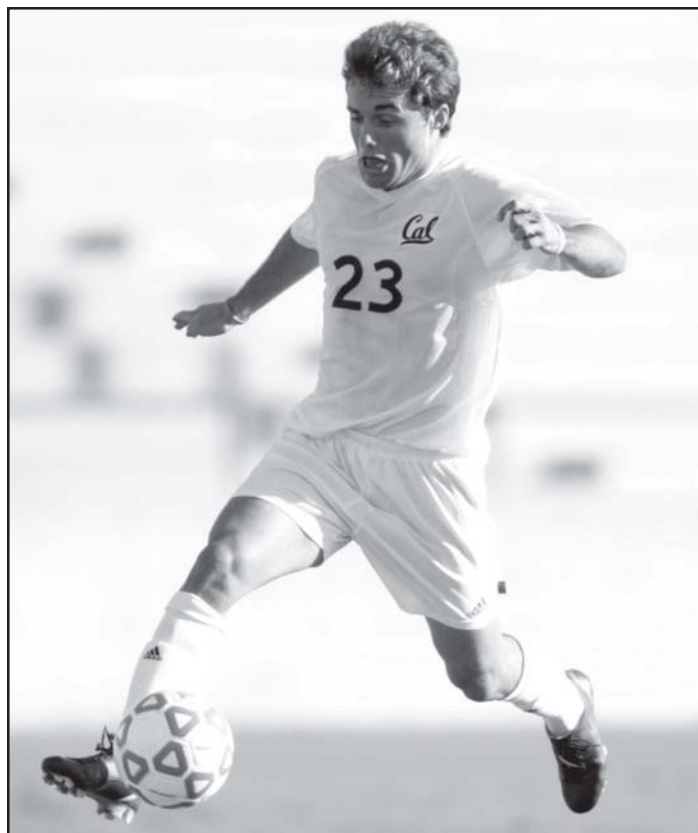
The Bears placed 12 players on the All-Pac-10 team, matching a school record with three making the first-team. First-team honorees included senior Troy Roberts (one goal and one assist), juniors Calen Carr (five goals, four assists and 62 shots) and Nick Hatzke (seven goals and eight assists). Carl Acosta, Eric Kronberg, Noah Merl and Tyson Wahl were awarded second-team honors, while Eric Ebert, Mike Munoz, Kyle Navarro, Steve Purdy and Angel Qunitero all received honorable mention. Cal set a school record and conference high by placing 12 players on the All-Pac-10 team.

NINE BEARS RECEIVE PAC-10 ALL-ACADEMIC HONORS

For the third season in a row, the Bears placed a team-high nine players on the Pac-10 All-Academic team. Juniors Pieter Berger and Calen Carr were rewarded for their hard work on the field and in the classroom with first-team honors, while seniors Yohei Fukuda and Noah Merl landed on the second-team, along with junior Tyson Wahl and sophomore Andrew Felder. Receiving honorable mention were junior Nick Hatzke and sophomores Matthew Holtrust and Steve Purdy.



As a junior, Calen Carr was named to the All-Pac-10 and conference All-Academic teams in 2004.



Nick Hatzke was named to the 2004 All-Pac-10 team after posting seven goals and eight assists last season. He also earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors.

PIETER BERGER HONORED AS ALL-DISTRICT ACADEMIC

Junior forward Pieter Berger was named to the 2004 CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII men's soccer team. Berger finished with three goals, all game-winners, and one assist for the season, while maintaining a 3.57 GPA in American Studies. The Irvine native has amassed nine goals and seven assists over 63 career appearances, including 35 starts. Berger received first team Pac-10 All-Academic honors last season.

CAL RECORDS THIRD POSTSEASON VICTORY IN SCHOOL HISTORY

Cal's first-round overtime victory over Santa Clara, 2-1, in the NCAA Tournament was the third tournament victory in school history. After claiming their first postseason victory in 2001 with a 2-1 win against UC Santa Barbara at home at Edwards Stadium, the Golden Bears proved the victory was no fluke, dispatching of San Jose State, 2-0, in first-round tournament action during the 2003 season. The victory moved the Bears' NCAA tournament record at home to 3-1.

BEARS FINISH STRONG

Finishing the year on a high-note, the Bears lost just once in their last six regular-season games. Cal closed out the season with two notable double-overtime victories against Stanford and Washington to propel them into the NCAA Tournament.

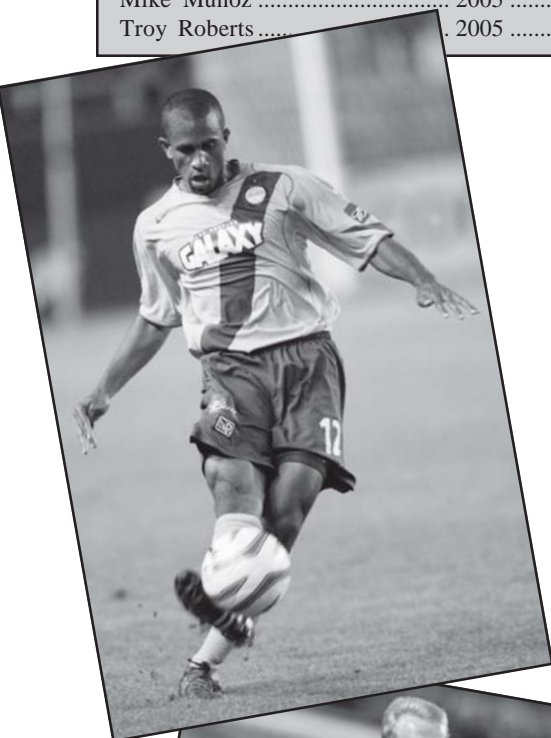

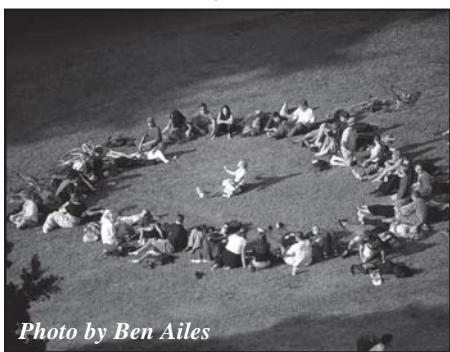

4. A MARKETABLE DEGREE

When you are ready to graduate, Cal's reputation may take on new importance. Hundreds of recruiters visit campus each spring, hoping to employ talented new Berkeley graduates.

5. EDUCATION COMES FIRST

Although Cal is well known for its stellar graduate programs, undergraduate teaching is a campus priority. Most professors enjoy having an opportunity to introduce undergraduates to their fields of study, and nearly half of all courses offered at the undergraduate level have 25 students or fewer.

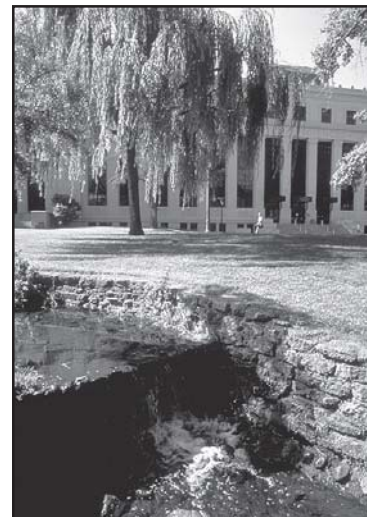


8. ORGANIZATIONS AND ENDLESS OPPORTUNITIES

9. BERKELEY AND THE BAY AREA

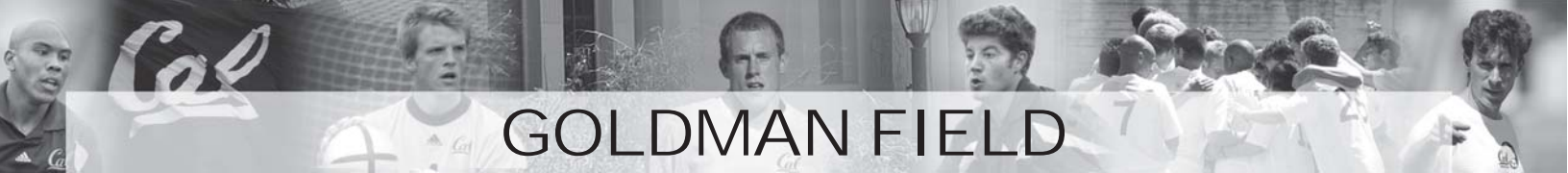
It's hard to imagine a place more stimulating than Berkeley, as the Bay Area forms an extraordinary environment for all types of educational, artistic and recreational pursuits. If you want to head into San Francisco, the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) is just a few blocks away. Regardless of what you choose to do, you won't find a more temperate climate or a more beautiful setting.



10. ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

Cal consistently ranks in the Top 20 among more than 300 Division I schools in the Directors' Cup standings, which measure a school's level of success, including a 15th-place finish in 2005. Cal added two team championships (women's crew and rugby) to its total, along with individual championships in men's gymnastics (Graham Ackerman, floor exercise) and men's swimming (Duje Draganja, 100m butterfly, 100m freestyle; team relays in 200m freestyle, 200m medley, and 400m freestyle). Dave O'Neill of women's crew earned national coach of the year honors, while Draganja and Valentina Godfrid (field hockey) were named conference athletes of the year.





GOLDMAN FIELD

The California men's soccer team competes at its highly-regarded on-campus facility – Goldman Field at Edwards Stadium, which was completed prior to the 1999 season.

The field was previously the track & field infield at historic Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1932, and was converted to a regulation 70-by-115-yards natural grass soccer field for use by the Cal men's and women's soccer teams. In addition to the field renovations, which included a state-of-the-art drainage system, the stands and press box have also been upgraded, with plans to eventually add stadium lights, allowing for night games and workouts.

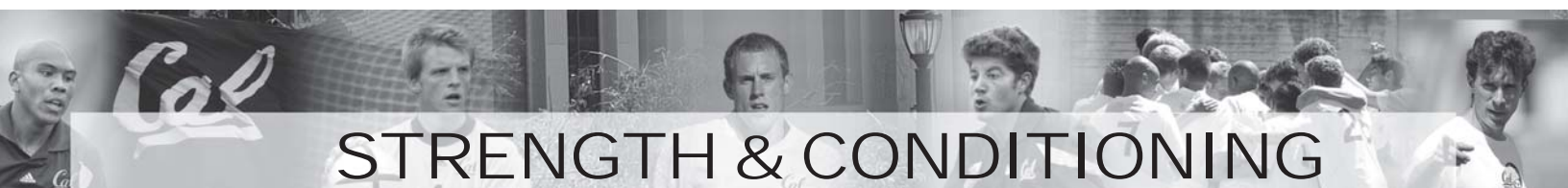
The \$3.5 million, 22,000-seat stadium project now enables Cal to host NCAA championships and international matches.

The dual-use grass facility has been named Goldman Field in honor of Richard (class of '41) and Rhoda (class of '46) Goldman, who made the initial \$1.5 million gift to lead the renovation campaign.

Prior to moving to Edwards Stadium, both Cal soccer teams' homes games were at Witter Field, which they shared with the football (practice only) and rugby teams. Their new home on the West side of campus is a short walk from the downtown Berkeley BART station and offers families a unique environment to watch top level soccer.



Edwards Stadium opens for the 1999-2000 academic year and is home to Cal's men's and women's soccer and track and field teams.

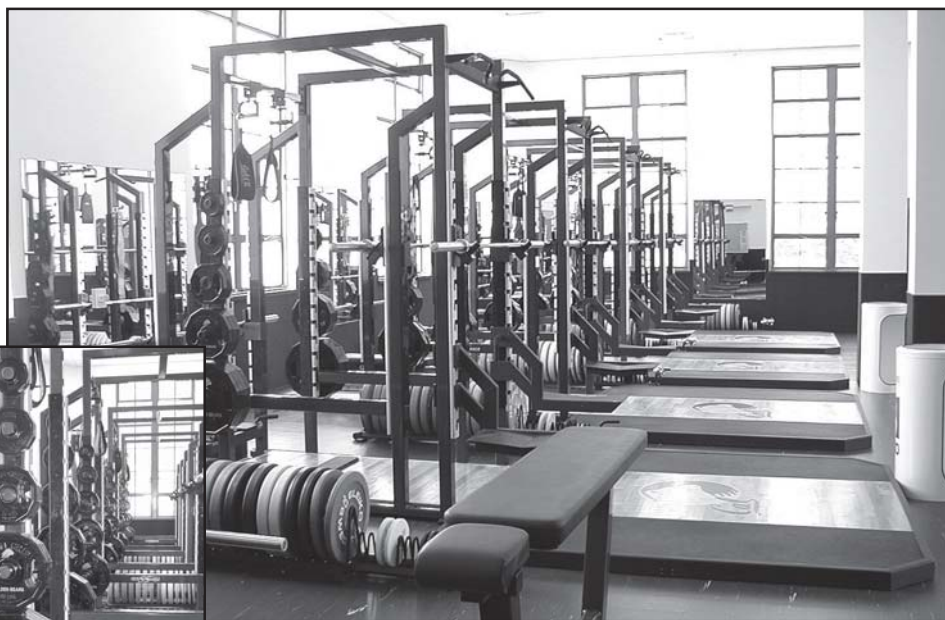


STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

An integral part of Cal soccer is the strength and conditioning program. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development, by teaching how the components, strength, speed, and flexibility fit together. The enhancement of these components results in maximizing their force production thus improving their power on the court. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques and progressed to increase their ability perform at their peak during competition. Out of all the components flexibility is key. It is essential for proper lifting, improving running mechanics needed for acceleration and deceleration, and developing greater explosiveness, all which are essential for playing soccer.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff, who work in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the



health and safety of all of student-athletes. In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and re-conditioning.

The Mary and Frank J. Schlessinger Weight Training Complex in Haas Pavilion includes six Olympic platforms, more than 4,000 pounds of Olympic bars and bumper plates, and an array of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The picturesque facility overlooks Evans Diamond baseball field and Edwards Track Stadium and is adjacent to the Paul F. White Sports Medicine Center.



ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM

One of the real success stories for the University of California is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes – the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and in the classroom.

PROGRAM FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate good study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The Tutorial Program promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The Advising Program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with University, college and NCAA requirements, developing time management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes. During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate student-athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

THE UNIVERSITY

The University of California is one of the world's leading academic institutions. The school, known throughout the world as "Cal," is truly a prototype of a contemporary university. It attracts what many consider the finest applicant pool in the country, generates an ethnically and culturally diverse student population on campus, and provides one of the finest learning experiences in the world today.

WORLD-CLASS FACULTY AND STUDENTS

The Berkeley campus is renowned for the size and quality of its libraries and laboratories, the scope of its research and publications, and the distinction of its faculty and students. National rankings consistently place Cal's undergraduate and graduate programs among the very best. The faculty includes seven Nobel Laureates, 128 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 16 MacArthur Fellows, 83 Fulbright Scholars, three Pulitzer Prize winners and more Guggenheim Fellows (139) than any other university in the country.

The quality of Cal's diverse and independent student body complements the stature of the faculty. Almost 33,000 students annually enroll at Cal. Of these, about 23,000 are undergraduates. Students come to Berkeley from all over California, in addition to every state in the union and more than 2,000 students from more than 75 countries around the world.

THE BAY AREA

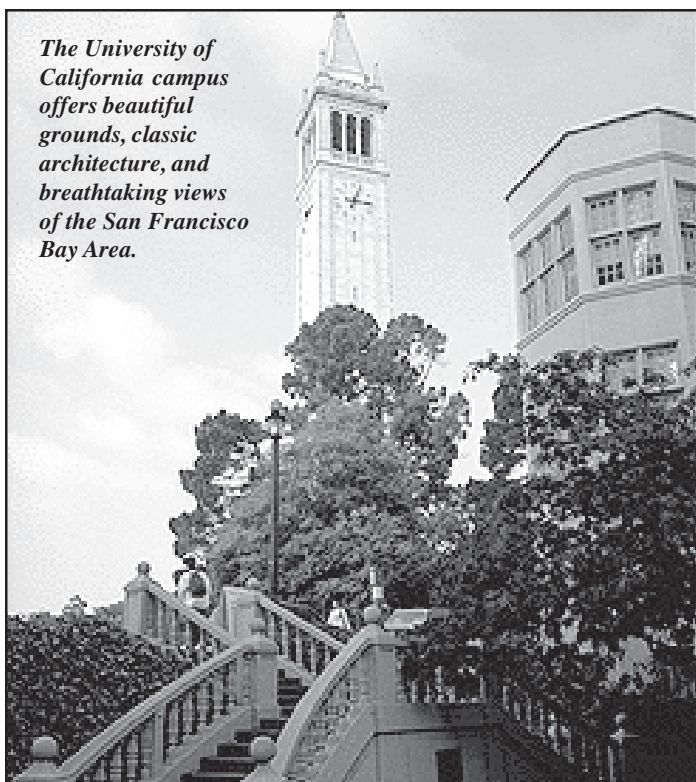
Overlooking San Francisco Bay, the campus is a lush and tranquil 1,232-acre oasis in an urban setting. The grounds have retained much of the beauty of their rural beginnings. Spacious lawns, hiking and running trails, as well as groves of oak, redwood and eucalyptus blend with the Neo-classical architecture of John Galen Howard. The University is bordered by the wooded rolling hills of Tilden Regional Park and the City of Berkeley, one of America's most lively and culturally diverse municipalities.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

By any standard, Cal offers its students one of the best educations available. Since its birth it has earned a reputation unmatched by any public university in America. According to a recent study by the National Research Council, Cal ranks first nationally in both the number of graduate programs in the Top 10 in their fields (97 percent) and the number of "distinguished" programs for the scholarship of the faculty (32 programs).

Although Cal is well known for its stellar graduate programs, undergraduate teaching is a campus priority. Nearly half of all courses offered at the undergraduate level have 25 students or fewer, and many lecture courses include smaller laboratory or study group sections which allow close interaction with professors and other instructors.

Cal offers a wide arena for academic endeavor and personal growth with more than 7,000 courses in nearly 300 degree programs. Exceptional support

services such as the Student Learning Center, Career and Graduate School Services, the Disabled Students' Program, and campus and alumni mentor programs reflect Cal's strong commitment to undergraduate education. Study abroad is available to undergraduate students through the Education Abroad Program, which maintains more than 90 study centers in countries such as Australia, Costa Rica, Hong Kong, Italy, New Zealand and Thailand.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The excellence of the University's intercollegiate athletic program rivals the school's academic reputation as Cal boasts one of the finest all-around programs in the nation. Twenty-seven sports – men's and women's basketball, crew, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track & field and water polo; men's baseball, football and rugby; along with women's softball, volleyball, field hockey and lacrosse – are sponsored by the University. Over the years, Cal has captured more than 60 national team championships – most recently rugby and women's crew in 2005 – while claiming over 130 NCAA individual championships in a variety of sports. This past season, Dave O'Neill was named the national women's rowing Coach of the Year, while Duje Draganja was chosen the Pac-10 men's Swimming of the Year.

OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

A myriad of activities also goes on outside the classroom. There are more than 350 registered student organizations, such as the Marching Band, Hang Gliding Club, radio station KALX, ethnic associations, humor and literary magazines, debate team, Cal Corps (volunteer programs), Cal in the Capitol/Sacramento, and political organizations.

In addition, Cal has a host of other features, including public lectures and concerts, campus-sponsored forums and seminars, clubs and workshops, dramatic presentations, international festivals, art, photographic, design, architectural, anthropological and archaeological exhibits and displays, and dozens of bookstores within one-square mile – all of this making Berkeley one of the most intellectually stimulating communities in the country.
