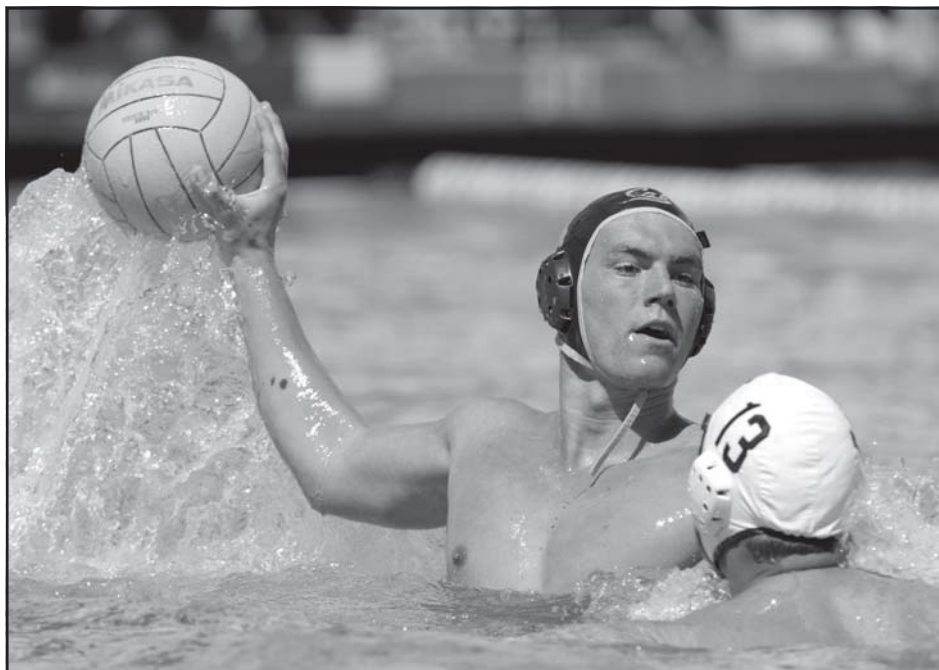

2005 SEASON OUTLOOK



Junior John Mann earned first-team All-America and All-MPSF honors last season, leading the Bears with 60 goals and averaging 2.00 goals per game.

Bears' leading scorer with 60 goals, notching at least one goal in 26 of the team's 30 matches. Mann was also first-team All-MPSF, averaging 2.00 goals per game. The 6-5, 225-pounder was the only sophomore named first-team All-American, and headlines Cal's list of members of the USA Senior National Team.

Juniors **Andrija Vasiljevic** and **Marty Matthies** return after earning honorable mention All-America accolades last season. Vasiljevic is a left-handed attacker who is one of the Bears' top offensive threats, scoring 39 goals last year, including two against Stanford in Cal's Big Splash win, and goals against USC and UC Santa Barbara in the MPSF Tournament. He has netted 75 goals in his career and was selected third-team All-MPSF in 2004. Matthies, a member of the Senior National Team, provides Cal with solid all-around

GOLDEN BEARS LOOK TO RECLAIM SPOT AMONG NATION'S ELITE IN 2005

Could this be the year California recaptures the crown?

The 2005 Golden Bears certainly have one of the more talented squads in the program's history with three returning All-Americans, five players who are members of the USA Senior National Training Team and waves of other athletes who are part of Kirk Everist's and Boyd Lachance's outstanding recruiting classes. In other words, Cal water polo is loaded with talent and depth, and is a strong contender to win the national title.

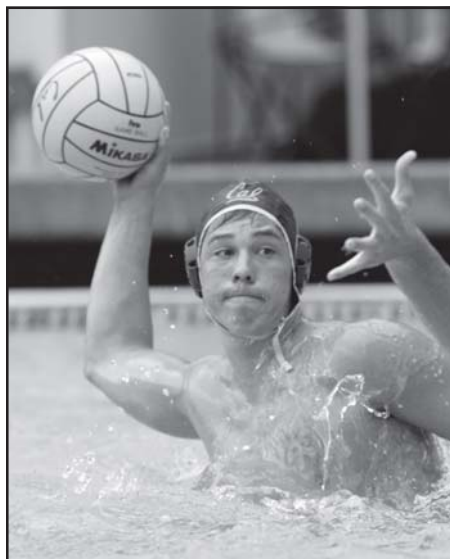
"I am very excited about our prospects this year," said Everist, who is in his fourth season leading the Bears. "The competition against the other schools will be fierce as usual, but if we can play consistent team water polo, I feel we can play with anyone."

Cal features an extremely talented group of returnees, highlighted by 2004 first-team All-American **John Mann**, who as a sophomore was the

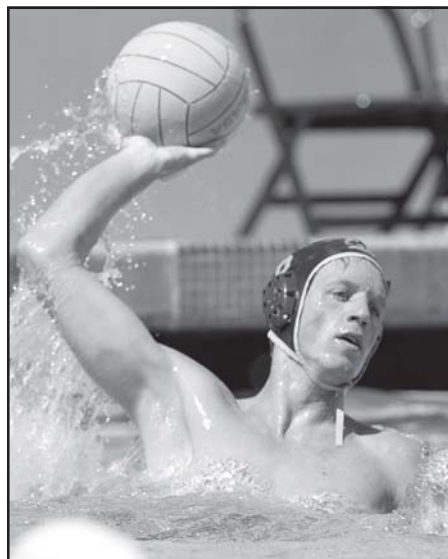
play and is considered one of the team's top defenders as a center back. He finished last year with 14 goals, including a key score against Stanford in the Big Splash.

Senior goalie **Nate Bennett**, junior attacker **Brian Bacharach** and junior center **Brian Kinsel** also return after impressive 2004 campaigns. Team captain Bennett is one of the country's top goalies and a member of the National Team. He was honorable mention All-MPSF after recording 216 saves in 29 matches, including 12 saves in the Big Splash victory over Stanford, and an impressive 27 saves in the MPSF Tournament. Team captain Bacharach was the Bears' second-leading scorer last year with 48 goals, including notching the matching-winning score in Cal's upset of eventual national champion UCLA during the SoCal Tournament. The 6-5, 235-pound Kinsel was also honorable mention All-MPSF after finishing fourth on the team with 37 goals, including tying Bacharach with a team-high four goals during the MPSF Tournament.

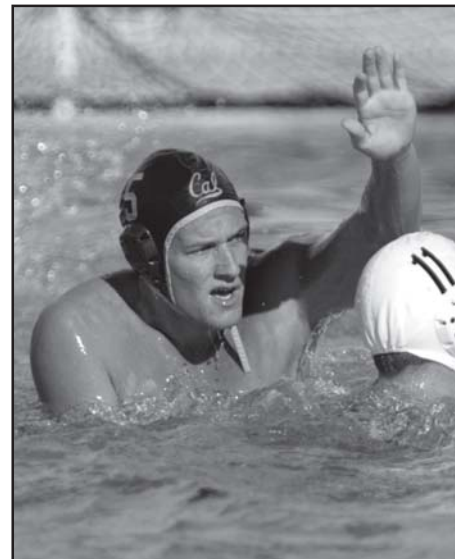
Sophomore **Michael Sharf** and true freshman **Shea Buckner** are two more forces in the Bears' arsenal. Sharf, a 6-3, attacker, and Buckner, a 6-4 center back, are two of the youngest members of the USA National Team.

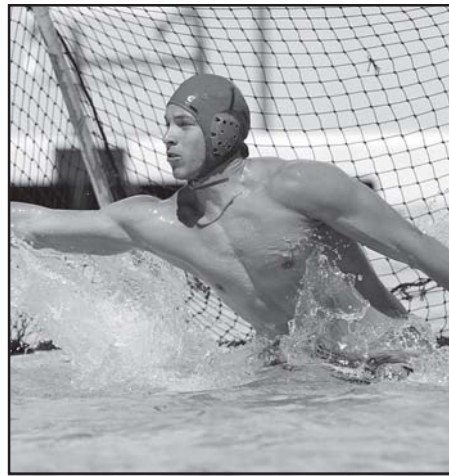

Sharf tallied 22 goals as a freshman, providing the Bears with outstanding performances against the nation's top teams. He had a team-high three goals in Cal's upset of UCLA at the SoCal Tournament, and notched three goals against USC in the MPSF Tournament. Buckner is the Bears' top recruit as he comes to Cal after being named the 2004 CIF Division II Player of the Year and scoring 364 goals at Villa Park (Calif.) High School.

Even with the long list of returning standouts, Everist has several additional talented young stars worth noting – proving the Bears are at least two-deep in every position. Sophomores **Mike Hayes**, **Adam Haley**, **Zac Monsees**, **Jeff Tyrrell**, **Kevin Platshon** and **Cameron Jones** are all in contention for substantial playing time. Hayes is a strong offensive player who had 13 goals as a freshman, Haley is one of Cal's top center backs and Monsees is a left-handed attacker who notched 10 goals as a freshman. Tyrrell, Platshon and Jones are also going to be in the Bears' playing rotation and were all members of the Lamorinda water polo club team that won the 20-

weight room," said Everist. "We have become closer as a unit, and we will definitely need that cohesion in order to get back into the NCAA championship."

Under National Championship this summer in Davis, Calif.

Additional depth will be provided by senior captain **Tom Kurth**, a 6-6, 255-pound center; **Trent Calder**, a 6-4 redshirt freshman center; **Jon Marshall**, a 6-0 sophomore attacker and 6-2 sophomore attacker **Jonathan Richina**, as well redshirt freshman goalie **Marc Vacquier** and freshman goalie **Nick Sgarlata**. This group has also shown the ability to contribute this season, both offensively and defensively. Kurth, Calder, Richina, Vacquier and Sgarlata were members of the Lamorinda Water Polo Club that excelled in the 20-Under National (gold medal) and Senior National (bronze medal) competition this past summer.

"The team has worked extremely hard this past spring and summer in both the pool and the

THE COACHING STAFF



KIRK EVERIST
Head Coach • Fourth Year

As the head coach of the University of California men's water polo program, Kirk Everist is the perfect person to continue the tradition of excellence that defines the Golden Bears. A former three-

time All-American, NCAA Player of the Year and two-time United States Olympian, Everist earned 2002 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Coach of the Year honors in his inaugural season, and most recently was inducted into both the 2004 Cal Athletic Hall of Fame and the USA Water Polo Hall of Fame.

On July 29, 2002 Everist, 38, returned to his alma mater and led Cal to a 20-7 mark and the Bears' first MPSF title and national runner-up finish since 1995. Now after solid 20-win seasons in 2003 and 2004, including a Big Splash victory over Stanford and an upset of eventual national champion UCLA last year, Everist and his troops are looking to vie for the program's 12th NCAA title in 2005.

Before returning to Berkeley, Everist had contributed to eight CIF North Coast championships as an assistant at Miramonte High School. During Everist's 11-year tenure there, the school also produced nine league titles and three third-place finishes in the California State Tournament. He helped develop 22 high school All-Americans, and three of his former players went on to earn NCAA All-American recognition, while two pupils have played on NCAA championship teams.

In addition to his work at Miramonte, Everist served as water polo commissioner at San Francisco's Olympic Club from 1999-2001, a period that produced a gold medal and two silver medals in FINA World Masters competition. Also, since 2000 he has been co-head coach for the Lamorinda water polo team, leading that club to the 2001, 2004 and 2005 USA Water Polo 20-Under national championships, and the 2002 Northern California Zone Junior Olympic title. In January of 2005, Everist added to his duties the position of treasurer of the College Water Polo Coaches Association.

A 1990 Cal graduate, Everist propelled the Bears to national championships in 1987 and 1988. He earned NCAA All-American status from 1986-88 and was named the NCAA National Player of the Year in 1988. Everist went on to play for the United States National Team for nine years (1988-96) and was a member of the USA Olympic Team in the 1992 Barcelona and 1996 Atlanta Games. He also competed on America's gold medal winning water polo teams at the 1991 World University Games and 1995 Pan American Games.

"Kirk has been an Olympian and an All-American, but I believe he is now a better coach than he was as a player," said four-time NCAA Coach of the Year Pete Cutino, Everist's former Cal mentor who passed away in September of 2004. "He is a

very intense person who has always been a student of the game. Kirk is everything we would want in a coach."

Everist lives in nearby Pleasant Hill with his wife, Kim.

BOYD LACHANCE
Associate Head Coach

Boyd Lachance was promoted to associate head coach for the Cal men's water polo team on July 18, 2003 after playing a key role in the Bears winning the MPSF title and advancing to the NCAA title match in his first year as an assistant in 2002.

Lachance, 33, came to Cal after an outstanding water polo career at Pacific in the early '90s and seven years of coaching club, high school and junior college water polo. As a two-year starter for the Tigers (1992-93), he was Pacific's second leading scorer in 1992, finishing his career with a scoring average of 1.09 goals per game. In addition, Lachance was a member of the only Tiger water polo team in school history to reach the NCAA tournament, achieving a No. 5 national ranking in 1993.

Transferring his skills from the pool to the pool deck, Lachance has coached in the national and international scene. He was an assistant coach with the National Cadet Team in Yugoslavia in 2002 and was head coach of the Pacific Zone Division II Premier League team that won the 2004 national championship. Lachance was also co-head coach at Campolindo High School from 1999-2000 and an associate head coach at Diablo Valley College in 2001.

Lachance has been part of eight national championships (five 20-under, two Premier League, one 18-under) in his coaching tenure, while developing 65 USWP All-Americans, six high school All-Americans and three community college All-Americans along the way.

In addition to his coaching duties at Cal, Lachance is the club director of Lamorinda Water Polo, which he founded in 1999.

Lachance received a degree in sociology from Pacific in 1994. He resides in West Sacramento with his wife, Gretchen, and son, Carson, born July 7, 2004.

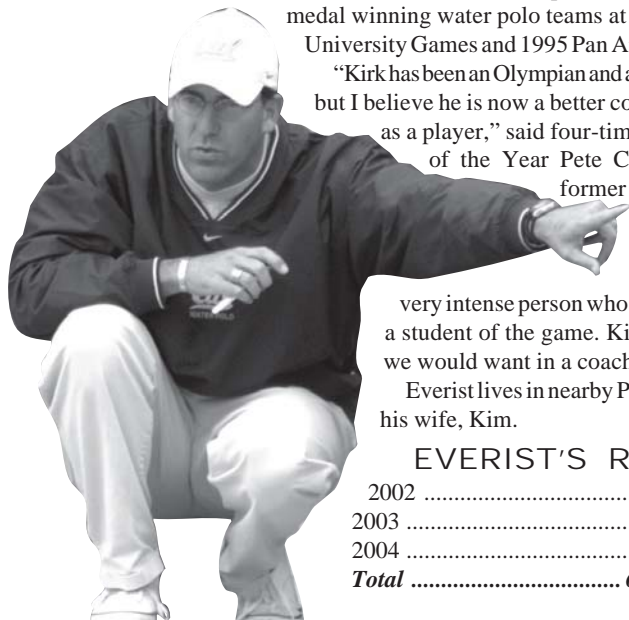


SEAN NOLAN
Assistant Coach

Former Golden Bear goalie (1991-94) and 2000 Olympian Sean Nolan, 33, is in his first season as an assistant men's water polo coach at Cal.

Nolan joins the Bears' coaching staff after a successful national and international water polo career. A member of the USA Senior National Team from 1994-2000, he competed in the 2000 Sydney Olympics, helping the United States to sixth place finish along with other former Cal stars Gavin Arroyo, Chris Humbert and Chris Oeding. Nolan was also on Team USA's gold medal-winning squad at the 1993 World University Games in Buffalo, NY; was named Goalie of the Tournament at the 1997 Unicon Cup in Budapest, Hungary; and helped the United States to a gold medal at the 1999 PanAm Games in Winnipeg, Ontario, Canada. He played professionally in Greece for the club team, Naok, in the town of Corfu from 1996-97.

A three-time All-American (1992, 1993, 1994) at Cal, Nolan graduated in 1995 with a degree in political economies of industrial societies. He led the Bears to NCAA titles in 1991 and 1992, including making two match-saving blocks at the end of regulation in the '92 title match against Stanford. The 1992 NCAA championship match is considered by many to be the greatest title match in NCAA water polo history as Cal went on to win 12-11 in sudden death overtime to finish with a perfect 31-0 season record. Nolan was the recipient of the Peter J. Cutino Water Polo Trophy in 1992 as the team's most improved player, and was the team's Most Valuable Player in 1994.

2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

The California men's water polo team did not finish the 2004 season the way they would have liked, but the Golden Bears did show signs of what they could achieve. Cal ended the 2004 campaign 20-10 overall after losing a pair of heartbreaking matches in the first and second rounds of the MPSF Tournament, falling to defending national champion USC, 10-8, in overtime in the tournament opener, and then losing to Pepperdine, 4-3, in the second round. Cal was then able to rebound to defeat UC Santa Barbara, 7-6, to place seventh in the conference championship.

The Bears had entered the MPSF Tournament on a high note after an impressive 6-5 upset of No. 2-ranked Stanford in the Big Splash at Spieker Aquatics Complex, led by two goals apiece from sophomores **Brian Bacharach** and **Andrija Vasiljevic**, and 12 saves by junior goalie **Nate Bennett**. Cal also had the distinction of being only one of two teams to have defeated eventual national champion UCLA during the regular season. The Bears had upended the Bruins, 10-9, during the SoCal Tournament, highlighted by freshman **Michael Sharf's** three goals and Bacharach's match-winning score with 1:18 left on the clock.

Cal gathered its share of accolades in 2004. Center **John Mann** was the only sophomore in the nation to earn first-team All-America honors after leading the Bears with 60 goals, tallying at least one score in 26 of the team's 30 matches. Mann was also named first-team All-MPSF, averaging 2.00 goals per game. Sophomores **Marty Matthies** and Vasiljevic were selected as honorable mention All-Americans. Matthies, one of the team's top defenders, scored 14 goals, including a score in the Bears' victory over Stanford, and a goal with four seconds left in regulation to send a match into overtime at Long Beach State. Vasiljevic finished the season on a scoring tear, recording 29 of his 39 goals in the last 17 matches, including goals against USC and UC Santa Barbara in the MPSF Tournament. He also had a five-goal match in a victory over Pepperdine, and was named third team All-MPSF.

Bennett, Bacharach and sophomore center **Brian Kinsel** had notable seasons as well. Bennett was honorable mention All-MPSF after recording 216 saves in 29 matches, including 27 saves in the MPSF Tournament and 15 saves in the overtime loss to USC. He was the Nov. 22 MPSF Player

of the Week after his 12 saves versus the Cardinal in the Big Splash. Bacharach was the Bears' second-leading scorer with 48 goals, and besides his notable efforts against Stanford and UCLA, was the Sept. 5 MPSF Player of the Week after scoring 12 goals in the season-opening tournament at Navy. Kinsel, who finished fourth on the team in scoring with 37 goals, tied with Bacharach with a team-high four goals during the MPSF Tournament and was honorable mention All-MPSF.

In the academic arena, Cal had six players recognized by The American Water Polo Coaches Association as members of the 2004-05 All-Academic

Team. In the Outstanding class with grade point averages between 3.71 and 4.00 was Sharf (3.77, undeclared), who was fifth on the team in scoring with 22 goals as a true freshman. In the Superior class with grade point averages between 3.41 and 3.70 were sophomore **Dan Werner** (3.59, economics) and redshirt freshman **Cameron Jones** (3.52, undeclared).

Three Bears in the Excellent class (grade point averages between 3.20 and 3.40) included Vasiljevic (3.40, interdisciplinary studies), senior goalie **Derek Schauffler** (3.27, political science) and senior center defender **Alexander Niehenke** (3.28, business administration and legal studies). Vasiljevic, Bennett, Bacharach, Jones, Werner and freshman **Kevin Platshon** were also selected to the MPSF All-Academic team.

The entire Cal squad was noted by The American Water Polo Coaches Association as the Bears had the nation's 16th-best team GPA (2.98) in the nation—the highest team GPA of any Pac-10 or MPSF school.

as groves of oak, redwood and eucalyptus blend with the Neo-classical architecture of John Galen Howard. The University is bordered by the wooded rolling hills of Tilden Regional Park and the City of Berkeley, one of America's most lively, culturally diverse and politically adventurous municipalities.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

By any standard, Cal offers its students one of the best educations available. Since its birth it has earned a reputation unmatched by any public university in America. According to a recent study by the National Research Council, Cal ranks first nationally in both the number of graduate programs in the Top 10 in their fields (97 percent) and the number of "distinguished" programs for the scholarship of the faculty (32 programs).

Although Cal is well known for its stellar graduate programs, undergraduate teaching is a campus priority. Nearly half of all courses offered at the undergraduate level have 25 students or fewer, and many lecture courses include smaller laboratory or study group sections which allow close interaction with professors and other instructors.

Cal offers a wide arena for academic endeavor and personal growth with more than 7,000 courses in nearly 300 degree programs. Exceptional support services such as the Student Learning Center, Career and Graduate School Services, the Disabled Students' Program, and campus and alumni mentor programs reflect Cal's strong commitment to undergraduate education. Study abroad is available to undergraduate students through the Education Abroad Program, which maintains more than 90 study centers in countries such as Australia, Costa Rica, Hong Kong, Italy, New Zealand and Thailand.

Each year, more than 8,500 students receive degrees from the University – about 5,500 bachelor's degrees, 2,000 master's degrees, 900 doctorates and 200 law degrees.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The excellence of the University's intercollegiate athletic program rivals the school's academic reputation as Cal boasts one of the finest all-around programs in the nation. Twenty-seven sports – men's and women's basketball, crew, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track & field and water polo; men's baseball, football and rugby; along with women's softball, volleyball, field hockey and lacrosse – are sponsored by the University. 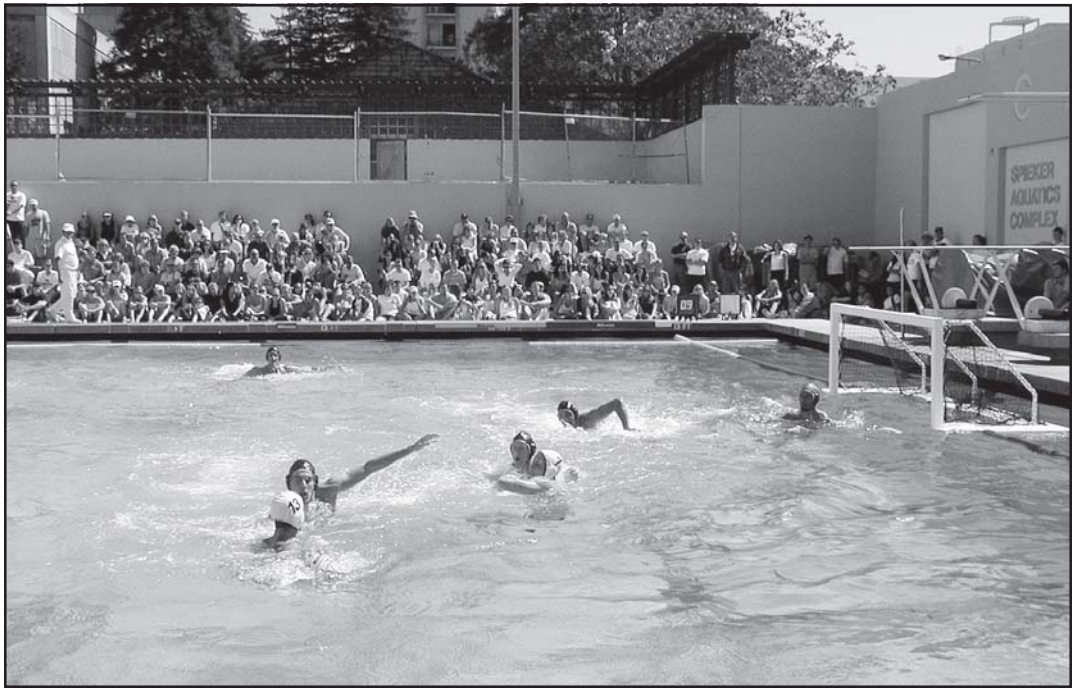
Serving as home to the California water polo and swimming teams is the Spieker Aquatics Complex, one of the finest outdoor facilities in the United States.

Located on the corner of Dana and Bancroft on the south side of Haas Pavilion, the one million dollar facility was completed in the fall of 1982. It was made possible through the Cal Sports '80s project and was named after former Cal water polo letterman Edward "Ned" Spieker, who provided the major portion of the funds for the project.

The facility replaced the antiquated Harmon Pool, which served as the home for California aquatics for 50 years. The primary aspect of the extensive remodeling project was the joining of the two previously existing tanks to provide for the 50-meter by 25-yard pool of deep water, suitable for major national and international water polo and swimming championships. Spieker Aquatics Complex has served as the site of the United States Senior National Water Polo Championship in 1984 and '86, the National Qualifying Tournament for collegiate women's water polo in 1997 and 2000, the men's Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Tournament in 2001, and most recently the women's MPSF Tournament in 2005.

One thing that hasn't changed with the Bears move into Spieker is Cal's dominance at home. Between 1976 and '81, the Bears' men's water polo team lost just

one league match at home. Since the Cal men played their first match in the Spieker Aquatics Complex in the middle of the 1982 season, the Bears have compiled a 165-40 (.805) record. In 1991 and '92, the Cal men went through the home season unbeaten, winning all 19 of their matches at Spieker. The Bear women played their first home matches as a varsity sport in Spieker during the 1996 season and have compiled a home record of 51-16 (.761).



RULES, REGULATIONS & TERMS

INTRODUCTION

Water polo, the oldest team sport in the Olympics, is a game of skill, endurance and swimming ability played in a 20 by 30 meter pool. There are seven players, six in the field and one goalkeeper. The object of the game is to shoot a the ball into a one-by-three meter goal. One point is scored for each goal. A player may shoot for a one-point goal, without a fake or a hesitation, after an ordinary foul outside of seven meters. The game consists of four, seven-minute quarters, with each team allowed 35 seconds to take a shot.

GAME PLAY

The game starts with both teams lined up on the opposite ends of the pool. They sprint for the ball dropped in the middle of the field of play by the referee. Teams advance the ball by passing, or dribbling (swimming with it). Only one hand may be used on the ball at one time, with the exception of the goalkeeper. Defensively teams will play man-to-man and zone defenses. No player is allowed to hold, sink, pull back or otherwise interfere with the free limb movement of an opponent unless the player has his hand on the ball. It is the object of the defense to play the ball and not the man. The timing of the foul is critical in all defensive plays. Poor timing often results in ejection fouls.

FOULS

The referee indicates a foul by blowing a whistle and pointing with the hand toward the team that has possession, indicating the direction of the team's attack. That team may receive a free throw. There are ordinary fouls and major fouls.

Ordinary fouls - offending team gets a free throw from the point of the infraction.

1. Two hand touch of the ball.
2. Taking the ball underwater and touched by an opposing player.
3. Impeding the progress of a player who does not have the ball.
4. Pushing off of an opponent.
5. Stalling.

Major fouls - Offending player ejected for 35 seconds or until a goal is scored or there is a possession change.

1. Kick/strike an opponent.

2. Interfere with a free throw.
3. Hold, sink or pull back an opponent without the ball.
4. Misconduct, disrespect.
5. Ordinary foul in dead time (the time between the call of the foul and the actual putting the ball into play).

TERMINOLOGY

Back Door: An offensive drive from the wing position on the weak side (away from the ball).

Ball Under: A minor foul (see #2 under ordinary fouls).

Center Throw: A free throw from a position in front of the goal at the two-meter line, awarded when the ball goes over the goal line last touched by a defensive player.

Counter Attack: A fast break.

Dry Pass: Pass from one player to another without the ball touching the water.

Extra Man: A man up situation, usually six on five and a "power play" situation.

Inside Water: A situation where the offensive player has an advantageous position in front of the defender, with nothing but open water in front of him and the goal.

Moving Pick: Moving screen intended to free an offensive player for a release pass and/or shot.

Natural Goals: Goals scored when both teams have an even amount of players.

Penalty Shot: A free shot taken by the offensive player from the four-meter line, awarded when a foul occurs inside the four-meter line preventing the probable scoring of a goal.

Point: Position at the top, of the 12 o'clock area of the offensive set-up, in the center of the pool.

Release: A player making himself available for a pass.

Switch: Defenders switching defensive responsibilities.

Wet Pass: A pass from one player to another that lands near the receiver in the water.

Wet Shot: A shot that is attempted while the ball is controlled in the water, usually a quick wrist shot. This is also called off the water shot.

FRIENDS OF CAL AQUATICS

The Friends of Cal Aquatics is an organization of alumni, parents, and supporters of all four Cal Aquatics programs—Men's and Women's Swimming & Diving and Water Polo teams. The Friends of Cal Aquatics fundraising committee works in conjunction with the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and the Cal Athletic Development office to raise necessary funds for the four Cal Aquatics programs. The support from the Friends of Cal Aquatics provides vital financial assistance in the form of annual gifts and contributions to endowment funds for student scholarships, as well as the day-to-day operating costs for the aquatics programs in perpetuity.

Friends of Cal Aquatics evolved from the efforts provided by four generous visionaries and alumni: Rick Cronk, Don Fisher, Warren Hellman and Ned Spieker, who founded the Splash Club Endowment Fund in the 1980's by providing a leadership gift of matching funds which raised a total of \$2 Million for the programs. Another prominent Cal Aquatics endowment fund was established in honor of the legendary Cal Swimming and Water Polo Coach Pete Cutino. The Peter J. Cutino Scholarship Fund currently enables the men's water polo program the opportunity to attract nationally prominent water polo players to Cal.

The Cal Aquatics teams are traditionally the finest in the nation, but if

these programs are to maintain the level of excellence they have enjoyed, new sources of revenue must be found.
