# CAMPBELL *at a glance*

Founded in 1887, Campbell University is a private, coeducational institution of the liberal arts, sciences, and professions offering undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral degrees. The University is comprised of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law, the Lundy-Fetterman School of Business, the School of Education, the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences and the Divinity School.

For nearly 125 years, Campbell University has been helping students build meaningful and successful futures. The university was ranked as one of the Best Regional Universities (South) by U.S. News & World Report in its America's Best Colleges 2011 edition and named one of the "100 Best College Buys" in the nation by Institutional Research & Evaluation, Inc. Campbell is also recognized as a Servicemembers Opportunity College.

**Location:** Set on over 1500 acres, Campbell maintains a beautiful, residential campus in the Cape Fear region of North Carolina. The University is located just 28 miles north of Fayetteville and 30 miles south of Raleigh, the capital city. Campbell also boasts campuses in the Research Triangle Park, Fort Bragg/Pope and Camp Lejeune. The Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law moved to a new facility in Raleigh in the fall of 2009.

**Mission:** The mission of Campbell University is to graduate students with exemplary academic and professional skills who are prepared for purposeful lives and meaningful service. The University is informed and inspired by its Baptist heritage and three basic theological and biblical presuppositions: learning is appointed and conserved by God as essential to the fulfillment of human destiny; in Christ all things consist and find ultimate unity; and the Kingdom of God in this world is rooted and grounded in Christian community.

**Curriculum:** The University has over 100 undergraduate tracks and concentrations; as well as graduate and professional degree programs within the Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law, College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, School of Education and Divinity School. Campbell University is also recognized as a North Carolina Teaching Fellows institution.

**Enrollment:** Each year, Campbell enrolls approximately 6,000 students representing diverse cultural, socioeconomic and religious backgrounds. On the main campus, approximately 3,000 undergraduates are enrolled with more than 1,500 students enrolled in master's programs or professional schools.

**Faculty/Student Ratio:** Campbell offers small class sizes and individual attention, with a faculty to student ratio of 1-to-18. Over 90 percent of faculty hold doctoral or terminal degrees.

**Athletics:** Campbell is a member of the NCAA Division I Big South Conference. Men's varsity sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, track and field and wrestling. Women's sports include basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and field and volleyball. The Fighting Camels also compete in the Pioneer Football League, the Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association and as an associate member of the Southern Conference in wrestling.

The University embraces the conviction that there is no conflict between the life of faith and the life of inquiry.

## Q&A with Head Coach Steve Armas: A look at the 2012 Camels

*Under the direction of third-year head coach Steve Armas, Campbell starts the 2012 season looking to add to its collection of four league trophies over the past seven years. Despite key injuries late in the campaign, last year's squad finished third in the Big South standings and went 1-0-1 against members to the Atlantic Coast Conference.*

*Facing a schedule that includes three teams ranked in the NSCAA pre-season poll, Armas' unit will attempt to earn the Big South title and claim its first NCAA College Cup berth since 2007.*

*Nine starters return from last year's club, including three all-conference performers in Mitchell Cardenas, Justin Franz and Travis Golden, plus all-freshman selection Jhuvon Francis.*

**Q: After 17 years as a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference, Campbell returned to the Big South Conference a year ago. How did this change impact the men's soccer program?**

A: It has impacted the program in a positive manner. The proximity of our opponents in the conference has allowed us to develop rivalries among the teams.

**Q: Liberty (Big South Tournament champion) and Coastal Carolina (regular season champion) both advanced to the 2011 NCAA College Cup. Which teams do you see as the teams to beat in the Big South, and where do the Camels stack up against the league's elite?**

A: Coastal and Liberty both have put together strong teams and replenished their rosters over the summer. We had some trouble against both Coastal and High Point and will look to putting together some better per-

formances this year against them.

**Q: On what areas will you and your staff focus before the season opener Aug. 24 at SMU?**

A: We will most definitely work on all aspects of the program. Our team's defensive shape will take up most of our focus this preseason. Incorporating our incoming players and getting them to understand our system and their roles within it is our top priority.

**Q: Once again, you've once again assembled a challenging non-conference schedule, with dates against the likes of SMU, N.C. State, Virginia Tech, North Carolina, Elon, Loyola, and UNC Wilmington. How would you describe your scheduling philosophy?**

A: My scheduling philosophy is to put together the most challenging schedule possible. It allows our team the opportunity to test ourselves as individuals and collectively as a group day in and day out. The main purpose is to put together a challenging out of conference schedule that will prepare us for conference play. We must develop a belief in our program and in our abilities that we can compete with these elite programs.

**Q: Share your insight into the contributions of each of your three seniors – Mitchell Cardenas, Ben Iames and Keegan Terry.**

## Q&A with Head Coach Steve Armas: A look at the 2012 Camels

A: In looking back at all three of their careers here at Campbell you can see their growth and development as individuals and players. We will rely on their experiences and leadership to carry the team this year. We will ask a lot of them. We are fortunate to have a player of Mitchell's ability lead this team. He is an integral part of how we play and his contributions in the attacking end will be necessary for this team's success. Ben liames is one of our biggest competitors, he has been an anchor for us in the back and will look to his leadership to help mentor our incoming players. Keegan allows us to play different systems/formations. We will rely on him to help us relieve pressure, contribute to our build up in the attack and most importantly in creating and scoring goals.

**Q: What are some of the key factors to gaining a real home field advantage at the Eakes Complex (where the Camels knocked off ACC member NC State last year)?**

A: There are a few things that need to happen. We need to put out a good product that spectators will enjoy. Additionally, we want to develop a mentality within our group that understands what playing at home means.

**Q: With nine players who started double-figure games returning from last year's squad, who do you view as key contributors from your veterans?**

A: It is a rare thing when you have so many key contributors return. My hope is that our seniors and captains will be our key contributors.

**Q: What do you feel are your team's strengths heading into the season?**

A: The past couple of seasons we have talked about the youth of the group. Now that the group has aged, with this age we have more experience. We have leadership in multiple spots on the field and it should aid in our success on and off the field.

**Q: By contrast, what are some areas that need improvement?**

A: Just like everyone we need to concede fewer goals and get more output from our attacking players.

# The Campbell Way

It is the goal of the Men's Soccer team at Campbell University to be exceptional in all we attempt. The driving force for our Program will be to strive for excellence in all we do on the field, in the classroom, and in life. Team members have a positive and passionate attitude towards the game and one another. The players are valued and respected, and expected to offer the same to others in our community. Our mission, goals and work ethic are governed by the principles below:

## Playing Style and System of Play

Campbell has a reputation for its disciplined play. We are committed to an organized effort defensively, paired with an attack-oriented style of play; we defend to attack. Passing ability and speed of play are essential to the success of our team. Players are encouraged to communicate and make the game as simple as possible, while given the freedom to create and take chances in the final third.

Though we define individual roles and responsibilities for each of our players, performing as a team is stressed and given top priority. It is our philosophy that the system of play be dictated by the players available for selection. Attacking and Defending Agreements are decided on as a group and fall within the confines of our System of Play.

## Training and Player Development

A practical roster size of twenty-four players and four coaches in the program allow us to be creative and specific in our training. Functional training by positions, pattern play, theme-based short-sided games to 11-a-side, along with soccer-specific fitness and strength training are a large part of how we prepare on the training ground. We believe this gives our players the best foundation (technically, tactically, and athletically) to develop and will allow them to be successful in competition.

## Community Service

Team members are expected to spend time serving the local community. The Men's Soccer team has volunteered time with the S.A.F.E program, Operation Christmas, Relay For Life, Red Cross Blood Drive, Operation InAsMuch, Buies Creek Elementary School, Harnett County Annual Food Drive, Buies Creek Fall Festival, at Raven Rock State Park. Several players and coaches have visited the Harnett Manor Retirement Home, Ronald McDonald House and Duke Children's Hospital, spending time with patients and handing out t-shirts and soccer balls. Additionally, players and coaches give back to the game each spring by providing a free clinic for children in Harnett, Wake and the surrounding counties. We want to be involved in the surrounding area, in appreciation of the support the community provides us while we are on the field.

## The Goal

It is the goal of our program to instill character, passion for the game and a solid work ethic in each member of the team. Ultimately, we want to see each player earn their degree, improve in the game and leave with a top-notch soccer experience. This goal is both the responsibility of the coaching staff and the student-athletes.

**Attacking Agreements**

1. Take 2/3 Chances and Always follow a shot
2. Know your options before receiving the ball, be aware / Soccer I.Q.
3. Avoid or limit Square passes when possible
4. Error on over-hitting long or splitting passes
5. Make the extra pass
6. Centerbacks don't force the ball into Midfield
7. Always be in position to support teammates and communicate that (Shape of players must Δ as the position of the ball Δ's)
8. Use the width in the Final 1/3 and look to play in combination
9. Midfielders look to "get through" the Forwards when possible
10. Always be Offside Aware
11. Work the side-line on Throw-in's
12. Patience v. Counter / Soccer I.Q.

Attacking understanding...if a player is uncomfortable with a situation, it must be ok with the team if he chooses to put a ball forward in the channel

**Defending Agreements**

1. Always Communicate with a Purpose and Person in mind.
2. Shape 1st... Rest 2nd / recover inward and ball-side
3. Inside our 18 yard box, we Man-up
4. Immediate chase as a team when we lose it in the Final 1/3
5. "Keep your feet" / go to ground only as absolute last resort, not a 1st thought
6. Opponent passes back, we step-up... "Take the space away"
7. Double the ball when opponent dribbles across or back
8. Challenge 1st ball / Win the 2nd ball
9. Goalkeeper calls "Goalkeeper"
10. If Goalkeeper calls for ball, we cover / If no Goalkeeper call, we compete
11. Pass back to Goalkeeper always outside near post
12. Outside Backs always retain balance even when in attack... 1 up, 1 back

Enters 2012 just two points shy of becoming the 30th player in Campbell's 49-year men's soccer history to reach the 50-career point level... Has played an average of 79 minutes per outing in his career... Trained with Sporting KC of MLS during the summer of 2012.

2011: Named 3rd-team All-South Atlantic Region by the NSCAA and 1st-team All-Big South Conference by league coaches... Selected to NCCSIA All-State 1st-team... Also named to Big South all-tournament squad... Finished 9th among league scoring leaders with 18 points on 6 goals and 6 assists... Was 8th in assists and tied for 5th with 2 game-winning goals... Established career highs for games started (20), minutes played (1730), goals (6) and points (18)... Had 5 goals and 2 assists in 9 games vs. Big South regular season foes... Scored twice and assisted on CU's other goal in a 3-1 victory over Liberty (10/25)... Netted two goals, including the game-winner, in a 3-2 triumph over VMI (10/29)... Named Big South attacking player of the week for Oct. 25-31 and gained national team of the week honors from CollegeSoccerNews.com... Named Offensive MVP and to the all-tournament team at the UNCW adidas Classic in September when he had a hand in 3 of CU's 4 goals in wins over Wofford (1-0) and Hartford (3-2)... ## Campbell Soccer Facilities

In the two decades since the Campbell University Soccer Stadium opened, spectators have witnessed some of the highest moments in Fighting Camel soccer history and observed the skills of many of the top stars in college play at the facility.

Located on the north border of the Buies Creek campus within the Marion and Mary Eakes Athletic Complex, the Stadium was dedicated in 1986. Since then, many improvements have been made within the complex, most notably the construction of the McLeod Athletic Training Facility during the summer of 2004 in the east end zone.

Named in honor of long-time university benefactors, Bernard and Virginia McLeod of Fuquay-Varina, the McLeod Athletic Training Facility serves as home for Campbell's nationally-accredited sports medicine program, as well as providing locker room space for the varsity men's and women's soccer and softball teams.

Opened in August 2004, the facility includes a 2,000 square-foot athletic training room, the primary space for Campbell's Athletic Training curriculum. It also contains four locker rooms, plus offices for the athletic training staff, plus the men's and women's soccer staff.

Situated in the east end of the Marion and Mary Eakes Athletic Complex, the McLeod Facility frames one end of the Campbell Soccer Stadium. Public rest room facilities for home soccer and softball games are also located on the north side of the red brick structure.

Lights were added at the Stadium prior to the 1994 season to allow for play after dark. A new scoreboard was erected at the southwest end of the field prior to the 2002 campaign. A new Campbell Soccer windscreen, complete with logos and graphics, was added in 2008, while a brick and wrought iron fence was erected in 2009.

In addition to the Soccer Stadium, two soccer practice fields, the Campbell Softball Field and the James Nisbet Tennis Center are located at the Eakes Complex.

In 1993, the men's team established its best-ever record at the facility, winning all nine of its matches at home. The Camels matched that perfect home regular season with an 8-0-0 mark in 2008 and finished 9-1-0 at the stadium for the year. In 23 seasons at the Stadium, Campbell's men own a 146-83-8 home field record (.633).

Campbell's men knocked off two nationally-ranked teams in 1988 when the Fighting Camels posted a 8-0 regular season record at the Stadium. Third-ranked North Carolina and 10th-ranked Duke fell victim that year to the Fighting Camels in Buies Creek.

In 2005, the Camels defeated 23rd-ranked Davidson at the Eakes Athletic Complex, marking the program's first win over a nationally-ranked team in 17 years. CU also clinched the Atlantic Sun Conference regular season championship with a 3-2 win over Florida Atlantic, improving its

home field record against A-Sun foes in the year to 4-0-0.

Campbell's men notched an 8-1-0 record at home in 2006, when the Camels again led the Atlantic Sun with an average attendance of 639. CU twice set Eakes Complex attendance records in a 1-0 victory over third-ranked North Carolina (1481) and a 4-0 triumph over Lipscomb on Homecoming (1857). CU led the A-Sun in men's soccer home attendance during '05 and 2006.

In 2007, the Camels finished second among A-Sun schools in home attendance, averaging 420 spectators per outing, with a high of 1056 for a homecoming win over USC Upstate. Campbell was also one of only three A-Sun schools to average more than 300 spectators at its home women's soccer contests in 2007.

The Camels again led the A-Sun in home attendance (479) in 2008, including a yearly-high 1187 spectators, who witnessed CU's third straight victory over (7th-ranked) North Carolina. Campbell hosted the 2008 and 2009 A-Sun Championship tournaments after winning the regular season title each year.

In 2011, Campbell drew with nationally-ranked Furman in the season opener at the Eakes Complex and knocked off ACC member NC State 1-0 in extra time on Oct. 4.

Since the women's program began in the 1992 season, the Lady Camels have fashioned a 91-67-15 record (.569) at the facility, including an 8-0-2 mark in 2004 when CU won the Atlantic Sun Conference regular season and tournament championships. CU's women finished the 2011 season with a 7-1-0 record at home.

In addition to the 2008 and '09 A-Sun men's championship, CU also hosted the 2000 Atlantic Sun Conference men's soccer tournament at the facility. The 1995, 2002 and 2004 A-Sun Women's Soccer tournaments were also held at the site. In 2004, Campbell set an Atlantic Sun Women's Soccer Championship attendance record for the semifinal and final rounds at the site en route to its first A-Sun title.

In addition, Campbell hosted two Big South Conference men's tournaments (1986, 1988) at the Stadium.

Six Camels have earned All-America honors while competing at the stadium, two-thirds of which is surrounded by a wooded area. David Doyle, a 1986 All-American who led the nation in scoring, twice tallied five goals in one match at the facility. Another Camel All-American, Juha Miettinen (1988) finished fourth nationally in scoring both as a sophomore and senior (1990). Toni Siikala twice gained NSCAA All-America honors (1993, 1995). Willy Guadarrama earned All-America notice in 2005 after leading the country in goals and points scored per game. Richard Jata (2008) was the sixth CU All-American to perform at the facility. Siikala was third nationally in scoring as a sophomore and second in his senior year. Pasi Kinturi earned All-America recognition following the 1996 season.

Some of the nation's most talented college players have competed at CU Soccer Stadium, including U.S. National Team performers Tab Ramos (North Carolina State), Dante Washington (Radford) and Thori Staples (North Carolina State).

Seating for 1,000 spectators is situated on an 18-foot earthen ridge across the Bermuda grass pitch from the team benches and press table. The field measures 75x120 yards.

## Head Coach Steve Armas



Steve Armas, who has helped build the Campbell University men's soccer program into a regional and national contender, is in his third year as head coach of the Fighting Camels.

A former collegiate and professional standout, Armas spent the 2006-09 seasons as an assistant coach at Campbell before accepting the head coaching job in January 2010.

Over the past six seasons, Armas has helped guide the Camels to three conference trophies, the team's first-ever berth in the NCAA College Cup and a year-end national ranking at the Division I level.

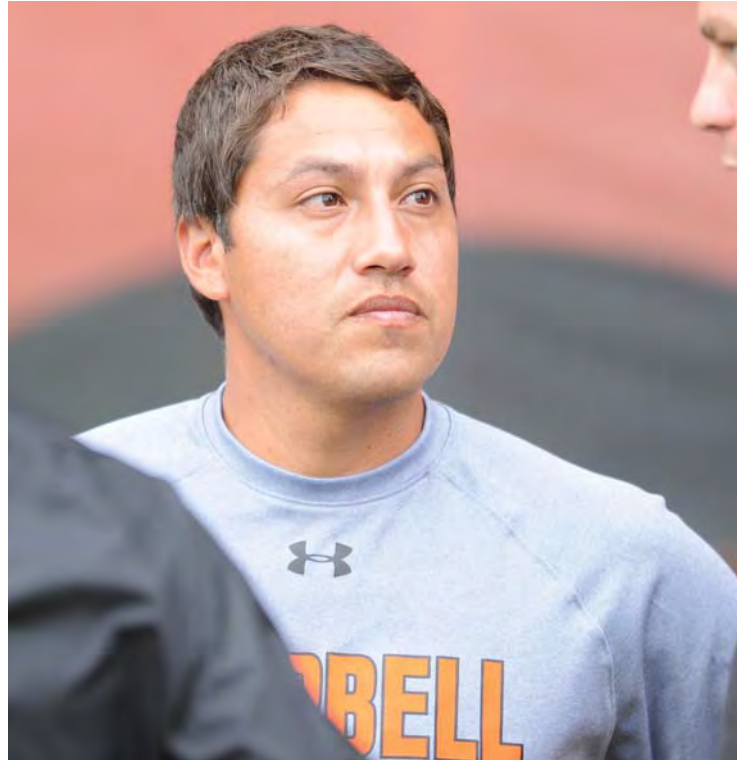
Now, the former Maryland and MLS standout is set to lead the Camels back to the top of the Big South Conference table.

Over his first two seasons as head coach, the Camels have recorded a 15-18-6 record against two of the toughest schedules in school history. His 2011 club finished 9-9-2 overall and placed third in the Big South Conference standings (5-4-0).

In addition, the Camels drew with nationally-ranked Furman and went 1-0-1 against Atlantic Coast Conference members in 2011, including a 1-0 extra time triumph over North Carolina State and a 1-1 tie at Virginia Tech.

Mitchell Cardenas earned third-team All-South Atlantic Region and first-team All-Big South Conference honors. Justin Franz and Travis Golden were tabbed second-team all-league, while Jhuvon Francis and Jonathan Ray were named to the Big South all-freshman team.

Since Armas' arrival as assistant coach in 2006, the Fighting Camels have compiled a 60-47-12 overall record (.555), including a 34-13-5 mark (.702) in conference regular season play. The Camels finished ranked among the top-10 in the final South Region poll in 2006, 2007 and 2008 and earned the school's first year-end national ranking (No. 25) in 2008 at the Division I level.



During his tenure at CU, Armas has mentored eight Campbell players who have been named to NSCAA All-Region squads as well as 32 who have been named to all-conference teams. In addition, 62 Campbell players have earned a place on conference All-Academic Teams.

Armas helped develop two A-Sun players of the year (Vince Petrasso and Richard Jata), the 2007 Atlantic Sun freshman of the year (Josue Soto) and the '07 A-Sun tournament MVP (Petrasso). His players have gained All-America (Jata), freshman All-America (Soto) and Academic All-America (Devin Sheppard) notice as well.

In his first year as a head coach, Armas led his squad to a 6-9-4 overall mark and 4-5-0 record in the A-Sun, securing a berth in the league tournament for the sixth-consecutive year. Despite fielding a side that included a combined 59 starts by freshmen, Armas' team was once again competitive, playing a total of 13 matches decided by one, or fewer, goals. CU also faced three nationally-ranked opponents and set a school record by playing to four draws.

Mitchell Cardenas was named to the 2010 A-Sun all-conference first team, while Ben Iames earned second-team recognition. Justin Franz was named to the all-freshman squad, while 10 Camels earned a spot on the A-Sun all-academic team.

In 2009, Petrasso was selected as A-Sun Player of the Year and first-team all-conference after the Camels captured their second-straight league regular season title and third in the last five campaigns. Senior Justin Madrid, junior Khalil Johnson and freshman Mitchell Cardenas were named to the all-conference second team. Cardenas was joined on the all-freshman squad by teammates Justin Smith and Keegan Terry.

In 2008, the Camels won the A-Sun regular season crown with a perfect 9-0-0 mark, finished 14-6-0 overall, defeated 7th-ranked North Carolina for the third-straight year, and was rated third in the final South Region

poll. CU finished the year as the third-highest scoring team in the nation (2.2) and set a school record with 12-consecutive victories.

The 2007 squad finished 13-6-3 overall, won the Atlantic Sun Conference tournament championship, and made the program's first appearance in the NCAA College Cup. CU knocked off ACC member North Carolina for the second-straight year and finished seventh in the final South Region ranking.

Before arriving at Buies Creek in July 2006, Armas spent two years as an assistant coach for both Greensboro College and the Carolina Dynamo of the United Soccer Leagues Premier Developmental League (PDL).

While at Greensboro College, Armas helped to guide the men's program to a 2005 USA South Conference tournament championship and a second round NCAA tournament appearance. With the Carolina Dynamo, Armas has had the opportunity to coach some of the best Division I collegiate players in the country. Two players from the 2005 Dynamo team have played in Major League Soccer -- Justin Moose of D.C. United and Floyd Franks of the Chicago Fire. The 2006 Dynamo squad included three Hermann trophy candidates.

A native of Germantown, Md., Armas played collegiately at the University of Maryland from 1995-98 and graduated in 2003 with a bachelor of arts in Spanish Language and Literature. He finished his career with 11 goals and 17 assists and ranks seventh among the school's career assists leaders. He helped lead Maryland to an ACC Tournament championship and captained the team to an NCAA College Cup appearance, where Armas was selected to the NCAA All-Tournament team.

Armas had an impressive professional playing career which included

stints with various clubs competing in Major League Soccer as well as the United Soccer League First and Second divisions. Armas played with the Pittsburgh Riverhounds of the USL2, where he helped the team capture the Atlantic Division and regular season championship. Armas spent the 2003 season with the Carolina Dynamo (USL2) where he played 17 games (1498 minutes), scored 5 goals and had 16 assists (2nd in the League) to help the Dynamo capture the regular season championship.

Drafted out of the University of Maryland in 1999 by the New England Revolution of MLS, Armas played with the Columbus Crew and Tampa Bay Mutiny of MLS as well as stints with USL First division clubs Atlanta Silverbacks, Minnesota Thunder and Cincinnati Riverhawks. He played in the U-17 World Cup in Japan, and also participated at the U-18, U-20 and U-23 national team levels. Armas holds a USSF "A" Coaching License.

Armas has also been especially active with the youth club community. He coached the '92 Elite team of the Capital Area Soccer League (CASL) for two years, which won the NCYSA State cup in 2010 and a final four appearance in 2011. He currently is the head boys coach for the CASL '95 Elite.

He coached the 92 Navy team with the Triangle Futbol Club for two years (2007, 2008), guiding the group to two final four appearances and one championship in the NCYSA state cup, two championships at the Jefferson Cup in Richmond, Virginia and another appearance in the finals at the esteemed Disney Showcase in Orlando, Florida.

Additionally, Armas spent three years as head and assistant coach with the North Carolina Olympic Development Program '93 Boys State Team.

He and his wife, Sarah, reside in Fuquay-Varina with their son James and golden retrievers, Amos and Wrigley.

## Assistant Coach Billy Englishby

Former Camel standout Billy Englishby is in his sixth year as an assistant coach with the Fighting Camel men's soccer program in 2012. A native of Preston, England, Englishby is involved in all phases of the operation, including on-field coaching and recruiting, as well as serving as assistant director of the Campbell men's soccer camps.



"I am very grateful for the opportunity to continue my coaching career at my alma mater in a more expansive role with Coach Armas and the Fighting Camel staff," said Englishby. "I look forward to continuing our relationship working with the current and future student-athletes, becoming a part of their development on and off the field while strengthening the values and traditions that have made this program successful."

During his first five years at Campbell, the Fighting Camels have compiled a 50-40-7 overall record. The Camels have finished ranked among the top-10 in the final South Region poll twice and earned the school's first year-end national ranking (No. 25) in 2008 at the Division I level.

In 2011, Campbell returned to the Big South Conference and finished 3rd in the league standings. In addition, the Camels drew with nationally-ranked Furman, while compiling a 1-0-1 record against Atlantic Coast Conference opponents, including a 1-0 extra time win over North Carolina State and a 1-1 tie at Virginia Tech.

Campbell claimed the Atlantic Sun Conference regular season championship for the second-straight year in 2009.

In 2008, the Camels won the A-Sun regular season crown with a perfect 9-0-0 mark, finished 14-6-0 overall, defeated 7th-ranked North Carolina for the third-straight year, and finished third in the final South Region poll. CU finished the year as the third-highest scoring team in the nation (2.2) and set a school record with 12-consecutive victories.

The 2007 squad finished 13-6-3 overall, won the Atlantic Sun Conference tournament championship, and made the program's first appearance in the NCAA College Cup tournament. CU knocked off ACC member North Carolina for the second-straight year and finished seventh in the final South Region ranking.

"I am excited to have Billy on staff and keep continuity within the program," said head coach Steve Armas. "He has been an integral part in the success of our program in recent years. Billy is an individual of high character and a great coach. I look forward to working together with Billy to continue the growth and development of Fighting Camel Soccer."



In his first two years on the Fighting Camel staff, Englishby mentored 2008 A-Sun Defensive Player of the Year Aaron Johnson. A four-time all-conference and three-time A-Sun all-tournament selection, Johnson set the lowest goals-against average (1.08) in Campbell's 46-year men's soccer history. As a senior, the keeper led the A-Sun in GAA (0.993), shutouts (9) and save-percentage (.780) while earning second-team All-South Region honors.

Since graduating in 2003 with a B.S. in exercise science, Englishby has been involved in the club coaching ranks in the Triangle area. He coached club teams in Fayetteville and Charlotte before accepting a position as Director of Coaching for the U-6 classes in 2004 at Soccer Dome America in Raleigh.

Englishby also began work with the Goldstar Soccer Club in Raleigh during 2004. He served as Director of Goalkeeper Training and head coach of both the '91 and '94 Goldstar Select teams.

Currently, Englishby is coaching with the Triangle United Soccer Association. He is the head coach of the '95 Boys Triangle United Gold. He previously served as Triangle United director of Goalkeeper training for Wake County. Englishby is also head coach of the North Carolina Olympic Development Program '97 State Team.

Englishby holds the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Premier Diploma and the United States Soccer Federation "B" License. In addition, he has earned the NSCAA Advanced National and National diplomas, plus the Football Association Junior Managers certificate.

During his three-year career at Campbell, Englishby started every game he played (44). He still ranks among CU's all-time leaders in goalkeeper matches played and started, minutes played (3954) and saves (201).

Englishby served as a co-captain during his senior year, and earned the team's coaches award as a junior in 2001 when he suffered a fractured cheekbone, but missed only four games.

In his first year with the Camels (2000), he earned A-Sun Defensive Player of the Week honors twice. He recorded 13 saves while facing 30 shots in a 1-0 loss at North Carolina. Later in the year, he posted back-to-back shutouts of UNC Wilmington and Stetson.

Englishby won U-19 County honors three times and was selected for the U-18 England Residential Coaching Camp. He led Fulwood Amateurs FC to the Lancashire Cup in both 1997 and 1998.

He and his wife, Grace, reside in Fuquay-Varina.

## 2011 Review: CU unbeaten vs. ACC, Wins BSC Sportsmanship Award

A red-hot October propelled Campbell to a third-place finish in the Big South Conference standings, but the Fighting Camels could not overcome injuries to key players down the stretch and finished the year with a 9-9-2 overall record, 5-4-0 in the league.

Campbell went 6-1-1 in eight games during October, including a win at home over North Carolina State and a 1-1 draw at Virginia Tech. CU also knocked off eventual Big South tourney champion Liberty on Oct. 25.

However, season-ending injuries to versatile midfielder-defender Eduardo Rodriguez, speedy forward Jhuvon Francis limited Campbell in the attack and the Camels fell to High Point in the Big South tournament quarterfinal round.

Nevertheless, second-year head coach Steve Armas' club went 2-0 at the UNCW adidas Classic and drew with nationally-ranked Furman in addition to finishing 1-0-1 against Atlantic Coast Conference members.

Junior midfielder Mitchell Cardenas led six Camels on the Big South all-conference teams by earning first-team recognition. He hit career highs in games played (20) and started (20), goals (6) and points (18). He ranked seventh among Big South scoring leaders with 18 points and fifth in assists (6).

Cardenas was also named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-South Atlantic Region third team and to the all-state team by the North Carolina Collegiate Sports Information Association (NCCSIA). He was also selected for the Big South all-tournament team.

Justin Franz (2 goals, 4 assists) and Travis Golden were second-team all-conference selections. Jonathan Ray led all Big South players with six assists in league regular season play and was joined by Francis (4 goals, 2 assists) on the Big South all-freshman team.

Sophomore keeper Ethan Hall earned a spot on the Big South all-academic team after compiling a 3.59 grade-point average as a sport management major and logging career highs in games played, starts, minutes and saves.

Campbell shared the 2011 Big South Conference's Team Sportsmanship Award for men's soccer with Liberty. The honor is part of the Big South's Sportsmanship Awards program that began in 2005-06.

The team awards are voted on by Big South student-athletes and are awarded at the end of each competitive season.

"Our program is extremely proud to receive this award," said second-year head coach Steve Armas. "Our staff and players take great pride in building a respectful program. Conducting ourselves with integrity, with character and always, in an ethical manner are core values of our program. This award is a positive reflection on the University and our program; it will serve as motivation to reinforce all aspects of Campbell Soccer."

The Camels were whistled for only 9.9 fouls per game and were issued only 15 yellow cards all season – lowest among all Big South schools. The most times that any one player was cautioned were three over the course of the season. No Campbell player or coach received a red card during the 2011 campaign.

Nine Camels -- Jhuvon Francis, Ethan Hall, Ben Iames, Scooter Oliver, Eduardo Rodriguez, Keegan Terry, Aleks Tossavainen, Brian Urioste, Michael Wisniewski -- earned a spot on the Big South Presidential Honor Roll by compiling a grade point average of 3.0 or higher during the 2011-12 academic year.

## Campbell Men's Soccer Timeline

**1963:** Jim "Catfish" Cole is named head coach of Campbell College's first men's soccer team.

**Sept. 28, 1963:** Campbell loses to North Carolina State 9-2 in its first match. Nowris Cardan scores the first goal in Campbell soccer history.

**Oct. 12, 1963:** Campbell defeats Belmont Abbey 9-2 for the first victory in the program's history. Nowris Cardan scores four goals, en route to a team-high nine goal season.

**Nov. 11, 1964:** The Camels end the season with a 2-1 victory over St. Andrews to secure their first winning campaign at 7-5-0.

**Oct. 28, 1966:** Campbell sets a school record for goals scored in a 10-0 over Methodist.

**Nov. 9, 1968:** Freshman Gary Woodward scores a school-record six goals in a 12-0 victory against Baptist. David Amsler sets a school record (that still stands) with four assists.

**December 1968:** Richard Murphy is honored as Campbell's first soccer All-American.

**Sept. 30, 1969:** The Camels defeat East Carolina 13-1 behind Gary Woodward's six goals.

**Oct. 24, 1969:** Campbell wins its school-record 10th-straight game. The Camels would tie their next match against Guilford before losing for the first time in the campaign to N.C. State on Halloween.

**Nov. 11, 1969:** The Camels defeat St. Andrews 1-0 on Bill Young's goal with 47 seconds remaining in the second OT to win their first NAIA District 29 championship.

**Nov. 15, 1969:** Campbell defeats Erskine 3-2 on Bill Young's second goal of the day -- with just one minute remaining -- to win the NAIA Area 5 title.

**Nov. 26-29, 1969:** The Camels make their first NAIA National Tournament appearance. At Richmond, Ind., Campbell loses 5-0 to Eastern Illinois in the opener, then defeat Westmont (Calif.) 2-1. Tai Adeleke's goal at the 3:01 mark of sudden death OT provided CC with a 2-1 victory over Ottawa (Kan.) and fifth place in the tourney. Campbell finishes its season with a school-record 16-2-1 mark.

**Sept. 25, 1970:** Gary Woodward breaks his school record with seven goals in an 11-2 win over Monmouth.

**Oct. 10, 1970:** Bill Young scores six of CC's goals in an 8-1 win at East Carolina.

**Nov. 14, 1970:** At Buires Creek, John Bush scores twice and Bill Young once as the Camels defeat Erskine 3-2 for their second-straight NAIA Area 5 championship.

**Dec. 2, 1970:** Bill Young scores twice to lift Campbell to a 4-1 win over Earlham (Ind.) College in the first round of the NAIA National Tournament, hosted by the Camels at Dunn, N.C. The victory is CC's school-record 11th-straight win.

**Dec. 3, 1970:** Quincy ends CC's win streak and national title hopes with a 4-1 victory in the NAIA semifinals.

**Dec. 5, 1970:** Bill Young scores twice, including the winner with 15 seconds remaining in the final period, to lift Campbell to a 2-1 triumph over New Paltz (N.Y.) and third place in the NAIA National Tournament. Young is named to the all-tournament team.

**Dec. 1970:** Jim "Catfish" Cole is named NAIA National Coach of the Year after CC matched its school-record won-lost mark at 16-2-1 and the Camels scored a school-record 98 goals. Mike Glover is named NAIA All-American. Gary Woodward scores a school-record 35 goals, followed closely by Bill Young's 31 strikes. Young concludes his career with 70 goals in 56 games.

**Oct. 12, 1971:** The Camels set a school record for goals scored in a 14-1 triumph over Pfeiffer. John Bush and Eduardo Abad score four each.

**Nov. 17, 1971:** CC defeats Belmont Abbey 5-1 to improve to 14-0-1 on the year, a school record for most consecutive games without a loss.

**Nov. 19, 1971:** Erskine edges the Camels 4-3 in the NAIA Area 5 Championship game. Gary Woodward scores twice to complete the year with a school record 38 goals. He concludes his career with an NAIA national record 117 goals in only 67 games. CC matches its school record with 98 goals and finishes the year at 14-1-1.

**Sept. 25, 1973:** Tai Adeleke and David Korman score four goals each in CC's school-record 17-0 win over North Carolina Wesleyan.

**Nov. 9, 1973:** The Camels match their school record with 11-straight wins in a 3-0 triumph over Pembroke State.

**Oct. 22, 1974:** CC wins its 11th-straight match to open the year in a 2-0 victory against St. Andrews.

**Nov. 19, 1974:** Tony Lotierzo scores twice, but the Camels lose 4-3 to Erskine in the Area 5 playoffs. Lotierzo ends the season with 29 goals in 16 games.

**Dec. 1974:** Defender John Beyer is named NAIA All-American.

**Nov. 15, 1975:** The Camels capture their third Area 5 championship with a 2-0 victory over Warren Wilson.

**Nov. 26-29, 1975:** CC makes its third NAIA National Tournament appearance and finishes 6th in the event at Raleigh, N.C. After an opening 4-2 loss to Western New England, Campbell downs Houghton (N.Y.) 2-1 before losing to Fredonia State (N.Y.) 4-3. Jim Cole ends his coaching career after 13 seasons, 138 victories and three national tournament appearances.

**Nov. 4, 1976:** Under new coach Darrell Saunders, the Camels claim their sixth District 29 championship in their final year of NAIA competition.

**Oct. 29, 1977:** Campbell completes its first year as an NCAA Division I member with a 7-7-1 record under coach Wayne Cunningham.

**Sept. 1981:** First-year coach Tim Morse guides Campbell University to its best start in Division I play -- a 6-0-2 record -- en route to a 10-4-4 season.

**Nov. 1983:** Campbell earns its first season-ending South Region ranking (No. 9) as a Division I member.

**Nov. 10, 1984:** David Nisbet is named tournament MVP after CU defeats Winthrop 2-0 to win the inaugural Big South Conference championship at Radford, Va.

**Apr. 25, 1985:** Richard Murphy is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Nov. 23, 1985:** CU makes it back-to-back Big South crowns with a 3-1 victory over Radford in the league final at Conway, S.C. Per Jensen is named tournament MVP.

**Sept. 1, 1986:** Campbell plays its first match in the new CU Soccer Stadium at the Eakes Athletic Complex, but drops a 2-0 decision to Loyola (Md.).

**Sept. 6, 1986:** David Doyle scores a school Division I record 5 goals in a 5-0 victory over Elon.

**Sept. 24, 1986:** Doyle again scores all five goals in a 5-0 blanking of Winthrop.

**Oct. 27, 1986:** CU explodes for its greatest offensive output as a Division I member in an 11-0 win over Armstrong State.

**Dec. 1986:** David Doyle is named 2nd-team NCAA Division I All-American after leading the nation in scoring with 34 goals and 6 assists (74 points). Tim Morse resigns as head coach following the season after directing the team to 65 wins and two league titles in six seasons.

**Sept. 7, 1988:** Darren Dawson's second half goal propels the Camels to a 2-1 win over third-ranked North Carolina, the highest-rated Division I team that Campbell has ever beaten.

**Oct. 5, 1988:** Goalkeeper Peter Moore's school-record 18th career shutout comes in a 2-0 victory over 10th-ranked Duke.

**Oct. 10, 1988:** Second-year coach Gary Hall's Camels gain the first ISAA national ranking (No. 16) in school history since joining Division I.

**Oct. 17, 1988:** After a 14-1 start, the Camels are ranked 14th nationally in the ISAA poll, their highest rating as a Division I member. CU would lose its next match at UNC Charlotte three days later and fall out of the national ratings.

## Campbell Men's Soccer Timeline

**Nov. 3, 1988:** In the longest match in CU soccer history -- 131 minutes, 38 seconds -- the Camels are upset in sudden death overtime by Baptist 2-1 in the semifinals of the Big South tournament.

**Dec. 1988:** After finishing fourth in the national scoring race with 21 goals and 49 points, Juha Miettinen is named second-team All-American by the NSCAA.

**Feb. 1989:** Barry Howard, a former All-South defender in the '60s at Campbell and longtime assistant coach, is named head coach of the Fighting Camel program. The Camels would advance to the 1989 Big South championship game and the 1990 league semifinals under his direction.

**August 3, 1991:** Derrick Leeson is named head coach of the Camel program.

**Nov. 9, 1991:** The Camels become the first team in league history to advance through the Big South tournament without allowing a goal and win their third conference title in a 4-0 triumph over Winthrop in the final at Conway, S.C. Rami Kauppi is named tournament MVP.

**Nov. 7, 1992:** The Camels defeat UNC Greensboro 5-0 in the championship match of the Big South tourney. Rami Kauppi, who scored four goals in a 5-0 semifinal win over UMBC, is again named tournament MVP. Kauppi finishes third in the national scoring race with 51 points on 20 goals and 11 assists.

**Oct. 2, 1993:** Gary Woodward is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Oct. 13, 1993:** Campbell improves to 12-1-0 on the year with a 6-3 win at Maryland.

**Nov. 6, 1993:** The top-seeded Camels drop a 2-1 decision to host UNC Greensboro in their final Big South championship game. CU ends its 10-year league membership as the only program to advance to at least the semifinal round of the conference men's soccer tournament.

**Dec. 1993:** Toni Siikala (23 goals, 14 assists) and Brian Hunter (23 goals, 10 assists) finish the year third and fifth, respectively, among the nation's scoring leaders. Siikala is named second-team All-American by the NSCAA and Derrick Leeson is tabbed South Region Coach of the Year. CU finishes the year ranked seventh in the South.

**Jan. 1994:** Campbell announces that it will join the Trans America Athletic Conference for the 1994-95 academic year.

**Nov. 4, 1994:** CU suffers only its second losing season of the '80s and '90s in a 4-2 overtime setback against seventh-ranked Florida International in the TAAC Tournament semifinals at Charleston, S.C.

**Nov. 10, 1995:** Toni Siikala scores his final goal in a CU uniform, his 68th in 60 career games, as the Camels defeat Florida Atlantic in the TAAC semifinals at Miami.

**Nov. 11, 1995:** With Toni Siikala on the bench nursing an injured back, the Camels drop a 4-1 decision to the College of Charleston in the TAAC championship at Miami.

**Dec. 1995:** Toni Siikala is named first-team All-American after tying for the national goal scoring lead with 25 strikes.

**Nov. 9, 1996:** The Camels make their fifth league finals appearance in six seasons under coach Derrick Leeson, but drop a 3-2 decision to host College of Charleston in the TAAC championship. The decisive goal comes with just six seconds remaining in the second overtime period.

**Dec. 1996:** Pasi Kinturi is named third-team All-American by the NSCAA.

**Oct. 4, 1997:** Coach Jim "Catfish" Cole is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Nov. 6, 1997:** Derrick Leeson is named TAAC Coach of the Year for the second time in three years.

**June 6, 1999:** Former coach Jim "Catfish" Cole is inducted into the North Carolina Soccer Hall of Fame.

**June 24, 1999:** Former player Andrew Maughan is presented the North Carolina Governor's Award for Bravery and Heroism by Governor James B. Hunt in ceremonies at Raleigh. The award is given to Maughan in recognition of his acts on May 25, 1998 when he pulled a child from a burning automobile.

**Summer 1999:** Jimmy Biringier, Buddy Edwards, Matt Harrison, Mathew Hooker, Pasi Kinturi and Andrew Maughan join David Doyle, Brian Hunter, Ricky Mobley and Toni Siikala in professional soccer, giving Campbell an all-time high 10 alumni in the pro ranks.

**June 4, 2000:** Former Campbell player Bill Holleman is inducted into the North Carolina Soccer Hall of Fame. Holleman went on to become one of the nation's top high school coaches and served as a venue director for World Cup '94 and the 1996 Atlanta Olympics.

**Oct. 7, 2000:** Dave Amsler is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**January 2002:** Derrick Leeson resigns as head coach at Campbell after leading his teams to 101 victories and two league championships in 11 seasons.

**Feb. 1, 2002:** Doug Hess is named Campbell's ninth men's soccer head coach in the 40-year history of the program.

**Oct. 5, 2002:** Bill Holleman is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**August 2003:** John Payne (CU 1987-90) wins a United Soccer Leagues Division 3 Professional National Championship with the Wilmington Hammerheads.

**Oct. 4, 2003:** Barry Howard is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Summer 2004:** David Doyle ('87) retires from professional indoor soccer after 19 seasons, including 12 with the Dallas Sidekicks. He finishes as the eighth-leading goalscorer in U.S. pro indoor soccer history with 637.

**January 2005:** CU recruit Sonny Guadarrama makes international debut with U.S. U-18 National Team.

**Sept. 13, 2005:** Campbell defeats number-23 Davidson 2-1 for the program's first victory over a nationally-ranked school since Oct. 10, 1988.

**Sept. 24, 2005:** Sonny Guadarrama's overtime golden goal lifts the Camels to a 1-0 victory at 25th-ranked UNC Wilmington as CU records its second win over a nationally-ranked school during the year.

**Oct. 6, 2005:** Willy Guadarrama sets a school record for most goals scored vs. an A-Sun

opponent with five strikes in a 7-0 win over Stetson in Buies Creek. Guadarrama's first goal is the fastest to open a game in Campbell history, just 26 seconds in the the match. CU ties school records for most goals scored vs. an A-Sun opponent and victory margin vs. an A-Sun opponent.

**Oct. 31, 2005:** Willy Guadarrama appears in Sports Illustrated's Faces in the Crowd.

**Nov. 5, 2005:** Campbell defeats Florida Atlantic 3-2 to win its first Atlantic Sun Conference regular season championship since joining the league in 1994.

**Nov. 10, 2005:** Campbell sweeps Atlantic Sun Conference individual honors as Willy Guadarrama (Player of the Year), Sonny Guadarrama (Freshman of the Year), Aaron Johnson (Co-Defensive Player of the Year), Devin Sheppard (Co-Defensive Player of the Year) and Doug Hess (Coach of the Year) are recognized by league head coaches.

**Nov. 12, 2005:** Campbell drops a 2-1 decision to Stetson in the A-Sun final to end its regular season at 13-6-1, the program's best record since 1996.

**Dec. 2005:** Willy Guadarrama (21 goals, 46 points) finishes 1st among national leaders in goals and points scored per game. Sonny Guadarrama (13 goals, 32 points) finishes 16th in points per game and 18th in goals per game to rank as the program's highest-scoring teammates since 1993. Aaron Johnson ranks 8th nationally in saves per game. Willy Guadarrama named 3rd-team All-American by the NSCAA. Sonny Guadarrama is named 2nd-team Freshman All-America by College Soccer News.

**Mar. 2006:** Sonny Guadarrama invited to participate in U.S. Under-20 National Team camp.

**July 2006:** Sonny Guadarrama signs pro contract with 1st division Santos of Mexico.

**Oct. 2006:** Sonny Guadarrama debuts with Mexican U-20 National Team vs. Ecuador.

**Oct. 10, 2006:** Campbell defeats 3rd-ranked North Carolina 1-0 in front of an Eakes Athletic Complex record crowd of 1481. The victory marks the highest-ranked opponent since CU defeated 3rd-rated UNC 2-1 on Sept. 7, 1988.

**Oct. 21, 2006:** Campbell breaks 11-day old Eakes AC attendance record when 1857 see 4-0 win over Lipscomb on Homecoming. David Doyle, a 1986 All-American, is inducted into Campbell's Sports Hall of Fame.

**Nov. 2006:** Campbell is ranked No. 10 in the final NSCAA South Region poll, the program's first year-ending regional rank since 1993.

**Dec. 2006:** Devin Sheppard named first-team Academic All-America® by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

**Jan. 18, 2007:** Willy Guadarrama is selected in the fourth round of the Major League Soccer supplemental draft by the Kansas City Wizards, and signs a contract two months later. Guadarrama is the first CU soccer player to join an MLS team.

**Sept. 15, 2007:** Campbell wins its first in-season tournament since 1988 by defeating Duquesne (2-1) and host Richmond (2-1) in the Nike Challenge Cup. Josue Soto is named tournament MVP after scoring twice and assisting on another goal.

**Oct. 31, 2007:** For the first time in the 21-game series, Campbell defeats North Carolina in consecutive matches. Josue Soto and Richard Jata score in the 2-1 victory.

**Nov. 13, 2007:** Campbell ranked 7th in final South Region poll. Josue Soto is named A-Sun Freshman of the Year.

**Nov. 14, 2007:** Campbell sets a school record for goals scored in an A-Sun tournament game in a 6-1 first-round victory over Gardner-Webb. Vince Petrasso and Richard Jata each score twice.

**Nov. 17, 2007:** Campbell claims its first A-Sun tournament championship in a 5-4 penalty kick decision over Jacksonville. The teams played to a 1-1 draw (CU's school-record 7th tie of the year) through overtime before tournament MVP Vince Petrasso nets the deciding PK.

**Nov. 24, 2007:** CU makes its first-ever appearance in the NCAA Championship tournament, but drops a 2-0 decision at 20th-ranked Furman.

**Dec. 2007:** Josue Soto is named 2nd-team Freshman All-America by College Soccer News.

**August 2008:** Campbell is chosen to finish first in the A-Sun pre-season poll for the third-straight year.

**Oct. 28, 2008:** Campbell defeats 7th-ranked North Carolina 2-0 for its third-straight win over the Tar Heels.

**Nov. 1, 2008:** Campbell defeats Mercer 3-0 to become the first team in Atlantic Sun Conference history to finish with a perfect 9-0 league record and claim CU's second A-Sun regular season title.

**Nov. 12, 2008:** Doug Hess is named A-Sun Coach of the Year, Richard Jata Player of the Year and Aaron Johnson Defensive Player of the Year.

**Nov. 13, 2008:** Campbell defeats Belmont 7-1 in the A-Sun semifinals to set a school record with its 12th-consecutive victory.

**November 2008:** Campbell earns its first-ever, season-ending national ranking (No. 25 by Soccer America) and its highest-ever South Region final rank (No. 3) as a Division I member.

**December 2008:** Richard Jata is named 2nd-team All-American and is joined on the All-South teams by Aaron Johnson, Stephen Oyuga and Josue Soto.

**January 15, 2009:** Richard Jata is chosen in the fourth round of the Major League Soccer SuperDraft by the Chicago Fire.

**April 17, 2009:** Juha Miettinen, a former All-American and three-time All-South performer, is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Oct. 22, 2009:** Campbell extends the nation's longest unbeaten streak in conference play to 16 games following a 2-0 victory at Stetson.

**Nov. 5, 2009:** Doug Hess is named A-Sun Coach of the Year and Vince Petrasso named A-Sun Player of the Year.

**Dec. 16, 2009:** Vince Petrasso named 2nd-team All-South Region.

**Jan. 13, 2010:** After leading CU to A-Sun Championships in 2005, 2007, 2008 and 2009, Doug Hess resigns as head coach to accept the same position at Drexel University.

**Jan. 29, 2010:** Steve Armas is named the 10th head coach in the 47-year history of the program.

**Apr. 9, 2010:** Toni Siikala, CU's first two-time soccer All-American, is inducted into the Campbell Sports Hall of Fame.

**Oct. 5, 2010:** Campbell and Furman play to a 0-0 draw at Greenville, S.C., marking CU's school-record fourth tie in the season.

**Oct. 28, 2010:** Keegan Terry and Khalil Johnson score two goals each and Mitchell Cardenas adds 3 assists as CU ties a school record for goals scored vs. an Atlantic Sun Conference opponent in a 7-0 win over Belmont in Buies Creek.

**July 1, 2010:** After 17 years as a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference, Campbell University re-joins the Big South Conference, of which it was a charter member from 1983-94.

**Aug. 26, 2011:** Campbell opens the year with a 0-0 draw against nationally-ranked Furman at the Eakes Athletic Complex.

**Sept. 28, 2011:** The Camels host Radford in CU's first Big South Conference regular season game since Oct. 1993.

**Oct. 1, 2011:** Campbell defeats Gardner-Webb 3-1 for its first Big South regular season win since a 3-1 triumph at UNC Greensboro on Oct. 27, 1993.

**Oct. 4, 2011:** Ben Iliames golden goal lifts Campbell to a 1-0 win over Atlantic Coast Conference member North Carolina State at the Eakes Complex.

**Dec. 2011:** Mitchell Cardenas named 3rd-team All-Southeast Region.

## Support Groups

### Athletic Training

CU's Athletic Training staff offers all Fighting Camel student-athletes the best available medical care for athletic injuries. They design and implement programs to prevent, manage and treat athletic injuries. They also supervise injury rehabilitation programs that are designed to return the athlete to athletic activity as quickly and safely as possible.

The athletic training services program is directed by head athletic trainer Jackie Knight, four assistant athletic trainers and five interns/graduate assistant athletic trainers.

In addition, the staff also provides hands on experience to a number of students majoring in athletic training. These students are enrolled in a challenging academic major that not only requires that they make the grade in the classroom but also must excel in real-life situations.

The education program is directed by Catherine Simonson. The Athletic Training staff also works closely team physicians, Dr. Bill Hage and Dr. Richard Slusher of Triangle Orthopedics in Raleigh and Dr. Michael Hart and Dr. Kristin Clarey of Cary Family Practice and Sports Medicine to provide quality physician services to student-athletes. They also have a team chiropractor in Dr. David Bradham of Bradham Chiropractic in Erwin. Other allied health care needs available within the athletic training services program include optometry, dentistry, and sports massage.

### Student-Athlete Support Program

The Campbell Athletics Department is committed to academic excellence and to promoting student-athlete welfare through the broad-based Student-Athlete Support Program. Under the guidance of Malinda Ashcraft, Associate Athletics Director for Academic Services and Campbell's Senior Women's Administrator, programs are available that provide opportunities for student-athletes to grow academically, socially, spiritually, emotionally and physically.

The Student-Athlete Support Program was created to assist student-athletes with a number of issues ranging from the development of personal responsibility and educational goals to addressing personal and social problems that are unique to the Division I student-athlete.

Some of the services offered through the Student-Athlete Support Program are the Individual Study Plan program, tutorial sessions, study halls, one-on-one academic advising, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, NCAA Life Skills and other academic support services.

The Academic Support Center is the focal point of the program. The center is open seven days a week with flexible hours designed to accommodate the busy schedule of a student-athlete. The center has been designed to serve as an optimal learning environment, while providing the student-athlete with all the tools necessary to achieve academic success.

The center is equipped with several computer work stations, individual study carrels, and areas for monitored group study and tutorial work. Tutorial sessions of different subject areas are provided several times a week for the student-athletes. The center also provides the student-athlete with a convenient place to study, either individually or in a group setting, where his or her progress can be supervised.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee is comprised of members of the 21 varsity sport programs at Campbell who are nominated by their head coaches. The group was organized to facilitate communication and involvement between student-athletes and administrators and to better integrate athletes into the general student body.

As a branch of the SAAC, the Camels CARE Team is comprised of student-advisory members, whose mission is to develop ways to increase university representation in community service activities. Proposed committee activities include: Special Olympics, "Adopt-a-Grandparent," tutoring services for local grade schools, the Big Brother / Big Sister organization and a speakers' bureau.

To these young adults, athletics becomes more than an end in itself, but rather a means by which they may fully develop their character, and in the process, make a positive impact on the world around them.

### Strength and Conditioning

The Campbell University strength and conditioning facilities are located at the John W. Pope Jr. Convocation Center and the Willard B. Harris Training Center.

Although specific strength and conditioning programs are designed for each sport, the basic goal is the same – to help athletes increase their full potential in all areas of fitness: strength, speed, flexibility and stamina.

Workouts are supervised by Andrew Carter, who is in his fourth year as head strength and conditioning coach. To assist in the student-athlete's routines, the improved facilities are stocked with a wide array of free weights, stationary plate-loaded machines and a number of aerobic machines.

Members of each of CU's 21 varsity teams meet on a weekly basis, with some teams training and preparing for competition several times a week. Campbell's strength and conditioning program has an ultimate goal of achieving the maximum potential, in order to better prepare student-athletes in competition.



### The Fighting Camel

Many stories exist as to the origin of the nickname "Fighting Camels" and the adoption of a camel as the mascot of Campbell University athletic teams. To date, there is still uncertainty as to why the unique mascot (only one other school in the United States -- and none in Division I -- has the nickname "Camels") was chosen.

According to historian J. Winston Pearce, author of "Campbell College, Big Miracle in Little Buies Creek," the nickname's origin perhaps stretches back to the turn of the century when all but one of the school's original buildings were destroyed by fire. In the aftermath, Z.T. Kivett visited the school's founder and president, Dr. James Archibald Campbell, at his residence.

As Dr. Campbell bemoaned the fate of the institution he had worked 13 years to build, Mr. Kivett encouraged him, "Your name's Campbell; then get a hump on you! We've got work to do." Dr. Campbell thought that Mr. Kivett said, "You're a camel, get a hump on you." Hence the nomadic nickname.

Campbell's athletic teams were originally named the "Hornets." Copies of Creek Pebbles, the school newspaper, in the 1920s and 1930s described the teams as "Hornets." Other references to the athletic teams were "The Campbells" or the "Campbellites."

Although an official date is unknown, the changing of the mascot to a camel came in late 1933 or early 1934. There is no explanation why the nickname was changed to Camels, only this one sentence was printed in the Jan. 13, 1934 issue of Creek Pebbles: "Eight new men were recently initiated into Campbell's monogram club, which has changed its name from 'Hornets' to 'Camels.'"

From that point on, all Campbell athletic teams have proudly worn the Camel mascot.

## Big South Conference

Since its founding in 1983, the Big South Conference has matured into a competitive leader in college athletics, actively pursuing excellence on the field of play and in the classroom. The League's growing presence as an NCAA Division I athletic conference is evident by athletic accomplishments on the national stage, innovative marketing and media partnerships, increased television packages, and quality athletic competition while intentionally fostering the academic, personal, social, athletic and leadership development of each student-athlete. This has evolved into the Conference's mission of "Developing Leaders Through Athletics." The 2012-13 academic year features the Big South's largest membership (12) and sponsored sports (19) in its 29 years of existence.

The Big South Conference was formed on August 21, 1983, when Charleston Southern (then Baptist College) Athletic Director Howard Bagwell and Augusta President George Christenberry began recruiting members into the Big South, receiving initial commitments from Augusta, Charleston Southern, Campbell, Coastal Carolina and Winthrop. One month later, Dr. Edward M. Singleton was selected as the League's first Commissioner and continued to solicit new members. His efforts led to the additions of Armstrong State, Radford and UNC Asheville, giving the Big South more than the required six members to constitute an official conference. The Big South's first year of competition was in the Fall of 1984, and in September 1986, the Big South Conference was granted full-fledged NCAA Division I status.

During its infancy and prior to securing automatic bids to NCAA Championships, the Big South made early strides in earning at-large berths in several national postseason events, including volleyball, women's basketball and women's golf. In 1989, George F. "Buddy" Sasser replaced the retiring Dr. Singleton as Commissioner, and in 1990, the League received its first automatic bid – receiving an automatic qualifier to the NCAA Baseball Championship. Under Sasser's seven years of leadership, the Conference implemented its public relations and compliance programs, and introduced its first-ever men's basketball television package, featuring the Big South competing among some of the finest teams in the nation.

In August 1996, Kyle B. Kallander replaced Sasser as the League's third Commissioner, and in his 16 years at the helm of the Big South, Kallander has been instrumental in aggressively promoting the Conference to new heights. The Conference has enjoyed record levels in marketing revenue during his tenure, he has brought television coverage to Big South women's basketball, baseball, softball and men's soccer for the first time in Conference history, as well as increased national television exposure to the League as a whole through aggressive and unique television packages.

Under Kallander's leadership, the Big South developed and initiated its first long-range strategic plan, re-affirming the League's vision as a distinctive athletic Conference committed to the quality of institutional life through athletic competition. He also spearheaded the efforts to add football as a championship sport, which came to fruition in 2002, and oversaw the additions of men's and women's indoor track & field in 1997. The Conference's 19th championship sport -- women's lacrosse, begins play this season with eight members. At the same time, Kallander has solidified Conference membership, as an all-time high 12 member institutions comprise the 29-year old League. Recent additions include High Point, Gardner-Webb, Presbyterian College and Longwood, plus the return of charter member Campbell University. Kallander's long range vision has also included technological advancements, as the Conference introduced

its first live video streaming event in 2005 and has since expanded its video offerings to more than 700 events annually through a partnership with the member institutions, as well as the creation of several online and social media platforms.

In the last 15 years alone, the Big South Conference has experienced monumental growth and success in nearly every sport. During this time, the Conference has had an individual National Champion six times, has had more than 280 All-Americans, has reached the "Sweet 16" in men's soccer, women's basketball and baseball, has received national Top 25 rankings in football, men's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's outdoor track & field, and men's golf, had an individual selected to play in the NCAA Singles Championship seven times in addition to the first men's tennis doubles at-large selection, had the first women's golf program advance to the national finals, had the No. 1 ranked men's golfer in the country, had the nation's top scoring men's basketball team five consecutive years as well as the national men's basketball scoring leader twice, received an at-large playoff berth in the Football Championship Subdivision in 2006, has had six NFL Draft picks, and has had two institutions finish in the top 10 in the NCAA Men's Golf Championships -- including the Conference's highest-ever team finish in an NCAA event (fifth in 2007).

This past season, the Big South had a record 41 student-athletes earn All-America distinction, while another 10 were named Academic All-Americans. The Conference also won its first football playoff game (Stony Brook), had the national women's basketball Rookie Coach of the Year,

had two men's soccer teams reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in a decade (Coastal Carolina, Liberty), and had a record five individuals selected for the NCAA Men's Golf Regionals -- the most of any Division I conference in 2011-12. In addition, Liberty was the first men's golf team in Confer-

ence history to win an NCAA Regional, and the Flames went on to finish 10th at the national event.

Several former Big South student-athletes have also reached national prominence in recent years. Coastal Carolina's Amber Campbell made the U.S. Olympic Team in 2008 and 2012, and was one of five former Big South athletes to compete in the 2008 Games; VMI's Reggie Williams reached the NBA with the Golden State Warriors in 2010, UNC Asheville's Ty Wigington was named an American League All-Star in 2010, and Coastal Carolina's Dustin Johnson has won six PGA Tour events since departing the Big South Conference in 2007. Three former Big South baseball players made their major league debuts in 2012, while Avery Warley became the third Big South women's basketball player to play in the WNBA.

The Conference's tagline, "Developing Leaders Through Athletics" was unveiled in 2008-09 in conjunction with the Conference's 25th Anniversary. The League also honored its heritage with the Top 25 "Best of the Best" moments in League history from 1983-2008, with Liberty University's 10-year women's basketball championship run from 1996-2007 being crowned the No. 1 moment in the Big South's first 25 years. The Conference's on-field accomplishments have been duplicated in the classroom. Annually, more than 40 percent of Conference student-athletes are named to the Big South's Presidential Honor Roll for maintaining a cumulative 3.0 grade-point average, and the League has had more than 100 Academic All-Americans in its 28 years of existence. Furthermore, the Big South has recorded double figure totals in NCAA Public Recognition Awards for APR progress the last three years.
