SEASON OUTLOOK

Fresh Faces, Key Returnees Look to Bring Camels Success in 2007

The 2007 Fighting Camels will have a vastly different look from the 2006 squad. Gone are 23 players who accounted for a vast majority of the playing time and production. Shaking up the roster are seven true freshman and six transfers eager to make an impact on the everyday lineup. These 13 new faces will look to gel with 14 returnees to help Campbell to a successful 2007 season.

The 2006 cast finished with a 19-38 record overall and a 13-17 mark in Atlantic Sun play as the Camels qualified for their second Atlantic Sun Tournament in three years. The story of the season was the inability to win close games, as the Camels lost 17 games by two runs or less.

With new faces at several key positions, the Camels will look to contend in the Atlantic Sun from wire to wire in 2007.

Catchers

Catching took a big hit for Campbell over the summer. With the graduation of Matt Marek and the transfer of rising senior David Forbes to East Carolina, the Camels lost two solid backstops from offensive and defensive standpoints. Forbes and Marek teamed up to start 54 of 57 games behind the plate in 2006. Their void will be filled by redshirt sophomore Todd Matthews and freshmen Bryan Braswell, Andrew Caron and Brandon York. Matthews and the trio of freshmen will have to continually learn from their experience and learn how to handle the staff in a short period of time.

Heading into the season Braswell will most likely be the opening day starter. Braswell comes to Campbell from Northern Nash HS in Rocky Mount, N.C. where he was named to the all-state team last season after hitting .315 and throwing out 80 percent of attempted base-stealers. Braswell's ability to work with the pitching staff coupled with a strong throwing arm will be his biggest assets to the Camels this season.

Matthews batted .286 in limited action, seeing time in 14 games last spring in various roles. An injury to his foot in the fall may limit his availability, but there is a possibility that Matthews will be ready for the '07 season.

Matthews' leadership skills behind the plate will be counted on when he's out on the field and in practice helping bring along the new freshmen. Matthews showed his potential at the plate in limited action last year where he has the potential to be a solid line-drive type singles hitter.

Caron should also challenge for time behind the plate. The Waynesboro, Pa. native joins the Camels after a successful senior season at Waynesboro Area HS in which he batted .400 with two home runs and 25 RBI en route to an all-conference and Mid-Penn all-star selection.

The coaching staff has a lot of confidence in Caron after he showcased his capabilities in the fall. Caron's physical strength serves him well, and some fine-tuning of his throwing from behind the plate this fall will pay dividends in stopping the opponent's running game this spring. Caron has a bright future ahead of him and has the potential to produce when called on this season.

York will provide much needed depth to the catching corps as a reliable option off the bench. He makes the trek to Campbell from Miller's Creek, N.C. where this past summer he led his Caldwell American Legion Baseball squad with a .440 average. While at West Wilkes HS he helped lead his team to three state tournaments in four seasons.



Jacob Allen

Infield

CU returns the middle part of its starting infield from last season in sophomores Jacob Allen and Ryan Hamme. However, two big voids were left at the corners by the graduation of Mike Priest and Tim Holt. Priest's and Holt's name dot the Campbell record book as Priest sits in the top-10 in seven single-season categories while Holt holds similar standing in four. On the career list, Priest occupies 10 top-10 slots.

With the departure of Priest, Hamme is set to make the move from second to first base. Hamme, a Wilmington, N.C. native, earned a second team All-Atlantic Sun nod last season to go along with Atlantic Sun All-Freshman Team honors after batting .312 with two home runs and 31 RBI.

Hamme's overall upside and size has allowed for a smooth transition from second to first base, and is expected to be a key contributor in the middle of the Campbell lineup again this season.

Allen looks to return to his role as the everyday shortstop for the Camels. The sophomore from Raleigh, N.C. was a fixture in the everyday lineup, as he was one of three Camels to play in 56 of 57 games last season. Allen accumulated a .234 average with three home runs and 25 RBI last season and will look to improve in '07 with the experience gained from '06.

Allen came in as a highly touted freshman, being named one of the top 50 recruits in North Carolina for the 2005 graduating class. By getting thrown in the fire last season, Allen earned valuable experience and made great strides. The belief around the program is that Allen will keep getting better and will produce for the Camels for years to come.

Zach Johnson looks to be the prime candidate to be Allen's partner in the middle of the infield. The freshman from Smithfield, N.C. gives the Camels what has the potential to be a strong double-play combo. Johnson brings an impressive resume with him to Campbell. He was a two-time all conference selection and team defensive MVP his junior and senior seasons. Johnson finished his high school career by batting .428 with five home runs and 28 RBI his senior season.

Johnson's blue-collar attitude has carried over from high school through the fall season, as he has worked hard to correct some issues with his swing. His defensive skills look to be as sharp as any on the team, as he turns the double play as well, if not better, than anybody on the team. Johnson's production on the offensive and defensive side sides will be vital to the success of the team this spring.

Freshman Rob Lyster appears to be in line to take over starting duties at third base. The Indian Trail, N.C. native was an integral part of his Piedmont High School team, as he was a two-time All-State selection and put up a .402 average to go along with eight home runs and 63 RBI in his three-year high school career.

Lyster's versatility has been a boost to the Camels, as he came in as a shortstop but can be called upon to play second or third as well. Lyster's outstanding fall swinging the bat has will hopefully carry over to give the Camels an offensive boost.


Robb Meng should also challenge for a good amount of playing time in the Campbell infield. The junior transferred to CU from Monroe Community College in Rochester, N.Y. where he set the school's single season records hits (82) and doubles (24). His strong stick and ability to play solid defense will give Meng a good opportunity to make his mark on the Camels this spring.

Another redshirt freshman Matt Gardner returns from last year giving the Camels another option in the middle of the infield. Gardner hails from Huntersville, N.C. where he lettered three times for Hopewell HS. During the '06 season Gardner excelled in the classroom, where he earned a place on the Atlantic Sun All-Academic Team.

Freshman Blake Lowry comes into the spring as one of the options for the designated hitter role. In his high school career at Garner Magnet High School, Lowry showed a penchant for the long ball, belting 26 home runs in his four-year high school career. His senior season proved to be a productive one, as he batted .350 with nine home runs. His efforts earned him a second team all-state selection his junior season and a first team selection his senior year.

Lowry's power could give the Campbell lineup the power boost it needs this season. This will help the freshman log some at-bats at the DH spot this spring.

Mike Cheeseman will also challenge for some at-bats at the DH spot. The redshirt freshman was hampered by injuries last season and this fall, but should be 100% for the beginning of the '07 slate. A Burlington, Vt. native, Cheeseman

was a four-year letter-winner at Burlington High School, where he was named to the All-Metro Team his sophomore and junior seasons.

Outfield

Last season, the outfield was the deepest of any position on the Camel squad. This season the outfield situation has taken an about-face, as CU comes into the season with Brandon Scott, Daniel Smith, Carlton Floyd and Mike Causey occupying the only outfield spots on the roster. However, the members of this foursome all bring college experience to the table, giving the Camels reason to be optimistic.

Scott, a Robersonville, N.C. native, took hold of the starting right field position early last season and never relinquished it. Scott batted .364 with four home runs, 26 RBI and amassed a team-leading 25 stolen bases. His stellar '06 season earned him a second-team All-Atlantic Sun selection.

Smith, a versatile redshirt sophomore, will be looked upon to make the move from second base to the outfield this season. Last season the Raleigh, N.C. native saw action in 28 games producing a .257 average while driving in seven runs.

Smith is one of three current Camels that begin their third season on the team. His experience in the program could pay-off for CU this spring. Smith is an average-type, contact hitter which will provide the Camels a solid option in the outfield.

The Camels continued to tap into their pipeline from Lenoir Community College, as Causey is one of four Lancer alums to occupy a roster spot for CU. The junior from Wilmington played a key role in Lenoir's success last season as he earned first team All Region X honors after hitting .361 with seven home runs and 53 RBI.

Causey's athleticism will help in the outfield, and his two years of experience at Lenoir will give the Camels another veteran presence in the outfield.


Pitchers

The strength of this year's edition of Fighting Camel baseball lies in the pitching staff, led by pitching coach Brad Schrock. All three of CU's weekend starters in Blake Herring, Chris England and Quinn LeSage return for their senior year, while set-up man Ryan Hamme and anticipated closer Brandon Scott come back to anchor the back end of the bullpen for CU.

The staff also returns sophomore relievers Carlton Floyd and Jared Lehman while Carlos Dominguez also returns after not seeing any game action last year. The final returning member of the pitching corps is Austin Harris, who will sit out the 2007 season after having off-season Tommy John surgery. In addition to the host of returnees, the Camels boast four new pitchers to round out a deep and talented pitching staff.

LeSage comes off a solid junior campaign in which he tied for the team lead in wins (5), logging 86.1 innings for CU. The right-hander from Helena, Mont. transferred to Campbell from Columbia Basin Community College in Pasco, Wash. LeSage will be counted on to produce wins on the weekend for the Camels in the 2007 season.

This fall LeSage emerged as leader on and off the field, which is a plus to go along with his solid skills on the hill. LeSage's competitive fire and reliability on the mound are major assets to a squad that will need big things from him this year.



Herring played a big role in his first season for the Camels. The junior transfer from Lenoir Community College put up a 3-3 record with a 5.36 ERA in 85.2 innings. Herring led the Camels in several other statistical categories such as appearances, games started, strikeouts and complete games and figures to play a large part in the Camels success in 2007.

Herring is one of the anchors of the pitching staff with three quality pitches and a knack for keeping baserunners close. His pickoff move is viewed as the best on the team.

England is the third of the expected weekend starters for the Camels this season. The senior from Bradford, Ontario was shuffled between his middle relief role and starting role throughout the season, as he made a team-leading 19 appearances, starting seven of them. England wound up tied for the team lead in wins, putting up a 5-6 record with four coming as the starter.

Floyd returns expecting to fill numerous roles for CU. Floyd should challenge for a starting spot in the outfield while also providing the Camels a left-handed hitting option in the designated hitter spot. Floyd saw nearly all of his action as the Camel's first left-handed option out of the bullpen last season. The Riegelwood, N.C. native made 17 relief appearances, sporting a 6.23 ERA in 21.2 innings of work. His lone win of the year was arguably Campbell's biggest, as he pitched 2.1 innings of scoreless relief to defeat Texas Tech 7-5.

Floyd's arm will be counted on again to log innings out of the CU bullpen, as his solid fall on the mound solidified his spot on the staff. The Camels will also turn to Floyd for his bat and fielding abilities.

Lehman, of Pine Grove, Pa., will look to make an impact on the staff this season as well. The sophomore right hander hurled 8.2 innings spread out over seven appearances. Lehman will be counted on to solidify the middle of the bullpen as well as making the occasional spot-start for the Camels.

Dominguez returns in '07 looking to log some innings for the Camels. The native Venezuelan did not see any game action last season, but should challenge for some time out of the Campbell bullpen.

Three junior college transfers and one freshman will make up the remainder of the '07 Camel pitching staff. Matt Martinez, Justin Lilly and Trevor Smith all come in from the junior college ranks while Wilmington, N.C. product Hunter Ford stands as the lone freshman on the Camel staff.

Smith joins the Camels after one season at Lenoir Community College. A local product from Lillington, N.C. and Harnett Central HS, Smith led the LCC Lancers with a 9-1 record and 75 strikeouts last season. The sophomore is slated to play a big role on Campbell's staff and should make a push for a starting spot.

Smith will be counted on to log innings, whether it be starting or relieving, and will be one of the keys to the success of the pitching staff this year.

Lilly begins his Campbell tenure after spending his first two seasons at Louisburg College. The Camels have had success with pitchers from LCC. In 2005 for CU, Hurricane Mike Ange earned second team Atlantic Sun honors. Likewise, Lilly looks to be one of CU's go to guys this spring after compiling a 3-2 record with a 3.57 ERA and 19 strikeouts in 17.2 innings in 2006. Lilly's breaking ball will be an asset, as big things are expected from the tall right-hander this season.


Martinez rounds out the new junior college arms for the '07 season. The Peoria, Ariz. native brings some west coast flare to the Camel staff, as he comes to Bries Creek from Phoenix College in Arizona. During his two years as a Bear, the junior lefthander pitched 126.2 innings, compiling four wins and striking out 68 batters.

Martinez worked in the fall, changing his delivery to get more movement on his fastball. Martinez should see a quality number of innings on the mound because of his ability to miss bats and keep hitters off-balance.

Ford stands as the lone freshman pitcher on an experienced staff. The Wilmington, N.C. native joins the Camels and former Ashley High teammate Ryan Hamme after a successful high school career for the Eagles. His junior season proved to be a memorable one as he was named to the North Carolina Preps All-State Team after posting a 1.14 ERA and setting the school record for shutouts.

Ford will be used exclusively in a middle-relief role for the Camels. His solid fall showing ensured the freshman opportunities this spring.

All-in-all, the 2007 season proves to be one of great promise for the Fighting Camels. With depth on the mound and solid players at every position, the Camels look to make some noise in the always tough Atlantic Sun.

Former Fighting Camel standout Chris Wiley joined the Campbell staff in July 2006 as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. He was named interim head coach on Jan. 10 and will serve in that capacity through the 2007 season.



Wiley spent the 2006 season at Division II Limestone College, where he served as pitching coach. A native of Dudley, N.C., Wiley coached Saints all-region pitcher Kevin Pucetas, who was chosen by the San Francisco Giants in the 17th round of the 2006 Major League Baseball amateur draft.

Prior to his year at Limestone, Wiley served two seasons (2004-2005) as assistant coach at Louisburg Junior College. During his stint at LC, Wiley helped lead the Hurricanes to an 89-31 record and two NJCAA Region X championships. Three of the LC players Wiley coached went on to join the Fighting Camel program – Mike Ange, Ricky Howard and Justin Phillips.

In addition to his work at Limestone and Louisburg, Wiley has been active as a coach in the Coastal Plain League, a summer collegiate league that spans the Carolinas and Virginia. He has served as head coach of the Gastonia Grizzlies for the last two seasons, guiding the club to a second-half West Division title and berth in the 2005 Pettit Cup playoffs.

Wiley, who was an assistant at Gastonia in 2004, has also spent time as an associate scout for the Kansas City Royals. He also served as an assistant coach with the Carolina Black Sox of the Southern Collegiate League during the summer of 2003.



Henry Rochelle's Five Home Run Game

Babe Ruth, Hank Aaron, and Mickey Mantle never did it. Neither did Willie Mays, Joe DiMaggio or Mike Schmidt. In 1985, Henry Rochelle, then a freshman at CU, hit five home runs in a game to establish a record that has yet to be equaled in the Major Leagues. The mark stood for 14 seasons in the NCAA Division I ranks until Marshall McDougall

of Florida State hit six home runs against Maryland on May 9, 1999.

Rochelle's five-home run performance came in a 38-0 win against Radford University on March 30, 1985 at Taylor Field. In his "once-in-a-lifetime" game, Rochelle went 8-8, scored eight runs, blasted five home runs and knocked in 10 runs.

Rochelle established new NCAA records for most home runs (5) and most total bases in a game (23), while tying the NCAA standard for most runs scored in a game (8).

Rochelle's home runs came in the first, third, fourth, seventh, and eighth innings. His incredible performance lifted his batting average from .302 to .412 and his slugging percentage from .419 to .804. He had not

homered prior to the game and hit more home runs in that contest than he did during his high school career.

"I couldn't believe I hit five," Rochelle said at the time. "I was expecting a lot of breaking balls after I hit the first couple of homers and the last two I hit out were curves. I was just looking to get a base hit when I went to the plate. I guess it's one of those once-in-a-lifetime things. It's kind of hard for me to believe."



TAYLOR FIELD

Since the late 1940's, Taylor Field has been the home of Campbell baseball, but the Taylor Field that hosts the Fighting Camels at the turn of the century is a far cry from that on which they play today. Long praised for having one of the best playing surfaces in the state, the facilities that surround the grounds have been much improved over the last six years.

Upgrades have included the installation of lights to allow for night play and less missed classes for the Camels and their opponents. A new scoreboard, refurbished press box, improved batting cages, bullpen areas and new dugouts and spectator seating have also been added during the last 10 years. Just three seasons ago, foul screens, which includes a low brick wall at the base and four flag poles were added. The latest addition to Taylor Field includes a brand new scoreboard in right field shortly before the 2006 season. It replaced the previous scoreboard which dated back to the 1989 season.

The facility was named in honor of Herbert B. Taylor, an avid supporter of Campbell athletics and friend of Leslie Campbell. Taylor, a former Campbell trustee, was a huge supporter of baseball in the Harnett County area. He organized the Knee Pants Baseball League and received national acclaim when the President of the United States wrote him a personal letter commanding his work in this field. Each year, the Taylor Award is presented to the top returning player on the Campbell baseball team.

Taylor Field's dimensions are 337 down the left field line, 368 in the left-center gap, 395 to center, 375 to the right-center gap and 328 down the right field line.

The site hosted the Big South Conference Tournament in 1985, 1987 and 1988. It also was home to the North State Summer League Tournament which included North Carolina, N.C. State, UNC Wilmington, East Carolina as well as Campbell in 1981 and 1982.



The Willard B. Harris Training Facility

Inspired by the Los Angeles Dodgers Spring Training Camp in Vero Beach, Florida, Campbell University's Baseball Training Center will provide additional training and development opportunities to those athletes who desire to excel.

The heated building provides space and equipment for supplemental pitching and batting practice for players who, on their own time, desire to further their capabilities. The outdoor pitching and practice infield area permits further development of individual skills.

From a team standpoint, the heated indoor facility offers a site for pre-season and in-season training during inclement weather. These facilities are expected to enhance pitching and hitting capabilities of team members and supplement general practices and scheduled games.

Featured in the facility are three full-length batting cages, which can be utilized for specialized drills or to face live pitching. These cages can be rolled back to make room for various other drills and activities such as pitching or defense specific work. Lining the walls of the hitting facility are several different weightlifting and cardiovascular machines. The facility is not only utilized by the Campbell baseball team, but also the softball, track and cheerleading teams.

A native of Warrenton, N.C. and resident of Martinsville, Va., Willard B Harris is a long-time benefactor of Campbell University.

After graduating from John Graham High School in Warrenton, Harris enrolled in college on a baseball scholarship, but a draft notice and subsequent arm injury ended his playing career. He enrolled at Campbell and was a quarterback on its 1948 conference champion football team.

He graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he received a Bachelor of Science degree and a master's degree.

Harris retired as Vice President/Finance of Tultex Corporation of Martinsville, Va., a sweatshirt manufacturer. He was honored by Campbell in 1987 with the Distinguished Alumni Award.

CAMPBELL BASEBALL HIGHLIGHTS

- Campbell's baseball history stretches back to the institution's junior college days. Since attaining senior college status, the Fighting Camels diamond squads have won 814 games entering the 2007 season.
- At least 43 of Campbell's baseball players have been drafted or signed contracts with professional organizations, with seven Fighting Camels reaching the major leagues. Two Camels were drafted following the 2000 season, Daniel Hall in the 15th round and Byron Batson in the 42nd round, both by the Milwaukee Brewers.
- Two former Camels won the coveted Cy Young Award as the top pitcher in Major League Baseball. Jim Perry won the 1970 award after compiling a 24-12 record and a 3.03 earned run average with the Minnesota Twins. Jim's brother, Gaylord, became the first pitcher ever to win the Cy Young in both leagues. He claimed the 1972 American League Cy Young while with the Cleveland Indians and won the 1978 National League honor as a member of the San Diego Padres. The Perry brothers rank as the second winningest sibling pitching combination in Major League history with 529 wins from 1959-82.
- Gaylord Perry, who won 314 Major League games, was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1991.
- Calvin Koonce won junior college All-American honors for the Camels in 1960. He then went on to a 10-year major league career, including World Series championship with the 1969 New York Mets.
- Koonce returned to Buies Creek in 1980 as head coach and over the next seven seasons, became the winningest coach in Fighting Camel baseball history. Koonce's teams amassed a 174-123-1 (.586) record and his 1985 and 1986 squads enjoyed the school's first 30-win seasons. The 1986 Big South Coach of the Year, Koonce passed away on October 28, 1993 after a four-year battle with cancer.
- The 1985 squad led the nation in home runs per game (2.21) by clouting 106 round-trippers in 49 contests.
- On March 30, 1985, freshman outfielder Henry Rochelle set an NCAA Division I record by hitting five home runs in a 38-0 win over Radford at Taylor Field. Rochelle went 8-for-8 on the day, scored eight runs and drove in 10. He established new NCAA records for most homers and total bases (23) in a game and tied the NCAA mark for runs scored. The mark stood until May 9, 1999 when Marshall McDougall of Florida State hit six home runs against Maryland.
- In June 1986, John Posey became Campbell's highest draft pick ever when he was selected by the Baltimore Orioles in the second round of the annual June draft. Posey left CU with career records for highest batting average (.401), most home runs (50) and RBI (165) in just three seasons.
- In 1988, Kenny Milton was named Third-Team GTE Academic All-American. Kent Cox matched the feat in 1995 by earning Third-Team Academic All-American honors.
- The Fighting Camels won the 1988 Big South Conference Tournament with a 17-0 triumph over Baptist in the title game at Conway, South Carolina. CU tied a school record with 32 wins.
- Freshman right-hander LaGrande Russell tossed the first no-hit game by a Camel on the Division I level on Apr. 29, 1989 when he blanked Augusta College in a seven-inning game played at Fayetteville, North Carolina.
- Campbell made an improbable run to the 1990 Big South Conference Championship and earned the league's automatic berth to the NCAA Regionals. After finishing the regular season 11-31, CU swept through the Big South

tourney in four games and went on to face top-ranked Stanford and Southern Illinois in the NCAA West I Regional at Palo Alto, California.

- Junior catcher J.C. Hendrix was named Big South Player of the Year in 1991 after ranking fourth nationally in hitting with a school record .464 batting average.
- Campbell began play in the Trans America Athletic Conference in the 1994-95 academic year (renamed the Atlantic Sun in June 2001).
- Kent Cox ended his career in 1996 with school records for most hits (269), games (207) and at-bats (774). Cox is tied for seventh in school history with a .348 career average.
- In 1998, William McLean became the third Camel to earn GTE Academic All-American honors in a decade.
- In 1999, Wes Hepler was named Honorable Mention Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball after he posted a 6-2 won-lost record and 4.57 ERA.
- Campbell was represented on the GTE Academic All-District 3 Baseball team for the sixth consecutive year when first baseman Mike Campbell was selected in 1999.
- In 2000, the Camels advanced to the championship game of the TAAC Tournament. CU recorded four wins over nationally-ranked teams that season. Chip Smith was named TAAC Coach of the Year.
- In 2000, Nic Carter was named Honorable Mention Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball after he batted .300 with 24 RBI and 13 stolen bases.
- In 2001, The Camels recorded the most wins in school history (33). CU set a new school-record for conference wins (17) and stolen bases (104). Wes Hepler set a single season school-record for wins in a season (11). Four Fighting Camels received All-Conference honors.
- In 2001, Rob Finch was named Honorable Mention Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball after posting a 4-4 record and a 4.57 ERA.
- On May 10, 2002, CU defeated Samford 9-8, giving Chip Smith his 175th coaching win at Campbell to pass Calvin Koonce as the school's all-time winningest head coach.
- In 2002, Nic Carter was selected in the fourth round of the Major League Baseball draft by the Milwaukee Brewers. In just three years, Carter set the school record for career triples (15) and stolen bases (76).
- In 2003, Derek Barrows was drafted in the 30th round of the Major League Baseball draft by the San Francisco Giants. Barrows was the 10th player under former coach Chip Smith's watch to be drafted or sign a professional contract.
- In 2005, Mike Priest was named to the ESPN The Magazine / Academic All-American University Division Baseball second-team as voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Priest maintained a 3.90 GPA while majoring in biology / pre-med.
- On Feb. 19, 2005 Campbell swept Ohio in a double-header to give former coach Chip Smith 400 wins in his collegiate coaching career.
- In 2006 Mike Priest ended a decorated career by earning ESPN The Magazine / Academic All-American University Division Baseball first team honors. Priest ended his three year stint with the Camels by setting the single season record for hits (90) while posting a 3.9 GPA studying biology / pre-med.



STUDENT-ATHLETE TRAINING, CONDITIONING & SUPPORT

Athletic Training

Campbell University student-athletes have access to one of the finest sports medicine care programs in North Carolina. CU's Athletic Training staff offers all Fighting Camel student-athletes the best available medical care for athletic injuries. They design and implement programs to prevent, manage and treat athletic injuries. They also supervise injury rehabilitation programs that are designed to return the athlete to athletic activity as quickly and safely as possible. The athletic training services program is directed by head athletic trainer Dave Hammons, MED.,ATC/LAT and assistant athletic trainer Catherine Simonson, MA, ATC and two athletic training interns. In addition, the staff also provides the education to more than 35 students majoring in athletic training. These students are enrolled in a challenging academic major that not only requires that they make the grade in the classroom but also must excel in real-life situations. The education program is directed by Dr. Mary Jones. The Athletic Training staff also works closely with Dr. Chris Stewart, M.D., and Mr. Jerry Brenneman, P.A., of Campbell University Student Health Services and team physicians, Dr. Kurt Ehlert and Dr. Bill Hage of Orthopedic Sports Medicine Associates of Raleigh to provide quality physician services to student-athletes. Other allied health care needs available within the athletic training services program include optometry, dentistry, chiropractic and sports massage.

Strength and Conditioning

The Campbell University strength and conditioning facilities are located inside Carter Gymnasium and the Willard B. Harris Training Center.

Although specific strength and conditioning programs are designed for each sport, the basic goal is the same - to help athletes increase their full potential in all areas of fitness: strength, speed, flexibility and stamina.

Workouts are designed and supervised by David Johnston, who is in his second year as the director of Campbell's strength and conditioning program.

To assist in the student-athlete's routines, the improved facilities are stocked with a wide array of free weights, stationary plate-loaded machines and a strong amount of aerobic machines.

Members of each of CU's 19 varsity teams meet on a weekly basis, with some teams training and preparing for competition several times a week.

Campbell's strength and conditioning program has an ultimate goal of achieving the maximum potential, in order to better prepare student-athletes in competition.

Student-Athlete Support Program

The Campbell Athletics Department is committed to academic excellence and to promoting student-athlete welfare through the broad-based Student-Athlete Support Program. Under the guidance of Dr. Debbie Snell, Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance and Academic Services, programs are available that provide opportunities for student-athletes to grow academically, socially, spiritually, emotionally and physically.

The Student-Athlete Support Program was created to assist student-athletes with a number of issues ranging from the development of personal responsibility and educational goals to addressing personal and social problems that are unique to the Division I student-athlete.

Some of the services offered through the Student-Athlete Support Program are the Individual Study Plan program, tutorial sessions, study halls, one-on-one academic advising, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, NCAA Life Skills and other academic support services.

The Academic Support Center is the focal point of the program. The

center is open seven days a week with flexible hours designed to accommodate the busy schedule of a student-athlete. The center has been designed to serve as an optimal learning environment, while providing the student-athlete with all the tools necessary to achieve academic success.

The center is equipped with several computer work stations, individual study carrels, and areas for monitored group study and tutorial work. Tutorial sessions of different subject areas are provided several times a week for the student-athletes. The center provides the student-athlete with a convenient place to study, either individually or in a group setting, where his or her progress can be supervised.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee is comprised of members of the 19 varsity sport programs at Campbell who are nominated by their head coaches. The group was organized to facilitate communication and involvement between student-athletes and administrators and to better integrate athletes into the general student body.

As a branch of the SAAC, the Camels CARE Team is comprised of student-advisory members, whose mission is to develop ways to increase university representation in community service activities. Proposed committee activities include: Special Olympics, "Adopt-a-Grandparent," tutoring services for local grade schools, the Big Brother/Big Sister organization and a speakers bureau.

To these young adults, athletics becomes more than an end in itself, but rather a means by which they may fully develop their character, and in the process, make a positive impact on the world around them.



ATLANTIC SUN CONFERENCE

History

Founded September 19, 1978, the Atlantic Sun Conference has operated over a quarter century in the ever-changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics with a consistent commitment to its Constitutional Mission to "assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports." Formerly known as the Trans America Athletic Conference, the A-Sun changed its name in June of 2001 and introduced a new visual identity that distinguishes the league.

Bill Bibb became the A-Sun's third full-time commissioner when he took the reigns in October of 1991. Bibb followed Lou McCullough (1983-91) and Bob Vanatta (1979-83). The A-Sun office has been in Macon, Georgia, since April, 1992, after relocating from Athens, Georgia (1983-1992). The first office was located in Shreveport, Louisiana (1979-1983).

Academic Excellence

The Atlantic Sun Conference continues to prove that it excels both athletically and academically. In 2005-06, more than 50 percent of the conference's student-athletes who participated during the season earned all-academic honors. For the spring season alone, 52.2 percent of student-athletes in the A-Sun were honored, as compared to 50.0 percent during the fall, giving the conference a 51.4 percent total.

This marks the third consecutive year that the A-Sun has surpassed the 50 percent total. Belmont University won the A-Sun All-Academic Trophy for the fifth consecutive year. The award is given annually to the conference school with the greatest percentage of student-athletes receiving all academic honors. The Nashville school finished with 65.1 percent of all student-athletes earning the honor. For the fourth consecutive year, women's cross country had the highest rate of student-athletes earn all-academic, as 66.7 percent (92 of 138) were honored, with women's golf placing second at 64.6 percent. Four women's cross country and four women's soccer teams received All-Academic national recognition from their respective coaches associations.


Merger's Will Emerson earned A-Sun Student-Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive year and academic All-America on the men's basketball first team. On the women's side, ETSU women's soccer standout Erin Ashton was voted A-Sun Student-Athlete of the Year. Both received NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships.

The bar for academic excellence in the league was set in 2003-04 as Belmont broke its own single-season conference mark with 71.4% of

its athletes earning All-Academic honors (152 of 213). A record 52.8 percent of all A-Sun athletes earned all-academic honors that year.

Athletic Excellence

The A-Sun has continually matched its classroom achievement with success on the playing fields. Over the past eight-plus years, the A-Sun has posted NCAA wins in each of the team sports that it sponsors. For the seventh straight season the A-Sun advanced multiple teams to the NCAA Baseball Championship, with tournament champion Stetson and regular season champion Jacksonville receiving bids in 2006. The A-Sun also sent multiple teams to the NCAA men's golf championship for the fourth straight season in 2006 as Top-15 ranked ETSU joined A-Sun champ Jacksonville at NCAA Regionals. The A-Sun received multiple postseason berths in men's basketball for the third time in five seasons as Belmont made their first NCAA Championship appearance and Lipscomb earned an NIT bid. The women's programs matched the men as Florida Atlantic faced LSU in the NCAA Tournament and Belmont traveled to Volunteer State rival Tennessee Tech for a WNIT game.
