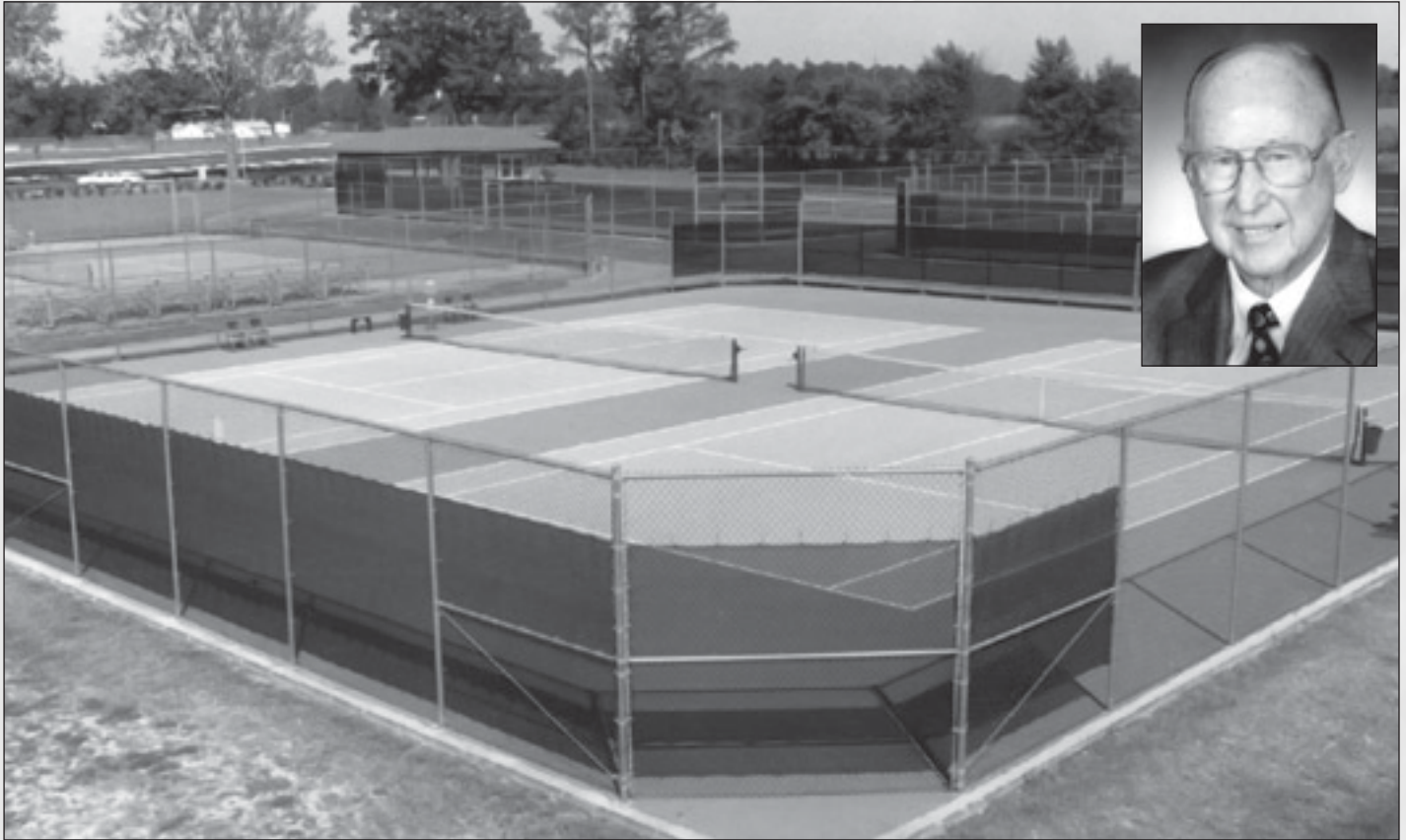
CAMPBELL UNIVERSITY TENNIS...



- Member NCAA Division I Atlantic Sun Conference.
- Seven Conference Championships in last 21 years.
- 146 players named to league All-Academic Team since 1989.
- The men's and women's tennis teams have won Campbell's Team GPA Award in 5 of the last 9 years.
- Since 1989, the Campbell men's tennis team has won 185 dual matches and four conference championships (Big South in 1989, 1990, 1991 and 1992).
- Since 1991, Campbell's women's tennis team has fashioned a 212-113 record, claimed three league championships (Big South in 1992, 1993 and A-Sun 2001) and four conference runner-up trophies (Big South in 1991 and 1994 and A-Sun in 1995 and 2003).
- Antonia Homolya ranked 20th in 1993 final ITA women's singles rankings and named NCAA Division I All-American.
- Rodrigo Cagide won Big South Conference singles and doubles championships each of his four years with the men's program (1988-91).
- Seventy-nine Campbell players have earned all-conference honors since 1986 and on eight occasions, Fighting Camels have been named league Player of the Year.
- In 1995, Aleksandra Cvetkovic (59th) and Eleonora Vegliante (80th) became the first Lady Camel teammates to ever finish the season ranked in the ITA top 100 collegiate singles rankings.
- Eleonora Vegliante, rated 59th nationally in the 1995 preseason rankings, won the 1995 James R. Nisbet Tennis Invitational.
- Andreas Mardbrink became the first Campbell men's tennis player to earn a national ranking on the Division I level when he finished the 1999 fall season rated 81st by the ITA.
- Jiri Beranek became the first-ever Campbell men's tennis player to end the year with a Division I ranking in 2005 when he was listed 115th in the final ITA ratings.
- Campbell's men's tennis team won 31-consecutive Big South Conference dual matches between April 1988 and February 1994.
- Since 1991, Campbell's women's tennis team has won 62 conference regular season dual matches while losing only 18.
- Home of the program is the Nisbet Tennis Center, featuring eight hard surface courts, offices and clubhouse.



THE NISBET TENNIS CENTER



Longtime Campbell University benefactor James R. Nisbet passed away Dec. 23, 2005. Campbell's tennis center was named in October 1988 in honor of Mr. Nisbet and his wife, Betty.

The founder of Carolina Controls and the founder, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Nisbet Business Center, Nisbet organized more than 15 other businesses over a four decade span. In addition to his interests in business, church, music, Campbell University and many other charitable causes, including serving as President of the Foundation of the Carolinas, Nisbet played competitive tennis for 50 years, routinely ranking among the top five players in the state in his classification.

Nisbet was a charter member of the Presidential Board of Advisors and had the distinction of being elected to serve as Chairman of the Board more than any other member. In addition, he participated in all fund-raising campaigns for more than 35 years, serving as Chairman or Co-Chairman. He served as Co-Chairman of the University's "Our Heritage, Our Challenge in the New Millennium Campaign."

In 1997, Nisbet received the Honorary Degree, Doctor of Law, from Campbell. In addition, he received the coveted Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award in recognition of his exemplary character and outstanding leadership. In 2000, he received the Presidential Medallion. He was also a member of Omicron Delta Kappa (ODK), the national leadership honor society.

The Nisbet Tennis Center was dedicated in October 1988. The facility includes eight hard courts, offices and a clubhouse. Since its dedication, Campbell has won seven conference championships and has reached regional and national rankings for both the men's and women's programs.

Q&A with Campbell Head Tennis Coach David Johnson

Q: What are your expectations for the teams this year?

Johnson: As far as the men go, in recent years, we've had returning players coming back who had, in the previous year, played high in the lineup and established themselves. We've had some knowledge of who was going to play at the top of the lineup. This year is the first year we really don't have that degree of certainty, with regards to the certain positions and who's ultimately going to play at the top. It's more open-ended. The positive to that is that there's jockeying for position. And yet, the downside is that we don't have those one or two go-to players that we've relied upon in the past. We've got a nice blend of upperclassmen and three freshmen, so it's going to be interesting to see how they come together. On paper, we have some talented players, but we have to see the evidence of that in the match results.

The women had a better year last year— we were 14-8— and we were just a game or two away from the finals in the confer-

ence. We've added three new girls, two of whom are strong players and will help out right away in the lineup, and combining those with the majority of girls who returned from last year's team, I expect us to be as good as or better than we were a year ago. I'm cautiously optimistic about things for the ladies.

Q: How do you expect the freshmen to impact the team?

Johnson: We have two girls, Blanca Saenz and Ana Surviladze, who made an immediate impact with the fall play. They both developed even from having been here just one semester, in terms of their maturation process. They will contribute significantly, both in singles and doubles, and will strengthen our team greatly.

We have three freshmen for the guys. They were kind of up and down throughout the fall. One of the boys, Beto Mondini, didn't get eligible until the end of the semester, so he really didn't get to play or train throughout the fall season. Beto, Alexandre Duval and Viktor Taune are all very talented. Viktor probably had the best results in the fall and has carried that over into what we're underway with now. Right now, all three will be targeted in the lower lineup positions. One of them could easily move up, but they need more time and experience to get that opportunity.

Q: Who are your key returnees?

Johnson: For the girls, we have one senior, Iva Stojancev. Iva was all-conference last year. She was our team MVP and had as good a season as anybody has had here. We certainly hope she can come close to reproducing that level of play. Scarlet Alfonzo

played at the one position for us last year and will probably play one or two this year. She's a solid player.

We have one senior for the guys, Artoym Starkov. He had a good year last year; it was kind of a breakthrough year for him. This marks the first full year that Gabriel Delarue has been able to start healthy. He had major shoulder surgery about a year and a half ago. He's certainly now at full strength compared to what he's been the past few years. He had some really good results in the fall, and he could potentially play as high as number one. And then our captain, Marc Sifre, had a solid year for us last year and we expect much of the same. For the guys, we need to lean heavily on those three.

Q: Do the teams have any prominent strengths or weaknesses that could impact the season?

Johnson: One vulnerability for the girls would be their size. In terms of doubles play, we don't have the tallest of teams. In singles, that works pretty well for us because we have some girls who can cover the court really well. They're pretty quick, pretty agile.

For the guys, we have a balance of size. The doubles will be critical for the guys as well. Some of the pairs we had established have had players who graduated, so we're forming new teams.

The upside to both teams is that most all of the players get along quite well. There's a good

overall level of unity and support. That's very worthwhile, for a long season in particular.

Q: How did the teams' fall tournament results fit into your expectations?

Johnson: The girls had more consistent, better results, and I was pleasantly surprised by some of those. That's what leads me to have a little more certainty about them as they're entering this spring season.

The guys were more up and down, and consequently, I have a little less certainty with them as they enter into things. There were some bright spots, but not quite the degree of consistency from the guys that I would have liked. Hopefully having played some of those matches has gotten us a little more familiar with what the landscape is out there and what we're up against.

Q: How do you see the teams falling in the A-Sun standings?

Johnson: The tournament this year is in Johnson City at East Tennessee State. Their women won the women's tournament last year, fairly comfortably. So, knowing their team and circumstances, they would be the team to beat. Their men were equally as good, if not better, and yet they did not win it last year. Nevertheless, I would say that they would be the team to beat as well.

Also, this year will mark the first year with new conference scheduling guidelines, where each A-Sun team will play every other team during the regular season. That will shed more light on where everybody stacks up against everybody else.

HEAD COACH DAVID JOHNSON



Now in his ninth year as head men's and women's tennis coach at Campbell University, David Johnson has established the program's status as a conference contender and regional threat. Since joining the Fighting Camel program in August 1998, Johnson has guided a Campbell men's or women's squad to the Atlantic Sun Championship match in three of the past six years.

The 2001 women's team won the league crown, then returned to the A-Sun final two years later. The 2004 men advanced to their first A-Sun title contest since the University joined the conference in 1994-95.

Under the direction of Johnson, the women's team has compiled an eight-year dual match record of 112-58 (.659). His men have made marked improvements with four winning seasons in the last seven years and an 85-82 (.509) dual match record in eight campaigns.

In 2006, Iva Stojancev, Liza Bensimon and Anita Dajc were selected for the all-conference women's teams. The Lady Camels posted a 14-8 overall record, including a 4-1 mark against A-Sun opponents. Stojancev was a first-team all-conference selection, while Bensimon and Dajc were named to the A-Sun All-Freshman squad.

Florent Wilpotte was a first-team all-league choice on the men's side in 2005, while Marc Sifre earned second-team honors. Vasja Gorjup was named to the A-Sun All-Freshman team.

The 2005 Campbell men finished 15th in the Southeast Region and saw Jiri Beranek earn the first-ever year-end individual national ranking in the program's history. Beranek and Florent Wilpotte earned Atlantic Sun Conference all-league honors, while Marc Sifre gained all-freshman status.

The Campbell women were represented on the 2005 A-Sun All-Conference teams by Georgiana Marta and Scarlet Alfonzo.

Johnson was named Atlantic Sun Conference Men's Tennis Coach of the Year in 2004 after he guided the men to a 16-8 won-lost record, including a 7-1 mark vs. A-Sun opponents. Campbell's 16 dual match wins were the most for the program since the 1989 squad went 22-5-1. The Camels won eight-straight matches before losing to top-seeded UCF in the A-Sun final.

Despite a 4-0 regular season record vs. A-Sun schools, the Fighting Camels were seeded seventh in the A-Sun Championship. CU defeated 10th-seeded Lipscomb in the first round, then dropped second-seeded Jacksonville in the quarters and third-seeded Florida Atlantic in the semifinals. Seven Campbell tennis players were named to the Atlantic Sun All-Conference teams, including first-team members Jiri Beranek (men) and Carmen

Linder (women).

In 2003, the women compiled a record of 13-5, and a berth in the Atlantic Sun final. The top-seeded school in the A-Sun tourney, Campbell was ranked as high as number-63 nationally during the regular season. Senior Kerstin Stockinger concluded her career with 83 singles wins, fifth-highest in the program's history. Linder was ranked as high as number-99 nationally during the season. Linder and Stockinger gained first-team all-conference recognition.

In 2003, the men's program posted back-to-back winning records for the first time since the 1992-93. Junior Martin Parkes and sophomore Sergio Tejada earned a national ranking of number-60 in doubles during the season and finished the year with a 12-3 mark. Beranek was a second-team all-league choice, while Carlos Campo and Florent Wilpotte were named to the All-Freshman Team.

In 2002, Johnson guided the women to a 16-7 overall record, a 2-2 A-Sun mark and a perfect 7-0 record at home. The Lady Camels advanced to the semifinals and finished the season with a No. 12 ranking in the Southeast Region of the Omni Hotels College Tennis Rankings.

In 2002, the Fighting Camel men went 11-10 overall and were 3-1 in the A-Sun. In the A-Sun tournament, the men defeated Jacksonville State in the first round before being knocked out with a 4-0 loss to Georgia State in their next match. Mardbrink completed his career with 75 singles wins, the fourth highest total in Campbell men's history.

Johnson was named the Atlantic Sun Women's Tennis Coach of the Year following the 2001 season after guiding the Lady Camels to their first-ever conference championship and a No. 72 national ranking.

The Lady Camels finished the 2001 season with a 21-3 dual match record, their first Atlantic Sun Conference championship, and initial berth in the NCAA regional where they fell to Duke, which ended the season ranked third in the country. Campbell's other two losses came at the hands of Old Dominion, which finished at number 35, and Memphis, which concluded the year with a regional ranking of number 12 in the Southeast. Campbell tied with Clemson for 10th place in the Southeast Region marks.

In his first season, Johnson's women's team posted a 14-7 dual match record and two of his student-athletes – Katrin Gaber and Teodora Doncheva – received Atlantic Sun Conference recognition. CU's top three singles players – Gaber, Doncheva and Alexia Erb – combined for a 57-7 singles record. On the men's side, Johnson's Fighting Camels boasted a regionally-ranked player – freshman Andreas Mardbrink.

During the 1999 fall campaign, Coach Johnson's teams continued to demonstrate their marked improvement. The women's team claimed several singles and doubles championships in tournament action, while Mardbrink not only won the North Carolina State Wolfpack Fall Invitational, but became the first



men's tennis player at Campbell to earn a national ranking.

During his six-year stint at Mars Hill, Johnson led the men's team to an 80-49 overall record while the women compiled a 53-52 won-lost mark. He was named South Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year in 1993, coached two SAC Players of the Year and two SAC Scholar-Athletes of the Year

A 1981 graduate of Winthrop, Johnson began his collegiate coaching career as men's coach at USC Spartanburg in 1984, then took over both the men's and women's programs at Western Carolina in 1989.

His overall coaching record for men stands at 213-179 in 23 years, while his women's teams have amassed a 211-152 mark in 19 years.

Johnson was named Southern Conference Men's Tennis Coach of the Year in 1991. During his college coaching career, the 46-year-old Johnson has coached three players who have represented their countries in Davis Cup competition.

A native of Greenwood, S.C., Johnson has been involved in tennis at a variety of levels. He has served as a teaching professional in Highlands, N.C., and in Tega Cay, S.C. He also coached on the high school level for several years in the Charlotte, N.C., area.

He and his wife Perrine, who served eight years as assistant coach at Campbell, were married in December 2003.

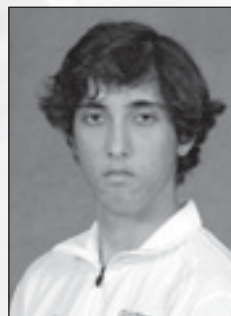

STUDENT-ATHLETE TRAINING, CONDITIONING & SUPPORT

Athletic Training

Campbell University student-athletes have access to one of the finest sports medicine care programs in North Carolina. CU's Athletic Training staff offers all Fighting Camel student-athletes the best available medical care for athletic injuries. They design and implement programs to prevent, manage and treat athletic injuries. They also supervise injury rehabilitation programs that are designed to return the athlete to athletic activity as quickly and safely as possible. The athletic training services program is directed by head athletic trainer Dave Hammons, MEd.,ATC/LAT and assistant athletic trainer Catherine Simonson, MA, ATC and two athletic training interns. In addition, the staff also provides the education to more than 35 students majoring in athletic training. These students are enrolled in a challenging academic major that not only requires that they make the grade in the classroom but also must excel in real-life situations. The education program is directed by Dr. Mary Jones. The Athletic Training staff also works closely with Dr. Chris Stewart, M.D., and Mr. Jerry Brenneman, P.A., of Campbell University Student Health Services and team physicians, Dr. Kurt Ehlert and Dr. Bill Hage of Orthopedic Sports Medicine Associates of Raleigh to provide quality physician services to student-athletes. Other allied health care needs available within the athletic training services program include optometry, dentistry, chiropractic and sports massage.

Strength and Conditioning

The Campbell University strength and conditioning facilities are located inside Carter Gymnasium and the Willard B. Harris Training Center.

Although specific strength and conditioning programs are designed for each sport, the basic goal is the same - to help athletes increase their full potential in all areas of fitness: strength, speed, flexibility and stamina.

Workouts are designed and supervised by David Johnston, who is in his second year as the director of Campbell's strength and conditioning program.

To assist in the student-athlete's routines, the improved facilities are stocked with a wide array of free weights, stationary plate-loaded machines and a strong amount of aerobic machines.

Members of each of CU's 19 varsity teams meet on a weekly basis, with some teams training and preparing for competition several times a week.

Campbell's strength and conditioning program has an ultimate goal of achieving the maximum potential, in order to better prepare student-athletes in competition.

Student-Athlete Support Program

The Campbell Athletics Department is committed to academic excellence and to promoting student-athlete welfare through the broad-based Student-Athlete Support Program. Under the guidance of Dr. Debbie Snell, Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance and Academic Services, programs are available that provide opportunities for student-athletes to grow academically, socially, spiritually, emotionally and physically.

The Student-Athlete Support Program was created to assist student-athletes with a number of issues ranging from the development of personal responsibility and educational goals to addressing personal and social problems that are unique to the Division I student-athlete.

Some of the services offered through the Student-Athlete Support Program are the Individual Study Plan program, tutorial sessions, study halls, one-on-one academic advising, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, NCAA Life Skills and other academic support services.

The Academic Support Center is the focal point of the program. The

center is open seven days a week with flexible hours designed to accommodate the busy schedule of a student-athlete. The center has been designed to serve as an optimal learning environment, while providing the student-athlete with all the tools necessary to achieve academic success.

The center is equipped with several computer work stations, individual study carels, and areas for monitored group study and tutorial work. Tutorial sessions of different subject areas are provided several times a week for the student-athletes. The center provides the student-athlete with a convenient place to study, either individually or in a group setting, where his or her progress can be supervised.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee is comprised of members of the 19 varsity sport programs at Campbell who are nominated by their head coaches. The group was organized to facilitate communication and involvement between student-athletes and administrators and to better integrate athletes into the general student body.

As a branch of the SAAC, the Camels CARE Team is comprised of student-advisory members, whose mission is to develop ways to increase university representation in community service activities. Proposed committee activities include: Special Olympics, "Adopt-a-Grandparent," tutoring services for local grade schools, the Big Brother/Big Sister organization and a speakers bureau.

To these young adults, athletics becomes more than an end in itself, but rather a means by which they may fully develop their character, and in the process, make a positive impact on the world around them.

The Fighting Camel

Many stories exist as to the origin of the nickname "Fighting Camels" and the adoption of a camel as the mascot of Campbell University athletic teams. To date, there is still uncertainty as to why the unique mascot (only one other school in the United States -- and none in Division I -- has the nickname "Camels") was chosen.

According to historian J. Winston Pearce, author of "Campbell College, Big Miracle in Little Buies Creek," the nickname's origin perhaps stretches back to the turn of the century when all but one of the school's original buildings were destroyed by fire. In the aftermath, Z.T. Kivett visited the school's founder and president, Dr. James Archibald Campbell, at his residence.

As Dr. Campbell bemoaned the fate of the institution he had worked 13 years to build, Mr. Kivett encouraged him, "Your name's Campbell; then get a hump on you! We've got work to do." Dr. Campbell thought that Mr. Kivett said, "You're a camel, get a hump on you." Hence the nomadic nickname.

Campbell's athletic teams were originally named the "Hornets." Copies of Creek Pebbles, the school newspaper, in the 1920s and 1930s described the teams as "Hornets." Other references to the athletic teams were "The Campbells" or the "Campbellites."

Although an official date is unknown, the changing of the mascot to a camel came in late 1933 or early 1934. There is no explanation why the nickname was changed to Camels, only this one sentence was printed in the Jan. 13, 1934 issue of Creek Pebbles: "Eight new men were recently initiated into Campbell's monogram club, which has changed its name from 'Hornets' to 'Camels.'"

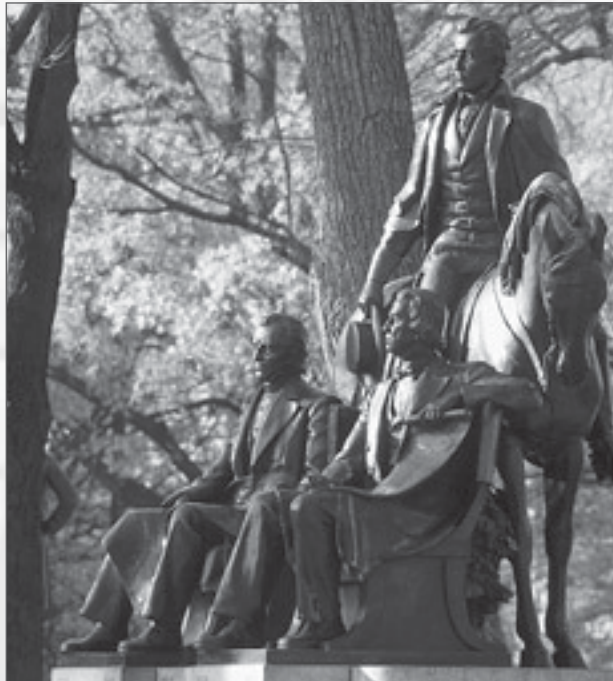
From that point on, all Campbell athletic teams have proudly worn the Camel mascot.

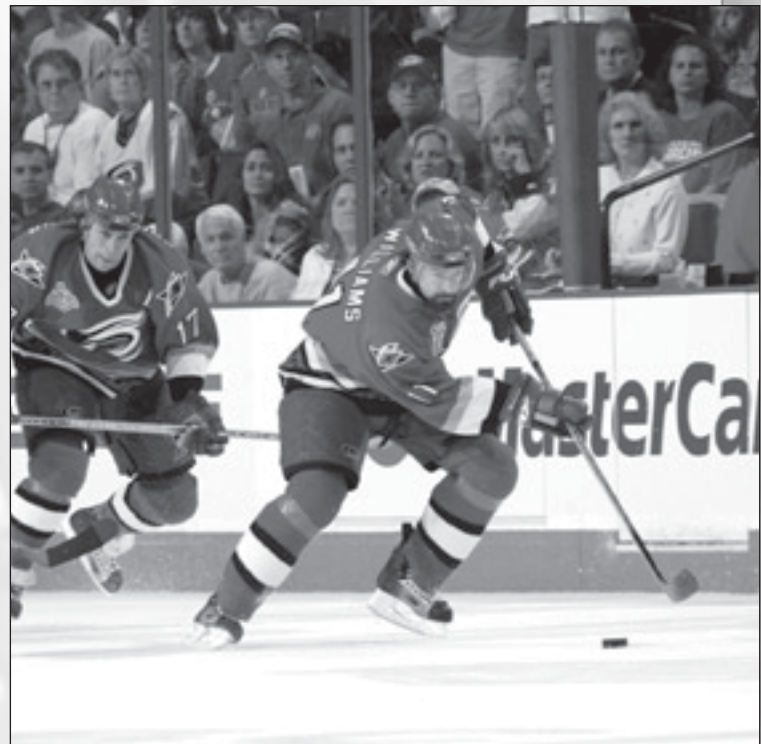

ATLANTIC SUN CONFERENCE

History

Founded September 19, 1978, the Atlantic Sun Conference has operated over a quarter century in the ever-changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics with a consistent commitment to its Constitutional Mission to “assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports.” Formerly known as the Trans America Athletic Conference, the A-Sun changed its name in June of 2001 and introduced a new visual identity that distinguishes the league.

Bill Bibb became the A-Sun’s third full-time commissioner when he took the reigns in October of 1991. Bibb followed Lou McCullough (1983-91) and Bob Vanatta (1979-83). The A-Sun office has been in Macon, Georgia, since April, 1992, after relocating from Athens, Georgia (1983-1992). The first office was located in Shreveport, Louisiana (1979-1983).

Academic Excellence

The Atlantic Sun Conference continues to prove that it excels both athletically and academically. In 2005-06, more than 50 percent of the conference’s student-athletes who participated during the season earned all-academic honors. For the spring season alone, 52.2 percent of student-athletes in the A-Sun were honored, as compared to 50.0 percent during the fall, giving the conference a 51.4 percent total.

This marks the third consecutive year that the A-Sun has surpassed the 50 percent total. Belmont University won the A-Sun All-Academic Trophy for the fifth consecutive year. The award is given annually to the conference school with the greatest percentage of student-athletes receiving all academic honors. The Nashville school finished with 65.1 percent of all student-athletes earning the honor. For the fourth consecutive year, women’s cross country had the highest rate of student-athletes earn all-academic, as 66.7 percent (92 of 138) were honored, with women’s golf placing second at 64.6 percent. Four women’s cross country and four women’s soccer teams received All-Academic national recognition from their respective coaches associations.

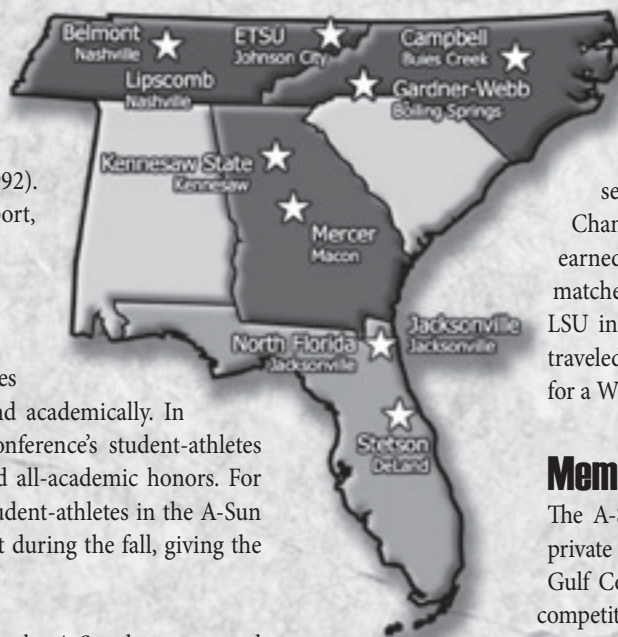
Mercer’s Will Emerson earned A-Sun Student-Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive year and academic All-America on the men’s basketball first team. On the women’s side, ETSU women’s soccer standout Erin Ashton was voted A-Sun Student-Athlete of the Year. Both received NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships.

The bar for academic excellence in the league was set in 2003-04 as Belmont broke its own single-season conference mark with 71.4% of

its athletes earning All-Academic honors (152 of 213). A record 52.8 percent of all A-Sun athletes earned all-academic honors that year.

Athletic Excellence

The A-Sun has continually matched its classroom achievement with success on the playing fields. Over the past eight-plus years, the A-Sun has posted NCAA wins in each of the team sports that it sponsors. For the seventh straight season the A-Sun advanced multiple teams to the NCAA Baseball Championship, with tournament champion Stetson and regular season champion Jacksonville receiving bids in 2006. The A-Sun also sent multiple teams to the NCAA men’s golf championship for the fourth straight season in 2006 as Top-15 ranked ETSU joined A-Sun champ Jacksonville at NCAA Regionals. The A-Sun received multiple postseason berths in men’s basketball for the third time in five seasons as Belmont made their first NCAA Championship appearance and Lipscomb earned an NIT bid. The women’s programs matched the men as Florida Atlantic faced LSU in the NCAA Tournament and Belmont traveled to Volunteer State rival Tennessee Tech for a WNIT game.
