CAMPBELL *at a glance*

Founded in 1887, Campbell University is a private, coeducational institution of the liberal arts, sciences, and professions offering undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral degrees. The University is comprised of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law, the Lundy-Fetterman School of Business, the School of Education, the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, the Divinity School and its newest school, the School of Osteopathic Medicine, scheduled to open in Fall 2013.

For 125 years, Campbell University has been helping students build meaningful and successful futures. The university was ranked as one of the Best Regional Universities (South) by U.S. News & World Report in its America's Best Colleges 2012 edition and named one of the "100 Best College Buys" in the nation by Institutional Research & Evaluation, Inc. Campbell is also recognized as a Servicemembers Opportunity College.

Location: Set on over 1500 acres, Campbell maintains a beautiful, residential campus in the Cape Fear region of North Carolina. The University is located just 28 miles north of Fayetteville and 30 miles south of Raleigh, the capital city. Campbell also boasts campuses in the Research Triangle Park, Fort Bragg/Pope and Camp Lejeune. The Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law moved to a facility in Raleigh in the fall of 2009.

Mission: The mission of Campbell University is to graduate students with exemplary academic and professional skills who are prepared for purposeful lives and meaningful service. The University is informed and inspired by its Baptist heritage and three basic theological and biblical presuppositions: learning is appointed and conserved by God as essential to the fulfillment of human destiny; in Christ all things consist and find ultimate unity; and the Kingdom of God in this world is rooted and grounded in Christian community

Curriculum: The University has over 100 undergraduate tracks and concentrations; as well as graduate and professional degree programs within the Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law, College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, School of Business, School of Education, Divinity School and School of Osteopathic Medicine. Campbell University is also recognized as a North Carolina Teaching Fellows institution.

Enrollment: Each year, Campbell enrolls approximately 6,000 students representing diverse cultural, socioeconomic and religious backgrounds. On the main campus, approximately 3,000 undergraduates are enrolled with more than 1,500 students enrolled in master's programs or professional schools.

Faculty/Student Ratio: Campbell offers small class sizes and individual attention, with a faculty to student ratio of 1-to-20. Over 90 percent of faculty hold doctoral or terminal degrees.

Athletics: Campbell is a member of the NCAA Division I Big South Conference. Men's varsity sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, track and field and wrestling. Women's sports include basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and field, volleyball and lacrosse. The Fighting Camels also compete in the Pioneer Football League, the Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association and as an associate member of the Southern Conference in wrestling.

The University embraces the conviction that there is no conflict between the life of faith and the life of inquiry.

Head Coach John Crooks

Now in his 23rd year as the men's head golf coach and 22nd in charge of the women's program at Campbell University, John Crooks is one of the top collegiate golf coaches in the country. In January 2006, the Winston-Salem, N.C., native was inducted into the National Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

During his tenure, Crooks has led the women's team to 11 conference titles and 15 NCAA Regional appearances. His women's teams have earned regional berths 12 times in the last 15 years.

Upon the program's return to the Big South Conference in 2011-12, he led the squad to the league title and was voted Big South coach of the year by his peers.

In 17 years during Campbell's membership in the Atlantic Sun Conference (1995-2011), Crooks guided the Lady Camels to three-consecutive league championships from 1996-98 and again in 2001, 2002, 2004, 2006 and 2007. In 2004 at Keith Hills Country Club No. 1, the Lady Camels set a record for lowest 54-hole score in the league tourney.

Crooks has also directed the Camel men to five conference championships, including the 1999 and 2009 Atlantic Sun Conference titles. The Campbell men made their first NCAA Regional team appearance in 2009 after CU individuals earned regional berths on four previous occasions. CU's men received a pair of individual NCAA regional berths in 2011 (Vaita Guillaume, Matt Moot).

In 2012 Vaita Guillaume won the NCAA Greensboro Regional and earned the program's first-ever berth into the NCAA Championship. He named 2012 Big South player of the year, Ping All-Region and honorable mention Ping All-American.

Crooks has been named conference coach of the year 15 times for either the men's or women's program. He was named Atlantic Sun Women's Golf Coach of the Year eight times in CU's 17 years as a league member. His men's teams have claimed 45 team titles and his women have won 67 tournaments.

Entering the 2013 spring season, Crooks ranks second among all active Division I women's coaches in tournament victories with 67, trailing only Dan Brooks of Duke (112). His women have won a tournament in 21 of the 22 years in which he has served as head coach, including three during the 2011-12 campaign and three in the 2012 fall season.

He stands fourth on the Division I all-time coaching victories chart.

With three victories in five tournaments, Campbell University ended the 2012 fall women's golf season ranked 26th among the country's 257 NCAA Division I programs, according to Golfstat. The ranking was the highest at the end of the fall season in Crooks' 22-year tenure with the program. Campbell finished the fall campaign with a 63-6 record against NCAA Division I competition while setting school 18-, 36- and 54-hole records.

In addition to securing his 11th women's league coach of the year honor, Crooks' squad placed four members -- Kaylin Yost, Michelle Koh, Lisbeth Brooks and Teresa Urquizu -- on the Big South all-conference team in 2012. Yost was tabbed player of the year and Brooks freshman of the year in the Big South.

He has also been actively involved in the oversight of the college game, serving as a member of the NCAA Division I Men's Golf Committee from 2004-2008.

Coach Crooks has directed 126 golfers to all-conference honors during his tenure and 182 individuals to all-academic honors.

He has mentored dozens of professionals, including PGA Tour members David Mathis and Brad Fritsch, as well as eGolf Tour member Vaita Guillaume.

On the women's side, Sandra Angulo is playing on the LPGA FUTURES Symetra Tour, while Mary Mattson is on the Ladies European Tour.

In 2011-12, the Campbell men won three tournaments, led by Big South player of the year Vaita Guillaume, who captured five individual titles. Mitch Gray was named Big South men's golf scholar-athlete of the year.

In 2011, Matt Moot and Guillaume received individual bids to play in the NCAA Virginia Tech Regional. Moot and Mitch Gray were named Cleveland Golf/Srixon All-America Scholars by the GCAA.

In 2010-11, the Campbell women finished as runner-up in the Atlantic Sun Championship, marking the 15th time in 17 years as a league member that the Lady Camels placed first or second in the tourney.

His 2010 women's team claimed team championships at the UNCG Star-tournament Fall Classic and Fighting Camel Classic, while finishing among the top six in each of its 11 tournaments.

Each of Campbell's six players recorded a top-6 finish in '09-10, including a pair of wins by senior Mary Mattson (UNCG and Campbell), plus runner-up showings from Sarah Bejgrowicz (Waterlefe), Belen Diaz Cisneros (Campbell) and Teresa Urquizu (UNCG).

Mattson and Diaz Cisneros were two of only 11 individuals to finish among the top 10 four times in the Atlantic Sun Conference Championship. Mattson was 5th in the 2010 tournament, while Diaz Cisneros tied with Bejgrowicz for 8th place. Mattson earned first-team all-conference honors, her fourth all-league recognition, and was named Campbell's Outstanding Female Athlete.

Campbell's 2009-10 men's team won the Big Five Invitational and finished fourth in the Atlantic Sun Conference, extending their string of top-five A-Sun finishes to a record nine years. Vaita Guillaume, who was a second-team all-conference honoree, participated in the 2010 US Amateur Championship after winning the Anderson Creek (N.C.) qualifier.

During 2009, Campbell's men claimed an automatic berth in the NCAA Southeast Regional by winning the Atlantic Sun Championship. The Camels led wire-to-wire at their home course as four CU players placed among the top 14 individuals.

Guillaume placed second individually to earn all-tournament honors in addition to second-team all-conference and all-freshman recognition. He and fellow freshman Mitch Gray were ranked 14th in the nation in the Golfstat Freshman Impact rating.

The Campbell women added two more tournament titles and a 2009 A-Sun runner-up finish, plus four all-conference honors to the program's long list of accomplishments. Only twice in 16 years has Campbell failed to finish either first or second in the A-Sun championship since joining the league in 1994-95. Mary Mattson was a first-team all-conference performer, who added all-tournament honors by finishing fourth at the A-Sun event.

Belen Diaz Cisneros and Sandra Angulo were named second-team all-conference in 2009, while Michelle Koh was named to the all-freshman team. Sophomore Sarah Bejgrowicz collected her first collegiate victory

at the Jacksonville Women's Classic.

In 2008, Campbell's women finished among the top two teams in the A-Sun Championship for the 13th time in 14 years in the league. Campbell's men extended their string of top-five finishes in the A-Sun tournament to seven years. Thirteen Campbell golfers were named to the league all-academic team.

Campbell won its second-straight (and a league record 8th overall) A-Sun women's championship in 2007, defeating second-place East Tennessee State by 29 strokes.

Alejandra Shaw won the A-Sun individual title and was named league player of the year for the second-straight year. She was joined on the all-conference first team by junior Maite Ortiz de Pinedo, who finished 2nd at the league tourney. Belen Diaz Cisneros (5th at the A-Sun Championship) and Mary Mattson (9th) were both named to the A-Sun all-conference second team and all-freshman unit.

Shaw, Ortiz de Pinedo (Fighting Camel Classic), Mattson (Shoot-out at the Legends) and Diaz Cisneros (Spider Fall Invitational) each won individual titles during '06-07.

Campbell's men tied a school record with four tournament titles during 2006-07 in events hosted by Hartford, Old Dominion, Campbell and William & Mary. Junior Fredric Sundberg was a first-team all-league choice, senior Kyle Spahr gained second-team honors, while Matt Evans was named to the A-Sun all-freshman team. Sundberg earned an individual berth to the NCAA East Regional Championship.

During the 2005-06 campaign, Crooks guided Campbell to its seventh Atlantic Sun Conference women's title. His Lady Camels won two tournaments (including the Stetson Invitational). Alejandra Shaw was named A-Sun Player of the Year and 1st-team all-conference after winning the league tourney and finishing among the top 10 individuals at the A-Sun event for the 3rd-straight year. Crooks was tabbed A-Sun Coach of the Year. Senior Sofia Gorelik became just the 2nd player in A-Sun history to earn 1st-team all-conference honors 4-straight years. Maite Ortiz de Pinedo was a 2nd-team all-league performer.

His men's squad won two tournaments in 2005-06, while sophomore Fredric Sundberg gained 2nd-team A-Sun all-conference honors.

In 2004-05, Crooks' women earned an all-large berth to the NCAA East Regional and finished 11th, its best showing since 1997. The team won four tournaments, the program's most in five years.

Five Lady Camels were honored by the Atlantic Sun Conference in 2005, including three, first-team all-league selections. CU's 2005 freshman class was ranked 13th nationally by Golfstat. On the men's side, Fredric Sundberg was named the A-Sun Freshman of the Year.

In 2003-04, Campbell's Alejandra Shaw was named Atlantic Sun Freshman of the Year while also earning A-Sun All-Freshman team honors. Sofia Gorelik and Josefina Usandizaga were named to the A-Sun All-Conference first team and also captured A-Sun All-Tournament honors. Brandi Underwood was a second-team all-conference selection.

On the men's side in 2003-04, Ulf Hedlund and Braxton Wynns were recognized on both the A-Sun all-conference first-team and the league all-tournament squad. Rickard Allard was a second-team all-conference choice, while Kyle Spahr earned league all-freshman team honors.

In 2002-03, Sharon O'Neill capped her Campbell career by earning A-Sun Player of the Year honors, plus her fourth first-team all-conference award. Sofia Gorelik was also named first-team all-league as well as to the A-Sun All-Freshman squad. Josefina Usandizaga was named to the A-Sun all-conference second team for the third year in a row. On the men's side, Braxton Wynns (first-team) and Ulf Hedlund (second-team) garnered all-conference recognition.

During the 2001-02 campaign, Campbell's Simon Dunn earned A-Sun Player of the Year and first-team all-conference honors on the men's side, while Braxton Wynns was a second-team honoree. Sharon O'Neill was a 2001-02 first-team all-league choice for the women, while Josefina Usandizaga earned second-team honors and Michelle Holmes was selected to the A-Sun all-freshman team.

Crooks has seen his women's team members earn Campbell's Outstanding Female Athlete award seven times. Janet Wooten received the honor in 1994, while Mara Larrauri earned the recognition in 1997. Georges Plumet and Kylie Pratt swept the honors for both men and women in 1999. Braxton Wynns was named CU's Outstanding Male Athlete for 2003-04,



and Alejandra Shaw gained the women's honor in both 2006 and 2007. Mary Mattson (2009-10), Kaylin Yost (2011-12) and Vaita Guillaume (2011-12) also gained the school's top individual honor.

Kim Scott received the 1996 CU Senior GPA award after posting a 3.94 cumulative GPA as a government major, while Brad Fritsch was selected in 2000 with a 3.89 GPA in criminal justice. Fritsch was also a GTE Academic All-American and qualified for the 2006 U.S. Open. Jayme Kolinski won the 2002 Senior GPA Award with a 3.92 grade-point average as a biology major.

Including 2012 honorees Kaylin Yost and Vaita Guillaume, CU players guided by Crooks have been named conference player of the year 15 times. Georges Plumet, Mara Larrauri and Alejandra Shaw each received the recognition twice following their junior and senior seasons.

Under Crooks' direction, Campbell golfers have made unprecedented strides in NCAA play. The Lady Camels have participated in NCAA post-season play in 15 of the past 20 years.

In 1993, Janet Wooten became the first Campbell women's golfer to qualify for the NCAA East Regional. The Lady Camels earned their first team bid in 1994 after winning five tournament titles, including the Big South Conference Championship. In 1997, Campbell finished fifth at the Regionals and earned its first-ever national championship bid. CU advanced farther in post-season play than any other team in Campbell's Division I history and wrapped up the 1997-98 season as the 14th-ranked squad in the nation in the championship tournament.

The women's team was also invited to play in the 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2005 NCAA East Regionals. Sharon O'Neill finished fifth at the 2000 event and qualified for the NCAA Championship. Campbell earned the A-Sun's automatic berth by winning the league crown in 2001, 2002, 2004, 2006 and 2007. CU was the Big South's automatic qualifier in 2012.

For the men's team, Plumet was selected to participate in the '98 and '99 NCAA Men's Golf East Regional. He became the first men's golfer in the school's history selected to participate in post-season play since Campbell joined the NCAA Division I ranks in 1977-78. Simon Dunn earned an individual berth to the 2002 NCAA East Regional, while Fredric Sundberg repeated the feat in 2007.

Prior to accepting head coaching duties at Campbell in May 1990, Crooks served as a volunteer assistant coach to Wendell Carr for two seasons and helped the Camels to the 1989 Big South men's championship.

A native of Winston-Salem, N.C., and a Buies Creek resident, Crooks played collegiately at the University of Houston under legendary coach Dave Williams. He is a former United States Golf Association Junior Amateur Champion who competes regularly in major state and national amateur championships. He won the 2001 North and South Senior Amateur Championship at Pinehurst #8, #5 and #2 in consecutive rounds.

Crooks is married to the former Susan Davis, who graduated from Campbell's Law School in 1989. They have two children, Beth Milton (Campbell '92) and John Thomas Crooks, Jr., and four grandchildren, Jeremy (a freshman on the Campbell golf team), Lauren, Abby and Gracie.

Associate Head Coach Tim Crooks

PGA Class A member Tim Crooks is in his ninth year on the golf staff at Campbell University. He was promoted to Associate Head Coach on May 1, 2012 after serving as assistant coach since joining head coach John Crooks' staff. A 1999 Campbell graduate with a B.S. in sport management degree, Crooks returned to his alma mater in 2004-05 after spending four years working in various aspects of the golf profession.

Since he joined head coach John Crooks' staff, Tim Crooks has played a vital role in the success of the program. During his tenure as assistant coach, Campbell has advanced to NCAA regional play seven times and won four conference championships. The Campbell men have won 12 tournament titles, while the women have claimed 18 in the same eight-year span.

CU golfers have been named all-conference or all-freshman 51 times. Campbell golfers have qualified for conference All-Academic Team recognition 107 times in his first eight years. Mitch Gray was named Big South Conference men's golf scholar-athlete of the year in 2012.

With three victories in five tournaments, Campbell ended the 2012 fall women's golf season ranked 26th among the country's 257 NCAA Division I programs, according to Golfstat. The ranking was the highest at the end of the fall season in the program's history. Campbell finished the fall campaign with a 63-6 record against NCAA Division I competition while setting school 18-, 36- and 54-hole records.

During the 2011-12 campaign, Campbell won six tournaments – three men's and three women's – and captured the Big South Conference women's automatic berth to the NCAA Regional after claiming a seven-stroke victory at the league championship at The Patriot Golf Club in Ninety Six, S.C.

The teams won the combined Golfweek Program Challenge to open the 2011-12 season. In addition to the Golfweek stroke play title, Campbell's men also won the Kiawah Classic and Bash at the Beach team titles. Senior Vaita Guillaume won four individual crowns and was named Big South men's golfer of the year after attaining a top-50 national ranking.

On the women's side, Campbell won the Xavier/LPGA International Invitational and the Fighting Camel Classic before claiming the Big South honor. Campbell's women earned a post-season NCAA berth for the fifth time in Tim Crooks' tenure. CU's Brooke Bellomy and Lisbeth Brooks were rated 13th nationally in the Golfstat Freshman Impact rating.

Campbell's men won the 2010 Georgetown Intercollegiate tournament and finished third at the 2011 Atlantic Sun Championship. Matt Moot and Vaita Guillaume received individual bids to play in the NCAA Virginia Tech Regional.

In 2010-11, the Campbell women finished as runner-up in the Atlantic Sun Championship, marking the 15th time in 17 years as a league member that the Lady Camels placed first or second in the tourney.

The 2010 women's team claimed team championships at the UNCG Starmount Fall Classic and Fighting Camel Classic, while finishing among the top six in each of its first 11 tournaments en route to an NCAA East Regional berth. CU placed second at the Furman Lady Paladin Invitational, Waterleaf Invitational and LPGA International/Xavier Invitational. Campbell tied for 3rd at the Atlantic Sun Championship.

Campbell's 2009-10 men's team won the Big Five Invitational and finished fourth in the Atlantic Sun Conference, extending their string of top-five A-Sun finishes to a record nine years.

Shaw, Maite Ortiz de Pinedo (Fighting Camel Classic), Mary Mattson (Shoot-out at the Legends) and Belen Diaz Cisneros (Spider Fall Invitational) each won individual titles during '06-07.

Campbell's men tied a school record with four tournament titles during 2006-07 in events hosted by Hartford, Old Dominion, Campbell and William & Mary. Junior Fredric Sundberg was a first-team all-league choice and earned an individual berth to the NCAA East Regional Championship.

In 2005-06, Crooks helped guide the Campbell women to the Atlantic Sun Conference title and an NCAA East Regional berth. Four CU men's and women's golfers were recognized on the all-conference teams and 14 earned league All-Academic honors during the campaign.

In his first year with the program, Crooks helped develop a women's team that earned a berth to the 2005 NCAA East Regional and finished as Atlantic Sun Conference runners-up. Six Campbell golfers earned all-league recognition and 17 gained conference All-Academic status in his first season. Crooks coached both the Atlantic Sun men's and women's Freshmen of the Year in '05.

Before accepting the Campbell position, Crooks served one year as assistant golf professional at the Butte Des Morts Country Club in Appleton, Wisc. He also worked as an assistant pro at Desert Mountain Golf Club in Scottsdale, Ariz., and Green Bay (Wisc.) Country Club.

After completing his collegiate eligibility at Campbell in 1999, Crooks played one year on the Golden Bear Tour, a professional circuit in West Palm Beach, Fla. He spent 2001 as a tournament operations assistant with the FUTURES Tour, the official developmental tour of the LPGA.

During his collegiate playing career, Tim Crooks recorded six top-10 individual tournament finishes. As a junior in 1997-98, he was named to the Trans America Athletic (now Atlantic Sun) Conference second team after posting a pair of runner-up showings. He finished second at the San Diego State Montecito Invitational and the Columbus State G. Gunby Jordan Intercollegiate (four-under 212). That year, Crooks was the only Campbell individual to compete in all 25 rounds for the team during the regular season.

As a senior, he also finished second at the UNC Wilmington Belvedere Intercollegiate. During Crooks' senior season, he captained a team that finished no worse than fourth in any of its tournaments and won the TAAC crown.

Crooks is a 1994 graduate of Bishop McCort High School in Johnstown, Pa. He earned all-state honors during his prep career and also played in the U.S. Junior Amateur and finished in the top-10 of the Eastern Amateur Championship.

He and his wife, former LPGA touring pro Joellyn Erdmann-Crooks, are proud parents of a son, Evan Joseph Crooks, who was born Dec. 4, 2008. Joellyn is head pro at Crooked Creek Golf Club in nearby Fuquay-Varina, N.C.

Camels on Tour

Two Campbell graduates -- **David Mathis** and Brad Fritsch -- are playing on the PGA Tour in 2013.

Mathis is on the PGA Tour for the fourth time in the last five years after completing 2012 ranked No.-120 on the money list (\$736,765).

He produced a pair of top-10s in 2012 – at the Zurich Classic of New Orleans and the McGladrey Classic, where he secured his top-125 ranking and exemption for 2013.

In 2011, the Raleigh, N.C. resident earned \$715,404 in 25 events to finish 118th on the money list. He nearly doubled the \$364,959 he collected in 27 events during the 2009 PGA Tour season. In 2010, Mathis returned to the Nationwide Tour and finished 13th on the Money List to re-gain his PGA Tour card for 2011.

In May 2011, Mathis shot a final-round 68 on Sunday and tied for eighth place in the PGA Tour Zurich Classic of New Orleans. He recorded the best finish of his PGA Tour career and earned a career-best \$172,800 by shooting 10-under-par 278 (70-68-72-68) at TPC of Louisiana. He tied for 13th in June 2011 at the FedEx St. Jude Classic where he shot 65-72-72-66—275 and pocketed \$112,000 in winnings. Mathis held the outright lead for the first time in his PGA Tour career following his opening-round 65.

Mathis led the Camels to back-to-back league titles in 1993 and 1994 as a junior and senior. He earned his degree in business administration in 1997.

After making 15 cuts in 27 starts on the 2009 PGA Tour, Mathis finished 13th in the final 2010 Nationwide Tour standings, where he claimed his second Nationwide victory at the 2010 Winn-Dixie Jacksonville Open.

Brad Fritsch, a 2000 Campbell graduate from Manotick, Ontario, finished 18th on the 2012 Web.com Tour money list (\$212,168) to earn his PGA Tour exemption. A resident of Holly Springs, N.C., Fritsch produced seven top-10 individual finishes in 2012.

He tied for second at the Mylan Classic in September; then tied for ninth at the Web.com Tour Championship. Fritsch's best career PGA Tour finish is a tie for 71st place at the 2011 RBC Canadian open.

Fritsch returned to the Nationwide Tour in 2012 after earning his way through Q-School.

Fritsch spent four seasons (2007-09, 2012) on the Nationwide Tour.

He returned to the Canadian Tour in 2010 and made over \$32,000 on the Canadian circuit in 2011, plus \$40,000 or so on the Carolina-based eGolf mini-tour, \$10,000 and change after playing his way into the RBC Canadian Open, and another \$7,500 for a tournament in Colombia early in the year.

During his Fighting Camel career, Fritsch (Class of 2000) was twice honored as an Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). He earned Trans America Athletic Conference All-Academic honors in each of his four years at CU and was a second-team All-TAAC selection as a senior when he finished ninth in the 2000 league championship.

Vaita Guillaume, a 2012 graduate who earned Big South player of the year and honorable mention PING All-America honors, is playing on the eGolf tour after making his PGA Tour debut as a qualifier at the 2012 Wyndham Championships in Greensboro.

Sandra Angulo, a 2011 graduate, is the latest Campbell women's golfer to join the LPGA Symetra FUTURES Tour. The winner of the 2003 Mexican Junior National Championship, and member of the Mexican National Team, Angulo recorded three top-five and 12 top-10 finishes during her career at Campbell. She was named the 2008 Atlantic Sun Freshman of the Year.

Mary Mattson, who graduated in 2010, spent the 2012 season on the Ladies European Tour. Mattson was a four-time all-conference performer, who twice earned A-Sun all-tournament honors.

In addition, former Campbell All-American and FUTURES Tour member **Kylie Pratt** now serves as caddie for Hee Young Park on the LPGA Tour. Pratt (No. 303) and fellow Camels **Yvonne Cox** (159) and **Mara Larrauri** (363) rank among the top 400 in FUTURES Tour career winnings.

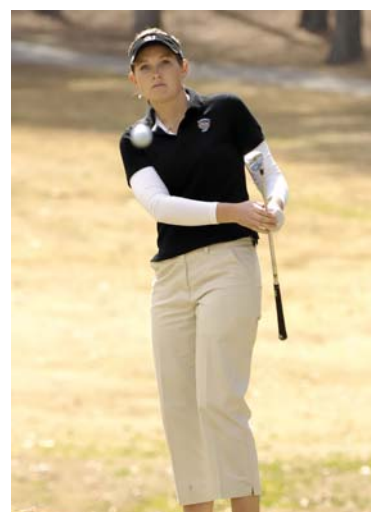

Big South Conference

Since its founding in 1983, the Big South Conference has matured into a competitive leader in college athletics, actively pursuing excellence on the field of play and in the classroom. The League's growing presence as an NCAA Division I athletic conference is evident by athletic accomplishments on the national stage, innovative marketing and media partnerships, increased television packages, and quality athletic competition while intentionally fostering the academic, personal, social, athletic and leadership development of each student-athlete. This has evolved into the Conference's mission of "Developing Leaders Through Athletics." The 2012-13 academic year features the Big South's largest membership (12) and sponsored sports (19) in its 29 years of existence.



The Big South Conference was formed on August 21, 1983, when Charleston Southern (then Baptist College) Athletic Director Howard Bagwell and Augusta President George Christenberry began recruiting members into the Big South, receiving initial commitments from Augusta, Charleston Southern, Campbell, Coastal Carolina and Winthrop. One month later, Dr. Edward M. Singleton was selected as the League's first Commissioner and continued to solicit new members. His efforts led to the additions of Armstrong State, Radford and UNC Asheville, giving the Big South more than the required six members to constitute an official conference. The Big South's first year of competition was in the Fall of 1984, and in September 1986, the Big South Conference was granted full-fledged NCAA Division I status.

During its infancy and prior to securing automatic bids to NCAA Championships, the Big South made early strides in earning at-large berths in several national postseason events, including volleyball, women's basketball and women's golf. In 1989, George F. "Buddy" Sasser replaced the retiring Dr. Singleton as Commissioner, and in 1990, the League received its first automatic bid – receiving an automatic qualifier to the NCAA Baseball Championship. Under Sasser's seven years of leadership, the Conference implemented its public relations and compliance programs, and introduced its first-ever men's basketball television package, featuring the Big South competing among some of the finest teams in the nation.

In August 1996, Kyle B. Kallander replaced Sasser as the League's third Commissioner, and in his 16 years at the helm of the Big South, Kallander has been instrumental in aggressively promoting the Conference to new heights. The Conference has enjoyed record levels in marketing revenue during his tenure, he has brought television coverage to Big South women's basketball, baseball, softball and men's soccer for the first time in Conference history, as well as increased national television exposure to the League as a whole through aggressive and unique television packages.

Under Kallander's leadership, the Big South developed and initiated its first long-range strategic plan, re-affirming the League's vision as a distinctive athletic Conference committed to the quality of institutional life through athletic competition. He also spearheaded the efforts to add football as a championship sport, which came to fruition in 2002, and oversaw the additions of men's and women's indoor track & field in 1997. The Conference's 19th championship sport -- women's lacrosse, begins play this season with eight members.

At the same time, Kallander has solidified Conference membership, as an all-time high 12 member institutions comprise the 29-year old League. Recent additions include High Point, Gardner-Webb, Presbyterian College and Longwood, plus the return of charter member Campbell University. Kallander's long range vision has also included technological advancements, as the Conference introduced its first live video streaming event in 2005 and has since expanded its video offerings to more than 700 events

annually through a partnership with the member institutions, as well as the creation of several online and social media platforms.

In the last 15 years alone, the Big South Conference has experienced monumental growth and success in nearly every sport. During this time, the Conference has had an individual National Champion six times, has had more than 280 All-Americans, has reached the "Sweet 16" in men's soccer, women's basketball and baseball, has received national Top 25 rankings in football, men's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's

outdoor track & field, and men's golf, had an individual selected to play in the NCAA Singles Championship seven times in addition to the first men's tennis doubles at-large selection, had the first women's golf program advance to the national finals, had the No. 1 ranked men's golfer in the country, had the nation's top scoring men's basketball team five consecutive years as well as the national men's basketball scoring leader twice, received an at-large playoff berth in the Football Championship Subdivision in 2006, has had six NFL Draft picks, and has had two institutions finish in the top 10 in the NCAA Men's Golf Championships -- including the Conference's highest-ever team finish in an NCAA event (fifth in 2007).

This past season, the Big South had a record 41 student-athletes earn All-America distinction, while another 10 were named Academic All-Americans. The Conference also won its first football playoff game (Stony Brook), had the national women's basketball Rookie Coach of the Year, had two men's soccer teams reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in a decade (Coastal Carolina, Liberty), and had a record five individuals selected for the NCAA Men's Golf Regionals -- the most of any Division I conference in 2011-12. In addition, Liberty was the first men's golf team in Conference history to win an NCAA Regional, and the Flames went on to finish 10th at the national event.

Several former Big South student-athletes have also reached national prominence in recent years. Coastal Carolina's Amber Campbell made the U.S. Olympic Team in 2008 and 2012, and was one of five former Big South athletes to compete in the 2008 Games; VMI's Reggie Williams reached the NBA with the Golden State Warriors in 2010, UNC Asheville's Ty Wigginton was named an American League All-Star in 2010, and Coastal Carolina's Dustin Johnson has won six PGA Tour events since departing the Big South Conference in 2007. Three former Big South baseball players made their major league debuts in 2012, while Avery Warley became the third Big South women's basketball player to play in the WNBA.

The Conference's tagline, "Developing Leaders Through Athletics" was unveiled in 2008-09 in conjunction with the Conference's 25th Anniversary. The League also honored its heritage with the Top 25 "Best of the Best" moments in League history from 1983-2008, with Liberty University's 10-year women's basketball championship run from 1996-2007 being crowned the No. 1 moment in the Big South's first 25 years. The Conference's on-field accomplishments have been duplicated in the classroom. Annually, more than 40 percent of Conference student-athletes are named to the Big South's Presidential Honor Roll for maintaining a cumulative 3.0 grade-point average, and the League has had more than 100 Academic All-Americans in its 28 years of existence. Furthermore, the Big South has recorded double figure totals in NCAA Public Recognition Awards for APR progress the last three years.

Keith Hills Golf Club has long been a hidden treasure in the Southeast. It has been rated as high as the seventh best public golf course in North Carolina by Carolina Magazine. The 27-hole Ellis Maples-designed championship golf course offers a complete and exciting challenge to the golfing enthusiast. With large bent grass greens and rolling, plush fairways, Keith Hills is fun for all players. The par 72-6625 yard layout of the Orange/Black Courses winds through a golfing community set on the Cape Fear River, which makes Keith Hills one of the most picturesque settings in North Carolina.

Voted as one of the top 100 values in the country and as a 5 Star Award Winner by Golf Digest, Keith Hills has gained national recognition. Home to Campbell University's Professional Golf Management Program and golf teams, Keith Hills plays host to two collegiate golf tournaments throughout the year. Keith Hills, already the premier golf facility in the Piedmont of North Carolina, opened its third 9 holes in November of 2002. Keith Hills hosted the 1998 & 1999 North Carolina Senior Amateur, the 1999 and 2009 Atlantic Sun Conference Men's Championships, the 2004 Atlantic Sun Men's & Women's Championships, the 2007 Atlantic Sun Women's Championship, and the 2007 US Women's Open Sectional Qualifier. With a championship golf course and a one-of-a-kind practice facility, Keith Hills is a golfer's paradise.

The facilities at Keith Hills are second to none. Acknowledged as one of the top 50 in the southeast by Golfweek, it is complemented by a 32-acre state-of-the-art practice facility. With an onsite snack bar, men's and ladies' locker rooms with showers, a well-stocked Pro Shop and friendly staff, Keith Hills was designed with the golfer in mind.

Conveniently situated between Raleigh and Fayetteville, it is accessible to all golfers in this area and along the East Coast. Located 12.5 miles north on 421 from I-95, Keith Hills is a great halfway point for travelers on their way to Myrtle Beach or Florida.

Keith Hills (Orange Course)

The 1st hole offers a challenging second shot with a mid-iron to a green surrounded by bunkers and water. You are then faced with the second most difficult hole on the course, the 559 yard uphill par five 2nd. The next three holes are positioned between the big oaks and tall pines. The 6th tee turns you home for a flourish of challenging holes. The second of the two par fives on this nine can be reached in two. The well bunkered 7th is a long and difficult par three. Eight, is a downhill par four that turns right to left. Number nine is one of the toughest holes in North Carolina. The second shot forces you to carry both water and bunkers, while leaving you hungry for more.

Keith Hills (Black Course)

The Black Course (back nine) begins with three par fours, which flow from left to right. They are followed by a 550-yard demanding par five. The 14th hole is a picturesque par three, situated among the dogwoods. The par four 15th hole ranks as the toughest on the course. As you make your way back to the clubhouse, you are faced with three realistic birdie opportunities. The 16th is a short par four, 17 is a mid-iron par three, and the 18th finishing with a beautiful lake front par five.

Keith Hills (White Course)

The 1st and 2nd holes are par fours that require accurate tee shots and second shots over wetlands. From an elevated tee, the third is a beautiful par 4 with water guarding the front of the green. Hole four is one of the shorter par 3s with a bunker guarding the right side of the green. A wide open fairway awaits you on the par 4 5th. The approach shot is a short iron to the most undulating green on the course. Six is a long straightaway par 5 with bunkers surrounding the green. The 7th is our most picturesque par 3 measuring 188 yards with water surrounding the green. The par 4, 8th is straight away and with an accurate tee shot, your approach to the green is narrow, guarded by silos on the left and trees on the right. The 9th is a great finishing hole, the shortest of the par 5s mea-
