PRESIDENT BARBARA R. SNYDER

Barbara R. Snyder became president of Case Western Reserve University on July 1, 2007. A professor who began her academic career as a faculty member at our School of Law, she returned to campus committed to increasing academic excellence, enhancing faculty collaboration, and improving alumni engagement.

During her tenure, the university has set all-time records for annual fundraising and total donors, doubled the number of undergraduate applicants, and significantly strengthened the academic qualifications of entering students. In 2011, the university launched Forward Thinking, a \$1 billion capital campaign, with more than 60 percent of the goal raised during the quiet

phase.

Snyder assumed the Case Western Reserve presidency after serving as Executive Vice President and Provost of The Ohio State University, and as Professor of Law at the Moritz College of Law for 19 years. She graduated from the University of Chicago Law School, where she served as executive editor of its law review, and earned her bachelor's degree from Ohio State.



DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS DAVID L. DILES

David L. Diles, Ph.D., assumed the post of director of athletics and chair for the Department of Physical Education and Athletics at Case Western Reserve University on May 9, 2005. He was previously director of intercollegiate athletics at Eastern Michigan University (1999-05) and former vice president and director of athletics at St. Bonaventure University (1994-99).

A native of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, Diles' career in intercollegiate athletic administration spans more than 20 years. He began as an assistant athletic director at Central Michigan University from 1989-91. He moved on to serve in the same capacity at Auburn University from 1991-94 before joining St. Bonaventure and then Eastern Michigan.

In addition to his time in intercollegiate athletics, Diles served as an assistant

director of public relations for the National Football League's New York Jets and was a ticket and marketing intern for the New England Patriots in 1984. He also worked as the director of athletics at Dexter Community Schools (1987-89) and was an administrative assistant at the University of Michigan (1985-87).

Diles earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Ohio University, graduating cum laude in journalism in 1983 and summa cum laude in sports administration in 1984. He completed his doctorate in education at the University of Michigan in 1988.

DAVID WILSON PLAY-BY-PLAY

David Wilson returns for his sixth season as the play-by-play broadcaster for Case Western Reserve football. Wilson joined the Spartans' broadcast team in 2007 and called every play of the Spartans' thrilling, undefeated regular season and NCAA Division III playoff run. Wilson is a familiar voice on the local and regional sports scene. In addition to Spartan football broadcasts, he also handles high school football and basketball play-by-play throughout Northeast Ohio. He has broadcast Cleveland State University women's basketball and was behind the microphone for the Vikings' NCAA Tournament game versus Stanford in 2008. An experienced baseball announcer, the Pendleton, Indiana-native has

logged over 15 years calling play-by-play for several minor league baseball teams around the country, including the Triple-A Buffalo Bisons and Louisville Redbirds as well as the Double-A Akron Aeros and Single-A Lake County Captains. Known for an easy-going style and meticulous preparation, Wilson describes his association with CWRU Football as 'one of the most professional and enjoyable assignments I've ever had.' A Chagrin Falls resident, Wilson has also covered local sports in print, having been a regular contributor to the sports page of the *News-Herald* from 2002-06. He embarked on his broadcasting career after graduating from Indiana State University in 1989.



ED DAUGHERTY ANALYST

Ed Daugherty enters his eighth season as a member of the Case Western Reserve football broadcast team, serving as the team's color analyst. In addition to his duties as the color analyst for Spartan football, Daugherty also serves as the color analyst for CWRU basketball broadcasts, and as the pre-game, halftime and post-game host. He has been a play-by-play, color analyst and sideline reporter for high school football broadcasts in the Cleveland area for over eight years, serving as the lead play-by-play voice for the St. Ignatius football broadcasting network. The North Olmsted-native is a graduate of Xavier University and has previously handled the pre-game, halftime and post-game

show hosting duties for the Cleveland Force of the Major Indoor Soccer League and the MISL Radio Network. Daugherty began his broadcasting career at WVXU-FM in Cincinnati and served as a weekend anchor at WEOL-AM between 1996 and 1998. He currently lives in Olmsted Township with his wife Patti, and three children, Kate, Meg and Matt.

CASE FIELD HOME OF THE SPARTANS



The 2012 season will mark the eighth year that the Case Western Reserve University football team has called Case Field home.

The 2,400-seat, state-of-the-art stadium and surrounding residence hall complex opened in August of 2005. The stadium boasts many distinguishing features, such as its spacious locker rooms, updated press box, field surface and surrounding track. The entire complex was built at a total cost of \$126 million.

‘As a coach and recruiter, you want to be able to show prospects a facility that they would be proud to call home during their collegiate career,’ said Head Coach **Greg Debeljak**. ‘The players and parents who visit our complex walk away with that feeling and more.’

After playing over 35 years of football at Finnigan Field, the Spartans played their last game at the multi-sport complex on November 8, 2003. Finnigan Field had played host to many successful teams, including the 1984 Case Western Reserve football

team, which was the first team in university football history to finish the season undefeated. The field also was used as a practice facility for the Cleveland Browns from 1965 to 1972.

During the 2004 season, the Spartans played their home games at Brush High School’s Korb Field while construction on their new home was completed. Play opened at the new facility for the Case Western Reserve football squad on September 10, 2005, versus Denison University in front of 2,300 fans. The Spartans did not disappoint on that day, defeating the Big Red, 20-6.

The setting in which Case Field was built is arguably one of the best in all of NCAA Division III football. The gridiron is surrounded by seven residence halls known as the Village at 115. These student dormitories, built in a horseshoe shape around the field, house around 800 undergraduate students, giving it a unique and intimate feel.

‘Our attendance has more than doubled since the facility was erected,’



explained Debeljak, who was an assistant at Case Western Reserve for three seasons (2001-2003) and has been the head coach since 2004. 'A very spirited atmosphere has created a home field advantage that is second to none in Division III.'

The stadium also boasts a modern and spacious press box. The area contains booths designated for both home and away radio as well as a large area for members of the media and school representatives. The coaches' areas within the box are especially spacious and seat six coaches comfortably. There also is a large president's suite that is used to host distinguished guests and sponsors or to hold meetings. The press box has wireless high-speed internet access and digital television throughout.

Currently, locker rooms are located adjacent to the field in the lower level of house seven of the dormitory complex along with a modern training room facility, named after Dr. Tom McLaughlin in 2007, which includes both full size warm and cold whirlpools. The university plans to construct a field house alongside of Case Field, and the home locker rooms will be relocated to that site where they will contain even more amenities, including a weight room.

The field itself is a multifunctional field with a FieldTurf surface surrounded by the eight-lane Coach Bill Sudeck Track, named after the legendary cross country, track and basketball coach in 2008. The field was built in a European box style, allowing a large enough area for soccer contests. Along with hosting varsity football, soccer

and track events, the field is used for intramural activities, special events, and for the general recreation of the campus community.

HEAD COACH GREG DEBELJAK

Ninth Season ■ John Carroll '88 ■ Record: 61-23 (.726)



Greg Debeljak enters his ninth season as the head football coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. In his eight seasons, he has compiled an overall record of 61-23 (.726) and led the Spartans to an unbelievable 38-game regular season winning streak from 2006-10. Debeljak was named the Spartans' head coach on March 24, 2004 after serving for 15 years as an assistant coach in the local college ranks.

Debeljak led the Spartans to three consecutive undefeated (10-0) regular seasons, NCAA postseason appearances and University Athletic Association titles from 2007-09. Since 2007, Case Western Reserve has posted an overall record of 48-6, earning Debeljak and his staff the UAA Coaching Staff of the Year award for three straight seasons from 2007-09 and once again in 2011. Five times in the past eight years, the Spartan staff has received that honor.

Additionally, Case Western Reserve has been ranked in the top 25 in the nation in four of the last five seasons, including their highest mark of seventh during the final regular season American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) poll in 2009.

Debeljak also was selected as one of five finalists in Division III for the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year Award for three straight years (2007-09) and was named the 2008 Lee Tressel Ohio College Coach of the Year by the Northeast Ohio chapter of the National Football Foundation.

A graduate of nearby Mentor High School,

Debeljak served as the Spartans' associate head coach/offensive coordinator for three seasons before being named head coach. Highlighting his three years as the offensive coordinator, Case Western Reserve ranked first nationally in passing offense and second in total offense in 2002.

Prior to coming to Case Western Reserve, Debeljak spent 12 years as an assistant (1988-00) at his alma mater, John Carroll University. At JCU, he was a graduate assistant during his first two seasons, before working eight years as the quarterbacks and receivers coach. Before his final season at John Carroll, he was promoted to the offensive coordinator position.

Debeljak was a member of the staff that produced NFL Pro Bowl linebacker London Fletcher, and he was the position coach for former Denver Broncos Head Coach Josh





McDaniels, Indianapolis Colts Personnel Director Tom Telesco, and former pros Tom Arth (Colts, Packers, Toronto [CFL]) and Larry Wanke (Giants).

Debeljak earned both his bachelor's (1988) and master's (1995) degrees from John Carroll, and he played basketball and football for the Blue Streaks. On the gridiron, he lettered four times, once as a defensive back (earning second-team all-league honors), twice as a quarterback and once as a receiver. As a basketball player, he helped lead the Blue Streaks to a pair of Presidents' Athletic Conference titles and held the school-record for assists in a single game with 13.

Debeljak and his wife, Kelly, reside in Beachwood. Their two daughters, Ashley and Allison, are both student-athletes at Case Western Reserve.

THE "COACH DEBS" PHILOSOPHY

Debeljak has a three-part philosophy on how to win both on and off the playing field and when it all comes together – the Spartan leader feels it positions his team for ultimate success. "You are going to have various levels of success with wins and losses, but I think it's important to experience other things," he explained. "When we have recruiting weekends and we meet as a group, this is one of the first things I bring up."

- The first goal is to become a family through team-building activities. "We want our kids to come together as a team and a family but it's difficult," Debeljak explained. "Each year brings different players with different personalities – that's why it is our number one goal. We can't accomplish anything else until we merge together as a family. The relationships an incoming freshman had with his high school teammates most likely began in elementary school – they grew up with each other. The biggest hurdle is to get (freshmen) to believe in their new family in a shortened period of time."
- The second is the commitment to excellence in both athletics and academics without sacrificing one for the other. "In regards to academics and athletics, we feel that even though we are one of the better academic institutions in the country, we still want to be competitive on a national level athletically. Simply said, they should both fit together." The Spartans had both their best season on and off the field in 2007. While posting an 11-1 record and reaching the NCAA Division III playoffs, the team posted its highest GPA during Debeljak's tenure and had 10 players, eight of whom were freshmen, post a perfect 4.0 GPA.
- Third, student-athletes give something back through community involvement and service. One of his first initiatives in this area was making the players a household name with incoming freshmen by helping them move into their dorm rooms, a recurring event every August. And last year, the Spartan gridironers taught football skills to hundreds of inner city elementary students during a university-wide volunteer effort. "I think it is important to get out there and make your name known to the Case Community and to classmates," Debeljak said. "The Case For Community Day Sports Clinic event was a lot of fun, our kids learned as much from the campers as they did from them."



MARCUS MACALLA

Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator



Marcus Macalla enters his 12th season at Case Western Reserve and his ninth year as assistant head coach in 2012.

Last season, Macalla guided the Spartan defense to one of the best performances in program history. The unit ranked seventh in the nation in rush defense (75.8 ypg), 12th in scoring defense (12.9 ppg) and fourth in red zone efficiency (52%) in addition to producing the University Athletic Association Defensive Player of the Year in tackle Dale English and two *D3Football.com* All-North Region selections in English and safety Dan Calabrese.

In 2009, Macalla was recognized by the Northeast Ohio Chapter of the National Football Foundation as its Assistant Coach of the Year as the Spartans earned a third-straight undefeated regular season, UAA Championship and NCAA Playoff berth.

Macalla joined the staff in 2001 as a defensive line and special teams coach. He was named assistant head coach in 2004 and defensive coordinator in 2005.

Prior to joining the staff at CWRU, he served as Kenyon College's defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in 2000. Before Kenyon, Macalla was at Hamline University (1999-2000) in Minnesota where he coached wide receivers in addition to serving on the staff for track & field.

He served as an assistant coach at John Carroll University from 1996-98, also obtaining a master's degree in education. While at JCU, he worked with defensive ends, linebackers and special teams. Before coaching at the collegiate level, Macalla was an assistant football and track coach at North Olmsted High School.

As a student-athlete, Macalla played outside linebacker at Baldwin Wallace University and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration and health & physical education in 1994.

Macalla resides in Old Brooklyn with his wife, Carrie, and their children, Maddy (11) and Shane (9).

DERECK SLESH

Offensive Coordinator



The 2012 season will mark Dereck Slesh's ninth season as the offensive coordinator and his 13th season overall at Case Western Reserve. Slesh joined

the staff in 2001 and spent his first three seasons as the defensive coordinator.

During his time at CWRU, Slesh has guided some of the nation's top offensive units, including a 2009 squad that ranked fifth in the nation in scoring (42.4 ppg) and seventh in yardage (470.8 ypg). Slesh also produced a three-time (2007-09) University Athletic Association Player of the Year and 2009 American Football Coaches Association All-American in quarterback Dan Whalen.

Prior to his arrival at Case Western Reserve, Slesh spent three seasons (1996-97, 2000) on the staff at John Carroll University. He also served in the local high school ranks as head coach at Benedictine High School from 1998-99 and as a member of the staff at Beachwood High School from 1990-95. In 1988, Slesh began his coaching career at his high school alma mater, Hawken School.

Slesh was a football and baseball student-athlete at Marietta College where he received a bachelor's degree in business management in 1988. He also earned an M.B.A from Cleveland State University in 1996.

JERRY SCHUPLINSKI

Special Teams Coordinator/Linebackers



Jerry Schuplinski enters his fifth season as special teams coordinator and linebackers coach in 2012. Schuplinski, who was

named a full-time assistant coach in August of 2008, had previously been the head football coach at local Trinity High School since December of 2002 and its athletic director since June of 2007.

The 2003 Ohio Division IV Co-Coach of the Year inherited a struggling program that had not posted a winning season in seven years and turned the team around in just five seasons. The Trojans won two conference championships and made their first state playoff appearance in 19 years under Schuplinski's reign.

From January of 2000 until May of 2002, he served as a graduate assistant at John Carroll University, where he worked with the running backs and special teams. Schuplinski earned both his bachelor's degree in business administration (1999) and an M.B.A. (2001) from JCU.

Schuplinski resides in Seven Hills with his wife, Megan, and their children, Macy and Bryn.



JIM MICHALS

Outside Linebackers



Jim Michals enters his ninth season as an assistant coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. He graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1974 and earned a master's degree from Cleveland State University

in 1983. Michals is currently a teacher at St. Ignatius High School in Cleveland. He has coached at several area high schools as well as serving as an assistant at John Carroll University in the late 1980s. He resides in Euclid with his wife, Donna, and his three children, Maggie, Jack, and Danny.

MIKE JONES

Cornerbacks



Mike Jones returns for his sixth year as the cornerbacks coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. Prior to joining the collegiate ranks, Jones was Cleveland Heights High School's head football coach for seven years (2000-06).

He still teaches health and physical education at Cleveland Heights. Jones was an assistant football coach and head women's tennis coach at Ohio Northern University from 1994-2000 and served as defensive coordinator and linebackers' coach his last three years at ONU. Jones also was a high school assistant at Trotwood Madison High School in Dayton, Ohio (1988-2004) and spent the 1987 season coaching in the Dayton Public Schools. He was a four-year letterwinner at defensive end at Wittenberg University, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in health and physical education in 1987. He completed a master's degree in education at Bluffton College in 1999.

MIKE MURPHY

Offensive Line



Mike Murphey enters his first season as the offensive line coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. A former collegiate player, Murphey has more than a decade worth of coaching experience in Northeast Ohio. Prior to joining

the Spartan coaching staff, Murphey coached for four seasons (2008-11) at nearby Kenston High School in Chagrin Falls. He served as offensive coordinator/offensive line coach and helped lead the Bombers to the 2010 Chagrin Valley Conference Championship with a berth to the state playoffs. Murphey also coached at Chagrin Falls High School for four seasons as defensive coordinator. In 2007, the St. Louis-native was selected as a head coach for the 2007 Cuyahoga County East/West All-Star Game. Before his time at CFHS, Murphey served as offensive coordinator for one season at Trinity High School under current Spartan Special Teams Coordinator Jerry Schuplinski. With Murphey leading the offense, the Trojans captured the 2003 North Coast League Championship. Murphey got his start in coaching at his college alma mater, John Carroll University. He worked as a graduate assistant for three seasons (2000-02) and was a member of a staff that led the Blue Streaks to the No. 3 ranking in Division III in 2002. As a player, Murphey was a three-year letterwinner at JCU during the time when current Spartan Head Coach Greg Debeljak was on the Streaks' coaching staff. A member of both the Greater Cleveland Football Coaches and Ohio High School Football Coaches Associations, Murphey earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology from JCU in 2001. He later earned a Master of Education in School Counseling in 2009. Murphey currently serves as a professional school counselor at Kenston. He and his wife, Laura, reside in University Heights and have two boys, Sean (3) and Matthew (1).

Ben Taylor '01 begins his 11th year as an assistant coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. A former stand-out defensive lineman for the Spartans, Taylor earned four varsity letters and was a three-time All-UAA selection.

A native of Lyons, Ohio, Taylor graduated in 2001 and later earned his M.B.A. from the Weatherhead School of Management. He also works in the athletic department as a building attendant and an assistant wrestling coach.

JOEY BAUM

Quarterbacks (Student Assistant)

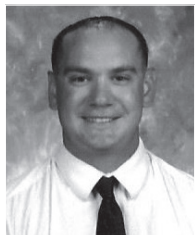


Joey Baum '11 enters his second season on the Spartan coaching staff in 2012, working primarily with the quarterbacks. A three-year letterwinner at QB from 2008-10, Baum started all 10 games at quarterback

in 2010 and was the UAA's top-rated passer. He completed 210-of-324 passes (64.8 percent) for 2,446 yards and 23 TDs versus just seven interceptions. Baum was an ESPN Academic All-American and one of just 29 male student-athletes from around the nation to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. He is currently pursuing a Master of Business Administration degree at Case Western Reserve.

VIC PREISEL

Receivers



Vic Preisel enters his second season as an assistant coach at Case Western Reserve in 2012. A former collegiate player, Preisel spent nine years in the high school coaching ranks in Cleveland before joining the Spartan staff prior to the 2011 campaign. A native of Cleveland and 1999 graduate of nearby Holy Name High School, Preisel played four seasons of collegiate football at Division III

"powerhouse" University of Mount Union. A member of three NCAA Champion teams, Preisel earned his bachelor's degree in 2003. Upon graduating, he joined the coaching staff at Elyria Catholic High School. He served as varsity quarterbacks coach during his first season then moved over as head freshman coach from 2004-06. In 2007, Preisel re-joined the varsity staff as receivers coach and special teams coordinator. In his three seasons in the position, he helped produced three All-Ohio receivers as part of one of the most prolific passing attacks in the state. Preisel also spent the 2010 campaign as the receivers coach at Benedictine High School.

DALE ENGLISH

Defensive Line (Student Assistant)



Dale English is in his first season on the Spartan coaching staff in 2012 and will assist with the defensive line. A four-year letterwinner at defensive tackle, English was a four-time All-UAA selection and the 2011

UAA Defensive Player of the Year. Also a two-time *D3Football.com* All-North Region honoree, English finished his career with 215 tackles, 59 tackles for loss, two interceptions and a school-record 33 sacks.



2012 SEASON PREVIEW

With several key playmakers back on each side of the ball and a total of 13 starters returning, the Case Western Reserve University football team will look to win a fifth University Athletic Association Championship in six years during the fall of 2012.

The Spartans (9-1 overall, 3-0 UAA in 2011) have won four of the past five UAA Championships with three-consecutive NCAA Playoff appearances from 2007 to 2009. Over the last five seasons, the Spartans boast an overall record of 48-6.

Of the 27 lettermen back from last year's group, Case returns five starters on offense, seven on defense and one on special teams. And, for the second-consecutive season, a bulk of the team's experience returns on the defensive side of the ball.

"Our goals have stayed pretty consistent over the years," said ninth-year **Head Coach Greg Debeljak**. "Our number one goal is to win the UAA, number two is to be competitive at a national level and reach the NCAA playoffs. When comparing this group to last season, we definitely have more experience returning on offense. We also have quite a few starters back on defense. But, we graduated several impact guys who were playmakers for us over the last four years. So, the question we'll have to answer is can our returnees be as impactful as the players we lost? There are quality guys back with plenty of experience on both sides of the ball, and I am confident they can get the job done."

OFFENSE

The Spartan offense took on a bit of a different identity last season while trying to withstand the graduation of several key players. Even though the unit didn't match the high-scoring production of years past, it did find ways to generate scores in key moments throughout the year, and it allowed for several newcomers to work their way into vital roles on the team.

"I think we'll be run-oriented again this season, but

we'll also be looking to be more aggressive," said Debeljak. "Last year, we played so well on defense that it allowed us to be more conservative on the offensive side. This year, I think we need to take more risks and throw the ball down the field more. Ultimately, our top playmakers are in the running game, so our offense will start there."

Quarterback

Unlike last season, the Spartans will have the benefit of a returning starter at the signal-caller position. Senior **Erik Olson** joined the team last fall as a highly-touted transfer and turned in a solid first campaign that netted him second-team All-UAA honors. Also the team's punter, Olson completed 154-of-257 passes (59.9%) for 1,571 yards and 11 touchdowns. Olson earned UAA Offensive Player of the Week status for three-consecutive games and ranked second in the league in both passing yards and TDs.

"Erik went through a major transition last season, playing for the first time in two years and learning a new offense," noted Debeljak. "He improved during the season, and he improved greatly during spring practice. He is unquestionably our starter and the leader of our offense. Erik's had the chance to build some quality reps with the guys around him, and his growing comfort level in our offense will allow him to be more aggressive and more successful."

The back-up job figures to be a close competition in preseason camp with sophomores **Billy Beecher** and **Sean McCarthy** as the front-runners, and junior **Jacob White** also in the mix.

Running Back

Running back is easily the most accomplished amongst the Spartan skill positions. The All-UAA duo of junior **Kenny Riordan** and sophomore **Manny Sicre** lead a group that returns most of its production from 2011. Riordan was the starter in all 10 games during his sophomore year and earned first-team All-UAA hon-

ors with 556 yards and two touchdowns. The team's leader in rushing average (4.6 ypc), Riordan was tabbed UAA Offensive Player of the Week during two-of-three conference games and turned in long rushes of 45 and 56 yards late in the year.

The reigning UAA Rookie of the Year, Sicre led the team and ranked fourth in the conference with 638 yards on the ground. Sicre scored a total of six TDs—five rushing, one receiving—and was UAA Offensive Player of the Week after rushing for 172 yards with a 75-yard TD in the opener at John Carroll University. OhioCollegeFootball.com also tabbed Sicre as its Division III Rookie of the Year.

'Manny (Sicre) gives us something that we haven't had probably since Brandon McDowell (2001-03), a guy that just makes people miss, and Kenny (Riordan) is 210 pounds and our fastest guy,' said Debeljak. 'It's a great combination to have.'

With the graduation of one fullback from last season in Christian Anderson and the loss of junior **Steven Magister** due to injury, the lead blocking position figures to be a competition between sophomore **Manny Surunis** and several highly-touted freshmen. Sophomore **Ricky Hanzlik** is also back at the tailback spot after a solid rookie campaign at the junior varsity level.

Offensive Line

Much like last season, the front line will have to withstand key losses as a trio of starters graduated in Tony Opperman (guard), Michael Allen (center) and Brandon Rollé (left tackle). However, the group does return the entire right side of the line with senior **Cullen Dolan** at tackle and junior **Jake Abbott** at guard. The team will count on returning letterwinners in senior **Andrew Berkebile** and juniors **Shay Baker** and **Garrett Hartig** to fill in the remaining spots.

Dolan has been a constant on the line over the past two seasons, starting 19-of-20 games at right tackle.

As a junior, Dolan was tabbed second-team All-UAA. Abbott was a full-time starter last season after being named the team's freshman MVP the previous fall. The third-year Spartan was also a second-team All-UAA selection in 2011.

Berkebile, projected to start at center, made three starts last season and has seen time at both center and guard in his career. Hartig started twice last season and will likely assume the role at tackle, while Baker started three games at guard in 2011 after moving from linebacker a season ago.

Senior **Michael Koopman** and sophomore **Jon Allen**, younger brother of the aforementioned Michael Allen, also return with the opportunity to see significant playing time.

'There have been some years where we came in and felt like we only had five or six guys on the O-line that could play at this level,' said Debeljak. 'Now, we feel like we have nine or 10, but we don't know how good they can be. We need to keep them healthy, let them compete, and see what happens. It is a great luxury to have both Cullen (Dolan) and Jake (Abbott) back on the right side, and we will rely on them heavily as the others get acclimated to their roles.'

Receiver/Tight End

The Spartans' pass-catching unit lost a pair of starters to graduation in receiver Bryan Metlesitz and tight end Bryce Coleman, but Debeljak sees a young group that possesses great size, speed and big-play capability.

Leading the receiving corps is sophomore **Sean Lapcevic**, who started all 10 games as a freshman. In his rookie campaign, Lapcevic was the team's No. 2 wide out, hauling in 36 receptions for 429 yards and a touchdown. He ranked third in the UAA in catches and fourth in yardage.

Also back is senior **Brian Rice**, who caught eight passes

for 142 yards before suffering a season-ending injury last October. Rice posted a key reception with a 33-yard TD in a win at Allegheny College (Pa.) in early October.

Debeljak sees additional players in the mix like senior **Zachary Scott** and junior **Peter Vicente**, who both lost last season due to injuries, as well as sophomores **Tony Lybarger**, **Matthew Avril** and **Colin MacLeod**. The head coach also expects a talented group of freshmen to contribute to the position.

The tight end job position figures to be led by sophomore **George Darany** and junior **Drew Volbers**.

DEFENSE

In 2011, the Spartan defense turned in one of the best seasons in program history, ranking seventh in the nation in rush defense (75.7 ypg), 12th in scoring defense (12.9 ppg) and fourth in red zone efficiency (52%). The unit also produced the UAA Defensive Player of the Year, two D3Football.com All-North Region selections and seven of the 13 first-team All-UAA honorees. Although several key players from the group have been lost to graduation, Debeljak is still counting on his defense to set the tone for the rest of the squad.

‘The big question is how badly are we going to miss the likes of Dale English, Jake Adams and Rich Doolin?’ said Debeljak. ‘We have four seniors on the line, three senior linebackers and three seniors in the secondary. So, the experience level is there. We just have to wait to see the level of production we get out of our play-makers. And with the guys we having coming back, I’m confident this can be a great defense once again.’

Defensive Line

The defensive line has been the unit’s driving force over the past two seasons, and even with the loss of two starters, Debeljak expects the line to once again pace the squad’s 4-2-5 attack. Leading the group are a pair of All-UAA seniors in end **Adam Watson** and nose

guard **Michael Harris**.

Watson, a two-year starter, finished second on the squad last fall with 6.5 sacks and totaled 56 tackles, 10 tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. In his three seasons with the program, the two-time All-UAA selection has 129 tackles, 23.5 TFL and 15.5 sacks.

Harris, a three-year starter, has been a force on the interior of the line and posted 41 tackles with 1.5 sacks last season. In 30 games played during the last three years, Harris has 101 tackles, 14.5 TFL, five sacks and three forced fumbles.

‘Adam (Watson) and Mike (Harris) have been key guys for us over the past few years, and we’re expecting them to move to the next level as leaders of the line. Our other returnees have shown good things when they’ve gotten on the field, and we have the depth to be very good up front.’

The line lost two of the best in its history with 2011 UAA Defensive Player of the Year Dale English now a member of the Spartan coaching staff and two-time Capital One Academic All-American® Rich Doolin gone to graduation. But, Debeljak expects those spots to be filled by combinations of senior letterwinners **Collin Desens** and **Michael Sirosky** along with junior **Brandon Bryant** and sophomores **Mike Streicher**, **Mike Valle-riano**, **Derek Porto** and **Jack Behrend**.

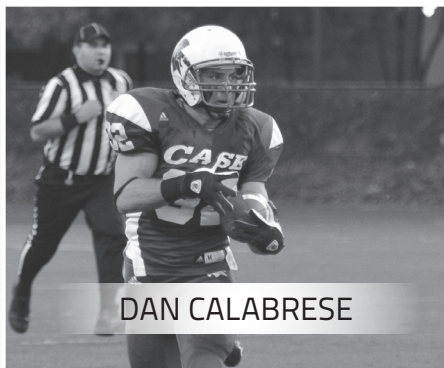
Desens missed time due to injury last season but did play in five games and had a half-sack and a forced fumble in the season-opening victory at John Carroll. Sirosky also missed time with an injury but had eight tackles and a half-sack for the year.

Linebackers

The linebacking corps returns all but one (Jacob Adams) from last year’s rotation and will be complemented by the return of an injured starter from last season. On

the inside, the Spartans feature senior starter **Wade Self** along with a two-year letterwinner in senior **Kevin Nossem**.

Self started nine games last season, missing one due to injury, and ranked third on the team with 66 tackles. For the season, Self racked up 4.5 tackles for loss, a sack and two forced fumbles on his way to earning All-UAA Honorable Mention accolades. The senior backer also earned UAA Defensive Player of the Week honors in late October after totaling 10 tackles and forcing a key fumble in an overtime win at The College of Wooster.

A second-team All-UAA pick, Nossem played in all 10 games with a start and ranked third on the team with 64 tackles as well as fourth with three interceptions. Nossem was named UAA Defensive Player of the Week as well following a win at Denison University in which he recorded 14 tackles, four sacks, a forced fumble and an interception.

With Self and Nossem projected as the starters at inside backer, junior **Scott Campbell** figures to be the team's main back-up.

On the outside in the hero position is first-team All-UAA senior **Ryan Ferguson**. Ferguson switched positions to fill in for an injured **Michael Fioramonti** last year and led the UAA with 95 tackles. Ferguson twice posted 13 tackles in a game in 2011 and was tabbed UAA Defensive Player of the Week with nine tackles and both a fumble and interception return for a touchdown in the season-opener at John Carroll.

A red-shirt senior, Fioramonti was injured in training camp late last summer but is expected back this fall with a 63-tackle, second-team All-UAA season of 2010 on his resume.

'Linebacker is a very strong and versatile position for us,' said Debeljak. 'Wade (Self) and Kevin (Nossem) are

the main guys inside, and they both played very well last season. If Fioramonti is able to return, that will give us a lot of flexibility in moving Ferguson around. Either way, we know we have a group that can impact the game in many ways.'

Secondary

The secondary features three returning starters as well as the team's most accomplished player in senior safety **Dan Calabrese**.

The reigning UAA Special Teams Player of the Year, Calabrese was tabbed All-UAA First Team and D3Football.com All-North Region at defensive back with 46 tackles, a team-best six interceptions and 10 passes defended, a forced fumble and three touchdown returns on two INTs and one punt. An impact player all of last season, Calabrese was a two-time UAA Defensive Player of the Week and was named to D3Football.com's National Team of the Week after tying a school record with three interceptions and returning a pair for scores in a victory versus Oberlin College in early October.

'Dan (Calabrese) is just a great football player,' said Debeljak. 'He was nominated for All-American consideration by other coaches in our league, and he has tremendous respect within within our region. He is a special player that can make a lot of things happen.'

Joining Calabrese as returning starters are senior cornerback **Cary Dieter** and junior safety **Jordan Banky**.

A two-year starter and three-year letterwinner, Dieter earned first-team All-UAA honors as a junior with 41 tackles and five pass break-ups. The team's top cover corner a season ago, Dieter also set up the game-winning score with a forced fumble at Allegheny on October 1.

Banky took over as the starting free safety in 2011 when current senior **Steven Roby** suffered a season-ending injury. In nine games and eight starts, Banky recorded 26 tackles, a fumble recovery and two inter-

ceptions en route to earning All-UAA Honorable Mention status.

Roby posted 13 tackles and four pass break-ups in just two games before seeing his first season as a starter cut short versus the University of Rochester (N.Y.) on September 10. Debeljak sees Roby in the mix at cornerback this fall.

Also back in the secondary are letterwinners in senior corner **Brandon Flick** and junior safety **Jacob LaFleur**. Flick, projected to start at corner, played in six games with a start last season, totaling 16 tackles and a forced fumble. LaFleur saw action in nine games. Junior **Fady Haddad** is also back at the corner position.

SPECIALISTS

For the second-consecutive season, the special teams unit graduated its starting placekicker with all-time kicking scoring leader Sam Coffey gone in 2011 and All-UAA performer Daniel Vasil gone this season. The unit does, however, return its punter in Olson, who averaged 36.8 yards per punt last fall.

Calabrese will once again pace the return game after leading the UAA with a school-record 367 punt return yards as a junior. The UAA Special Teams Player of the Year also handles holding duties.

In the kicking game, Debeljak sees a trio of freshmen competing for the job.

THE SCHEDULE

A pair of first-time opponents and a final year of UAA/ North Coast Athletic Conference match-ups headline the 2012 schedule.

The Spartans begin the season with three-of-four games on the road, including a pair of night games to open the schedule at Marietta College on September 1 and Hiram College on Sept. 8.

The early slate of away games doesn't figure to be an issue for the Spartans, as the team has posted a 24-1

record in the past 25 road contests dating back to 2007.

Marietta is one of two first-time opponents as the Spartans welcome Frostburg State University (Md.) to Case Field for the 2012 home-opener on Sept. 15. Another road night game at Ohio Wesleyan University on Sept. 22 and a Homecoming clash with Wittenberg University on Sept. 29 close out the first month of the season.

The 25th and final installment of the "Baird Brothers Trophy Game" versus Wooster opens the second month of the season on October 6. Following a bye week, Case then closes out the road portion of the schedule at Oberlin on October 20 and the University of Chicago (Ill.) in the UAA opener on October 27.

November features a pair of home conference games with Washington University (Mo.) in town on the 3rd and Carnegie Mellon University (Pa.) at Case Field for the 26th Annual "Academic Bowl" on the 10th.

"Much like last year, this schedule will be one of the toughest we've had in my time here," said Debeljak. "We add two new opponents (Marietta and Frostburg St.) to the mix that come from two of the top conferences in the nation, and we add Wittenberg, who is a perennial power in the NCAC and in the region. The UAA is as competitive as it's ever been, so we know that we'll need to be at our best each and every week."

The 2012 campaign is the final season of the UAA/ NCAC schedule, and the Spartans will conclude annual matchups with the likes of Wooster, Oberlin, Hiram and others. In 2014, the team will join the Presidents' Athletic Conference as an affiliate member, beginning a full PAC schedule along with the three-game UAA slate.

ACADEMIC BOWL

Each fall, student-athletes from Case Western Reserve University and Carnegie Mellon University meet on the gridiron with the victor claiming the Academic Bowl. This annual football game between two of the nation's top academic institutions began in the fall of 1986 and continues to be one of the more anticipated games for both teams each year. The two schools are among the nation's elite research and scholastic institutions, therefore a rivalry already exists in the academic aspect of the universities. So as competition in the classroom continues, the winner of the coveted Academic Bowl trophy can claim bragging rights on the athletic field for at least one year.

The Academic Bowl is more than a trophy as it emphasizes a "Commitment to Academic and Athletic Excellence". The academic part comes hand in hand being a student-athlete in the University Athletic Association whose members include, along with Case and Carnegie Mellon, some of the top institutions in the country including Brandeis University, the University of Chicago, Emory University, New York University, University of Rochester, and Washington University. The athletic excellence side of the



Academic Bowl involves the storied football traditions between these two schools.

The Spartans won the first Academic Bowl Trophy in 1986, defeating Carnegie Mellon 21-14. In the all-time Academic Bowl series, the Spartans hold a 15-11 advantage over CWRU.

BAIRD BROTHERS TROPHY

Fishing and football don't ordinarily go together, but don't tell that to Case Western Reserve University and the College of Wooster. When the Spartans and the Fighting Scots meet on the gridiron, the winner claims one of the most unique trophy traditions in college sports, the Baird Brothers Trophy. This trophy, noted in a 1995 issue of Sports Illustrated magazine as one of the most unique trophies in college football, consists of a golden fishing stringer with carved brass fish representing each meeting.



The trophy's beginnings date back to 1984 when Bob Baird, an economics professor at CWRU, and his brother Bill Baird, an economics professor at Wooster, came up with the idea. The winner of the game gets to keep the stringer for the year and add a new fish for that year's contest. Each added fish is representative of how the game was played, with the score and winner engraved on the side. The original fish is a four-inch blue gill symbolizing the narrow last second Case victory, 21-14. A big northern pike denotes the Spartans 37-0 victory over the Scots in 1985. Other fish included on the trophy are a flounder, a carp, a walleye, a catfish, a rainbow trout, a sturgeon, a sucker, a crappie, a muskie, a sheepshead, a gar, a largemouth bass and a smallmouth bass.

The Baird brothers originated the trophy in 1984 when Wooster and Case first met as members of the North Coast Athletic Conference. The brothers, economic professors at the rival schools, were taught by their father to fish at an early age and thought the fish theme would be a fitting reward to the victors. Bob Baird passed away a few years ago, but his brother Bill still carries on the tradition of presenting the trophy to the winning team at the conclusion of the game.

The two schools have met 24 times, with Wooster holding an 13-11 advantage in the all-time series [for the Baird Trophy] with CWRU.

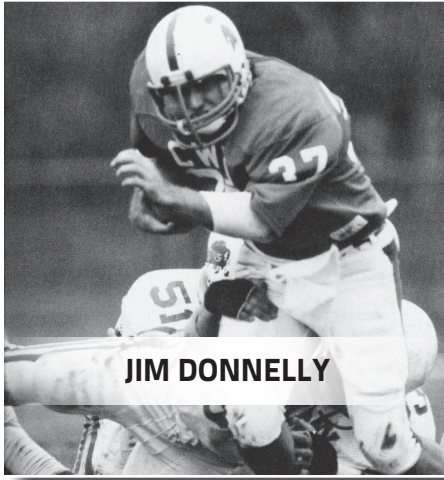

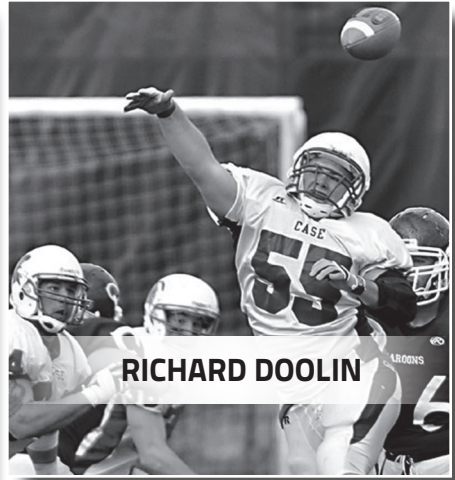

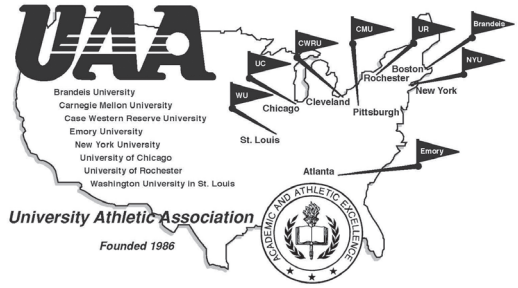
THE UAA: WHERE THEORY MEETS PRACTICE

For 25 years, the University Athletic Association has served as a bold statement of what college athletics can and should be - that it is highly desirable and possible for a group of committed institutions to conduct a broad-based program of intercollegiate athletics for men and women; to compete with like academic institutions spread over geographically expansive areas; and to seek excellence in athletics while maintaining a perspective which holds the student-athlete and the academic mission of the institution as the center of focus.

The UAA is a significant expression of the principle that the provision of a high-quality college athletic experience is worth the commitment required of an institution. It is worthwhile not only because it benefits the student-athletes, but also because it benefits the entire campus community and, in turn, the institution itself. Perhaps more importantly, the UAA is a strong statement that the success of intercollegiate athletics is wholly dependent upon institutional integrity and the ability of institutions to complete the full integration of athletics into the academic fabric of higher education.

Members of the UAA share the belief that academic excellence and athletic excellence are not mutually exclusive. Implicit in this belief are several sets of assumptions. The first is that the academic enterprise is the primary element. Student-athletes are just that - students first and athletes second.

The second set of assumptions has to do with athletic excellence. Athletic excellence is not to be confused with a win-at-all-costs attitude. It properly relates to the



caliber of experience offered to students who participate in intercollegiate athletics. Athletic teams should have the benefit of qualified coaching - capable individuals chosen for professional competence and commitment to putting the welfare of the student first. They should play and practice in first-rate facilities at reasonable times. Their equipment should be safe, of high quality, and conducive to the best performance possible. A consistent and challenging level of athletic competition should be provided to both women and men.

The final assumptions concern what might be termed a proper athletic emphasis. Athletic programs are extracurricular activities conducted for students and should be given consideration similar to that accorded other such institutionally sponsored activities. They should not only complement the academic experience, but should also reflect the quality of the academic environment within which they exist. Division III is an approach to athletics - not a synonym for third-rate. The University Athletic Association sponsors competition in 22 sports - twelve sports for men and ten sports for women - including football, soccer, cross country, volleyball, basketball, fencing, wrestling, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, baseball, softball, outdoor track and field, tennis, and golf.
