The UAA – Where Theory Meets Practice

For 38 years, the University Athletic Association has continued to serve as a bold statement of the vision of its founders — that the pursuit of academic and athletic excellence are complementary goals and can be achieved without the compromise of one by the other. The members of the UAA hold that the success of intercollegiate athletics is wholly dependent upon institutional integrity and the ability of institutions to complete the full integration of athletics into the academic fabric of higher education.

The UAA is a significant expression of the principle that the provision of a high-quality college athletic experience is worth the commitment required of an institution. It is worthwhile not only because it benefits the student-athletes, but also because it benefits the entire campus community and, in turn, the institution itself.

Members of the UAA share the belief that academic excellence and athletic excellence are not mutually exclusive. Implicit in this belief are several sets of assumptions. The first is that the academic enterprise is the primary element. Student-athletes are just that — students first and athletes



The second set of assumptions has to do with athletic excellence. Athletic excellence is not to be confused with a win-at-all-costs attitude. It properly relates to the caliber of experience offered to students who participate in intercollegiate athletics. Athletic teams should have the benefit of qualified coaching — capable individuals chosen for professional competence and commitment to putting the welfare of the student first. They should play and practice in first-rate facilities at reasonable times. Their equipment should be safe, of high quality, and conducive to the best performance possible. A consistent and challenging level of athletic competition should be provided to both women and men.

The final assumptions concern what might be termed a proper athletic emphasis. Athletic programs are extracurricular activities conducted for students and should be given consideration similar to that accorded other such institutionally sponsored activities. They should not only complement the academic experience, but should also reflect the quality of the academic environment within which they exist. Division III is an approach to athletics — not a synonym for third-rate.

The University Athletic Association determines champions in 20 sports — ten sports each for men and women, including cross country, soccer, volleyball, basketball, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, wrestling, baseball, golf, softball, tennis, and outdoor track and field.

Many student-athletes from UAA institutions have been recognized for their achievements as scholars and athletes. During the 2024-25 academic year, 61 student-athletes from UAA institutions were recognized as College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-America® honorees, three of whom were named Academic All-America Team Member of the Year in their respective sports, and six earned the prestigious NCAA Elite 90 award.

Fourteen student-athletes from UAA institutions were among those awarded NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. In addition, 280 UAA student-athletes received more than 520 All-America honors in team or individual sports.

UAA teams earned NCAA titles in 2024-25 in women's soccer, women's basketball, women's golf, and women's tennis with eight runner-up team finishes. Twelve individuals captured NCAA titles with eight UAA relays/doubles teams also earning NCAA championships.

In all, 37 UAA teams posted top-10 finishes, including 23 among the top-five, while 16 others finished in the top 20. In total, 53 Association teams posted top-20 finishes.

The theoretical . . .

The actual . . .

In 2024-25, 61 student-athletes from UAA institutions were recognized as CSC Academic All-America® honorees and 14 were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

UAA teams earned four NCAA titles and eight runner-up finishes. 12 student-athletes captured 17 individual national titles with eight relays/doubles teams also winning national titles.

In 2024-25 NCAA championship competition, 23 UAA teams finished in the top five in their national championships, while another 30 finished in the top 20.
