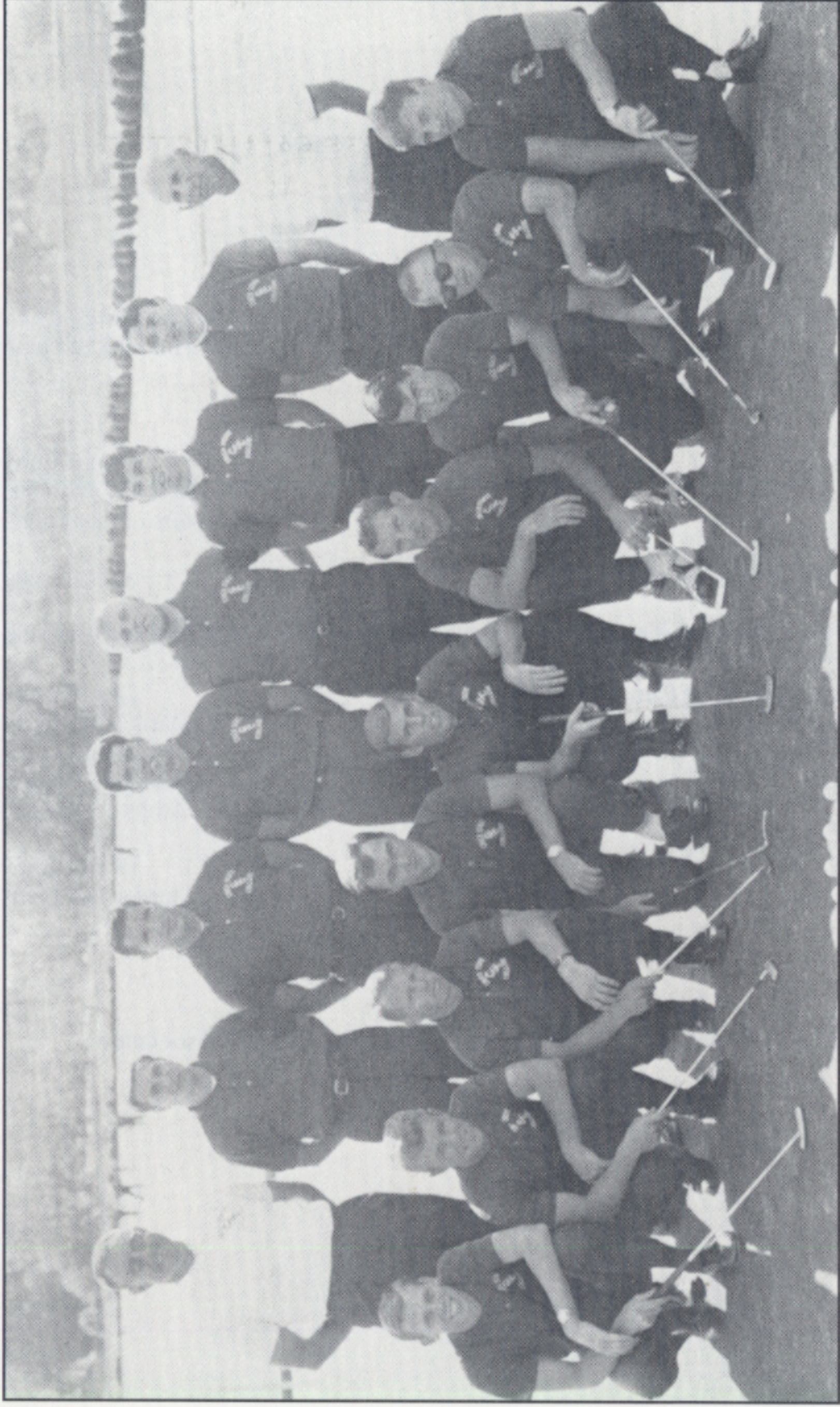

THE HALL OF FAME COMMITTEE SALUTES THE 1966 and 1967 GOLF TEAMS

Hal Bishop's finest years as golf coach were without a doubt while coaching the 1966 and 1967 teams. The 1966 team finished its dual season winning fifteen matches, losing two, and tying one. They placed second in the Far Western Conference tournament and won the Division II NCAA championship. Leaders of that team were Robb Shultz, Jess Crawford, and Bill Barkhurst. The 1967 team, led by Captain Robb Shultz, completed the season undefeated, won a Far Western Conference title, and had a high finish at Paducah, Kentucky in the nationals. Joining Shultz as outstanding players on this team were Alex Stewart, Jerry Myers, Bill Barkhurst, Jim Olsen, and Ron McElroy.

CHICO STATE ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

HORACE BRAKEBILL, Stirling City

Track: 1925, 1926, 1927

"Brakey" was captain of the track team in 1926 and 1927. He was an outstanding half-miler and miler, winning the Conference mile in 1925, 1926, and 1927. He was voted outstanding distance runner in the Conference and was the outstanding miler in the state in 1925. Thirty six of his thirty eight years in teaching and administration were spent in Stirling City. During the two years he didn't teach in Stirling City he was in Anderson—because the Stirling City mill burned down. In 1963 at his retirement, 132 of an estimated 325 graduates attended. The Stirling City Grammar School in 1975 was appropriately named the Horace Brakebill Elementary School.

LYNN CANNON, Oroville

Track & Field: 1970, 1971, 1972

Basketball: 1970, 1971, 1972

Lynn qualified for the first women's track college nationals in 1972 and for the AAU track nationals in 1973, 1974, and 1975. She placed second in the javelin in 1974 and fourth in 1976 in the Olympic Trials. Cannon has a distinguished record on U.S. teams in world competition. She participated in the World University Games in 1973, on the USA team vs. Russia in 1974, on the first U.S. team to China, and received a Pan Am Games bronze medal in 1975. In 1979 she won a silver medal in the first Olympic Sport Festival at the Pan Am Games. Cannon retired from competition in 1980 because of a knee injury. Since 1981 she has served as an official on the committee for Track & Field National Athletes and was its first chair. Lynn currently serves as head of Women's Track & Field for the United States.

DICK COPLAND, Redding

Basketball: 1938, 1939, 1941, 1942

Track: 1942

Football: 1942

As a freshman, Dick competed on what Art Acker said was the best frosh team in the history of Chico State. He was the workhorse on the 1940-41 Far Western Conference championship team and was a starter the next two years. He lettered in track as a long-jumper and in football as an end. He was active in student activities including president of his fraternity, president of Inter-fraternity Council and chairman of Pioneer Days. After World War II, he settled in Redding as an accountant and has been active in community activities and the Alumni Association.

KAYE HARMON FEHLIMAN, Redding

Basketball 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960

Softball: 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960

Volleyball: 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960

Kaye was Women's Athletic Association president, won the Associated Women's Students outstanding CSU Woman's award in 1958-59, and served as commissioner of women's athletics in 1959-60. She was outstanding in the physical education program at Chico State and was a fine athlete. From 1960 to 1964, she served as physical education instructor and Girls Athletic Association advisor at College Park High in Concord. From 1964 to 1972, she was the department chair at Central Valley High School, where she formed the first track team in the Shasta High School District, as well as the first district gymnastics and adaptive physical education program. In 1991 and 1992, she was selected the Teacher of the Month by students and faculty.

VERNE FREITAS, Sumner, Washington

Football: 1937, 1938, 1939, 1940

Basketball: 1938

Track: 1938

Verne was a first-string halfback on Roy Bohler's single wing teams. He came from a long line of the Freitas family of Red Bluff. Along with his brothers, he excelled in athletic endeavors, lettering four years in football, one in basketball, and one in track. During World War II, he earned the rank of captain in the Army and was wounded during the European invasion. After World War II, he returned to Northern California and taught elementary school in Westwood, Red Bluff, and Corning. He was district superintendent of schools and principal of the Corning Elementary district when he retired. He was actively involved with the Rotary Club, Mormon Church, Little League, and PTA.

JANICE FURMAN, Aptos

Swimming: 1966, 1967, 1968, 1969

Volleyball: 1966, 1967, 1968

Jan served as a teacher in the Davis Unified School District for 17 years. She was named Davis Teacher of the Year in 1983 and received the School Board Achievement Award in 1987. She was inducted into the Sacramento Sports Hall of Fame in 1986 and was named the California High School Volleyball Coach of the Year for 1987-88 and the National High School Volleyball Coach of the Year in Region Eight, Western States for 1987-88. She also received the "Davis Says Thanks" Award in 1988. Jan coached volleyball at Davis High School for thirteen years winning twelve consecutive Delta League championships with a record 222 wins/30 losses and a 77 consecutive game winning streak. She was League Coach of the Year seven times. Her teams won the San Joaquin Section League championship four times, won third place at the state championships, and were ranked nationally twice.

***ART GUERRA, Paradise**

Football: 1950, 1951, 1952, 1953

Boxing: 1952, 1953, 1954

Baseball: 1951, 1952, 1953, 1954

Art was "Mr. Steady" in all activities in which he participated. He gave his utmost and performed at the highest level of his ability. He was a back in football, middle weight boxer, and a pitcher in baseball. He received the Art Acker Trophy for outstanding senior athlete in 1954. After graduation, he taught and coached at Wheatland High School; in 1957, he moved to Enterprise High School and also taught courses at Shasta and Siskiyou colleges. In 1965, he moved to Paradise High School where he taught and coached until his retirement in June of this year. While coaching at Paradise, he won two Northern Section football championships and one cross country championship. He also taught Spanish at Butte College and served as a consultant to the State Department of Education for two years. Art passed away in August.

CAROL STANLEY HALL, Chico

Track and Field: 1970, 1971, 1972, 1973, 1974

Carol took part in sprints, hurdles, relays, and the long jump at Chico State. She qualified for the college nationals in the 200-meter hurdles in 1973 and placed second in the 400-meter conference championships in 1974. Carol has been a physical education instructor at Butte College since 1975, was women's volleyball coach from 1975 to 1980, and had a championship team and undefeated conference season in 1979. She was named Coach of the Year in 1979, 1980, 1982, and 1990. She coached the Western U.S. Track Team in 1981 at the Olympic Sports Festival in Indianapolis. She hosted the first Northern California Track and Field championships for women in 1978 and 1979. Carol was the coach for two women's track teams in the state championships. She founded the Butte Track Invitational for Girls for thirty Northern California high school teams.

GEORGE E. LANGEN, Chico

Football: 1950, 1951, 1952

Basketball: 1950, 1951, 1952

Tennis: 1950, 1951, 1952

George lettered three years in three sports—football, basketball, and tennis. He was a great team player in football and basketball and a terror on the tennis courts. He was the Far Western Conference singles tennis champion in 1951 and 1952. Since his college days, he has been active in community service with the Lions and Elks. He has served on the Chico Housing Board and Affirmative Action Committee. In recent years, he has been active as a speaker on behalf of the Multiple Sclerosis Society throughout Northern California. He has taught speech, history, and English at Notre Dame School in Chico and is a docent at the Chico Museum. For over ten years he contributed a trophy for a free-throw award to both Chico and Pleasant Valley High schools.

ROBERT MYERS, Fairfield

Football: 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976

Track and Field: 1974, 1975, 1976, 1977

Bob is a superb athlete and professional in the field of athletics and strives to enhance athletics to its highest level. As a freshman at Chico State, he broke a record by catching six passes against Sacramento State. He became a two-time All American in the decathlon and an All American in the javelin. He held the school conference record in both the decathlon and javelin in 1975, 1976, and 1977. He was the Conference decathlon champion in 1976 and 1977. While coaching at the University of Arizona in Tucson, he coached twenty three All Americans, two national champions, and four collegiate record holders. He has authored a book, "Drills for Jumping Events," and has written over 25 research and professional articles. This past year he became Athletic Director and division dean at Solano College.

KEN PIERCY, Chico

Basketball: 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956

Track: 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956

After graduation from Chico High, Ken attended Chico State and continued a brilliant athletic career. He was named to the All-Conference basketball team in 1954, 1955, and 1956. In 1954, he set a new Chico State high jump record and placed third in the state National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics track meet. He received the Art Acker Trophy as the outstanding senior athlete in 1956. Ken coached and taught at Bidwell Junior High for nine years and in 1969 he moved to Chico High as a business teacher and basketball coach. He retired from coaching in 1985. During his last ten years, his teams have won eight Eastern Athletic League championships.

CHARLES SHELEY, Chico

Track and Field: 1957, 1958, 1959, 1960

Cross Country: 1959, 1960

Chuck was a member of the Chico State Far Western Conference championship track and field teams of 1957 and 1958. He placed in the FWC championships all four years in the hurdles, 400, and mile relay. He has taught at Chico Junior High for 28 years and served as athletic director for 18 of those years. He has been cross country coach at Chico High for 18 years and track coach for 8 years. His boys' and girls' teams have won 27 league and 21 section championships at Chico High School. The Chico Educational Hall of Fame in 1990 honored him as the most inspirational teacher.

DAVE SIGEL, Chico

Basketball: 1938, 1939, 1940, 1941

Dave worked hard for four years as a Chico State basketball player. He was a tenacious, consistent, and dependable player and a starter on the 1939-40 championship team. In high school, he learned to play basketball from Art Acker because Chico High did not have a basketball team. He was a great baseball player (Chico State had no baseball team), and he played first base for the Chico Colts from 1935 to 1942. After graduation, he taught in the elementary district in Alameda and also served as vice principal. He left Alameda to manage the family men's store in Chico. He returned to teaching in Gridley in 1968 until his retirement in 1980. He still substitute teaches in Gridley. Dave also served a four-year term as a city councilman in Chico.

SAM SIMMONS, Chico

Football: 1965, 1966, 1967, 1968

Boxing: 1966, 1967, 1968, 1969

Track: 1967, 1968

Basketball: 1966

Sam epitomizes Chico State athletics—multisports participation, campus involvement, including Associated Students president, outstanding senior athlete award, and long and dedicated service as a teacher and coach. His most successful sport was boxing, where for three years he received All Conference honors at 139 lbs. in the California Boxing Conference. His coaching career started at Gridley High and continued at Bidwell Junior High where he coached and taught for 20 years. He is currently the head basketball coach at Chico High School and a mentor teacher in the Chico Unified School District. He joins his father, Willie Simmons, in the Hall of Fame. His father was also president of the Associated Students and an outstanding senior athlete. Like father, like son.

While at Chico State, Liz was an enthusiastic participant in all phases of the women's athletic programs. She served as a student assistant to Jane Shurmer and reflected that training when she became an exceptional teacher. She had a deep involvement in recreational programs and enjoyed working with young people. Liz was a member of Pi Kappa Sigma, now Sigma Kappa, during two years at Chico State. She was a member of the Women's Athletic Association and served as intramural manager and officer of that organization. After graduation and her marriage, she lived in Jackson, Michigan. She set up the elementary physical education program in Jackson in 1955 and joined the staff of Vandercook Lake High School there in 1957. Liz received her MA degree in counseling from Michigan State University in 1965. She joined the Foothill High School staff in 1967 and was a counselor from 1968 to 1982.

JEANETTE McCANN WHITE, Carmel

Jeanette was very active in all Women's Athletic Association activities and a Cardinal Key member and its president in 1961. She was an outstanding tennis and badminton trophy winner in 1959 and 1960. Jeanette was elected to "Who's Who Among Colleges and Universities" in 1960 and 1961. She taught in the Carmel Unified School District from 1961 to 1965, at Carmel Pre-School from 1969 to 1973, and at Santa Catalina School in Monterey from 1973 to 1991. From 1965 to 1991, Jeanette was very active in the Carmel American Red Cross as an instructor of water activities and CPR. From 1972 to 1986, she served on the city of Carmel Community and Cultural Commission and was appointed by five mayors to be chair. From 1988 to the present, she has been president of Friends of Sunset Foundation, the official support group for the city of Carmel culture and arts.

MONA MARGARET (PEG) WILLIAMS WOODRICH, Mountain View

All Sports: 1942, 1943, 1944, 1945

Peg was involved. She participated in softball, volleyball, badminton, field hockey, basketball, tennis, modern dance, golf, archery, bowling, and tumbling. She was also president of the physical education majors, social chair of the student body, yearbook editor, and Cardinal Key member. After graduation, she taught from 1948 to 1951 in New Caledonia; from 1952 to 1956 in Japan; from 1956 to 1959 at the American School in the Philippines; and from 1964 to 1992 in the Cupertino High School district. Peg is a doer. She was raised in Northern California on a sheep ranch, which is still in her family. Since 1974 she has hosted nearly 100 children for two-week sessions to ride, work, and learn to be ranch hands. She is a member of the Cattlemen's Association.

ROYCE DELMATIER, CHICO

Royce arrived in Chico in 1966 as a professor in the Political Science department and later served two presidents as chair of that department. He was Far Western Conference and Northern California Athletic Conference Faculty Athletic Representative for sixteen years. During those years, he worked with other colleges in the transition from the FWC to the Northern California Athletic Conference and the addition of women's athletics to the Conference. It might be noted he played basketball at the University of California at Berkeley. He retired from Chico State University in 1989 and still resides in Chico.
