SETTING THE SCENE

Central Michigan plays host to Michigan State in a nonconference game on Saturday, Nov. 19 (1 p.m.) at McGuirk Arena.

THE SERIES

CMU is 8-29 all-time against the Spartans. MSU has won the last eight meetings. CMU last won in 1993, 60-59, in Mount Pleasant. The Chippewas are 4-11 all-time against the Spartans in their home gym.

MSU won the last meeting, 79-70, on Dec. 18, 2020 in East Lansing.

The teams' prior meeting was in an NCAA Tournament opener on March 23, 2019 in South Bend, Ind. The Spartans won that game, 88-87.

LAST MEETING

12/18/2020: MSU 79, CMU 70 at East Lansing, Mich.

The Central Michigan women's basketball team gave it a valiant effort before coming up short to Michigan State, falling 79-70 in a nonconference game at the Spartans' Breslin Center.

The loss ended CMU's win streak at three games.

The Chippewas went toe to toe with the unbeaten Spartans (5-0), who surged ahead with a 10-0 fourth-quarter run, breaking a 65-65 tie.

Taiyier Parks put MSU in front for good with a layup with 5:54 to play. That ignited the game-breaking spurt as the Chippewas committed three critical turnovers and went more than four minutes without scoring a point.

It was an entertaining and well-played game that featured eight ties and 11 lead changes.

Micaela Kelly scored 26 points to lead CMU, while Kyra Bussell had 14, and Molly Davis and Jahari Smith added 11 each.

Nia Clouden scored 21 points to lead MSU, which made 21 of its 25 free throw attempts and 48.2 percent of its field goal tries. CMU attempted just 10 free throws, making seven.

The Chippewas made 15 3-pointers – just two shy of the program record -- and finished 39.5 percent from beyond the arc.

MSU held a decided 40-14 advantage in points in the paint and its bench outscored CMU's, 23-5.

LAST TIME OUT

Central Michigan made a fourth-quarter charge before falling, 84-71, to Indiana State at the Sycamores' Hulman Center.

Freshman guard Bridget Utberg tallied a career-high 21 points to lead the Chippewas. She hit seven 3-pointers on 14 attempts.

Jahari Smith finished with 16 points on 6-of-8 shooting, while Sydney Harris added 14 points, nine of which came from beyond the arc.

CMU committed 23 turnovers to the Sycamores' nine and finished with a season-best 46.4 field goal percentage.

Indiana State used a 13-2 run to take a 46-36 halftime lead and then outscored the Chippewas, 22-12, in the third quarter. The Sycamores led, 68-48, entering the fourth.

Utberg hit four triples in the fourth quarter as the Chippewas navigated their way through a game-high 28-point deficit down to the final 13-point margin.

Anna McKendree and Natalia Lalic scored 23 and 22 points, respectively, to lead the Sycamores, who made 10 of their 21 3-point attempts.

The Chippewas return five letterwinners. All five made at least two starts in 2021-22. The returnees and their respective number of starts (CMU played 29 games in 2021-22): Jahari Smith, 27; Lisa Tesson, 26; Anika Weekes, 25; Tiana Timpe, 15; Karrington Gordon, 2.

Jahari Smith

• Had 16 points and eight rebounds vs. Indiana State (11/16). Both totals are season highs.

- Was 6-for-8 from the floor and 4-of-5 from the free thrown line vs. Sycamores.
- Raised field goal percentage to teambest .636.
- Steady and solid program mainstay averaged 29.1 minutes per game in 2021-22
- Averaged a double-double with 12.5 points and a team-high 10.4 rebounds per game a year ago.
- Is the first Chippewa to average a double-double since Reyna Frost in 2018-19, when Frost was named the MAC Player of the Year.
- Ranked second in the MAC and 26th nationally in rebounds per game
- Led the MAC and ranked ninth nationally with a .590 field goal percentage
- Her .590 field goal percentage is the second best for a single season behind the .591 posted by Jody Beerman in 1985-86
- Has a program-best .577 career field goal percentage

HEAD COACH

FOURTH SEASON

The Central Michigan women's basketball program hasn't missed a beat since Heather Oesterle took the reins prior to the 2019-20 season.

In 2020-21, Oesterle's Chippewas won the Mid-American Conference Tournament to earn a fourth consecutive bid to the NCAA Tournament, finishing with an 18-9 record, an RPI of 23 and a ranking of 12th in the CollegeInsider.com Mid-Major Top 25 poll.

Led by First Team All-MAC guards Micaela Kelly and Molly Davis, the Chippewas knocked off regular-season champion and No. 1 seed Bowling Green, 77-72, in the tournament title game at Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse in Cleveland.

Kelly, who finished her brilliant CMU career in '20-21, was selected by the Connecticut Sun in the WNBA draft in April. Kelly is the second Chippewa – both of whom were coached by Oesterle – to be taken in the professional draft. CMU is the only MAC team to have more than one player selected in the 25-year history of the draft.

Oesterle, a longtime assistant in the program, was named the Chippewas' head coach in July, 2019, and proceeded to lead CMU in 2019-20 to a 23-7 finish, a fourth consecutive Mid-American Conference regular season championship, a fifth straight MAC West title, the No. 1 seed in the MAC Tournament, an NCAA Tournament berth, and a slew of individual postseason awards.

Oesterle served under longtime head coach Sue Guevara for nine years, the final seven of which were as the Chippewas' associate head coach. Oesterle helped to build CMU into the MAC's premier program and a mid-major power.

The Chippewas' 2020 NCAA Tournament berth was their fourth since 2013. In 2018, the Chippewas knocked off both LSU and Ohio State en route to the Sweet Sixteen and a program-record 30 victories.

Oesterle's '19-20 squad finished 10th in the CollegeInsider. com Mid-Major Top 25 poll and carried an RPI of 22, far and away the best among MAC teams and fourth best among all mid-majors.



The Chippewas put together a remarkable streak during which they won 22 of 23 games, including a 15-0 start in MAC play. They clinched the regular-season crown with three games remaining, and finished 16-2 in league play, extending their five-year mark in MAC regular-season games to an incredible 77-13.

Oesterle was named the MAC Coach of the Year and her players were amply rewarded on the individual front as well.

Kelly, then a junior, earned the MAC Player of the Year Award, was named to the All-MAC First Team and the league's all-defensive team; senior forward Gabrielle Bird picked up the Sixth Player of the Year Award; Davis was named to the all-conference second team and its all-freshman squad; and junior forward Kyra Bussell earned a spot on the all-league third team.

Oesterle and Kelly made it a three-peat with regard to their respective MAC individual awards. Guevara was named the MAC Coach of the Year in each of the previous two seasons, and Kelly followed Tinara Moore (2018) and Reyna Frost (2019) as the MAC Player of the Year. Both capped their brilliant careers at CMU by earning All-America honors, the first from the Chippewa women's program to be so honored.

Moore and Frost are among the recent Oesterle-coached former Chippewas to have made a professional career in the game, joining Presley Hudson, Cassie Breen and Crystal Bradford.

Bradford became the first CMU player and just the second in MAC history to be selected in the WNBA draft when she was taken by the Los Angeles Sparks with the seventh overall pick in the 2015 draft.

Frost graduated from CMU as the MAC's career rebounding leader, while Hudson is the top scorer and assist-maker in program history.

Oesterle is the 11th coach in program history; her first Chippewa squad did not miss a beat in the excitement and/ or statistical departments.

The Chippewas averaged 76.4 points per game to lead the MAC and rank 20th nationally all while playing a rugged scheduled that included the likes of Louisville, which finished sixth in the final AP poll, and traditionally strong mid-majors such as South Dakota State, Marist, Bethune-Cookman, Green Bay, Western Kentucky and Dayton.

The Oesterle-led Chippewas finished a combined 4-3 against those seven teams, five of which finished the 2019-20 season an RPI of 71 or better. Six of those seven teams won 20 games – the other won 19 – in '19-20 and they posted a combined 166-52 won-loss record (a .761 win percentage).

In Oesterle's 10 seasons with the program, the Chippewas have posted eight 20-win seasons and one 30-win season. CMU has made eight postseason appearances and is a combined 217-109 (131-43 in MAC regular-season games) during Oesterle's decade with the program. Over that span, the Chippewas hold a .752 win percentage in league play and have claimed a dozen pieces of conference-championship hardware – six divisional titles, four overall MAC crowns, and two MAC Tournament titles.

During Oesterle's tenure, the Chippewas have experienced a remarkable number of individual achievements, including:

• Back-to-back-to-back MAC Player of the Year Awards (Moore, '18; Frost, '19; Kelly, '20).

- Two MAC Freshman of the Year Awards (Niki DiGuilio, 2011; Hudson, 2016).
- Two MAC Tournament Most Valuable Player Award winners (Bradford, 2013; Frost, 2018).
- Five MAC Sixth Player of the Year Award winners (Taylor Johnson, 2011, 2014; Jalisa Olive, 2012; Jewel Cotton, 2016; Bird, 2020).
- Three MAC Defensive Player of the Year Award winners (Bradford, 2014; Moore, 2017, 2018).
- In Oesterle's 10 years with the program, five Chippewas have been named to the All-MAC First Team a combined nine times; six have earned All-MAC Second Team honors a combined six times; seven times has a Chippewa been selected to the All-MAC Third Team; Chippewa players have garnered All-MAC Honorable Mention seven times; nine times a Chippewa has made the MAC All-Freshman Team; and 11 times has a CMU player been named to the MAC All-Tournament team.

Before joining the Chippewas for the 2010-11 season, Oesterle served as an assistant at Northern Illinois from 2008-10, and at Miami (Ohio) from 2003-08.

She was a volunteer assistant coach at Stanford in 2002-03, helping the Cardinal to a 27-5 finish, Pac 10 regular-season and tournament titles, and an NCAA Tournament berth.

Oesterle played at Michigan during Guevara's tenure as the Wolverines' coach. She served as the Wolverines' team captain in 2001-02 and was honored with the program's Leadership Award following her senior season. She helped the Wolverines to a four-year record of 76-45 (.628) that included two NCAA Tournament and two WNIT appearances.

Oesterle, a native of Mason, earned her bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Michigan in 2002 and her master's in sports studies from Miami in 2008. She was a Detroit Free Press Class A All-State selection as a senior at Mason High School, where she was the program's career scoring leader with 1,451 points.





Michele Savage **ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH**

Michele Savage joined the Central Michigan women's basketball coaching staff as the associate head coach in May, 2021

Savage most recently served as an associate head coach for two seasons at Memphis and was the head coach at Davidson from 2010-17. Prior to her tenure at Davidson, Savage served for nine years as an assistant at Tulane along with stints at Cornell, Toledo and Chicago State.

An Illinois native, Savage was a three-time All-Big Ten selection at Northwestern, from which she graduated in 1993. She led the Wildcats in scoring for three seasons, was twice the team's top rebounder, and in 1991 earned All-America honors from Street & Smith's. She helped lead the Wildcats to two NCAA Tournament berths and the Big Ten championship in 1990 and is a member of both the Northwestern and Illinois halls of fame.



Courtney Shelton **ASSISTANT COACH** SIXTH SEASON

Courtney Shelton rejoined the Central Michigan women's basketball staff as an assistant prior to the 2017-18 season as CMU has continued to solidify its reputation as the Mid-American Conference's premier program and one of the very best mid-majors in the nation.

In 2020-21, The Chippewas won the Mid-American Conference Tournament to earn a fourth consecutive bid to the NCAA Tournament, finishing with an 18-9 record, an RPI of 23, and a ranking of 12 in the CollegeInsider.com Mid-Major Top 25 poll.

Led by First Team All-MAC guards Micaela Kelly and Molly Davis, the Chippewas knocked off regularseason champion and No. 1 seed Bowling Green, 77-72, in the tournament title game at Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse in Cleveland.

The 2019-20 Chippewas finished 23-7, won a fourthconsecutive MAC regular-season championship, a fifth-straight MAC West title, claimed the No. 1 seed in the MAC Tournament, an NCAA Tournament berth, and a slew of individual postseason awards under first-year coach Heather Oesterle, a longtime assistant who took over the program prior to the '19-20 season.

Shelton served as CMU's video coordinator from 2013-15, helping the Chippewas to a MAC West title and a WNIT berth. In each of her three seasons since her return to the program, the Chippewas have won MAC West and overall league regular-season championships. Twice CMU has played in the NCAA Tournament during that time, highlighted by a run to the Sweet Sixteen in 2018.

Shelton, a native of Roscoe, Ill., earned her bachelor's degree in communications from NIU in 2012, and later completed her master's degree at CMU.

Presley Hudson, one of the all-time greats in Central Michigan women's basketball history, returned to the program in May, 2021.

Hudson, the Chippewas' all-time leading scorer and the leader of some of the best teams in program history, joined coach Heather Oesterle's staff as the director of player personnel and was promoted to an assistant coaching position in July, 2021.

Hudson was a four-time All-Mid-American Conference selection who scored a CMU-record 2,309 career points. A point guard, she led the Chippewas to four consecutive MAC regular season titles from 2016-20 and the MAC Tournament title in 2018.

Hudson and the Chippewas advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2018. She played one year professionally in Europe and spent the 2020-21 season as an assistant at Western Michigan.

Hudson earned a bachelor of science degree with a major in physical activity specialist from CMU in 2019.



Micaela Kelly DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT FIRST SEASON

Micaela "Twin" Kelly returned to Central Michigan women's basketball family in August, 2022. One of the very best players in program history, Kelly serves under head coach Heather Oesterle as the director of player development.

Kelly was a three-time All-MAC selection as a player at CMU. She was drafted by the Connecticut Sun in the second round (pick 21) of the 2021 WNBA Draft and played professionally in both Turkey and Iceland. She earned a bachelor's degree in community development from CMU.

As the director of player development, Kelly works with the team's guards, assists with on-campus recruiting, and collaborates with the program's director of operations.

During the 2020-21 season, as a CMU student manager, he assisted the coaching staff with equipment and during workouts, handled film exchange and other video responsibilities, helped coordinate travel and oversaw the managers and practice players. McCullen also served as a student manager for the 2019-20 season, assisting the coaching staff in practice and working closely with the director of operations.
