

A MESSAGE FROM ZYZELEWSKI FAMILY AVP/ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AMY FOLAN

In the three years that I have had the privilege to serve as the Zyzelewski Family Associate Vice President/Director of Athletics, we have continually strived to provide the best experience possible for our outstanding student-athletes along with our loyal supporters and fans.

Our focus remains on the development of our CMU studentathletes while setting the standard for excellence in the Mid-American Conference and providing an exceptional fan experience.

Once again, we have plenty in which to take pride as we look back on the 2022-23 school year, including a combined six MAC individual and team championships, plenty of historic accomplishments, and, as is always the case, an abundance of academic achievement.

Collectively, our student-athletes achieved a 3.34 cumulative average at the end of the 2023 spring semester. This was the 49th consecutive semester CMU student-athletes recorded a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better!

In May, 55 of our student-athletes representing 15 of our 16 varsity teams, received a diploma. Four of those graduates earned a master's degree and 51 earned a bachelor's. They represented 30 majors/fields of study across six academic colleges.

We celebrate our gymnastics and lacrosse programs, each of which claimed a repeat MAC title, the gymnastics team at the MAC Championships and the lacrosse squad at the league tournament. In addition, the Chippewa wrestlers captured the MAC West crown.

Individually, several of our student-athletes and coaches earned noteworthy honors in 2022-23:

· Gymnast Hannah DeMers was named the MAC Senior Gymnast of the Year.

- Luciana Alvarado-Reid earned the MAC Freshman of the Year Award for gymnastics.
- Tom Borrelli added to his legacy as one of the nation's mostrespected names in wrestling in earning his 14th MAC Coach of the Year Award.
- Wrestlers Johnny Lovett and Alex Cramer captured MAC titles in their respective weight classes.
- Standout running back Lew Nichols III was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the NFL Draft, and three other Chippewas including Joel Wilson, Thomas Incoom, and Carlos Carriere signed free agent contracts with NFL teams.
- A combined eight CMU teams and individual student-athletes advanced to partake in NCAA Tournament/Championships during the 2022-23 season.



I look forward to connecting with you in the year ahead.



MEN'S BASKETBALL

Among the highlights in 2022-23 for coach Tony Barbee's CMU men's basketball team was a 63-61 upset at Michigan on Dec. 29, when the Chippewas knocked down a 3-pointer with just over 11 seconds remaining to go ahead for good at Crisler Center in Ann Arbor. It was CMU's first win in the Wolverines' home since 2007. A month later, the Chippewas would follow with a 70-69 come-from-behind win over Western Michigan in front of a standing-room-only crowd at McGuirk Arena on Toilet Paper Toss Night, a revival from the early 1980s. The Chippewas trailed for 39 of the game's 40 minutes and outscored the Broncos, 15-3, over the final 4 minutes in securing the victory in front of the largest crowd in McGuirk Arena history. Among those in attendance was Chippewa legend Dan Majerle, who played at CMU when the Toilet Paper Toss became a tradition in the 1980s before going on to a sensational 14-year NBA career.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

One-time CMU assistant Kristin Haynie has taken over the Chippewa women's basketball program, bringing a fresh approach and a winning track record to the program in which she served as an assistant under legendary coach Sue Guevara from 2014-17. Haynie came to CMU from Michigan State, where she served as an assistant to longtime coach Suzy Merchant. As a standout player, Haynie led Michigan State to the 2005 NCAA Championship

game and then helped the Sacramento Monarchs to a WNBA championship. She also played professionally with the Atlanta Dream and Detroit Shock, and played in Italy, Lithuania, Russia and Greece.


WRESTLING

The Chippewa wrestling program put together one of its most successful seasons in recent memory, winning the Mid-American Conference West Division title and finishing second in the MAC Championships, just 2 ½ points out of first place. Two Chippewas, Johnny Lovett (149 pounds) and Alex Cramer (174), won MAC titles and they, along with teammate Corbyn Munson (157), qualified for the NCAA Championships. Tom Borrelli, CMU's legendary coach, completed his 32nd season in charge of the storied program and, for the 14th time, earned the MAC Coach of the Year Award.

GYMNASTICS

The storied Chippewa gymnastics program turned in another outstanding campaign, repeating its title at the Mid-American Conference Championships. Hannah DeMers won the all-around, the uneven parallel bars, and floor exercise in leading CMU to the crown, and in the process was named the MAC Senior Gymnast of the Year while the Chippewas' Luciana Alvarado-Reid earned the MAC Freshman of the Year Award after finishing third on vault and



BASEBALL

The CMU baseball team wrapped up another successful season, finishing 34-23 and in second place at 19-11 in the Mid-American Conference. The 34 wins brought Central Michigan's record over the last five years to 179-80 since 2019 with the nation's sixth-highest winning percentage during that time (.691). Five Chippewas, all of whom are expected to return in 2024, earned All-MAC honors, including left-handed pitcher Adam Mrakitsch and second baseman Luke Sefcik, both of whom were named to the first team.

WOMEN'S GOLF

The Chippewa women's golf team turned in its best season in history with a program-best third place finish in the 10-team Mid-American Conference Championship under first-year coach Ryan Williams. Individually, Ashley Goh shot a final-round 68 to finish fourth in the tournament. Her 68 tied the program record and her fourth-place finish – one of two top 10s for CMU in the MAC – was the best ever by a Chippewa in the league championship. The Chippewas set two program MAC Championship records, the first a final-round 295 and the second a 912 54-hole total. The 912 shattered by 46 shots the previous CMU best in the MAC Championship. Casilda Allendesalazar, who placed sixth in the MAC Championship, earned first team all-conference honors, becoming CMU's first such honoree.

LACROSSE

The CMU lacrosse team turned in another outstanding season, winning the Mid-American Conference Tournament and earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season. Under first-year coach Emilia Ward, the third-seeded Chippewas knocked off No. 2-seed Kent State, 18-7, and then top-seed Robert Morris, 15-12, on the Colonials' home field to win the tournament and the right to represent CMU in the NCAA Tournament. Sophomore goalkeeper Alexa Martel made a combined 22 saves in the two tournament games to earn the MAC Tournament Most Valuable Player Award. Four Chippewas -- Audrey Whiteside, Kelly Hoyt, Maggie Diebold, and Hallie Moore -- earned First Team All-MAC honors.

SOFTBALL

The Chippewa softball program finished in third place in the Mid-American

MENS GOLF RETURNS AS CENTRAL MICHIGAN SPORT

The CMU men's golf program made its return after a 37-year hiatus a successful one with a sixth-place finish in the nine-team Mid-American Conference Championship in May under coach Kevin Jennings. The Chippewas' Jeffrey Andrus, one of eight freshmen on the nine-player roster, went into the final day of the MAC tournament with a share of the lead and finished tied for 10th, a remarkable accomplishment for a first-year player in the nascent program.

"We're seeing glimpses of the future from everyone and looking forward to further tapping into that as we continue what we're doing," Jennings said. "The indicators of individual, as well as team, progress throughout the year are duly noted by myself and by members within the program and we look forward to moving forward with what we have and the foundation that we've laid."







Conference to earn a berth in the four-team league tournament under fourth-year coach McCall Salmon in 2023. Senior outfielder Kelsey Alexander, who led CMU with nine home runs and shared the team lead with 33 RBI, earned Second Team All-Region honors from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association. The Chippewas put together an 11-game MAC win streak en route to an 18-11 finish in league games. Junior pitcher Grace Lehto, who earned First Team All-MAC honors, fired a no-hitter on April 26 at Margo Jonker Stadium; it was the Chippewas' first no-no since 2009.

FIELD HOCKEY

Jennifer Johnstone made her debut as the CMU field hockey coach a successful one when she led the Chippewas to a 2-0 victory over Saint Louis

in the season opener. Led by senior Alice O'Hagan, the Chippewas made vast strides as a program under Johnstone, scoring 26 goals on the season. It was their highest goal total in more than 20 years and the third-highest number in the eight-team MAC. In addition, goalkeepers Maja Halasz, Katie Maxim and Coletta Beeler combined to make a league-high 180 saves.

VOLLEYBALL

The CMU volleyball team in 2022 posted a 20-12 finish, earned a berth in the National Invitational Volleyball Tournament, made its first Mid-American Conference Tournament appearance in four years, and posted its first victory in a MAC Tourney match since 2011 under seventh-year coach Mike Gawlik. The Chippewas finished 12-6 in MAC play, a high-water mark for wins for the program under Gawlik. Chippewas Mallory Hernandez and

Claire Ammeraal earned First Team All-MAC honors.

CROSS COUNTRY/TRACK & FIELD


In track & field, CMU's Emily Paupore (steeplechase), Anya Turner (steeplechase) and Hayley Manners (long jump) qualified for the NCAA East Regional during the outdoor season. Paupore placed second and Turner was third in the steeplechase in the MAC Outdoor Championships, while Manners placed third in the long jump. Chippewa student-athletes posted a pair of top-three finishes at the MAC Indoor Championships, a second in the 4x400-meter relay and a third by Mohogany Wells in the shotput. The Chippewas combined to produce 18 times/distances/heights during the 2022-23 indoor and outdoor seasons that rank among the top 10 in program history. CMU's Adam Rzentkowski provided a big-time highlight in

the fall when the senior placed 12th in the Mid-American Conference Cross Country Championships, marking the third time in his standout career that he earned All-MAC honors.

SOCCER

The Central Michigan soccer team registered its most impressive victory of the year, 1-0, against rival Western Michigan. Coach Jeremy Groves enters his fifth season at the helm and welcomes 20 newcomers to the program.

FOOTBALL

The Central Michigan football team saw the emergence of budding stars such as Deiyantei Powell-Woods, Donte Kent, Justin Whiteside and Kyle Moretti during the 2022 season, Jim McElwain's fourth at the helm of the program. While the aforementioned quartet continues to provide tremendous leadership, the Chippewas last fall saw two young quarterbacks Bert Emanuel Jr. and Jase Bauer both flash outstanding

potential during the season. Standout running back Lew Nichols III was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the NFL Draft, and three other Chippewas who completed their eligibility in 2022 - tight end Joel Wilson, wide receiver Carlos Carriere and defensive lineman and All-American Thomas Incoom – signed as free agents with the Buffalo Bills, the New York Giants and the Denver Broncos, respectively. Incoom, along with defensive back Donte Kent, who returns in 2023, earned First Team All-MAC honors. McElwain's 2023 class of recruits was ranked No. 1 in the MAC by 247sports.







CMU ATHLETICS CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF TITLE IX

Central Michigan Athletics celebrated the 50th anniversary of Title IX this year as six legendary CMU former coaches and administrators served as Grand Marshals at Homecoming: Cristy Freese (field hockey), Sue Guevara (women's basketball), Margo Jonker (softball), Marcy Weston (volleyball), and posthumous honorees Mary Bottaro and Fran Koenig.

In addition, the athletic department hosted a recorded panel discussion about the legacy of Title IX, on women's athletics at CMU and beyond. Freese, Guevara, Jonker, and Weston, along with CMU Deputy Athletic Director for Administration and Senior Woman Administrator Tangela Cheatam, all participated.

"Title IX has changed so many lives over the past 50 years, including mine. Without this law, I wouldn't have had the opportunities I had to play as a student-athlete and now to be in a leadership role in athletics," said Amy Folan, Zyzelewski Family Associate Vice President and director of athletics. "At CMU, we are committed to advancing this so that even more lives will be positively impacted in the future."

Additionally, CMU Athletics celebrated the national milestone with a social media campaign, several on-field recognitions, and various special events.

ROY KRAMER TO BE INDUCTED INTO NFF HALL OF FAME

Former Central Michigan Head Football Coach Roy Kramer is one of 22 players and coaches selected to be inducted into the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame, the NFF announced during a live broadcast live on ESPN. Kramer will be inducted during the 65th annual NFF Awards Dinner set to take place at the ARIA Resort & Casino in Las Vegas, Nevada on December 5, 2023.

Kramer will join Herb Deromedi as the two Central Michigan coaches who have been inducted into the NFF College Football Hall of Fame. Deromedi was honored with the 2007 Hall of Fame Class. On Sept. 17, 2022, prior to its football game against Bucknell, Central Michigan recognized the close connection between the two coaches and their outstanding contributions to the Chippewa program by officially naming its football venue as the Kramer/Deromedi Field at Kelly/Shorts Stadium. Statues of both men stand proudly outside the Chippewa Champions Center, located at the north end of Kelly/Shorts Stadium, and both are members of the Central Michigan University Marcy Weston Athletics Hall of Fame.

During his 11 seasons heading the Central Michigan program (1967-77), Kramer won an impressive 71.8 percent of his games, including a 12-1 record in 1974, when the Chippewas won the Division II National Championship and Kramer was named NCAA National Coach of the Year. Kramer compiled an 83-32-2 record at CMU and led

the Chippewas to back-to-back Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships in 1967-68.

JAKE SABOL HIRED AS NEW HEAD BASEBALL COACH

Former Central Michigan player and graduate Jake Sabol has been named the new baseball coach at CMU, Zyzelewski Family Associate Vice President/ Director of Athletics Amy Folan announced on June 27. Sabol, a 2011 Central Michigan graduate, becomes the 22nd coach in the 117-year history of the Chippewa baseball program.

"Jake has proven success over eight years as a head coach," Folan said. "As a player and coach, he has consistently figured out how to beat all odds. We are excited to welcome the Sabol family back to Central Michigan and excited for Jake to continue to build upon this great baseball legacy and tradition at CMU."

Sabol rejoins the Central Michigan program after serving as the head coach at Northwood University for the past five years (2018-23). In four full seasons, Sabol guided the Timberwolves to a 140-90-1 record, 77-35 conference mark, four NCAA Division II Regional appearances, including three straight from 2021-23, and two Great Midwest Athletic Conference titles (2023 regular season and 2023 tournament).

ROBI STUART, HANNAH DEMERS: MEDAL OF EXCELLENCE WINNERS

Central Michigan student-athletes Hannah DeMers and Robi Stuart have been named the Mid-American Conference Medal of Excellence Award winners, the league announced. DeMers is a member of the CMU Gymnastics team, while Stuart plays on the Chippewa Football team.

The Medal of Excellence is presented to two standout student-athletes, one male and one female student-athlete, at each of the MAC's 12 full-time member schools. The selected student-athletes are required to achieve a minimum 3.50 grade point average and have exhibited athletics excellence, leadership, and service. Both honorees attended the MAC Honors Dinner which took place on June 1 at the Metropolitan Hotel in Cleveland, Ohio.

MADDY BOYD IS GOTEACH GRAND PRIZE AWARD WINNER

Central Michigan senior Maddy Boyd has been named the grand prize winner of the GO TEACH Dr Pepper Giveaway scholarship. The College Football Playoff Foundation and Go Teach Dr Pepper have awarded over 100 student-athletes aspiring to pursue a career in teaching and education. Each MAC institution selected one individual to earn \$2,500 with the grand prize winner earning another \$10,000.

Boyd is a member of the CMU cross country and track & field program. She is a psychology major, focusing on mental health and holds a 3.92 GPA. Boyd spent this past summer working with the Boys & Girls Club to to improve her skills for her future job as a social worker. She has also started an organization called the Sunset Project, which helps youth that are in need of mental health resources.

CFPF and Dr Pepper are dedicated to growing the Go Teach initiative to place qualified teachers in classrooms across the nation. Over the next five years the CFPF and Dr Pepper are awarding a collective \$1.5 million in awards to provide support and recognition for student-athletes majoring in education.





The night had it all. The historical pregame Toilet Paper Toss. A matchup with rival Western Michigan. CMU legend Dan Majerle in attendance. A raucous, energetic standing-room-only crowd. A dramatic game-winning shot in the closing seconds. A Central Michigan comeback victory. Chippewas fans rushing the floor in wild celebration. Memorable moments and events like these are what makes Central Michigan great.

Before the largest crowd in McGuirk Arena history, Central Michigan rallied from an 11-point deficit with four minutes to play and senior Brian Taylor drained the game-winning 3-pointer with 6.6 seconds to go as the Chippewas claimed a dramatic 70-69 men's basketball victory over rival Western Michigan.

It was an oh-so-fitting end to a dramatic, memorable, and historic night for Chippewa Athletics.

The event was organized in observance of the 40th anniversary of the first Toilet Paper Toss game. Fans were encouraged to wear white shirts and everyone participated in the previously well-known CMU tradition of throwing toilet paper rolls from the stands onto the playing floor. The toilet paper was provided to fans upon entrance to McGuirk Arena. White pompoms were distributed to the first 2,500 fans in the arena, and the first 250 students received a free Snake Pit t-shirt, an homage to an era

of CMU basketball when then-Rose Arena was colloquially known as the Snake Pit.

Majerle, a 14-year NBA veteran who is a member of the CMU Athletics and Mid-American Conference halls of fame, signed autographs pre-game and Qdoba provided a halftime meal to students in attendance. So popular was the entire night that some 500 people were turned away at the door.

Toilet Paper Toss was a moment to remember. After the Chippewas were introduced, university President Bob Davies sent a bounce pass to Dan Majerle, who then threw a bounce-pass to his son, CMU player Max Majerle, who dribbled once, elevated and threw down a dunk. At that moment, thousands of toilet paper rolls rained down on the McGuirk Arena floor. "Thank you to all our alumni, students, faculty, staff and community members who attended this memorable event," said Amy Folan, Zyzelewski Family Associate vice president and director of athletics. "We made history while celebrating history, and once again proved that CMU — hands down — has the best fans in the Mid-American Conference, and beyond."

The contest matched the intensity of the pregame festivities. The Chippewas trailed for 39 of the game's 40 minutes. Behind by two points, 69-67 after Western Michigan converted the first of two free throws, sophomore Nico Pavrette rebounded the missed free throw. Pavrette set a screen on

Taylor's defender, junior Jesse Zarzuela found Taylor in the corner, and Taylor spotted up and swished the game-winning 3-pointer with 6.6 seconds remaining.

Central Michigan outscored Western Michigan 15-3 over the game's final 4:07. The crowd of 5,425 surpassed the previous top McGuirk Arena crowds of 5,412 vs. Western Michigan on Feb. 3, 2017, and vs. Ball State on Feb. 18, 2017.

Second-year Chippewa coach Tony Barbee thanked the crowd for creating a decisive homecourt advantage.

"Today's game showed the homecourt advantage that this arena can give you," he said. "When the fans, students, alums, having some of our great former players back, Max's dad Dan being there, when all those groups are engaged, the crowd has just as big of an impact as Brian Taylor's shot. The crowd gave us a 15-point advantage today."

"We're going to keep doing our job to engage the students," Barbee said. "The students have to know that they set the atmosphere, the students, the fraternities, the faculty, they are a part of this team. They are part of this program, and they are just as important as my starting point guard and starting center. Just as I expect those players to show up every game,

It is Central Michigan Athletics' primary goal to develop young men and women who exemplify the definition of a student-athlete in its truest form. The department's mission also includes providing an authentic environment in which student-athletes can thrive both academically and athletically.

Over the 2022-23 academic year, continued success in both areas was undoubtedly achieved as studentathletes demonstrated dedication and determination to their academic pursuits.

Consider the following numbers:

- The 2022-23 academic year marked the 48th and 49th consecutive semesters in which CMU studentathletes collectively achieved a grade point average of 3.0 or higher.
- At the end of the spring 2023 semester, 327 student-athletes achieved cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher, 206 student-athletes achieved a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher, and 12 had

a 4.0 GPA.

- At the conclusion of the spring 2023 semester, the CMU women's cross country squad compiled the highest team cumulative GPA of 3.70.
- This past spring, field hockey posted the highest semester team GPA with a 3.69.
- Thirteen of Central Michigan's 16 teams posted a team cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher.
- The CMU football team registered the highest team grade point average increase from the 2022 fall semester to the 2023 spring semester (+0.36).
- Seventy-five student-athletes graduated from Central Michigan University combining December 2022 and May 2023. Of the 75 December and May graduates, 62 notched cumulative GPAs of 3.0 or higher, 48 earned a 3.5 or higher, and one earned a 4.0 GPA.


Women's Cross Country maintained a department teambest 3.70 cumulative GPA.

Over the past year, Central Michigan Athletics has introduced several new initiatives in a variety of areas.

OPENDORSE

This fall, Central Michigan Athletics partnered with Opendorse, creating an all-in-one Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL) platform for the department with one of the industry's leaders in the NIL space.

Through an online hub and mobile app, Opendorse provides the technology and services to cover student-athletes and staff with compliance, content, and educational tools that will be used in developing NIL landscape.

"We are pleased to partner with Opendorse," Director of Athletics Amy Folan said. "The all-in-one platform aligns with our mission of preparing student-athletes for life after sports and will assist each student-athlete in optimizing their name, image, and likeness. Our coaches and staff fully support this initiative to enhance the Central Michigan student-athlete experience."

Student-athletes receive on-demand access to photos, videos, and content suggestions from their teams and the department, helping the student-athletes engage with fellow students and fans. Opendorse also provides education sessions both in-person and virtually with industry leaders at companies including Meta, Overtime, The Players' Tribune, Opendorse, and more. The partnership also ensures student-athlete eligibility by enabling student-athletes to disclose any NIL deals with the CMU compliance office.



H3H helps colleges and universities save lives, eliminate stigma, and scale mental wellness programs for student-athletes. H3H does this by sharing Tyler's story, connecting students with mental health resources, and assisting universities to institutionalize best practices.

Hilinski's Hope Foundation is a non-profit organization formed to promote awareness and education of mental health and wellness for student athletes. The Foundation's mission is to educate, advocate, and eliminate the stigma associated with mental illness, while funding programs that provide student-athletes with the tools and resources that support their mental health and wellness.

SOCIAL MEDIA GROWTH

PLAYING SURFACE AT KELLY/SHORTS STADIUM NAMED KRAMER/DEROMEDI FIELD

In a pregame ceremony on Sept. 10, 2022, Central Michigan University honored two of the giants of its storied football history by naming the field at Kelly/Shorts Stadium in their honor. The playing surface at the stadium is now named Kramer/Deromedi Field, in recognition of legendary coaches Roy Kramer and Herb Deromedi.

"We are proud to honor the rich tradition and football history at CMU by dedicating our field to coach Roy Kramer and coach Herb Deromedi," said Amy Folan, Zyzelewski Family associate vice president and director of athletics. "The indelible imprint of these two legendary CMU leaders has benefited so many throughout the years and will continue to benefit future generations. It is befitting that this prominent space they helped build will carry their names."

Kramer, with Deromedi as his defensive coordinator, led the Chippewas to the NCAA Division II national championship in 1974. Statues of both men stand proudly outside the Chippewa Champions Center, located at the north end of Kelly/Shorts Stadium, and both are members of the Central Michigan University Marcy Weston Athletics Hall of Fame. Kramer will join Deromedi as the two CMU Football representatives in the NFF Hall of Fame as he will be inducted in December.

Kramer guided the Chippewas to an 83-32-2 record in his 11 seasons as coach and in 1974 he earned the NCAA Division II National Coach of the Year Award. Kramer went on to serve as the athletic director at Vanderbilt and later became the commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

"I am honored and very humbled by this recognition of my days at Central Michigan University," Kramer said. "I am particularly honored to share this recognition with Herb Deromedi. However, this

is really a celebration and recognition of the hundreds of young men who represented the pride and tradition of the maroon and gold of the Chippewas."

Deromedi joined Kramer's coaching staff as an assistant in 1967 and then succeeded his longtime mentor as the head coach in 1978.

He posted a remarkable 110-55-10 record over 16 seasons, leading the Chippewas to Mid-American Conference titles in 1979, '80 and '90. He was twice named MAC Coach of the Year and was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2008. After hanging up his whistle, Deromedi served with distinction for 13 years as CMU's director of athletics and was a member of the College Football Playoff Committee from 2016-18.

"It is a tremendous honor, and very humbling, to be recognized alongside my mentor back then, and still now, Roy Kramer," Deromedi said. "I am so grateful for my time at Central Michigan and all of the men I was able coach and all of the people that have been so impactful in my life."

The naming of the field in honor of Kramer and Deromedi was the result of a \$1 million fundraising effort supported by numerous CMU football alumni and friends of Kramer and Deromedi.

SOFTBALL TURF DEDICATION

On April 15, before a softball doubleheader with Western Michigan, Central Michigan hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony to honor and celebrate the donors who made the installation of new FieldTurf possible at Margo Jonker Stadium.

VOLLEYBALL LOCKER ROOM UNVEILING


