Second Year At Cornell
Cornell '91

Head Women's Hockey Coach

Doug Derraugh, a 1991 graduate of Cornell, assumed the helm of the Big Red women's hockey program prior

to the 2005-06 season. Now in his second season, Derraugh looks to get Cornell back into the elite of the ECACHL.

Bringing a new energy to the team, Derraugh was instrumental in the team's turnaround last season. The squad tripled its win total from the previous season and scored 12 more goals, allowed 18 fewer, and recorded 34 more points than during the 2004-05 campaign.

Derraugh played in all 119 contests for the Big Red in his four seasons, helping lead Cornell to an NCAA tournament appearance and a second-place finish in the ECAC as a senior co-captain. He led the team in scoring in his final season with 30 goals and 36 assists en route to earning second-team All-Ivy and honorable mention All-ECAC honors. The winner of the team's Nicky Bawlf team MVP and the Ironman Award for determination to overcome injuries, Derraugh's 30 goals are the most ever scored by a senior at Cornell. Overall, he ranks 10th in career scoring for the Big Red with 153 points (66 goals, 87 assists).

After graduation, the former Big Red star spent 13 years playing professionally overseas, seeing action with nine different teams and played in some of the top leagues in Norway, Germany, Austria and Finland. He scored more than 100 points in a season twice and posted 30 or more points 10 times. Derraugh ended his career with 257 goals and 347 assists in 637 professional contests. In his final professional season, Derraugh served as special teams coach for his team.

The native of Arnprior, Ont., graduated from Cornell in 1991 with a degree in biological sciences. He and his wife, Louise, have three children.

Danielle Bilodeau '01, a former Cornell women's hockey captain, will return to Lynah Rink this season, joining head coach Doug Derraugh '91 on the Big Red coaching staff as assistant coach. Bilodeau spent the past four seasons working in a similar position at Ivy League rival Princeton.

While at Princeton, Bilodeau was responsible for assisting with all aspects of the program, from recruiting and scouting to skill development and travel. The Tigers claimed the 2005-06 Ivy League title and helped the program to its first-ever NCAA tournament appearance. The team won a school-record 21 games. She assisted in the development of Andrea Kilbourne '03, a member of the U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team that won a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. Nikola Holmes '03 also represented Germany in the 2006 games in Torino, Italy. In her four seasons on the sidelines, Princeton won at least 20 games three times and posted a 77-37-9 record.

An experienced camp clinician, Bilodeau was a head coach at the Princeton camp for three summers, as well as Bowdoin College's clinic in 2004 and 2005. She was also a coach for the Pacific Steelers Showcase in 2005.

Bilodeau played four seasons for the Big Red, earning All-Ivy honors as a sophomore, and serving as team co-captain her senior year. The winner of Cornell's Jeff Stenstrom Memorial Award as a freshman, she was a nominee for the Hockey Humanitarian Award. The Academic All-Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) pick, Bilodeau was a member of the Red Key Athletic Honorary Society and the Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC). After graduating in 2001 with a degree in communication, she played one season for the Beatrice Aeros of the NWHL, helping her team to a league and Ontario Provincial championships, while reaching the finals of the Canadian national tournament.

Kim Insalaco, a 2006 Olympian, joins the Big Red coaching staff this year. As a forward, she is a veteran of two World Championships, and made her Olympic debut in Torino, Italy in 2006 with Team

USA, winning a bronze medal.

As an undergrad, Insalaco played for Brown, where upon completing her four-year career in 2003, she totaled 127 points with 45 goals and 82 assists. She was a two-time captain for the Bears, and as a junior, she scored the game-winning goal in the ECACHL's championship game and the winner in the national semifinal game against Minnesota. She led Brown to two ECAC championships and competed in two NCAA Frozen Fours.

After graduating from Brown, the Rochester, N.Y. native played two seasons for the Oakville Ice of the National Women's Hockey League in Canada.

Dale Grossman, one of the women's ice hockey team faculty advisers, is a senior lecturer in the department of applied economics and management and the Department of Communication, along with

lecturer responsibilities in the Johnson Graduate School of Management.

After receiving her bachelor's degree from Cornell University in 1972 and a J.D. degree from Washington College of Law in 1976, Grossman was admitted to practice law in 1977. She joined the Cornell faculty in 1980 after serving three years as the University Judicial Administrator, where she was responsible for the implementation and operation of the campus judicial system. Now with over two decades of faculty experience at Cornell, Grossman teaches courses in communication law, internet law, business law and estate planning. Along with her classroom responsibilities, Grossman is currently the chair of the Academic Integrity Hearing Board for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

Grossman has been named Professor of Merit by the senior class for her excellence in teaching and has also been named a D.C. Burgett Distinguished Adviser. Along with serving the women's ice hockey team, Grossman is the team faculty adviser for men's ice hockey and men's lacrosse.

Ronald E. Ostman, one of the women's ice hockey team faculty advisers, is a professor and former chair of the department of communication in Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

He has taught and conducted research at the university since 1979.

Ostman received his bachelor's degree from Bemidji State and a master's and Ph.D. from Minnesota.

An author of several academic books and many scholarly journal articles, Ostman teaches about the content of mass media, the effects of mediated messages on individuals and groups and processes of public opinion and persuasion.

Ostman and his wife, Nancy, the Natural Areas Director of the Cornell Plantations, have two children. Five Cornell degrees (three bachelors, one Ph.D. and one M. Eng.) are held among the four members of his family.

THE CUB CLUB

More than a century after Ezra Cornell wrote to his granddaughter, Eunice, expressing his desire for girls to have the same opportunities as boys, the Cornell women's hockey team is teaching local hockey players how to be champions on and off the ice. Founded in 1995 by Dr. Megan Shull '91, the Cub Club, a joint venture between the Tompkins Girls' Hockey Association (TGHA) and the Cornell women's hockey team, has made a difference in the lives of hundreds of girls in Ithaca.

The Cub Club is a unique mentoring program that pairs TGHA girls, ages 7-12, with Cub Club big sisters from the Cornell women's hockey team. Cub Club privileges include being special guests at Big Red home contests and being stick girl for a day.

The cubs and their big sisters also have fun at Cub Club pizza parties, bowling bashes and on-ice skating events. More important, Cornell women's hockey makes a meaningful difference in the lives of girls in Tompkins County. By spending time with their cub sisters, Cornell players help to teach important lessons about winning and losing gracefully, falling down and getting up, setting, accomplishing and scoring goals, and the meaning of teamwork.

Research confirms that girls who participate in athletics are self-confident, have high self-esteem and work well with others. They do better in school and are more likely than their non-athletic peers to grow up to be leaders in their community.



Also, girls derive significant health benefits from physical exercise, lessening their risk of developing heart disease, breast cancer and osteoporosis later in life. By providing authentic heroes, Cornell women's hockey players are helping to make hockey the coolest sport in town for girls in Ithaca. And most significant, they are impacting the lives of young women for years to come.

The Cub Club has been recognized nationally for making a difference. In 1997, TGHA won the coveted NHL Assist Grant, and the Cub Club was featured in USA Hockey's *American Hockey Magazine* in the January 2000 issue.

In October 2001, the TGHA helped to bring the U.S. women's national team to Lynah Rink for an exhibition against an all-star squad from the ECAC-North. Former Big Red players Jenel Bode, Brooke Bestwick and Erinn Perushek were named to the ECAC team.

Dave Herrick is back for his third year coordinating the effort for the TGHA.

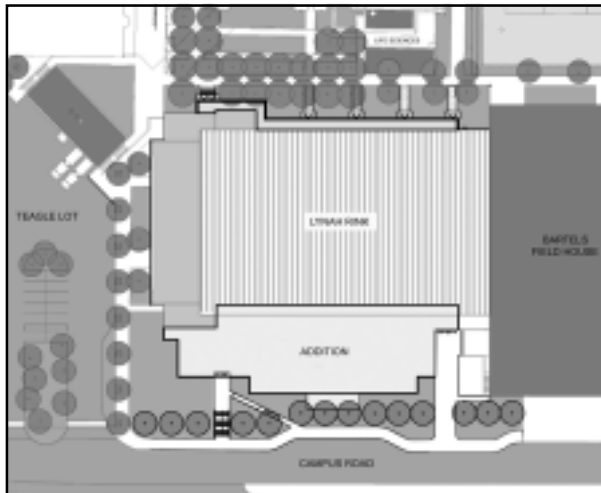
