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Heavyweight Freshman Coach:

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HILARY GEHMAN

Third Year as Head Coach • Colby '93 The Staley Head Coach of Women's Rowing

Hilary Gehman, a six-time member of the U.S. national rowing team and a two-time Olympian who served as the interim head coach of the Cornell women's crew in 2006-07, was named the Staley Head Coach of Women's Rowing in July 2007.

After taking over the program during the spring of 2007, Gehman's varsity boats showed steady improvement throughout her first two seasons in both times and results.

In 2008, the big Red finished in the top 10 at Eastern Sprints for the first time since 2004, placing ninth overall. Her junior varsity boat was even stronger, placing sixth overall and making the grand finals.

Gehman served as the Big Red women's novice rowing coach for two and a half seasons after being hired in 2004. In her two seasons with the Big Red, the novice women combined for an 11-6 record.

Gehman was the voice of the Olympic 4X in Athens, serving as crew leader in training sessions and during races. Her fifth-place finish at the 2004 Games mirrored her performance in the quad at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney.

A two-time Olympian, Gehman has also raced on four U.S. national teams in the women's quad, earning a bronze medal at the 2001 World Championships in Lucerne, Switzerland. A

competitor at numerous World Cup stops with the U.S. team, Gehman and her crewmates have captured four bronze medals at four international regattas since 1999, and her quad earned the gold medal at the 2003 Munich World Cup. In competitions at the national level, Gehman won the double sculls at the 2001 and 2002 Head of the Charles regattas and finished second in 2003.

Gehman earned coaching experience in the competitive EAWRC while serving as the assistant coach at Georgetown from 2000-03, and her first novice boat captured the Big East title in 2001. Prior to her time in the nation's capital, Gehman was the head men's and women's rowing coach at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Ore., from 1996-98, overseeing 60 student-athletes.

A native of Wolfeboro, N.H., Gehman graduated from Colby College in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in sociology. She was a four-year member of the Mules' club rowing team, as the sport was elevated to varsity status the season following her graduation.

Gehman is an exceptional all-around athlete whose national team career and active lifestyle make her a role model for Cornell's undergraduates. She still logs many miles in her single and on the ergometer, but she has diversified her training by competing in The Birkebeiner, a 51km cross country ski marathon held in Hayward, Wis., in February. In warm weather she enjoys swimming across Cayuga Lake, and she has successfully completed two half ironman triathlons (the Tupper Lake Tinman and the Musselman Half Iron).

Gehman was married this fall to former national team member and new heavyweight assistant coach Matt Smith.

DAN FRONHOFER

Second Year at Cornell • Cornell '04 Women's Assistant Coach

Second-year assistant coach Dan Fronhofer will continue to help build the Big Red women's rowing program after making great strides in his first season as the novice coach in 2007. For his efforts, Fronhofer was named the EAWRC Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007-08.

In his first year, Fronhofer directed the novice eight to the medal podium at the Eastern Sprints, finishing third in the grand final and posting a 6-2 overall record.

Fronhofer previously had worked as a volunteer assistant for the lightweight and heavyweight men's rowing teams in 2007. Fronhofer rowed for the Big Red heavyweight squad for four seasons.

In his three seasons on the Cornell varsity crew, Fronhofer was part of a fifth-place boat at Eastern Sprints in 2002 and earned the team's Ackerman Award for motivating and inspiring the crew as a senior in 2004. He was part of a club eight team that earned a gold medal at the 2006 Head of the Charles Regatta. Fronhofer also competed at the Pan-American Games trials in the pair and competed at the National Selection Regatta in a single.

Fronhofer most recently worked for BDP Industries, Inc., in Greenwich, N.Y. He has twice completed the Lake Placid Ironman Triathlon, qualifying for and competing in the prestigious Hawaii Ironman.

A 2004 graduate of Cornell, he earned his degree in biological and environmental engineering. Fronhofer and his wife, Melissa, reside in Ithaca.



CAITLIN MANCE

First Year at Cornell • Cornell '08 Intern Coach

Former Big Red captain Caitlin Mance '08 remains on East Hill and will serve as an intern coach for the 2008-09 season. She will lend her leadership skills to a team that showed great improvement a season ago.

A four-year competitor, Mance guided her novice eight to a silver medal at the 2005 Eastern Sprints and was part of the varsity eight boat that finished ninth in 2008, the team's highest finish in four years. The squad posted the seventh-best time of the finals, placing third in the petite race.

Mance started rowing as a sophomore at Oliver Ames HS in South Easton, Mass. Primarily a sculler, she rowed for the Narragansett Boat Club in Providence, R.I.

Mance graduated with a degree in Biological Sciences.



2008-09 Women's Rowing Outlook

The Big Red women's rowing team graduated seven outstanding seniors in May 2008 and their shoes will be filled by a strong, talented and ambitious group of athletes. A team that features nine seniors, seven juniors, the entire spring '08 freshman squad, and seven experienced freshmen will continue to get faster as the season moves along.

With two grand final appearances at the 2008 Eastern Sprints championships (bronze medal in the first novice eight, sixth place in the second varsity eight), and the best overall performance in several years, the team is moving in the right direction. There is still work to be done, races to win, personal bests to achieve. Under the leadership of senior captain Cathleen Balantic, the team will rise to these challenges.

The Big Red women's team will continue to work in small boats throughout the year, practicing and racing in pairs and fours to build on technical skills and boat feel. As always, the athletes look forward to their annual winter training trip to Orlando, Fla., in January and a return trip to Clemson, S.C., over spring break in March. These training trips are crucial for setting the tone for the spring racing season that starts the first weekend in April.

The Big Red women will continue looking for student-athletes who are eager to challenge themselves in the classroom and on the water. The coaching staff is dedicated to promoting academic excellence as well as winning races in 2008-09 and beyond.

TODD KENNETT '91

**1st Year as Heavyweight Head Coach • 17th Year Overall • Cornell '91
Spirit of '57 Director of Rowing/Heavyweight Rowing Head Coach**

After 10 seasons as the lightweight rowing coach, Todd Kennett was named the Spirit of '57 Director of Rowing/Heavyweight Rowing Coach in June of 2007. He will attempt to bring his alma mater to the top of the national rankings, much as he did in directing the lightweights to three consecutive national titles.

Under his direction, the Big Red lightweights won three consecutive IRA national titles (2006-08), two Eastern Sprints titles (2006, 2008) and four top-three finishes and earned four straight invitations to the renowned Henley Royal Regatta, including a pair of runner-up finishes. His varsity eight boat placed in the top six nationally in each of his last seven seasons.

The 2008 squad made history, becoming the first lightweight eight boat to capture three straight IRA titles and swept the Eastern Sprints and IRA races for the second time in three years. Cornell took home the Jope Cup, given to the school that wins the most lightweight points, at the Eastern Sprints for the first time since 1992. The Big Red also earned a fourth consecutive invite to compete at the Henley Royal Regatta, advancing to the quarterfinals.

Kennett's varsity eight boat in 2007 won its second-consecutive IRA national title and finished as the runner-up at Henley, reaching the final for the second-straight season in the Temple Challenge Cup. The varsity finished 6-1 overall, while the junior varsity missed winning Eastern Sprints by .1 seconds.

The 2006 varsity eight captured not only the Eastern Sprints title, but also pulled off an upset and claimed the first IRA national title for the Big Red since 1992. Then, after earning another trip to Henley, the lightweights had five very successful days of racing to advance to the finals where they managed an exciting second-place finish (the Big Red's best finish since 1967). The Eastern title was the eighth in the program's history and the national title was the second. Also enjoying a spectacular season was the junior varsity, who earned a 7-1 record and a first-place finish at the Eastern Sprints. He was named lightweight coach of the year, and the lightweights were named crew of the year.

Kennett's boats also had a remarkable season in 2005. Every varsity boat medalled at both the Easterns and at the IRAs, and the third varsity went undefeated and won the Eastern title. The first varsity boat compiled an 8-1 record and a third-place finish at the Easterns, breaking a course record in the process. And, at the IRAs, the varsity eight had an excellent second-place finish, and the Big Red also had a gold medal-winning pair and a bronze medal-winning four.

A native of Middlebury, Conn., Kennett has been a member of the Cornell rowing staff since 1993. He coached the Big Red's third and fourth varsity eights in 1993-94 and served as the coach of freshman rowing from the fall of 1994 through 1998. Under Kennett, the third varsity eight placed second at the Saturday Night Sprints that year and the four-with-coxswain finished third at the IRA championships. In 1995, he led his first freshman eight to a second-place finish at the Eastern Sprints. The Big Red's second freshman eight was undefeated during the 1996 and 1997 regular seasons. In 1998, the first freshman eight

placed third at the EARC grand finals, while the second freshman boat took second-place honors. He coached the lightweight pair to a gold medal at the 2000 IRAs and in 2001, the pair of Rob Garrison and Jon Zelken claimed a silver medal. Also in 2001, the junior varsity eight took bronze at the Sprints as did the lightweight straight four at the IRAs. In 2002, he led all five of his crews to grand finals races at the Eastern Sprints, including a bronze medal performance by the varsity eight. Several members of his team also enjoyed success at the IRAs, with the varsity eight earning fifth place and the freshman four taking bronze. And, in 2003, a Kennett-coached varsity pair captured a bronze medal at the IRAs.

In 1992-93, Kennett served as coach of the Ithaca College women's novice program, leading the squad to a 22-2 record, two New York State Small School titles and two Murphy Cups. His Bomber crews also earned silver and bronze medals at the Dad Vail Regatta.

A 1991 graduate of Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Kennett received his bachelor of science degree in animal sciences. As a rower with the heavyweights from 1987-91, he competed in the first freshman eight his first year and went on to row in the varsity eight for three consecutive seasons, including the 1991 campaign in which the varsity finished third at the IRA regatta and competed at the Henley Royal Regatta. He received the Butler Award for outstanding leadership and athletic performance as a senior.

From 1989-91, Kennett rowed in U.S. Rowing Olympic Development and Pre-Elite camps. He also competed in the 1989 and 1990 Olympic Festivals, placing third and first, respectively.

Kennett and his wife, Jessica, reside in Groton with their two daughters, Emma and Sophie.

MATTHEW SMITH

First Year at Cornell • Wisconsin '00 Heavyweight Rowing Freshman Coach

U.S. Olympian Matthew Smith was named the heavyweight freshman rowing coach in August of 2008. He brings a unique background to the Big Red with 16 years of rowing experience and eight years of leadership as an officer in the U.S. Army.

A seven-time member of the U.S. national rowing team, Smith has won medals at the Pan-American Games, World Championships, and National Championships, while also representing the U.S. in the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece.

Smith has served as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's varsity heavyweight crew at his alma mater, the University of Wisconsin, during the winters of 2002, 2003 and 2007, assisting in the daily management and logistics of over 45 Division I student-athletes.

Smith rowed all four years for the Badgers, spending two years with the first varsity-8 and serving as team captain in his senior season. An Eastern Sprints and IRA medalist, Smith was also a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

Following his graduation from Wisconsin in 2000, Smith was commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Army where he continued his elite rowing career in the Army's World Class Athlete Program.

During his time in the military, Smith was promoted twice, eventually earning the rank of Captain, and was awarded the Bronze Star and Meritorious Service Medals for exceptional duty in combat and peacetime operations.

Smith was married to Olympian and Cornell head women's rowing coach Hilary Gehman this fall.

COLIN FARRELL

First Year at Cornell • Cornell '05 Intern Coach

Former lightweight rower Colin Farrell joined the Big Red rowing staff as an intern coach in August 2008. His experience on a national and international level will provide key insight as Cornell attempts to continue its march toward the top of the heavyweight standings.

A three-year member of the U.S. national team, Farrell was part of the lightweight eight boat that won the world championship in 2008. His other top international finish has been sixth in the lightweight four at the 2007 FISA World Cup in Linz, Austria. He has also been part of boats that finished ninth in the lightweight four at the 2006 FISA World Championships and 11th in the same event at the 2007 World Championships.

Farrell was part of the lightweight four crew that won the 2007 Pan-American Games Trials and was second in the lightweight pair at the 2006 National Selection Regatta.

The 2005 winner of the Mario St. George Boiardi '04 Leadership Award at Cornell, Farrell was the only collegiate rower to be invited to the United States national team tryouts in the summer of 2005. The two-year captain was part of four varsity boats that medaled at the Eastern Sprints, and he helped the team to a 21-2 record as stroke of the crew, the best recorded by a Cornellian in 40 years.

2008-09 Heavyweight Rowing Outlook

It is going to be a very interesting ride this year for the varsity heavyweight squad. There is a lot of change in the plans as they head into this season. First and foremost, Dan Roock's retirement set off a chain reaction in changes in the coaching staff. Todd Kennett '91 took over as the Spirit of '57 Director of Rowing and heavyweight rowing coach after 10 successful seasons with



the lightweights that featured four trips to the Henley Royal Regatta, three IRA national titles and two Eastern Sprint titles. Matthew Smith joins the staff to lead the freshman, while former lightweight captain Colin Farrell '05 will

be the men's volunteer coach.

Despite the changes to the coaching staff, there will be a great core of returning varsity rowers. Led by commodore Jason Malumed, there will be nine returners who at some point have rowed in the varsity boat. Meanwhile, a large portion of the junior varsity is also returning in the 2009 campaign. With that many returning rowers there is bound to be some great competition within the squad to make the varsity.

The varsity is coming off some of its best recent success at the IRA where it won the IRA petite final, defeating powers such as Harvard, Princeton, Yale, Brown, and Navy. The rowers tasted some success and are probably closer than they have ever been in their rowing careers.

The team will be looking to get far stronger, working closely with Tom Dilaplane in the Friedman Strength and Conditioning Center. They will also be doing a lot of work in the small boats (2-, 4-, 4+) and working competitively in the big boats to bring out the best boatspeed. The team has a chance to have some great results.

They will have to work together as a team towards that goal. Time will be the deciding factor.

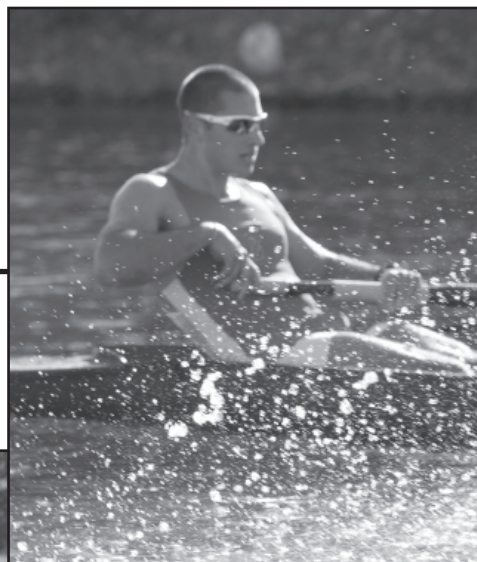

"We are so fortunate to have Chris joining the staff," said Todd Kennett, the Spirit of '57 Director of Rowing. "Chris brings an amazing resume of experience to the Cornell rowing staff – from winning world championships and being an Olympian, to helping run the Head of the Charles - he will be a huge addition to the staff. Chris is a lively character who will challenge his team to perform their best, and always challenge them to make sure they are doing their best."

Kerber competed as a national and international rower for 14 years and was a seven-time member of the U.S. national team. He was a two-time World Champion and won numerous medals at the Henley Royal Regatta, the Pan-American Games, and the U.S. National Championships. He placed among the top six lightweight men for the 1996 Atlanta Olympics as an alternate.

Since retiring as a competitive athlete in 2000, Kerber has given back to the sport of rowing in various ways. He has coached and developed training plans for university, club, and masters rowing teams; he helped run the prestigious Head of the Charles Regatta for four years; and he was a venues consultant for FISA (Fédération Internationale des Sociétés d'Aviron), the governing body of the sport of rowing.

As an undergraduate at Temple University, Kerber earned four medals at the Dad Vail Regatta.

Former lightweight rower Sean Healey returned to his alma mater in 2006 and begins his third season on East Hill in 2008-09. Healey has been an important part in building a crew that has won two Eastern Sprint titles (2006 and 2008) and an unprecedented three straight IRA national titles (2006, 2007 and 2008).

Healey was responsible for working with the lightweight freshmen in 2006-07, guiding the team to a 5-2 record and a fifth-place finish at the Eastern Sprints. Included were head-to-head victories over both Harvard and Princeton. In 2008, his freshman boat placed fifth at Eastern Sprints. He helped the Big Red claim the Jope Cup as the program that earns the most lightweight points for the first time since 1992.

A four-year member of the Big Red crew, Healey spent the 2005-06 season coaching for Three Rivers Rowing Association in his hometown of Pittsburgh, Pa.

A 2005 Cornell graduate with a degree in Engineering, Healey won an IRA title in the pairs and collected three second-place finishes at the Eastern Sprints championship during his rowing career.

2008-09 Lightweight Rowing Outlook

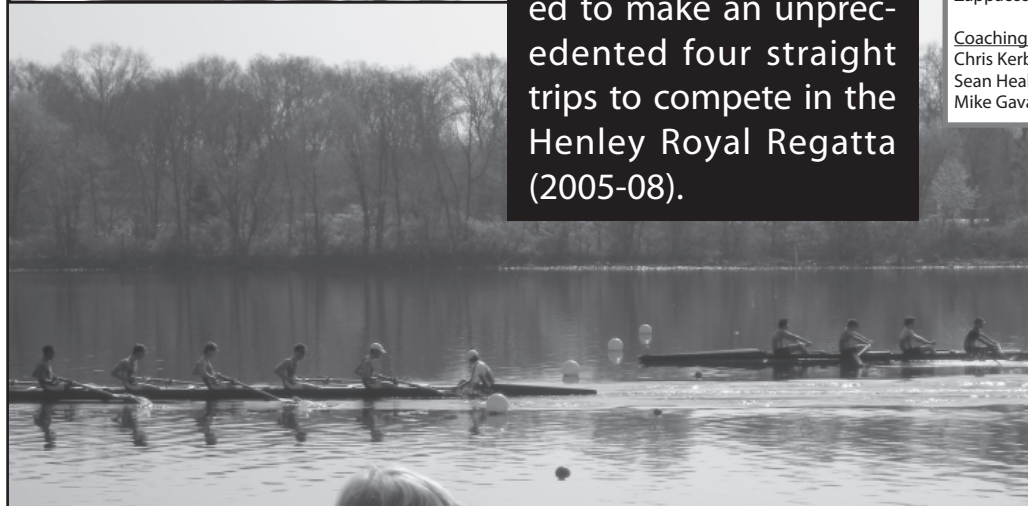
A winning program builds on the success of previous years, embracing the triumphs rather than succumbing to expectations.

Cornell lightweight rowing is officially a winning program.

Now, under the guidance of first-year head coach Chris Kerber, the Big Red has an opportunity to continue its recent achievements — an unprecedented three straight IRA national titles, four consecutive appearances at the Henley Royal Regatta and two Eastern Sprint titles in the past three years.

The varsity will need to replace three rowers, but returns a nucleus that has achieved great things in the team's top boat. Junior coxswain Kerry Quinn emerged in the varsity boat a season ago and earned great credit in maneuvering the Big Red to the top of both major regattas a season ago. Despite the loss of Matt Kochem (stroke), Billy Boyce (six seat) and Chris Bunnell (third seat) to graduation, three seniors are expected to pick up the leadership mantle. Mike Psiaki (five seat), Stefan Brabeck (four seat) and team captain Mike Gavalas (bow) return for their final season hoping to become the first class in IRA history to win four straight lightweight national crowns. Along with Quinn, juniors Nick Carbone (seven seat) and Ray Fort (two seat) also will be back competing for their spots in the varsity boat. With a junior varsity boat that won the petite final at the IRA regatta, there are plenty of candidates to fill the empty spots in the lineup in 2009.

A year ago, Cornell had just four rowers returning to the varsity boat in what was considered a rebuilding year. The Big Red responded by picking up boat speed as the season went along, eventually avenging losses to both Princeton and Yale in the Eastern Sprints to capture its second Ivy title in a three-year span. Cornell took home the Jope Cup, given to the lightweight program that scores the most team points at the event. The Big Red then swept the Eastern Sprints-IRA double for the second time in hitting the line first in the grand final.

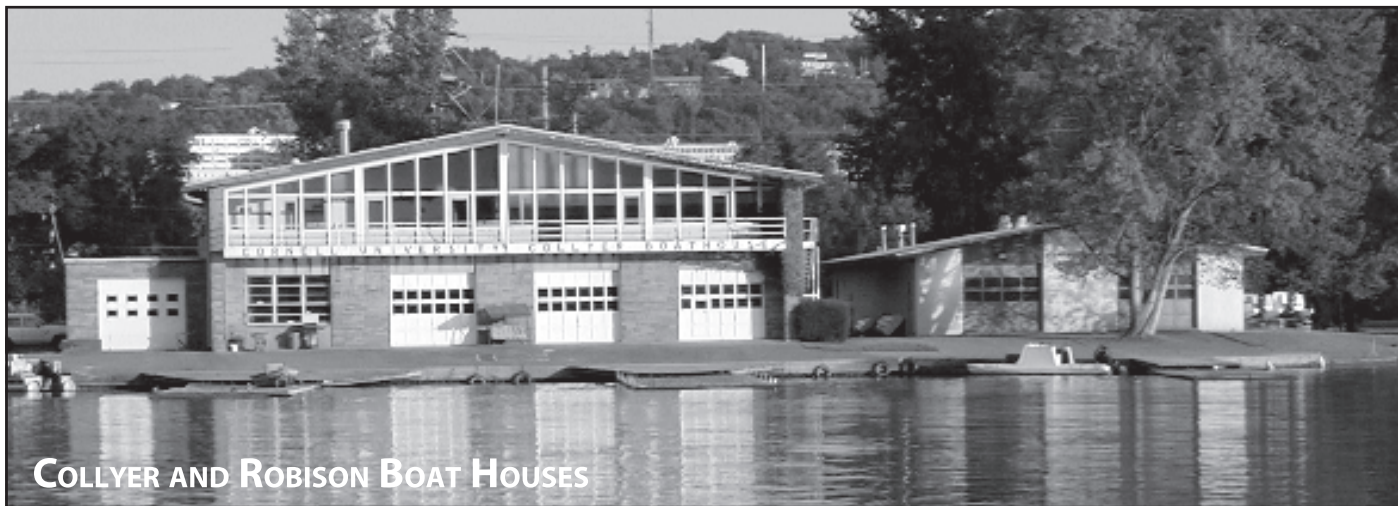

Big Red Rowing Facilities

For most athletes who row, their favorite place on campus is in a boat, on the water. At the same time, members of the crews enjoy multiple venues for training. The space allocated to these athletes speaks of the University's support of rowing and the long history the sport has at Cornell. On central campus, Teagle Hall is home base for the men's and women's crews. Two moving water rowing tanks, training space for ergometer work and circuits, plus an office suite for the coaching staff, are contained within the Charles J. Abbe '63 Training Facility. Just around the corner in Teagle is the Tregurtha Erg Room where more floor space is devoted to all "slider" ergometers. Up the hill past Lynah Rink, athletes work with certified assistant coaches in the Friedman Strength & Conditioning Center. Down the hill, approximately two miles from campus, are the Collyer Boathouse and the Doris Robison Shell House.

This Is Cornell University

In the early 1870s, several boat clubs came into being on the south shore of Cayuga Lake. In 1873, Cornell President Andrew Dickson White procured a new shell and a new coach, Henry Coulter, and Cornell rowing, a program that would become rich with success and tradition, was born.

Legendary coaches like Charles Courtney and R. Harrison "Stork" Sanford are the fathers of that success. Courtney was named the official head coach of Cornell rowing in 1889, although he assisted in the training of the crew for five or six years previous. He led the Big Red to a total of 14 intercollegiate championships. Courtney

was also far ahead of his time with respect to women's sports, training women to row though intramural sports during his tenure.

With the arrival of Stork Sanford in 1937, the Big Red continued its winning ways. The Sanford era lasted 34 years and during that time the Red saw six IRA championships, four Eastern Sprints championships and an undefeated crew that broke a 118-year-old Henley record in 1957.

Lightweight crew was introduced in 1920. The first championship season was in 1949, and that was followed by four EARC championships between 1961 and 1968. The program had another undefeated national championship season in 1992, and in both 2006 and 2008 the team won both the EARC championship (the eighth and ninth in the program's history) and the IRA national championship. The 2007 team also won the IRA national title, with both squads finishing as the runner-up at the Henley Royal Regatta in the Temple Challenge Cup.

Women rowed at Cornell until 1933 when American and world events pushed the program into hiatus until 1974. It later became

a varsity sport in 1975. Recent history is highlighted by a national championship in 1989 and the first bid to the NCAA championships in 2002, with many EAWRC medals in between.

Cornell was represented in the 2008 Olympics in Beijing, China, by former Big Red rowers Ken Jurkowski '03 and Jen Kaido '03. Jurkowski finished 11th in the single sculls, while Kaido placed fifth as part of the women's quadruple sculls.

Supporting Big Red Rowing

Numerous alumni have made generous contributions in support of the Big Red rowing programs. Rowing has provided thousands of Cornell student-athletes with tremendous memories and opportunities, and many have chosen to give back to the program that gave them so much. Here are just a few examples.

CORNELL UNIVERSITY

Realizing a Bold Dream

In the mid 1800s, two New York state senators, Ezra Cornell and Andrew Dickson White, shared the bold dream of founding a "truly great university." Cornell, a plain-spoken inventor, wanted "an institution where any person can find instruction in any study," including the mechanical arts and agriculture. White, a scholarly graduate of Oxford and Yale, yearned to establish a university where "truth shall be taught for truth's sake" in the arts and sciences. Together they created a nonsectarian university that was the first in the eastern United States to admit women and that pioneered the concept of elective courses. Their egalitarian vision and innovative ideas, which set Cornell apart at its opening in 1868, continue to guide the university today.

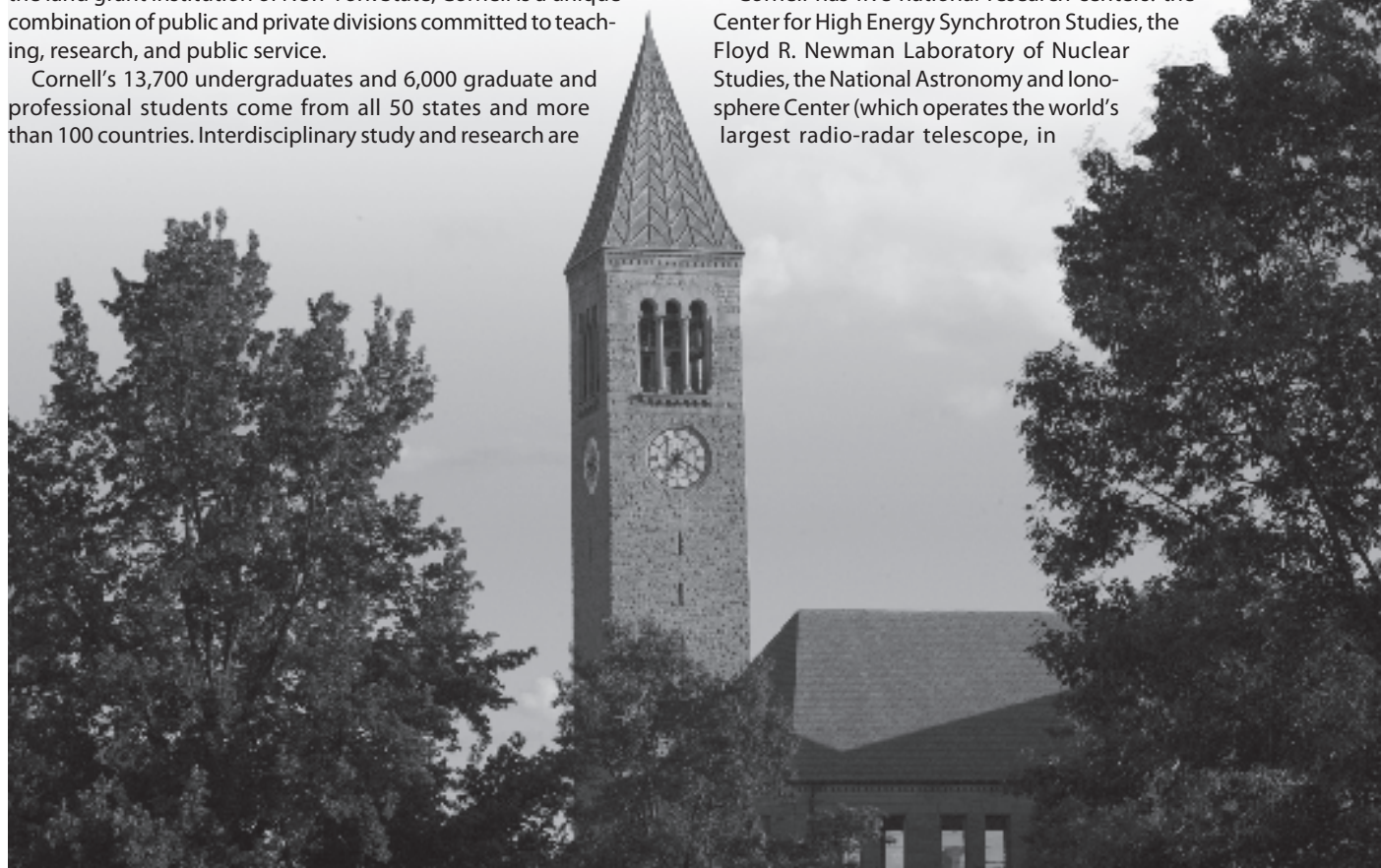
Cornell includes 13 colleges and schools. On the Ithaca campus are the seven undergraduate units—the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences; the College of Architecture, Art, and Planning; the College of Arts and Sciences; the College of Engineering; the School of Hotel Administration; the College of Human Ecology; and the School of Industrial and Labor Relations—as well as four graduate and professional units: the Graduate School, the Law School, the Johnson Graduate School of Management, and the College of Veterinary Medicine. (The Weill Medical College and the Weill Graduate School of Medical Sciences are in New York City.) An Ivy League university that is also the land grant institution of New York State, Cornell is a unique combination of public and private divisions committed to teaching, research, and public service.

Cornell's 13,700 undergraduates and 6,000 graduate and professional students come from all 50 states and more than 100 countries. Interdisciplinary study and research are

Cornell hallmarks, as is attention to undergraduate education. The university's 2,200 faculty members are active teachers as well as researchers—Nobel laureates often conduct introductory courses—and the lines of traditional disciplines are easily crossed. Engineering students dabble in photography; theatre arts students explore the world of computers; physics majors learn landscape architecture.

National Science Foundation studies on programs in research and development at U.S. universities consistently rank Cornell among the top 10 or 11 in total research and development expenditures, and in federally financed expenditures. Cornell ranks second among U.S. universities in funds allocated by the National Science Foundation for programs in academic science and engineering.

Cornell has five national research centers: the Center for High Energy Synchrotron Studies, the Floyd R. Newman Laboratory of Nuclear Studies, the National Astronomy and Ionosphere Center (which operates the world's largest radio-radar telescope, in



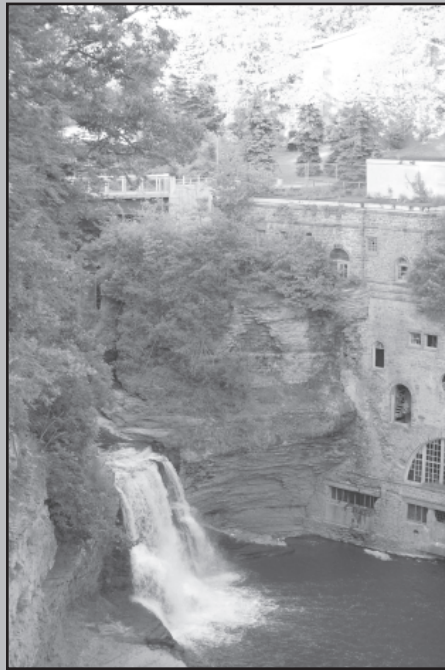
At a research institution, scholars don't just acquire knowledge — they help create it. Cornell's faculty members have garnered such prizes as the Nobel and the Pulitzer, not to mention MacArthur "genius" grants and countless other honors.

These same luminaries teach undergraduate classes and include students on their research teams.

Cornell serves as a land grant institution, receiving funding from New York State for its colleges of Human Ecology, Agriculture and Life Sciences and Veterinary Medicine and for its School of Industrial and Labor Relations. In return, the university offers reduced tuition to state residents in those colleges and helps citizens apply the research generated here to improve the state's economy and the health of its people.

A network of more than 200,000 alumni around the world supports the efforts of current students by sponsoring internships, offering career counseling and mentorship, and providing much of the financial support that maintains the university's world-class libraries, laboratories, and faculty.

Four thousand courses offered by nearly 100 departments, more interdisciplinary programs than you'll find at any other university in the country, research opportunities for undergraduates in nearly every field, and faculty-guided independent study give you the wherewithal to shape a program that speaks to your interests and passions and



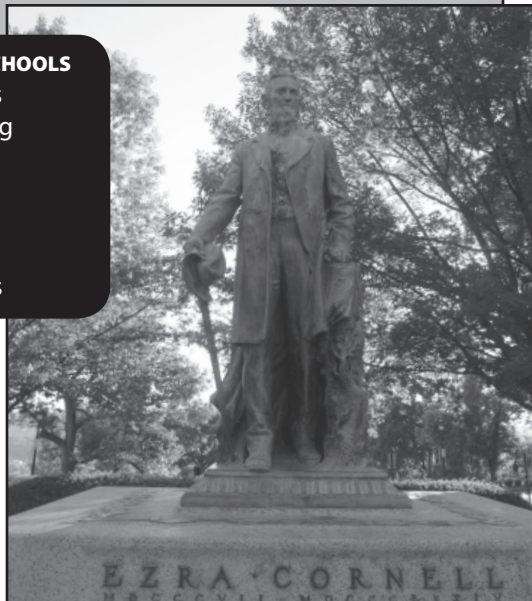

Cornell may be a cutting-edge research university, but that doesn't mean undergraduate education is an afterthought. A Cornell undergrad could spend the morning in a meeting with a professor for an independent study and the afternoon in large survey courses like psych 101.

Students here work hard. Besides attending classes, there's reading, writing, and research, not to mention preparing for exams. But students still find time to build friendships, volunteer off campus, hold part-time jobs and play sports.

And while some students spend their four years close to campus, many go farther afield. They study natural medicinals in South America, marine biology off the coast of Maine, and public policy in Albany, N.Y. In addition to university-run programs in New York City, Washington, D.C., and Rome, Italy, Cornellians travel to sites around the world, polishing their language skills and broadening their horizons.



Arecibo, Puerto Rico), the Cornell Nanofabrication Facility, and the National Science and Technology Center for Computer Graphics and Scientific Visualization. The university also has four national resource centers: the Latin American Studies Program, the East Asia Program, the South Asia Program, and the Southeast Asia Program.

Cornell University Library's 17 Ithaca-campus units provide an array of reference, information, and instructional services. At the southeast edge of the Arts Quad, Olin and Kroch libraries house the largest concentration of resources in the humanities, social sciences, and area studies, including extensive Asia collections, and rare books, manuscripts, and archival materials. Mann Library, on the Ag Quad, has materials in agriculture, biology, biotechnology, and related fields. Other libraries specialize in African and African American studies, engineering, entomology, the fine arts, hotel management, industrial and labor relations, law, management, mathematics, music, the physical sciences, and veterinary medicine.

Famed for its woodlands, gorges, and waterfalls, the 745-acre main campus is on a hilltop overlooking Ithaca, a lively city of about 30,000 situated at the southern end of 44-mile-long Cayuga Lake, in the Finger Lakes region of New York state. Campus attractions of special interest include the Johnson Museum of Art, the Cornell Plantations, and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Sapsucker Woods wildlife sanctuary. The heart of New York state's wine-growing region is less than an hour away, as are the Corning Glass Center and Museum and the Watkins Glen auto circuit. New York City is about a four-hour drive from Ithaca.

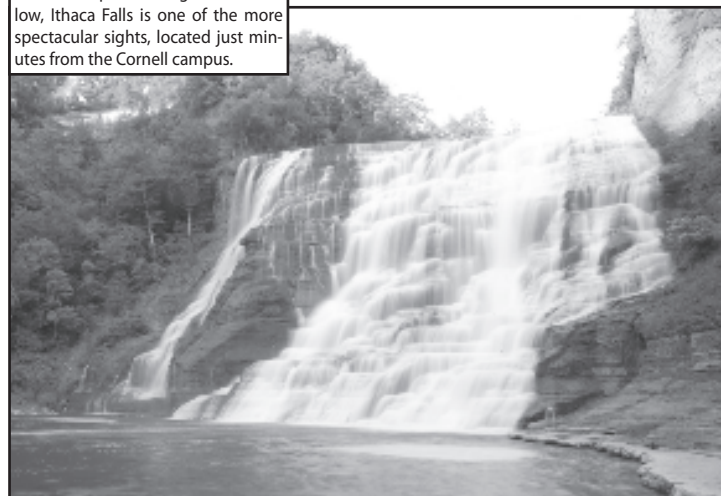

ITHACA, N.Y.

Nestled in the heart of New York State's beautiful Finger Lakes region is Tompkins County, with Ithaca at its center. Long known for the excellence of its educational and research institutions, and more recently for its multitude of scenic wonders, Ithaca is indeed, "Gorges."



The beauty of Ithaca and the Cornell campus is unmatched. Ithaca is host to over 150 waterfalls, all of which lie within a 10-mile radius of downtown. Tompkins County is also home to three of the six gorge parks in New York state. Among the amazing sites is Taughannock Falls (above). At 215 feet high, Taughannock has a greater vertical drop than Niagara Falls. Below, Ithaca Falls is one of the more spectacular sights, located just minutes from the Cornell campus.



• Ithaca and Tompkins County are located in the central Finger Lakes Region of New York State, five hours from New York City, three hours from Niagara Falls, two hours from Rochester and 4.5 hours from Philadelphia.

• The 14 counties in the Finger Lakes Region cover more than 9,000 square miles, or roughly the size of New Hampshire or Vermont, and slightly larger than the state of New Jersey.

• Ithaca offers more restaurants per capita than New York City.

• The Sagan Planet Walk, built to honor the memory of Ithaca resident and Cornell University astronomer Carl Sagan, is a true-to-scale model of our solar system. It is one of the only walkable "planet walks" in the world. The Sciencenter, Ithaca's hands-on museum and outdoor science playground, is the sponsor of the Sagan Planet Walk, and is one of eight museums involved in the partnership of educational attractions called the DISCOVERY TRAIL. Some others include the Museum of the Earth and Cornell's Laboratory of Ornithology.

DAVID J. SKORTON

3rd Year at Cornell

12th President of Cornell University

David J. Skorton became the 12th president of Cornell University on Sept. 7, 2006. He holds faculty appointments in Internal Medicine and Pediatrics at Weill-Cornell Medical College in New York City and in Biomedical Engineering at the College of Engineering on the Ithaca campus.

Skorton came to Cornell after serving as president of the University of Iowa since March 2003. He had been a faculty member there for 26 years. He was appointed vice president for research in 1992 and interim vice president for external relations in 2000. He served as vice president for research and external relations from March 2002 until he assumed the presidency. As vice president, he oversaw more than 30 administrative units and headed a research and development program that ranks among the nation's top 20 public research universities in obtaining external funding. He also continued his role as a physician, caring for adolescents and adults with inborn heart disease.

Co-founder and co-director of the UI Adolescent and Adult Congenital Heart Disease Clinic at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, Skorton focused his research on congenital heart disease in adolescents and adults, cardiac imaging, and computer image processing. His research was supported by the National Institutes of Health, the Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Heart Association, and by private industry. He has published numerous articles, reviews, book chapters, and two major texts in the areas of cardiac imaging and image processing. He served in a variety of administrative positions at the University of Iowa, including director of the Cardiovascular Image Processing Laboratory (1982–1996), director of the Division of General Internal Medicine (1985–1989), and associate chair for clinical programs in the Department of Internal Medicine (1989–1992).

A national leader in research ethics, Skorton is charter past-president of the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, Inc., the first entity organized specifically to accredit human

research protection programs. He has served on the boards and committees of many national organizations, including the American College of Cardiology, the American Heart Association, the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, the American Society of Echocardiography, the Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs, the Association of American Universities, the Council on Competitiveness, and the Korea America Friendship Society. He has traveled widely in Europe and Asia on behalf of both academic and community projects.

Skorton is actively engaged in service to the community and to the state of Iowa, particularly in regional and state economic development. He served on and chaired the Iowa City Area Development Group, served on the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce Priority One Advisory Committee and the Technology Corridor Committee, and currently serves on the Cedar Rapids Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors. He also was a member of the Iowa Business Council and has served on the Iowa Department of Economic Development Board, the Governor's Life Sciences Advisory Committee, and the Iowa Research Council, of which he was president from 1999 to 2001.

Skorton earned his bachelor's degree in psychology in 1970 and an M.D. in 1974, both from Northwestern University. Following a medical residency and cardiology fellowship at the University of California, Los Angeles, he went to the University of Iowa in 1980 as an instructor. He was named assistant professor of internal medicine in 1981 and assistant professor of electrical and computer engineering in 1982. He was promoted to associate professor in 1984 and to professor in 1988.

As a musician, Skorton has a longstanding interest in jazz. He grew up in Los Angeles surrounded by Latin music and worked as a professional jazz and R&B musician in the Chicago area. He hosted a weekly program, *As Night Falls—Latin Jazz*, on KSUI, the University of Iowa's public FM radio station.



DR. SUSAN H. MURPHY '73

30th Year at Cornell

Vice President, Student and Academic Services

Susan H. Murphy has served Cornell University as vice president for student and academic services since July 1994. Under her direction are academic support, campus life, dean of students, Greek life, career services, public service, religious affairs, athletics and physical education and health services.

A 1973 graduate of Cornell's College of Arts and Sciences, Murphy majored in history. She subsequently completed master's degrees at Stanford University and Montclair State College. In 1994, she earned a Ph.D. in educational administration from Cornell.

Murphy joined the Cornell staff in 1978 following work as a guidance counselor and head of the guidance department at Chatham (N.J.) Borough High School. For 16 years, she worked in admissions and financial aid, including nine years as dean of admissions and financial aid.

In addition to her responsibilities at Cornell, Murphy chairs the policy committee of the Council of Ivy Group Presidents. Previously, she has held state-wide and national positions in the College Board and the National Association of College Admission Counselors.



J. ANDREW NOEL, JR.

**28th Year at Cornell • 10th Year As Director of Athletics
The Meakem-Smith Director of Athletics and Physical Education**

Andy Noel begins his 10th year as Cornell University's director of athletics and physical education, having led the Big Red athletics program to unprecedented success while setting a course for his vision of continued prosperity.

His position was endowed in December 2003 by Jack '58 and Diane '61 Meakem and Scott Smith '79. Jack is a former oarsman and member of Cornell's Athletic Hall of Fame, while Scott wrestled under Noel during his time on East Hill.

The Big Red teams have parlayed Noel's accomplishments into success on and off the playing field. Cornell's athletic teams have won 49 Ivy League team titles and 11 national championships during his tenure. The program captured 31 Ivy titles from 2002-03 through 2005-06, setting a Cornell record dating back to the inception of the Ivy League, including a record nine in 2005-06. Academically in 2007-08, 15 student-athletes were named to academic all-district teams, with one earning Academic All-America honors, bringing Cornell's six-year total to 16, among the most of any school in the Ivy League.

Noel accepted the appointment as director after serving three years as an associate director of athletics for the Big Red. Since becoming director, Noel has continued to hire top coaches and has also successfully upgraded a number of department facilities (including renovating Schoellkopf Hall, Lynah Rink and Hoy Field. During his tenure, he has also been a member of the team that raised \$66 million in support of capital projects and endowment, helping secure the financial future of the department. During the campaign, 21 coaching and staff positions were endowed, bringing the total number of endowed positions within the department to 30, the most of any school in the country.

Noel was the Big Red's head wrestling coach from 1974 to 1988 and then served two years as an assistant director in the department's public affairs office, implementing the athletic department's annual giving program.

At Cornell, his wrestling teams won four Ivy League championships and placed second four times. Under Noel's direction, the wrestling team established a strong network of support from alumni and friends. In 1990, he was recognized at the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association Championships for his distinguished coaching career at Cornell, and in 1992 he was inducted into the New York State Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame. He is also a member of both the Franklin and Marshall Sports and the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association (EIWA) halls of fame.

In addition to his coaching and administrative career, Noel served on the wrestling committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association from 1997-2001 and was reappointed for a four-year term in 2008. He was a member of the NCAA Championships Cabinet from 2003-06 and served on both the Misconduct Appeals Subcommittee and the Playing Rules Oversight Panel. Noel is a past chairman of the Ivy League athletic directors' committee on administration and serves on the Cornell President's Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs and the Council of Mental Health and Welfare. In 2006, he was named to the Wells College Board of Trustees.

A native of Lancaster, Pa., he graduated from Franklin and Marshall College in 1972 with a bachelor of arts degree in history and received his master of arts degree in counseling and guidance from Colgate University in 1973.

Noel is married to Dr. Betsy Mead Noel '86, and has a son Jonathan '04 and two daughters, Amanda '07, and 4-year-old Amelie.

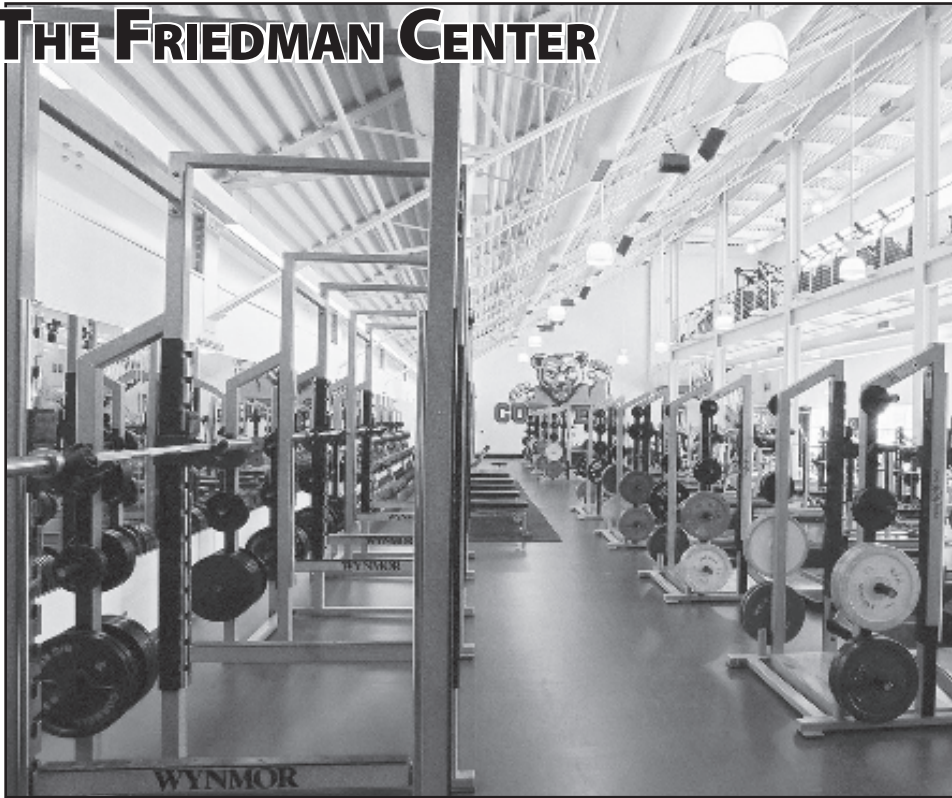

THE FRIEDMAN CENTER



Champions are crowned during the season, but championships are earned long before competition begins. Cornell's 900 varsity athletes have exclusive access to one of the newest and best training facilities in the nation—the 8,000-square-foot Friedman Strength and Conditioning Center. Completed in June 1997, this impressive \$2 million addition to Bartels Hall reflects the university's strong commitment to athletic excellence. Coaches and team members alike credit the center, its world-class equipment, and first-rate staff with adding immensely to the success of the Big Red athletic program.

The Friedman Center contains free-weight, selectorized, plyometric, and cardiovascular equipment and has been designed to meet the diverse training needs of Cornell's athletes. The center can accommodate up to 100 users at a time without compromising safety or function. Its unique features include air-conditioning, a 175-watt stereo system, and damage-resistant flooring.

Cornell's varsity strength and conditioning program—nicknamed "Big Red Power"—focuses on enhancing performance and preventing injury. The new facility and equipment enable the staff to prescribe year-round sport-specific programs with variety and precision.

Before the training programs are designed, the muscular and metabolic needs for each sport—and for each position within the sport—are analyzed. Athletes are then assessed to identify their individual strengths and weaknesses, and follow-up assessments are conducted at regular intervals. Comprehensive workouts are prescribed to address deficiencies and promote the development of skills used during competition.

Injury prevention also is emphasized. Through resistance training, the number and the severity of injuries are reduced. If an injury does occur, the strength and conditioning staff works closely with the sports medicine staff to ensure a safe and complete rehabilitation. The objective is to allow the athlete to resume full participation as soon as possible.



TOM HOWLEY

14th Year at Cornell
Assistant Director of Athletics for Athlete Performance

Tom Howley has been the strength and conditioning coach at Cornell since July 1995 and was promoted to assistant director of athletics in 2005. In that role, he oversees the design and implementation of athletic performance programs for Cornell's 36 varsity sports. The comprehensive, year-round programs include strength and power development, mobility skill training and conditioning, and are implemented in a motivating, team-oriented environment.

Prior to his arrival at Cornell, Howley was the assistant director of strength and conditioning at East Carolina University from 1991-1995. During these seasons, the Pirates participated in two bowl games (1992 Peach Bowl and 1995 Liberty Bowl), qualified for the NCAA baseball regional tournament (1994) and played in the NCAA basketball tournament (1993).

Howley was a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at Auburn University from 1989-91, where he earned his master's degree in exercise physiology. The Tigers were the 1989 Southeastern Conference co-champions, the 1990 Hall of Fame Bowl and the 1991 Peach Bowl champions. Howley also served as an assistant coach with the special teams.

A 1988 graduate of Tulane, Howley earned a bachelor of arts degree in history and was a three-year letterman and two year starting offensive lineman on the football team. The Green Wave played in the 1987 Independence Bowl his senior year. He was the recipient of the New Orleans Quarterback Club Student-Athlete Award as a senior.

Howley is an active participant in the Cornell University/Ithaca College chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and his wife, Amanda, reside in Ithaca with their daughter, Anna Corrine.



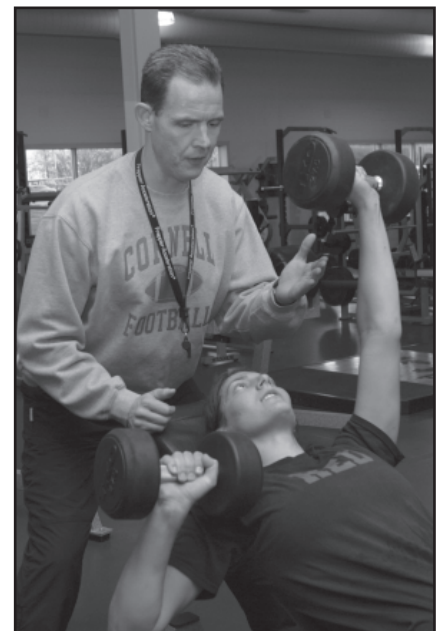

Bernie DePalma's top priorities are the health and safety of the student-athletes, and providing them with a safe environment for training and competition. He has been an integral member of the athletic staff as head of physical therapy, athletic training and rehabilitation for Cornell University Health Services since August 1980 and head athletic trainer since 1983.

DePalma graduated from Quinnipiac College with a bachelor of science degree in physical therapy in 1978 and received his master's degree in athletic training-sports medicine from the University of Virginia in 1980.

DePalma and the Big Red head coaches work together in planning practice schedules to assist in the prevention of injuries. DePalma also works closely with the strength and conditioning staff to assist with injury prevention.

DePalma was a founding member of the Cornell sports nutrition discussion group, which examines the role nutrition plays in the student-athlete's well-being and performance. He also manages programs he developed for graduate assistantships with Ithaca College and athletic trainer internships from Ithaca and other area colleges. He supervises seven full-time staff members and numerous part-time assistants.

DePalma's expertise impacts national athletics legislation. He has served on numerous NCAA committees, including the Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sport Safety, which he chaired; the NCAA special committee on student-athlete welfare, access and equity; and the national athletic trainer's task force which developed medical coverage guidelines for all intercollegiate athletic programs.

He was honored in 2001 by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA) with the Most Distinguished Athletic Trainer Award. The award recognizes the NATA's certified members for their outstanding contributions to the profession of athletic training and to the association.

DePalma and his wife, Mary, have a daughter, Taylor, and a son, Turner.



The Ivy League

The Ivy League is truly one of a kind.

While the 2006-07 academic year marked the 50th season of official Ivy League athletic competition, the rivalries and traditions in the League go so much deeper. The first official athletic competition between League schools was more than 150 years ago (1852, Harvard-Yale rowing) and the first football game was more than 130 years ago (1872, Columbia-Yale).

In the early days, the Ivy schools dominated college athletics. All-America status, Olympic medals and national championships were routinely earned by students from the Ancient Eight.

Today, Ivy Leaguers continue to claim national titles and Olympic medals — as well as All-America and Academic All-America status. Hundreds continue athletic careers as professionals and hundreds more as coaches and athletic administrators. The student-athletes also are among the nation's leading public servants, doctors, journalists, lawyers, scientists, scholars, business leaders, entertainers, educators and so much more.

The success of the League comes without athletic scholarships while maintaining self-imposed high academic standards. The Ivy League has demonstrated a rare willingness and ability, given the pressures on intercollegiate success throughout the nation, to abide by these rules and still compete successfully in Division I athletics.

Sponsoring conference championships in 33 men's and women's sports, and averaging more than 35 varsity teams at each school, the Ivy League provides intercollegiate athletic opportunities for more men and women than any other conference in the country. All eight Ivy schools are among the "top 20" of NCAA Division I schools in number of sports offered for both men and women.

The term "Ivy colleges" was first in October, 1933 by Stanley Woodward of the New York Herald Tribune to describe the eight current Ivy schools (plus Army). On Feb. 8, 1935, Associated Press sports editor Alan Gould first used the exact term "Ivy League."

The first "Ivy Group Agreement," signed in 1945, applied only to football. It affirmed the observance of common practices in academic standards and eligibility requirements and the administration of need-based financial aid, with no athletic scholarships. The agreement created the Presidents Policy Committee, including the eight Presidents; the Coordination and Eligibility Committee, made up of one senior non-athletic administrator from each school; and the committee on Administration, comprised of the eight directors of athletics.

The Ivy Presidents extended the Ivy Group Agreement to all intercollegiate sports in February 1954. Their statement also focused on presidential governance of the League, the importance of intra-League competition, and a desire that recruited athletes be academically 'representative' of each institution's overall student body. Although that is the League's official founding date, the first year of competition was 1956-57.

The Ivy League office is housed in Princeton, N.J., under the leadership of Executive Director Jeffrey H. Orleans, who has been at that post since 1984.

- Became the second conference with three of the six NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winners in the same year (2007) — Dartmouth's Gail Koziara Boudreaux, Brown's Steve Jordan and Yale's Patricia Melton.

Academic Services

Academic counseling is provided in partnership with the student-athletes' assigned academic advisers and college advising office.

Academic contracts are developed in conjunction with the student-athlete to outline specific academic goals for the semester.

Academic monitoring of current course grades and academic performance can be requested from instructors by coaches or student-athletes at anytime throughout the semester. The instructor will be asked to fill out a form and return it to Athletic Student Services Office. Once received, a follow-up meeting with the director allows the student-athlete to meet and discuss their academic progress.

Tutoring services are available to all student-athletes as a supplement to existing tutorial services on campus. Student-athletes may request a tutor by completing a tutor request form that can be obtained from their coach or the form can be printed from www.CornellBigRed.com.

Laptop computers are available for student-athletes to sign out on away athletic trips. You may request a laptop by contacting Chris Wlosinski. There is a limit of one per team and are available on a first-come first-serve basis.

Study skills workshops can be arranged through the Athletic Student Services office. Referrals to the Center for Learning and Teaching provide additional support for individual academic and study skills support.

Support Services

Personal Needs Counseling - Student-athletes are encouraged to schedule an appointment with the director when they have concerns regarding academic, athletic, or personal issues. Assistance will be provided and referrals will be made to appropriate support services on campus.

Educational Seminars/Workshops - Various seminars and workshops are given throughout the year and provide information relevant to student-athletes. Past workshops include topics such as nutrition and eating disorders, alcohol education, sports psychology, women's health issues, and study skills.

Career Development - Services Career development services for student-athletes are coordinated with the University Career Center and each of the undergraduate colleges. Services including assistance with resume writing and conducting a job search is also available through the various Career Centers across campus.

Student-Athlete Assistance Fund - Money is available for Pell Grant recipients and to non-US citizens who have demonstrated need that is comparable to those qualifying for Pell grants and are receiving institutional aid. There is a \$500 allowance for clothing and essentials and/or travel home and \$100 for academic course supplies.

10th Year at Cornell

The Andrew '78 & Margaret Paul Assistant Director of Athletics for Student Services and Compliance

Chris Wlosinski took over the role of the Andrew '78 and Margaret Paul Director of Student-Athlete Support Services in August 2001 and was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director for Student Services and Compliance in March 2005. In her position, she has assumed a dedicated role focused on student-athlete support and compliance with NCAA and Ivy League rules.

Cornell and its counterparts embrace a philosophy that includes the notion that student-athletes should experience a mainstream collegiate life, but the university also recognized the extra demands placed on this special population. In August of 1998, the position, the first of its kind in the Ivy League, was created, a role that asks Wlosinski to work as an available and reliable adviser who understands the lifestyle student-athletes lead and assists them in balancing their academic, athletic and personal challenges. In this capacity she also serves as a liaison with the colleges and directs student-athletes to appropriate campus-wide resources for academic and personal needs.

When Wlosinski first joined the Big Red program, she worked collaboratively with the director of student-athlete support services, coaches and administrators to provide counseling and academic support services serving 36 varsity sports. She developed and maintained personal contacts with ad-

ministrators and professors throughout Cornell's seven colleges, and she assisted the director in monitoring the academic progress of student-athletes.

Most of Wlosinski's time is devoted to personal meetings with student-athletes, and while the bulk of her work focuses on freshmen, sophomores and transfer students, she does assist athletes from all classes and across all colleges at Cornell.

Wlosinski came to Cornell in August 1999 and worked in compliance, student services and event management. In June 2000, she accepted the position of associate director of alumni affairs and development for athletics where she served until assuming her current position.

Prior to joining the Cornell staff, Wlosinski spent a year each as an athletics administrative intern at Bates College and Plymouth State College. She also served as a special education teacher for the learning disabled for seven years in Lancaster, Pa.

Wlosinski graduated from Millersville University in 1989 with a bachelor's degree in special education and from Plymouth State College in 1999 with a master's degree in education.

Success In And Out Of The Classroom ...

To be a Cornellian is to be among the best and Cornell University's intercollegiate athletic program is no different, ranking among the nation's elite. The Big Red competes at the highest level of intercollegiate athletic competition as an NCAA Division I institution. Rich tradition and history follow Cornell athletics throughout the university's storied past. Cornellians have been national champions in ice hockey, lacrosse, polo, rowing, track and field and wrestling. They have also earned spots in halls of fame, on All-America teams, on the Olympic medal podium and have written their names in record books as Wimbledon tennis champions and major league players in baseball, basketball, football and hockey. More recently, Cornell has won 45 Ivy League titles in the last six years, including eight during the 2007-08 season. That is only part of the equation. Over the last six seasons, the Big Red has had 16 student-athletes named Academic All-Americans.

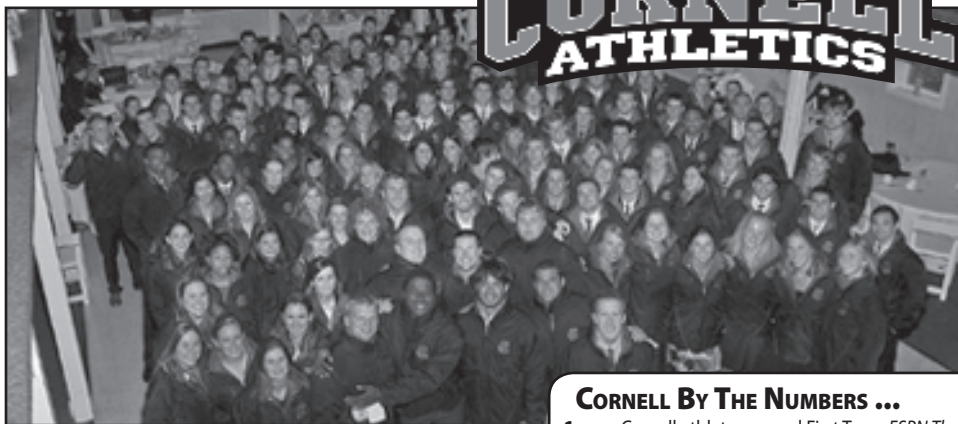
