WHAT'S ON TAP

The Big Red will wrap up both a four-game home stand and the first wave of league play this weekend, when it plays host to Ivy League opponents Yale on Friday and Brown on Saturday. Both games are scheduled to begin shortly after 7 p.m. and will be streamed live on subscription-based Big Red Digital with Jason Weinstein handling play-by-play and Tony Eisenhut providing color commentary. Their call is also available for free on Big Red Digital, and it can also be heard in the Ithaca area on WHCU-AM (870).

ABOUT THE BIG RED

Cornell split its first weekend of ECAC Hockey home games, winning in exhilarating fashion Friday against Clarkson, 2-1, before falling to St. Lawrence the next night, 4-2. While killing off a major penalty in overtime against the Golden Knights, the Big Red struck on the counterattack with senior forward Joel Lowry (1-2-3) setting up sophomore forward Eric Freschi (1-0-1) for the short-handed winner. It was the program's first short-handed goal in overtime since 2005. Lowry also scored the first goal of the game after sophomore goalie Mitch Gillam's 100-foot stretch pass helped spring Lowry on a breakaway. Senior forward Cole Bardreau (1-1-2) and sophomore forward Matt Buckles (2-1-3) scored power-play goals in the loss to the Saints on Saturday. ... Gillam (1-3-1, 1.66, .944) ranks eighth in the country in both goals-against average and save percentage. The Big Red is eighth nationally in team defense (1.83 goals against per game) despite leaning heavily on three defensemen and two goalies with a combined three games of college hockey experience heading into the season. ...

Cornell broke an 0-for-17 skid on the power play with three goals on the man advantage last weekend. The penalty kill is ranked seventh in the country with a 92 percent success rate. ... Buckles and Lowry are tied for the team lead in scoring, one point ahead of Bardreau, sophomore defenseman Patrick McCarron (1-1-2), senior defenseman Jacob MacDonald (0-2-2) and sophomore forward Jeff Kubiak (0-2-2). ... Buckles and sophomore defenseman Holden Anderson are not eligible to play Friday's game vs. Yale because of disqualifications assessed to them in Saturday's game vs. St. Lawrence. ... Mike Schafer is in his 20th season as the Jay R. Bloom '77 Head Coach of Men's Hockey. Associate head coach Ben Syer and assistant coach Tophier Scott return for their fourth seasons with the Big Red, and Lyle Gregory has joined the staff as a volunteer assistant coach.

SITTING ATOP THE IVY

This weekend's games mark the first home games against Ivy League opponent this season. Cornell won the Ivy League championship outright in 2014. It's the second time in the last three years the Big Red claimed the Ivy crown, the 17th time it's done so outright and the 21st time overall in program history. Cornell came up just short of even more history when a 1-0 loss to Dartmouth on Feb. 28 proved to be the squad's only loss against the Ancient Eight last season. Just three times in program history has the Big Red completed the Ivy League schedule undefeated. The last time Cornell was unbeaten in Ivy games was 1996, when it was 9-0-1 in Mike Schafer's first season as the Big Red's head coach. The other two occasions were in 1969 and 1970. Cornell dropped its Ivy debut this season on Nov. 7 at Princeton, 2-1.

ABOUT YALE

The Bulldogs are coming off a road sweep of Dartmouth and Harvard last weekend, which has led sophomore Alex Lyon (3-1-2, 1.82, .937) to be named the ECAC Hockey Goaltender of the Week. Senior defenseman Tommy Fallen (1-1-2) and freshman center Ryan Hitchcock (1-3-4) each had a goal and an assist on the power play in a 4-1 victory over the Big Green, then staved off the Crimson the following night, 2-1. Junior defenseman Ryan Obuchowski (1-1-2) scored 6:48 into the third period. With 55 seconds to play, sophomore forward Mike Doherty (3-2-5) scored an empty-netter that eventually turned into the game-winner when Harvard scored an extra-attacker goal 39 seconds later to break Lyon's shutout bid. ... Yale started the season by winning the Liberty Invitational. After tying Princeton in the opener, the Bulldogs advanced to the championship via shootout win, then topped Connecticut, 2-1. ... Sophomore forward John Hayden (1-5-6) leads the team in scoring, though he missed Saturday's game at Harvard.

ABOUT BROWN

The Bears have struggled in the early going, having been outscored 21-9 through five games. That includes conceding six goals in each of their losses to Harvard and Dartmouth last weekend. Brown opened its league slate with a 5-2 loss to St. Lawrence and a 2-1 setback against Clarkson. The team's lone victory was Oct. 31 at Army, 4-2. ... Senior forward Massimo Lamacchia (1-2-3) holds the early scoring lead, with senior Matt Lorito and sophomore forward Davey Middleton each scoring two goals. Junior forward Nick Lappin returns to the lineup after a two-game suspension for a hit from behind against Clarkson. ... Sophomore Tyler Steel (1-3, 4.12, .887) assumes the starting goaltending role after winning the job last season. Classmate Tim Ernst (0-1, 4.74, .862) has started one game and come on in relief once.

THE SERIES WITH YALE

Friday's game will be the 145th all-time meeting between the Bulldogs and Big Red, with Cornell holding a 81-58-5 advantage since the teams first met during the 1902-03 season. Cornell swept the season series last year, including a 2-1 victory at Lynah Rink. Senior forward Joel Lowry provided the winner just 67 seconds into the second period. Lowry has four goals and three assists for seven points in six career games against the Bulldogs, while career linemate John McCarron has one goal and five assists for six points in six career games against Yale. Mike Schafer is 21-17-4 against Yale in his tenure as Cornell's head coach.

THE SERIES WITH BROWN

The Big Red has a commanding lead in the all-time series, 72-43-5, and Mike Schafer is a dominating 30-7-3 against the Bears during his first 19 seasons as the Big Red's head coach. Cornell has won four of the last five games, including a sweep of the season series last year. Matt Buckles and Cole Bardreau scored goals in each game, including a 2-1 victory at Brown, and Eric Freschi scored twice in a 5-1 victory at Lynah Rink. ... Bardreau has three goals and two assists for five points in four career games against the Bears. ... Freschi, Buckles, Reece Willcox and Christian Hilbrich all scored their first collegiate goal against Brown.

BLANK YOU VERY MUCH

Cornell has recorded at least one shutout in each of the last 19 seasons — a streak that was kept alive with a 1-0 overtime victory against Clarkson in Game 3 of the ECAC Hockey Championship quarterfinals last March. The last time the Big Red went a full season without posting a shutout came during the 1994-95 season under former coach Brian McCutcheon. The following year marked the first season for current head coach Mike Schafer.

LET'S GET IT STARTED

Cornell has an all-time record of 57-34-7 in season openers, staying unbeaten in its season debut for a fourth consecutive season after a 1-1 tie with Omaha last Friday. The Big Red won its three preview season debuts, including last year's 5-3 win at Omaha. Under current head coach Mike Schafer, the Big Red is 12-6-2 in season openers.

TRENDING

The Big Red welcomes two newcomers from the U.S. National Team Development Program this season in defenseman Ryan Bliss and forward Jared Fiegl. This marks the fifth consecutive season that at least one player from the U.S. Under-18s has joined the Big Red. The others were Clint Lewis (in 2013), Gavin Stoick (in 2012), Cole Bardreau (in 2011) and Andy Iles (in 2010).

NOT JUST A DEFENSEMAN

Senior blueliner Joakim Ryan ranked 11th in the nation in points per game for defensemen (0.75) last season. He was tied for second on the team in scoring with 24 points, and his eight goals ranked third on the team. Over the last two years, he has been on the ice for 88 of the team's 160 goals (55 percent). The production was nothing new for the San Jose Sharks draft pick, who set a program record for goals by a freshman defenseman in 2011-12 with seven. Ryan was named to both the media's and coaches' Preseason All-ECAC Hockey Teams, but he has missed five of the first six games this season due to injury.

FEEL THE DRAFT?

Cornell has seven players on the roster who have been selected in the NHL Entry Draft, including two picks from last June. Freshman forward Jared Fiegl was selected in the seventh round by the Arizona Coyotes, with the only other Big Red player selected by the organization being David LeNeveu in 2002. Freshman forward Dwyer Tschantz was then selected 11 picks later by the St. Louis Blues — the first time the organization has selected a Cornell product in 15 years. Other NHL draft picks on the team include defensemen Reece Willcox (Philadelphia Flyers) and Joakim Ryan (San Jose Sharks), forwards John McCarron (Edmonton Oilers), Joel Lowry (Los Angeles Kings) and Matt Buckles (Florida Panthers).

FIVE-ON-THREE PROWESS

There are few situations in hockey more dire than when a team is facing a two-man disadvantage, but the Big Red has made a habit of rising to the occasion in those scenarios. Cornell is a perfect 16-for-16 killing off a two-man disadvantage over the last three seasons, spanning a total of 14 minutes, 44 seconds. The last time Cornell surrendered a five-on-three goal was against Yale on Feb. 11, 2012.

NOW THAT'S A STREAK

It has been 1,553 games since the Big Red has been shut-out in back-to-back contests. The last time Cornell was blanked in consecutive games was way back in December 1963, when Clarkson and St. Lawrence held the Big Red off the scoresheet.

THE 35th TO 350

Already the winningest coach in program history, Mike Schafer hit 350 victories for his career — all of which have come from behind the Big Red's bench — with a 4-2 win over Princeton on Nov. 1, 2013. He became the 35th coach all-time to rack up 350 victories across all NCAA divisions. Schafer is also just the third coach to pass 350 victories with Ivy League tenure, joining Ned Harkness (Cornell, Union and Rensselaer) and Tim Taylor (Yale).

GLOBAL INFLUENCE

The Big Red has 17 players on the roster born in the United States. Cornell also now has players native to four different countries on its squad. Aside from the bulk of its roster hailing from the United States and Canada, Cornell also has a player from Denmark (Christian Hilbrich) and Finland (Teemu Tiitinen). Even within the United States, the Big Red has some untraditional hockey areas covered. Joel Lowry has lived in Florida, Tiitinen has lived in Georgia, John Knisley is native to South Carolina, and Cole Bardreau and Ryan Bliss were both born in North Carolina.

GOLDEN AGAIN

Senior forward Cole Bardreau won a gold medal while serving as an assistant captain for the United States at the 2013 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship in Ufa, Russia. It wasn't the first time Bardreau's earned gold with the U.S. either — he also wore an "A" while capturing gold at the IIHF Under-18 World Championship in April 2011. Freshman forward Jared Fiegl also won gold in the same event in April 2014.

POLLS PROSE

The Big Red was ranked 14th in both the USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine and USCHO.com polls in the preseason, but Cornell's slow start has seen it drop out of both the USCHO.com poll and the USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine poll. The last time Cornell was unranked in either poll was the preseason of the 2013-14 campaign.

UP NEXT

The Big Red turns its attention to the second edition of The Frozen Apple, when it takes on Penn State on Saturday, Nov. 29 at Madison Square Garden before returning home to wrap up the fall semester portion of the schedule with a two-game non-league series against Denver at Lynah Rink. Cornell is then idle for three weeks before departing for the annual Florida College Classic, where it opens the tournament Dec. 28 vs. Lake Superior State.

MIKE SCHAFER

The Jay R. Bloom '77 Head Coach of Men's Hockey
20th Season As Head Coach
27th Season Overall at Cornell • Cornell '86

When Mike Schafer returned to his alma mater as the 12th head coach in Cornell men's hockey history in the summer of 1995, his goal was to bring the Big Red program back to a position of national prominence. Beginning his 20th season behind the Cornell bench in 2014-15, he has clearly accomplished that objective, guiding the Big Red to the NCAA tournament nine times, including a berth in the NCAA Frozen Four in 2002-03, the program's first since 1980.

Schafer is Cornell's second-longest tenured coach, while his 365-212-72 record has him as the winningest coach in Cornell men's hockey history. He picked up his 231st career victory on Jan. 27, 2007, a 2-1 triumph against Colgate at Lynah Rink, to become the program's all-time wins leader.

Coming hand-in-hand with Cornell's success on the national scene, the Big Red has been one of the top programs in ECAC Hockey during Schafer's tenure. Cornell has claimed five ECAC Hockey tournament titles and staked a claim to three regular season crowns. He has a career 239-130-53 record in ECAC Hockey regular-season play and a 52-23-2 mark in the ECAC Hockey playoffs.

His peers have taken notice of his accomplishments, electing him the ECAC Hockey Coach of the Year three times during his career. He is also a three-time finalist for the Spencer T. Penrose Award, presented to the national coach of the year. He has regularly had the Big Red ranked among the nation's elite over the past decade, including reaching as high as third in both the USCHO/CBS College Sports and the USA Today/USA Hockey polls in 2008-09. Cornell has held the top spot in the polls during the 2002-03 and 2004-05 seasons.

Schafer is no stranger to reaching milestones, as he became just the second Cornell coach to reach 200 victories with the Big Red's win over Michigan State on Oct. 28, 2005, and the first to reach 250 wins with a 3-2

victory over Dartmouth in game one of the ECAC Hockey First Round on March 7, 2008. His 300th career win then came at the expense of rival Colgate on Nov. 27, 2010, with the Big Red scoring three goals in the third period of a game at the Prudential Center — home of the NHL's New Jersey Devils — to secure a 4-3 victory.

Schafer guided the Big Red to the ECAC Hockey tournament title in 1995-96 and 1996-97, becoming the first Cornell coach to win ECAC Hockey tournament titles in his first two seasons. His five tournament titles are the most in program history. In 2002-03, Schafer led the Big Red to the NCAA Frozen Four, setting a school record with 30 wins, going one better than the undefeated, untied 29-0-0 national championship squad of 1969-70. Cornell's 2002-03 ECAC Hockey mark of 19-2-1 was Cornell's best mark since the 1969-70 team went 21-0 in league play. He enters the season with a .621 career winning percentage, which ranks in the top 10 among active Division I coaches.

Over his career, Schafer has coached 48 All-ECAC Hockey selections and 20 ECAC Hockey All-Rookie team picks. In 2012, forward Brian Ferlin won both the Ivy League and ECAC Hockey Rookie of the Year awards. In 2010, Brendon Nash and Ben Scrivens were both named to the first team, marking the first time Cornell placed two in the top six since David McKee and Matt Moulson in 2005. In 2007, Riley Nash earned ECAC Hockey Rookie of the Year honors, the first since David McKee in 2004 and the first non-goalie to bring that award back to Ithaca since Kyle Knopp in 1996, Schafer's first season as head coach.

A 1986 graduate of Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences with a degree in business management and marketing, Schafer was a four-year letterman for the Big Red and a two-year captain. He capped his collegiate career by leading the team to the ECAC Hockey championship and a No. 5 national ranking as a senior. After

graduation, Schafer was named a Big Red assistant coach in September 1986. He was instrumental in recruiting 14 players who were NHL draft choices, two of whom became All-Americans. He also handled the Cornell junior varsity skaters from 1986 to 1988. During Schafer's initial coaching tenure with the Big Red, the skaters had ECAC Hockey Final Four appearances in 1989 and 1990.

A native of Durham, Ontario, Schafer played junior hockey with the Guelph Jr. A Holody Platers, finalists in the Centennial Cup for the national championship in 1982. Schafer and his wife, Diane, have two sons, Luke and John, and a daughter, Michelle.

BEN SYER

Fourth Season At Cornell; Third as Associate Head Coach Western Ontario '98

Ben Syer joined the Cornell men's ice hockey family in June 2011 as an assistant coach, taking over the lead role in recruiting as well as coaching the defense. He was then named the Associated Head Coach of the program

prior to the 2012-13 season.

Syer previously served as associate head coach during his 12 seasons at Quinnipiac under head coach Rand Pecknold. During that run, the Bobcats posted a 242-168-46 record with one NCAA tournament appearance (2002) and nine 20-win seasons. Quinnipiac won the 2005 Atlantic Hockey regular season title and the 1999 MAAC regular season and 2002 MAAC tournament championship crowns during his tenure.

"I have a lot of respect for Ben," head coach Mike Schafer said. "His defensemen have always been very well-coached. Previous assistants and other coaches I've talked to respect his ability to recruit top student-athletes. There is no question he is one of the

top recruiters in college hockey, so we're excited to bring a quality coach on board to replace a quality coach lost."

Quinnipiac reached the MAAC tournament semifinals in each of the first four years of Syer's tenure, including three straight MAAC finals appearances. Included in that span were the 2002 MAAC tournament title and the first NCAA appearance in program history. The Bobcats also won the MAAC regular-season title in Syer's first year at Quinnipiac.

A native of Kitchener, Ontario, Syer arrived at Quinnipiac after serving one season as an assistant coach at Ohio University. At Ohio, Syer assisted with practice and game preparation as well as recruiting.

A 1998 graduate of Western Ontario, Syer earned a bachelor's degree in urban development. He also has prior coaching experience with the North Middlesex Stars, a junior development team based in Parkhill, Ontario. He earned his master's degree in physical education with a concentration in athletic administration in 2000.



TOPHER SCOTT

Fourth Season As Assistant Coach Cornell '08

Former Cornell standout Topher Scott '08 rejoined the Big Red men's ice hockey family as an assistant coach in July 2011. He spent the previous season as a volunteer assistant coach at Miami (Ohio).

Scott's responsibilities with the RedHawks included breaking down game film and assisting in skill development with players, among other duties. Miami (Ohio) posted a 23-10-6 record and featured two Hobey Baker Award finalists, including winner Andy Miele. The team won its first CCHA tournament title, claiming the Mason Cup with a win over Western Michigan in the finals. A No. 1 seed in the 2011 NCAA tournament, the RedHawks finished the year eighth in both national polls. In all, three players on the team signed professional contracts.

As a four-year letter winner for the Big Red, Scott was a finalist for the Hockey Humanitarian Award and the Lowe's Senior Class Award as a senior. He received the Nicky Bawlf Award as the most valuable player of the 2007-08 Cornell men's hockey team, while also receiving the Bill Doran Sportsmanship Award for the third consecutive

season and the Mark Weiss Award. Scott finished the 2007-08 season with 30 points on 10 goals and 20 assists, with the 30 points and 10 goals both serving as his single-season highs. He concluded his Cornell career as the 44th player in Cornell history to score 100 points, finishing with 107 points on 25 goals and 82 assists. He played in all 138 of Cornell's games during his career, the second-most appearances in Cornell history. He was named honorable mention All-Ivy League for his play as a senior. Scott was team captain as a senior and was an assistant captain as a junior and was hailed for his services to the community, including coming up with the idea for an annual "Teddy Bear Toss" for the Cancer Resource Center of the Finger Lakes and the Franziska Racker Centers.

Following his collegiate career, Scott played professional hockey in the Central Hockey League for the Texas Brahmas and the Rio Grande Valley Killer Bees before heading to Miami (Ohio) to begin work on his master's degree in sports behavior and performance while beginning his coaching career. Scott and his wife, Emma, reside in the Ithaca area.



LYLE GREGORY

First Season As Volunteer Assistant Coach Hendrix '14

Gregory joined the Big Red in advance of the 2014-15 season. He served as an intern at the NHL Entry Draft from 2011-14, and he was the lead intern from 2012-14 for the scouting combine run by the NHL's Central Scout-

ing Service.

Gregory was also a business and technology intern with Video Scout for two years, where he field-tested new scouting technology and patent-pending player evaluation

tools. He has also worked as a freelance scout for NHL draft eligible prospects and college scholarship recruits. He filmed and acquired scout-specific video for NHL teams during the 2013 USA National Junior Team Evaluation Camp in Lake Placid, N.Y.

Originally from Connecticut, Gregory has served as a goalie coach and assistant coach for Yale Youth Hockey, the Arkansas Hockey Association and ProCrease.

Gregory earned a degree in philosophy from Hendrix College in Arkansas, where he also competed on the men's lacrosse team.

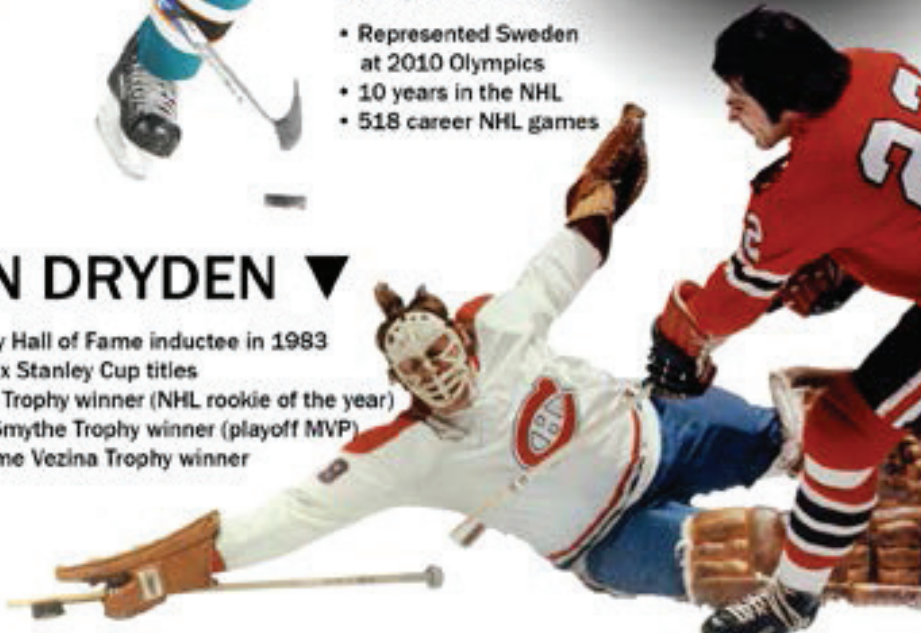
