PUCK DROP

The Cornell women's hockey team plays the first of its two exhibition games against Canadian opponents this evening when it hosts McGill, who are playing the first of its three exhibition games in as many days against Ivy League opponents.

ECAC PRESEASON POLL

During ECAC's annual media day, Cornell was picked to finish sixth in the preseason poll, the conference announced Sept. 14.

Colgate was selected the preseason favorite after receiving six of the 11 possible first-place votes. The Raiders finished with a conference-best 115 points. Yale, who received three first-place votes, was picked second with 98 points, and Princeton ended with 97 points and one first-place selection. Quinnipiac had the fourth-most points (92 points), while Clarkson received the last first-place vote, finishing with 86 points, good for fifth. Cornell (73), Harvard (67), St. Lawrence (60), Brown (33), RPI (30), Dartmouth (27), and Union (14) rounded out the preseason voting.

GUILDAY NAMED TO PRESEASON TEAM

Sophomore **RORY GUILDAY** was one of two defensemen named to the All-ECAC Hockey preseason team during the conference's annual media day on Sept. 14.

Guilday had a strong freshman year for the Big Red last season. In 29 games, the 5-foot-11 defender logged 18 points (seven goals, 11 assists) while blocking 74 shots, which was second on the team, trailing **ASHLEY MESSIER**'s team-high 78 blocks.

BIG RED RANKS IN TOP 15

Cornell has remained in the top 15 of both the DCU/USCHO.com and *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* polls through the first four weeks of action, despite not having played any regular-season contests.

The Big Red opened the season ranked No. 12 in both polls before jumping up to as high as No. 11 in the *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* poll on Sept. 19 and in the most recent poll (Oct. 3).

Of the 15 teams ranked in both polls, Cornell is currently scheduled to play eight of the remaining 14 programs currently in the top 15. Two of which (Ohio State — No. 1 — and Northeastern — No. 3) are ranked in the top 5.

GUILDAY EARNS SILVER

Sophomore defenseman **RORY GUILDAY** earned a silver medal for Team USA at the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championships in Denmark last month.

On the other side of the gold medal game, **BRIANNE JENNER** '13 scored twice in a span of 1:24 to aid the Canadians to its second consecutive and 12th overall gold medal. Fellow former Big Red players, **MICAH ZANDEE-HART** '20 and **KRISTIN O'NEILL** '20, aided the Canadians to the tournament win.

Guilday appeared in all seven games for Team USA, logging a goal and three assists.

It was Guilday's second time representing the United States at the national level, but the first time with the senior team. Guilday played for Team USA at the IIHF Women's Under-18 Championships in 2020 in Bratislava, Slovakia.

BIG RED QUARTET EARN GOLD

Four of Cornell's six incoming freshmen won a gold medal with Team Canada at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championships in Madison, Wis., this past June.

Forwards **AVI ADAM** and **MCKENNA VAN GELDER**, along with defensemen **SARAH MACEachern** and **ALYSSA REGALADO** helped the Canadians to a 3-2 victory over Team USA in the gold medal game.

van Gelder logged a goal and two assists in Canada's six contests. MacEachern also had a pair of assists while appearing in all games. Regalado logged one point, which came on a goal in a 7-0 victory over Slovakia in its quarterfinal round matchup.

RETURNING POWER

 Cornell is returning majority of its offense from last year's team as 18 players who registered at least one game played last year are back for the Big Red.

 Just over 94 percent of the Big Red's total offense from last year is back, returning 179 of its 190 points from the 2021-22 campaign. Nearly 92 percent of Cornell's goal scoring from last year (67 of 73 goals) return, including both of the Cornell's double-digit scorers in **LILY DELIANEDIS** (14) and **GILLIS FRECHETTE** (12).

 Frechette, who led the team with her 40 points (12 goals, 28 assists), is one of the top nine scorers from last year who are back for the Big Red in 2022-23. The others on the list include Delianedis, **IZZY DANIEL**, **RORY GUILDAY**, **KAITLIN JOCKIMS**, **ASHLEY MESSIER**, **LEAH MacSWEEN**, **GABBIE RUD**, and **CLAUDIA YU**.

 Every player who scored a game-winning goal for Cornell last year is back, while 14 of the Big Red's 16 goals scored on the power play are also returning.

LEADERSHIP GROUP ANNOUNCED

 Cornell will deploy tri-captains for the upcoming season, as seniors **GILLIS FRECHETTE** and **IZZY DANIEL**, along with sophomore **ASHLEY MESSIER**, have been named the captains for the 2022-23 season.

 Frechette and Daniel were two of four alternate captains for last year's squad, which was captained by then fifth-year goaltender **LINDSAY BROWNING**.

LYNAH FAITHFUL

 Cornell has excelled at playing in front of the fans at Lynah Rink, who are deemed the Lynah Faithful, over the last 12-plus seasons. The Big Red have had at least a .500 win percentage at home in 11 of the past 12 seasons of competition, posting an overall record of 158-39-16 in that span.

 Since the 2009-10 season, Cornell's .779 win percentage on home ice ranks as the third-highest by a Division I program in that span. The Big Red trails perennial powers Wisconsin (193-28-14 — .851) and Minnesota (210-33-16 — .842).

 The Big Red's .779 win percentage is the highest by a current ECAC program, with the closest program to Cornell being Clarkson, who ranks fifth nationally with its .772 win percentage (177-43-26).

Four Cornell players (**MADDIE MILLS, KRISTIN O'NEILL, LENKA SERDAR, and DIANA BUCKLEY**) logged two-point nights in the victory.

🍁 The last time Cornell and McGill squared off was Jan. 2, 2015, with the Big Red prevailing, 3-0. **BRIANNE JENNER** and **JILLIAN SAULNIER** recorded three-point nights, and **STEFANNIE MOAK** had a 20-save shutout.

👉 Former Cornell player **JESSICA CAMPBELL** '14 will make history Oct. 16 when the Coachella Firebirds, the Seattle Kraken's American Hockey League affiliate, plays its inaugural game as Campbell will be the first woman to be behind the bench of an American Hockey League team.

 Campbell's role with the Firebirds will include working with the team's special teams units, while also helping player development in aspects such as skills and skating.

🏒 The 2022 calendar year has led Campbell in logging many miles across the world. In Aug. 2021, she was named President of Girls Hockey for the Chicago Young Americans. She then headed across the Atlantic Ocean, spending time in Germany with the Nurnberg Ice Tigers of the DEL as a skills coach before being promoted to an assistant coach in the middle of the season.

Her time with the Ice Tigers led Campbell to be an assistant coach with the German National Team at the World Championships in Finland in May. Campbell coached current NHLers including Tim Stützle and the reigning Calder Trophy winner, Moritz Seider.

 This past summer, Campbell worked as a guest coach with the New York Rangers at its development camp before being hired by Stanley Cup-winning head coach, Dan Bylsma, who is the head coach for the Firebirds.

The Everett Family Head Coach of Women's Ice Hockey 18th season as Head Coach

Derraugh brings a 309-166-47 record into the 2022-23 season as he begins his 18th season as the head coach of the Big Red, the program's longest-tenured head coach. During his time on East Hill, Derraugh has built Cornell into an perennial contender on both the league and national stages.

The pinnacle of that ascent, so far, was a remarkable 2019-20 season that ended in unprecedented heartbreak, when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancelation of the NCAA Tournament which featured Cornell as the top overall seed for the first time in program history following a 28-2-3 record. It also marked the first time the Big Red ended both ECAC Hockey (19-0-3) and Ivy League (10-0) seasons undefeated, boasting a national-best goals-against average of just 0.94. Then-junior goaltender, **LINDSAY BROWNING**, was the program's first netminder to earn All-America status as Cornell advanced to the ECAC Hockey championship game for the ninth time in 11 seasons.

Derraugh helped lead the Big Red back to the Women's Frozen Four for a fourth time to culminate a 2018-19 season that ended with a 24-6-6 record — highlighted by dramatic postseason performances. **MICAH ZANDEE-HART** '20 scored the double-overtime winner over Princeton in the league semifinals, and then-freshman **GILLIS FRECHETTE** lifted the Big Red through the first round of the NCAA Tournament with a breakaway goal in overtime against Northeastern.

The Big Red's current prominence is a far cry from when Derraugh took the helm for the 2005-06 season, when he inherited a program that was coming off a 3-23-3 campaign. By 2009-10, the fruits of Derraugh's labors took the Big Red to new heights with a stunning run to the national championship game. That proved to be just the tip of the iceberg.

Including that run, Cornell posted five consecutive 20-win seasons — including all four of the Big Red's ECAC Hockey championships. Cornell has won six league regular-season titles and seven Ivy League crowns under Derraugh. For his efforts, Derraugh is a five-time ECAC Hockey Coach of the Year, three-time AHCA Division I National Coach of the Year, and the USCHO Division I National Coach of the Year on one occasion.

Concurrent to his time at Cornell, Derraugh has also served in some capacity with Hockey Canada since the 2012 IIHF Women's Worlds. He most recently served as an assistant coach at the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing, China, where the Canadians won gold. He also helped the Canadians in their championship run at the 2021 IIHF Women's Worlds in Calgary. On Aug. 31, Canada won their first title since 2012 after passing the United States in a 3-2 overtime thriller. Along with Derraugh, five Cornell alumnae were also members of Team Canada (**REBECCA JOHNSTON** '12, **BRIANNE JENNER** '15, **JILL SAULNIER** '15, **JAIME BOURBONNAIS** '20, and **KRISTIN O'NEILL** '20). **LENKA SERDAR** '19 (Czech Republic) and **SARAH KNEE** '18 (Hungary) also competed in the 2021 Women's Worlds.

Derraugh's roots at Cornell go back to his own playing days, when he racked up 153 points on 66 goals and 87 assists (currently 10th all-time on the program's career scoring list) with the Big Red's men's team. He then played professionally in Europe for 13 years before returning to Ithaca to assume his current role.

A native of Arnprior, Ontario, Derraugh graduated from Cornell in 1991 with a degree in biological sciences. He and his wife, Louise, who serves as the team's director of operations, have three children.

EDITH RACINE

Fourth Season as Associate Head Coach 14th Season at Cornell

Racine enters her fourth season as the Associate Head Coach of the Cornell women's hockey team. The 2022-23 season will be Racine's 14th overall season with the Big Red program since joining the coaching staff prior to the 2009-10 season. Instrumental in developing the Big Red's goalkeepers, during Racine's first season as an Associate Head Coach, she helped coach Lindsay Browning to become the first-ever Cornell goalie to earn All-America honors and to finish in the top-10 for the Patty Kazmaier trophy. That year, Browning led the nation in goals-against average (0.91), shutouts (12), and win percentage (.894). Browning's .952 save percentage was second, only behind Northeastern's Aerin Frankel. Prior to arriving on East Hill, Racine spent two seasons at ECAC Hockey and Ivy League rival, Brown, serving as a volunteer assistant in 2007-08 before being promoted to a full-time assistant coach for the 2008-09 campaign. Racine also spent six summers as the head goaltending instructor at the Elite Hockey Camp in Hanover, N.H. At the collegiate level, Racine spent four seasons at Elmira College, where she guided the Eagles to a pair of national titles and a national runner-up finish. Racine was a two-time All-American by the American Collegiate Hockey Association.

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TIM CROWLEY

First Season as Assistant Coach

Crowley joined the Cornell women's hockey coaching staff in September 2022 after spending the last 10 years on the Elmira women's hockey team coaching staff, spending the last six as head coach. Crowley directed Elmira to a 127-21-10 record over six seasons and a remarkable 88-4-3 conference record to become the winningest coach in program history. Discounting the COVID-shortened 2020-21 season, the Soaring Eagles won four consecutive United Collegiate Hockey Conference (UCHC) regular-season and tournament titles before capturing the 2021-22 New England Hockey Conference (NEHC) regular season and tournament titles. Elmira qualified for the NCAA Division III Championships each season. As interim head coach in 2016-17, Crowley's team went 14-2-2 and was runner-up at the ECAC West Tournament before making its fifth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Division III Tournament. He then guided Elmira to the inaugural UCHC regular-season and tournament titles, and a runner-up finish in the NCAA title game in 2017-18. Elmira won at least 22 games in four of the next five seasons, going 13-1 during the COVID-interrupted 2020-21 campaign. Before taking over the women's program, Crowley spent four years as an assistant men's coach. During his time on the bench, Crowley helped guide the Soaring Eagles to the program's 10th ECAC West Title and had one player receive ACHA All-American accolades.
